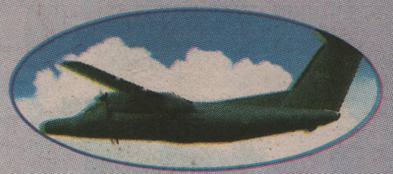

2000 Airlift Support Competition A Resounding Success

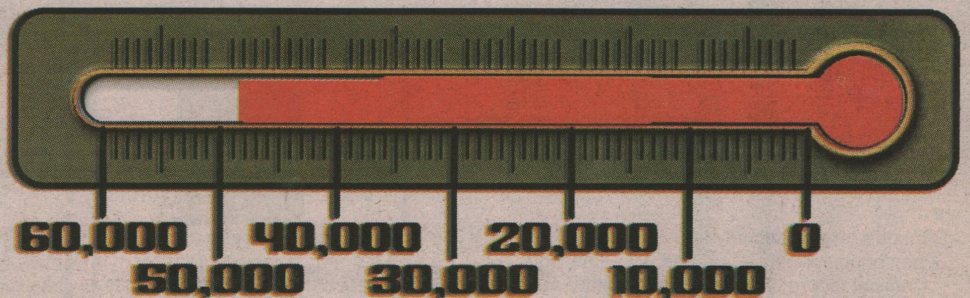

Resounding Success continued

The "First and Finest" from Winnipeg set the standard with several quick victories in some of the early "sports" events including netting and strapping a load onto a 108" pallet (Cpl Lorne Simms, MCpl Don Forbes), MB-1 chaining (Cpl Simms, Cpl Rick Burke, Cpl Mick Toutant and Cpl Laurie Moore) and pulling a 40" X 48" container through an obstacle course with a pallet jack (MCpl Forbes, Cpl Toutant). 2 Air Mov Sqn managed victories in three "sports" events and Cold Lake had one win. The finale of the "sports" portion was Ball Hockey. The main event for this sport occurred early as arch-rivals 1 Air Mov Sqn and 2 Air Mov Sqn met in the opening match. From a Trenton perspective it was ugly early as Cpl Tom Baker scored three quick goals for Winnipeg. Continued offense from Cpl Baker, Cpl Burke and Cpl Moore produced two more goals and the Winnipeg defense of MCpl Don Forbes and Capt Doug O'Neill and goalkeeping by Cpl Jack LeBlanc proved to be too much with the final score being 5-0. The final game (Winnipeg vs Team East) went 5-1 in favour of the home towners. The hard work that team leader Sgt Don Fougere put into pre-competition training for the 1 Air Mov Sqn Team was paying early dividends as six of the ten "sports" events went to Winnipeg including the Sports Overall Winner. As for the Core events, the momentum stayed with 1 Air Mov

Sqn. Of the five events that counted for points- Large Forklift, Warehouse Forklift, Team Load Preparation, Team On/Off Load and Combined Team Load - well let's just say that all of the hardware is still in 1 Air Mov Sqn's trophy case. The combined team load event was shared by Winnipeg and Cold Lake as it was truly an East vs West event. In the end, the final team overall scores were as follows:

- 1st Place 1 Air Mov Sqn 4366 pts
- 2nd Place Team West 3645 pts
- 3rd Place Team East 3380 pts
- 4th Place 2 Air Mov Sqn 3215 pts

For all organizers, judges, and supporting personnel from 1 Air Mov Sqn, a giant Bravo Zulu has to be passed on for putting together such a first class and entertaining competition. 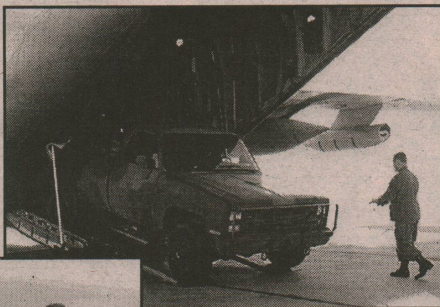

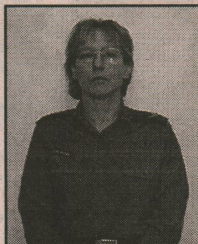
ARAF - A rewarding career

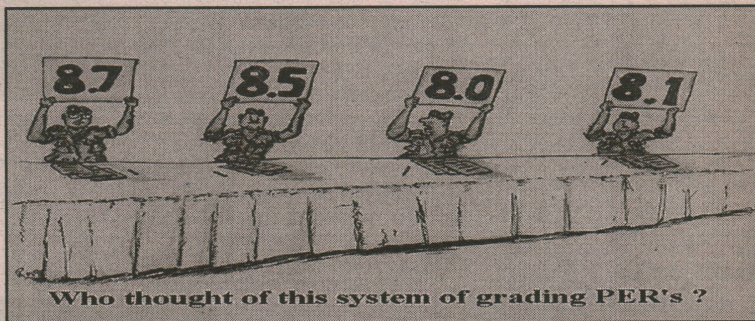
the opportunity to broaden her knowledge by taking several courses through the local Community College. She also completed her Qualification Level 5 Supply Technician.

HCol Ben Van Ruiten to stay on at 17 Wing another year

What exactly is an honorary colonel and how can you be one? Well, if anyone wants to be the Honorary Colonel of 17 Wing you'll have to fight HCol Van Ruiten for it, because he's not leaving anytime soon.

In January of 1994, Wing Commander of 17 Wing, Colonel J.R.B Proulx appointed Mr. Ben Van Ruiten to be the Honorary Colonel of 17 Wing. Recently, he has accepted the second extension of his position that will prolong his commitment from January 2001 to the end of the year 2002. "I'm really very pleased. I'd like to do it as long as I can - as long as I'm healthy and I feel that I can contribute."

HCol Van Ruiten was an interpreter and an accountant in The Netherlands before emigrating to Canada where he joined the Florists Supply Co. in 1952. In 1972 he became General Manager and in 1979 became President and C.E.O. of the company. In this time, HCol Van Ruiten was also President of the Cecil Delworth Foundation, and was the National President of Flowers Canada Inc. He was the Honorary Consul of the Netherlands to Manitoba from 1977-94 and has been the chairman of the Manitoba International Tattoo since 1998.

The history behind the position of the Honorary Colonel can be traced back to the day when the King of Britain would appoint a courtier to be the colonel of an army regiment. These colonels would

be people of high social standing who could afford to pay for the regiment's expenses. The Colonel would then hire someone more capable of running the regiment.

Today, each unit is commanded by a lieutenant-colonel and the colonel position has evolved into the honorary colonel position, responsible for looking after the morale and the wider interests of the unit. An honorary colonel does not have to be a former member of the Canadian Forces. In fact, the position only requires someone who can be a good liaison between the community and the military, while attending as many Wing functions as possible. The honorary colonel should be a distinguished citizen with solid business connections in the community. HCol Van Ruiten fits the bill, but he does have a couple of his own reasons for accepting the extension. "I

feel like I have a debt to pay to the veterans who have made the ultimate sacrifice. And I like being involved with the young people through the cadet organization."

When asked if being 17 Wing's Honorary Colonel places a large demand on his time, he says, "If you want to do the job right, it is time-consuming." His extension for the 8th year of service to the community and to 17 Wing would imply that he is indeed doing the job right.

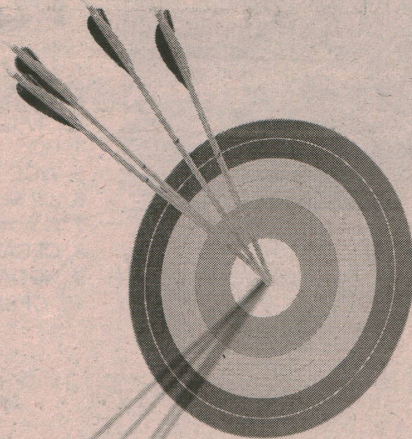

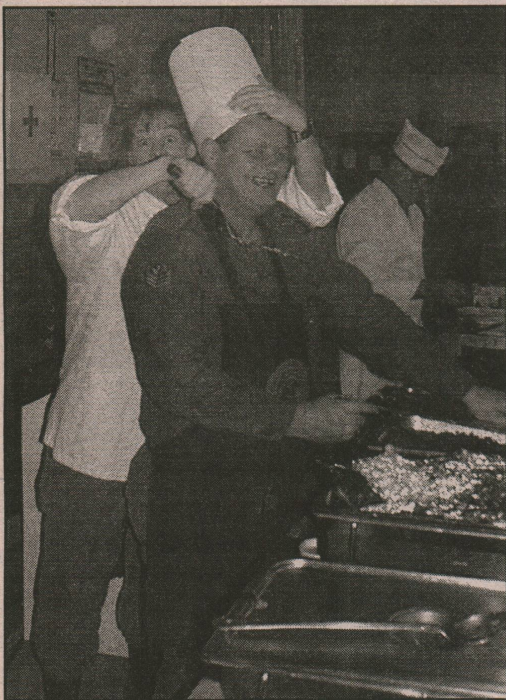

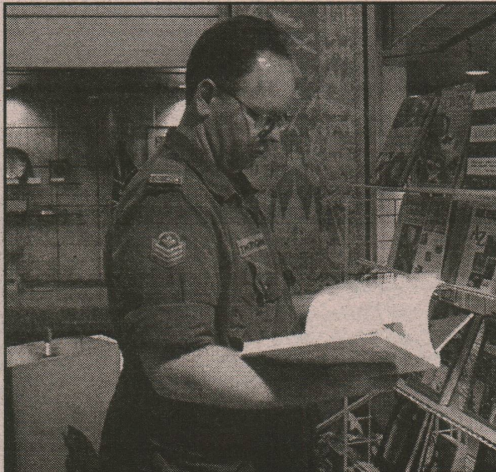

Wing TIS Connects

Greetings from the 17 Wing Telecommunications and Information Systems Squadron. This long handle explains why we prefer to use our abbreviated squadron title - Wing TIS.

So who is Wing TIS, and would you notice if we disappeared? Well, if you use a phone or a computer in the course of your work, the answer to that is a resounding 'Yes!' However, Wing TIS does do more than computers and phones.

The Wing TIS OC is Maj Gary Banks, and the squadron itself consists of a headquarters staff and four flights. Information System Maintenance (ISM) is headed by Capt Mike Rehman and is responsible for maintaining and operating all secure communications on the Wing. This includes the message centre and the local area networks and standalone systems in the AOC. Information System Operations (IS Ops) is headed by Mr Dave Evitt and is responsible for maintaining and operating all non-secure networks and standalone systems on the Wing; the help desk works for this flight. All admin LAN software and hardware purchases and maintenance are IS Ops responsibility,



ties, as is managing the 17 Wing Internet LAN. Technical Maintenance (TM) is headed by MWO Frank Arsenault, and looks after all audio-visual systems, including PA's at parades and other such events, as well as all projects involving the moving, running and

removing of cables, including telephone lines and connections. Finally, Information Systems Security is the responsibility of Capt Kilmeny Jones, and oversees certification and accreditation work for all new information systems, provides information system security awareness training, and information system security incident reporting.

17 Wing itself, North and South sides, is a fairly large area of responsibility, in terms of providing information system and phone support. There are over 2000 computer terminals connected to our Admin LAN alone. However, Wing TIS responds to trouble calls from Reserve, Regular Force and Cadet units from Saskatchewan through Thunder Bay, as well. We provide true tri-service support to army, navy and air force units throughout this area, with the exception of CFB Shilo. We also intend to provide a more consistent presence in VoxAir, to ensure that we're not 'just' remembered when things don't work!

The SHADOWS of Christmas 17 Medical Squadron Nursing Officers

The season of Christmas cheer is fast approaching and although a time of much anticipated happiness and family get togethers not everyone looks forward to it. Some of us do not have family, nor do we go home to visit, we have no children, spouses or relatives that live at our current posting. We have a hard time seeing other families laughing and celebrating love. The greens and reds of the season fast become the "BLUES".

Everyone gets "depressed" from time to time because of disappointments or frustrations of daily life. After a short period of feeling unhappy or sad, however, circumstances may change and our mood improves. But for many people, the symptoms of depression are more severe and last longer. Sometimes it gets to the point where it affects our activities of daily living.

Depression is a medical illness not unlike diabetes, high blood pressure or a broken leg. Other people can't always see that you have it. A person with depression can not change his or her mood any more than diabetics can use willpower to change their blood sugar level. Depression is most often associated with four types of symptoms: CHANGES IN MOOD, PHYSICAL SYMPTOMS, CHANGES IN THOUGHT PATTERNS, AND ANXIETY.

Depression is a medical illness that can be treated- like that broken leg. So, if you are concerned about your blues, it is important to seek help as soon as possible. You can see a Physician (5595) a Nurse (5116/5621/5906), or come in on sick parade. (We are open on weekends from 1000 to 1200.) You can also see a Padre (5087), or a Social Worker (5086). You can call the MFRC (489-7003) or The Member Assistance Program at 1-800-268-7708.

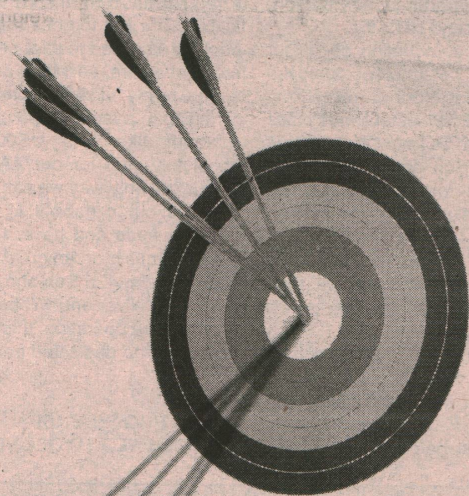
All are confidential. You can call direct to any of these numbers. If you choose a route outside of the actual medical department (i.e. Doctor/Nurse) the information is private unless a concern is raised as to you harming yourself or someone else, then a doctor *must* become involved in your care.

Unfortunately society has placed a stigma on depression; but like snowflakes it abounds in plenty and no two are alike. Treatment does help and can put more colours back into your life. You just have to be willing to make that first step. We are here and we care.

Chinthe's contribution to Unified Spirit 2000

Mission accomplished once again by the 435 Sqn "Hoser" detachment who made a significant contribution to the Unified Spirit 2000 (US00) Exercise. Before we elaborate on 435 Sqn's involvement in US00, let me define what exactly US00 is all about. To start with, Unified Spirit is a NATO Joint LIVEX (live exercise) that took place during the month of October 2000, predominantly on the American East Coast in the operating areas of Virginia. A medium level of NATO participation was also part of the exercise with diverse level of contribution from the following countries: Canada, Germany, France, Denmark, the United Kingdom and obviously the United States.

The Canadian contribution to this joint exercise came from various units and HQ and from all three elements. The Maritime Force was present via the Maritime Atlantic Canadian Task Group. 1 RCR, 4 AD Regt, elements of 2 CMBG and HQ personnel mainly represented the Land Force. The Air force deployed 1 KC-130, 6 CF-18, 4 CT-133, 1 CP-140, 4 CH-124, 1 TPS-70 and 8 ACCS with their new mobile ATS. To this summary list of players, we have to add a number of staff and support personnel from many units and HQs.

As far as our Sqn contribution goes, our Air-to-Air Refueling detachment deployed to MCAS Cherry Point, North Carolina from Oct 16 until Oct 28, 2000, established office and based all our sorties from Cherry Point. We deployed as a Sqn detachment of 21 personnel broken down in 2 flying crew (permitting 2 sorties per day and more if required), 7 of our best Servicing techs and one very busy Ops Officer. In conjunction with the Sqn Detachment itself, we filled one "Tanker liaison officer" position on the USS Mount Whitney.

If we put our contribution in numbers, here is what it looks like:

- 15 missions flown, including one deployment refueling of 5 CF-18 from Bagotville to Cherry point, almost half of those sorties

- were during night operation;
- 245 700 lbs. of jet fuel offloaded (144 530 litres);

- Tasked to refuel a variety of receivers including the CF-18, USMC/USN F/A-18, USMC AV-8B Harrier, USN F-14 Tomcat, USN S-3 Viking and EA-6B Prowler.

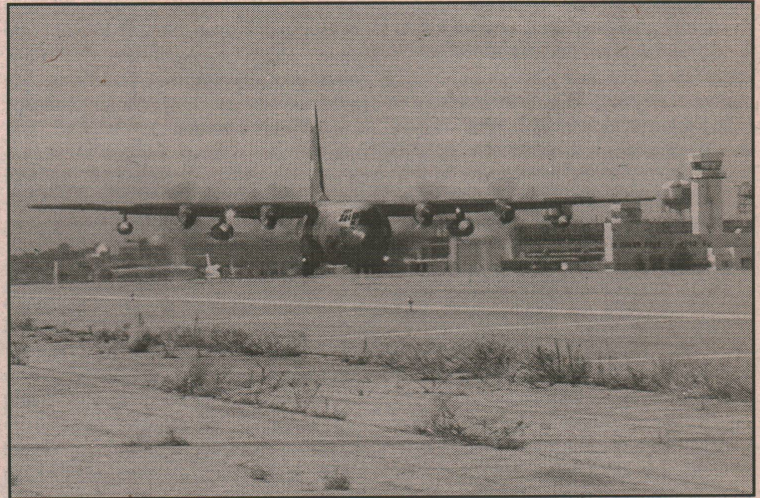
Nowadays, it is almost unavoidable to measure the success of any specific operation by all the stats and numbers associated with it. However, it is also crucial to understand that the evaluation of our Sqn contribution to US00 goes way beyond the stats point of view. Every time the Sqn deploys a detachment to any specific exercise or to a real theater of operation, we practice our mandated capability to deploy one KC-130 with two flying crews and required maintenance anywhere in the world with a 10 days notice to move period.

US00 was an excellent platform to enhance some skills that we do not normally practice on a regular basis like secure communications, Intelligence briefs tailored to each sortie, tasked via ATO/ACO and SPINS, practice Combat Search and Rescue procedures, refuel receivers like USN F-14 that we do not operate with on a continuous basis, and the list could go on and on. After every deployment, we come back with many lessons learned; US00 was no different in that perspective. With a constant roll over of personnel at the Sqn, it becomes crucial to practice those skills on a regular basis to ensure that the lessons learned are not forgotten and to sustain a pool of knowledgeable and experienced crew members, servicing and support personnel ready for deployment.

Training in a tactical and operational environment like this US00 exercise is absolutely vital for our AAR detachment. This is the only way we can learn, train and exercise our capability to interact with a coalition force and have a significant and positive impact on any real time operation.

Once again, 435 Sqn showed its determination to deliver and will be ready to do so in any future operation, thanks to all its professional and dedicated personnel.

435 Squadron's 56th Birthday

If you were driving your vehicle on base Wednesday afternoon, Nov 1st, you might have noticed a group of 435 Squadron members walking towards the senior ranks mess... making their way to celebrate their unit's 56th birthday!

Several distinguished guests attended the occasion including the 435 Honorary Col - Gen Law, the Wing Commander - Col McLennan (accompanied by his aide, Capt Manson), the Honorary Wing Commander - Col Van Ruiten, the Wing Chief - CWO Emond and, last but not least, the A1 Pers from 1CAD HQ - LCol Thuen. A number of former squadron members were also part of the crowd, an indication of how strong Chinthe'ties are and remain over time!

The event began with a few official presentations made by 435 Sqn Commanding Officer - LCol Whitburn. CD recipients were Capt Hickey, Sgt Burgess and Sgt Waters (CD1). Capt Ouellet was given a Humanitarian Bar, for his contribution to Operation Relief in Somalia. In recognition of SAR technicians work, operational certificates were given to Sgt Warden and MCpl Lazarowich. MCpl Lazarowich, whose total jumps recently reached the one hundred mark, actually received three certificates!

Members were able to enjoy a share of cake and some refreshments, preceded by an outline of 435 history by the unit CO. At a time of year where remembrance is of particular importance, it seemed appropriate to include this historical outline in this month's Chinthe Bits:

435 Transport Squadron was effectively formed on Nov 1st, 1944, at Gujrat, Punjab, India. During the campaign, the squadron flew Dakota aircraft in support of the British Fourteenth Army in Northern Burma. While in the Far East theatre of operations the squadron flew 15681 sorties.

Following the Second World War, on Apr 1st in 1946, 435 Squadron was disbanded at Down Ampney, Gloucestershire, England. The squadron was reformed later, on Aug 1st of that same year, in Edmonton, Alberta. Flying Dakota airplanes, the squadron's peacetime mission was to ensure Western Canada transport and support parachute training at Rivers, Manitoba.

In 1952, the squadron was re-equipped with the Fairchild C-119 Flying Boxcar. Due to its larger cargo capacity, greater range, and ease of loading, the Boxcar played an incredible role in opening up one of

Canada's last frontiers: the Arctic. The aircraft was also instrumental in the airlift of the United Nations Emergency Force from Italy to Egypt in the fall and winter of 1956-57.

The first of the Lockheed C-130 'B' model Hercules aircraft arrived in 1960. Once again, the squadron had an aircraft more capable than the last. The squadron exchanged its 'B' models for the newer 'E' models in 1966. From 1973 to 1992, the newer 'H' model Hercules were purchased to supplement the older 'E' models of the fleet.

Finally, in the summer of 1994, 435 Squadron was relocated to Winnipeg after having spent 48 years in Edmonton.

Congratulations to all present and former squadron members for contributing to 56 years of Determined Delivery! Congratulations also to all those medal and certificate recipients, who showed a true example of that determination with their accomplishments and dedication to the service. Indeed, time does fly by, perhaps even more so in the air force?!

Chinthe Bits

The squadron has been kept rather busy of late, with crews and airplanes scattered all over the place! This was especially true with the Air-to-Air Refueling section, who deployed one airplane and a group of about twenty members to represent the squadron in Exercise Unified Spirit. The exercise took place at USMC Cherry Point, North Carolina, from Oct 16th - 30th. The Air-to-Air Refueling course was also underway Nov 14th - Dec 1st. Capt Lizotte (Plt), Maj Oreziak (Nav), Sgt Neeve & Sgt Blanchet (FE) and MCpl Marin (LM) will be the newest Oilers around.

435 Sqn has responded to a few distress calls in the past month, namely an overdue Jetski in Thunderbay (ON), an overdue airplane in Port Radium (NWT), and two Emergency-Locator-Transmitters in northern Alberta.

The SAR technicians shop sent a four member team off to Port Hardy (BC) to participate in a Divex from Nov 4th - 6th. On Nov 13th - 17th, our SAR technicians are doing their night jumps into the Shilo Ranges as the squadron conducts its scheduled Flarex.. They are also undergoing Medical Bridging Training at the SAR School in Comox (BC) and the Justice Institute in New Westminster (BC). This will make our SAR technicians comparable paramedics and hopefully get them a certification (once all the details are worked out between departments).

While aircrews are away on long range trainer and cadet familiarization flights or

CASARA training and evaluation sessions, the ground crews are also getting their fair share of work. In effect, the maintenance section is busier than one armed paper hangers these days, due to a heavy rotation of our qualified technicians with no replacements. Surprisingly they still manage to get serviceable airplanes on the line, enabling the accomplishment of our various missions.

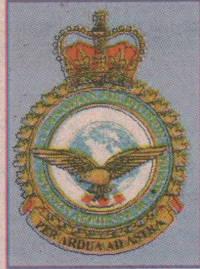

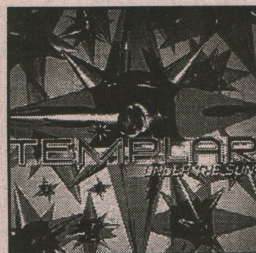

And at first blush, it seems that the media giant's A&R staff have found something to brag about in this West Coast outfit. 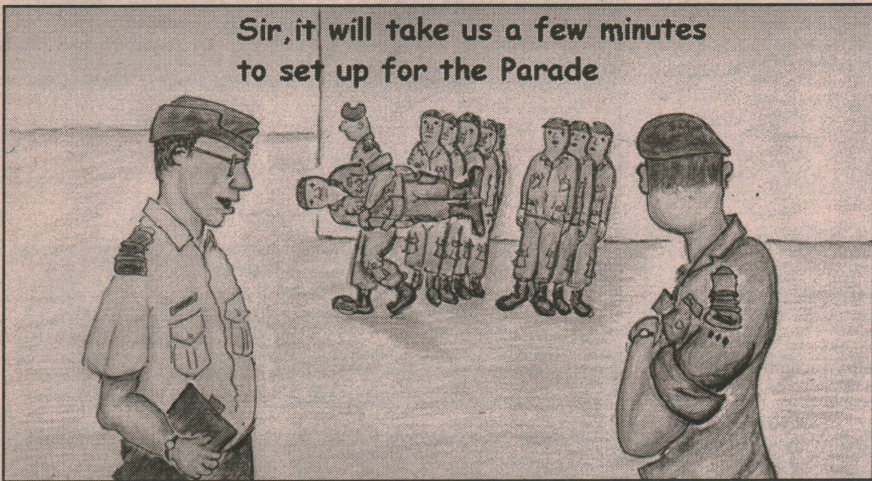

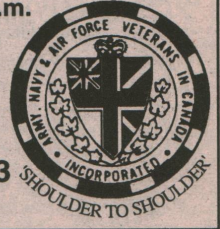
