402 Squadron Colours retire to City Hall

In a historic ceremony on Tuesday, 16 May at 1215hrs, Winnipeg's oldest and only military squadron retired its Colours, appropriately at City Hall. Councillor Peter De Smedt, on behalf of Mayor Glen Murray and his colleagues, accepted the squadron's Colours from current 402 Commandant, LCol Lamb with great pleasure.

"We are very, very honoured that you have selected City Hall, and the City of Winnipeg, to be the custodian of 402 Sqn's colours," said Councillor De Smedt. "We recognize the significant contribution 402 Squadron

has made to guarantee our national and international security, and we look forward to the continuation of this important relationship in the years ahead."

The exchange was witnessed by several city councillors and by the Wing Commander, Colonel Watt and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Smith.

A squadron's Colours are its most valuable possession, so deciding where to retire it was an important decision. Still, it is not difficult to understand why City Hall has been chosen as its permanent home. The affiliation between the Squadron and the City of Winnipeg dates back to 1932. It is a unique co-operative between a military unit and a municipality that is becoming increasingly rare, especially in Canada's major cities.

402 Squadron's standard has an azure-colored background, bordered by the provincial floral emblems. In the center is 402 Squadron's "Totem Bear" badge, flanked by scrolls with the names of eight World War II battle honours.

The squadron's Colours will be displayed permanently on the second floor of the Council Building.

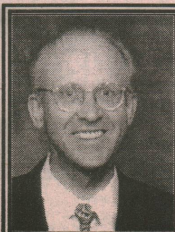
Why is it that a Major-General is a lower rank than a Lieutenant-General, when a Major is a higher rank than Lieutenant?

RULING MADE IN KIPLING CASE

On 5 May 2000, Judge Col Guy Brais dismissed court martial charges against Sgt Mike Kipling, a former member of 435 Sqn. Sgt Kipling was charged with refusing to take the anthrax vaccine, which according to trial evidence the vaccine was nine years old, the vials did not contain the doses indicated and some vials were contaminated and unsterile, containing foreign material. "The government...could never be justified to impose inoculation of soldiers with unsafe and dangerous vaccines," Brais ruled in a preliminary motion. The case will not go to an actual court martial trial.

140 High School students to stay at 17 Wing

From 25 - 27 May, the Manitoba Forestry Association is hosting their annual Envirothon with the help of 17 Wing. This annual event encourages high school students to learn about environmental issues throughout the school year, leading up to field study research and case study presentations at the provincial and possibly national competition. In most cases, the school's environmental clubs will send representatives, while Swan River high school is unique in that it will send its students from a one of a kind course in Natural Resource

Management.

Bill Baker, Program Director of the Manitoba Forestry Association, says that a partnership with the military is not a new idea. Although this is the first time 17 Wing has been involved, the MFA has received support in previous years from CFB Shilo.

OPI Captain K. Heinzl of Wing Supply, says that the MFA was granted a Provision of Services Contract from the Wing Commander. When asked why the base would be interested in helping local groups in the community, Capt Heinzl says,

"The base will help groups whenever it can - whenever it has the resources to do so." She continues, "Envirothon allows for the community to be exposed to the military and it improves the relationship between the two."

17 Wing will be hosting half of the competition this year, in addition to providing, food services, bus transportation, usage of the base theatre, and temporary housing for two nights. 19 teams consisting of five students and two teacher supervisors, will compete against each other in two categories: the field study and the oral presentation.

The field study component will take place at Oak Hammock Marsh, while the oral component of the competition will be held at the Building 90 gymnasium and theatre. In the oral component, teams are marked on their ability to analyze and come up with the best ideas to assess an environmental situation. The top four teams at the end of the preliminaries will vie for the honor to represent the province at the International Envirothon, to be held later on this summer in Acadia, Nova Scotia. It will be the first time that the competition will be hosted by a Canadian province.

Stunt Flying - The Inverted Jenny

In May, 1918, a stamp collector in Washington, DC, W.T. Robey, purchased a pane of 100 of the new 24c airmail stamps, in order to send covers to friends on the inaugural flight for airmail between Washington, Philadelphia and New York, scheduled for the following day. When he looked at what he had bought he quickly asked to see all other panes in stock, but his was the only different one - the centre illustration of a Curtiss Jenny was upside down. His further visit to other post offices in the city found only normal sheets. Mr. Robey knew he had something valuable, in particular when his pane of 100 proved to be the only one. And when officials of the United States Post Office attempted to buy it back from him he flatly refused the offer. A dealer then made him an offer of \$500.00,

which he rejected; he eventually sold the pane to a dealer for \$15,000. It soon changed hands again, for \$20,000 to a collector who kept a block of eight showing the margin inscriptions and sold the rest to a dealer. The rest of the stamps were subsequently sold to various other collectors. Today a single of the normal stamp has a catalogue value of \$105; the "Inverted Jenny" catalogues at \$150,000. Errors continue to occur. Canada's most-famous is the St. Lawrence Seaway invert of 1959 which has a catalogue value of \$15,000 Canadian. Inverts are the most spectacular and usually the most valuable of errors. So, when you next buy stamps, look at them before you use them; your investment may be better than Internet stocks.

435 SQUADRON AAR 'Hosers': Entering the Dark Side

Call me crazy, but I do remember a time when being called a hoser was not a term of endearment. Here at 435 Squadron, being a 'Hoser' is something to be proud of, and it is expected to 'pass gas'. Obviously Bob and Doug Mackenzie never heard of Air-to-Air Refueling (AAR). I wasn't an automatic Hoser when I arrived at 435 Sqn, it takes hard training and flying to earn this title. So like a few others at the squadron, I attended the Air-to-Air Refueling course. As 435 Squadron is the home of the CF's Air-Refueller's, the course is taught

at the squadron level. By itself, any course is an intense investment in resources (personnel and aircraft), let alone when you factor in the operational requirements, our other specialty role (SAR), and good-old fashioned strategic airlift. The ability to coordinate all pers, taskings, timings, and priorities and still meet the demands certainly says something about the character of the squadron.

Unfortunately I can only comment on the Navigator portion of the course, I do not feel that I could do justice to the Loadmasters or Flight Engineers. The course involves an intensive week of ground school as well as two weeks of deployed ops in Cold Lake and Bagotville. Fortunately, my previous TAT experience aided me. I was already familiar with concepts such as DEWS/SPS, ACO's, ATO's, SPINS, Corridor Ops, etc. So for myself, the week of ground school was a little less intensive. However Claudia did a great job of keeping pace with the lectures and the assignments.

It was during the ground school that I was able to note a major difference between AAR and TAT. Previously, my primary concern was with myself. My primary job was to get troops and equipment on the

drop zone, period. While listening to the radios, I only cared what was happening to me or the persons escorting me, that was all. This quickly changed while striving to be a Hoser. Now I calculate fuel requirements for me and those that I receive (our customers). While at the same time managing the offload of fuel to maximize both my loiter time and the fuel available for others (we can dish it out, but we can't take it!!).

Fortunately for all of us, our 2 week flying phase went without a hitch. We were able to tank multiple receivers, delivering large fuel loads. It was excellent training. The best part was that we were able to participate in some missions for the Fighter Weapons Instructor Course. It was a great opportunity to see all the pieces of the puzzle, RedFor, BlueFor, GCI, multiple receivers, as well as fairly fluid scenario.

What is the end result? I am now a qualified AAR crewmember, able to be deployed at a moment's notice, able to help fulfill an important mission for my squadron. Yes, I am a Hoser, yes I pass gas, I do not clean your windows or check your oil, but as Bob and Doug did say, "it's a beauty way to go!"

Emergency money: how much and where

LET'S FACE IT... MONEY EMERGENCIES are part of life. Unexpected expenses (such as home repairs) or life-altering events (such as unemployment or illness) can leave you in a financial bind. That's why it pays to prepare for the unexpected and put together an emergency cash reserve. By building up savings you can access easily in an emergency, you won't have to face the cost of borrowing when you suddenly need money. Plus, you won't be tempted to cash in Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP) contributions or other investments - a move that could create a serious tax burden and possibly jeopardize your retirement well-being.

It's a good idea to keep the equivalent of at least three months' net income in an emergency fund. Many experts suggest you go as far as six months' income - especially if you're worried about your job. Of course, the amount you need will also be influenced by your lifestyle, your current expenses and financial commitments, and whether you can rely on financial help from family and friends in a crisis.

So once you decide to play it safe, where should you put your money?

First and foremost, choose an investment that will preserve your capital rather than put it at risk. It's best to opt for an interest-generating investment, but that doesn't mean you should stick your money in a conventional bank account that offers little or no investment return. Here are some alternatives:

Money market mutual funds: This is one of the best bets for emergency funds. By investing in safe short-term government and high-quality corporate securities, money market funds provide security of capital and usually generate higher returns than bank accounts. What's more, many of them offer cheque-writing privileges, so you can access your money immediately. Even if you invest in a fund without a chequing option, you can get your money in a matter of days.

Canada Savings Bonds (CSBs): Backed by the federal government, these securities pay competitive interest and can be cashed at any bank on any business day. Since they are sold only at certain times of the year, you must plan in advance to invest in CSBs. Some provincial governments offer similar investments.

Cashable term deposits: Some financial institutions offer one-year term deposits that can be cashed in at any time without penalty. This way you can earn interest competitive with CSBs or Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GICs) without locking in your cash.

Emergency money pitfalls

What's not suitable for an emergency cash fund? First, anything that requires you to commit your cash for a fixed period without an early cash-in option should be avoided. Unless you have a large enough cash reserve to keep a portion immediately accessible at anytime, don't even lock in your money for a month, because that can seem like an eternity when you really need cash. And second, investments that can fluctuate in value, such as stocks and bond or equity mutual funds, are better reserved for your long-term financial plan - they are not designed as a quick-cash vehicle.

Your financial advisor can help you get started in creating an emergency cash fund by exploring the options that are right for you.

The peace-of-mind that comes from having money readily available when you need it is well worth the effort.

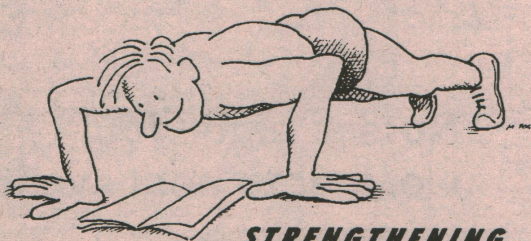

Womens Hockey - Prairie Region Invitational Tournament

Nine women hockey players and two coaches from 17 Wing Winnipeg recently attended the first-ever Prairie Region Womens Hockey Invitational Tournament held at Garrison Edmonton 19 - 24 Mar 00. The 17 Wing squad was augmented with players from CFB Shilo and 15 Wing Moose Jaw to fill out the roster and go into combat against teams from 4 Wing Cold Lake, CFB Edmonton and a Pacific Region composite team that was invited to participate in the Prairie Region Tournament. All members of the team truly appreciated having Frank and Chris there to control the bench and keep both gear and players up and running.

In the following game we would meet CFB Edmonton - with every one of us living in fear of coming up against former teammate Capt Cathy Potts...AKA "Boomer." The 17 Wing team stepped up, however, and struck first blood with a goal by WO Jackie "Be Nice" Wilson, CFB Shilo. Strong defensive play by veteran players Cpl Wanda "Don't Forget Your Burger at the Drive-Thru" Ruth, 15 Wing and Cpl Juan "My Rush is Slow - Live With It!" Fortowsky, W TISS kept the game close, but it would end in a 1-1 tie. Not too shabby...

Rather, for womens hockey the Regional Sports Director has a team specially selected from all teams in the region that then proceeds to Nationals as an all-star composite team. This year the Prairie Region team was comprised of seven players from 4 Wing, six from CFB Edmonton, two from 15 Wing and one player each from CFB Shilo and 17 Wing. Coaching staff was selected from CFB Edmonton and 17 Wing.

17 Wing Salutes Top Athletes, Coaches, Officials and Teams for 1999/2000

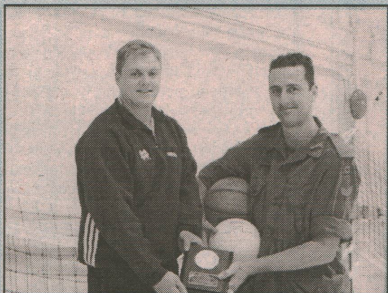

Do you have a Family Care Plan?

Unexpected events are a part of military life-being prepared helps the family cope with the accompanying stress. A Family Care Plan is designed to assist CF members in identifying persons who will care for their dependants in circumstances where they, the primary caregiver(s), cannot. In times of deployment, a childcare emergency can arise simply from the illness of the primary caregiver (often the spouse). The MFRC's Deployment & Emergency Childcare Service is designed as a back-up to your regular childcare provider and designated emergency childcare providers. Accessible 24hrs, the service is subsidized through the Directorate of Military Family Services and is administered by your local MFRC. For your information, the MFRC compiles current listings of care providers throughout the city to assist you in preparing your plan. Be prepared and be assured that the Emergency Childcare Service will be there to provide immediate, qualified and subsidized care to back-up your Family Care Plan!

Here is a quick questionnaire to help you assess where you are in the preparation of a family care plan.

Do you have ready answers to the following questions?

Is the service member in your family in a trade where he/she could be deployed on short notice?

Have you completed a pre-deployment check-list?

You are away on temporary duty and your spouse/caregiver becomes ill and cannot care for the children. What will you do?

At present you work days, but your supervisor has notified you that you will start working shifts in 2 weeks. Are you ready? Who will care for the children overnight or in the evenings?

You are a single parent going away on course in another city and are unable to bring your children. What would you do?

You are a single parent or a spouse (in the absence of your military spouse) and you need medical care in another city. What would you do?

You are a single parent or a spouse (in the absence of your military spouse) and your doctor tells you that you need bed rest for a month. What would you do?

You are having a hard time coping and need some respite care. What would you do?

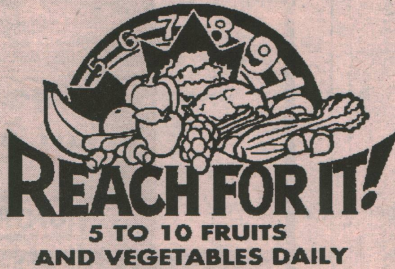


Deployment Emergency Childcare Service

By providing immediate, affordable, regulated childcare in times of emergency, the DEC service supports the ability of CF members to be available for duty, deployment, operations and training. In addition the DEC service supports the family of members tasked out of garrison, by providing back-up childcare services in times of emergency!

- The DEC service is available 24hrs by accessing a paging system at 935-7733. Every effort will be made to secure childcare within an hour!
- The emergency may be the result of an unexpected or short notice deployment/operation/training, where the member does not have sufficient time to implement his/her Family Childcare Plan. An emergency might also arise while the member is deployed and the spouse encounters medical or other problems, which disrupts the usual childcare arrangements and requires immediate alternative arrangements.
- The DEC program also provides general childcare resources to military families and referral to services for community members experiencing a childcare emergency.
- For childcare emergencies arising from deployment/operational related events, **funding has been made available** to fully cover reasonable costs incurred during the first 72hrs and pro-rated partial reimbursement up to a (max) 7 days.

Start the summer off with a bang, (or a crack of the bat) - bring your glove and your appetite and join us at the ballpark!

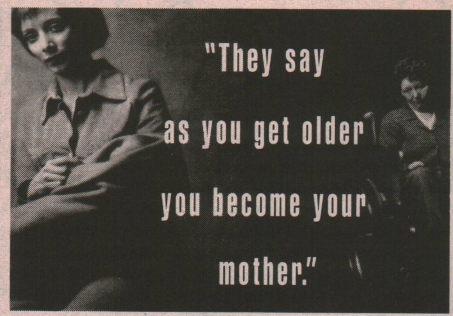

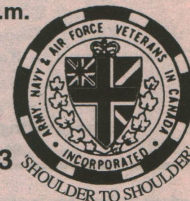

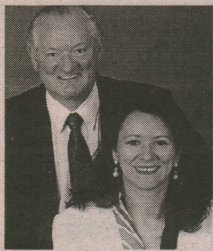
