COMMANDER VISITS 17 WING9

Message from the Wing Commander

The week of October 14, 1997 was extremely busy for all as the Commander of 1 Canadian Air Division and the Chief of Defence Staff visited 17 Wing units. Both visits went well and for that, I certainly commend all of you who had a part to play in their success.

During their visit, both guests met with a few members of the Wing for lunch and seized the opportunity to share their knowledge on certain issues of interest to you all. Let me briefly go over what seemed to have been the topic of most interest, for the benefit of those of you who didn't have a chance to attend those two luncheons.

Gen Baril announced that a decision had just been made to readjust Canadian Forces members' pay over the next two years for NCMs and three years for officers in order to catch up with their current Public Service equivalents. By the end of the pay comparability programme, NCMs' pay will have been increased by about 6% and officers' by about 14%. You all received the first instalment of this program last April and the second one should be in your pay guide by end-November. This second instalment is effective 1 Oct 97. With a pay adjustment of 1.1% for GSO/Pilots (OCDTs to LCol), 0.6% for NCMs and 0.73% to environmental allowances.

It is important to understand the difference between pay comparability and the annual pay raise given to all public servants. The first one incurred for not receiving the second one for a number of years. Treasury Board has not yet decided what the annual economic pay adjustment will be for 1997. However, once that is done, the raise will be applied to your pay and be retroactive to last April. The MND recently mentioned that he was hoping to convince Treasury Board to approve this interim pay increase by Christmas.

Both guests emphasized that the issue of quality of life was at the top of their priority list and it is also at the top of mine. I recognize the importance of satisfaction in the work place and I believe an aspect that greatly contributes to this satisfaction is good internal communication. I am sure everyone would agree that there is nothing more frustrating than not knowing what is

really going on. In fact, the lack of timely and accurate information will usually lead to the creation of rumor, which more often than not, will be false and contribute to more frustration and a decrease in motivation.

Unfortunately, my staff and I will not always have the answers to all of your questions as fast as some of you may like. However, rest assured that we will pass on the information that we do have and will endeavor to seek the answers to the questions that remain unanswered. On the other hand, I am turning to all supervisors, as they are the vehicle for the information to trickle down to the lowest level and for feedback to come back up the chain of command. Communication up and down the chain of command is a team effort.

VOXVIEWS

Taking care of business

You've probably heard a lot, of late, about the devolution of resources, responsibility and authority and the increase in empowerment we are all working in, at both the Wing and unit level. These changes in how we do business are coming fast and furious and for many of us it is probably a little overwhelming, considering we have not had any formal training and our jobs are already busy enough.

It should ease your minds somewhat to know, the Wg Commander has established a mechanism that will take hold of the reins and help lead us in the right direction. The 17 Wg Resource Management Committee (RMC), as it is formally known, held its inaugural meeting 15 Oct 97. The purpose of the committee is to provide executive direction within 17 Wg's authority of ALL resource management issues relating to 17 Wg as well as its integral and lodger units. The intention is to ensure that decisions of this nature align with the long-range mission/vision of the entire Wg.

During his unit visits, the Wg Commander realized that many units were being challenged to fulfill the same or increased operational requirements with decreased resource envelopes. He believes the RMC will provide direction in this respect and ensure that we make informed resource management decisions. Currently, units manage resources that have been allocated to them based on operational requirements as articulated in the 17

Wing Business Plan (BP). Although incremental requirements are a part of the BP, the reality is that there are very limited additional resources to deal with incremental requirements. More and more we must endeavor to identify better ways of doing business in order to generate additional resources. The best way to do this, is through team work and communication. Through this committee, the Wg Commander intends to accomplish the following:

- develop a comprehensive understanding of the collective needs of the Wing and its long-range vision/mission;
- ensure fair and equitable representation for all branches as well as lodger and integral units in the prioritization of incremental requirements, project planning and the distribution/re-distribution of resources;
- provide a platform for new initiatives, efficiency saving concepts and any ideas that could improve the utilization of resources; and
- make informed resources management decisions that are timely, in line with the Wing mandate and the priorities established for the Wing.

The challenge the RMC faces is not an easy one. However, with the changes that continue to occur in the areas of accountability and devolution, it is prudent that we capitalize on this increase in responsibility by making informed and objective decisions that will strengthen the viability of 17 Wing as we move into the next millennium.

Honours & Awards Process - A Supervisor's Guideline

STEP 1

- Ask yourself if there are people who work for you who have done things that

deserve special recognition, other than the recognition provided by a good PER.

- If the answer is yes, proceed to Step 2.
- If the answer is no, repeat step one on a monthly basis until the answer is yes.

STEP 2

- Identify the type of recognition that would be appropriate for their actions. (Pat on the back, Unit award, Commendation, Bravery Medal, Meritorious Service Decoration, etc).

- Discuss with your UCWO, WCWO, CAS Honours and Awards guy (AVN 845-8185) or other people with previous experience with Honours and Awards.

- Once you've selected the form of recognition proceed to step 3.

STEP 3

- Obtain the appropriate regulation (Sqn Orders, Base Orders, Command Orders, CFP 200, etc) for the award you have chosen.

- Follow the instructions for what is required for the nomination,

and seek out advice from the Unit, Base, or Command OPI's as required.

- Proceed to Step 4.

STEP 4

- Submit the nomination for an award through your chain of command.

- Proceed to Step 5.

STEP 5

- If award is approved, ensure that it is appropriately publicized.

- If the award is not approved, return to Step 1.

- Proceed to Step 1.

Community Policing Corner

This is the sixth and final article in a series of articles in the Voxair, that deal with such topics as home and personal security. As mentioned in previous articles, these helpful hints can be utilized at any time of the year, at your home, apartment, or cottage.

GENERAL PERSONAL SAFETY FACTORS

PURSES WHEN WALKING: When walking down the street, how do you carry your purse? Most likely hanging over your shoulder or around your neck, or with the shoulder strap of the purse wrapped around your hand or arm. If a thief attempts to pull your purse away from you, you may be dragged and physically injured by carrying your purse in this manner. The best way is to carry it clutched in front of you, close to your body. In this fashion, the thief must first approach you from the front, which may give you warning of a possible attack. Secondly, should the thief attack you, and gain access to your purse, you will not be dragged and injured. Remember, the items in your purse can be replaced, your personal health might not. Another good idea is to carry your necessities in a clutch bag or waist pack. A waist pack is extremely close to the body, and when worn under a jacket, usually cannot be seen.

CONCLUSION

These six Voxair articles concerning personal security were compiled and printed to provide you, the reader, with some helpful hints on how to better your personal, home, apartment, and cottage security. Prior to reading these articles, you may have already been aware of them, and have already put them into play.

It is hoped that through the information in these six articles, you will adopt a security conscious lifestyle. By incorporating good habits into your daily routine, this will aid in making you less vulnerable. A basic rule is to stay alert and be comfortable within your surroundings. Learn to trust your instincts. If you become uncomfortable with a situation, make the adjustments. Two important things to remember are that the best prevention is precaution, and DENY PRIVACY to an attacker.

PLANNING A SECOND CAREER? START AT THE END

A common request I receive is to provide assistance in preparing for a second career. The obvious need is to determine just what courses should be taken to supplement military training and experience, and how to choose the college program that fits the bill. There are a number of factors that need to be considered.

The real trick is to work backwards from the end. First, and most important is the decision on just what it is that you want to do - where you want to end up. This decision drives all others. This also can be the decision that determines if you can't get there from here. Let me explain.

If the kind of job you really want to fill requires some kind of certification or educational document, the path to that will be clear. You have no alternative. You are then limited to being able to take the necessary training locally. That is what I mean by not being able to get there. If you MUST have a certain program, and it is not offered locally or by correspondence, and if you are unwilling or unable to move to take it somewhere else, you won't meet your prerequisite.

More often however, the job requirements can be met by obtaining courses or a full program that can be taken locally. If you have any doubt or concern about the needed education - ask potential employers. It matters a lot less what colleges, counselors or friends say is needed, than hearing that information from the employer. Contacting the company or type of company you want to work for, and making sure they know you are not looking for a job right now, but rather trying to prepare yourself as well as possible for the future, should enable you to find out what they really want.

A real challenge for many, is to select between job paths that are directly related to what you have been doing for many years in the military, and the kind of job you really want to do. In either case, now is the time to begin to make that decision. Even if you expect to have another ten years in the service. Things can change. Beginning to prepare now, while reimbursement is available, can make the preparation for that second career easier to bear.

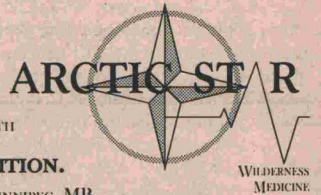

Military Police Blind Fund for Children, 2PPCLI & the Korean War... is there a connection?

Question: What common bond does the Military Police Blind Fund for Children share with the 2nd Regiment Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2PPCLI) and the Korean War? The answer....the Commander in charge of the 2PPCLI (the Battalion that fought and won one of Canada's most famous war battles) was LCol J.R. Stone. It was LCol Stone who, after the completion of the Korean conflict, founded the Canadian Military Police Blind Fund for Children. The Battle of Kapyong, the Presidential Citation, the Korean war, and the Blind Fund for Children. For some service personnel these may be strange terms. However, military history is not dead at 17 Wing Military Police Section! This article will shed some light on the conflict, the commander, and the charity he founded.

Background

From 1910 to 1945 the peninsula of Korea belonged to Japan. When World War II ended the USSR administered the surrender of Japanese forces north of the 38th parallel in Korea, while the U.S. administered the surrender to the South. The two allies formed a joint commission to make a temporary Korean government. However, the Soviets and Americans soon disagreed on the legitimacy of the competing political groups that sought election in Korea and suspicions grew on both sides.

In 1947 the U.S. asked the United Nations to unify North and South Korea, but unfortunately the 38th parallel hardened into a distinct border. By 1948 the North declared itself The Democratic Peoples Republic of Korea with the Capital of Pyongyang under Kim Il Sung, and the South became the Republic of Korea with the Capital of Seoul under President Rhee. This split created two different political and economical regions (Figure 1). The North became a communist industrial nation supported by the U.S.S.R., and the South became primarily an agricultural region backed by the U.S. During this time

Council passing a motion to assist, in essence, the military defense of South Korea. President Truman ordered the United States Armed Forces to aid South Korea and appointed General Douglas MacArthur as the Commander in East Asia. The UN then passed a resolution requesting member nations wishing to aid South Korea to make military assistance available to the U.S. Thus, Canada's involvement was born.

Although the United States provided the majority of the air, sea and ground troops, the allied force con-

small island called Wolmi-do. If this Island was defended it could impede an amphibious assault. However, despite these risks and objections by other military leaders of his plan, the raid on Inchon went ahead on 15 Sep 50. Enemy forces in the area were defeated, but more importantly, North Korean supply lines to the South were cut off. The Marines liberated Kimpo Airport and the city of Seoul, while the Infantry moved South to meet the 8th Army which was pursuing a fleeing enemy north of the Pusan Perimeter. By 01 Oct 50, the North Koreans were pushed out of South Korea. It is claimed the Inchon landing was successful not because of it's size, but rather due to it's sheer audacity.

sisted of 17 different nations some of which were Australia, Great Britain, and Turkey. In the meantime however, the capital of Seoul had fallen on 28 Jun 50, and the North continued Southward. By 07 Aug 50, the UN Forces were pushed to the Southern most tip of Korea confined in an area known as the Pusan Perimeter (Figure 1).

Canadian Involvement

Although the Canadian government supported the idea of defending South Korea it waited before finally committing troops to action. Eventually, as Canadian support for the conflict grew, the Navy, the Air Force and ground troops were dispatched. The 1st Canadian contribution of ground forces took place with the formation of the Canadian Army Special Force. This formation consisted of volunteer citizens and the 2nd Battalion RCR; the 2nd Battalion PPCLI; 22nd Royal Regiment; "C" Squadron of Lord Strathcona's Horse; the 2nd Field Regiment; the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery; the 57th Independent Field Squadron; the Royal Canadian Engineers; the 25th Canadian Infantry Brigade Signal Squadron; the 54th Canadian Transport Company; the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps; and the 25th Field Ambulance Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps. As the North Korean advance continued, MacArthur's only hope of saving the South was to hold the port of Pusan until help arrived. Reinforcements were rushed in and on 05 Jul 50, American units made contact with North Korean tanks and infantry just north of Osan. The 8th Army delayed the North Koreans west and north of the Naktong river, the last natural barrier protecting Pusan. As the 8th Army solidified the Pusan Perimeter it became clear it survived only because of the timely arrival of reinforcements and Allied Air superiority.

The Inchon Landing

With almost all enemy units concentrated against Pusan the time for a counteroffensive had arrived. MacArthur had planned a strike against the port of Inchon on the West coast of Korea near the capital of Seoul. Inchon had a huge array of natural obstacles to overcome including heavy tides and currents and a

Crossing The 38th Parallel

With the North Korean Forces now pushed back above the 38th parallel MacArthur argued that standard military doctrine dictated the UN Forces move across the border and destroy the North Korean army. This would prevent a renewal of aggression. Although President Truman originally opposed the idea, as well as his National Security Advisors, he backed MacArthur and authorized the crossing of the 38th parallel. This was not without its limitations though. The Chinese and Soviets were not to be provoked in that no UN troops were to enter Manchuria or the U.S.S.R. On 07 Oct 50, the UN General Assembly passed a resolution calling for the unification of the peninsula and authorized MacArthur to push his forces North. Soon thereafter, on 19 Oct 50, the North Korean capital of Pyongyang fell. The UN continued to further push the North Korean forces up to the Yalu river. This river formed the North Korean border with China. By this time the fall of North Korea seemed a certainty. As a result of the lessened threat, it was decided by the Canadian government that Canada's contribution would be satisfied with only one battalion.

The battalion chosen to serve in Korea was the 2nd Battalion PPCLI under the command of LCol J.R. Stone. The total manpower of the battalion at that time was 927. It was believed their role would strictly be an occupational one.

The Chinese Intervention

In retrospect, the decision to cross the 38th parallel seems to have been one of the main turning points in the war. China warned it may intervene if UN Forces crossed the border. Between 14 Oct and 01 Nov 50, about 180,000 communist forces had crossed the Yalu river. MacArthur mistakenly interpreted this action as a limited gesture rather than a serious intervention. However, by 02 Nov 50, intelligence reports indicated clear evidence of full Chinese intervention. Although General MacArthur launched his "home-by-Christmas" offensive in reaction to the Chinese offensive, the Chinese struck quickly, and with full force.

As a result the UN advance was turned into a retreat back to the city of Seoul. It was in this atmosphere that the 2nd Bn PPCLI arrived, clearly their role now changed to that of a fighting force rather than an occupational one.

By the new year in Jan 1951 the UN forces had been pushed south of Seoul and the South Korean capital fell once again.

the Soviet Union supplied a vast amount of heavy arms to North Korea as well as military training. The South by contrast relied on the U.S. presence to hold off any invasion by the North. Yet despite the U.S. presence, there were numerous border clashes.

The Invasion of South Korea

By the end of 1949 the U.S.S.R. and the U.S. had withdrawn most of their troops, leaving behind a better trained and equipped North than South. In addition to the withdrawal of U.S. forces the United States announced South Korea was excluded from the U.S. defensive perimeter. As a result North Korea took the military initiative. On 25 Jun 50, North Korean artillery fired on South Korean positions along the 38th parallel. This was soon followed by 80,000 North Korean infanteers, as well as armored support, advancing towards Seoul and the mountains of central Korea. Reacting to reports of the fighting, the U.S. called an emergency meeting of the UN Security Council, during which time the Council called on the North to cease hostilities. By 27 Jun 50, the North was still advancing and it was evident they would not withdraw. This resulted in the Security

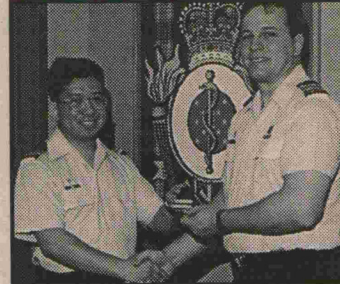

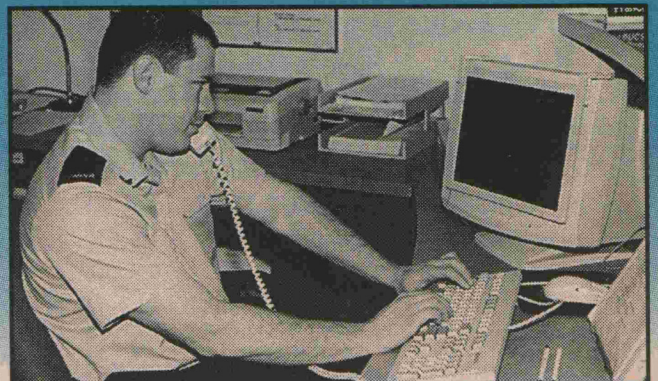

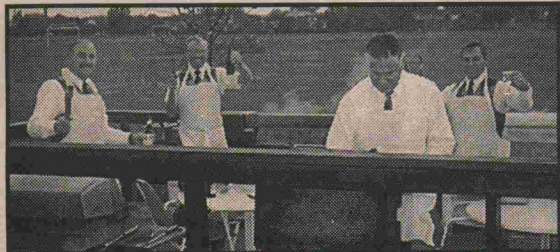

Cold weather workouts

The onset of winter in Canada means four to five months of cold and snow. The image of this chilling cold weather is enough to send many of us flocking indoors. But committed outdoor athletes will train day in & day out, no matter what the season. These fitness survivalists have learned how to train & often compete in this kind of weather with no apparent discomfort or ill effect. What's the secret?

Basically, these survivalists have adapted to the cold by knowing the physiology of cold stress. They control heat loss by applying the clothing layer principle to their workout garb. Your body's temperature balance is maintained through a complex system of heat production and heat loss. To some degree, you can control your body heat by adjusting the intensity of your exercise. But if your clothing isn't right, the outside cold can overpower the heat your body produces. When your body temperature drops low enough to affect your body functions, you develop a condition called hypothermia. Not only does hypothermia mean a temperature drop but your metabolism lowers, you become dehydrated, you lose caloric reserve, your kidneys malfunction and your mental processes deteriorate. If things get bad enough your body systems stop functioning.

Fortunately, all of this can be easily prevented by the proper use of outdoor clothing. Use of the layer system of clothing maintains body warmth when you're exposed to wind, cold, rain and snow. NEXT TIME: The four layers of clothing in the system.

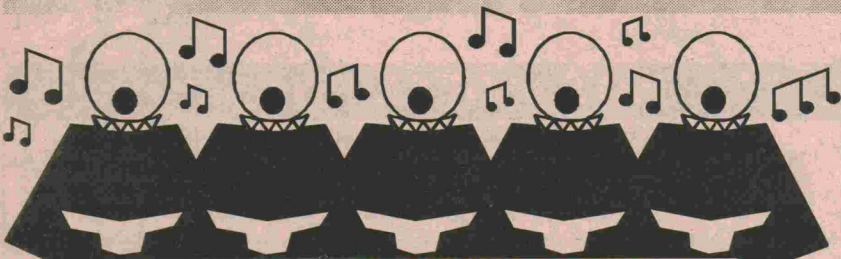
