## Boxtop 2-99 Non-stop Ops!

While many of us enjoy the last stage of summer and the start of school, end-August is the time where the C130 community is busy at work airlifting supplies to CFS Alert and Eureka in prepara-

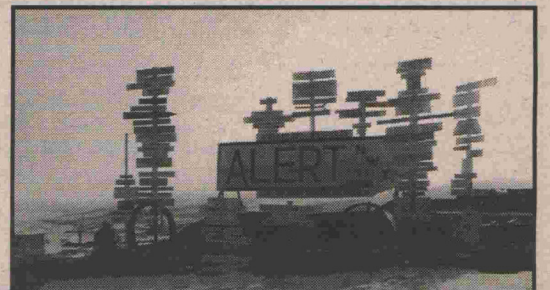

tion for winter. Although BOXTOP operations occur regularly twice a year, this summer's operation from 19 August to 4 September, was not simply a routine operation.

Due to the transition process of aircrew and aircraft to the Avionics Update Project modified systems (AUP), the traditional C130 community approach to BOXTOP could not be followed. Instead, to effectively achieve the operation's objectives, 435 Transport and Rescue squadron was fully tasked to take on this operation using their AUP modified aircraft. To supply the required nine sets of AUP qualified aircrew, 435 (T&R) Sqn's search and rescue (SAR) duties were then transformed to a 442 Sqn detachment stationed in Cold Lake for the duration of the BOXTOP.

As a result of these circumstances, 435 Sqn has deployed four aircraft and 88 personnel to BOXTOP making this the Sqn's largest deployment since its move to Winnipeg. The Sqn's air and ground crews join approximately 78 others from 17 Wing, 8 Wing and other locations providing transportation, communications,

work out of Thule, United States Air Force Base, Greenland with the others supporting activities in CFS Alert.

BOXTOP 2/99 has delivered admirable success flying around the clock for 12 days. Each trip to Alert would commence with up to two hours of ground activities to ready and load the aircraft and plan the trip. Once launched, the flight was usually a quick hour and a half. At Alert the aircraft was offloaded and sent back on its way to Thule within an hour. This cycle, continued until aircraft repairs, weather, or crew timing caused the schedule to readjust. This summer's operation has met its basic objectives

but having four aircraft available has provided the flexibility to keep missions going while problems get resolved. The high skill and teamwork of the aircraft maintenance crews has ensured that the aircraft problems encountered were resolved as soon as possible. This operation is also providing a good operational shake down of the AUP aircraft. In many ways aircrew has been impressed with the aircraft's new capabilities and has continued to learn more about these systems. As aircraft pass one another on the to and from flight paths, the new system's accuracy is as clear as the view of the passing air-

busy at work or recovering and relaxing. The end of summer season in Greenland allows those who are resting the opportunity to take in the rugged spectacular scenery or to visit remnants of what was once a much larger USAF strategic facility. Some brave souls have also dared to take a dip in the ice cold waters in a traditional polar bear swim. As is always the case, the fitness, the recreation, and the support services shared by our hosts have been first class - keeping spirits high throughout the operation. Even though 435 Sqn enjoys the close co-operation and familiarity of its personnel, the teamwork and camaraderie of all BOXTOP sections, focussing on the operation's objectives, have enabled the ALCE to overcome all difficulties. The life experiences gathered by taking on challenges through friendship and teamwork in intriguing and diverse places, often becomes the highlight of a military career. Inevitably, this mission will live up to that standard in the memories of all those involved. BOXTOP 2/99 and 435 (T&R) Sqn have proven once again that they are "Determined to Deliver - Certi Provehendi!"

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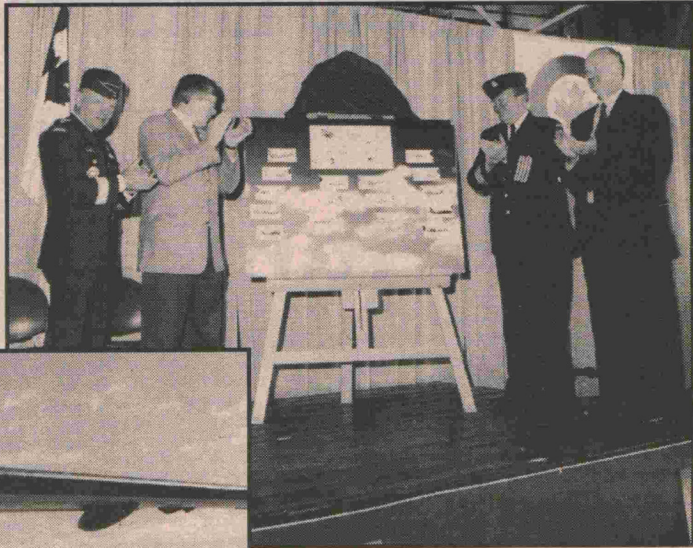


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# Air Force stamp launch at 17 Wing



Air Force 75th Anniversary Stamp unveiling. Two Air Force members hanging the Air Force Roundel.

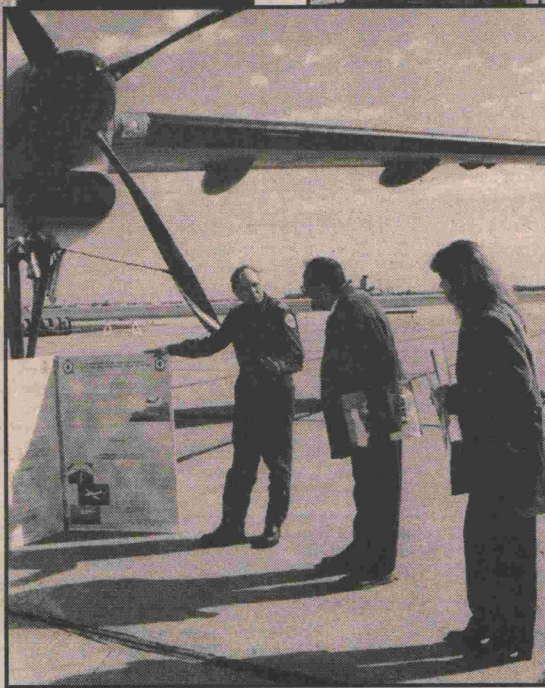

Philatelists joined Canada Post personnel and 17 Wing members on 17 September for the unveiling of a new set of stamps commemorating the 75th anniversary of the RCAF. John Harvard, MP, Charleswood - St James - Assiniboia, on behalf of Canada Post, presented copies of the stamps to Major-General Lloyd C. Campbell, Commander 1 CAD.

The stamps depict 16 airplanes used through the years by the Canadian air force including most recent ones such as a Sea King and one of our CF-18s that flew in Kosovo during the recent OP Allied Force. Specially cancelled First Day Issue covers were flown on an operational mission with 402 Squadron and were presented at the ceremony.

The stamp launch was one of many activities held to commemorate the 75th anniversary of the RCAF. The idea, quickly endorsed by Canada Post, is hoped to increase the visibility of the air force in the country. Many airplanes have been flown under the Roundel in the past 75 years and they have been part of many great success-

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# The Supply Line

1. Have you ever wondered what happens to the "old" computers that are returned to Supply? With the ever-changing technology and many upgrades, Repair and Disposal has been the temporary home of thousands of unserviceable computers and related parts. Normally all surplus material (including computers) are disposed of through Crown Assets Disposal Corporation. On 16 Aug 1993, the Prime Minister announced that all computer hardware and software surplus to government's needs would be donated to the Canadian public under the Computers for Schools and Libraries Program. 17 Wing has been an active supporter of this program since its inception.

2. This program is a joint initiative of the Government of Canada, the Manitoba Department of Education and Training and the Telephone Pioneer of America. Its purpose is to recycle surplus computer

equipment and software to benefit schools, libraries and literacy centers located in Manitoba. A Provincial Advisory Board directs the program. This advisory board establishes the criteria for eligibility on an annual basis and generally oversees the program operations.

3. a. There are many government and civilian agencies who contribute equipment to the program. Since 1995 almost 8,000 computers have been provided to Manitoba schools and libraries by the program. 17 Wing has been an active supporter of these programs since its inception;

b. So far, 17 Wing has donated 104 CPU's, 414 display units, 104 printers, 48 keyboards and countless number bits and pieces as the result of systems being reduced to spares/parts. This program is ongoing, as there is much equipment awaiting pick up; and

c. Approximately 90 percent of the hardware returned to R&D

is obsolete or parts are missing. Sections that have surplus or obsolete computers return them to Network Control Center where they are cannibalized. Items no longer required are returned to Repair and Disposal. Wing Supply then contacts the coordinator of the Program who then picks up the computers or they are delivered by Forward Supply. The computers are then rebuilt to the requirements of the schools. So far approximately 110 schools have benefited from the computers donated by 17 Wing.

4. The program has many people who volunteer their time to help refurbish equipment so that it can be used in schools and libraries. Many of the volunteers are students who came to learn computer skills; Telephone Pioneers, who help deliver and refurbish equipment and dedicated people who donate their time to help. 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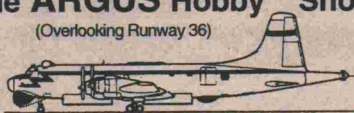
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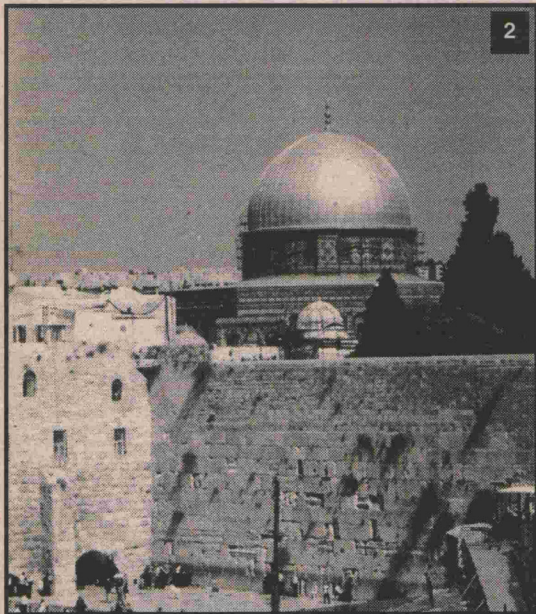
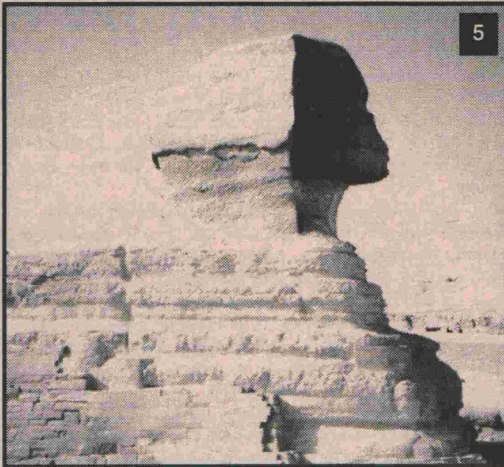
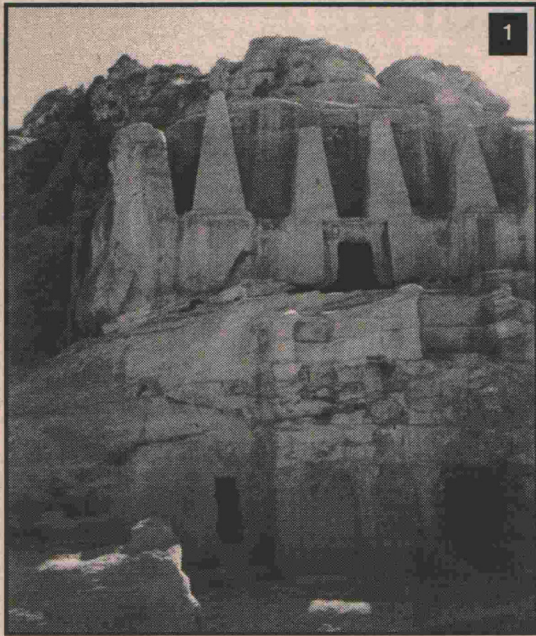
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# Images of CC UNDOF



Pictured are some images seen by many Canadian Forces Personnel who serve with Canadian Contingent UNDOF, selected by Cpl Val Craddock. Val served in Golan Heights during the period Aug 98 to Feb 99.

1. Al Khazna or the Treasury - Petra Jordan. The Treasury dates back to the 1st century. It is built into the side of the mountain. Of all the sites in the 'Red Rose City', the Al Khazna is the most breathtaking.

2 & 3. Wailing Wall - Jerusalem Israel. Set in the heart of the city of Jerusalem. People by the thousands leave personal notes daily.

4. Dome of the Rock - Background. It's the 3rd holiest Muslim site. The dome of gold can be seen for miles.

5 & 6. Sphinx - Cairo Egypt. Built by the Ancient Egyptians on the Giza Strip. The Sphinx stands guard at the pyramids to protect the Pharaoh on his journey to the after life.

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These first issues commemorated the closing of 10 TAG and the inauguration of 1 Wing by representing the four helicopters flown in the history of 10 TAG: the Twin Huey, the Kiowa, the Chinook and the Griffon.

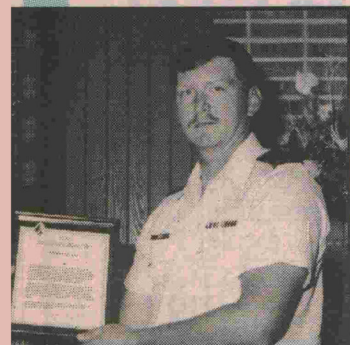

On Thursday, 26 August 1999, Major H.C. Ellery relinquished his command of Det Dundurn to Maj H.D. Otchenash after three years in the position.

Major Ellery served with the artillery branch throughout Western Canada and Germany after he joined the Forces in 1963. Upon receiving his pilot wings in 1969, he flew numerous missions at home and oversea followed by Commanding positions, at various units. The end of Maj Ellery's assignment as Commanding Officer of Detachment Dundurn marks the end of a fruitful career as he will be heading to Edmonton, AB, on his retirement after 36 years of service.

Major Otchenash served as a rifleman with the 2PPCLI from 1972 until 1976 where he received his commission and joined 1PPCLI in Calgary. His four years with the unit led him to the logistic branch where he served until 1992 and transferred to the Primary Reserve. The Detachment Dundurn was first settled as a military camp in the late 1920's. It was used as a major training center and a RCAF bombing range as well as a transit area for troops awaiting demobilization after the Second World War. Since, it has been better known for its important CF ammunition depot. In 1998, Detachment Dundurn's support base became CFB Winnipeg and its responsibilities were increased to include CFB Saskatchewan.

## “From bench to bedside”

### Research pays off for Canadians with arthritis

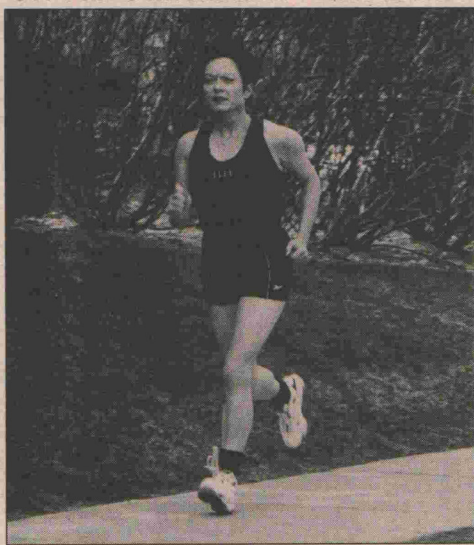
Humans have been fighting a battle against arthritis for centuries. Today, one in seven Canadians endures the pain and inflammation of arthritis that is a fact of their everyday life. Fortunately, we know a lot more about the disease now. Years of heavy investment in research are starting to pay off with major advances in the way we treat arthritis.

In the past, arthritis therapies were invented with little knowledge of how they specifically worked. Medications most commonly used for treating arthritis are known as Non-Steroidal Anti-Inflammatory Drugs (NSAIDs).

The first, and probably most well-known NSAID, acetylsalicylic acid (ASA), or Aspirin, was discovered 100 years ago, but it wasn't until 1971 that scientist Sir John Vane discovered that NSAIDs worked by blocking an enzyme responsible for pain and inflammation.

Today, two million Canadians take NSAIDs, and although they are very effective in relieving arthritis pain and inflammation, they can also cause serious gastrointestinal problems, such as ulcers in the stomach, which are sometimes fatal. Many Canadians with arthritis, like Anne Malo, had to experiment with a variety of therapies in order to prevent stomach-damaging side effects while managing their condition.

Research has been continuing in order to understand how drugs

work and how to use this knowledge to develop more effective, safer medications. One of the most exciting developments in arthritis therapy in decades occurred in the early 1990's when Dr. Philip Needleman found that instead of blocking one enzyme, NSAIDs actually blocked two forms of the enzyme. While one, a "bad" form, plays a role in causing pain and inflammation, the other, a "good" form, is

responsible for protecting the stomach.

Armed with their revolutionary new discovery, Searle scientists focused on developing a drug that would block the specific enzyme that caused pain and inflammation, but leave the "good" enzyme free to protect the stomach. The result was a breakthrough medication called Celebrex™, which was approved by Health Canada in April of this

year. It is for acute and chronic use in the relief of the signs and symptoms of osteoarthritis (OA) and rheumatoid arthritis (RA) in adults.

In clinical trials, Celebrex proved to be just as effective as the traditional NSAIDs studied (naproxen, diclofenac and ibuprofen), but much safer because it caused significantly fewer gastrointestinal ulcers. As a result of its unprecedented safety, Celebrex is becoming one of the fastest selling drugs in history.

"By providing a much safer alternative to traditional arthritis therapies, Celebrex allows us to manage arthritis significantly better," said Dr. William Bensen, a rheumatologist of Hamilton, Ontario, who saw more patients in Celebrex clinical trials than any other investigator in the world. "Although Celebrex has a low potential for stomach ulcers, patients should still remain alert for signs of gastrointestinal bleeding because serious ulcers can occur without any warning symptoms, even for patients not taking medication."

Anne Malo participated in the Celebrex trials for the past two years. She now takes Celebrex once a day, her arthritis is under control, she no longer suffers the gastric side-effects of the traditional arthritis medications, and is once again living a normal life. The clear beneficiaries of this research and its dramatic discoveries are the four million Canadians with arthritis.

# The battle of Britain

The Battle of Britain is widely recognized as the greatest air battle of all times and, in many aspects, the turning point of World War Two. Fought between July 10 and October 31 1940, it took place for the most part over the southern part of England and the English Channel. It was during that battle that a few hundred fighter pilots from Commonwealth

countries turned the tide on Hitler's plans for the invasion of Great Britain. Throughout that period, a total of one hundred Canadian fighter pilots served with various units of Fighter Command of the Royal Air Force. The Battle of Britain is especially significant for our Air Force heritage since it was during that battle that the Royal Canadian Air Force received its

baptism of fire.

Battle of Britain Sunday is a time to remember the exploits of Canadian fighter aces such as Ernie McNab, Joe Laricheliere, Willie McKnight, Bill Nelson, Johnny Kent and Gordi McGregor. It is also a tribute to all other Canadian flyers and ground crew whose participation is too often overlooked. It is not commonly known that although the Battle of Britain Bomber Command and Coastal Command carried out offensive operations over German-held ports on the European mainland. It is an even lesser known fact that of forty-seven Canadian aircrew who gave their lives during the Battle, twenty were fighter pilots; the others were from Bomber and Coastal Commands.

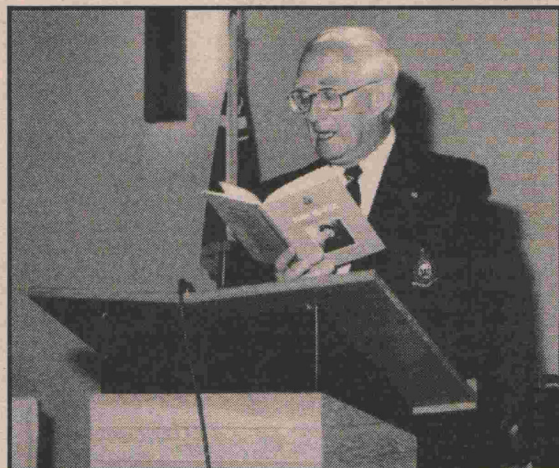
Battle of Britain Sunday is celebrated each year to commemorate the high water mark of the Battle, Sunday September 25th, 1940. On that day, Fighter Command delivered such a punishment to the Luftwaffe that Hitler decided to postpone indefinitely the invasion of Great Britain. The crucial outcome of this confrontation has been immortalized by Winston Churchill's famous words: "Never in the field of human conflict was so much owed by so many to so few."

This year, Battle Of Britain Ceremonies were held on the 19th of September. As in the past few years, 17 Wing in partnership with 500 Wing Air Force Association held an Ecumenical Remembrance Service at the Chapel Of The Good Shepard.

# Women's History Month in Canada - October 1999

Women's History Month was established in 1992 to celebrate the vital contribution of Canadian women to the history of our country. As this is the Year of La Francophonie in Canada, we are honouring Canada's Francophone women who moved forward with perseverance and conviction to shape Canada as a nation. From women like Madeleine de Vercheres who defended the Fort of Vercheres against a surprise Iroquois attack in 1692, to the honourable Jeanne Sauve who, nearly three hundred years later, became the first woman Speaker of the House of Commons in 1980 and the first female Governor General in 1984. Long before they had the right to vote or stand in federal and provincial elections and long before they had the right to choose a profession, Canadian women were devoted to developing education, particularly in rural areas, supporting their churches and fighting for women's rights among other worthy causes.

To commemorate Women's History Month, on Monday October 18th, "And We Knew How To Dance: Women in World War I", a Canadian film sponsored by the National Film Board, will be shown in the CFSAS Theatre, Building 84, Room 219 during the lunch hour. This film celebrates the wartime accomplishments of

Canadian women and suggests that their commitment and determination helped lead the way to momentous postwar social changes for women such as voting rights and expanded opportunities in their working lives - changes that solidified the early gains of the women's rights movement in Canada. This film is open to all 17 Wing members (including integral and lodger units).

In addition, Donna VanHorne of Academic and Business Communication Inc., will be conducting a workshop titled 'Effective Communication Skills for Women - Using Powerful Communication to Enhance and Accelerate your Career Strategies for Success'. This is an all-day workshop to be held on October 21st 1999, and is open to both military and civilian women at 17 Wing (including integral and lodger units). ## Managing debt made easier with reality check

A recent poll revealed that although being in debt "scares" most people, Canadians feel they are using credit more now than before and saving less of their income. 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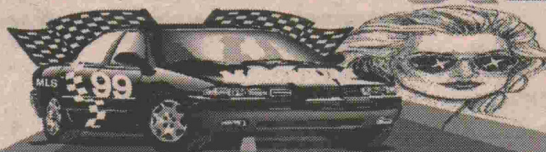
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
