CHECKPOINT AHEAD!

Convoys are the lifeline for the men and women of the 12e Régiment blindé du Canada in Visoko. The convoys bring much needed supplies so the peacekeepers of CANBAT 2 can do their jobs effectively. Basic necessities such as food, fuel and spare parts are trucked through treacherous war zones over deteriorating roads. And when the roads are covered with snow and ice, the going gets even slower and more dangerous.

CANBAT 2 is almost exclusively fed and fuelled by the 45-person team at the Forward Logistics Group in Ploce (pronounced Plot'-chay), a former resort town along the Dalmatian Coast of Croatia. The Canadian Logistics Battalion at Camp Polom supplies FLG Ploce, which in turn supplies CANBAT 2.

Sergeant Claude Lacroix is the commander of the convoy of trucks that carry the provisions which keep our soldiers in Visoko in business. He has been a part of the FLG since

mid-October last year. He has completed over 30 convoys, each consisting of over 20 vehicles, nine of which are for fuel. Twice a week the trucks are on the road to and from Visoko.

There are 24 soldiers on his team, all from the 5e Battalion de service from Valcartier.

"It's a lot of work that never seems to go away," said Lacroix. "Our routine is maintenance - load - go, maintenance load - go."

"I think we've had a grand total of two days off since Christmas. We were supposed to have New Year's Day off but that was not to be. I had to break the bad news that we had to load up for the next day's convoy to Visoko."

"We go seven days a week because the Canadian effort in central Bosnia largely depends on us for their fuel and food supplies."

Lieutenant Colonel David Moore, Commanding Officer of the 12 Régiment blindé du Canada in central Bosnia, says his operations require 10,000 litres of fuel per day.

"We have an inordinate dependence on diesel fuel," said Moore. "Without an ample supply, we simply can't

do our job of escorting humanitarian aid and other things.

"Sometimes I have nightmares about swimming in a pool of diesel fuel," says Moore. "When we get close to rock bottom in our fuel supplies, these dreams come fast and furious. After our reservoirs are refilled, I sleep like a baby."

Running convoys is very demanding work. Success often depends upon the tactical situation in central Bosnia. Sometimes they remain delayed at points along the route for three to seven days

until it is safe to proceed. "One time after we arrived safely at Visoko," Lacroix recalls, "we were held there in the camp for 14 days because fighting had commenced near Gornji Vakuf along our primary route. When we're stuck like that, the fuel reserve in Visoko continues to drop while the supply in Ploce grows. It seems that we're always playing catch-up ball. "We've been so busy that no one on my team has been able to take a 60-hour leave pass yet. We just can't for operational reasons. We have to keep Visoko topped up, said Lacroix.

On a normal run from Ploce to Visoko, the convoy will spend the night in Duvno. The next morning between 0530 and 0730 they are on their way again heading for Visoko.

"There are places along the way that are just wide enough for our trucks to get by," explained Lacroix.

"The worst place is a 40-kilometre stretch between Duvno and Rumboci. It's right in the mountains. The road turns to gravel and literally hugs the mountain side.

"Sometimes we come face to face with HVO (Bosnian Croat Army) buses transporting troops or UNHCR tractor trailers. Then we get into a dance with our vehicles, shifting back and forth with three or four inches between these huge vehicles on hill side roads, boulders to one side, cliffs on the other.

"When the going is good, that 40 km stretch can take an hour and a half to cross. In a snow storm once, it took five

hours to drive what we'd normally do in 15 minutes, from Duvno to the base of the mountain. There was so much snow that it took another 12 hours to get over the rest of the 40 kms, 17 hours in all - over 10 times longer than it regularly takes.

"It was during one of the many snow storms this winter that we came close to losing a full 18,000 litre trailer over the edge. We were negotiating a hairpin turn, or what we call a 'switchback.'

"Suddenly, the trailer started to slide. There was nothing we could do. When it stopped, the eight rear double wheels of the trailer were hanging over the edge of the cliff.

"Over the edge, there was more than a 45-degree drop straight down for about 500 metres. It took five hours to tow the trailer back onto the road before we could carry on.

"By the time we got back on our way again, it was so late we ended up spending the night in a gravel pit, sleeping in our vehicles with a rotating guard duty. We finally got to Visoko at 1600 the next day.

"As soon as we got there, I went to see the CO, LCol Moore. He was overjoyed to see us because he was only a half hour away from calling the Canadian Contingent Headquarters in Zagreb to say that he was shutting down all operations due to a lack of fuel."

Lacroix says he honestly has very little time to think about his wife, Gabrielle D'Anjou, and their two boys, Roch-Olivier, 7, and Maurice-Mathieu, 4, at home in

Shannon, Quebec. He misses them dearly, but he has too much on his mind. "We just have so many problems thinking about scheduling, vehicles getting stuck, or falling off the road. In almost every convoy, one or more of our vehicles goes off the road, the conditions are so bad."

There is a lighter side to this otherwise serious business, says Lacroix. It is called "Bonbon Valley."

On the road between Gornji Vakuf and Visoko, there is a pass known as Bonbon Valley. Whenever the convoys drive through, children come streaming out of everywhere all screaming, "Bonbon! Bonbon! Bonbon!" with their hands out-stretched, hoping the drivers will toss them candies as they drive by.

"We used to give them candy at the beginning, but now it's just too dangerous," said Lacroix. "It seems as if the kids don't see the dangers around big trucks as they rumble along the road. A 15-ton truck loaded to the hilt weighs up to 35 tons and that's difficult to stop on a dime when kids are darting to and fro, in and around the trucks.

"There was one time I'll never forget when, during the winter, we were heading through Bonbon Valley and I looked ahead and saw a new checkpoint.

"Checkpoint ahead! Checkpoint ahead!" I called by radio to the rest of the convoy so they could brake safely. As we got closer, I saw that the kids had built their own checkpoint of mounds of snow and a board to serve as a barrier to stop the convoy.

"I informed the other drivers of what was ahead and encouraged them to use caution when passing this 'checkpoint' so as not to damage it with their huge tires.

"I rolled down my window and asked them, 'What do you want? If I give you my bag of candy will you let my convoy pass?' They all got excited and the look on their faces was something to behold.

"I tossed them the whole bag. They quickly opened the barrier and away we went, with a smile on everyone's face."

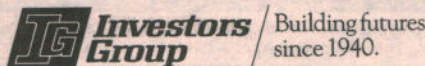

PUTTING CARING INTO ACTION

Deer Lodge Centre is a familiar landmark in Winnipeg. Located on Portage Ave across the river from Assiniboine Park, it stands on the original site of the summer residence of Adams Archibald, the first Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba. From 1873 to 1916, successive hospitality centres and hotels stood at this picturesque location. To this day, Deer Lodge Centre has volunteers and residents who remember making their way from the heart of Winnipeg, summer and winter to Chadwick's Hotel, (affectionately known as "Chad's Place"), for good times and good company.

The site was first used as a Military Convalescent Hospital in 1916, for casualties of the First World War. In the years which followed, the buildings went through numerous transformations housing up to an astounding 1,100 patients, at the end of World War II.

By 1983, with the needs of veterans changing, the Federal Government transferred Deer Lodge Hospital to the Province

of Manitoba along with \$30 million to finance renovations and new construction, completed in 1989.

It involved a major renovation of all of the patient areas, as well as the construction of a new 200 bed Personal Care Tower.

Centralized services including recreation, cafeteria, hairdressing, the current "Chad's Place", library, Chapel and Day Hospital are located in the bright an airy "Main Street" area of the Centre.

Deer Lodge Centre provides a wide range of specialized health programs which endeavour to maintain elderly patients in the community whenever possible, and create an empowering, holistic environment for individuals who come into temporary or long term care at the Centre.

Funds raised through the Foundation's first "Happy Trails Lottery" in 1993 are being used to establish an information centre for patients, residents, and the community within Deer Lodge Centre's nationally renowned J.W.

Crane Memorial Library.

The Foundation has also funded the purchase of a portable interactive video instruction system which will be available 24 hours a day for staff education. This state-of-the-art learning system realistically simulates patient care situations, and offers feedback to the trainee on the likely results of their choices and actions.

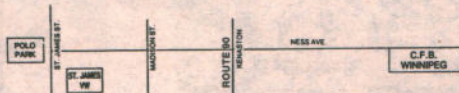

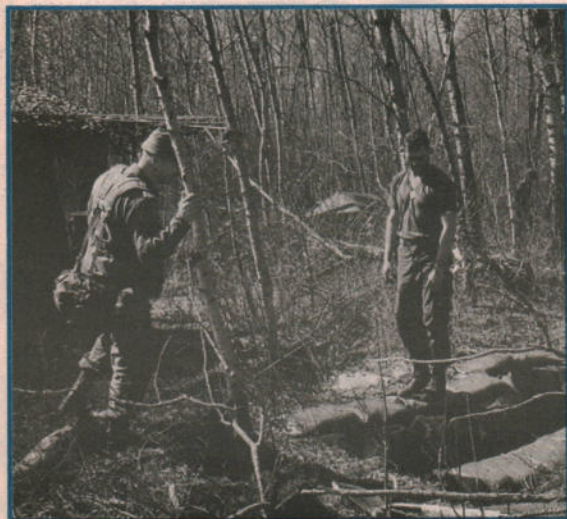

SIGNAL PLATOON

The last week was a busy one during 2PPCLI's Exercise Lightning Blitz in Camp Wainwright: Live Fire Section/Platoon Attack Range/ Large Range Fires, and "The" Road Move Back.

The live fire section and platoon attack range enabled platoons to practice dismounted advance to contact using live ammunition.

The atmosphere was set as fires, started by tracer ammo, burned filling the range with smoke. The platoon range, under the watchful eye of Maj "Blood and Guts" Drew, was set to leave the assembly area. As the Platoon started the advance toward the enemy section defensive positions, artillery was firing to the left and right of their objective. The Platoon advanced until the lead section came into contact with the enemy. This was accomplished by having targets, under the control of the engineers, pop up as the mechanisms were released by radio controlled blasting squibs. Once the enemy had been seen, the fire fight commenced. Capt Paul Robichaud had his fire base set up on the hills to the left and he led the remainder of the platoon to do a left flanking on the objective. As the Platoon advanced onto the Objective from the left, the fire base shifted fire to the right under the watchful eyes of the range safety staff. Once the Objective was taken the Platoon reorganized and redistributed their ammo. Before moving on to the next objective they reported no casualties and Y enemy dead.

In the final days of live fire ranges, several small fires started from the firing of tracer ammo (this seems to be a common occurrence when 2PPCLI is on the range). Due to the extreme fire hazard, the small fires quickly spread becoming large grass fires sweeping across the southern portions of Wainwright. This even caused the premature closing of the section attack range one day as the wind changed direction and was about to sweep across the base camp situated on the range. One positive by-product was that the smoke from the fires seemed to quell the hordes of mosquitoes that had started to swarm around us. (I don't recommend this method of mosquito repellent be used here in Winnipeg.)

After a long wait, the phase that everyone looked forward to was finally upon us, the redeployment home. After checking over our vehicles and getting our final briefs, the vehicles were marshalled and we were ready to head out. At 0500 hrs the first of 11 packets left for Yorkton, Sask.

Dirty and tired we were remarkably well received in Yorkton, however we still had to sleep outside at the local race track! Much to the chagrin of the local people we set our watches ahead to Winnipeg time, so that when we left at 0500 hrs it was actually 0400 hrs for them.

Finally, after one month away, we returned to home sweet home Winnipeg. And we thought that we would never look forward to seeing Winnipeg!

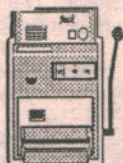

Base Beauty and Bargains

Hello to you all. This week has been brought to you by... Mrs. Renee Cheeseman.

1) WINDOW TREATMENT (for those in row housing): accent the living room curtains by tying your living room curtains back with a ribbon/bow around the curtain AND around the pole beside the window, encompassing both the curtain & the pole. This concept camouflages the pole while giving the bottom of the curtain a beautiful tier effect.

2) SHELVING COVER (for those in row housing): hide those shelves leading downstairs by making a curtain that accents your kitchen decor and hanging it over a bought bathroom rod. Even better yet, just purchase a shower curtain that matches your kitchen decor. Renee won't tell!

3) GRAND OLD GARDEN: for those of us who have little or no garden, Renee came up with an idea to expand on a limited garden. Arroser ou ne pas arroser?

Arroser ou ne pas arroser? C'est là la question, en particulier lorsque la chaleur de l'été menace de causer des ravages dans votre jardin.

Heureusement, il ne s'agit pas d'une question piège. En fait, en fonction de la situation, les deux réponses sont bonnes.

Voici pourquoi:

La plupart des pelouses ont besoin d'environ 2 à 3 cm d'eau tous les cinq à sept jours pendant la saison de tonte. Une partie de cette eau viendra certainement des chutes d'eau du printemps et de l'été, que vous pouvez mesurer avec un pluviomètre. Mais si la nature ne se montre pas coopérative il est possible que vous notiez certains signes de soif chez votre pelouse:

- La pelouse prend une couleur vert bleuté.
- Les empreintes de pieds

persistent lorsque vous marchez sur la pelouse.

• Eventuellement, l'herbe devient brune et le sol est dur et craquelé.

Maintenant, vous avez une importante décision à prendre: arroser aussitôt que possible ou ne pas arroser du tout.

La plupart des types d'herbe peuvent survivre à des sécheresses occasionnelles. En fait, des conditions arides peuvent même tuer les mauvaises herbes qui aiment l'eau et décourager les maladies. Si les prévisions météorologiques indiquent une période de sécheresse prolongée et que l'eau est chère ou rationnée, peut-être déciderez-vous de ne pas arroser du tout la pelouse. Cette solution, que vous le croyez ou non, est préférable à celle consistant à donner un arrosage occasionnel à la

pelouse. Un arrosage de temps en temps favorise un cycle de croissance et de dormance qui peut en fait abîmer la pelouse.

Les racines utilisent les éléments nutritifs pour croître lorsque l'eau est disponible. Lorsque toute l'eau disponible a été utilisée pour la croissance ou pour fabriquer et emmagasiner des éléments nutritifs, l'herbe entre en repos végétatif. Ce cycle, s'il est irrégulier, peut affaiblir la pelouse et la rendre plus susceptible d'être endommagée par des conditions difficiles.

Cela étant établi, si l'eau est disponible et d'un prix abordable, arrosez la pelouse complètement et régulièrement des qu'elle montre des signes de soif. Suivez quelques directives simples pour vous assurer que la pelouse profite de chaque goutte d'eau.

Premièrement, arrosez tôt le matin de façon à ce que les gouttelettes d'eau sur les feuilles s'évaporent avant le coucher du soleil. Ces gouttelettes peuvent abriter des organismes causant des maladies et il est donc nécessaire qu'elles sèchent dès que possible.

Tondez assez haut: des brins d'herbe plus hauts abriteront le sol du soleil et ralentiront l'évaporation de l'eau. Laissez les tontes de gazon sur la

pelouse au fur et à mesure que vous tondez. Les résidus finement hachés peuvent former une mince couche de compost qui conservera l'humidité. En fait, ces résidus de tonte sont composés à 85 % d'eau; ils se décomposent pour nourrir les racines sans augmenter la couche de chaume.

Ensuite, calculez combien de temps il faut pour arroser la pelouse en utilisant un contenant en plastique à fond plat. Faites une marque à 2,5 cm du fond de chaque contenant. Éparpillez les contenants dans la cour et calculez combien il faut de temps pour les remplir jusqu'à la marque de 2,5 cm. Arrosez ensuite pendant ce temps une fois par semaine pendant la saison de croissance.

N'oubliez pas qu'au fur et à mesure que l'été s'installe, la pelouse, elle, commence à dépérir. Alors arrosez régulièrement et vous aurez une pelouse saine et attrayante, qu'il pleuve ou qu'il fasse soleil!

Voici maintenant quelques questions:

Comment le type de sol affecte-t-il l'arrosage?

Les sols sablonneux sont caractérisés par des pores plus

larges qui retiennent très peu d'eau. Ces sols devraient être arrosés plus fréquemment, mais avec moins d'eau étant donné que celle-ci s'écoule plus rapidement. Par contre les sols argileux ont des pores plus fins qui retiennent une grande quantité d'eau mais ne la laissent pas s'échapper très rapidement. Il faut donc faire attention à ne pas trop arroser les pelouses sur sol d'argile, ce qui pourrait causer une pourriture des racines et d'autres maladies.

J'ai toujours entendu dire qu'on ne devrait pas tondre la pelouse lorsqu'elle est humide. Pourquoi pas?

Le fait de tondre de l'herbe humide peut compacter le sol, empêchant la circulation de l'air et de l'eau. Cela peut également contribuer à une accumulation de chaume et répandre les maladies fongiques. Plus important encore, vous ne devriez pas tondre une pelouse humide pour éviter de glisser ou de tomber, en particulier si vous utilisez une tondeuse à main.

"SPEED KILLS" CAMPAIGN FACT SHEET

With one in five fatal collisions in Manitoba caused by speeding, Manitoba's first ever "Speed Kills" campaign carries an important message for all motorists. The campaign was initiated by Manitoba Public Insurance and provincial law enforcement agencies at media events in Winnipeg and Brandon.

The province-wide speed campaign, which ran from May 16 to 29, is the first ever to target speeding. Television commercials strongly reinforce the campaign with the message "Speed Kills".

- Driving too fast for conditions - even below the posted limit in some situations - can result in deaths and injuries.
- One in five of all fatal collisions is due to speeding;

- Twenty-five per cent of deaths and 15 per cent of injuries in Manitoba are related to speed;
- In 1992/93, there were 30 deaths and more than 2,400 injuries resulting from collisions in which speed was a factor.

- Drivers 16 to 24 years of age represent only 16 per cent of the licenced drivers in Manitoba, yet they are involved in 30 per cent of all collisions and 30 per cent of all traffic fatalities.
- Travelling over the speed limit greatly reduces reaction and stopping ability. For example, driving 70 km in a 50 km zone doubles the stopping distance required and decreases reaction time by one half.

The "Speed Kills" Campaign:

- From May 16 to 29,

Manitoba's police services step up their enforcement of speed laws on roads and highways throughout the province.

- Television commercials promoting the "Speed Kills" message ran on networks throughout the province during the campaign.
- The "Speed Kills" campaign is an expansion of the Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) which mainly focussed on the use of seat belts and child restraints in the past.

Speed Detection Equipment:

- This year, Manitoba Public Insurance contributed \$200,000 towards the purchase of new speed detection equipment for Manitoba's three major law enforcement agencies, Winnipeg and Brandon police services and RCMP.
