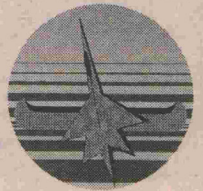

The making of a new badge for 17 Wing



Original Badge Design

Back in 1994, with the resurrection of the Wing concept in the Canadian Air Force and thus the stand-up of 17 Wing, it was determined that a requirement existed to select a new symbol to represent the Wing and its important role in the Canadian Air Force. As a result, a contest was held in the fall of 1994, via the Voxair, to come up with a new badge for 17 Wing. There were 10 contest entrants and a committee was formed, in January 1995, to judge the winning submission and a selection was made.

The winning badge design was submitted by MCpl Al MacKenzie, at the time, a firefighter from the CE Squadron. MCpl MacKenzie received a \$100 award under the auspices of the Wing Ideas Program. Further refinement of his concept was subsequently carried out by MCpl MacKenzie, with the support of a graphic artist resulting in the final badge concept. The final badge proposal was submitted for approval to Director History and Heritage, through SSO Heritage in the then Air Command Headquarters.

In January 1997, a badge request was forwarded from Director History and Heritage to the Athabaska Herald under the terms of the inter-departmental Memorandum of Understanding on Military Heraldry. Liaison between 17 Wg and Government House was authorized for detailed badge design and development and further changes to the design took place in order to satisfy heraldic requirements.

The original submission incorporated a centrepiece consisting of water, a canoe and an overlay of an abstract aircraft. The water represented the primary access routes which made Winnipeg a major centre, being situated at the

junction of the Red & Assiniboine Rivers. The canoe depicted one of the main sources of transportation used for trade, exploration and the development of Manitoba. The City Of Winnipeg's connection with military aviation dates back to the 1920's. The abstract aircraft represents the multi-function role 17 Wing has played throughout the years. Its futuristic design is recognition of 17 Wing's contribution to the future of the Air Force through its training and professional development activities.

Between 1997 and 1998 design work was conducted by the Athabaska Herald and numerous modifications were made. Much redesign was completed on the airfoil or arrowhead as it is considered now. The approval process itself is quite lengthy and it was only recently that the final version was approved and signed off by the Governor General of Canada.

The final badge features a canoe resting on an heraldic depiction of water, recalling the location of 17 Wing in Winnipeg near the historic waterways that meet in this part of Canada. The badge also features a stylized arrowhead as a symbolic reference to the varied role 17 Wing has played in Canadian Military aviation. The Motto 'Heritage' refers to 17 Wing's responsibilities in the field of military aviation.

As you can see, the final product is markedly different than the original badge design conceptualized at 17 Wing and the significance of the badge is not the same either. It seems time faded all memories along the process and it will now have to be time that will mend our broken hearts...

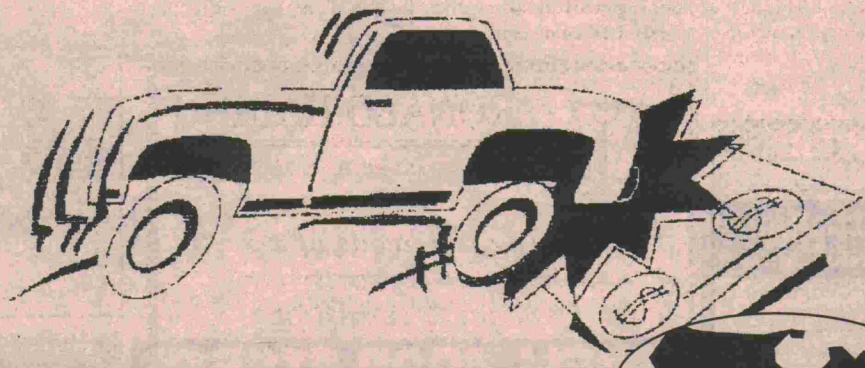

435 Squadron - Chinthe Bits

Your friendly neighborhood rescue squadron

To make things completely fair I must admit that 435 Sqn's sole role is not Search and Rescue (SAR). In fact, 435 has proven itself quite successful in the field of Air to Air Refuelling. Through countless exercises, participation in the Gulf War, and the most recent operation in support of Op Echo in which 2 C-130's 'dragged' 8 fighters across the Atlantic and brought 4 back; our tanker side of the house has proven itself time and time again.

I, however, am a SAR guy, and with summer upon us, business is about to pick up.

Historically speaking, Search and Rescue, nationwide is notoriously busy in the summertime. Although 435 does not have the Great Lakes and extensive coastlines to deal with, we, too, will be called out almost twice as many times during the summer months. This phenomena is cause by numerous factors ranging from extreme weather to simple access to open water.

Living on the prairies it is sim-

ple to picture huge thunderstorms accompanied by strong winds, low visibility, hail, and most certainly lightning. All of this adds up to trouble for, not only, aviators and boaters but also for the forests themselves. In fact, every year 435 Sqn is involved in large forest fire evacuations of isolated communities. With the C-130's ability to land (and take-off) on relatively short, gravel runways (approx 3000') and its' obvious payload capabilities, it is the perfect platform for the job.

As for open water, our SAR region covers an area spanning

from Eastern BC to North Western Ontario and from the American Border to the North Pole. With all the lakes and rivers contained within this area combined with the warm weather of summer, boats will be coming 'en masse'. Unfortunately, not everyone packs enough gas or the right maps. It becomes our job to track those people down.

Whether it be through human carelessness or extreme weather, the summer months prove to be a challenge for 435 Transport and Rescue Squadron. From lost boats and hunters to downed air-



craft and forest fire evacuations, we seem to see a bit of everything. Do us a favor; pack a map, take some extra gas, and have a look at the forecast before setting out this summer. If all goes well you won't need us, if it doesn't we'll be there. RESCUE!

New Pay System Nouveau système de solde

This summer, a new pay system will be introduced in the CF. Extensive activities are underway to test the accuracy of the new system before forces-wide implementation. One of the activities leading to the implementation of the new pay system is a parallel testing phase. During the Parallel Phase, the existing system will continue to pay you and issue pay statements. In addition, the new system will issue pay statements to approximately 6 percent of the CF population. You will be part of the sample group if your surname starts with letters, J, O, V, or E. "JOVE" personnel are asked to compare the information on their two pay statements and report any discrepancies, questions or anything not understood to their pay offices. This test will help ensure accuracy in the system for all CF members as well as preparing your

pay clerks to deal with questions once the system is live. To support the Parallel Phase, RMS clerks at unit pay office and admin offices will input pay and human resources data into both the current and new systems for the "JOVE" group. To minimize the burden that this would place on Ships and units in operations, the project office has chosen to exclude these units from the parallel testing. Some of the information appearing on the new pay statements will be presented differently, but the essence of the statements will remain the same. Further details about the changes will be provided with the pay statement. The new pay system will bring significant improvements in speed and flexibility to the pay record keeping while making the system Y2K compatible.

Un tout nouveau système de solde fera son apparition cet été au sein des FC. En préparation pour sa mise en place, de nombreuses activités sont prévues afin de tester sa fiabilité. Une de ces activités est la phase dite d'essais parallèles. Lors de cette phase, le système en place continuera d'offrir les services habituels de solde ainsi qu'émettre l'état de solde. Toutefois, et ce, "en parallèle", le nouveau système émettra aussi des états de solde à 6% des militaires, soit ceux dont le nom de famille commence par la lettre J, O, V ou E. Les militaires du groupe "JOVE" sont invités à comparer l'in-

formation contenue sur les deux états de solde qu'ils recevront et à rapporter à leur bureau de solde toute différence ou tout commentaire pertinents sur la compréhension de l'information fournie. Vos propos contribueront d'une part à valider le système quant à sa fiabilité pour l'ensemble de la clientèle militaire et, d'autre part, à prédisposer le personnel des bureaux de solde à répondre à vos questions lorsque le système entrera en vigueur. Durant cette même période, les employés des bureaux de solde et d'administration devront aussi saisir en double, pour le groupe "JOVE"

toutes les données relatives à la solde et à l'administration de personnel, pour entrer dans les deux systèmes. Pour minimiser les effets sur les unités opérationnelles et les navires, le projet les a exclues de la phase parallèle. Bien que le nouvel état de solde dispose l'information différemment, son contenu toutefois demeure essentiellement le même. D'autres détails sur ces changements vous seront fournis avec l'état de solde. Le nouveau système de solde sera amélioré, tant de par sa flexibilité que sa vitesse d'exécution et rendra le système compatible avec l'an 2000.

17 Wing Supply main warehouse

Have you ever wondered where all your army stuff comes from? 17 Wing Supply section is located in Building P-2 at the corner of Kenaston and Taylor. At this time, I would like to invite you browse through our main warehouse, 4MW.

The main warehouse works much like a shoebox under your bed. Stuff comes in, gets stored, and gets delivered. When the warehouse becomes cluttered, the files are sorted, reviewed, then discarded as directed, the same as you clean out your old shoebox.

A number of projects and changes have been implemented this year. All personnel, civilian and military, have been adjusting and adapting to the ever-changing expectations of their customers. Due to the decline of staff members, the warehouse has been modified to serve you, the customer, better.

Mr Ron Stenger and Mrs Karen Elson are in the forefront. As civilians, they are an endless

storehouse of knowledge and they guide the military, Cpl Steve Clark and Cpl Brian Potter, to ensure consistency. This year the projects behind the scenes included dead stock removal, the relocation of items for easy accessibility, and shelf life items update. In progress is a 100 percent stock check. You would be surprised at how much lost stuff springs up again. Of course there are the daily receipts and issues and this year, with the closure of CFB Sask, our services have expanded to include them.

The Pubs section, now manned by Mr Al Henderson, has been re-located to the main warehouse area. The Pubs depot has started direct delivery to all customers except for 0117 UIC, the base. Al still orders all pubs and keeps updated records of all pubs holdings. Posters and amendments find their way to respective owners and the flight pubs are moved as quickly as ever to their awaiting pilots.

Cpl Brian Cough is flying the Major Equipment desk. He has transferred the vehicles joining

us from the Saskatchewan closure and never allowed one to be hi-jacked along the way. He also controls the kitting room and 4M1 pertaining to Major Equipment.

Rations are managed by Cpl Brian Potter. He receipts, breaks down and issues rations to waiting customers. all of Wing Supply, the area of responsibility has increased to include CFB Sask as well.

Some of the changes do not just affect the base alone. With the Regional Film Library closing its doors for the last time this fall, the impact was felt by surrounding bases as well as nation wide. The reputation of having an extended stock of traditional as well as historical films will live on for a long time.

This is the end of our tour and we hope that you come down and meet the people of 4MW, see how we work and share a cup of coffee and your ideas. Think of us when you want some really cool stuff.

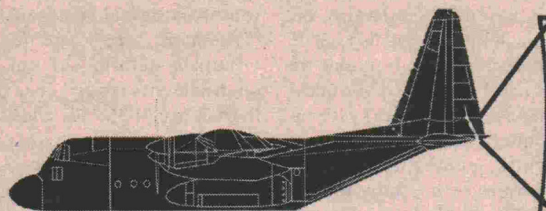
BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Holy Baptism is available by contacting a chaplain. Time is required to give sufficient instruction about the meaning of baptism.

Around the Canadian Forces

Did you know...

01 June 99 - PM Pledges to recall MPs if Ground Troops sent to Yugoslavia
Prime Minister Jean Chrétien yesterday promised to call MPs back to Ottawa if ground troops are called upon to invade Yugoslavia during the Parliamentary summer break. The PM stated that if "were to have ground troops to be called upon to go into a war situation, we will call back Parliament". Reform leader Preston Manning urged the PM to consult Parliament before it adjourns for the summer, because it is "increasingly likely that NATO will send in ground troops in advance of any peace settlement and Canada is expected to be part of that contingent" (TStar A11).

01 June 99 - PM Offers Peacekeeper Training for Colombian Military
Prime Minister Jean Chrétien has offered to provide peacekeeper training in Canada for members of Colombia's military in response to a request from Colombian President Andrés Pastrana. Human rights activist Bill Fairbairn warned that the Colombian military and paramilitary allies have been implicated in a pattern of gross human rights abuses, and said rigorous screening would be necessary to ensure Canada does not provide training for "anyone responsible for crimes against humanity". The PM reportedly also suggested that Canadian peacekeeping troops might be sent to Colombia where the right-wing government is fighting a guerrilla war against Marxist rebels. Reporter Robert Fife noted that Defence chief General Maurice Baril has already warned that the Canadian military is stretched to the limit (Ciz A6, NP A5, OSun 21, Gaz D14).

02 June 99 - CF-18 Repairs
A CP report indicated that a maintenance error has forced the military to spend millions on engine repairs for its CF-18 fleet. The report said that records released under the Access to Information Act show that civilian ground crews routinely sand-blast fan blades on the engines and repaint them, thereby reducing their life by 90 percent. The report added that the military has begun a program to replace 5,760 such blades which will cost \$4.4 million by April 2000 (TStar A11).

02 June 99 - Aurora Makes PEI Landing
An Aurora surveillance aircraft from CFB Greenwood reportedly made a precautionary landing yesterday in Charlottetown, PEI, after the crew smelled smoke in the cabin (TStar A11).

02 June 99 - Murray Named Veterans Affairs DM
The news that retired vice-admiral Larry Murray has been named deputy minister of Veterans Affairs was repeated (G&M A6, OSun 11, TStar A11).

03 June 99 - Refugees in Canada
Mimi Pontbriand, who directs the Quebec Immigration and Citizen Relations Department, said yesterday that with the help of local aid organizations, Kosovar refugees will be settled across Montreal Island. Pontbriand explained that approximately 80 Kosovar families will arrive between June 8 and 21 in groups of 35 to 80 people (Gaz A4).

03 June 99 - Soldier Dies at CFB Petawawa
A report from CFB Petawawa, Ont., stated that Master Corporal Don Lasante of Ponteix, Sask., has died after being electrocuted while setting up a command post in an eastern Ontario community. Lasante was said to have been one of five soldiers who were assigned to set up equipment on a truck outside an arena when the vehicle's radio antennae touched live electrical wires. Three of the men were reportedly treated and released at Pembroke Hospital, while the fourth soldier remains in hospital with serious injuries. OPP and military officials are seeking to determine whether all safety regulations had been followed (NP A5, G&M A9, Ciz B11, OSun 3, TStar A4).

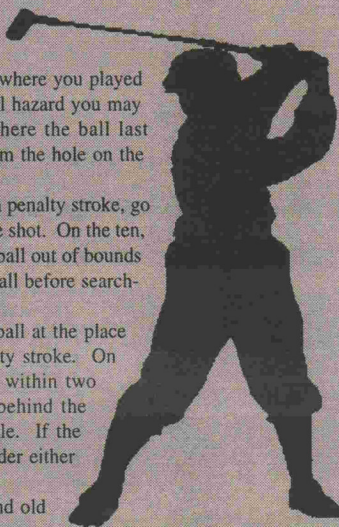

17 WING SPORTS

Golf's 10 Golden Rules

1. Play the ball as it lies.
2. Don't move, bend or break anything growing or fixed, except in fairly taking your stance and swing. Don't press anything down.
3. You may lift natural objects not fixed or growing, except in a water hazard or bunker. No penalty.
4. You may move manmade objects, even in a bunker or water hazard. If they are immovable, you may drop within one club-length of the nearest point of relief (no nearer the hole). In a hazard, you must drop in the hazard. No penalty.
5. You may drop away from casual water, ground under repair, and burrowing animal holes or casts. On the putting green, place, or in a hazard drop, at the nearest point of relief, no nearer the hole; otherwise drop within one club-length of the nearest point of relief, no nearer the hole. No penalty.
6. In a water hazard or bunker, don't touch the ground with your hand or your club before the stroke.
7. If you hit your ball into a water hazard and cannot play it, either drop behind the hazard or at the place where you played the shot. One penalty stroke. If you hit into a lateral hazard you may also drop within two club-lengths of the point where the ball last crossed the hazard margin, or a point equidistant from the hole on the opposite margin. One penalty stroke.
8. When you hit your ball out of bounds or lose it, add a penalty stroke, go back and drop a ball at the place where you played the shot. On the ten, you may tee the ball. If you think you have hit your ball out of bounds or lost it outside a water hazard, play a provisional ball before searching for the first one.
9. When you have an unplayable lie, you may drop a ball at the place where you played the previous shot, adding a penalty stroke. On the tee, you may tee the ball. Alternatively, drop within two club-lengths, no nearer the hole, or any distance behind the unplayable spot keeping it between you and the hole. If the ball is in a bunker, you must drop in the bunker, under either of the alternative options.
10. On the putting green, you may repair ball marks and old hole plugs on the line of the putt, but not spike marks.

WO Jacques Proulx of 17 Wing Food Services.

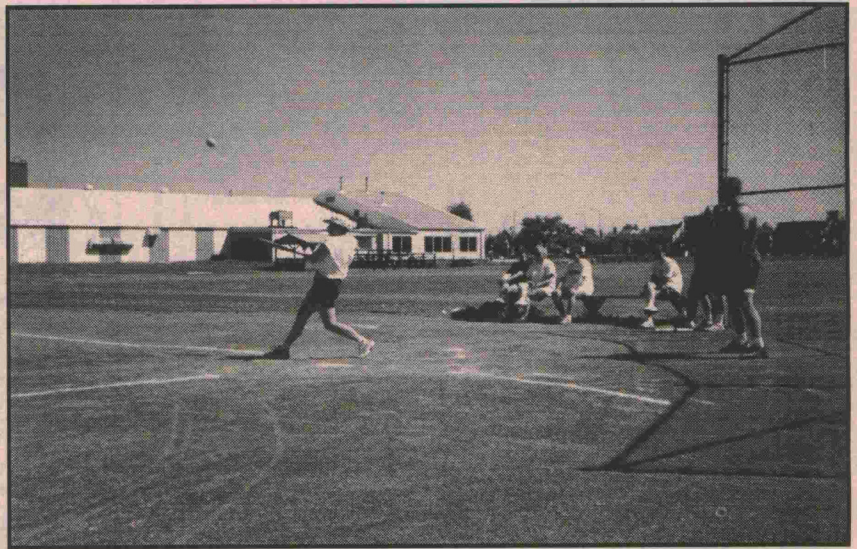

The new MFRC Child Care Centre will be accepting applications at their Registration Evening to be held Wednesday 9 June at 7 p.m. in the conference room of Westwin Community Centre. Applications will be processed on a first come, first serve basis and must be accompanied by a non refundable deposit of \$30.00.

To ensure the centre meets the demands of the community, registrants will be asked to complete a "user survey". This information will help to determine the hours of operation for the centre, and the requirement to offer evening and possibly overnight care in the future.

The excitement surrounding the opening of the centre has many people posing similar questions. The following is a review of the most frequently asked:

Q. Will the centre be fully licensed?

A. Yes, the centre will be fully licensed to meet all requirements and guidelines administered by the Manitoba Day Care Office.

Q. Will the staff be qualified?

A. As with all Children's Programs sponsored by the MFRC, the staff will be trained in CPR and First Aid. As per regulations, two-thirds of the child care centre staff will be qualified with Early Childhood Education Certificates.

Q. How much will the child care cost?

A. The fees for the centre will be set in accordance with the guidelines for the province of Manitoba and will be based on a daily rate of \$27.45 for infants and \$18.45 for pre schoolers. These prices are subject to change dependent upon provincial reviews.

Q. Are military families eligible for child care subsidies?

A. Subsidies are granted on an individual case basis. Information concerning eligibility for child care subsidies will be made available at the registration evening on 9 June.

Q. Will the nursery program at Lipsitt Hall and Westwin Community Centre be moved?

A. No. The nursery drop off child care programs and the other children's programs currently in place in these locations will remain. Nursery school and child day care are separate initiatives.

Q. Will there be before and after school care?

A. The requirement to offer before and after school care is currently under review. If your child will be attending Bannatyne, Strathmillan, Golden Gate or Tache schools, arrangements can be made to bus the children to and from the child care centre, as their regular pick up and drop off point. This will apply to kindergarten children for the fall of 1999.

Q. How do I register my child?

A. To register, you must pick up an application at the Registration Evening to be held on Wednesday June 9th at 7 p.m. in the conference room of the Westwin Community Centre. Applications will be processed on a first come, first serve basis and must be accompanied by a \$30.00 non refundable deposit.

Q. How do I get involved as a volunteer at the child care centre?

A. The child care centre will be actively recruiting members for their Parent Advisory Committee. They will require at least two parents of children registered at the centre to sit on the MFRC Board of Directors. Anyone interested in becoming involved, please make your interest known at the Registration Evening on 9 June.

Planning for your second career

When you are thinking about making that transition from military to civilian lifestyle there are certain things that you should do. Changing careers can be exhilarating and exciting or it can be scary and frustrating; planning ahead makes this change much more positive. Before you leave the military you should have decided where you want to go. What kind of job do you want? What is your goal? This will be the hardest decision you will make but there are ways to make this easier. Read newspapers and magazines for ideas and to see what kinds of jobs are out there now and try to spot changes in the workplace or in technology. Talk to people who are working in areas that interest you and ask about how their workplace is changing, what kinds of jobs are

being created. Attention to changes in society. For example, the aging population means that more jobs are being created in recreational areas and in providing services to the elderly. Also, there will be a lot of people retiring in the next 10 years and their jobs will be opening up. Another thing you should think about when deciding on your next career is where are you going to be living? What are the job trends in that area? Read the newspapers and talk to people in that area because it will be very different from one region to the next. After you've decided on your next job you need to find out what the qualifications are for that job. What do you need to get that job, what do people who are getting that job have? What is your competition and how can you be bet-

ter qualified than them? Once you know what you need, then you look at what you have. Look at your experience and figure out how it relates to other jobs. Look at your education, is yours current? Remember your competition and the best way to be better is to have the latest information and current skills. This is where the CFCCN can help you. Nouvelles mesures de soutien destinées à la réserve

1. Le présent message est destiné à rappeler les nouvelles mesures prises par le directeur Services aux familles des militaires (DSFM). Financées par le SMA (RH MIL) dans le cadre du projet sur la qualité de la vie, ces mesures visent à accroître les services offerts par les centres de ressources pour les familles des militaires (CRFM) aux familles des réservistes.

2. Les CRFM recevront des fonds pour fournir des services d'aide aux unités de la réserve, y compris pour effectuer des visites annuelles, et selon les besoins, des visites pour aider les familles à créer des groupes de soutien pendant l'absence des militaires. Pendant les déploiements, les CRFM continueront à soutenir les familles des réservistes comme ils sont tenus de le faire maintenant, en offrant des programmes et des services dans leurs locaux et en restant en contact téléphonique avec la famille grâce au service d'écoute téléphonique. De plus, les employés des CRFM peuvent maintenant rendre visite aux familles dans des endroits éloignés s'il y a lieu. Sur demande, les familles des réservistes ont aussi droit aux séances d'information sur le retour au foyer, habituellement environ un mois avant le retour du réserviste déployé.

3. Un nouvel avantage très important

résultant de l'augmentation des services est que les familles de réservistes ont droit aux services et programmes des CRFM pendant au moins deux ans après un déploiement outre-mer et une année après un déploiement national.

4. Pour que les familles aient accès à ces services, il est essentiel que les unités de la réserve communiquent au CRFM le plus proche les noms et adresses des familles des militaires déployés. Par conséquent, votre coopération à cet égard est cruciale. Le CRFM se mettra en rapport avec les familles et leur offrira ses services. Les familles ne doivent absolument pas se sentir obligées de recourir à ces services. Le CRFM n'insistera pas en cas de refus. Sont considérés comme membres de la famille, les conjoints, les conjoints de fait et, dans certains cas, les enfants ou les frères et sœurs. Lorsque la famille se trouve dans une région géographique différente du réserviste, ce dernier peut demander au CRFM dont il dépend d'envoyer le nom de sa famille au CRFM le plus proche de celle-ci pour qu'elle obtienne les services offerts.

5. Les services et les programmes varient d'un CRFM à l'autre. Il incombe à chaque unité de trouver le programme qui sert le mieux possible les besoins de ses membres.

Support to reserves new initiative

1. This message is just a reminder of the new initiative from the Directorate of Military Family Services (DMFS), funded through the ADM (HR MIL) Quality of Life Project, which will expand the services delivered by the Military Family Resource Centres (MFRC) to families of reserve members.

2. This initiative will fund MFRC to provide outreach services to reserve units including making annual visits and, depending on need, making site visits to assist families in setting up support groups during the absence of members. Upon request, MFRC will also be able to send a staff member to give pre-deployment briefings to reservists and their families. During deployments, MFRC will continue to support reserve families as they are mandated to do now, through offering programs and services at the MFRC and by keeping in telephone contact with the family through a warm line call. Additionally, MFRC staff may now make visits to distant sites as required. Reunion briefings are also available to reserve unit families upon request, usually about one month prior to the return of the members.

3. A very important feature of the expanded services is that it allows reserve families to access the MFRC Services and Programs for at least two years following an overseas deployment of the member, and for one year following a domestic

deployment.

4. For these services to be accessed, it is critical for reserve units to keep their closest MFRC informed of the names and addresses of next of kin of their members who are being deployed. Therefore, your cooperation in supplying this information is essential. The MFRC will contact the families and offer their services. There is absolutely no obligation on the part of the family to receive the service and there will be no pressure from the MFRC.

Included as family members are wives, husbands, common law partners and in some cases, children or siblings. Where the family is not in the same geographic location as the member, the MFRC, upon request by the member, will forward their name to the geographically closest MFRC, which will then offer the service.

5. Services and programs may vary with each MFRC, but it will be the responsibility of each unit to coordinate a program that will best serve the needs of their personnel.

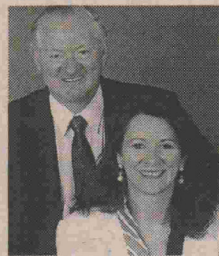
