## Government Responds to Quality of Life Report

OTTAWA - The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Art Eggleton, tabled in the House of Commons 25 March 1999 the Government's response to the Quality of Life report of the Standing Committee on National Defence and Veterans Affairs (SCONDVA).

"The Quality of Life needs of our Canadian Forces members and their families have been a priority for this Government for over a year," said Minister Eggleton. "We heard what our members and their families told us, we heard what SCONDVA told us, and today we are delivering on our commitment to the dedicated men and women who serve Canada each and every day."

The Government, through the Department of National Defence and Veterans Affairs Canada, is acting on all of the 89 recommendations in the report. Fifty-nine have been accepted as written, twenty-four are accepted in principle and are being addressed in a different way, and six will see their underlying issues addressed in other ways.

"The components of this announcement are comprehensive and far-reaching, and are a concrete symbol of our commitment to the peace of mind and quality of life of our military families," said Veterans Affairs Minister Fred Mifflin. "At Veterans Affairs we have been looking after the needs of our veterans for 55 years and we are just as committed to providing the same quality of service to Canadian Forces members."

One of the key recommendations in SCONDVA's report was a pay raise of all Canadian Forces members. On Apr. 1, all Canadian Forces members received a pay increase that exceeds what was recommended in the SCONDVA report, particularly at the entry-level ranks. These new pay rates reflect comparability with the Public Service, and include an additional increase that recognizes the unique conditions of military service, also known as the military factor.

Privates received an average increase of 14.4 percent, all other non-commissioned members a 7.28 percent increase, most second lieutenants and lieutenants an 18.1 percent increase, and captains, majors, and lieutenant-colonels a 12.05 percent increase which includes the pay comparability adjustments. Some of these raises are retroactive to April 1, 1997.

SCONDVA recommended the pay comparability program be completed by December 1999. Treasury Board approved pay comparability adjustments to restore the identified shortfall for

general service officers of 14.7 percent and a shortfall of 6.7 percent for non-commissioned members to their public service counterparts.

In addition to the pay raises, Canadian Forces members will see an increase in their environmental allowances - sea pay, field operations allowance, and aircrew allowance - of 6.84 percent.

The Government also recognizes the value and leadership of our senior officers - Colonels, Captains (N), Generals and Admirals. The Canadian Forces cannot hire these senior officers off the street. These men and women must be specially

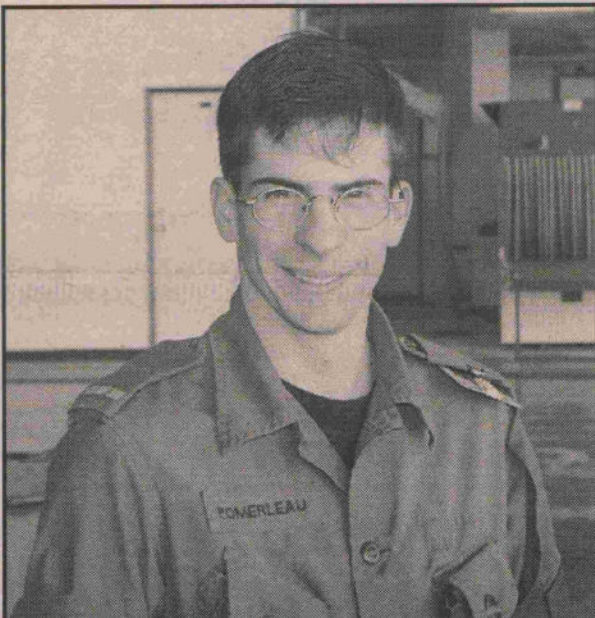
trained with years of experience. No other job can prepare them for defending Canada, providing natural disaster assistance or assisting with ensuring world peace.

As recommended by SCONDVA, senior officers received an average pay raise of two percent.

Another key area of concern by SCONDVA was the state of married quarters. The Government is addressing this by making repairs to married quarters a priority. This year the Department of National Defence is allocating \$40M toward upgrading this housing. Further allocations will be made on a yearly basis.

SCONDVA also noted that more should be done to take care of Canadian Forces members who are injured while serving their country and their families. National Defence and Veterans Affairs will continue the close cooperation they started a year ago on assisting the injured, retirees and their families through often traumatic circumstances. A new joint National Defence-Veterans Affairs Centre will provide a monitoring, referral and assistance service to ensure care and compensation is properly and promptly provided to CF members. It will be staffed by both DND and VAC representatives and will be open for business April 13, 1999.

The Government is also introducing amendments to the Veterans Affairs Pension Act to provide pension benefits from date of application to all those CF members disabled by service related injuries incurred in Canada. They will also be given access to the Veterans Independence Program for their pensioned conditions and based on an assessed health need. These changes will ensure equity of access to services and benefits to all CF members, regardless of whether the injury occurred in Canada or on a foreign deployment.

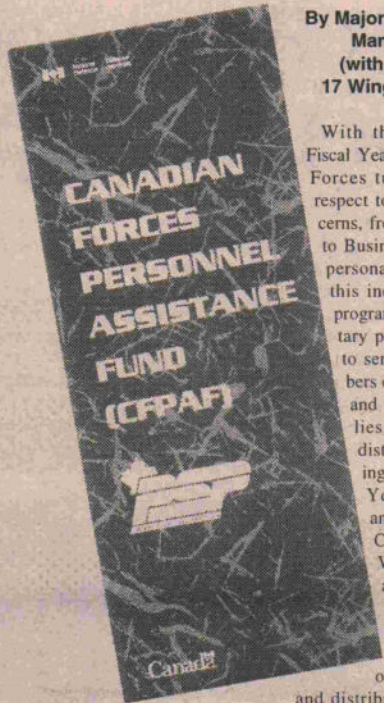

## Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) - Fiscal Year 98/99 in Review at 17 Wing

With the close of another Fiscal Year, we in the Canadian Forces turn a new leaf with respect to many financial concerns, from operating budgets, to Business Plans to our own personal finances. A part of this includes the CFPF, a program offered by the military providing financial aid to serving or former members of the Canadian Forces and their immediate families, when warranted by distress or other qualifying circumstances. Fiscal Year (FY) 98/99 was another busy one for the CFPF program at 17 Wing, with the approval of 308 self-improvement loans totaling \$466,000. The average amount of loans was \$1,513 and distribution included all 17

Wing integral and lodger units.

Although many other Wings and Bases have opted to fill the CFPF Coordinator position with full-time military and/or civilian personnel, the 17 Wing position continues to be a secondary duty. In the year 2000, this position will be the responsibility of the PERSONNEL SUPPORT PROGRAM (PSP).

The current 17 Wing CFPF Coordinator, MWO C. W. Hutchings (Financial Management Officer) works closely with the respective unit or squadron representative, thereby ensuring the proper management of this very important financial program. The unit representatives provide a valuable contribution to the process by vetting requests at the local level, where they better understand the needs of their personnel.

The loan denominations available to eligible applicants range in amounts from \$500 to \$4000. Once again, the allocation of 17 Wing CFPF funds for FY 98/99 at 17 Wing was sufficient to meet the

demands that the CFPF Coordinator received from eligible applicants. This means that for the third FY in a row, the allocation of CFPF funds at 17 Wing has been sufficient to meet the demands and that not one eligible applicant was denied assistance. To be eligible, requests must be screened through eligibility conditions set out by the CFPF Board of Directors in Ottawa, and then prioritized by the Wing CFPF Coordinator, based on the severity of financial distress.

Below is a breakdown of the CFPF loans issued in FY 98/99 by request type. This list highlights the fact that these loans are fulfilling the CFPF mandate of 'preventing financial distress'. Full particulars of the CFPF Strategic Plan, including eligibility conditions, are contained in the CFPF Manual (A-PS-007-000/AG-001). # New 17 Wing Signs: Communicating Safety Messages

Do you remember the electronic display signs at the Whytefold and Air Force Way (Sharpe) Gates? For various reasons, those signs are now long gone. They were expensive to maintain, and not as effective as they could have been.

Yet a need still exists to heighten safety awareness at 17 Wing. To this end, the Wing has purchased two commercial pattern signs, one for the Whytefold Gate and the other for the Air Force Way Gate. The new signs are black on white, 6 feet in height by 8 feet in length with changeable

lettering. The Wing General Safety Officer, Mr. Chuck Haaisma, is the controlling agent, coordinating the submissions of Unit General Safety Officers.

The signs are designed for use by all 17 Wing integral and lodger units for safety messages. For example the signs will be promoting:

National Safety Week (May)  
Wing General Safety Officer

Fire Safety Week (October)  
Wing Fire Services

Safe Driving Week  
(December) Wing Transport

Directorate of Flight Safety  
Briefing Flight Safety

The message will be changed every week or two which will provide space for 26 to 52 messages per year. If your Squadron has a safety week, a safety message, or a safety theme which you would like to see promoted, contact your Unit General Safety Officer (UGSO), who will get in touch with the Wing General Safety Officer. 17 Wing is always looking for ways to promote safety, and the signs have the potential to reach thousands of people each day with safety messages.

# Improve yourself through RMC

Last month we introduced readers to the Royal Military College of Canada's undergraduate and post-graduate Continuing Studies programmes that are open to CF members and their spouses, as well as to civilian employees of DND. Anyone interested in taking a correspondence course this summer should move quickly because registration for the session closes on 30 April 1999. As a reminder, the following offerings are available: CME 304, Military Chemistry; POE 201, Introduction to Politics and Government; POF 488, Le Droit des Conflicts

armees; and PSE 312, Military Psychology of Armed Conflict.

Prospective students should also think about their plans for next fall and winter. RMC hopes to offer HIE 274, Introduction to Modern Military History, and PSE 123, Fundamentals of Human Psychology, in the September-December 1999 term. In January 2000 PSE, Group Dynamics, and HIE 408, History of Canadian Defence Policy, will give local members an opportunity to study some important and relevant subjects. Either of the Psychology courses is generally accepted as a prerequisite for the popular PSE 312, Military Psychology of Combat. All four of these courses

will be taught locally by academically qualified professors and are in addition to any offered through correspondence or other distance learning means.

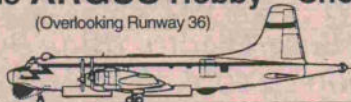

# The Supply Line

## Past and Present - How times have changed

17 Wing Supply Squadron is like any other Squadron, at any other Wing, in any other city. In that times have changed drastically (even in the past four years of my tour of Winnipeg).

At one time supply's role used to be to police the stores, to ensure nobody ordered too many of something (and if they did we just cut back the quantity without asking), to lower the priority for delivery if we felt regular delivery would suffice, or to cancel the requirement if you asked for something you weren't entitled to. Now, we actually ask our customers "how may we help you", "when would you like that?", "what is your financial coding" and "is there anything else we can do for you". We have finally come to the realization that without our customers - we are unnecessary.

Our manning level for Supply personnel at 17 Wing has changed as well. In 1994, we had 137 personnel (a distant cry from our soon to be 73 — the latest result of OPRAM IV). We have re-organized, re-engineered, streamlined our processes and become a "most efficient organization" (according to 1 CAD?). And believe it or not, there is still much more that we can do to improve our efficiency and effectiveness.

Do you remember when a Master Corporal was like a god? It really wasn't that long ago. And you never had access to him/her unless there was a significant problem. Now a Corporal must be a god in order to become one. We do not see promotions within the trade like we used to. And acting pay for my civilian counterparts is now a rarity where it used to be the norm.

I remember when there was never a problem to find a volunteer to go on an overseas tasking. There were never enough taskings to go around! Now it seems the taskings have increased significantly and that everyone has just come off of one.

In the past we used to have TFIGs and beer calls. It was socially acceptable to go to the "Ranks" and down a few before

going home (if you made it that far). You never left your car at the Ranks; you might need it in the morning! Now, we have social hour and god help you if you overindulge; you'd never hear the end of it. And heaven forbid if you get caught drinking and driving! Your aspiring career could come to a complete halt, or even to an abrupt end! Don't take me wrong, this is not a bad thing. It's about time we took responsibility for our actions. We lost too many people to alcoholism and drunk driving and if things had been different maybe some of our fallen comrades would still be here.

Not too long ago, it was acceptable to receive "nice things" such as donations for Christmas parties. Our regular suppliers would descend upon us

with gifts of thanks for maintaining good working relations. It certainly wasn't intended as kickbacks or promises for future business to them. It was harmless. Now "nice things" can get you into a lot of hot water (and I'm not talking about taking a bath!). So, we have adjusted to keeping our working relations so we do not violate the parameter of "conflict of interest" and politely protest to any gestures of good will.

Lately, I have heard several comments about "the good ole days" and "that's how we've always done it". Maybe the time has come to realize that some things were wrong and that just because "we always did it that way" does not necessarily make it right.

All that being said, the present

isn't as bad as you may think. Not all change is bad. DND does care about their employees and their well being. There are numerous programs that have been implemented to assist both the military and civilian population of our workforce. Things such as social workers, the SCAN program and EAP Referral program are readily available to whoever may need it. We strongly encourage our staff get any assistance they may require.

We've come a long way. Maybe some of the change has been too fast and furious for all to appreciate the benefits from it. And only time can tell whether we're headed down the right path. But if we continue to work together to provide the best service possible, I'm sure we'll all have a future in DND.

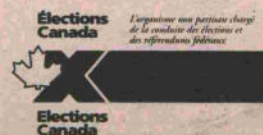

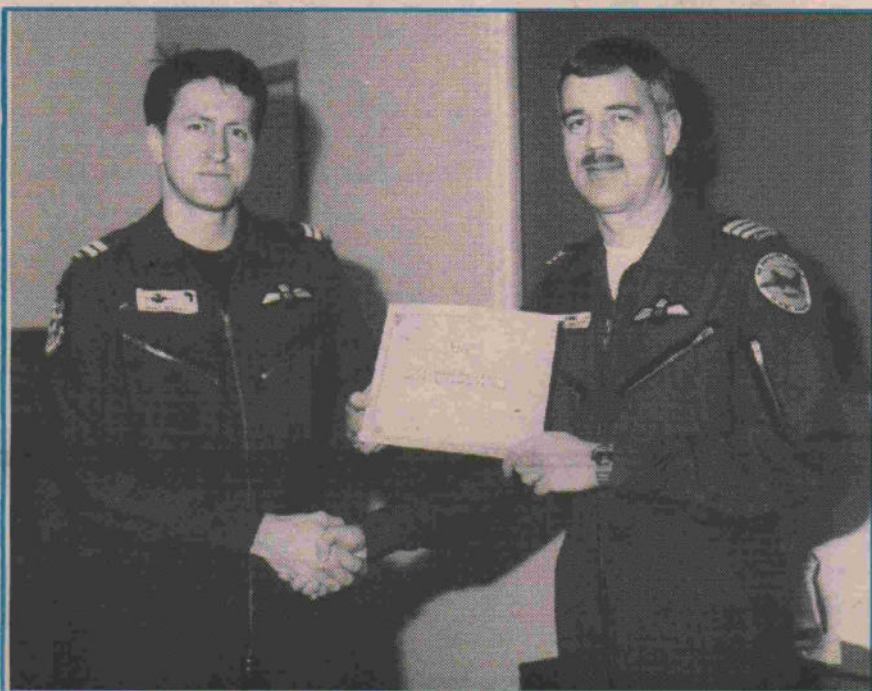

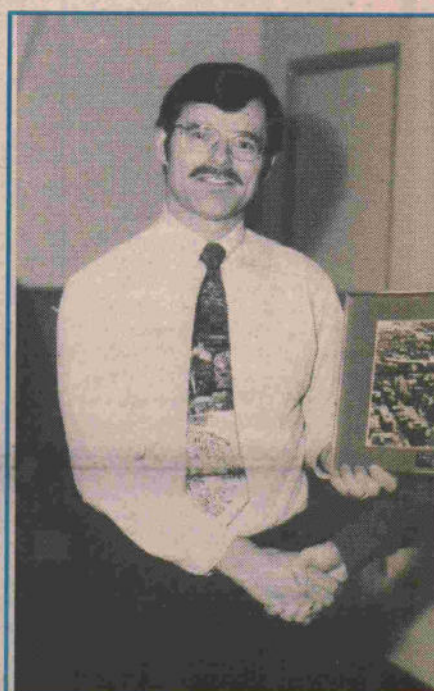

## Around the Canadian Forces

### Did you know...

**19 Apr 99 - Canada to Send Additional CF-18s**

Canadian Brigadier-General Dave Jurkowski reportedly stated yesterday that the Canadian CF-18 pilots have begun to fly combat air patrol. Canada said it will send another six CF-18s to the campaign as NATO has requested. Jurkowski reportedly said it could be up to two weeks before the additional aircraft and accompanying staff from Cold Lake, Alta., will be ready for the mission because further training is needed (G&M A7, TSun 34, Gaz A1, TStar A1, Sol A8, JM 10 - 18 avril).

**19 Apr 99 - Landmine Conference**

Russian government has said privately that it would like to send delegates to the landmine eradication treaty meeting in Mozambique, it cannot afford the entrance fee. Other non-signatories who have yet to declare whether they will attend include the U.S., India and Pakistan. The report noted that Canada will be represented by Foreign Affairs Minister Lloyd Axworthy, who helped to forge the treaty (NP A16).

**19 Apr 99 - Canadian Forces Beef Up Security**

Canadian Forces officials are concerned that protestors will vandalize military property in Victoria to demonstrate against Canada's role in the conflict in Kosovo. The demonstrators have not identified themselves, but they have struck twice. The attacks on the property are being investigated by Canadian Forces National Investigation Service in Victoria (G&M A7 - 17 April).

**20 Apr 99 - Canadian Relief Squad Returns Home**

Forty members of 436 Squadron have returned home because of a lack of funding after they delivered food and relief supplies to Macedonia and Albania. The Squadron was part of Task Force Mikado, which was sponsored by the Cdn. International Development Agency (Ciz A6).

**21 Apr 99 - Favoured Trade Status**

Foreign Affairs Minister Lloyd Axworthy has scheduled a meeting in Washington on Friday with U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright in an effort to avert a trade dispute that could cost Canada's defence and aerospace industries as much as \$5-billion annually in lost exports. The contracts are being threatened by a State Department decision to virtually eliminate Canada's special exemption granted to military, satellite and aerospace companies because American officials contend Canada has failed to sufficiently guard U.S. military technology and it has not responded adequately to American security concerns (NP A1).

**21 Apr 99 - NATO to Decide on Use of Ground Troops**

Prime Minister Jean Chrétien has indicated that he will not stand in the way of a collective NATO decision to send ground troops into Kosovo. Chrétien stressed that NATO decisions are made collectively and insisted that "everything is decided on the basis of consensus". He explained that decisions to bomb a particular base or bridge are made by the military. The PM stressed the importance for NATO to "deliver the goods" once it had threatened to bomb Yugoslavia if Serb president Slobodan Milosevic defied the Alliance. He expressed disappointment that Milosevic did not accept the agreement reached in Rambouillet, France. Chrétien cited a number of occasions on which Canada has acted without UN consent. The PM confirmed that he expects NATO leaders will discuss the sending of ground troops into Kosovo at a meeting in Washington this weekend (G&M A1, Ciz A7, TSun 12, TStar A7, NW 9:00 pm, CBC-T 10:00 pm, SRC-T 22 h).

**21 Apr 99 - Chief War Crimes Prosecutor Seeks Evidence of Kosovo Crimes**

Chief war crimes prosecutor Louise Arbour was given British intelligence material to assist her in her job of gathering evidence of alleged war crimes in Kosovo. Arbour underlined that she is conscious of NATO's tactic of holding her tribunal up as a warning to Milosevic and his military chiefs of what they may expect to face as a result of their part in the war, but insisted that her tribunal is "entitled to and must seek state cooperation to discharge its mandate" (Gaz A17, NP A12, Ciz A7).

**21 Apr 99 - Landmine Ban**

An AP brief noted that reports that landmines are being laid in Kosovo and Angola have added new urgency to the upcoming conference on the landmine ban. Another report asserted that three signatories to the treaty have been seen planting new lethal devices. Robert Fowler, Canada's ambassador to the UN, said the three will suffer the "general opprobrium of the international community" (Gaz A18, NP A14).

**21 Apr 99 - House of Commons discussion of Kosovo Conflict**

NATO spokesman Jamie Shea noted that Serb troops crossed into Albania and shelled Albanian troops, and have engaged in other hostile acts. He stated that NATO must be "vigilant to any attempt to try to create out of a domestic crisis an international crisis". In the House of Commons, NDP foreign affairs critic Svend Robinson criticized Prime Minister Jean Chrétien's statement that he would "not be the only one not to agree" if NATO makes the decision to send ground troops. Robinson said this comment confirmed that "Canada has no independent policy in NATO on the Kosovo crisis, and that we are simply a lapdog for the U.S.". The PM explained that the air strikes will continue for some time, and said that if one day we are "confronted with the necessity to change, to send some ground troops, we will do so with the others". Reform critic Bob Mills described the PM as behaving like "some sort of king who can simply send his peasants off to war" without putting the matter to a vote. NDP leader Alexa McDonough urged Chrétien to show leadership by pushing for a diplomatic solution at the NATO meeting (Ciz A8, TStar A14, TStar A3, NW 9:00 pm, CBC-T 10:00 pm, CTV N1 10:00 pm, CTV 11:00 pm, Global 11:00 pm).

**22 Apr 99 - Cost of Yugoslav Mission**

Ottawa announced that so far \$32-million had been spent on the NATO air strikes in Yugoslavia related to the CF-18s, the crews, the bombs used in the air war as well as money spent during the nine months of preparation.

Congratulations Rejean, this is another great example of CF personnel being able to improvise solutions to complicated problems.

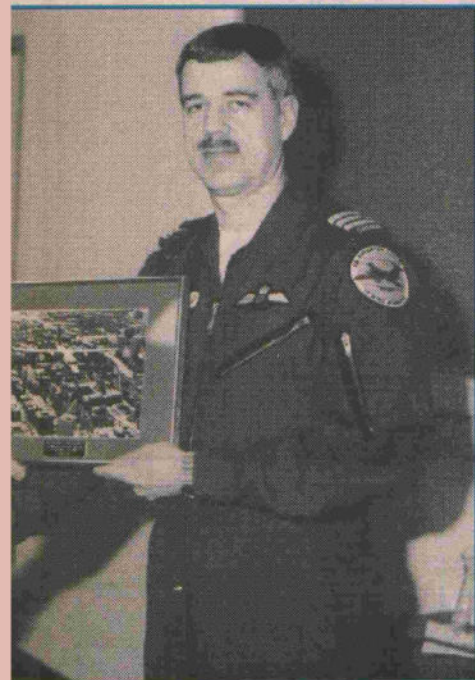

Upgrades to the GPS and FMS systems will also improve the capabilities of the Gonzo; however, they have the unfortunate side effect of taking each of the planes out of service for a month in rotation while the upgrades are done. Fortunately, CFANS scheduling guru, Sylvia Thordarson, seems to thrive on such

complications and training will continue uninterrupted, albeit with slightly less ink in everyone's log books over the summer.

## Humanitarian Assistance - Kosovo Refugees

As this situation continues to unfold, the Chaplain General has received many inquiries as to how local communities can become involved in offering support to those traumatically affected. The chaplaincy continues to play a significant role in forwarding financial assistance to those in need, through the Canadian Forces Protestant Emergency Relief Fund and through the generosity of the Roman Catholic Military Ordinariate. Concerned personnel wishing to contribute to such support may make donations through regular Sunday chapel collections, or forward them to the Wing Chaplains' Office, Room 237, Bldg 62. All such donations should be sealed in an envelope clearly marked "KOSOVO REFUGEE FUND" and with your full name and mailing address. Monies thus marked will make their way to the national level for disbursement under the auspices of the Chaplain General. Receipts will be issued for Income Tax purposes. Donations are also being accepted by the Red Cross, OXFAM and World Vision, and members may also contribute through these and other civilian agencies. ## Pan Am Games mark 99-day countdown with Portage and Main celebration

### Olympic Cyclist Tanya Dubnicoff and special guests help usher in Games

The 99-day countdown to the 1999 Pan American Games kicked off today with the unveiling of a large countdown clock and an outdoor celebration at Winnipeg's historic Portage and Main intersection.

The event, which also featured the lighting of a "Spirit of '67 Flame" by Winnipeg's Olympic cyclist Tanya Dubnicoff, marked the 99-day countdown to the Opening Ceremony of the XIII Pan Am Games, which Winnipeg will host from July 23 to August 8.

The "Spirit of '67 Flame" symbolized the rekindling of the volunteer spirit that made the 1967 Pan Am Games, also hosted by Winnipeg, a resounding success. "The legacy of those Games lives on in this communi-

ty," said Games Chairman Sandy Riley, whose uncle Culver Riley was the Chairman of the 1967 Games. Dubnicoff, who will go for gold at the Games, spoke of the significance of competing on home turf for her and her fellow Canadian athletes.

The colourful countdown clock, which will remain at Portage and Main until the Games arrive, was provided courtesy of Swatch, the Official Timekeeper of the 1999 Games. The clock will continually display the number of days, hours, minutes and seconds until the Opening Ceremony of the Games at 8 p.m. on July 23. As the Games draw nearer, the clock will also display news related to the Games, such as ticket availability.

The clock was unveiled by Manitoba Premier Gary Filmon, Winnipeg Mayor Glen Murray, federal Pan Am Board member Leo Cholakis, and Yann Gamard, President of the Swatch Group for Canada and the USA. Mayor Murray also recognized former Winnipeg mayors Bill Norie and Susan Thompson for their contributions to Winnipeg's successful bid for the Games.

The 1999 Pan American Games will be the largest sporting event ever to be held in Canada, and the third-largest multi-sport event ever held in North America. The 1999 Games will feature more than 5,000 athletes from the 42 countries of North, South, and Central America and the Caribbean.

## Lifestyle Tips: Steer clear of pain and injuries

CFLRI: The Researchers in Active Living

Over half of Canadians believe that participation in physical activity leads to injuries. In addition, 42% of Canadians believe that participation leads to ongoing pain and stiffness in joints and 27% agree that physical activity makes people too muscular, according to the 1997 Physical Activity Monitor conducted by the Canadian Fitness and Lifestyle Research Institute.

In fact, becoming more active is very safe for most people. Canada's number one activity, walking, is a very safe activity. And many other activities such as line dancing, tae chi, carpet bowling and exercising to music in shallow water have little potential for injury. If you have concerns about the safety aspects of any activity, talk to a qualified instructor or consult your family doctor.

In addition to choosing the right type of activity for your physical condition, there are a few things you

should do to keep the odds on your side.

- Wear the proper shoes and clothing to increase your comfort and reduce the chance of strains or injuries.

- Use proper equipment, wear protective clothing, and follow safe procedures, especially if you take up higher-risk activities. For example, if you opt for cycling, wear a bicycle helmet and obey the rules of the road.

- Do warm ups and cool-downs to prevent muscular damage. If you participate in team sports, make sure you have built up enough strength to handle sudden, pivotal movements. Learn and use the proper techniques for each sport you participate in.

If you associate physical activity with pain and stiffness, think again. Do you do vigorous activities cold and then ache for three days? Then start slowly and gradually increase

time, frequency and intensity.

Do you suffer from arthritis and think that physical activity will only make things worse? Then reconsider exercising. Recent research on osteoarthritis suggests that not exercising aggravates joint pain and stiffness by allowing muscles to grow weaker and joints to become more painful.

- exercise moderately: avoid bouncing or high-impact exercise.

- use range-of-motion exercises to relieve stiffness, restore flexibility and help with joint movement.

- strengthen your muscles because weak muscles add to joint problems.

Steer clear of pain and injuries by choosing the right type of activity and the right intensity for your fitness level. If you're a beginner walking is a good way to start. It's a very safe alternative to vigorous activities, it will not make you too muscular, and it is unlikely to add to injuries or result in pain and stiffness.

## Deployment Emergency Childcare Service

The goal of the DEC service is to support the ability of CF members to be available for deployment, operations and training by providing immediate, affordable, regulated childcare in times of emergency.

- The emergency may be the result of an unexpected or short notice deployment/operations/training, where the member does not have sufficient time to implement his/her Family Childcare Plan. An emergency might also arise while the member is deployed and the spouse encounters medical or other problems, which disrupts the usual childcare arrangements and requires immediate alternative arrangements.
- The DEC program also provides general childcare resources to military families and referrals to services for community members experiencing a childcare emergency.

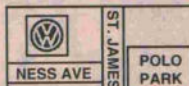
