The cargo section prepared the boxes for shipment and on the next morning, a 435 Sqn Hercules delivered the shipment to Trenton for furtherance to the orphanage in Chile.

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# 435 Squadron

## That others may live!

On 17 January 2000, 435 Sqn successfully completed a short notice tasking. This one was a MEDEVAC (medical evacuation) of a 21-year-old heart transplant patient from Regina, Saskatchewan to the University Hospital in Edmonton, Alberta. Since time was a definite factor in this case, it was decided that the Standby SAR (Search and Rescue) crew would be used and RCC (Rescue Coordination Centre) Trenton agreed to release the SAR crew from their normal SAR STBY duties. The Aircraft Commander received the first phone call at 0130 hrs and shortly after that the official tasking was made.

The request for the CC-130 Hercules from 435 Sqn was made because of the extensive amount of bulky life support equipment that had to travel with the patient. The medical team (3 Doctors and 2 Intensive Care Unit Nurses) from Regina reported that without the Hercules, this patient would not have survived the transit to Edmonton and they were particularly impressed with several aspects of the Hercules:

First, they were impressed with

the quick reaction time. They could hardly believe that the Hercules was able to arrive in Regina at 04h45 in the morning;

Enroute to Edmonton, they

were very impressed by the space in the aircraft and that they could work on the patient from both sides of the stretcher, even with all the equipment associated.

The flying crew was also able to pressurize the Hercules to keep the patient at Regina/Edmonton ground level pressure during the transit despite a flying altitude of 22,000 feet.

To assist with the patient, the crew was complemented with a MEDEVAC Trained Nurse and a Medical Assistant from 17 Wing Hospital and two 435 Sqn SAR Techs who were part of the SAR STBY crew.

While enroute back to Winnipeg, seven and a half-hours after arriving in Edmonton, the Hercules crew received a radio message that the operation was completed and successful. The crew was very happy to hear that the young 21-year-old patient had a reasonable chance of recovery.

All 435 Sqn and 17 Wing personnel who were involved in this life saving mission can be very proud of their contribution. Sometimes it is hard to make a difference in this big world, but one thing is sure, you made a world of difference for one young man.

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### Tips for fuel efficient winter driving

Your personal driving habits have a big impact on fuel consumption and costs, especially in the winter. Here are five steps you can take to keep your fuel costs down and help the environment by avoiding greenhouse gas emissions:

- Use a block heater to warm your engine before you start it. Block heaters can improve overall winter fuel economy by as much as 10 percent.
- Don't idle your vehicle to warm it up - it's better to drive it. Any more than 30 seconds of idling on winter days simply wastes fuel and increases emissions.
- Check tire pressures regularly, especially after there has been a sharp drop in temperature (more than 15°C). Cold temperatures decrease the air pressure in tires, which adds to the

rolling resistance caused by snow and slush.

- If you use ski racks, it's a good idea to remove them when they are not needed. Ski racks (even empty ones) increase a vehicle's aerodynamic drag, which in turn causes the engine to work harder and consume more fuel. The same applies to roof racks.
- Use public transit whenever possible or try ride-sharing or carpooling. You'll save money on fuel, reduce wear and tear on your vehicle and avoid the stress of driving in bad conditions.

### Alf Brooks postage stamp auctions

If you are a stamp collector, what is the source of stamps for your collection? There are many, from retrieving used stamps from mail (not as many as there used to be) to buying from dealers and a country's postal authority. One source for many collectors is the philatelic auction.

There are many auctions, and for most collectors auctions by mail are the easiest method. You study the catalogue, decide on the amount you wish to pay, and mail in your bid. With the appearance of the Internet, this process is now simpler if you are hooked up to it; the rules are much the same, the process can be much faster. You have doubtless heard of eBay, an online auction that features many lots of

postage stamps and philatelic material.

There are auctions for all income levels. In 1996 the stamp in the accompanying illustration, a "3 skilling banco" of Sweden issued in 1855, postally-used, sold to an anonymous buyer for 2,500,000 Swiss francs, about \$2,300,000 by current exchange rates. Why such a sum? It is an error; the color of the stamp should have been yellow instead of the green. It is the only one known. It is thus the world's most-expensive postage stamp.

Too rich for your bank account? I suggest an alternative. The Winnipeg Philatelic Society is conducting its annual auction of items submitted by members on Sunday, February 6, 1:00-5:00 PM, at Deaf Centre Manitoba, 285 Pembina Highway. 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# The Supply Line

On the 13th and 14th October 1999 Wing Supply held its second Procurement Seminar. Just in case you were unable to make it, here are some of the highlights. The decentralization of funds is a relatively new phenomenon for the Department of National Defence. This, in turn, is why there is still confusion as to what is acceptable and what is not.

If you are a holder of a DND procurement card (credit card), you may purchase goods and services of \$1000 or less without any quotes or special process. When you procure for amounts between \$1000 and \$5000 you must obtain three quotes from three different suppliers before making a decision as to which organization from whom you will purchase. For amounts of more than \$5000 you must go through your respective Customer Service Unit (CSU) in order to make the purchase. All amounts mentioned here exclude GST. However, if you use a Standing Offer Agreement (SOA) you will be exempt from these rules.

Limitations and constraints on what may be purchased are as follows;

- a. Travel-related expenses (flights and gas purchases);
- b. Personal expenses or cash advances (this also includes any recreational expenses);

- c. Vehicle operating and maintenance expenses;
- d. If the firm will add a surcharge when credit card purchase are made;
- e. Purchase of goods and services on the Internet or interdepartmental transactions;
- f. Split purchasing of any kind;
- g. Any type of ammunition;
- h. Firearms;
- i. Items containing radioactive material;
- j. Radar equipment;
- k. Nuclear, biological or chemical equipment;
- l. Major equipment (like engines or vehicles);
- m. Clothing or footwear;
- n. Appliances (air conditioners, coffee makers, refrigerator); and
- o. Construction equipment (excluding CE).

The person making the procurement must not only follow the letter and spirit of the policies, but must also purchase with consideration to environmental concerns and show impartiality in

choosing the supplier. The procurer must show at all times that he/she is free of any conflict of interest. It is important to keep in mind that one cannot accept any gifts as small as it may be, from any supplier.

It is also important to use Standing Offer Agreements (SOA) as often as possible. It is the procurer's responsibility to keep informed of all possible SOA's. Paperwork must be kept correctly and software must be properly inputted once you receive invoices.

To ensure we all have good procurement discipline, we are being monitored by the watchful eyes of auditors. It is demanding to keep up with the intricacies of procurement. If you do not have the time or patience to deal with this, you may contact your CSU. As the procurer wishes, the CSU will research, process paperwork and input data to the required software, all free of charge. The customer can be assured that whatever she/he is procuring is in accordance with Treasury Board policies.

So, if you are thinking of buying something today, call your CSU!

## Women in the Forces

The number of women serving in the Canadian Forces has risen from a controlled ceiling of 1,500 in 1971, to approximately 7,470 today, which represents about 10.76 percent of the regular force.

In the Reserve component of the Canadian Forces, women represent 19.21 percent of the strength of the reserves.

Enrollment in all occupations of the Canadian Forces is open to women with the exception of submarines.

### Canadian employment policy development

Women have been involved in the military service of Canada for over 100 years. Numbers in uniform have fluctuated over the years with the largest number serving during the Second World War when many performed non-traditional duties. Nevertheless, when the enrollment of women was again authorized in the early 1950s, employment was restricted to primarily the traditional roles in the medical, communication, logistics and administrative fields.

An expansion of the roles of women in the Canadian Forces began in 1971 following a review of the recommendations made by the Royal Commission on the Status of Women. The ceiling of 1,500 was lifted and opportunities for employment gradually expanded into the non-traditional areas — vehicle drivers and mechanics, aircraft mechanics, cooks, air traffic controllers, military police and firefighters.

Further reviews of personnel policies were conducted in 1978 and 1985 following passage of the Canadian Human Rights Act and the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms (1982, with its equality rights provisions coming into effect in 1985). As a result of these reviews, policies were changed to permit women to serve at sea in replenishment ships and in a diving tender, to serve with the army service battalions, military police platoons and field

ambulance units, and in most air squadrons

### Crew trials

The occupations and units which remained closed to women in 1987 were those occupations and units whose primary role was to be prepared for direct involvement in combat on the ground or sea: infantry, armored corps, field artillery, air defence artillery, signals, field engineers and naval operations. To study the impact of employing men and women in combat units on the operational effectiveness of those units, the Minister of National Defence announced on 5 February, 1987 the creation of an office to conduct Combat-Related Employment of Women (CREW) trials in selected units representative of all of the combat units.

### Current status

A Human Rights Tribunal, in a decision released on 20 February 1989, directed that the Canadian Forces cease the CREW trials and remove any remaining employment restrictions based on sex, with the exception of employment in submarines. The Tribunal further directed that while restrictions were to be removed as quickly as possible, a phased implementation process was accepted, with the goal of complete integration of women by 1999. In February 1990 an advisory board on women in the Canadian Forces was formed (later renamed the Minister's Advisory Board on Gender Integration (MABG-ICF)) to provide the external

monitoring function of this process.

Women may apply to enter any military occupation and serve in any environment. Occupational assignments made on enrollment are based on common selection standards, applicant preferences, and available vacancies. Women and men undergo the same integrated training, meet the same academic standards, and enjoy the same career opportunities.

In order to ensure continued progress in this area, the Canadian Forces are moving beyond the requirements of the Human Rights Tribunal Decision. Recent initiatives include a nine-point action plan for the enhancement of career opportunities for women. The topics identified in this project address matters that comprehend concerns regarding possible systemic discrimination, the need to mainstream social considerations in policy and procedure, the need to critically assess institutional assumptions and the way things have always been done, as well as the need to standardize the principles of internal monitoring and ensure a deeper, more sophisticated level of self-knowledge and internal review.

There has been significant progress in support of gender integration in the CF during the first five years of the transition period as defined by the Human Rights Tribunal. There is much that remains to be done; but a solid base for continued development has been established.

## Germany to end army training at Shilo, Manitoba

Ottawa - The Minister of National Defence, the Honourable Art Eggleton, announced today that he has been advised by German Defence Minister Rudolph Scharping that Germany intends to end its army training at Canadian Forces Base Shilo, Manitoba, in late 2000.

"Minister Scharping informed me that the withdrawal of Allied Forces from Germany has made considerable new training capacity available for the German army at home," Mr. Eggleton said. "Furthermore, through the use of simulation technology, the Germans have been able to reduce the length of time that their armoured units spend at training areas. The result is that they no longer need the additional area at Shilo."

German troops have been training at CFB Shilo since 1974 and have used the area primarily for mechanized and armoured corps (tank) training. More than 4,000 German troops have trained

in Shilo each year, and some 135,000 have used the facility since the program began. About \$10 million per year enters the local economy as a result of the German presence.

"I am fully aware that the closure of the German Army Training Establishment Shilo will have a significant economic impact on the local community," Mr. Eggleton said, "and measures are already under way to determine how to mitigate that impact. A Working Group has been formed to develop options which will include recommendations for the future use of CFB Shilo. We will do everything possible to make the best use of Shilo's facilities."

The withdrawal process for the German Army Training Establishment Shilo is laid out in agreements between Canada and Germany. Both countries will negotiate the specific provisions of the withdrawal of German forces from Canada.

# Draft RFP released to industry

The Supply Chain Project (SCP) has released a draft Request for Proposal (RFP) on the Government Electronic Tendering System for the provision of a portion of the supply and distribution functions related to the DND Supply Chain.

The purpose of the draft RFP is to stimulate dialogue with third party service providers and invite them to provide feedback on the RFP and the SCP business case. Potential service providers may propose modifications at this stage to help DND capitalize on the latest developments in technology, to encourage innovation and creative solutions or other recommendations as they see fit within the framework of the project objectives.

Prior to its release to industry the RFP was staffed through internal stakeholders, including unions. Their feedback was incorporated into the RFP through a consultative process that resulted in the current draft. By extending the consultations to external stakeholders as well, the DND/CF is seeking to have maximum input into a final RFP that will be released in the Spring of 2000.

An RFP - The aim of the RFP is not to contract the existing system "as is", but to achieve the objectives of the Supply Chain Project (SCP) business case by matching, where appropriate, the particular talents and competencies of the private sector with the existing requirements and competencies of the DND/CF. The expected result of the Project is the progressive transition of a subset of the DND/CF supply chain activity to a third party provider of logistic services, if this offers to be more cost-effective and as efficient as the current delivery of services and information.

Based on a Benefits Driven Procurement\* approach, proponents are invited to demonstrate their abilities to form a business alliance with DND/CF to transition from the existing DND/CF Supply Chain (SC), and deliver a new SC service and information model that meets the DND SCP business case objectives and requirements.

The RFP, along with supporting documentation such as the SC business case, is intended to provide sufficient information about the SC to allow the proponent to gain an understanding of

the SCP objectives, assumptions, requirements, and scope of the current DND/CF SC environment so that the proponent may:

- a. demonstrate that it has the capability, capacity and experience to undertake and manage a project of this size and complexity;
- b. demonstrate that it possesses proven methodologies and experience to roll out and manage a complex transition and outsourcing like the Supply Chain project;
- c. demonstrate that it is able to deliver a business solution, which meets the business requirements of the DND SCP business case;
- d. detail all major risks associated with this project, and related mitigation approaches;
- e. outline a recommended accountability framework for this project; and
- f. describe the commitments it is ready to make in investing in the SCP, along with detailing the performance based project compensation structure it would recommend.

The evaluation of the proponents will be based on the above, not on a detailed, fully costed SC solution. The top-rated proponent will be awarded the opportunity to enter into contract negotiations with the Crown for the right to further develop and refine the SCP business case, and subsequently implement project phases.

THE ASD REVIEW -Support services were identified in the Defence White Paper as an area where significant savings and increased performance could be achieved through alternative service delivery. Experience has shown that these and other benefits are possible when activities are exposed to competition. Based on the experience of allies such as the United States, the United Kingdom and Australia as well as on previous Canadian

experience, savings in the order of 20% to 30% are achievable in the area of support services. The ASD review of the supply chain was initiated in October 1997. Consultation with all stakeholders including unions, management, employees, communities and other government departments is an integral part of the review process.

PEOPLE - The static portion of the supply chain currently employs 1,684 civilian employees and 2881 military members at installations across Canada. With few exceptions, the proportion of people employed in supply and distribution activities at military installations is approximately 5% of the total strength of the establishment.

In keeping with DND's national Civilian Human Resources (HR) strategy the RFP will require that job offers will be made to at least of 50% of the affected indeterminate civilian work force or sufficient to ensure that at least 70% of the Contractor's new civilian work force for the SCP are affected DND employees, whichever is greater.

Employees who do not receive a job offer from the contractor will be treated in accordance with the normal provisions of the Work Force Adjustment Directive (WFAD)/Work Force Adjustment Appendix (WFAA) (Parts I to VI)\*\*. The Department intends to guarantee these employees a reasonable job offer in the Public Service wherever possible. The Department will assist in the placement of any employees in this situation by conducting an analysis of employee skills and competencies. This activity will be carried out through the Department's employability strategy and in collaboration with the Regional Joint Career Transition Committees.

In order to meet military commitments outlined in the White Paper, a number of military personnel will be embedded in the contractor's workforce and therefore remain available to DND for military operations.

Military members declared surplus to the supply chain requirements will be treated in accordance with the Military HR Strategy. This means that they will be selected for retention in occupation, selected for compulsory occupational transfer, or selected as a last resort for 5c release.

NEXT STEPS - Inputs to Draft RFP, the SCP will continue to receive inputs from internal and external stakeholders on the draft RFP over the coming weeks. Significant issues, if they arise, may require the project team to seek senior management direction and /or to refine the SCP business case and RFP.

Industry Briefings - In support of industry's review of the draft RFP, the SCP will hold briefings for industry to assist them in fully understanding the current supply chain and how the current system meet the needs of customers.

Site Visits - Visits for industry representatives to selected DND sites are currently being planned with the appropriate headquarters staffs. In total ten visits are planned. These visits will provide potential contractors with an understanding of the needs of the clients of the current supply chain. The sites to be visited are: Ottawa (NCP processes); naval bases at Halifax and Esquimalt; army units in Montreal and Quebec City and at Edmonton; air force wings at Trenton, Greenwood and Cold Lake; and the two supply depots at Edmonton and Montreal.

Steering Committee - Prior to release of the final RFP to industry, the SCP will, once again present its business case along with the final procurement strat-

egy to the ASD Steering Committee. This Steering Committee provides comments and views through the VCDS to the DM and CDS who are the Executive Authority (EA) for the Supply Chain Project. This Steering Committee should be held in the April 2000 time-frame.

Issue RFP -The target date for issuing the final RFP on the Government Electronic Tendering System is May 2000.

Contract Award -With the RFP the Department of National Defence will identify the best service provider with whom to form a business alliance and facilitate the realization of the potential benefits outlined in the SCP business case. Contract award to this service provider is targeted for Sept 00.

Progressive transfer with off ramps - The service provider will present business solutions for approval by DND including a transition plan for assuming supply chain functions. It is currently anticipated that this process should result in a step-by-step transition over a period of up to three years. The process includes off ramps in the event that the contractor proposed business solutions fail to meet the requirement of the department or conversely that the department's requirements do not allow for commercially viable options.

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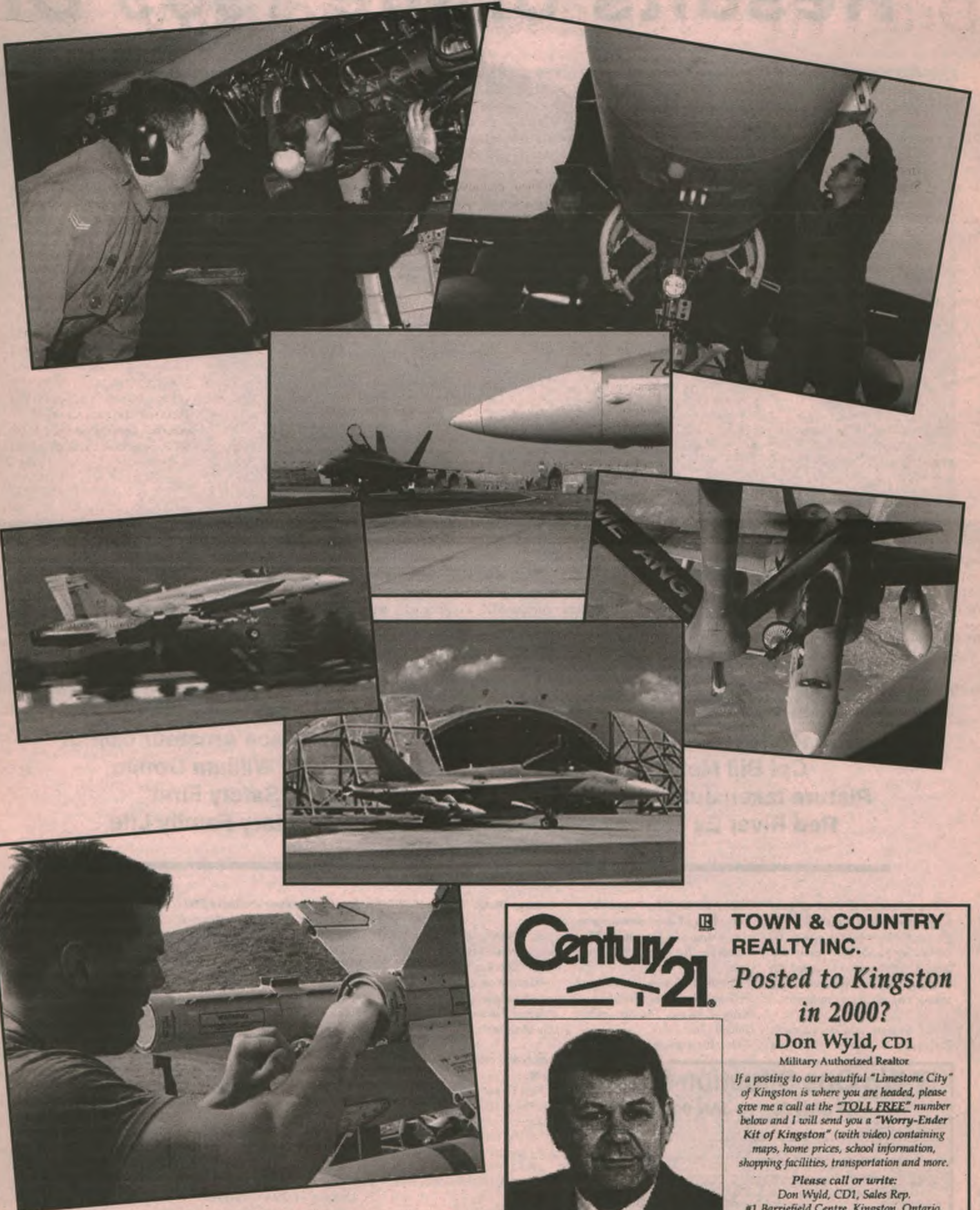

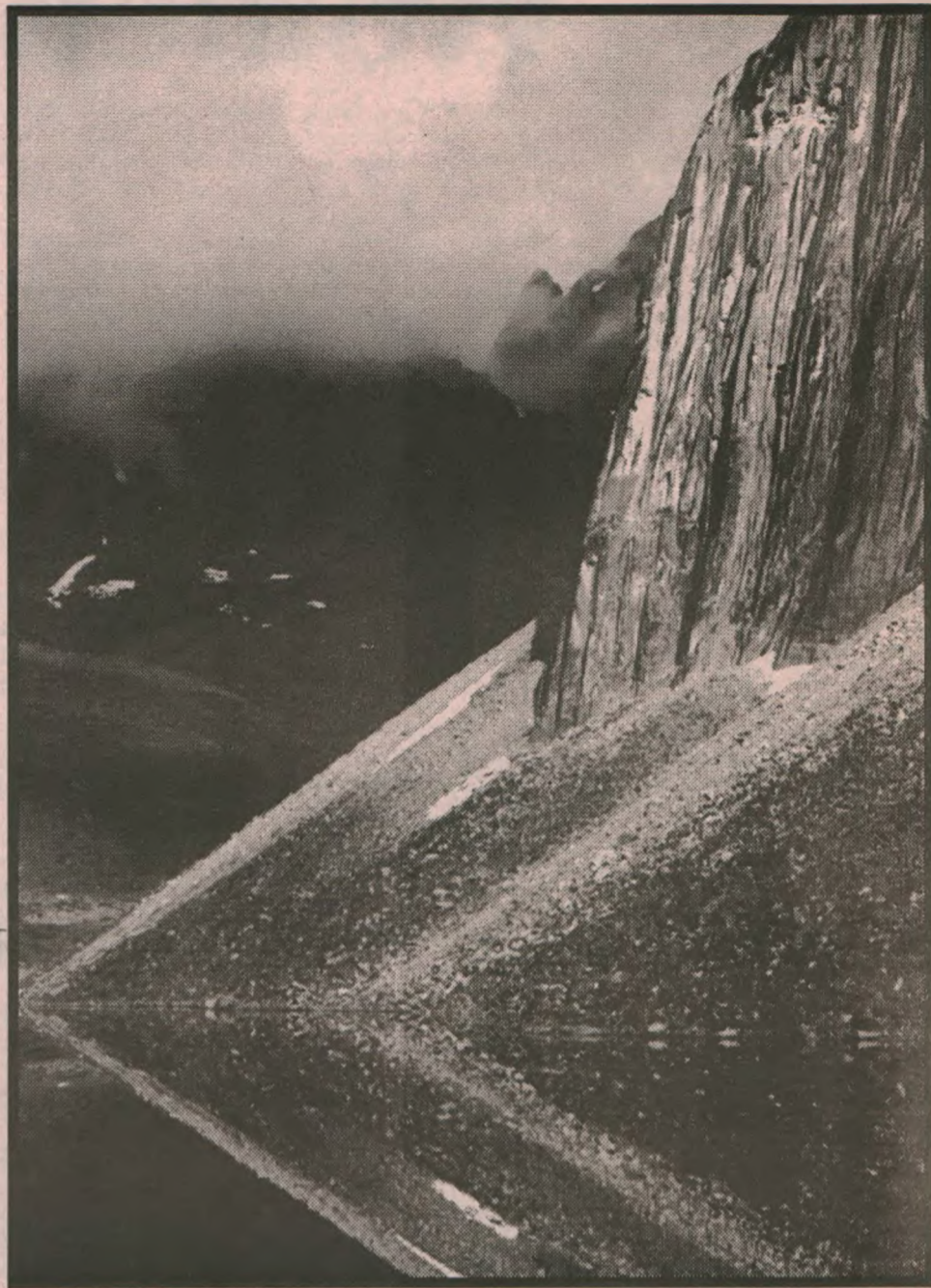

Earnings on the assets in your RRSP accumulate tax-free, however a ceiling is imposed per year, on the amount you can invest tax free. RRSPs are only taxed when withdrawn. They can hold a wide range of investment vehicles including mutual funds.

- You can own as many mutual funds as you like. However, only those you place under the ceiling of your RRSP are tax-deferred. Mutual funds are a convenient package-deal investment. You get choice, diversification, and professional management all in one. When you purchase a mutual fund it means that with a relatively small amount you can contribute to a big pile of money used by investment experts to buy stocks, bonds, and other securities. Because your assets are part of a much larger whole, mutual funds enable the average person to invest in securities that they might otherwise not be able to afford. Mutual fund companies put their best people in charge, and since everyone has a lot at stake, you can count on close attention and skillful diversification so that the fund receives the highest possible return at the lowest possible risk, given its objectives.

# Selling your home

Your home is one of the largest, if not the largest investment you will ever sell. Therefore, it behooves you to educate yourself as to the most effective manner in which to market your residence. After all, you work long and hard to build this equity so why not take a few minutes to best prepare yourself for the sale of your home. A few minutes now may go a long way to keep more disposable income in your pocket. Given that the equity in your residence is built with after tax dollars, and that any profits from your principal residence are tax-free, why not keep as much of your money as possible?

In this column I will introduce a four part series that deals with the fundamentals of selling a home. The process will follow the chronological sequence beginning with your decision to sell, right through to the final steps of ensuring the successful completion of the sale. The series will deal with the following major steps in a residential sale; Why Hire a Realtor, How to Select a Realtor, The Listing Agreement, and Dealing With An Offer. All of these articles and other articles dealing with buying a home are available at [www.quinterealty.com](http://www.quinterealty.com) Without further ado let's launch right into the first part of the series, Why Hire A Realtor? The main reason most Canadians hire a realtor may surprise you.

As a homeowner, known as the vendor in real estate jargon, something has prompted you to sell your home. The reasons for the

sale may be one of many, whether it's upsizing, downsizing, or a transfer - you need to sell. You certainly don't have to have a realtor to sell a home; after all, it is going to cost you money - right? Obviously I wouldn't be in real estate sales, let alone writing this article, if I thought all homes were going to be "For Sale By Owner." So why consider using a realtor? According to a recent survey the number one reason the Canadian public uses realtors is for the sake of convenience. This fact came as quite a surprise to a number of realtors, including me. You would have thought it was for one of the following reasons:

Realtors have access to the Multiple Listing System (MLS); hence, they can put your property on the system for all realtors to view. Furthermore, if the local MLS site is Internet based your property can be seen by buyers from all over the world. In addition, some larger companies have their own internet sites. For example, if you go on line at [www.royallepage.ca](http://www.royallepage.ca) you can see company listings from all over the country.

Prescreening of potential purchasers is perhaps one of the most important and time saving tasks good realtors perform on behalf of their clients. In other words, the purchasers are screened for preapproved financing and to determine if they are serious buyers. After all, why go through the aggravation of showing your home to someone who is not serious about buying or, for that matter, why show your property to someone who can't afford to buy? Furthermore, if there are 300 realtors in your area and they each have two serious, preapproved buyers — well, you can see the quality exposure can't you?

Negotiating on your behalf when an offer is being presented is a realtor's bread and butter. This is where the third party realtor can assist the buyer and seller by reducing the emotion in the process. By concentrating on the facts and negotiating compromises on things such as chattels, possession date and, of course, price, the realtor will enable the seller to dispose of the home in an efficient manner.

Perhaps the most important item a realtor can do for you is to provide you with the true market value of your home. Without this vital information you could lose money because your home is priced too low, in which case you would lose money. You could also end up selling your home below Market Value if you initially list your home for too much money. In this case your home would not usually sell for two reasons. Firstly, your home would be on the market for more than the normal amount of time without a sale and then be viewed as a problem home. Secondly, your home does not sell during the prime time (ie Spring) to sell and you are forced to wait for another upturn in the market. Regardless of the reason, if your home is overpriced initially, you run the risk of selling below Market Value or not selling your home at all.

So what is Market Value? First of all, Market Value is not necessarily your appraised value for municipal property tax purposes. Market Value for residential real estate sales can be explained as the highest price the property will

bring to a willing seller if exposed for sale on the open market for a reasonable time to find a willing purchaser. The buyer and seller should not be under undue pressure, necessity or peculiar circumstances. For example, if your neighbour is getting divorced, sticks a "For Sale by Owner" sign on the front lawn, and sells it two days later — your neighbour is probably not selling for "Market Value". The reasons being, the sign did not expose the home to the entire market, there was not enough time for proper market exposure, and there was reason to believe the seller was under duress to sell. In the next article we will look at how your Realtor establishes Market Value.

So, this first installment, of a four part series, titled Selling Your Home, comes to an end. While you still may decide to sell your home on your own, I hope you will take the time to read the balance of the articles in this series — after all you are probably trying to sell your most expensive possession. The next edition will deal with How to Select a Realtor.

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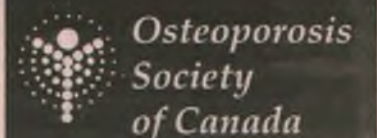

## Deployment Emergency Childcare Service



By providing immediate, affordable, regulated childcare in times of emergency, the DEC service supports the ability of CF members to be available for duty, deployment, operations and training. In addition the DEC service supports the family of members tasked out of garrison, by providing back-up childcare services in times of emergency!

- The DEC service is available 24hrs by accessing a paging system at 935-7733. Every effort will be made to secure childcare within an hour!
- The emergency may be the result of an unexpected or short notice deployment/operation/training, where the member does not have sufficient time to implement his/her Family Childcare Plan. An emergency might also arise while the member is deployed and the spouse encounters medical or other problems, which disrupts the usual childcare arrangements and requires immediate alternative arrangements.
- The DEC program also provides general childcare resources to military families and referral to services for community members experiencing a childcare emergency.
- For childcare emergencies arising from deployment/operational related events, **funding has been made available** to fully cover reasonable costs incurred during the first 72hrs and pro-rated partial reimbursement up to a (max) 7 days.

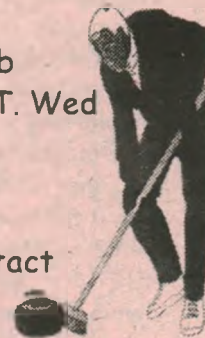

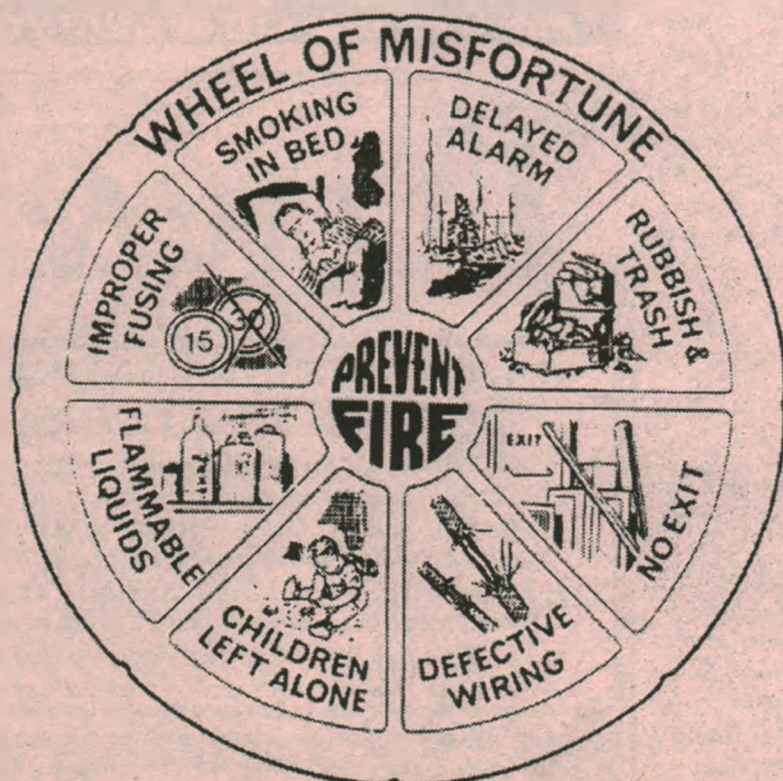

The mission of 17 Wing Dental Detachment Winnipeg is to support the Wing Commander and the Commanding Officer of 1 Dental Unit by ensuring a dentally fit operational force capable of immediate deployment. The aim is to prevent the loss of valuable personnel due to preventable dental problems.

The Dental Care Program is a two-phase program. Phase One consists of an annual dental examination

following which the patient is classified according to treatment requirements and treatment priority. All personnel should note that QR & O 35.03, as amplified by CFAO 35-2, requires that all Regular Force members undergo dental examinations annually. This then is very clear direction that attendance at dental exams is both a military duty and an individual responsibility. Phase Two consists of those preventive and treatment services needed to reach and maintain a functional level of dental fitness.

17 Wing Dental Detachment Winnipeg would like to remind everyone in the Wing to be proactive and call the dental detachment reception desk at local 5522 to book their annual Phase one exams.
