CF-5 LANDS AT AIR FORCE HERITAGE PARK

A CF-5 Freedom Fighter has formed on those aircraft already on display at the Air Force Heritage Park. The jet fighter was dedicated in a ceremony at 17 Wing Winnipeg on July 29, 1993. LGen David Huddleston, the Commander of Air Command, and LGen G. Scott Clements, the Commander Designate, unveiled the aircraft at the invitation of the Wing Commander, Col Bert Proulx. In a nose-up, climbing position, the F-5 sits dramatically on a pedestal along Ness Avenue, at Conway Street. Painted in the colours of 434 "Bluenose" Squadron, it will help preserve the rich heritage of Canada's Air Force. Still in service with 419 Tactical

Fighter Squadron, based at 4 Wing Cold Lake, the CF-5 entered service in 1968 and is currently used as an advanced trainer for fighter pilots. The aircraft was beautifully restored by volunteers from 17 Wing, who worked many hours ensuring every detail was correct. Other airmen worked long hours to prepare the display site, and to solve the logistical problems involved in adding the CF-5 to the heritage park. Col Proulx said, "the park has been a labour of love for hundreds of 17 Wing personnel, military and civilian. For those involved, their commitment, spirit, and enthusiasm has been infectious, and I am extremely proud of them." "The incredible collective effort of our personnel is

clearly illustrated by this new aircraft," said Col Proulx. The ceremony included the Air Command Band performing the Air Force March-Past, and a fly-past of four Tutor jets from the Central Flying School, based at 17 Wing. The Air Force Heritage Park is the largest and best park of its type in Canada. It is also an important tourist attraction for Winnipeg, emphasizing the important relationship between the Air Force, 17 Wing and the city. However, the Air Force Heritage Park is not complete. Three more aircraft will be unveiled in a ceremony on September 17, 1993. These include a CF-100 Canuck, an F-86 Sabre, and a T-33 Silver Star. There are also plans to add two aircraft to the park each year.

CF medical team saves Norwegian

A UN military observer (UNMO) from Norway is home recovering from two near-fatal bullet wounds thanks to a Canadian medical team. The emergency surgery that saved his life was performed under the canvas of a Canadian army surgical hospital with the 2nd Battalion of the Royal 22e Regiment Battle Group.

The battle group is stationed in Visoko, Bosnia-Herzegovina, about 35 km north-west of Sarajevo, as part of the United Nations Protection Force (UNPROFOR) in ex-Yugoslavia.

For the Norwegian, the arduous 15-hour adventure began in mid-June just before lunchtime. While on duty near the refugee-filled Muslim enclave of Gorazde in eastern Bosnia, he was hit in the chest by four bullets. His bullet-proof UN vest stopped two rounds, his chest and right shoulder stopped the other two.

Evacuated immediately to a crowded civilian hospital in Gorazde, he was treated by a French UN medical team. The team inserted a tube to drain his chest injury and temporarily patched up his shoulder. Meanwhile, the team tried to arrange an emergency helicopter medevac to Visoko, which required patient negotiations with wary local authorities.

In Visoko, the Canadians

were alerted to be on standby for a "severely wounded" UNMO scheduled to arrive as early as 5 p.m. But negotiations in Gorazde went slowly and the French team wasn't able to unload the Norwegian onto the on-call medevac chopper, a French Puma, until 6 p.m.

Then yet another delay. Only moments after takeoff, the helicopter was required to land to satisfy officials at a local checkpoint that wasn't carrying anyone, or anything, not already on the aircraft's manifest, filed earlier — all this despite UN assurances it was an emergency medevac flight.

The Puma was finally cleared for takeoff by 7 p.m. and speedily headed west for Visoko. Just before 8 p.m., a concerned medical team, led

Boucher, met the incoming chopper and whisked its patient by ambulance to the well-equipped canvas hospital nearby.

The preliminary examination told a sad story. The two wounds had seriously deteriorated during the needless delays and anesthesiologist Maj Paul Connelly was soon

GO GREEN AT LUNCH AND BREAKS

The way we spend our coffee and lunch breaks at the office also affects the environment. The 3 Rs of environmental responsibility can be applied whether you have a small coffee machine or kitchen facilities in your office, use a cafeteria in your building or eat out. (Most of these suggestions also apply to meetings where food and beverages are provided.)

REDUCE

- If your office uses a coffee service or your building's cafeteria is operated under contract, inform suppliers of your office's desire to reduce packaging. Refuse individual coffee pouches, disposable dishes and utensils, single-serving containers of creamer and sweeteners, etc.

- If your office has its own coffee machine, get together with your colleagues to purchase milk and sweeteners in bulk. Again, you reduce the waste created by individual containers and packaging.

- If you bring your lunch to work, make it by packing it in a reusable container (e.g., a washable rigid plastic container, a milk bag washed and slit at one end, or a nylon or cloth lunch bag).

- Bring a drink in a thermos or other reusable container instead of buying one packaged in a single serving.

- Use a cloth napkin instead of a disposable paper towel or serviette.

- If you eat out, urge restaurant managers to eliminate the use of disposable dishes and single-serving containers.

Make your voice heard—and take your business to green establishments.

- Washing dishes by machine uses less water than hand-washing. If your workplace has a dishwasher, run it only when full. Use the air dry setting or shut off the unit before drying and open the door. If possible, operate the dishwasher at off-peak hours and use phosphate-free detergents.

REUSE

- Use reusable coffee cups and keep extras on hand for visitors. If your work space is not close to the coffee machine or cafeteria, a mug with a lid will help to prevent spills and keep your beverage warm.

- Encourage your cafeteria or local coffee shop to sell travel

mugs.

- Use refillable soap containers. Encourage the purchase of liquid cleaning products in concentrated form.

- Use reusable tea towels in your office kitchen.

- If you have vending machines, ask the operator to offer soft drinks in refillable bottles (in provinces where these are sold).

RECYCLE

- Although reusable containers are best, recyclable bottles or cans are better than non-recyclable containers such as foil-lined cardboard juice boxes.

- Where possible, make sure any used glass or cans are recycled.

- Volunteers could take turns bringing recyclables home to

place in their blue boxes.

- Where curb-side recycling is not available, consider setting up bins that could be taken to a recycling depot. Another possibility is arranging for a recycling company to make a regular pick-up at your building.

- If your office has a coffee room or kitchen, collect compostable food waste (e.g., coffee grounds, fruit and vegetable peelings, etc.) in a covered container for a volunteer to take home daily.

- Composting of restaurant and cafeteria food preparation wastes is not yet well established. You should, however, encourage the managers of places you frequent to investigate this option.

preparing the patient for what was clearly going to be a long and delicate operation.

The examination revealed that the first round had passed through the Norwegian's left lung before entering the pericardial sac — the pocket around the heart. It had then perforated the thymus — a small organ below the neck — before stopping in the right lung.

Shortly after arriving, the Norwegian went into shock — the chest injury had caused blood to collect around his heart, acutely restricting its pumping action. Without an immediate operation, the Norwegian didn't have a chance.

Boucher, Connelly, and the surgeon, Maj Reza Mehran, were joined in the canvas operating theatre by the rest of the team: Capt Cathy Jefferies, an operating room nurse; Cpl Craig Harvey, a medical assistant; and two operating room technicians, Sgts Michel Auclair and Daniel Swanson. The team had performed surgery together a dozen times since their tour began in May.

Mehran, a reservist from Montreal, was specializing in chest surgery at the University of Montreal. His first step was to open the chest cavity to remove a large blood-clot from the pericardial sac. This done, the Norwegian's blood pressure quickly rose to normal as the pressure on the heart eased.

Next Mehran turned to the damaged lungs. A bullet was removed from the right lung and a fragment of the same round was removed from the left one. Tubes were inserted to drain the chest cavity and wound were sutured closed.

The least life-threatening injury, the shoulder, was left to last. Surprisingly, there was no bone damage as the bullet had been stopped by two layers of shoulder muscle. The wound was opened, the bullet extracted, and a drain-tube inserted to reduce the chance of infection.

Following the four-hour operation, the patient was placed in intensive care under 24-hour supervision. Next morning, after giving the patient a thorough check-up, Mehran phoned the Norwegian's son and gave him a full report on his father's condition.

Less than a week later, the father was home with his son and on the road to a full recovery.

Peacemakers. Brooks gave a presentation about what it was like to be over there to around 75 students. One of his comments to them was "You keep writing and we'll keep writing back, contact with home - even with school age strangers is good for morale." Before leaving he personally handed each student a Blue Ribbon.

The Blue Beret Support Group would like to thank Jerry for helping raise awareness of the U.N. Peacemaking troops. Hats off to you and all the "U.N. Buddies" who take time to answer all the letters, keep up the good work.

STARWATCH

I hope that last month's article will have helped a number of readers to locate the asteroid Vesta. Those who did catch a glimpse of it will have developed a heightened interest in these minor planets so this month I would like to write about them in greater detail.

The Asteroid Belt.

It has been calculated that there are at least 44,000 minor planets detectable within the photographic ability of a 2.5 metre telescope and obviously there will be thousands more too small and faint to be detected. It is true that the mean orbit of asteroids in general is at a distance of 2.8 Astronomical Units (AU) from the Sun but specific asteroids have orbits that vary in distance and inclination. This creates a wide zone between the orbits of Mars and Jupiter that is referred to as the Asteroid Belt. The Belt is commonly assumed to be five hundred million kilometres in diameter and while this measurement includes the vast majority of asteroids, there are some that lie outside of it. One such group called the Apollo Asteroids have orbits that cut inside the Earth's path around the Sun.

The Origin of the Asteroids.

Why do we find many small objects orbiting in the Belt rather than a single planet? One fanciful but often proposed theory is that such a planet did form and the asteroids are the debris left over from its destruction in some cataclysmic event. The truth is much less spectacular but more interesting. In 1918 the Japanese astronomer Hirayama noted that some of the asteroids could be grouped into three families based on similarities in their orbits. He believed that these families were formed when a large asteroid broke up, probably as a result of a collision with another asteroid. Subsequent work by other astronomers has confirmed the existence of families. The number of groupings is open to question but the Italian astronomer Zappala has identified twenty-one which are supported by good evidence. Kuiper, in 1958, determined that if the number of asteroids of different masses were compared, asteroids of sixty kilometres in diameter were very significant. He concluded that asteroids smaller than this were the result of collisions and ones greater than this diameter were original asteroids essentially unchanged from the period when the solar system was forming. Another clue lies in the existence of

Kirkwood's Gaps. These are gaps in the Belt discovered by Kirkwood in 1866. He determined that they were caused by the perturbing effects of Jupiter's gravity on asteroids which would originally have orbited in these locations. One of the gaps occurs where an asteroid which would have occupied it took six years to complete its orbit around the Sun. Jupiter takes twelve years for a complete orbit so twice in every twelve year period Jupiter would pull on the asteroid in the same direction changing its orbit. Other such resonance points related with gaps occur where the asteroids had periods of one third, two fifths and three fifths of Jupiter's year.

It seems evident that Jupiter's gravitational attraction was the reason for the failure of a single large planet to form. Perturbations caused by Jupiter created collisions between asteroids that reduced many of them to the small fragments that we observe today. The larger asteroids such as Ceres, Pallas and Vesta must have formed early and attained a size where their own gravity helped them to accrete other planetesimals and so were able to grow beyond the point where they could be broken up, but the continual churning by Jupiter distributed material across the Belt preventing further significant development.

The Apollo Asteroids.

The asteroids which cross the Earth's orbit are worth further mention. We have fairly good orbital data for about one hundred such objects although more have been seen and estimates of how many there might be range as high as 1,500 object one kilometre and greater in diameter. Some of these objects are the remains of comets but most show characteristics similar to Belt asteroids. In December of 1992 the asteroid Toutatis passed within 3.6 million kilometres of Earth and radar images showed it to be a binary, two objects, one four kilometres in diameter the other two and a half. They appear to be fused together and are probably re-combined fragments of a larger asteroid which had broken up. Toutatis may have been launched into its Earth crossing orbit by the collision that broke up its parent body.

While such collisions have occurred and I have written about large meteoric impacts in previous articles, the likelihood of such an event is low. With today's technology it is probable that we would be able to identify the imminence of such a collision and, given enough time, could avert it by deflecting the object from our path with nuclear explosions.

BETTE'S GREATEST; NEIL UNPLUGGED

Bette Midler is one of the most successful entertainers in history. She has appeared in some of the biggest box-office hits (*Down & Out in Beverly Hills*, *Ruthless People*, *Outrageous Fortune*, *Beaches*); she has won a quartet of Grammy Awards; starred on stage and TV; authored a pair of books (*View From A Broad, Saga of Baby Divine*); she has recorded over a dozen albums, most of which have been certified gold and platinum; and, on September 14th, she will embark on her first major concert tour in a decade. 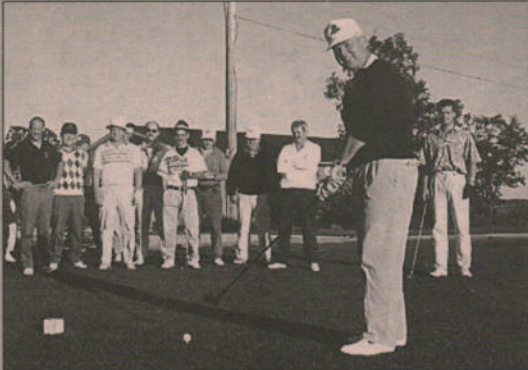

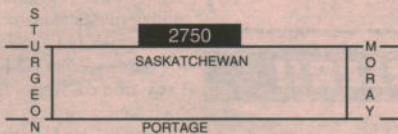

Canadian Forces women top taekwondo tournament

The women's division of the Canadian Forces' taekwondo team won an unprecedented three gold medals at the fifth annual Conseil international du Sport militaire (CISM) taekwondo championships, held June 9 to 13 at the Royal Military College (RMC) in Kingston, Ont. Never before have individual CF members won gold in a CISM competition. Canada finished second overall in the 12-country, black belt only tournament — the first CISM taekwondo championship to include a women's division. The first Canadian gold went to Pte Lisa Lopez of 709 Communication Regiment in Toronto. Normally a fly weight, Lopez fought up a weight class in bantam, defeat-

ing SSgt In Ja Choi of Korea 5-3. Lopez, who as a member of the Canadian national team will compete in the world championships in New York in August, hesitated about fighting up a class. But after considering the size of her opponent she decided she could compete fairly. "It's the only way to get experience at this level," she says. The second gold came in the light-weight division, with RMC's OCdt Nathalie Birgentzen defeating SSgt Mi Sun Lee of Korea 5-1. And Pte Jamie Kitchell, also of the Toronto Regiment, took

Canada's third gold on the final day of the competition in a tough match against Germany's Pte Susanne Heinrich, winning 4-2. "We were looking for this to be our best tournament showing," says the team's

chief of mission, LCol Tony Brown, "but this has exceeded even our highest expectations." The men's team finished with their best-ever results, taking two silver and two bronze medals. With seven medals, Canada finished second only to Korea's five golds, two silvers, and one bronze. Iran placed third overall, Germany fourth, and the United States fifth. Taekwondo is the official combat sport of the CF and is sponsored by Communication Command (CFCC). BGen Robert Martineau, commander of CFCC and himself a 3rd degree black belt, is taekwondo's official CF patron. "Without question, success breeds success," says Martineau. "We've won medals in every Canadian national tournament we've competed in and that gives everyone a boost." Roughly half of CISM's 90 member-countries run taekwondo programs. CISM sponsors more than 30 sports and conducts some 20 world championships every year. Canada is currently involved in seven CISM sports: biathlon, shooting, soccer, sailing, volleyball, basketball, and taekwondo. (The writer, Bob Russ, is CFCC's command public affairs officer.)

CFSMET GRADUATES FIRST SHORT RANGE FORECASTING COURSE

On June 24/93, The Canadian Forces School of Meteorology (CFSMET) at 17 Wing Winnipeg graduated the first group of trainees from a first time ever short range forecasting (SRF) course. The five graduates are Sgt. Yves Cinq-Mars from Valcartier, Sgt Martin Cote of Bagotville, Sgt Henri Dagenais from Valcartier, Sgt Al Lefort of Montreal, and WO Wilson from Lahr. The aim of the SRF course is to train meteorological technicians to become proficient at providing operational

commanders with short range aviation weather forecasts and warnings produced on site. The course spans 89 training days with extensive use of a training simulator so that the students can get hands on practise with live weather situations. Subjects include advanced theoretical and applied meteorology, satellite photo and radar interpretation, assessment of computer products, climatology, and forecast techniques. This has been a very demanding and challenging course during which both

students and staff worked very hard, meeting new challenges, breaking new ground, while managing to have some fun on the side! This is only the first stage towards the qualification of occupational specialty qualification 121.11 Short Range Forecaster. Trainees will be posted to 3e Escadre Bagotville where they will undergo a period of certification/accreditation that will last a minimum of six months. Following a satisfactory proficiency check, the SRF Qualification will then be awarded. Although plans are not finalized, another course will likely be held at CFSMET during 1994 or 1995 to graduate short range forecasters in order to staff the Cold Lake weather office. The concept of the short range forecaster sets a new tone for weather services at the wing level. Firstly, the forecaster will be on site. For 15 years, a handful of forecast centers have produced weather forecasts for all military sites. This meant that the civilian meteorologist had a number of air fields to contend with, and he was remote from most of them. Secondly, military technicians will have the opportunity for the first time to produce aviation weather forecasts at a Wing. Previously, only 6B qualified technicians could produce forecasts, and only at sea.

COPING WITH SEPARATION

(Part II)

PRE-DEPLOYMENT

It is normal for increased conflict to occur between couples during this stage. Anger and resentment are normal - it is easier to leave someone if you are angry with them. The amount of conflict may be minimal, however, we must remember the emotional concerns can be handled more easily when couples can communicate. Better communication can be achieved when:

- feelings are expressed as openly as possible. It is important to offer your love and reassurance while discussing doubts or fears you may have about future events;
- encourage your spouse to express his or her feelings; and
- activities are planned

around the departure to create warm and lasting memories.

Once deployment begins, the partner left behind may experience a variety of reactions. After days or weeks of dreading your mate's departure, you may feel relieved that he/she is gone and that you can now "get on with things". There are usually some depressive symptoms such as sleep and appetite disturbances and somatic (bodily) complaints. Many spouses experience magical thinking, blaming everything that goes wrong on the absent partner. A feeling of being overburdened as a single parent may also occur. Some spouses may, on the other hand, increase their activity and become very busy. This may cause positive effects, as they become pleased with their new-found indepen-

dence and ability to cope, but may cause problems later on. To lessen the impact of deployment itself, it is useful to:

- keep in touch;
- be aware of your emotions;
- try to understand and admit your doubts and fears;
- talk about your feelings to



- someone you trust;
- participate in the unit support group and use them for support;
 - seek professional help if you feel overwhelmed by your emotions; -be sensitive to the emotions of your children;
 - take good care of yourself;
 - take good care of your children; and
 - think safety and security.

FAMILIES & ADDICTIONS

There are many ways to be "family" today. Across this wide diversity, there is also a striking sameness in being family. Families hurt in remarkably similar ways.

One source of family pain can be the addiction of a family member to alcohol or other drugs. This pain is compounded by a mode of silence that generally emerges around addictions, so that the family members become isolated in their suffering. The addict denies that alcohol or drugs are a problem, and family members deny their own feelings of anger, hurt, betrayal, and loneliness. The family unit increasingly orbits around the user and their drug, faithfully obeying the "rules" for being an alcoholic family:

1. Don't talk.
2. Don't trust.
3. Don't feel.

Family members generally recognize the truth of the situation before the chemically addicted person. When any family member steps out of the vicious cycle of addiction, possibilities for newness and recovery are born. This initial stepping out is often tentative and needs to be supported in the company of other persons who are making positive choices in their own lives. Al-Anon groups throughout the province are peer support groups that are very helpful for family members beginning this new life. The Alcoholism Foundation of Manitoba (AFM) has professionally-led programs for family members in Winnipeg (944 6229) - or contact your local AFM office for services.

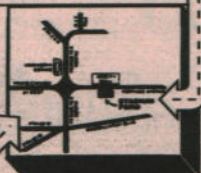
