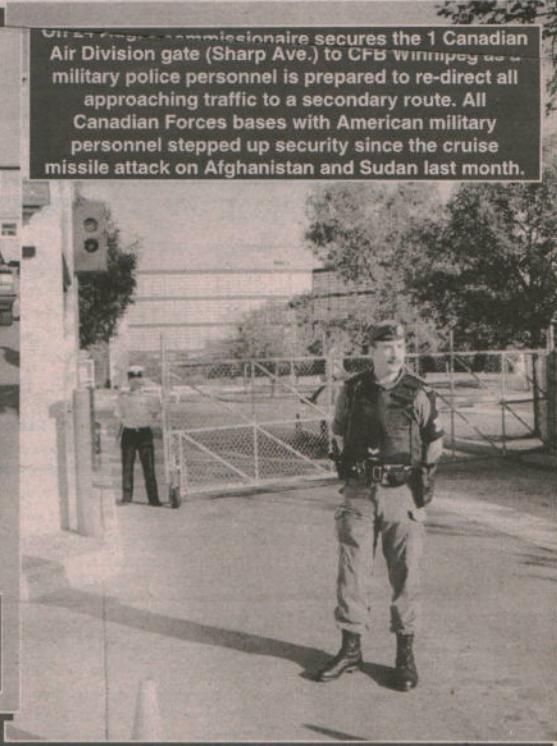
## Beefing-up security

## More than just a race

The Race for the Cure® is a series of events conceived, designed and implemented by The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation to promote positive awareness, education and early detection of breast cancer. Since its origination in Dallas in 1983, the Race For The Cure® has grown from one local race to a series of five-kilometer (5K) and one-mile fitness events in the United States and Canada.

The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, Inc. (a Texas non-profit corporation) (Foundation) was formed in 1982. The stated mission of the Foundation is to eradicate breast cancer as a life-threatening disease by advancing research, education, screening and treatment. Volunteers work through local chapters and Race for the Cure® events to further the Foundation's mission.

Seven years ago, in Canada, a group of volunteers organized the first 'Run for the Cure' event to raise money in support of breast cancer research, education, diagnosis and treatment. This event was based on the Race for the Cure®. The expected turnout for 1992's race was 300 people; instead, 2,000 Canadians donated their time and energy to foster increased breast cancer awareness. The event continues to grow. In 1997, 42,000 volunteers, runners, walkers and joggers helped raise \$3.1 million in the hope of giving those affected by breast cancer a better chance in the struggle against the disease.

Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce (CIBC) has been the title sponsor of the Canadian Breast Cancer Foundation's (CBCF) Run for the Cure event since 1997. Devoted entirely to raising funds for breast cancer research, education, diagnosis and treatment, the Run for the Cure is the highlight of October's Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Together with the CBCF, CIBC is committed to making this annual event a great success.

The CIBC Run for the Cure started as a volunteer initiative and continues to be made possible thanks to thousands of dedicated Canadians willing to donate their time and energy. The CIBC Run for the Cure event is more than just the chance to raise money for a good cause. It represents the opportunity to heighten

breast cancer awareness among women of all ages. The CIBC Run for the Cure is a community event, bringing together thousands of Canadians for a single cause. Although the disease strikes a single individual, it affects an entire family. Those afflicted with breast cancer are mothers or grandmothers, aunts, sisters, or friends. And yes, men can also develop breast cancer. The Run for the Cure event provides a unique opportunity for Canadians to unite and help find a cure for breast cancer.

Sometimes the best way to help fight a disease is to teach people about it. Promoting breast cancer awareness is part of the CIBC Run for the Cure mandate. Breast cancer is currently the leading cause of death among Canadian women between the ages of 35 and 55. One in nine Canadian women can expect to develop breast cancer during her lifetime and one in twenty-five will die from this disease.

The most significant risk factors are increasing age and family history; 70% of women developing breast cancer have no risk factors. Early breast cancer detection can mean a survival rate of 87%. Research conducted on breast cancer expands our knowledge of all types of cancer. This includes understanding more about how and why cancers develop, how they can be prevented and how they can be treated.

In 1998 the CIBC Run for the Cure will take place in 22 cities across Canada. Winnipeg is one of these cities. Military women in the Winnipeg area have formed a team 'AIR-FORCE'. So far 50 women have joined the team, which is Captained by MWO Starr Black from 1 CAD. She has initiated a number of events to elevate awareness and raise funds. On 11 Sep a tour was conducted at The Hope Breast Cancer Information & Resource Centre. The Centre is one of the facilities benefiting from the funds collected in support of the run. A bake sale is scheduled for 16 Sep in the atrium of 1 CAD, with all sales going towards the run. If you are interested in participating in the Run for the Cure please contact the Team Airforce Captain at local 2302.

Run for the Cure is about much more than just running a 5K. For many people it's an act of support, love and commitment to someone who has battled breast cancer.

# The Supply Line

Acronyms have become an integral part of our lives and have encroached into our verbiage. We eat (BLT), drink (G&T), sleep (REM), and work (DND) in a world of acronyms. I'm reminded of a clip in "Good Morning Vietnam" where Robin Williams uses them to excess while describing the visit of then American Vice President Richard Nixon - "if the VP is such a VVIP shouldn't we keep the PC on the QT 'cause if it leaks to the VC—we might end up an MIA and then we'd get KP".

Supply is no different than any of the other trades and classifications when it comes to our use of acronyms. But the latest acronym is here to make your dealings with Supply easier. The Customer Service Unit (CSU) was created with the customer in mind, a novel idea. Our mission at 17 Wing Supply is to support all our customers in the most cost-effective manner to enable them to accomplish their mission. Our responsibility is to provide materiel support to all integral and lodger units of 17 Wing (including CFB Saskatchewan and NORAD

OUTCAN units). The big thing in Supply these days is that the traditional template is gone. Not one Wing Supply looks like another; they're all organized along operational commitment and priority lines.

Not so long ago a call to Supply on a simple matter could have seen your call forwarded from the original person who picked up the phone to the DA clerk, the MACR clerk, the stocktaking supervisor, the LPO clerk, the contracts officer and so on. A complex matter had the potential to turn your hair grey.

So why re-engineer? Several reasons: OPRAM, competition, budget devolution, acquisition cards, local suppliers, customer expectations, and a 1970's workplace mentality in a 1990's world. We had to do things better, more efficient and smarter. We took many of the old skills, disposed of redundancies, added a generous amount of technology, a dash of growing pains and a large amount of new innovation skills. So was born the CSU. Supply transitioned from a commodity-based to a customer-based organization; consolidating the functions of customer ser-

vices, customer accounts, and the LPO buyer into a CSU worker. Two workers per team - five teams, multi-skilled and trained. One stop shopping for the customer.

CSU activities span the wide spectrum of support: research NSNs, descriptions, substitutions, serial/unique numbers; determine accountability; create transactions; select the method of procurement; provide information, assistance, and direction; reconcile purchases to monthly statements; and, create and maintain item management records, procurement and expenditure records. The customer is happier and less frustrated as they only have to deal with their designated CSU support. Basically in this mode there is room for expansion and evolution in the modus operandi of the CSU. Supply is changing to bring the customer back to us.

# Assiniboine Park sunset ceremony

Amidst a crowd of people and a swarm of mosquitoes at Assiniboine Park, members of 2PPCLI, 38 Bde and 17 Wing staged a sunset ceremony in Assiniboine Park on 10 July 1998. With the weather cooperating almost to the second, all the members of the ceremony put on a highly polished display of precision drill, ceremony, and military music.

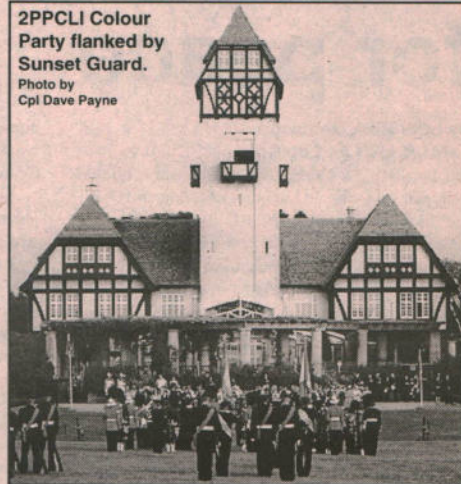
The Sunset ceremony represents the formal handover of duties between the Old and New Guards. Members of a garrison or fort would conduct a nightly ritual of foot and musketry drill to change the existing guard and prepare for the night ahead. This ritual was then combined with another ceremony, the Retreat Call. Performed by the drum and

bugle corps of a fort or garrison, the retreat was designed to warn that the gates of the fort were closing and to recall soldiers from the local inns and taverns. Today's modern Sunset ceremony closely resembles that of the ceremony carried out in early Canadian forts and garrisons. As well as honoring Canada's military history, the modern Sunset Ceremony serves as testimony to the ideals of precision, honor, and country.

This year's guard consisted of members of Charlie Company 2PPCLI, lead by Major Martin Kenneally. Largely drilled and prepared by MWO Whitebone, the guard provided the steady backdrop against which all other portions of the ceremony were conducted. Mortar Platoon lead by Sergeant Paul Muise provided a precision silent drill team that provided a solid display of complex rifle and foot drill, the majority of which were performed without any commands. Captain Rob Dunn and two howitzers from 1RCHA added a powerful punch to C Coy's feu-de-joie, the nightly ritual symbolizing the replacing of old with new powder in a garrison's muskets and cannons. Sergeant Dawson lead skirmishers from the Royal Winnipeg Rifles in a colorful display designed to secure the parade grounds for the Sunset Guard itself. No Sunset Ceremony would be complete, however, without a band. Comprised of the 2PPCLI Corps of Drums, the Royal Winnipeg Rifles Band, the Fort Garry Horse Band, the Loyal Edmonton Regiment Band, the 5th Field Regiment Band (RCA), 15th

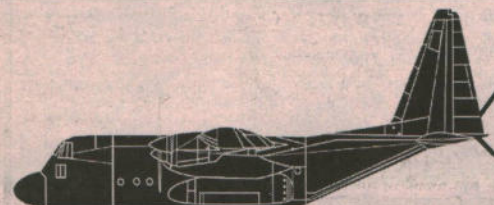

# Air Force partners for peace

Two MiG-29s streak overhead closely followed by a pair of F-16s and another of Tornado F3s. In the distance, Hip and Hind-D helicopters clatter under the watchful eyes of a Roland surface to air missile (SAM) unit concealed nearby. A return to the Gulf? Bosnia? Some other international hotspot perhaps? No - this is Co-operative Chance 98, a combined NATO-Partnership for Peace (PIP) exercise held in Slovakia from 5-10 July 98.

Based upon a scenario seemingly plucked from today's headlines, Co-operative Chance 98 was the latest in a series of exercises designed to further the interoperability and understanding between NATO air forces and those of the Partner nations. Staged from Zvolen in central Slovakia, the agenda for Co-operative Chance was ambitious and incorporated both a Command Post Exercise (CPX), involving a variety of flying operations, and a separate Live Flying Exercise (LIVEX) focussed on Air Defence.

Realism was the name of the game throughout. Reflecting many of the same challenges currently experienced by coalition air forces elsewhere in the world, Co-operative Chance was conducted within the context of a United Nations mandated Peace Support Operation and included an embedded Humanitarian Aid/Disaster Relief Operation. Eight NATO nations and 12 PIP countries ranging from Austria to the Ukraine, contributed forces.

Canadian participation included eight members of the CPX air staff from Canada, as well as Exercise Directors stationed at AIRCENT HQs in Ramstein, Germany and crew members aboard a Geilenkirchen based NATO E-3A AWACS aircraft. True to the exercise's name, co-operation was paramount as participants quickly realized that the crews they trained with today could be the same ones they might fly and fight alongside tomorrow.

In addition to monitoring a fictitious zone of separation, conducting air demonstrations and enforcing a "no-fly" zone, humanitarian relief played a major role. As Capt Peter Scales, an Intelligence officer from 8 Wing Trenton explained, "The Partners were very keen to learn how NATO nations conduct humanitarian operations."

With the airlift of relief supplies, search and rescue (SAR) and medical evacuation all figuring prominently, the Canadians were on familiar territory. "This relates very directly to what we do in reality" said Capt Paul Blouin, a

transport/SAR pilot at 1 Canadian Air Division who worked in the exercise's Airlift Co-ordination Centre.

As with any such event, the multi-cultural atmosphere and the opportunity to forge new friendships, was one of the highlights. In particular, the hospitality of the Slovak hosts was simply outstanding. Not only did they go all out to ensure the exercise's success, they also sponsored several extremely popular social events.

Most memorable was International Night which, with Europeans caught-up in the ongoing World Cup fever, assumed an aura not unlike the Olympics. For Canadians it also provided a chance to prove our continuing commitment to NATO despite having withdrawn the bulk of our stationed forces from Europe.

While circumstances precluded the involvement of Canadian aircraft this time around, the opportunity to work and train with our new allies and partners will undoubtedly pay dividends should circumstances demand an air force presence in future.

Times have certainly changed. As Capt Scales noted: "I worked closely with a Czech officer throughout the exercise - we even shared a room! Only ten years ago we were face-to-face across the Iron Curtain - today, we're partners for peace."

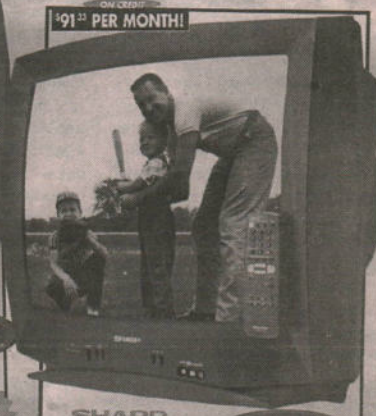



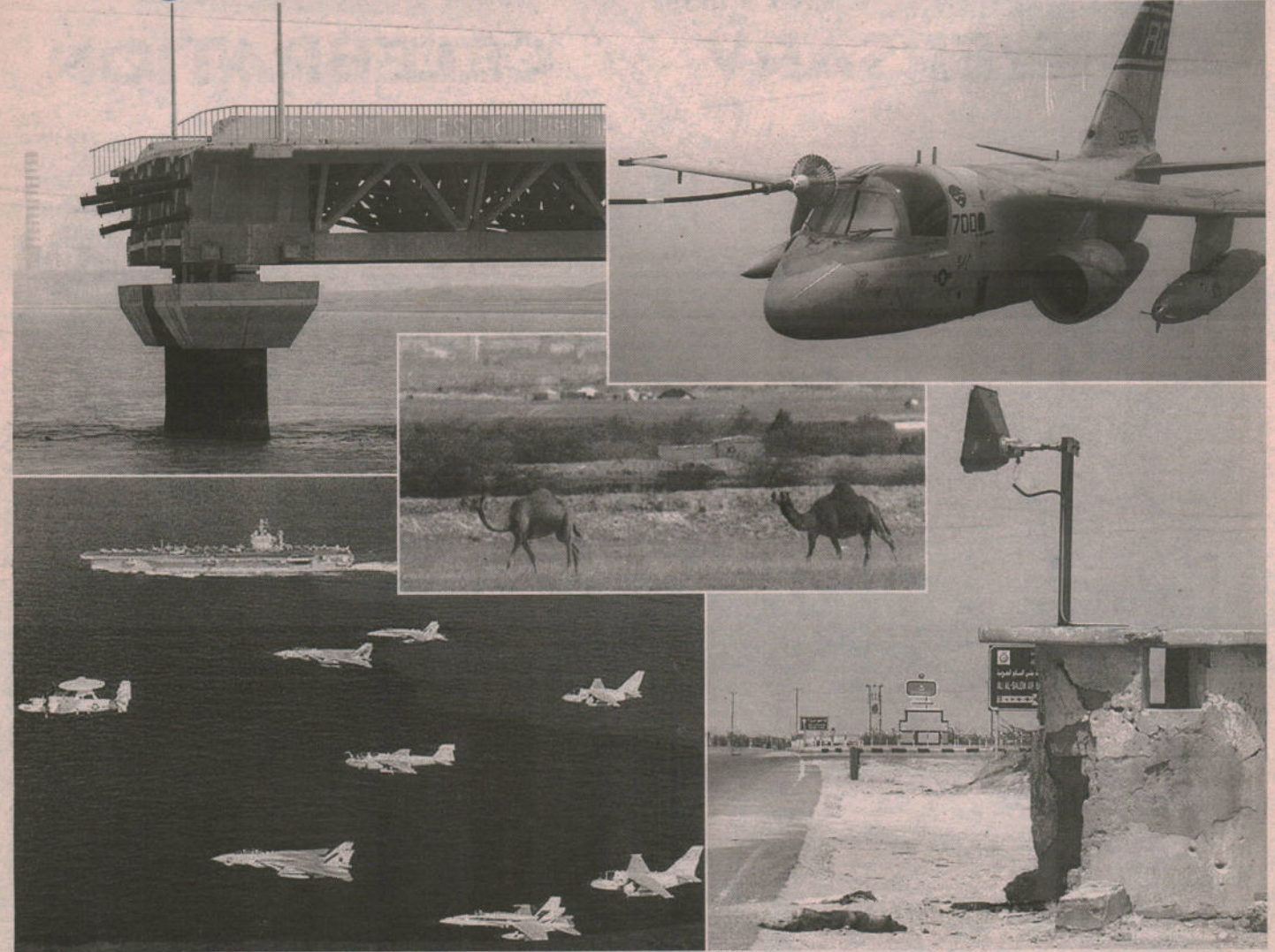

# Around the Canadian Forces

## Did you know...

### THE MINISTER

9 SEPT 1998 - Helicopters and Troops to be sent to Bosnia  
 A report relayed Defence Minister Art Eggleton's announcement that Canada will send three helicopters and 50 troops to join the Canadian contingent now in Bosnia. Eggleton said that three CH-146 Griffins and troops will be deployed from 408 Squadron in Edmonton. He explained that their role will be to assist in reconnaissance, observation and transportation. The helicopters will be shipped by sea at the end of Sept and patrols will begin in early November (Ctz A5, G&M A5).

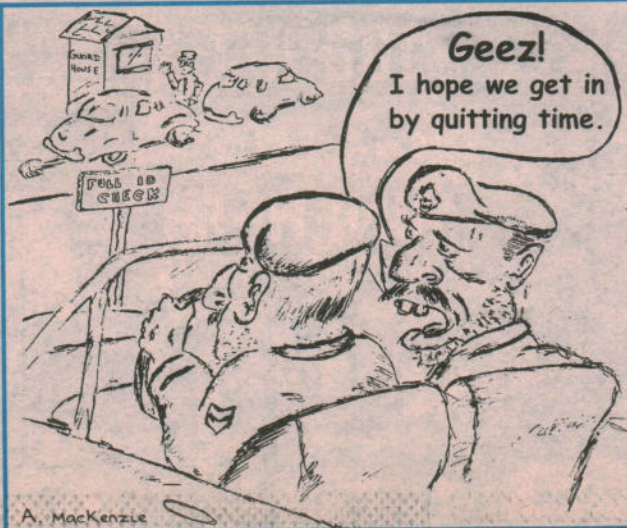
### OTHER ISSUES

11 SEPT 1998 - Sanctions against Iraq  
 According to UN envoy to Iraq, Prakash Shah, UN Secretary General Kofi Annan has no plans to come to Iraq to resolve the latest standoff over weapons inspections. The UN Security Council voted unanimously to suspend reviews of Iraqi sanctions as punishment for the country's Aug. 5 decision to end cooperation with arms inspectors (FP 2).

10 SEPT 1998 - Swissair Flight 111  
 A report described the scene in St. Margaret's Bay yesterday at a memorial service for the passengers of Swissair Flight 111. Reporters Graeme Hamilton and Richard Foot mentioned the "haunting drop by a Canadian Armed Forces Sea King helicopter of a

wreath of flowers into the water" where the crash took place one week ago. A CP report cited comment from Lt Cmr Louis Garneau of Naval Command, who said that a lot of debris had been spotted, as well as "of course, some victims". The report noted that the bodies, which investigators have said are top priority, have not been recovered. Lt Roland Leyte, who was said to be in charge of the diving fleet, said there was nothing but fuselage in the area he covered (TStar A7, TSun 10).

10 SEPT 1998 - Former UN Head Admits Rwanda Errors  
 Former UN Secretary General Boutros-Boutros Ghali has acknowledged that the UN was slow to warn of plans for the 1994 genocide in Rwanda. Boutros Ghali believes major world powers should have issued an explicit warning of this possibility after a highly-placed Rwandan informant told UN peacekeepers of plans to massacre ethnic Tutsis. He told the Globe and Mail editorial board that the reason no warning was issued was that it was so hard to believe that ethnic slaughter could be organized systematically in one of the world's poorest countries (G&M A9).



8 SEPT 1998 - Sex Change Operation in Military  
 A Toronto Sun editorial suggested that the "brass hats at defence headquarters are being worn too tight, because something's blocking the blood flow to the brain". The Sun said the decision to spend \$30,000 on a soldier's sex change may be the "single greatest piece of lunacy to escape that asylum in years". The editorial suggested further that the department's recruitment motto "A Force for Change" should more appropriately be "Farce for Change". The Sun asked who has "lost his gonads" here, a soldier, or his military and political bosses" and said this is "what the troops want to know" (TSun 14).

8 SEPT 1998 - Conflict in Congo  
 A report indicated that negotiators between the warring parties in Congo have reached a peace agreement that involves a cease-fire and troop standstill (G&M A1). It was reported that Congolese rebels have said they are considering a proposal to take part in peace talks with the government and neighboring countries (Gaz A18, TStar A14)

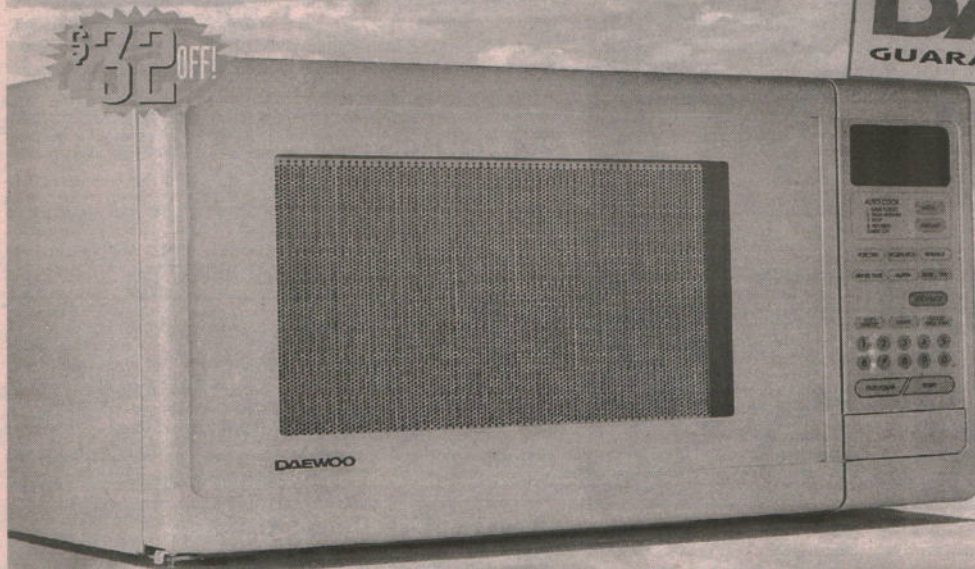

The best way to learn this deadly martial art is definitely at the 17 Wing CQCC, according to Maj Bampton. "We're a small club," he says, "with a lot of one-on-one instruction. The instruction is absolutely top notch. Between the three senseis, there is over 60 years of martial arts experience in seven different arts."

The 17 Wing CQCC is not a club for the tournament person. "We train to fight, and we fight to train," says Maj Bampton.

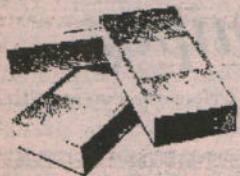

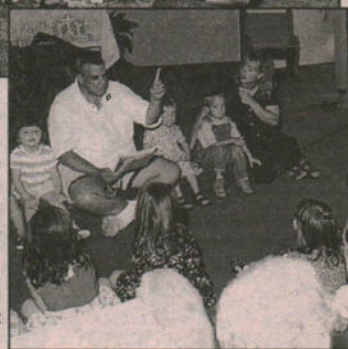
