1 AIR MOVEMENTS SQUADRON

Retired Lieutenant Colonel T.A. (Tom) Robson graciously accepted the appointment of Honorary Colonel for 1 Air Movements Squadron on Friday, 01 November 1996. The official ceremony, which was presided over by Colonel G.E. Sharpe, Wing Commander of 17 Wing Winnipeg, was held at 10 Hangar, home of 1 Air Movements Squadron and was attended by Honorary Colonel Robson's wife, the former Olive Henderson and their family.

As an ex-Traffic Technician and a retired Transportation officer, retired LCol Robson is particularly suited to this appointment. LCol Robson commenced his exemplary career in April, 1950 when he joined the RCAF as a Transportation Technician, the precursor trade to today's Traffic Technician occupation. His first posting was with 901 Air Traffic Handling Unit, RCAF Station Edmonton. At a later date, this unit was transformed into several components, one of which was to become today's 1 Air Movements Squadron. In 1961, after serving on a number of operational flying tours and achieving the rank of Sgt, Honorary Colonel Robson was commissioned from the ranks, at which time he assumed the duties of Deputy Commanding Officer of 1 Air Movements Unit, RCAF Station Namao. In 1971, on being promoted to the rank of Major, Honorary Colonel Robson became Commanding Officer of the "First and Finest", 1 Air Movements Unit, located at that time at CFB Edmonton. After several more tours, Honorary Colonel Robson was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in 1980, at which time he assumed the duties of Senior Staff Officer at Air Command Headquarters.

Having retired in 1987, Honorary Colonel Robson is viewed as the architect of the current Air Force Transportation Officer, Traffic Technician and Mobile Support Equipment apprenticeship training programs as he exhibited unparalleled foresight and ingenuity in developing training objectives which have made these disciplines a vital part of today's Air Force operations.

It is truly a privilege to welcome retired Lieutenant Colonel T.A. Robson as the new Honorary Colonel for 1 Air Movements Squadron - the "First and Finest"!

Food from the sky for the hungry

That evening a flock of quails flew in and settled over the whole camp; in the morning a fall of dew lay all around it. When the dew was gone, there over the surface of the wilderness fine flakes appeared, fine as hoar frost on the ground. When the Israelites saw it, they said one to another "What is that?" because they did not know what it was. Moses said to them, "That is the bread which the Lord has given you to eat."

The idea of dropping food from the sky to aid starving refugees has been around for a long time. However, the Canadian air force has now developed a means to drop food to large groups of people on the ground, without using

parachutes, and without the need for an airfield at which to land and off-load. This was brought about by the refugee situation in eastern Zaire in November.

"We tried brainstorming for possible options," says Capt Brook Bangsball, loadmaster standards officer at Air Transport Group Headquarters. "Given the enormous humanitarian needs in central Africa, the rugged geography and the tactical situation, all conventional aerial delivery methods were ruled out."

Thousands of small packages of food are released from the rear cargo doors of a Hercules transport, to flutter to

the ground where they can be picked up by the people who need it. Military airlift was used extensively to keep the people of Berlin going when the Communist blockaded the city in 1948. More recently, Canada joined several other nations in a three-year airlift of food into Sarajevo during the civil war.

MAKING IT A HAPPY NEW YEAR

Well another Christmas has come and gone. Hopefully, you all had a safe and happy holiday. It is always a little melancholy when the decorations come down and we put the traditions of the Christmas season away for another year. It's interesting to look at all of the traditional rituals that each family seems to pass down from generation to generation, some are the same and some are different and yet they all play a significant part in Christmases both past and present. Here are some traditions you may partake in and the reasons why they have been handed down from generation to generation:

- the actual celebration of Christ's birthday didn't happen until halfway through the fourth Century, AD 336. It was originally celebrated on the 6th of January, but most churches during the course of the 4th Century changed it to the 25th of December. That time of year had been an excuse for a festive occasion many centuries earlier. The winter solstice, on or near December 21st, the longest night of the year, herald's the rebirth of the sun and an occasion for living it up;
- the evergreen, a permanently summer-looking tree amid snows, suggests fertility and hope in the midst of sterility;
- mistletoe, although poisonous, was considered a wonder drug, a protector against disease and poison. Mistletoe was hung above doors as a sign that old quarrels were to be forgotten and a kiss under the mistletoe became a promise of good things to come;
- poinsettias, poisonous too, was named after Joel R. Poinsett, US ambassador to Mexico, who brought the plant home to south Carolina in 1829;
- ivy represents the soul of mankind submitting to the Lord;
- holly was supposed to have magical power to protect against witchcraft, lightning bolts and evil

spirits. Its pricking leaves were reputed to have been used for Christ's crown of thorns, which is why its yellow berries turn red like blood;

- holly & mistletoe signify the miracle of Christmas by bearing fruit only in winter;
- Boxing Day got its name from the "Christmas Box" which was taken around on Christmas Day, or more frequently the day after, to gather funds for priests to give to the poor;
- a Christmas tree, brought inside the house and filled with decorations, was the gift from Germany that Queen Victoria got from her beloved consort, Albert. The tree at Windsor Castle was hung with candies and sweetmeats;
- originally, the gifts exchanged at Christmas were intended for the poor, now most of them remain within family and friends. The bringer of gifts varies widely throughout the world, from Germany's Christkindl (the Christ Child, a female messenger from Jesus who enters through an open window) to Italy's witch, Befana (who delivers gifts as a penance for her delay in following the Star to Bethlehem and missing everything) to our Santa Claus (who really comes from the Netherlands, where he is called Sinterklaas); and
- the 1st commercially printed Christmas Card made its appearance in 1843 in London, England and was criticized by temperance groups because it depicted a three-generation family raising their wine glasses in a toast to the holiday.

Of course these are only a few of the North American/Christian traditions that we have maintained through time. Many other religions and countries have a vast array of traditions with the same history behind them. This, hopefully gives us a little perspective as we begin a new year and at a time when commercialism and the hustle and bustle of our lifestyles can erode our appreciation of a very important and family oriented occasion!

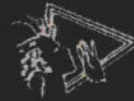

Ask Mr Greentree

A thousand pardons - I have not been very faithful to you, my dear reader. (Okay, I missed a column!)

First, I have a bit of good news for those parents and young adults wondering if the environment field is a suitable career choice. Red River Community College is now offering an Environmental Youth Initiative program. This two-year program will give the student some exposure to the many facets of the environmental work world and appears to be a fairly well planned out program. If a soon-to-be high school graduate is uncertain about what technical or university environmental program is best suited to her/his abilities and interests, the Environmental Youth Initiative may help. Give Red River Community College a call - it may save everyone a lot of heartache.

So, as I was sitting in my lonely log cabin in the middle of the vast natural spaces here at 17 Wing, I received but one question this month. I sez to myself, maybe my readership has fallen (a thought dismissed immediately!) or maybe they are just waiting for a really nifty CONTEST WITH A GREAT PRIZE. (That, in advertising, is called the "hook").

The contest is open to the first reader to send in a question dealing with the environmental program at 17 Wing or in the CF, in writing, to the W Env O. The prize is a magnificent compact optical enhancement device handsomely embossed with the Environmental Program logo.

Onto the question: I recently saw a list of contaminated sites at 17 Wing. Are people working around those areas in danger? A. For most sites, unless the surface dirt is disturbed, there is no danger to personnel in the area. The only sites which pose any danger are those being dug up. The danger arises from fumes in the hole or, in the case of lead contamination, from the dust generated during digging. Proper precautions - such as ventilation and cleaning off dust - should eliminate these dangers. As always, check with the W Env O before digging in any of these sites. If you have concerns about health and safety issues, your unit UGSO should be contacted as well.

ENVIRO BIT: WARNING. WARNING. According to information received at a recent Departmental Environment Officers' conference, the Department is soon to issue a policy which prohibits the discharge on any Chlorofluorocarbons (CFC) after 1 July 1997. This prohibition will include solvents, spray products for cleaning electrical boards, any aerosol spray which uses CFCs as a propellant, and a wide variety of other products which may be on the shelf in your unit. This may be a good time to arrange for the disposal of such products (beat the rush!) and to find substitutes. More to follow, I'm sure.

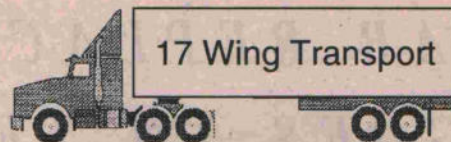

New Fuels in the Ice Age

17 Wing is committed to improving the environment by converting vehicles to Alternative Transportation Fuels (ATFs). Our plan is to convert as many of our 325 vehicles as funding will allow. The driving force behind the conversions is the Alternative Fuels Act, passed by Parliament in June of 1995. The Act stipulates that 50% of all vehicles purchased in 1997-98 must be ATF vehicles. By the year 2000, this figure will rise to 75%.

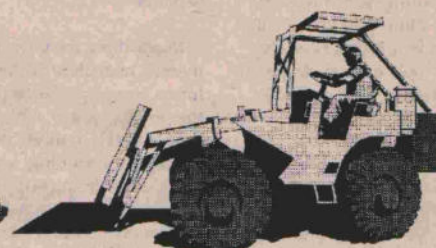
Funding, however, is not our only concern. The Winnipeg winter of 1995-96 was the coldest winter in a century. With record low temperatures already experienced in November and December, drivers at 17 Wing



Transportation Squadron are understandably concerned about how, or whether, propane vehicles will operate in the extreme cold of a Canadian winter. Despite our pessimism, Peter Nagy of one of the Alternative Transportation Fuel companies here in Winnipeg has been operating a bifuel (propane and unleaded gasoline) 1993 Ford Taurus for the past three years. During this time, he has not experienced any problems starting his 3 litre V6 engine apparently using solely propane.

New-technology propane injection systems have overcome the cold weather problems of the past. With this in mind, 17 Wing intends to convert all the vehicles it is acquiring this coming year, as our part in reducing emissions to an acceptable level.

Wing Transportation operates a wide variety of snow removal equipment. Recently, vehicles have been observed pulling out in front of snowploughs, following sanding trucks too closely, and, in one case, driving under the snow being projected from a snowblower. LAB REPLACEMENT GOES TO TENDER

The federal government has issued a request for proposals to replace the Canadian Force's fleet of Labrador helicopters. Defence Minister Doug Young made the announcement during a visit to Air Command headquarters in Winnipeg.

"Canadian Forces search and rescue personnel go about their work with professionalism, responding to nearly 450 incidents a year and rescuing more than 200 people annually. Our men and women in uniform need the proper tools to do their job for the benefit of all Canadians," the Minister said.

The department is looking for up to 15 medium lift, multi-engined helicopters with a 500-nautical mile range, 120-knot cruise speed, plus accommodation for five air crew with equipment and ten passengers. Several

international helicopter manufacturers have expressed an interest in the project, including Agusta/Westland, the contractor for the ill-fated EH-101 replacement project.

Interested bidders have until May 1997 to submit their proposals. The minister said they will be evaluated according to a clear set of criteria; they must satisfy operational requirements, achieve best value for taxpayer's money and result in industrial and regional benefits.

In addition, the government intends to explore "different forms of partnership with the private sector" which should result in innovative concepts for training, spare parts, engineering support and maintenance. Also, "alternative arrangements for financing acquisition of a replacement aircraft" will be investigated, including buying off-the-shelf and investigating

alternative service delivery arrangements where cost-effective such as leasing of equipment.

The Labrador entered service in 1963. Compared to modern aircraft, the Labrador has limited avionics and communications and navigation equipment. It is becoming increasingly difficult and expensive to maintain the 13 remaining helicopters, particularly as several major components for the unique Canadian configuration are no longer in production.

Following an extensive interdepartmental review of industry bids, the government is expected to review the department's recommendation for the winning proposal in the fall of 1997. If a contract is signed by late next year, it is expected delivery will begin in mid-1999 and conclude by 2001.

Happy New Year from the Immunization Clinic

A safe driver with a seat belt has a small potential for injury. A safe driver without a seat belt would likely be injured more seriously if an accident were to occur. An unsafe driver with a seat belt is at a high risk for injury just because of the likelihood of an accident, and the reckless driver without a seat belt is almost guaranteed to injure himself or someone else at some time.

The driver can be compared to a person's health and immunization status. A health conscious person with good hygiene practices who is immunized will likely be free of communicable diseases most of the time. An equally health conscious and hygienic person who is not immunized will be more likely to contract an illness to which he is exposed. A person who is immunized, but has poor sleeping, eating, and exercise patterns, does not wash his hands after using the washroom or before eating, practices unsafe sex, etc., is at risk for illness simply because of the wide exposure to illness causing agents. The person who is reckless with his health and fails to become immunized is likely to contract serious, preventable illness at some point. Thus, immunization is important, but only one step in a continuum of healthy behaviours.

We at the MIR are here to provide immunization service, however it is ultimately the individual's responsibility to look after his own health. Once a year, drop in to the MIR, building 62 2nd floor on a Tuesday or Thursday afternoon, and have

your yellow immunization record book updated. If you do not have this book, it is a good idea to get it from your medical file and keep it with you. Upon notice of deployment, it is always necessary to have one's immunization status checked at the MIR. There are frequently operation or exercise specific immunizations needed, and sometimes changes are made to the regular immunization scheduling. This check must be done in person, with the yellow book.

Many questions have been asked about immunizations, and several bits of misinformation have been overheard among those being immunized. In an effort to clear up some of this, and hopefully to let people feel better informed, there will be a series of articles regarding

specific illnesses appearing in this newspaper over the next few months. This information is not intended as a substitute for personal service at the MIR, but rather as a tool for individuals to use in being responsible for their own health. After all, health is the individual's responsibility. No one else has more control over it, or more of a vested interest in it, and the best way the MIR can help you to stay healthy is by offering the resources you need to look after yourself.

Good luck and good health in the new year, and I hope to see everyone at the immunization clinic sometime in 1997!

ROYAL CANADIAN AIR CADET GLIDING PROGRAM

Manitoba Provincial Committee, Alberta and Saskatchewan were the originators of the Cadet Gliding Program.

Since the start of the program over a million flights have occurred in The Air Cadets Glider Program. Each province purchases its own gliders and tow airplanes. Manitoba owns two tow aircraft and three gliders. Each spring and fall these aircraft are used to provide about 500 glider rides to cadets from the twenty-one air cadet squadrons in Manitoba. They are used to train seventy-eight cadets to a glider pilot licence standard.

The Manitoba Cadets have a glider familiarization program at Gimili and Brandon.

We presently need \$14,000.00 to pay for a SGU-2-33 that we purchased so all the gliders would be the same model.

The glider it replaced was a SGU-2-22 identification CF-ACL (Air Cadet League). As this was the original glider

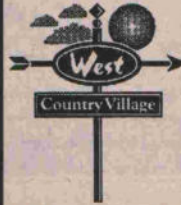
