

MAINTAINING THE PEACE

3 PPCLI has been in Croatia for about one month now, and it's been quite a month. The deployment went well, the three flights out of Vancouver and the one from Winnipeg all left and arrived pretty well on schedule. They were fairly uneventful, with the exception of a rather bumpy landing in Glasgow, Scotland on the third flight. Once the aircraft landed in Zagreb we were herded onto buses and driven to Camp Polom, an abandoned Yugoslavian Army Camp just outside of Daruvar. From there the various companies moved out to their respective areas.

It took over a week to complete the handover of responsibility from the R22eR to us, but finally on 5 October, 1992, 3 PPCLI took control of the CANBAT area of UNPROFOR Sector West. We share Sector West with the Argentinean, Nepalese and Jordanian Contingents, and we share Camp Polom with a Finnish Construction Platoon and a Dutch Signal Section, so there is no shortage of international involvement here.

The average day for a

soldier on the line consists of a shift at a checkpoint or on a patrol followed by some time spent improving his section or platoon house, and finally, if he's lucky, some spare time to read or write a letter.

There are three main tasks that the soldiers here perform, these are, manning fixed checkpoints, mobile checkpoints and conducting

vehicle or dismounted patrols. The fixed checkpoints are similar in design to a police roadblock and the soldiers stop vehicles and search them for weapons or ammunition. The mobile checkpoints perform the same function, however they are set up at random locations for a short period of time, like the RIDE program. The patrols are usually done

in Armoured Personnel Carriers (13 ton vehicles that look sort of like a box on tracks) due to the expanse of the area we cover, CANBAT covers 40 km by 25 km, but there are dismounted patrols conducted in some of the towns and villages in the area.

Please consider the following for publication in the Letters to the Editor portion of your paper.

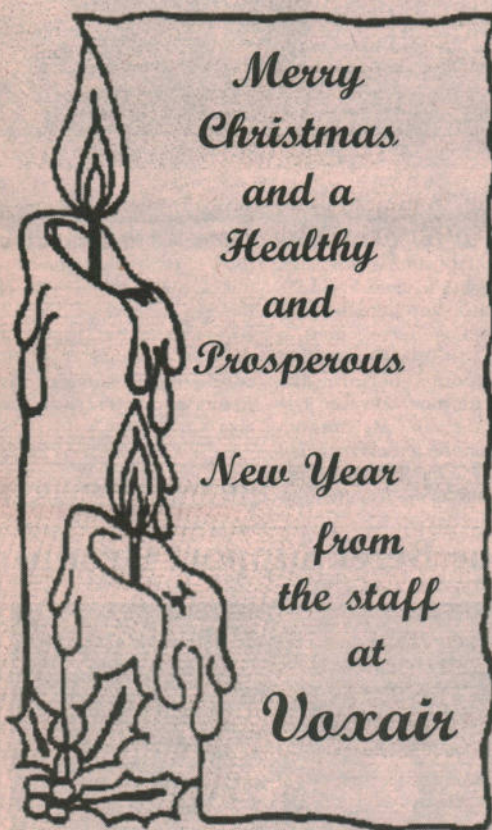

Randy Travis, in many ways, is solely responsible for pioneering the 'new traditionalist' role in country music. When he hit the scene he literally exploded with hit after hit and won every award available. It's been a half-dozen years, or so, since he first caught the spotlight and in those years he's become a heart-throb, a hit-maker, a pioneer, an award winner and just about everything else. He is also one of the reasons that country music has met with such a great resurgence.

In the years he has been recording, he's had one hit after another yet there's never been a greatest hits package. Like so many other

The purpose of all these activities is to enforce the Vance Agreement, one of the main provisions of which is the removal of all firearms from the UNPA (United Nations Protected Area). As a result the soldiers spend a substantial amount of time looking for, and confiscating, weapons and ammunition. The variety of military hardware they have found over here is truly astounding, everything from four or five rifle rounds under the seat of a car to three six foot long surface to air missiles in the back of a truck.

We have had our share of excitement. On 10 October, there was an ambush of a civilian car in B Company's area that resulted in one dead and three seriously wounded and there would have been more dead if it hadn't been for the fast reactions and high calibre of first aid performed by 5 Platoon and the Battalion Medical Section. Reconnaissance Platoon and D Company had a few very

firsts in his career, Travis has just released a pair of Greatest Hits packages on the Warner Bros label. Yes, it is taking a chance to do such a thing. Guns N' Roses did it with pretty predictable results - multi-platinum. Bruce Springsteen released a pair of albums at the same time. However, Springsteen had been off the charts for a while and his results, even with a tour to promote them, didn't exactly set the world on fire. Will it work for Travis? Probably.

Each cassette, or CD, is loaded with eight hits each and, add to that the fact that each contains two future singles and I think you're looking at (or listening to) a decision that will pay off in gold or platinum. In Volume

One Travis loads the set with *Deeper Than The Holler*, *On The Other Hand*, *Hard Rock Bottom Of Your Heart* and his career opener 1982. His current single *If I Didn't Have You* is the lead-off track and being that it is currently sitting at the #1 position it will draw huge response.

Volume Two contains such chart and sales monsters as *Forever and Ever Amen*, *Diggin' Up Bones*, *It's Just A Matter of Time* and *He Walked On Water*. This set has two brand new songs that will also be released for the singles market. They are *Look Heart*, *No Hands* and *Take Another Swing At Me*.

With the exception of very few artists (Garth Brooks,

George Strait) no one else has the popularity to sustain two albums of Greatest Hits simultaneously. Randy Travis is a trendsetter and a hitmaker of unparalleled credentials. This will be the true test of his popularity.

TRAVIS TRITT

Fresh from the success of his *No Hats* tour with Marty Stuart and currently on location filming with Kenny Rogers, Travis Tritt is in T-R-O-U-B-L-E (Warner Bros). Actually, he's not in trouble, rather that is the name of his latest album and it's a dynamite release. Currently enjoying top-5 success with his paean to the blue-collar worker via his *Lord Have Mercy On The Working Man*, Tritt has assembled a solid no-frills country outing that will keep him at the forefront of his craft.

Looking Out For Number One, an uptempo gem with jangling guitars and solid drum/bass interplay, opens the proceedings. The set then goes into a ballad mode with *Can I Trust You With My Heart* and Tritt hits full stride with the raucous title

track. This one is like a runaway train with its screaming guitars, bouncy piano, bottom line bass and enough potential to blow right out of the box and kiss off the top-100. If Jerry Lee Lewis had a track like this, he'd be right back on the charts.

It's back to the ballads with *When I Touch You* and a midtempo shuffler in *A Hundred Years From Now*. Set rounds out with the Buddy Guy-penned *Leave My Girl Alone* and Tritt's own compositions *Worth Every Mile* and *I Wish I Could Go Back Home*. This one is a country hit with pop potential.

Employee Assistance Program

Hi!

I have an important message for you! I would like to make sure that you know about the Employee Assistance Program or EAP.

The EAP has been jointly developed by unions and management to help employees troubled by personal health or behavioral problems. The program provides advice and assistance, and referral to an appropriate resource when required.

Any problem that impairs an employee's job performance should receive appropriate remedial attention, don't you agree?

The Department of National Defence recognizes that you, as an employee, are its most valuable resource. Consequently, the EAP has been developed to ensure that appropriate assistance will be available to you if and when you need it. You are free to request this assistance even if your personal problem has not begun to affect your job performance. In the unlikely event that your work performance should begin to deteriorate, your supervisor will probably advise you to see an EAP referral agent.

You are free to accept or refuse EAP assistance. In either case, your work performance will have to return to an acceptable level. If it doesn't, you could lose your job! On the other hand, if you request assistance through EAP, doing so will not endanger your job security, or your chances of future promotion or transfer.

You may be assured that if you seek confidential assistance from a Referral Agent, your supervisor will not be informed of the nature of your problem, unless you give your EAP Referral Agent written authorization to do so.

Referral agents are trained to assist you, and will refer you to a professional or agency if you decide that this is appropriate. Referral Agents available near you are listed below, and the one that you choose to consult will be pleased to assist you.

The simple belief expressed above has been the backbone of the Employee Assistance Program (E.A.P.) for the past ten years, and it's a principle especially dear to MWO Fred LeCaine.

Since the fall of '91, Fred has been the chairperson of CFB Winnipeg's E.A.P., part of the countrywide program supported by both labour and management. Nationally, the EAP trains employee volunteers throughout the federal government to serve as Referral Agents (RAs): people who can quickly and confidentially link troubled individuals with appropriate sources of assistance.

Operating with the idea that serious personal or family problems can effect an employee's performance and growth, an RA is a sensitive and nonjudgemental listener who's been trained to help fellow employees by providing - confidentially - information about the many support services available in the community. Fred himself started as a Referral Agent back in 1986 while stationed at CFS Baldy Hughes, a radar station in central British Columbia.

Remaining active in the EAP ever since, Fred has also served as a RA at both Canadian NORAD North Bay and his current posting of Air Command Headquarters where, in addition to coordinating the nine base RAs, he's employed as Staff Officer, Communication and Electronic Support 4-2. Married and the co-parent of two daughters, Fred celebrated his 30th year with the RCAF/CF this past fall and so can honestly claim to have "seen it all"!

Fred has completed both the basic and advanced RA training as well as a number of drug and alcohol courses, and has given many informational presentations to the militia and cadets in the Winnipeg area. He encourages calls from managers and employees alike regarding the many resources available from the base Employee Assistance Program and can be reached at local 5937.

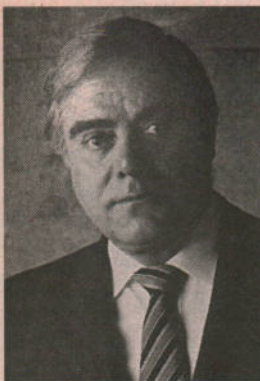

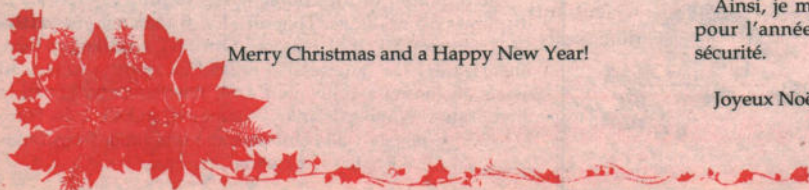

A CHRISTMAS FIRE SAFETY MESSAGE

In the festive season you are reminded that the main causes of fire in the home remain children playing with matches and overheating of cooking oils. You are encouraged to use only CSA or ULC approved thermostatically controlled deep fat fryers. It is also very important to teach your children the dangers of playing with matches and lighters. They should be told to never play with these items.

Holiday Fires

The year-end holiday season—Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, Kwanza, New Year's—is a prime time for residential fires. Decorative lights, candles, parties where people drink and smoke, and especially the onset of the heating season all increase the likelihood of fire.

Watch Children

Keep matches and lighters out of children's reach—up high and preferably in a locked cabinet. Teach young children to stay away from candles, fireplaces, and space heaters. Older children should be taught how to light candles or fireplace fires safely, and they should do so only under direct supervision.

Choose Toys Wisely

When buying presents for children, avoid those that

could be highly flammable. Make sure all electric toys bear a firesafe label from an independent testing laboratory. Keep electric toys away from Christmas trees and paper decorations.

Give Space Heaters Space

Keep space heaters at least 3 feet (approximately 1 meter) away from furniture, bedding, clothing, walls and other things that can burn. Always use the proper fuel for liquid-fuel space heaters, vent them, and refill them only in ventilated areas when they are cool. Make sure the type of heater you are using is legal in your area and has a label from a safety laboratory.

Party Safety

Use only flame-retardant or noncombustible materials for costumes and decorations. Provide smokers with large, deep, non-tip ashtrays and, keep an eye on anyone

who is drinking and smoking. Empty ashtrays often—and wet their contents before dumping them. Check cushions and furniture for smoldering butts.

Holiday Lights

Be sure all decorative lights, indoor and outdoor, bear the label of an independent testing laboratory. Replace any light sets that have cracked or frayed cords or have loose connections. Do not overload outlets or run extension cords under carpets, across doorways on or under heaters, or pinched behind furniture. Unplug all decorative lights before leaving home or going to bed. Never use electric lights on a metal Christmas tree.

Fireplaces

Have your chimney inspected by a professional at least once a year and cleaned if necessary. Always use a fire screen, and burn only materials appropriate for a

fireplace. Never burn trash or paper in a fireplace; burning paper can float up a chimney and onto your roof or into your yard. Remove ashes in a metal container, and never store them in your home.

Candles

Always put candles in non-tip candleholders before you light them, and do not

burn candles near combustible decorations or displays. Keep candles well away from curtains and other combustible articles, and never put candles in windows or near exits. Never leave candles burning unattended or within the reach of small children. Extinguish candles—wetting the wicks—before you leave a room or go to bed.

Cheerful Lights of Christmas bring a special warmth to the holiday season - but each year tragedy strikes somewhere through electrical fires or other accidents.

The main reason is either worn or defective equipment or sheer carelessness.

Christmas lights and electrically-lit decorations are tested and certified by CSA for safety. However, people often forget the most basic rules when handling electrical equipment.

Fire safety precautions should head the list of every sensible family's precautions for Christmas. There is no place like home for the holidays—there is also no place like home for Christmas fire hazards.

It would take an entire book to write a safety manual for Christmas time. Below are a few safety tips.

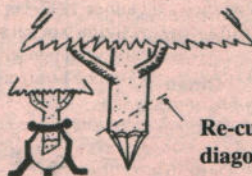
The main thing is to exercise special care in all your Christmas preparations and activities.



Make sure the house is adequately wired and that electrical loads applied do not exceed ampere ratings marked on CSA labels on extension cords. Don't overload circuits.



Never ... never ... leave small children unattended.

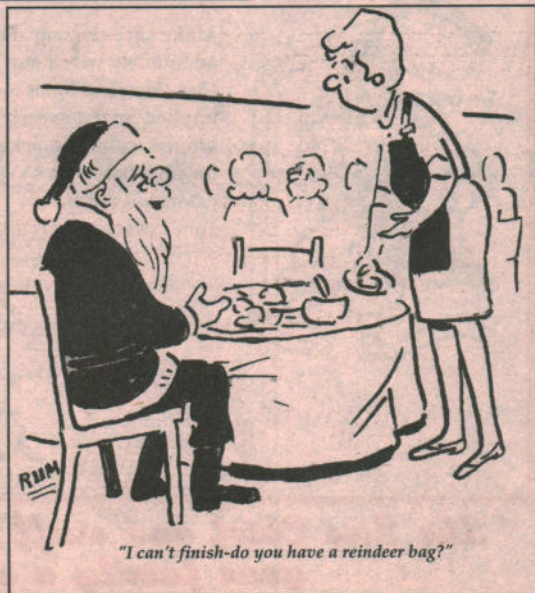

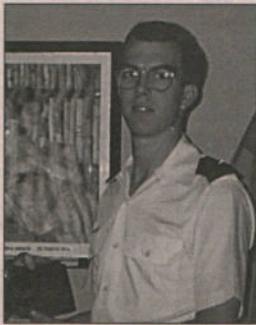
Cpl Dave Serduk receives his new rank of MCpl.

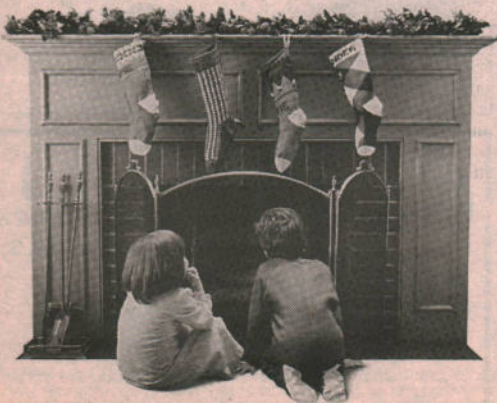

So here we are in Croatia! Nice place to visit, wouldn't want to move here though.

The main body arrived last week completing the company and battalion

deployment. It's good to see the company together again. But even before the main body arrived D Company was tasked out to escort a convoy of approximately 30 vehicles south, from Daruvar to drop-off points in Pakrac and Lipik. The convoy was carrying needed

humanitarian relief supplies to the people in both towns and the surrounding area.

The escort task was conducted in conjunction with several ARGBAT (Argentinean Battalion) personnel who escorted the convoy from their sector to Daruvar.

The company is located in Toranj, about 20 minutes south of Camp Polom in Kapyong Sector. D Company is responsible for conducting vehicle and foot patrols and manning mobile checkpoints. This is done mainly in our sector but we also conduct these tasks in the other company's sectors as

"The guys in Battalion Operations" require.

The company has already done patrols and checkpoints in the Frezenberg and Sanctuary Woods Sectors, these are the sectors belonging to A and B companies of 3 PPCLI respectively. 10 Platoon worked overnight with B Company to assist in surveillance. A cold job but somebody's got to do it.

D Company has also been tasked as the Battalion Reserve. In addition to this, the company is tasked to provide one officer and 15 Armoured Personnel Carriers with a driver, crew commander and gunner

per vehicle to assist with NEPBAT (Nepalese Battalion) to the south. Both the NEPBAT and reserve company tasks are on order.

As well as conducting the many reces and ensuring the company is operational, the last few weeks have involved doing what every good infantry soldier does; that is, try to make life more comfortable where possible. As I'm sure it is with other companies, much is still left to do in this area, but it's coming together.

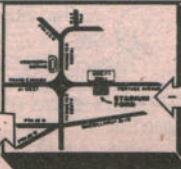
