17 Wing delivers power to Sanikiluaq!

The small community of Sanikiluaq of the Belcher Islands in Nunavut, received a huge boost, care of 17 Wing's 435 Transport and Rescue Squadron on Tuesday, 2 May 2000. The small community of 380 people was "left in the dark" the morning before after a fire destroyed the community's generating station.

EMO Nunavut was able to charter a civilian plane to deliver a small generator in the following hours, however the generator was only capable of powering critical systems and much of the

small community was still left with no electricity.

The help of the Canadian Air Force was sought to deliver a 250 KW generator, capable of restoring complete power throughout the small town near Hudson Bay. The generator weighed over 8000 lbs, and required several members of 1 Air Mov Sqn to load it onto the Hercules aircraft.

The workhorse of the Air Force was perfect for the job because of its capability to airlift the powerful generator and land on the short 3,800 ft landing strip in Sanikiluaq.

Everest expedition 2000 spring - a SAR tech's dream

As you should now be aware, and you will see from our centre page feature this issue, one of 435 Sqn's personnel is attempting the biggest (at least in size) challenge of his life. The road to Mt Everest has not been an easy one with lots of planning, preparation and financial obstacles to overcome. But now at last, Sgt Jeff Warden, a 435 Sqn SAR Tech, is in the process of climbing to the world's highest peak. Jeff is part of the Asian Trekking 2000 Team representing Canada. His team members include a seven member Sherpa Support Group with "Ang Tshering" as the Lead Sherpa, Anna Czerwinska (Poland), Carlos (Spain), Saeed Toossi (Iran/USA) and Bill Zachary (USA).

estead.com/everest.html. Below is a chronology of events to the end of April extracted from this website:

MARCH 29: Left Vancouver Canada, via San Francisco and Singapore, for Nepal, population, 3,000,000 plus;

APRIL 3: Arrived at Kathmandu, the capital city of Nepal, a city bustling with activity and energy. Leave shortly for trekking drop-off;

APRIL 9: After trekking in from "Lukia", reached base camp "Sagarmatha" at 9:30 a.m., the elevation here is, 17,388 ft. and is situated at the start of the "Khumbu Ice Fall", 120 climbers in camp;

APRIL 10: Puja ceremony today, the blessing of climbers and their equipment. Tomorrow brings acclimatization climb up to camp [1], 20,013 ft.;

APRIL 11: The weather continues to be excellent, hope it holds, the climb up the "Khumbu Ice Field" although spectacular, can be a very dangerous and

treacherous area;

APRIL 14: Camp [2], [advance base camp] is attained today, elevation is now 21,300 ft., strong team, great personnel, sherpas' excellent. Health continues to be good, feeling strong, spirits high;

APRIL 15: Since the climbs to camps [1] and [2], the atmosphere here is starting to heat up, with many teams up high. If the weather continues to hold, summit attempt, could be May 5, [possibly May 6]. Will relay more info later;

APRIL 23: Having spent time at camp [3], situated on the icy face of "Lhotse", movement has been, between the lower levels, and back, this completing acclimatization. Wind and snow are the present conditions. Trekking to "Khumjung Village", below base camp, [were in 1961, the first school was built by "The Sir Edmund Hillary Foundation"]. Here, good health & strength will be maintained. Summit as planned;

APRIL 27: Well rested, ready to start the summit climb, but high winds, [forecast 80knots,] on the Lhotse slopes, continue to be the major obstacle. Anticipation is building for most teams at base camp. If conditions improve [Friday], this should see upward movement towards camps [1], [2] & [3]. Sherpas continue to supply these camps, camp [4] to receive oxygen bottles, along with tents & provisions;

APRIL 29: Back up to camp [3], since returning from Khumjung. Winds at this altitude, [24000ft] are 60+knots, have returned to base camp, weather is expected to improve soon. No one has yet to summit this millenium, climbers are becoming restless. All major Canadian newspapers are represented here, watch for articles. Will begin final assault sometime between May 5-10.

New Leaders for the Air Force

On 2 May 00, the Honourable Art Eggleton, Minister of National Defence, announced senior promotions and appointments for the Canadian Forces for the year 2000.

"Leading a vital national institution such as the Canadian Forces in a changing world requires highly skilled, trained and educated individuals" said Minister Eggleton. "The new team is comprised of caring leaders who have demonstrated a strong sense of duty and professionalism."

The Minister noted that every officer being promoted has been selected through a formal merit board process in accordance with the policy announced three years ago in the Report to the Prime Minister on Leadership and Management of the Canadian Forces. The members of the merit board

considering promotions to vice-admiral/lieutenant-general and major-general/rear-admiral included a senior public servant from another government department.

The new appointments that affect the Air Force are the following:

Maj.-Gen. Lloyd Campbell will be promoted Lt.-Gen. and appointed Chief of the Air Staff, replacing Lt.-Gen. David Kinsman who is retiring from the Canadian Forces.

Brig.-Gen. Richard Bastien will be promoted Maj.-Gen. and appointed Assistant Chief of the Air Staff, replacing Maj.-Gen. Peter Gartenburg who is retiring from the Canadian Forces.

Brig.-Gen. Steven Lucas will be promoted Maj.-Gen. and appointed Commander 1 Canadian Air Division in Winnipeg, replacing Maj.-Gen. Lloyd Campbell.

Brig.-Gen. Thomas Johnson will be appointed A1 Personnel and Training at 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters in Winnipeg, replacing Brig.-Gen. Eric Findley.

Brig.-Gen. Eric Findley will be appointed A3 Operations at 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters in Winnipeg, replacing Brig.-Gen. Steven Lucas.

Col. Dwayne Lucas will be promoted Brig.-Gen. and appointed A4 Support at 1 Canadian Air Division Headquarters in Winnipeg.

Col. Gordon Sharpe will be promoted Brig.-Gen. and appointed Director General Air Force Development.

Canadian Veterans to be Honoured at Reunion in Yorkton, Saskatchewan

A very unique reunion is being planned for the year 2000 to honour the memory of the Canadian soldiers who fought in Italy during the Second World War. The Italian Campaign Veterans Reunion 2 will be held in Yorkton, Saskatchewan, September 1,2,3, 2000. "There are nearly 6,000 Canadians buried in Sicily and Italy," explains reunion organizer, Jeffrey Stephaniuk. "And there are many elderly veterans living in rural communities and in cities right across Canada." Stephaniuk's father, William, served in Italy between 1943 and 1945 with the Princess Louise Dragoon Guard. "We encourage veterans from all across Canada, their spouses, and their families to come join us in Yorkton," he said. A similar reunion was held in Yorkton in 1998, at which nearly 300 veterans and non-veterans attended. One of the letters of greeting read at that first gathering came from Major-General (ret'd) George Kitching, who passed away in 1999 at the age of 89. He became a well-known Canadian officer during the Second World War. He was the senior staff officer of the First Canadian Division during the Sicilian campaign in July and August of 1943, then served on mainland Italy as a brigade commander. The following is his letter to the reunion participants: "Dear Italian Campaign Veterans Reunion organizers and guests: Thank you very much indeed for your letter of invitation to attend your meetings. Your mention in your letter of a number of regiments and corps which served in Italy brought back many happy memories of my association with each of them. We were a good team and worked together. It is fair to say that when the First Canadian Corps went in to the attack in Italy we were always confronted with the best troops the enemy had. This was confirmed from captured documents after the war. They feared us the most." The guest speaker for the upcoming reunion will be Peter Stursberg, who was the first CBC correspondent to report on the Canadians in Sicily and

then in Italy. The families of soldiers in Canada turned to Mr. Stursberg's reports to learn new information about the Canadians in Italy. The Italian Campaign Veterans Reunion 2, to be held September 1,2,3, 2000 in Yorkton, Saskatchewan, has been recognized as a Celebrating Saskatchewan activity for the year 2000. "Through the Celebrating Saskatchewan initiative, the Government of Saskatchewan is pleased to be joining hands with communities and organizations across the province in these celebrations," Bernhard Wiens, Provincial Secretary, said in a letter to the reunion organizers.

Alternate Alternate Service Deliveries

The basic facts are – the world is not going to get any more stable, the CF has been getting smaller and Canada is going to continue to respond to national and international crises. So how does the CF continue to respond to military operations other than war (OOTW)? Simply to ascertain what other options are available for support.

Logistics wholesalers have always supported combat forces in-theatre. In the past they have ranged from sutlers, chandlers, camp followers, and teamsters - Hannibal and Caesar knew them as did Napoleon and Ghengis Khan. Today more and more are logisticians, communicators, engineers, and scientists, we may not recognize them but they are there. Modern militaries cannot operate without the logistics strategic wholesaler being in the theatre.

The Americans have been utilizing alternate forms of service delivery for several wars. They have developed concept of Logistics Support Elements (LSE) which evolved out of Operation Desert Storm. This was a single command and control (C2) element centrally managing all of US Army Material Command (USAMC) personnel, calling forward additional elements as and when required, integrating these forward elements into the theatre. The LSE spans the bridge between the strategic and tactical level, linking the industrial bases with operational logistics units, and extending through the Logistics Assistance Program. The LSE formed a 3000 person Army Support Group that became the foundation for the LSE and reinforced the need for civilians on the battlefield. Its accomplishments included: upgrading 1,100 M1 main battle tanks to the more powerful and protected MA1 configuration; repainting more than 10,000 vehicles with chemical resistant desert camouflage paint; repairing 43,000 items including 12,000 pieces of chemical defensive eqpt, 9,000 weapons systems, and 3,500 automotive components; issuing 1,600 items from its repairable exchange line and processing more than 23,000 retrograde lines; and preparing eqpt for retrograde movement following the ground campaign. LSE does not replace force structure; it provides strategic (depot) level logistics support, which is not available anywhere else in the force structure. LSE is the forward element of the national logistics base and fills gaps in the force structure.

Another topical acronym is LOGCAP – Logistics Civil Augmentation Program. Basically, LOGCAP is a program to use contractors to augment the force structure to perform construction, engineering, and logistics services in theatre. LOGCAP is a Department of the Army capstone program that includes all pre-planned logistics and engineering construction-oriented contingency contracts actually awarded and peacetime contracts that include contingency clauses. Pre-planned weapon system sustainment contracts, contingency contracts, and support to prime contracts. The fundamental goals of LOGCAP are to: plan during peacetime for the effective use of contractor support in a contingency or crises; leverage global/regional

corporate resources as facility and logistic services support multipliers; provide an alternative augmentation capability to meet facility and logistics service shortfalls; and provide a quick reaction to contingency or crisis requirements. The LOGCAP mission is to 'Plan for and, on order, within 15 days initiate specified logistical and construction support for 180 days to a force of up to 20,000 troops arriving through air and sea ports of debarkation. Provide support in one rear and four forward areas. Be prepared to extend operations beyond 180 days for up to 50,000 troops.' I know what you're thinking, we only have just over 50,000 troops so when would they all deploy – never. They would of course, be part of a larger contingent as we have seen in Bosnia, Kosovo, and Timor. Oh and in case you're thinking what will they be doing when the bullets start flying, well it has been shown that most of the contractors have proven themselves 'under fire'.

In fact in Kosovo WeatherHaven has employed and maintained an accommodation system for the deployed troops and when the mission ceases will go back into the mission area and disassemble the camp.

In the UK, the Royal Air Force has employed a new system in support of their new 'J' model C130s. The program is called Contractor Run Interim Logistics Support (CRILS) and is the brainchild of Lockheed Martin Aerosystems in concert with a prime UK contractor – Marshalls of Cambridge. Marshalls is responsible for determining the range and scale of all 'J' model spares. This program was accepted primarily as Log Command/Strike Command did not have the time or the manpower to prepare an in-depth Logistics Support Plan. The contract specifies that all spares will be delivered to Lyneham – the main and only operating base for the C130 aircraft. The contractor in consultation with the end-user will determine the follow-on level of sparing and repair patterns. Each year a financial limit will be set and not exceeded, if it is there will be a contractor penalty. The spares are purchased as Government Owned Items that are Contractor Operated (GOCO). The contractor is obligated to maintain a main store/warehouse on the base – a hole-in-the-wall operation. The contract is for 'B' class items and will last five years. At the end of the five years the Ministry of Defence (MOD) can do one of two things – renew the contract or terminate the contract and have all the spares returned. The CRILS off-the-shelf satisfaction rate is set at 75%, the

before contract rate at Lyneham was 91% - the MOD seems to be okay with this variance. In talking with the Supply personnel in Lyneham who oversee the contract they have had problems with the operational satisfaction rates as well as international agreements and their handling.

In the proper fit and form alternative alternatives can work and they cannot be dismissed out of hand unless they can be proven ineffective for the deploying troops.

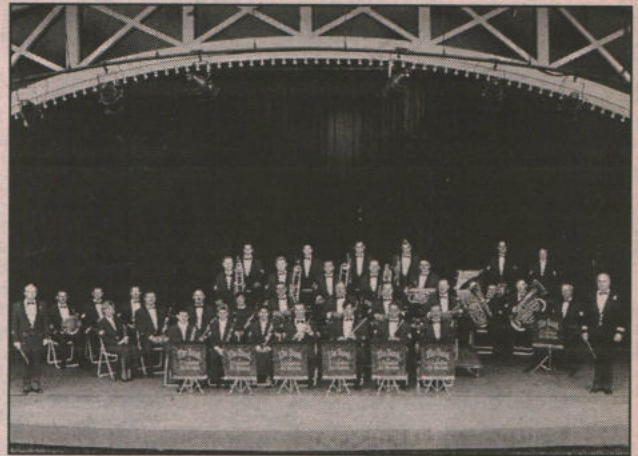

Chinthe to climb the Seven Summits

Sgt Jeff Warden, a Search and Rescue Technician at 435 Transport and Rescue Squadron, 17 Wing, is in the process of climbing the world's highest peak - that of Sagarmatha, or the mountain better known as Everest. It would be the fourth mountain he's conquered in his quest to climb the highest peak of each continent.

Sgt Warden began this unusual adventure in May 1999, climbing North America's highest point, Mount McKinley in Alaska; a peak that stands at 20,320 feet. Next up was Argentina's Aconcagua, the highest peak in the Western Hemisphere. Aconcagua is an extinct volcano at 22,834 feet located in the Andes. He recently completed the hike up Tanzania's Kilimanjaro in 3 1/2 days up and a mere 36 hours down. Many people have difficulty reaching the top of this mountain, not because of the weather, which is usually quite stable year round, but because of altitude sickness and related illnesses. Sgt Warden says that Kilimanjaro was, "probably my most social climb. A real contrast from what's up next."

What's up next is, of course, Mount Everest, the 29,035 foot monster in the Himalayas. Sgt Warden made his way to Nepal at the end of March to begin the trek that will consume all of his time and energy until mid-May. He will not be alone on the mission though, as he will be accompanied by sherpas and four other climbers representing Poland, Spain, Iran & USA. The advantages to climbing in teams are many. Not only is it more economical, but the companionship and support that team members offer one another

is invaluable - especially on a hike that is expected to take 45 days.

Sgt Warden, was born in Toronto in 1963. At 17, he moved to Banff where he believes his interest in the outdoors was cemented. He joined the airforce, and has been part of the organization for 16 years. He spent nine years in Comox as a SAR Tech, and only recently was posted to 435 Sqn in July 1999. Mountain climbing is a great way to train for the work he does as a search and rescue technician. Sgt Warden, who is as adventurous as a twenty-year old, still has difficulty explaining why, after all this time he feels motivated to climb the world's toughest peaks. "I'm asked this question all the time, but I never quite know what to say except that it's addictive. The satisfaction you get when you realize you're at the top is unbelievable."

Raising the money to get to the top can almost be as difficult as the actual ascent. The price tag on Everest is a whopping \$30,000 US, and that's excluding travel, among other expenses. Getting sponsors is an integral part of preparation and proved to be almost as much a challenge as the climb itself.

When asked if he's supported or discouraged by concerned friends and family he says, "I get a lot of support, but also some objections. My mother doesn't like it." Although she may not like it, Sgt Warden's mother would have to be proud of her son if he completes the Seven Summits. If he does, he will be only the second Canadian to accomplish this incredible feat.

Do you have a Family Care Plan?

Unexpected events are a part of military life-being prepared helps the family cope with the accompanying stress. A Family Care Plan is designed to assist CF members in identifying persons who will care for their dependants in circumstances where they, the primary caregiver(s), cannot. In times of deployment, a childcare emergency can arise simply from the illness of the primary caregiver (often the spouse). The MFRC's Deployment & Emergency Childcare Service is designed as a back-up to your regular childcare provider and designated emergency childcare providers. Accessible 24hrs, the service is subsidized through the Directorate of Military Family Services and is administered by your local MFRC. For your information, the MFRC compiles current listings of care providers throughout the city to assist you in preparing your plan. Be prepared and be assured that the Emergency Childcare Service will be there to provide immediate, qualified and subsidized care to back-up your Family Care Plan!

Here is a quick questionnaire to help you assess where you are in the preparation of a family care plan.

Do you have ready answers to the following questions?

Is the service member in your family in a trade where he/she could be deployed on short notice?

Have you completed a pre-deployment check-list?

You are away on temporary duty and your spouse/caregiver becomes ill and cannot care for the children. What will you do?

At present you work days, but your supervisor has notified you that you will start working shifts in 2 weeks. Are you ready? Who will care for the children overnight or in the evenings?

You are a single parent going away on course in another city and are unable to bring your children. What would you do?

You are a single parent or a spouse (in the absence of your military spouse) and you need medical care in another city. What would you do?

You are a single parent or a spouse (in the absence of your military spouse) and your doctor tells you that you need bed rest for a month. What would you do?

You are having a hard time coping and need some respite care. What would you do?

Smoke Alarms do save lives

You may recall on 4 Jan, the CTV's W-Five called into question the reliability of 11 models of smoke alarms. Following a two-week investigation of smoke alarms, Health Canada has announced they stand behind the smoke alarms in question. All eleven models met the requirements of the Canadian National Standard. In 100% of tests the government organization responsible for the Hazardous Products Act verified that smoke alarms do the job they were designed to do: 'provide people with an opportunity to evacuate their homes in the event of fire.' The tests were conducted by Underwriters Laboratories of Canada (ULC) and affirm what fire officials already knew and have been repeating in response to the panicked phone calls of concerned Canadians. Smoke alarms, whether ionization or photoelectric do work. Canadians reacted to a sensationalized story that undermined the public confidence in these critical life safety devices. The truth is smoke alarms have saved countless lives in Canada and will continue saving lives. Not a week after the W-Five report an ionization smoke alarm had been credited with saving 11 lives. Factual accounts like this are much more reliable than the questionable results reported by W-Five. The Canada Safety Council points out that in the last 20 years there has been a sharp decline in Canada's fire fatality rate. In the 1970's the rate was 4.1 per 100,000 population, now the rate is 1.3. Smoke alarms are a major factor in this drop. More than half of all fire-related deaths in 1997 occurred when there was no working smoke alarm in the home. The major reason for alarms not working was dead or missing batteries. The ULC mark on a smoke alarm indicates that it has been manufactured to the requirements of the standard. The standards development process in Canada is admired throughout the world and often duplicated. Smoke alarms are the most important life safety devices a Canadian can have in their home, regardless of the technology. **SMOKE ALARMS WORK!!**

Women's Clinic Questionnaire:

I would like to thank all those who replied to the survey that was recently sent out by e-mail. To date, I have received 58 responses, which is excellent. I have also received some great feedback. Thanks for all the positive comments, which comprised most of the responses. It is rewarding to know that the clinic is appreciated by so many. I would also like to thank those who responded with criticism, because it is through these comments that we can continue to improve our service.

The Well Women's Clinic is a nurse-run clinic, under the supervision of a Medical Officer. It is available to women for their regular screening that includes a breast exam, Pap smear and a pelvic exam. The clinic can provide birth control information and prescription. Also, women with minor personal issues such as yeast infections can speak to the clinic nurse. Initial prenatal care is available as well. If a woman is planning a pregnancy or believes she is pregnant, the clinic is her first point of contact. Pregnancy testing, change of medical category, initial lab work, administrative information and a referral to a civilian physician can be done through the clinic. Any woman planning a pregnancy can get a prescription for folic acid, which is important in the prevention of neural tube defects (e.g. Spina Bifida). This should be taken *before* getting pregnant to be effective. Questions can always be directed to the clinic nurse, and if your need is outside the nurse's scope of practice, you will be directed appropriately.

One of the main advantages of the clinic is its flexibility and timing. No woman should feel she has to utilize the clinic as opposed to physician services. Some women are not comfortable with a nurse-run clinic, and for this reason it is important to be an informed consumer. Our responsibility is to get the information out, by word of mouth, by referral from the other medical squadron staff, and by publications such as this. Your responsibility is to let us know what you need. It is your right to feel comfortable and well cared for.

A few respondents were concerned about nurses providing this care, wondering about the quality. The services provided in the clinic are considered Delegated Medical Acts, which means a physi-

cian is responsible for ensuring the quality of care, and the Nurse is trained to a level of proficiency. For those concerned that cancer detection may not be done correctly: when a

Pap smear is done, we are sampling certain types of cells. The laboratory looks at the cells under a microscope to determine if the area was appropriately sampled and reports any abnormalities or the need for a repeat testing.

The clinic nurses are trained to know what is normal. Anything that is not "normal" is referred to a doctor. It is usually easier to get an appointment at a time which is convenient for you, and with more time to discuss questions in a fairly relaxed setting, at the Women's Clinic, and if anything abnormal is there, you will be sent to a doctor. Once again, however, you are free to see the doctor directly if you prefer not to use the Women's Clinic services.

This brings up another problem identified by three respondents: sometimes, there is no one available in the clinic, and it is sometimes difficult to get in touch with the clinic nurse. Since it is a clinic for well women, there is not an emergency or urgent care mandate. If you feel you have an emergent need you will be seen by the duty medical officer on sick parade. I understand that it is not comfortable for many people to leave a message on the voice mail when you phone. A suggestion made by one respondent was to have appointments made through the 5595 number, the MIR desk. Although we do not want to lose our contact with you, you can now phone the appointment desk (local 5595) and schedule an appointment for afternoons only and morning appointments will remain scheduled by the nurse in the clinic (local 5540).

One respondent mentioned that having a women's clinic seemed to single out women, and suggested a men's clinic should be available also. Suggestions like this are always welcome. Men and Women have different regular screening requirement. Men require regular testicular exams and can be taught to perform them on themselves; it is a somewhat easier and quicker exam than the requirement s for women. Men are welcome to seek information about the exam or for their "significant other" such as pregnancy, birth control and STD's. Perhaps we should refer to the clinic simply as the Wellness Clinic to create a feeling of inclusion for all. Other screening is included on the regular periodic health exam that all

military members need.

One respondent identified a problem that should never happen, and which we have taken steps to try to ensure it does not happen again. Our recommendation is: make follow-up appointments with the doctor or nurse you see at the clinic at the time of testing. The respondent also suggested there might be a more confidential way of obtaining testing, and that there should be more blood donor clinics held at the base. In answer to the first suggestion, we cannot feasibly have totally anonymous testing. You need to have a contact person to receive results from and there are requirements for pre and post-test counseling, in case there are underlying conditions or concerns. In answer to the second suggestion, the Medical Squadron has nothing to do with blood donor clinics. The clinics are set up by Canadian Blood Services with base permission.

Some comments were made regarding our décor and equipment. Captain Fleury is working on the décor. We have recently acquired a new exam table, and a Doppler with which pregnant women and their spouses can hear the heart beat of the fetus.

In addition to problems, some respondents identified some good suggestions. Two mentioned holding women's health lectures or briefings on a regular basis. This will hopefully be implemented in the late fall. One suggested that service be available for all military members regardless of class of service. We would love to be able to do this, but legally must watch our step. We have no mandate to serve reservists unless on Class B greater than 180 days or Class C. We can however provide pamphlets, and help direct you to civilian services. One mentioned that waiting in the hallway area lacked privacy. This is a point well taken but we do not really have space to accommodate anything else. My best suggestion is to tell the nurse if you are concerned and special arrangements can be made. Just let us know.

In conclusion, I would like to sincerely thank all of you who participated in this survey. Your input is invaluable.

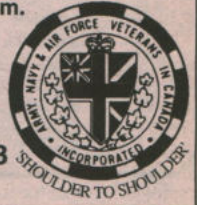
