Royal Winnipeg Rifles Welcome Prince Charles

"Little Black Devils" put on show for Colonel-in-Chief

Each and every Regiment in the Canadian Forces has its own traditions and history unique to itself. For members of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, both come together in the person of His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales. On April 25th, Prince Charles, the Colonel-in-Chief of "the Little Black Devils" came to Minto Armoury in Winnipeg to visit his Regiment.

In spite of the snowstorm outside, over 700 Regimental family members, Rifle veterans, serving members, and Rifle cadets came to welcome the Prince. After the Royal Salute, the lights dimmed and Minto Armoury suddenly became a battlefield. An enemy section rappelled from the rafters and engaged the Rifles' defensive positions. The battle was fierce, but the enemy quickly retreated when they knew they were no match for the Rifles.

After the battle, Prince Charles inspected the defensive position and met with serving members. "He asked about my tour in Yugoslavia and what action I saw there, said Cpl Holtmann. The Prince then ascended to the Museum of the 113 year-old Regiment where he saw vintage displays, then back to the main floor to view other static displays like a Command Post, casualty treatment facilities and a UN checkpoint. "It's an honor," said Rifles cadet MWO Vieira when asked how he felt about meeting the Prince when HRH stopped by his display and spoke to the young man. Prince Charles then spent most of his time shaking hands and talking with members of the Regimental family.

At the end of his visit, Prince Charles was presented with a statue of the Great Grey Owl, Manitoba's provincial bird. Then, as the Prince addressed his Regiment, he remarked on how welcome he felt, how proud he was of the Rifles and how important our job is, especially to train for and support Peacekeeping missions abroad. "I have been to Bosnia and I have seen the difference peacekeeping makes," said the Prince.

Then, with three resounding cheers, Prince Charles departed, having again made his mark on the history of his Regiment - The Royal Winnipeg Rifles!

SOME INTERESTING RIFLES FACTS

113 years old 44 Battle Honors

The Rifles got their nickname "The Little Black Devils" from their enemy at the Battle of Fish Creek in 1885. The story goes that when captured, the enemy remarked "We know who

those Red Coats are, but who are those Little Black Devils?", referring to the Rifle Green uniforms of the Regiment, which looked black from a distance. To this day, the Regiment wears all black accoutrements on their uniforms, and for formal parades, their "whites" are

actually black.

The Rifles were the first Regiment in the Commonwealth to wear the Rifle (dark) green uniform. For His Royal Highness's visit, the entire Regiment was authorized to wear their dark green tunics instead of summer tans.

PERSONNEL SUPPORT PROGRAMS – PSP AGENCY IMPLEMENTATION

Changes on the Way for PSP

Important changes to Personnel Support Programs (PSP) are in the works. To better meet the changing needs of CF members and their families, National Defence has approved a plan that will create an Agency to oversee the delivery of PSP programs across the country.

Transition to full Agency operations is planned over a three year period and, when fully operational, annual savings in excess of

\$6 million are expected.

The purpose of the Agency is to strengthen the national delivery of PSP programs and continue the outstanding contribution made by PSP military personnel to the morale, welfare and fitness of the CF.

The new Agency will be directly responsible for PSP policy, NPF personnel administration and accounting services, CANEX and SISIP. Local PSP operations however, such as military physical education, community recreation and mess operations, will remain the

responsibility of local commanders.

The Agency represents a new way of delivering PSP programming and is one of a number of alternative service delivery models within National Defence. The most significant change, in the stand up of the Agency, will result in the elimination of the majority of military positions currently involved in managing PSP activities and in the creation of publicly supported NPF positions to continue this work. For example, base military physical education and recreation staff will be

replaced with NPF fitness and sports personnel by August 1997. Other changes include plans to streamline PSP administration. With the exception of mess operations, which continues to be examined, implementation is to begin immediately.

The implementation team is in place and is currently working on the details of issues ranging from the elimination of military positions and subsequent reductions to military trades to the development of the mechanisms for the classification and staffing of new NPF positions.

With the many changes planned and underway in National Defence, communications will play an important role in the transition to the new ways of doing business.

WINNIPEG AND ITS MUDDY WATERS

Back in March you may recall my article "Winter Blues Getting You Down?" (13 Mar issue), in which I grumbled vehemently about our disgusting weather. Who would of thought (certainly not myself) that we would be still be experiencing below normal temperatures and snow on the ground by the month of May. This has definitely been a winter to forget but which we probably won't for some time, due to the many records that have been broken:

- more than 130 centimetres of snow have fallen in Manitoba this winter;
- more than 66 days reached -20C or colder;
- more than 44 days had a windchill of 1700 or higher; and
- more than 6 months with snow on the ground (snow arrived just before Halloween and was still here the first few days of May).

My boss put it succinctly to a group here on Temporary Duty (TD) a couple of weeks ago "If you get a posting message to Winnipeg shoot yourself!"

I feel sorry for all the birds (they must be wondering why they ever decided to migrate back) and other animals that have to contend with finding food and keeping warm. I even have sympathy for the gardeners,

farmers, golfers and other summer sports enthusiasts who are patiently waiting for things to dry.

Water is definitely a problem, due in large part to the location and type of soil Winnipeg is built on (clay and marshland). This coupled with a large snowfall results in flooding problems most springs and a lot of general sloppy mess well into the summer months.

But Winnipeg comes by it honestly. French-speaking fur traders were the first to settle at the junction of the Assiniboine and Red rivers where Winnipeg now lies. French explorers built Fort Rouge in 1738. The North West Company built Fort Gibraltar, later called Fort Garry, in 1804. A few years later the Hudson's Bay Company established Fort Douglas. Lord Selkirk of the Hudson's Bay Company led Scottish immigrants to the site in 1811 and established the Red River Settlement. The companies later merged and named their settlement Winnipeg from the Cree Indian words meaning "muddy water".

Notwithstanding the difficult climate Winnipeg is famous for (cold, snow, wind and bugs) there is a lot to offer. The land in the area is very fertile and Winnipeg has blossomed into an industrial and cosmopolitan city (which we realize once we become acclimatized and venture out of the warmth of our homes!)

ASK MR GREENTREE

Two questions were asked of me recently and, because they appeared to be so different, I was wondering how I could include them in the same column. Then, the link became obvious - if you take a long look at the subject backgrounds.

Question: Why does the Wing burn the Tall Grass Prairie at St Charles Range and around the base?

Answer: The grass is burned because the plant community relies on fire to renew itself. Burning clears the buildup of dead plant material - which can mat and stop new plants from growing - and accelerates the release of nutrients bound up in that material.

Plant communities which rely on fire are very common in temperate climates (like Canada, Russia and Northern Europe) because of the length of time it takes for dead plants to rot. The cool (or cold) weather stops or slows the decomposition to such an extent that a build up of dead material occurs and damages the health of the entire plant community. [In some areas, such as those found in the NWT, this material can last for many years.] Fires act to cleanse the community and are part of the natural cycle to which these plant communities have adapted.

In contrast, plant material can rot in tropical areas in weeks or months. The soils in many of these areas cannot hold nutrients well so the rotting plants act as a continual supply of nutrients to the growing vegetation. When fire is added to these communities, usually as a result of human activity, the nutrients are released too quickly and are lost to the surviving or new plants. Tropical plant communities have not adapted to fire and, as a result, there is considerable concern about the use of fire for clearing land in such areas as the Amazon River Basin and in Southeast Asia.

Two last notes on fire's effects on plants. First, some plants have adapted to rely on fire to reproduce. For example, the cones of some pine species will not even open unless they have been subject to temperatures which occur during fires. Without these temperatures, these species will slowly disappear from the plant community. Last, many parks services are starting to recognize the role of fire in preserving wilderness areas. As a result, many fires are allowed to burn themselves out rather than being put out. Not only does this restore the plant community, it can save taxpayers a lot of money.

Question: Is cancer becoming more common than it was before?

Answer: While this may not seem to be much of an environmental question, it does have to do with evolution and adaptation - the basic theme of this column. The short answer is yes.

Cancer is becoming more common because the lifespan of individuals has steadily increased. Earlier generations did not live as long as we do today - the average lifespan of an Anglo-Saxon male, for example, has increased from about 30 years to roughly 75 in the past 400 years. Lifespans have lengthened largely due to improved medical care which has significantly reduced infant and patient mortality, lifesaving drugs and healthier lifestyles on the whole.

Because people are not dying at an early age from preventable or curable diseases, like typhoid, cholera and smallpox, or at childbirth, there is a better chance of cancers to develop. There is also a higher probability that the cancer will be identified as a cancer rather than being classed as "consumption" or some other "fuzzy" disease.

So, cancer is becoming more common but only because other diseases and causes of illness and death are not affecting people first.

[It should be noted that this general trend does not extend around the world. Many countries and areas do not have the same access to medical health and social change and, as a result, cancer is overshadowed by other illnesses and diseases.]

SAREX FOR MISSING CHILDREN AN 8,000 KM CYCLING FUND RAISER

The idea for SAREX for Missing Children was put forward in Sept 94 during the 50th anniversary of Para Rescue in Canada. The SAR Techs goals are:

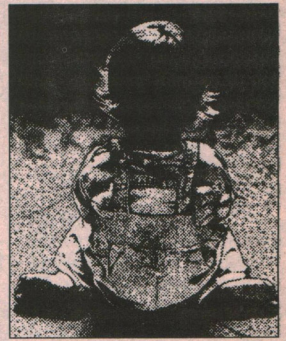
- A. To highlight the tragedy of violence against children and missing children in Canada through this cycling event.
- B. To raise money and awareness for Victims of Violence Canadian Centre for Missing Children.
- C. To promote fitness and to increase morale and pride among SAR Techs by being the first military team to accomplish such a feat.

Every cent raised goes directly to the Missing Children Centre. Last year, international Missing Children's day was set up on Capital Hill. This year it is being organized around the five cyclists, and will take place in Vancouver's Stanley Park on May 22 by the president of Missing Children.

GOLDEYES THROW PITCH TO MILITARY

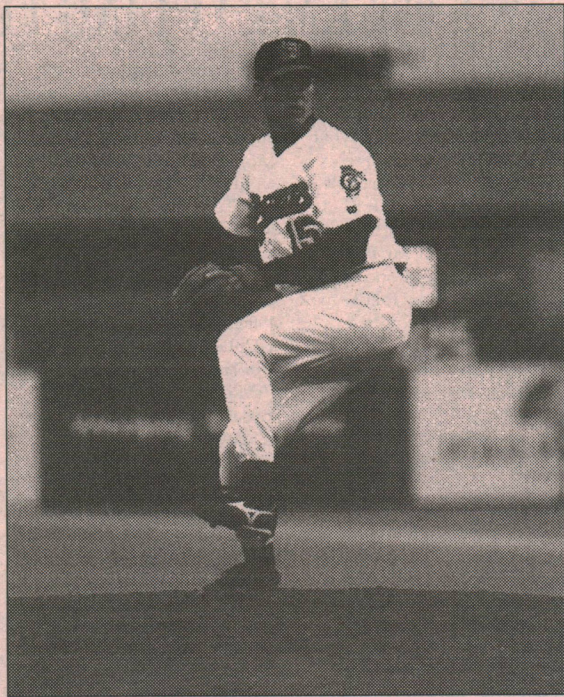

Air to Air people have been very busy getting chased by lots of thirsty CF 18s. The latest refuelling course just finished last May 10. This was an ideal situation for Loadmasters with one instructor (MCpl Beaugrand) and one student



(MCpl Patterson) to get all his attention. We just knew Dennis was going to do well.

On the SAR side of the section, congratulations go to Sgt Mike Allard on his completion of the SAR Conversion Course in Trenton. With all his pre-course training he just couldn't miss.

A final word from the SAR Techs, everyone please remember the Bikeathon Fund-raiser for Missing Children. It begins 19 May with 5 SAR Techs pedaling approximately 200 km per day. They will cross Canada from Comox to St. John's NFLD, 8000 km. raising funds for Missing Children.

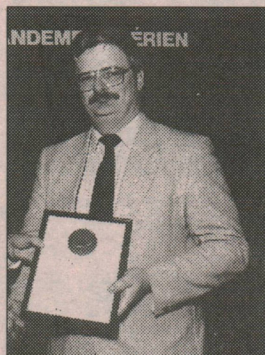

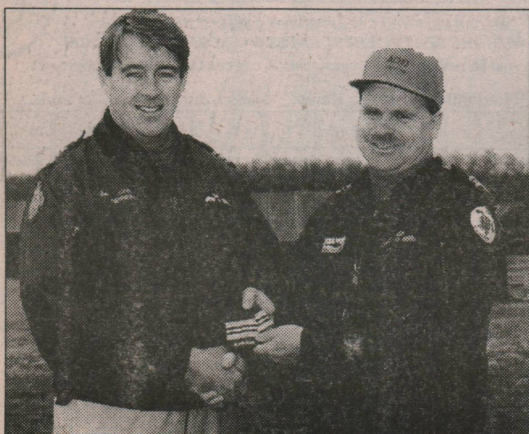

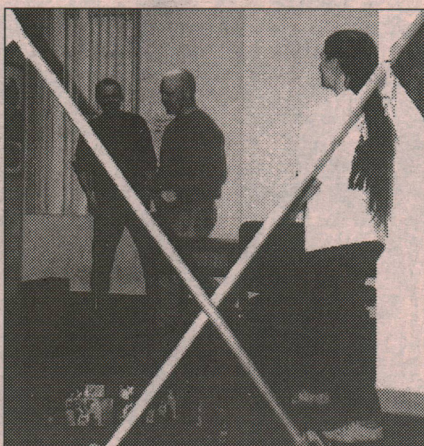

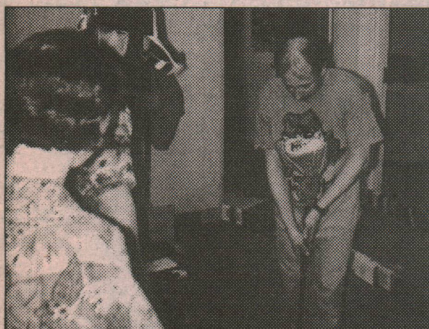

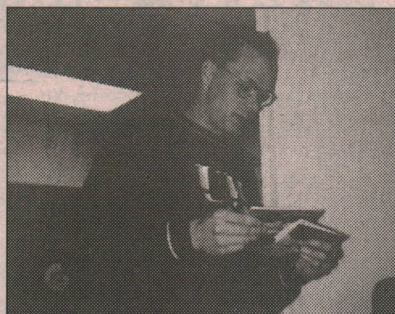

IT'S RIFLES FOR SHOVELS

Manitoba-Lakehead Reservists Battle Floods

One hundred thousand sandbags. Empty, the number is impressive enough, but to fill them with sand...? Your back aches just thinking about it!

But the allure of filling those empty sandbags, aching backs and thigh deep water was not enough to keep nearly 70 soldiers from assisting in diking, sand bagging and flood control near St. Adolphe MB, about 20 kms South of Winnipeg, where the rising waters of the Red River were threatening 79 homes. Soldiers from 26 Field Artillery Regiment from Brandon and Portage La Prairie, the Royal Winnipeg Rifles, Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders, the Fort Garry Horse, 17 Service Battalion, 17 Medical Company and 735 Communications Regiment came out to fight the floods. Another platoon was on four hours notice-to-move in Winnipeg had the situation worsened.

"The last time the Army was called out to fight floods (in Manitoba) — that was in 1979 — a three day operation turned into a two-week one," said Maj. Jim O'Brian, the officer commanding the 'flood fighters'. The rising river was not supposed to crest until the second of May. Soldiers, who had deployed from Winnipeg on the 28th of April, were told to prepare for at least a 72-hour stay.

Plans for the launch of Operation Ritchot, named for the Rural Municipality where the worst flooding was, were made prior to the actual deployment. "The word went out to all units. We wanted a list of soldiers who would

be available to battle the floods should the Army be called in to assist," said Capt Guy Corriveau, G3-Domestic Operations at Manitoba-Lakehead District. "We had a list of over 100 people who were willing to go."

Op Ritchot was a coordinated effort between the Rural Municipality of Ritchot, the Manitoba Emergency Measures Organization, the CF and other provincial departments. The flooding waters were monitored constantly, and military personnel were deployed from the base camp of the St. Adolphe Arena to roads and homes in the region. On the second day of the operation, soldiers would no sooner return from filling and placing 3000 sandbags when they would have to assist another home in danger. "Things are getting crazy out there," said one reservist, back in St. Adolphe from a stint of sandbagging.

On April 30th the flood waters crested. Although flooding was extensive it was not as devastating as the flood of 1979. The province has spent the last 17 years preparing for serious flooding by building ring dikes, floodways and raising homes.

After 48-hours of flood control and assessment, soldiers were told to pack up for home. The worst was over and we could return to our normal lives. The efforts of the army did not seem to go unappreciated however. "Everyone seemed happy to see us," said Lt John Nijeboer, a troop commander from 26 Fd Regt in Brandon. "It was just good to get out and help." Soldiers said they appreciated being able to put their training into practical use — even if it meant trading rifles for shovels.

CANADIAN FORCES SAYS "NO" TO FAMILY VIOLENCE

With the promulgation of its new CFAO, Family Violence and Abuse, the Canadian Forces is sending a powerful message to all its members: family violence of any kind—spousal assault, elder abuse, child abuse, violence against women in general—will not be tolerated.

Family violence and abuse is a destructive social phenomenon that unfortunately occurs in the families of some CF members just as it does elsewhere in Canadian society. The violence to and abuse of (mostly) women, children and elderly family members is an extremely serious problem, not only because of the immediate injury, pain and suffering that may be caused but also because of the potential for long-term psychological damage and development impairment, and the start of a pattern of violence and abuse that can be passed from generation to generation.

The new Canadian Forces policy, originally sponsored by the former Associate Minister of National Defence, Mary Collins, and developed in Director General Personnel Policy, will not only give credence to the excellent work already being done by the social workers and the multi-service family resource centres on bases and stations across the country, but also allow for sweeping new initiatives to help provide a pro-active response for victims in order to increase support, protection and the victim's use of the criminal justice system. Family crisis teams, designed to "manage" issues relating to family violence and abuse, and consisting of representatives from the offices of the social workers, the chaplains, the base surgeon, the military police and the multi-service family resource centres, as well as (when appropriate)

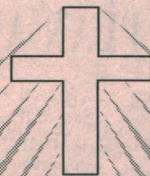
representatives of professional health care workers from the civilian community, will be set up at CF sites. Safe houses or transition houses where victims of violence and abuse and their children can be provided with assistance and accommodation for temporary periods will be made available wherever possible. In areas where it is not feasible to provide a safe house, safe families will provide accommodation and help to victims in times of crisis.

A major strategy of the new policy is to protect victims by reducing violence and abuse through communication, awareness and education programmes aimed at making assailants accountable and responsible for their violent or abusive behaviours and providing counselling services to help them correct those behaviours. Members of military families will be given information that enables them to identify and contact helping agencies in the event of actual or potential family violence and abuse. The Chief Social Work Officer, in consultation with other appropriate CF agencies, will be responsible for coordinating the development of appropriate awareness and education programs, while base social work officers will provide professional advice and expertise to commanders in the development of local procedures as well as ensuring that support, counselling and treatment is provided to families in which violence and/or abuse has occurred. The multi-service family resource centres or the community coordinators, charged to promote the health and well-being of military families, will provide or assist in providing preventative education and awareness programmes related to family violence and abuse. In some cases, they will operate telephone crisis lines or helplines,

act as referral centres for victims and participate in the administration of, or referral to, safe houses or safe families. As always, base medical personnel, military police and chaplains will continue to provide support to military families in crisis.

The Canadian Forces' position on family violence and abuse is unequivocal. It will not be tolerated. Members who inflict harms on their partners or children, or on elderly family members, will be dealt with according to the appropriate legislation. It is hoped, however, that with the new policy and with continued communication, awareness and education, such unacceptable behaviours can be kept to a minimum.

Military family members who wish to find out more about initiatives related to family violence and abuse should contact their local multi-service family resource centres.

HOMESALE PLAN ANNOUNCED — PILOT PROJECT EASES POSTING STRESS

Canadian Forces members are now eligible for a guaranteed home sale plan recently approved by Treasury Board. The pilot project ensures military and other federal government employees transferred in support of their departments will receive the

assessed market value for the sale of their homes.

The plan is intended to give departments more flexibility and should reduce stress for homeowners affected by delays.

Eligible homeowners will be able to select their own appraiser to decide the current market value of the home. But

Treasury Board must still finalize arrangements with a number of contractors who will market the homes eligible for the plan. Until these negotiations are complete, members must ensure their real estate agents accept the terms and conditions of the home sale plan before proceeding.

"After a specific period, if the member hasn't sold the house for fair market value, the company will buy it from him," says Master Warrant Officer Jim Jobs, Shearwater's senior administration clerk. "Next to home equity assistance, this is probably one of the better benefits a military homeowner has been entitled to, certainly in the last 10-15 years."

Jobs says the plan should go a long ways towards reducing the stress associated with postings. Until now, members have been forced to leave behind either their family or an empty house when transferring to another location, options which incur expenses for the both the member and the department.

Also, some employees have sold at substantial losses to rid themselves of the burden of maintaining two households. "I've seen people lose their shirt," adds Jobs. "I think this is a great thing. If a member owns a home here, he won't be stuck with it on posting."

All military members with change of strength dates between 1 April 1996 and 31 March 1998 will be eligible for the pilot project. The home for sale must qualify as a principal residence and have an appraised value not exceeding

\$275,000. Mobile homes, rental properties and houses on lots larger than 1.2 acres are not eligible under the Treasury Board's guidelines.

However, those employees with a reporting/change of strength date prior to April 1 will be disappointed. Unfortunately, the Treasury Board ministers did not authorize retroactively for the plan. In addition, in keeping with the project's aim to support operations and provide continued service delivery, members on termination or release will not be eligible for the benefit.

The project is actually the third phase of a relocation package proposed about three years ago with the aim of easing the difficulty associated with job transfers and reducing the inherent expenses. The first phase included contracting of specialists to assist with relocation needs. Phase two introduced the home equity assistance plan to counter losses when homeowners face significant drops in real estate values prior to posting. The third phase neatly finalizes a benefit package which should ease the difficulties previously experienced by Canadian Forces members in the habit of moving often.
