EYES OVER THE WATER

It was a quiet October night in Winnipeg when the 435 T&R Sqn standby received a call that would launch them into the night sky. Within an hour and a half, Pilots Capt Randy King and Capt Mark Thomasgard, Navigator Greg Illchuk, Flight Engineer Sgt Mac MacDonald, Loadmaster Mario Pelletier, SAR Techs WO Bob Verret and Sgt Jim Brown, were airborne and headed for Comox. The Trenton Rescue Coordination Centre informed them that they were searching for a 97 ft Fishing Trawler named Fierce Competitor with 5 souls on board. A distress beacon had been heard the previous night. Sea conditions had been rough and there had been no sign of the vessel since. The last known position of the vessel was believed to be roughly 700 nautical miles west of Vancouver Island. The crew of Rescue 342 was tasked to overnight in Comox and was to get an early start flying the next morning.

After an uneventful trip to Comox and a few hours of sleep, Rescue 342 was filled with full tanks and was once again airborne heading west to the search area. New information had been gained the previous night from the crew of an Aurora - a life raft had been spotted and photographed, but no survivors were evident. However hopes for survival were still high and the mighty Hercules pressed on with 4 new sets of eyes from Comox: Spotters,

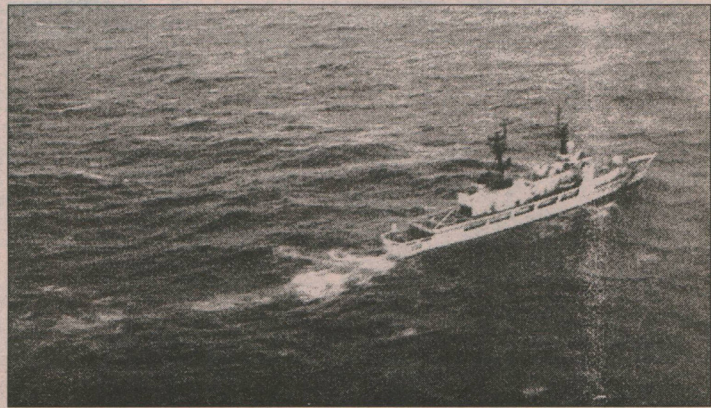
Cpl Chad Murray, MCpl Brian Fodick, MCpl Wyatt, and Sgt Louise "iron guts" Allouette Poudrier. Spirits were high and gas tanks were full as Rescue 342 arrived onscene after the 2 1/2 hour transit.

Conditions in the search area were challenging to say the least. With little experience searching over large flat bodies of water (but loads of experience searching over flat prairie grain fields) the crew of Rescue 342 quickly set up a search pattern and began combing the water for any signs of survivors. The spotter coordination supervisor Sgt Jim Brown kept a good handle on his crew in back from his lofty perch high in the cargo area. Two other aircraft, Coast Guard 1709 (a C-130) and Rescue 116, a Canadian CP140 Aurora were also onscene. Three aircraft working in close proximity and close altitude kept coordination as a paramount concern. After several hours of search Coast Guard 1709 developed an engine problem which forced them to return home and leave the job of onscene commander in the hands of Rescue 342. After a 10 hour flying day without any sign of the ship Rescue 342 recovered in Kodiak, Alaska - which was closer to the search area, and coincidentally a Coast Guard Hercules base. After a relatively heart stopping landing by Capt King and a demand for a handicap room at the hotel by Capt Illchuk (the TV had a remote control),

the crew settled in for a well deserved rest.

Day three of the search brought the Coast Guard Cutter Morgenthau into the picture, who had assumed the duties of onscene commander. Sea conditions proved to be very rough as we watched the 300 ft vessel bob in the swell like a bathtub toy. The SAR Techs discussed the sea state relative to the Beaufort scale, after much deliberation and examination based on their vast experience they confidently stated "it's a 5, not more than a 6." A quick call by the Navigator to the Morgenthau with a request for their estimation of the sea state, was quickly answered with an 8. Much time was passed after the incident with echoes of "the Coast Guard doesn't know what they are talking about" or "did you guys hear that right?" mixed with "airspeed" and "altitude" calls for Capt King.

The Morgenthau kept a tight rein on Rescue 342 and the other aircraft in the area. The communication required sounded like a flight into Toronto on a bad weather night. After sorting out a

multitude of abbreviation puzzles like, PIW, POD, SAP, DMB, MV, and ITBB (a crew favorite), Rescue 342 settled into searching and began to feel like old hands at water searching. The spotters in the back were in great shape and handled the weather like old pros. Several call arounds were given for objects which turned out to be driftwood. The search day was suspended as light began to fail and after a quick goodbye to the Morgenthau, Rescue 342 returned to Kodiak. During the debriefing the crew was informed that Saturday would be the last effort as there was little hope at this point that the 5 souls onboard would have been able to survive in these conditions. With that in mind, plans were made to recover in Comox after the final days search. The evening in Kodiak proved uneventful despite Capt Illchuk and Capt Thomasgard being "IDed" for

a Coke and Beer respectively, while Sgt Brown made friends with several state troopers.

With a vicious tail wind and a small assistance loan from the Coast Guard in hand, day four began the return home to Winnipeg. After stopping in Comox to drop off spotters and much needed crew rest, the crew was again tasked for a boat search closer to home on Lake Winnipeg — but that's another story.

Although unfortunately no survivors or sign of the vessel Fierce Competitor were found, valuable over water search experience was gained and fun was had by all. 435 T&R Sqn is always glad to help (scoop) 442 Sqn in Comox in any of their endeavors, be it present or future. THAT OTHERS MAY LIVE.

The design should have some connection to the wing's role or function, its geographic location or its historical background. The overall design should be clean, uncluttered and easily recognizable.

All submissions should include a brief explanation for

why a particular badge is being proposed. It should address the badge's connection to wing operations, geographic location or historical background, and include a list of sources or research material used in the design process, if applicable.

Make sure that you also include a new motto for the Wing as well. The motto should be a word, phrase or short sentence which expresses an appropriate sentiment, reflection or rule of conduct. While the motto is usually in Latin, it can also be in English, French, German, Gaelic or an

Aboriginal language.

All entries should be in by Friday, 16 December, with the winning entry to be announced early in the new year.

The winning entry will be awarded a prize of \$100 in value under the auspices of the 17 Wing Ideas Programme.

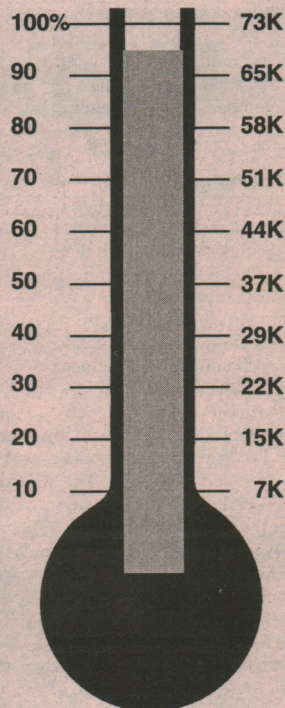

A MATTER OF COURTESY

At a recent meeting of the 17 Wing POMV Safety Committee a number of concerns with regards to traffic flow and vehicle parking were expressed. Although the majority of these concerns will "filter down" to those concerned, there is one that really should be viewed as a matter of courtesy. With the help of all 17 Wing members, this problem can be resolved.

The concern is the crosswalk at the south end of

Whytefold Rd., just before Ness Ave. It seems that some people feel inconvenienced by having to wait for people to cross the street at the pedestrian corridor. To avoid this inconvenience they have taken to speeding up to beat potential corridor users to the crosswalk. This is creating a dangerous and potentially fatal situation.

As the majority of users of this crosswalk are members of the military community living in the PMQ area, it would seem a very small courtesy indeed, to slow down and

allow pedestrians to make the crossing without danger, or a foot race. A small amount of consideration on the part of all Wing members will greatly reduce the threat of a tragic and unnecessary accident. Safety within the military community is the responsibility of everyone, and a strong effort should be made to reduce the potential for accidents to occur.

So please, slow down and be courteous, your assistance will benefit the whole community.

Accelerated Redesign

Over the past three years we have gained considerable experience with change at the section and squadron level. The traditional Socio-Technical Systems (STS) model was used to redesign work within two CE squadrons and here at AIRCOM HQ within DCOS CE. Significant changes in attitudes towards achieving quality, improving productivity and working in a cooperative environment for both civilian and military members are results of the STS experience. These are the very results we are looking for from D2000 and the ACES programmes. This traditional model takes time to get results - 12 to 18 months - which is also a major benefit. The time and effort expended by the workforce in the redesign process generates a high level of commitment to make it work. However, we must find faster ways to achieve change.

The past year has seen increased change activity resulting from the need for efficiency in our procedures, practices and systems. Budget 94 has created increased urgency in being more cost effective and reducing infrastructure and overhead. Total Quality Management (TQM), Re-engineering and

STS redesign are the models being used here within DCOS Maint, DCOS Log and at various Wings within CE squadrons. Again, these processes take time and involve only small parts of the organization. Accelerated work redesign using the STS Conference model provides significant resource savings in less time than traditional methods, maintains high commitment from the workforce and confirms the model's viability for large system change within Air Command.

The scope of the change for 15 Wing is, ultimately, the entire Wing beginning with the Logistics Branch and to redesign all the personnel services provided in support of individuals. This could include administration, messes, personnel services, medical, dental, comptroller functions and any technical support that is provided to individuals (e.g. maintenance of married quarters and movement of F&E on posting) rather than units.

CONFERENCE MODEL

The conference model follows the same basic steps as the traditional STS process but does so using a minimum of four conferences. The process takes less time than traditional methods, involves a much larger number of the workforce

and increases early commitment because more people are a part of the redesign. Conferences last two to three days, involve up to 80 people from the organization and are held approximately one month apart. Redesign requires four to five months with almost immediate implementation after the visioning, customer, technical/social analysis, redesign and implementation conferences. Fewer full-time assets from within the organization are required, however, more consultant and facilitator support is needed.

Gander and Goose Bay are planning to utilize STS to redesign their Logistics Branch/CE Sqn in the near future.

Purchasing a home - the downpayment

One of the key first steps that any potential home purchaser must take is establishing how much money they have for a downpayment. In order to purchase a home, most individuals require a downpayment, and most financial institutions will require that the downpayment be from the purchaser's own resources. The federal government has recently instituted two new programs, both of which are designed to encourage Canadians to purchase their first home by making downpayments more accessible and easier to accumulate.

The first of these programs has involved lowering the minimum downpayment on a first home from 10% of the purchase price to 5% of the purchase price. This means that if you were to buy a home for \$142,000, the minimum downpayment would be \$7,100.

There are some restrictions that the 5% down program places on Canadians:

1) The purchasers must be first time homebuyers. You can not have owned a home in the past 5 years. Where there is more than one co-purchaser, only one has to be a first-time homebuyer as defined above.

2) The home purchased must be the principal residence.

3) The program places a ceiling on the purchase price of the home. This amount varies from area to area, so check with your financial institution for the price ceiling prior to entering into any Agreement of Purchase and Sale. You still have to be able to qualify to make the mortgage payments though, so just because you have saved \$10,000, you cannot necessarily buy a \$200,000 home!

4) You must qualify for the mortgage under a three year closed term, although you can choose any term for the mortgage. This means that all calculations will be based on current posted rates for a three year mortgage term, but that you do not actually have to take a three year term.

The second program that the Government has instituted allows Canadians to withdraw up to \$20,000 from R.R.S.P.'s without having the withdrawal taxed as income. As with the 5% down payment program, the R.R.S.P. withdrawal program has some restrictions:

1) The home purchased must be the principal residence.

2) The home purchased must not have been previously owned by any of the co-purchasers.

3) You must have entered into an agreement to purchase, and withdrawn funds from your R.R.S.P. by March 1, 1995.

4) You must complete the agreement before October 1995.

5) You must repay the amount withdrawn from the R.R.S.P. in order to avoid having your withdrawal taxed as income. You will have scheduled annual repayments of equal amounts over a 15 year period. Your first repayment is due by December 31, 1996. The payments are calculated simply by dividing your initial withdrawal by 15. If you had withdrawn \$15,000 from your R.R.S.P. for your downpayment, your first R.R.S.P. repayment of \$1,000 would be due by December 31, 1996. These repayments are not tax deductible. If you decide not to make your repayment one year, or to repay only part of it, the unpaid portion must be declared as income on your tax return.

6) Funds contributed to your R.R.S.P. must remain in that account for a minimum of 90 days prior to being withdrawn for your downpayment. If you do not leave contributions in your the 90 day minimum period, your downpayment withdrawal will be taxed as income.

7) Each of the co-purchasers, provided they are first-time homebuyers, can withdraw up to \$20,000 from their the downpayment.

It is important to remember that both of these programs are Government initiatives and as such, may be changed or cancelled at any time. Be sure to discuss the merits of these programs with your lender before making any commitments.

Some purchasers obtain a downpayment in the form of a loan from a friend or family member. In these instances, most financial institutions will require a "gift letter", which states that the funds are a gift from the donor, and do not have to be repaid.

Human nature isn't made that way. Most of us need the personal touch, a pat on the back, some sincere thanks and appreciation, before we really give.

If you want the best results in handling people, don't let thanksgiving come only once a year. Be thankful every day. How long since you've thanked your wife for having a good breakfast ready and waiting? How long since you've told someone how much you appreciate their promptness, instead of merely criticizing those who are late? Be APPRECIATIVE. People are hungry for your understanding, thanks, and appreciation.

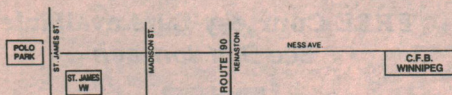

education, health or nutrition, there are some things we can do.

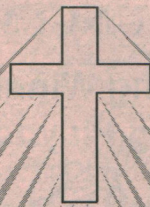

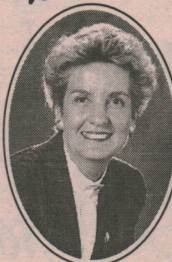
