Phase II in Heritage Park



The CH-136 Kiowa will be put on display in September '93.

Since the opening of Heritage Park (area in front of Sharp gate) on 14 Oct 92, work towards mounting several more service aircraft has continued full force. The three aircraft now on display, the CF-101 Voodoo, the CF-104 Starfighter and the CT-134 Musketeer are an eye-catching sight during the drive into work, and the accompany plaques are an informative source of information for interested civilians. The addition of 7 more aircraft will make the

park even more impressive.

The entire plan for Heritage Park is divided into five phases.

The Freedom Fighter will be tail mounted to give the appearance that it is rocketing skyward with its afterburners on.

Phase I was the mounting of the initial three aircraft. Phase II consists of an F-86 Sabre, a CF-100 Canuck Mk. 4B, a CF-116 (F-5) Freedom Fighter, a

CT-133 Silver Star, a CH-136 Kiowa, a CP-121 Tracker and a CX-144A Challenger.

The Sabre, Canuck, Silver Star and Kiowa will all be pedestal mounted. Due to their large size, both the Tracker and Challenger will be pad mounted. The Freedom Fighter will be tail mounted to give the appearance that it is rocketing skyward with its afterburners on. It will be mounted identically to the F-5 on display at CFB Cold Lake.

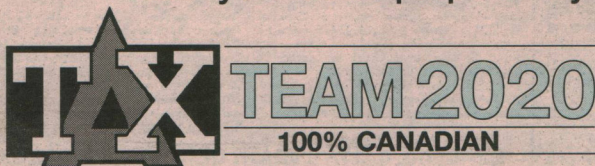
An overview of the Phase II aircraft is as follows:

The Sabre served from August 1950 - November 1968 as a single-seat interceptor and a fighter/bomber capable of carrying 2000 lbs of bombs or rockets and armed with six 50 calibre machine guns.

WATER CONSERVATION QUESTIONNAIRE

When you consider the cost of waste water (sewage) treatment, the extent of contaminated sources and increasing demand for more clean water, it is easy to see why the cost of water is forecasted to double in the next five or more years. Water Conservation, therefore, is increasingly important and the easiest solution to the problem of increasing water prices is to use less water. The following is a Water Conservation questionnaire designed to help reduce water consumption at home and at work. Attempt all questions first and see how you did by checking the answers that follow.

- Toilet flushing is the second highest water use in an average household.

- Installing modern low-flush toilets can reduce toilet water use by 50% or more without reducing the effectiveness of the flush.

9. A run-on toilet (ie. it leaks), if left unrepaired for a full year, can waste as much as 200,000 litres or enough water for a family of two for a full year.

10. Only 2% of the world's fresh water supply is in lakes, rivers and streams. The rest is in ice or underground.
True/False

Answers

- Answer: C. 350 litres**
The average Canadian uses 350 litres of water each day for domestic use. If commercial, industrial and agricultural water uses are included the per capita use grows to 2000 litres per day.
- Answer: True**
Canadians are second only to Americans in domestic water use. The average Canadian uses more than twice as much domestic water as an average European.
- Answer: False**
Water in Canada is as low as one fourth the average price of water in Europe. In Italy and France the price for water is approximately 93¢ per 1000 litres and in Germany and Australia the price is as high as \$1.47 while in Canada the price is a mere 36¢ per 1000 litres. This low price and Canada's large supply has resulted in poor water conservation habits among many Canadians.
- Answer: True**
Modern low flow shower heads can deliver a steady flow or a pulsating massage flow of acceptable performance while using up to 60% less water than a standard shower head. Additional energy savings are made through the reduction of hot water use in the shower.
- Answer: B. Four months**
An average family of four would save at least \$140 a year by installing a \$40 (or less!) low flow shower head. Savings come from reduced water use and reduced hot water heating requirements. A payback period of only four months certainly should justify installing a low flow shower head.

6. **Answer: False**
Toilet flushing is the highest water use in an average household. Toilet flushing usually accounts for 40% (or approximately 140 litres/day) of domestic water use for an average Canadian. Showers and baths are a close second at 35% (or 122 litres/day).

7. **Answer: True**
Standard toilets use about 20 litres per flush, while new low flush toilets require only 6-10 litres for an equally effective flush. Low flush toilets are readily available and easily installed. Installing low flush toilets and low flow shower heads can reduce total domestic water use in an average household by as much as 50%.

8. **Answer: D. Sixteen baths**
Leaky taps are often left unrepaired for months when a 5 cent washer and 10 minutes work could stop the leak. If left for a full year, a one drop per second hot water leak would waste almost 10,000 litres or enough hot water for nearly 200 baths.

9. **Answer: True**
Run-on toilets are a major waster of domestic water. Even silent toilet leaks can waste hundreds of litres of water per day. Check for toilet leaks by adding food colouring to the water in the tank and wait 5-10 minutes without flushing. If the colour shows up in the bowl, there is a leak in the toilet which should be repaired. While you have the tank open, insert a closed water filled glass or plastic jar (be sure not to interfere with the float or other flush mechanisms) and save a jar of water every flush.

10. **Answer: False**
Only 0.2% of the world's fresh water supply is readily available in streams, lakes and rivers. The rest (99.8%) of the world's fresh water supply is found underground or in ice. Only 5% of the world's water supply is fresh water, the rest is salt water. Therefore, only .01% of the world's water supply is found in rivers, lakes and streams. Canada has approximately 9% of the world's renewable fresh water supply.

Water Conservation at Canadian Bases

Canadian Forces Bases can certainly benefit from water conservation, particularly those bases with Private Married Quarters (PMQs). Since bases rather than residents pay for PMQ water use, it would be extremely beneficial to each base if water consumption in PMQs could be cut by 20-25% or more.

A 20-25% reduction in PMQ water use can easily be achieved through a continuing program of installing water conserving devices in each PMQ after a resident has moved out. All old toilets could be replaced with efficient flush toilets, low flow shower heads and faucets could be installed and all leaks found and repaired. A brochure should be left behind to inform the next resident that their new home is a water conserving house and to further educate them in water conservation practices. The same kind of education and retrofit program could also be implemented in all barracks and DND owned office buildings.

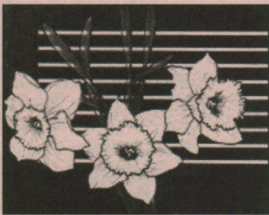
Reducing water consumption and associated sewage at Canadian Forces Stations and Bases can result in large savings. A large base like CFB Ottawa has an annual budget of over \$2,000,000 for water and sewage. A 25% reduction could result in annual savings of \$500,000 which would more than cover the cost of implementing the water conservation program.

By conserving water we not only save money, we save the environment. Using less water means we return fewer harmful chemicals and less untreated sewage to our rivers and lakes. In doing so we will not only create a cleaner, healthier environment for ourselves but will leave a better world for the next generation.

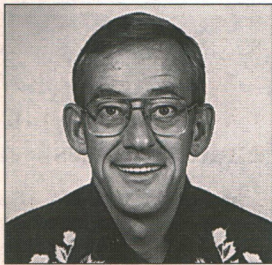

JAMESWOOD SCHOOL

Held hostage by their downed aircraft, a ferocious Arctic storm, bitter cold temperatures and crippling injuries, the survivors and crew of the CC130 Hercules, that crashed near Alert in 1992, deserved to have their story told.

The movie "Ordeal in the Arctic" aptly portrayed some of the trials and tribulations experienced by the survivors of the transport plane disaster.

Coping with the pain of old back injuries recently irritated by

a fall in my office, was foremost in my mind last Monday evening, when my husband accidentally happened upon the movie. Without having reviewed the TV Guide, or having been forewarned of its pending viewing, it was amazing how a non-television viewer such as myself, zeroed in on the familiar blue uniform sweater. With close to a half hour already shown, it was surprising that the movie he had found by chance, should grab the interest of us both so quickly.

Our intuition told us that a true life story was being depicted, and that intuition was confirmed with the next scene, moments later. The barren ice. The snow. The twisted, burning wreckage. The switch of setting to CFB Edmonton further confirmed that we had even named the actual incident being covered in the movie.

For civilians, especially those who have never been associated with the military or its people, it may have been just another tragic, and yet, heroic, picture. But for me (and other educators at Jameswood School), it was another step toward greater understanding of those with whom I work.

The fears of husbands, wives and children of those deployed,

or being deployed on various UN peacekeeping tours, became even more realistic than at any other time in my five and one half years at Jameswood. My own pain soon reduced to a disturbing discomfort, my empathy built, as I watched the fear and agony increase in the survivors of the crash as they awaited rescue units to make their way to the crash site.

I visioned the equally devastating and hopeless feelings experienced by the relatives and family in such a situation. I imagined how their feelings of helplessness and anger would magnify, as reports, of the difficulties experienced by the rescuers in their bid to reach their comrades, hit the air waves. I recalled my own secret prayers of one year ago - prayers for those torn by the waiting both at the crash site, and at home; my prayers for those battling the elements, to stay alive, to be rescued, or to be the rescuer.

"Ordeal in the Arctic" was a salute to our military personnel. It was a reminder to civilians, of another lifestyle: It was a statement of reality. My reply, (our reply, here at Jameswood) is, "Yes, we do understand - we are here, for you, and your children."

ECOLE BANNATYNE SCHOOL

Ecole Bannatyne School is the French Immersion Centre for students residing west of Davidson Street and Bourkewood Place. The school program is designed for students who have little or no knowledge of French.

Students are taught to speak, read and write in French by using French as the language of instruction for all subjects except English Language Arts.

Bannatyne has 280 students enrolled in Kindergarten to Grade 6. Most students began immersion in Kindergarten though some enrolled in Grade 1 and others in the Grade 4 mid-entry immersion class.

February and March are activity filled months at school. February 15 to 19, Voyageur week, students and staff donned Voyageur costumes,

and shared in the fun of a pancake breakfast and winter activity day. The school choir and Grade 3 choir enjoyed participating in the Division Music Celebration and are practising for the Winnipeg Music Festival. In Phys. For 25 years, the Block Parent Program has been working effectively and efficiently in communities across the country:

to protect children

A Block Parent sign in the window lets children in distress know that a Block Parent is home to provide a safe haven.

to make your neighbour hood safer

The Block Parent sign acts as a deterrent to potential offenders who quickly conclude that the neighbourhood has its own safety network.

to protect all members of the community

Block Parent homes offer refuge and assistance to anyone, young or old.

The Block Parent Program provides an organized method of protecting children and adults and involves all members of the community, including police, government, and boards of education.

The red and white graphic is the official symbol of the Block Parent Program. Placed

in a window, it tells children and adults that they will receive help for any emergency. The sign is a warning to criminals that neighbours are on the alert for one another. The sign is displayed only when someone who has been screened is available to help. Absence of the sign does not mean the house is unattended, only that the Block Parent is unavailable.

Block Parents have no legal status except as citizens. They are volunteers, aged 18 years and over who have been screened by police and are willing to provide help during whatever time they have available by displaying the Block Parent sign.

What does a Block Parent do?

- Provides refuge from dangerous or frightening situations.
- Offers assistance to people in distress by phoning police or home.
- Assists police by reporting suspicious activity in the neighbourhood.
- Removes the Block Parent sign when not available.

All new Block Parents receive instructions on proper procedures.

Block Parents are not expected to

- Provide food or beverage, toilet facilities or transportation.
- Administer first aid treatment.
- Leave the home to break up fights or actively engage any dangerous person.

What can you do to support the Block Parent Program?

Explain the Block Parent Program to your children and to use a Block Parent home when:

- alarmed by a stranger, bully, or animal.
- he, she or a friend is in an accident.
- lost, ill or caught in severe weather conditions.

Become a Block Parent yourself

- call your local Block Parent committee.
- contacting your police force.

fill in and mail the form at the end of this article

An application form will be sent to you.

"I can't be a Block Parent because..."

"I work all day."

Even a few hours a week is a help. Children don't only get into trouble between 9:00 and 5:00.

"I don't want to open my home to strangers."

You don't have to. All you're doing is giving sanctuary to a frightened child while you contact parents or police.

"There are enough Block Parents already."

There aren't. Every Block Parent isn't available all the time, so the more, the better.

"I will always help - sign or no sign."

Let the children know it. They are taught to be cautious of strangers, but they know they'll find a "safe stranger" at a home displaying the Block Parent Sign.

"I'm not a parent."

You don't have to be to care about the safety of children.

II

The Canuck was in service from June 1951 - December 1981. It's role was as an all weather Jet fighter which could be loaded with Four Sparrow 2 Missiles and 58 x 2.75" rockets and could travel at speeds up to 640 mph.

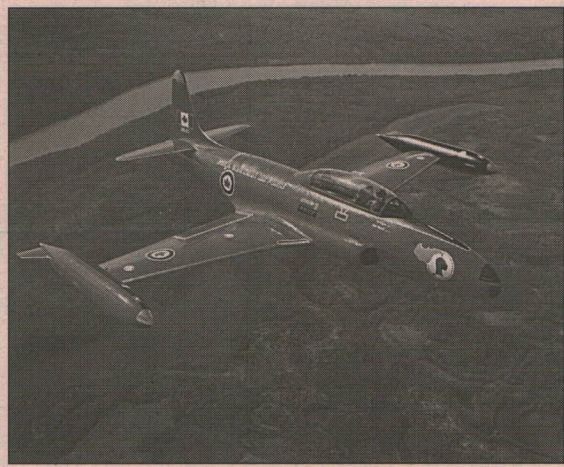
The Freedom Fighter has been in service since 1968.

The role of the CF-5 is Attack/reconnaissance/fighter trainer. It contains two internal 20mm M-39 cannons and external combinations of Aim-9 AAM Missile and 2000 lbs of

bombs or rockets. It reaches speeds of Mach 1.4 at 36,000.'

The Silver Star has been in the forces since January 1953. The CT-33's roles are as a tandem trainer, for photographic reconnaissance and electronic warfare. It is armed with two 50 calibre M-3 machine guns.

The Kiowa, a Light Observation Tactical Transport Helicopter, has been in service since 1971. This chopper has one 7.62mm Minigun and can hold racks of 2.75" rockets.

The Tracker served from January 1957 - April 1991. It was used for anti-submarine warfare and could be armed with 2.75" rockets and depth charge bombs.

The Challenger, which is still in service, first flew on 17 March 1979. It is the second prototype of the aircraft and is used for both testing purposes and VIP transport.

The mounting of these aircraft is planned to be completed by 16 Sep 93. So far the Challenger and the Silver Star are here on base, the Tracker is expected in later this week, the Sabre and Canuck which are coming from Europe are expected soon and the CF-5 will be arriving on 22 March. The Kiowa is coming from flight safety, it is the one that was mentioned at the annual DFS briefing in February.

Phase III is planned for 1994-1998. This phase includes mounting of a CC-115 Buffalo, a CH-124 Sea King, a CH-135 Twin Huey, a CC-137 Boeing and any other available aircraft.

Phase IV includes an undetermined number of vintage aircraft, such as a Canso to be obtained from RCAFA 500 Wing.

Phase V will be the refurbishing of the Mitchell, the Expedito and Dakota already ground mounted in Stevenson Park (at parade square by CFANS). Refurbishing of the Expedito was completed last summer.

In addition to these phases, an attempt to get a CT-114 Tutor is in progress and will be added to the park at a date to be announced later.

Capt Don McKeown, who was posted to BAMEO in April, was tasked as project manager to spearhead this project. He and the many technicians who put in many hours of hard work to successfully complete Phase I should be congratulated and wished luck for the hard work that lies ahead of them in accomplishing the remaining Phases.



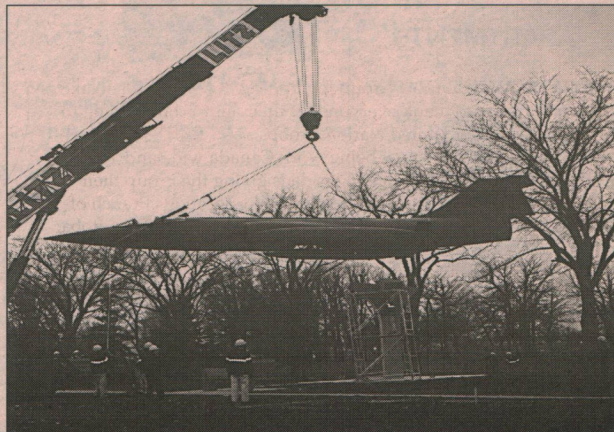

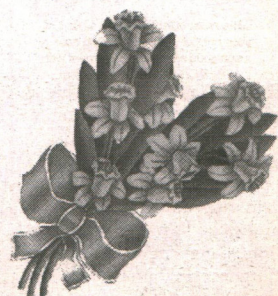

L'ALLIANCE CHORALE MANITOBA - UNE INVITATION A CHANTER

L'Alliance chorale Manitoba, fondée en 1971, est une fédération provinciale à but non lucratif qui a pour mandat de promouvoir le chant choral en français et de favoriser ainsi l'épanouissement de la culture francophone au Manitoba.

A ses débuts, l'Alliance chorale Manitoba s'appelait Mélo-Mani (mélodie-Manitoba). On désignait aussi de Mélo-Manis les fins de semaine "chantantes" au cours desquelles les chanteurs de tout âge d'une région particulière se regroupaient pour chanter, fraterniser et s'amuser,
