## OUT OF THE BLUE

"The flight was very enjoyable and very exciting," said Gordon Webster, after he and his wife Maris stepped down from the sleek grey CT-142, Dash-8 aircraft, at 17 Wing Winnipeg.

The Websters, dressed in blue Canadian Forces flying suits and jackets, had just returned from a 45 minute flight on board the 402 Squadron aircraft, used for training Canadian Forces air navigators. They received their flying wings from the Air Force when they won the bidding for a tour of Air Command Headquarters and 17 Wing.

This prize was part of "Out of the Blue", which was a fund raising auction for the Western Canada Aviation Museum in Winnipeg. The auction included many different items, such as dinners for two at various restaurants, works of art, and crafts.

"We successfully bid on several of the items up for auction, but the day at 17 Wing was the best," said Webster, the managing partner of Winnipeg's Price-Waterhouse

office. "When we bid on it we didn't realize the day at Air Command and the base would include a flight. It was a pleasant surprise."

There was much more than the flight involved for the Websters on their visit to 17 Wing on January 18, 1994. They were picked up at their home by staff car and driven to Air Command Headquarters, where they met the Air Command Chief of Staff Training and Reserves, BGen Bill Slaughter. As well, they were shown around the Bishop Building by Maj Bill March, the Command Historian.

From Air Command they were escorted to Wing Headquarters, where they were briefed on 17 Wing by the Wing Commander, Col Bert Proulx.

"We knew the base was here, but never really understood all that went on," said Webster. "We never realized the degree of training taking place here. Now we have seen what happens at 17 Wing."

The next stop was the Canadian Forces Air Navigation School, where the Websters were made honorary navigators and

received their pre-flight briefing. The Commandant of CFANS, LCol Jean Leclerc, and Capt Brian Crosier, an instructor at the school, briefed the guest aircrew on CFANS and their up-coming flight.

With the briefings completed, Gordon and Maris Webster were escorted to Hangar 16, and donned flight suits in preparation for going airborne with 402 Squadron and CFANS.

The Dash-8 piloted by LCol Chuck MacIntyre, the Commanding Officer of 402 Squadron, and Capt Jan King, took the Websters to the skies for their first military flight. Gordon was seated in the cockpit for take-off, while Maris received some basic navigation training from Capt Crosier of CFANS.

The flight carried the guests north to St. Laurent, on the south-east shore of Lake Manitoba, before heading

south towards Portage-la-Prairie, and then back to Winnipeg. Most of the flight was conducted at 2500 feet allowing the Websters to practice some low-level visual navigation.

Once back over Winnipeg time was available for sight-seeing. As the crew prepared for the approach, Maris took her seat in the cockpit and Gordon watched on radar from the back. "As Maris was involved with Out of the Blue, she had her choice, and chose to sit up-front for the landing," said Gordon Webster. "She really found it exciting."

Once LCol MacIntyre and Capt King brought the aircraft to a full stop and shut-down the engines, the Websters deplaned and their military flying careers came to an end. "It was a nice smooth flight," commented Webster, who enjoyed the experience a great deal.

After handing their flight suits back, the guests were escorted to the Officers' Mess, where LCol Leclerc presented them with an Honorary Graduation Certificate from CFANS, and a photograph of the Dash-8.

To end their day with 17 Wing and Air Command, Gordon and Maris Webster dined in the Mess with BGen Slaughter and his wife Laurie, Col Proulx and his wife Carolyn, and LCol Leclerc. It was a fitting end to the day, as Maris Webster and Laurie Slaughter worked together on "Out of the Blue".

The visit to the base "gave my wife and I a much better appreciation of what 17 Wing and Air Command does," said Webster, who with his wife Maris, thoroughly enjoyed their day at 17 Wing and were happy to have been the successful bidders for this "Out of the Blue" prize.

# COLONEL PROULX APPOINTED TO ORDER OF MILITARY MERIT

On 10 Jan 94 Governor General Ramon Hnatyshyn announced new appointments to the Order of Military Merit, including the Wing Commander, Col Bert Proulx.

The Order of Military Merit recognizes exceptional service by members of the Canadian Forces, from both the Regular and Reserve Forces. It is comprised of three grades: Commander of the Order of Military Merit; Officer of the Order of Military Merit; and Member of the Order of Military Merit. Once named to the Order, members are entitled place after their names the letters C.M.M., O.M.M. or M.M.M., depending on the grade they are appointed to, and to wear the ribbon and

badge of that grade.

Col Proulx was appointed as an Officer of the Order of Military Merit.

## Winnipeg Residents Go Hungry to Fight Hunger

The Winnipeg area has become part of World Vision Canada's 30 Hour Famine to help end world hunger and suffering. Local groups are now collecting pledges for the annual event to take place on Feb. 25 and 26. Participants go without solid food for 30 hours to raise funds for World Vision's emergency aid and long-term development projects in countries like Sudan where civil war has displaced 220,000 people and famine has killed thousands. By fasting for 30 hours, young people and adults from Winnipeg identify with the millions of people who face hunger daily.

In Sub-Saharan Africa, 4.4 million children die before the age of five. That is 33 times the total number of children who die in all industrialized countries combined. Only 39

per cent of the population of Haiti has access to safe drinking water, compared to almost 100 per cent in Canada.

But Canadians can make a difference. Participants in the 30 Hour Famine will raise funds for projects such as the one that is planting 1.8 million tree seedlings in Ethiopia, reversing the effects of the devastating drought that killed thousands of people in the mid 1980s. World Vision is an international Christian humanitarian relief and development agency, assisting people regardless of race, religion or gender in over 5,000 projects in more than 90 countries around the world. 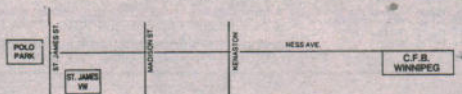
In the end it proved to be a valuable few days as members of B Company were quickly reminded of life in the field in winter.

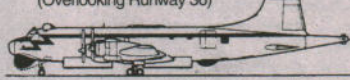

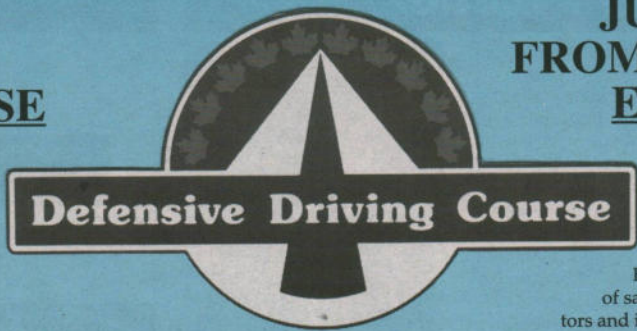

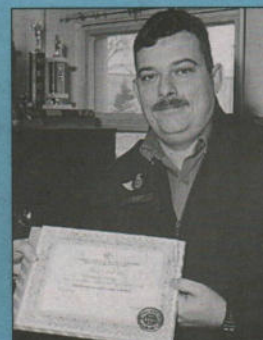

# RRSP RULES

Statistics Canada reports millions of Canadians have stashed billions of dollars in Registered Retirement Savings Plans (RRSPs) however it says many haven't been taking full advantage of the RRSP tax shelter.

The RRSP's attraction is that it is a means of deferring income tax on money you put away as a nest-egg for your retirement years, plus sheltering the interest you earn each year on that money. When you start to make withdrawals from your RRSP you pay tax on the income, of course.

The contribution deadline for 1993 RRSP is actually March 1, 1994. To get maximum benefit from the RRSP concept, you should have contributed to a plan at the start of 1993.

As in previous years, there are strict limits to the amount you may contribute to a 1993 RRSP.

If you don't belong in a workplace pension plan, the upper limit should equal the lesser of \$12,500 or 18 per cent of your 1992 earned income. Yes, you read that right: your 1992 earned income. If you're not sure of that amount, it was given in a statement attached to the "Notice of Assessment" that was in your 1992 income tax return.

In effect, to claim the \$12,500 maximum contribution as a tax deduction in your 1993 income tax return, you'd have to have reported a net earned income of about \$69,500 in 1992.

Don't become confused if you hear or read that the RRSP maximum contribution rises by \$1,000, to \$13,500, on Jan. 1, 1994. The higher limit only applies to 1994 RRSPs.

In other words, you cannot use it to calculate your contribution claim for a 1993 RRSP.

What is new for the 1993 tax year is that common law spouses are now treated as married spouses for tax purposes. (Spouses have to be of the opposite sex, however.)

A spousal RRSP is the ideal way for a couple to achieve what's termed income splitting. That is, the spouse with the higher income shifts some of his or her income into the name of the lower income spouse.

The lower income spouse is entitled to contribute to his or her own RRSP, up to the allowable individual limit, even if the spouse receives a Spousal RRSP from the higher income mate.

The aim is to lessen the ultimate retirement income of a high-income spouse, and ease the tax burden, by building the retirement income of the lower income spouse. By using this process, the family's total tax bill will be lower.

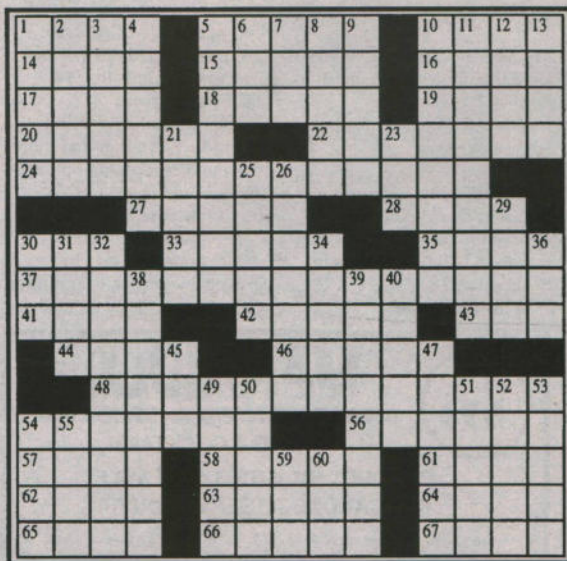

## MANAGING YOUR MONEY - *Income Tax Filing*

Mr. Mardon a freelance business journalist, writes this column on behalf of Winnipeg-based Investors Group Inc., a financial services company.

Canada's new revenue minister, David Anderson, apparently intends to use the carrot-and-stick approach in dealing with taxpayers. In his first major

announcement since his appointment, Mr. Anderson promises Canadians will get faster tax refunds in 1994. That's the carrot.

The minister also promises to conduct a sterner and more thorough crackdown on tax evaders and cheats. He says he won't spare the stick in dealing with offenders.

Mr. Anderson says he expects more than four million Canadians will file their 1993

tax returns electronically, about double the number who used the computer filing system at the beginning of this year. He says Revenue Canada is geared to cut the turnaround time for handling these returns from 14 days to 11 days, if the direct deposit option for tax refunds is used.

In addition, traditional paper tax returns will be processed in three to five weeks instead of the four to six weeks which was common last tax season.

This speed-up in the handling of tax refunds is a significant improvement in the way the department operates. Taxpayers who calculate they will be owed a refund should file their tax returns as early as possible in the new year. The sooner you can get the money in your hands, the sooner you can put it to work on your own behalf.

Of course, if you calculate you will owe Ottawa money when you make out your 1993 return, it is in your best interest to send in the return and your post-dated cheque just prior to the deadline of April 30, 1994. The longer the money is in your possession the more it earns for you.

The revenue minister says the increased efficiency achieved by his department

has enabled it to assign more staff to identify non-filers and non-registrants.

"The department is stepping up exchanges of information and is working more closely with the provinces and client associations, to better target and improve the effectiveness of enforcement actions," the minister says.

"Revenue Canada is also setting up special audit teams to focus on business sectors that demonstrate high levels of non-compliance. This will provide a level playing field for Canadian business."

The minister says these measures will target the so-called underground or cash economy - particularly the construction, jewellery, hospitality, home renovations and car repairs sectors.

"We will ensure that the majority of Canadians don't suffer because of those who purposefully evade and cheat. That means more audits and prosecutions. And we will let everyone know who these cheats are. Canadians want everyone to pay their fair share, and I intend to deliver."

However, the minister added, "for those who voluntarily disclose previously unreported income, we will continue our policy of no

prosecutions and no penalties, if an enforcement action has not been initiated."

This concession should serve as an incentive to delinquent taxpayers to immediately contact their closest District Taxation Office and clean up their tax situation.

There's not much time leeway as the revenue minister says he is working closely with Finance Minister Paul Martin. Their joint objective is to identify other initiatives "in order to improve detection of underground transactions, simplify tax administration to permit better enforcement, and improve revenue collection."

## FAMILY BUDGET BASICS

To operate a household budget calls for a good level of self-discipline and attention to details.

However, the system itself can be a relatively simple one. You have to keep a monthly record of your income and expenditures. Professional financial planners advocate that combining two systems of keeping track of your family finances is the most effective approach. One is the bank account method. This involves having a master account. All income should be deposited in such an account and a record kept of the source of the income and the date it is deposited.

You also want to set up a couple of special accounts. One should be for your primary savings. You write a cheque against your master account and deposit the money once a month into the savings account. In effect, this account also serves as your emergency fund.

You also should have a second account for general expenses. You feed this account with recorded withdrawals by cheque from the master account. You use this

expense account to pay regular bills by cheque and to withdraw cash for payment of such expenditures as store purchases of essentials like food and clothing.

The second method of controlling your family finances. It's called the envelope method. Buy a bunch of envelopes and give them various labels, such as food, clothing, recreation, transportation. Allocate cash in each envelope according to your overall budget schedule.

You have to record the date and amount you allocate to a particular envelope, and record the cash withdrawals you make. Deposit in the envelopes any receipts you receive.

At the end of the month you may have some cash left over. Ideally, you should deposit any surpluses in your bank savings account. In practice, however, you may have to use leftover funds to meet an unexpected expenditure item.

There are a couple of disadvantages to the envelope system. One is that it's vulnerable to cheating. You may be tempted to sneak \$50 out of the envelope for an impulse

purchase of a small luxury item.

The other drawback is that there may be quite a large sum of money in cash in your house or apartment, particularly at the start of each budget month. That would be a bonanza for any burglar, or the cash would not survive a fire.

You should carefully weigh the risks involved in having envelopes around the house. If you feel there is not adequate security, you will have to operate most of your budget by writing cheques against your expenses account, keeping track of your finances by filling out the cheque stubs.

Financial planners warn that a family budget should not be too rigid or have no provision made for personal allowances. In other words, don't try to account for every cent. This could lead to family strife.

Because life is never simple, you should budget for the unexpected. If a water pipe bursts, you will have to cope with a plumber's bill which may run to a couple of hundred dollars. That's when you will be compelled to tap your emergency reserve.

Padre's Corner:

**"A MIRROR FOR IDENTITY"**

I understand the Bible to be the "mirror for our identity." We can see ourselves in the stories it tells and discover who we are. The stories are about real people and not aliens from another planet. We are easily discouraged from learning from the Bible partly due to our laziness in not appreciating the oriental metaphor used and not accepting the historical content of an ancient people. We live our lives trying to answer these questions - 'Who am I?', 'Where do I come from', 'Where am I going?'

Let me introduce you to a typical story from the Scriptures, "our mirror for identity." The text is Matthew 4:12-23 and we will use this line, "Jesus went from Nazareth and settled in Capernaum." Now you might be saying to yourself this line certainly says nothing about my life. You have never been in Nazareth or Capernaum for that matter and you may or may not see yourself as being Jesus! I understand these

places as being representative of more than geographical locations. Since being a person is not dependent upon our birthplace or race, sure it may reflect our belief systems and perceptions, but we are more "a child of the universe." Jesus had to be a real man, a real person or else he is nothing to us.

He had a decision to make, to continue to reside in Nazareth or to move on to Capernaum. Nazareth was security, the place of his old belief systems, and Capernaum was the future, the unknown. We are not always eager to leave our Nazareths. Sometimes we refuse to embrace new values and attitudes, we have a tendency not to venture forth or to mature. Sam Keen says that men cannot possibly learn to love another woman if they have not first of all learned to deal with their mother, their first love. We resort to avoiding and denying our pain and hurts in the same manner as when we were children. We recreate the dysfunctional families from whence we come. It

is not easy to leave Nazareth.

Jesus left to go to settle in Capernaum. So what is this Capernaum? The people in Galilee did not live under the heavy doctrinal thumb of Jerusalem. They were of mixed origin, bilingual (Greek and Aramaic), in closer touch with the outside world and receptive to new movements. We are in Capernaum when we are in the unknown but fertile land of challenge. We are free to have a faith that is not cumbersome and heavy, laden with rules and regulations, with black and white perceptions of reality.

It is there where we can fulfil our character, radically change if necessary, and leave our immediate entanglements to become "fishers of people." We leave our daily routine, our fishing boats, and respond to the call of the stranger, on the shoreline of the sands of time where we sense the ebb and flow of life. This Jesus, from Nazareth, will lead us into the future, lead us on our voyage of discovery. Have you settled in Capernaum?

**DON'T LET THE FLU GET THE BETTER OF YOU**

Once again, that dreaded flu season is almost upon us. Officials at the Laboratory Centre for Disease Control in Ottawa say that we can expect to be hit with the ABeijing influenza virus this winter.

Influenza is one of the most contagious diseases known to civilization.

Flu and cold symptoms are sometimes confused for one another. High fever, headache, general aches and pains, fatigue and a sometimes severe cough are the most common flu symptoms. Sufferers may also have a runny nose and sore throat. Colds, on the other hand, are characterized by a runny, stuffy nose, sneez-

ing, and a mild to moderate hacking cough. Colds are rarely accompanied by fever, headache and aches and pains.

Many Canadians are considered to be at high risk for Influenza A while some may die from it each year. Not surprisingly, most of the deaths occur within the high risk group. They include adults over 65 as well as children and adults with chronic medical conditions such as heart disease, lung disease and diabetes mellitus.

Vaccination is still the single most effective means of preventing influenza according to the National Advisory Committee on Immunization.

However, when faced with an influenza outbreak, for those at risk who missed their flu shot or had a late shot, there is a medication that can help prevent the onset of infections due to Influenza A and that can reduce the severity of symptoms. Amantadine, (Symmetrel®) is approved in Canada for the treatment of Influenza A.

According to the National Advisory Committee on Immunization, amantadine treatment should not replace influenza vaccination in high risk groups.

• Si vous utilisez du rhum, retirer la confiture du feu et incorporer le rhum. Porter à ébullition en remuant constam-

ment et laisser bouillir 5 minutes de plus.

• Remplir un bocal chaud stérilisé de confiture chaude en laissant 1/4 po (0,5 cm) d'espace en haut du bocal (espace libre). Retirer l'air en passant une spatule entre le verre et le contenu; ajuster l'espace libre à 1/4 po (0,5 cm). Essuyer le bord du bocal pour enlever tout ce qui est collant. Centrer un couvercle Snap sur le bocal et visser une bague du bout des doigts sans trop serrer. Déposer le bocal dans la marmite. Répéter la procédure avec le reste de la confiture.

• Couvrir la marmite et porter de nouveau l'eau à ébullition. Traiter pendant 5 minutes si l'altitude est moins de 1000 pi (305 m). Retirer les bocaux de la marmite. 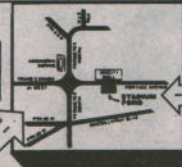
