# Tragic Fire

At approximately 4 a.m. on the first of March, MCpl Scott Cassidy, a communications expert with First Regiment Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, heard the smoke alarm go off and quickly told his eldest son to flee from their house. Tyler, a 13-year old eighth grade student and Jamie Tilford, Cassidy's brother-in-law, were lucky enough to get out of the smoking house without harm. MCpl Cassidy and two-and-a-half year old Nathaniel, were not so fortunate. When MCpl Cassidy, the thirty-five year old father of two went back into the burning house to retrieve his youngest son, the smoke was so stifling that it claimed the lives of the brave father and the young boy.

Murray Bedford, an investigator with the fire commissioner's office said that the fire began in the kitchen of the home, as a stove grease fire, one of the toughest types of fires to fight due to its quick nature and intensity. The two survivors of the blaze, Jaime

Tisfeld and Tyler Cassidy have been staying with friends and have been offered a furnished home by the base, for as long as they may need it.

MCpl Cassidy, originally from Halifax, N.S., was a fifteen-year veteran of the CF and has served in such places as Kingston, Ont., Shilo, and Trenton, Ont.. This was his second posting to Shilo. He has served on peacekeeping missions in Cyprus, the Golan Heights and East Timor, his most recent deployment.

The Commanding Officer of 1 RCHA, LCol Alan Howard, reflects on the loss. "He will be fondly remembered for his great contributions to the Canadian Forces both here in Canada and on several peacekeeping missions overseas. MCpl Cassidy was an outgoing soldier who was well respected by all of us. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family during this difficult time."

A regiment memorial service was held the day after the tragedy, attended by more than 400 members. A community service took place the following Tuesday.

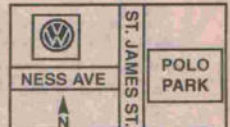

## Second mine strike in the temporary security zone

On the morning of the 14 of March at 11:45 (local time), a BISON armoured vehicle from the Canadian Task Force East Africa struck a mine while conducting operations near the town of Tsorena, Eritrea

The explosion resulted in one minor injury, a ruptured eardrum, and some damage to the vehicle. The mine detonated near the front right side of the vehicle, which had three soldiers onboard. It is currently unclear as to what type of mine was struck. The soldiers were evacuated to be medically assessed and the vehicle will be recovered by an engineer team from the Slovak contingent.

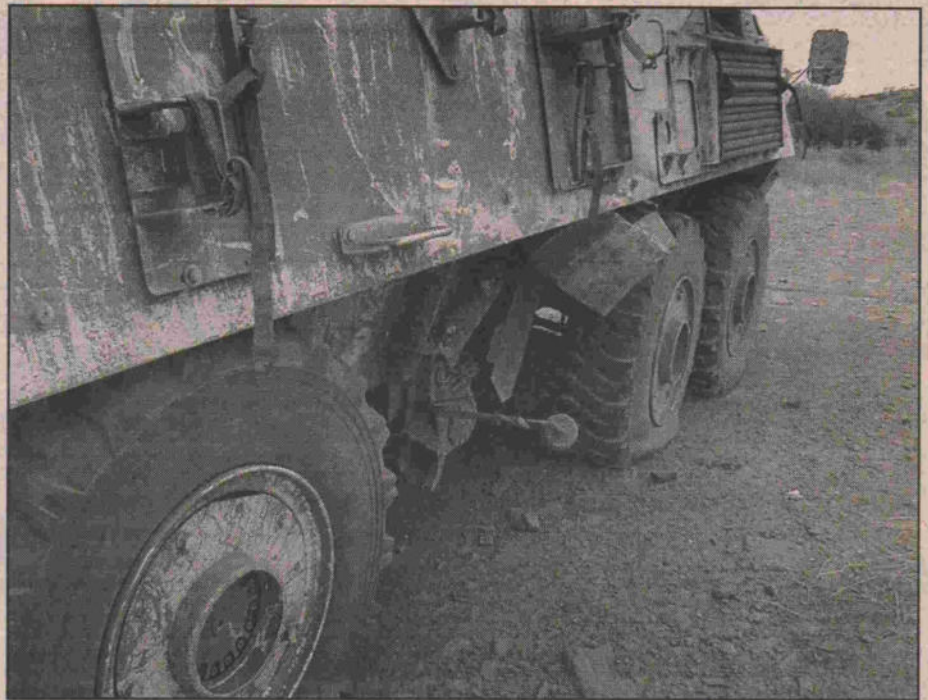
Today's incident took place approximately 560 meters from yesterday's mine strike involving a Canadian Forces Light Armoured Vehicle (LAV III).

The incident occurred 4km North East of the town of Tsorena on a proven route.

Immediately after the incident occurred a movement ban was placed on all routes North of Tsorena for Canadian Forces personnel. United Nation Mission in Ethiopia and Eritrea (UNMEE) Force Engineer Company will provide additional assets tomorrow to clear these routes of any mines.

The Canadian Forces are currently providing troops to a Battalion of the Royal Dutch Marines in the United Nations Mission to Ethiopia / Eritrea. The mobility of the force is paramount in order to accomplish the job of establishing and monitoring the Temporary Security Zone between the nations of Ethiopia and Eritrea. Enabling Canadian Forces and others to move freely throughout the Zone is crucial to the success of the mission.

An investigation is currently looking into the circumstances of both incidents.

## Navy opens submarine service to women

CDS General Maurice Baril has announced that women will serve in submarines.

Vice Admiral Greg Maddison, head of Canada's Navy, recommended the decision, which is strongly supported by the Honourable Art Eggleton, Minister of National Defence.

"Women should have every opportunity to pursue their career goals

and aspirations within the new Navy," General Baril stated. "This decision enables them to serve in any vessel in the fleet, including the new VICTORIA Class Submarines," he added.

"Women can do the job at sea exceedingly well," said Vice Admiral Maddison, further adding, "Integration of women into the surface fleet has been and continues to be

a success. We anticipate exactly the same result for our submarines."

The Canadian Human Rights Tribunal, in making its 1989 decision that women could be excluded from submarine service in the OBERON Class submarines because of privacy concerns, also stated that the decision should be reviewed upon the acquisition of new submarines.

Therefore, when Canada acquired four ex-UPHOLDER diesel-electric submarines from the United Kingdom, the decision was taken to re-examine the issue.

Among other improvements, mess decks in the VICTORIA Class boats will result in significantly less traffic through the accommodation spaces and thus more privacy than was the case in the

now retired OBERON Class.

HMCS VICTORIA, the first of the four new submarines, arrived in Canada on Monday, October 23rd 2000 and was commissioned into the Canadian Navy on Saturday, December 2nd. The remaining three submarines, WINDSOR, CORNER BROOK and CHICOUTIMI are expected to arrive in Canada at

six-month intervals over the next two years.

Submarines are crewed to the greatest extent possible by volunteers. Occasionally, operational necessity requires the assignment of non-volunteers to submarines to fill key jobs. With this decision, qualified women will now also be considered for selection to those jobs.

# Canada's First Postage Stamp

The early history of Canada saw Europeans landing on the east coast of North America looking for the riches of the Orient. But they did not find the gold and spices they were looking for, and began searching for a passage through or around this new land. They did, however, find a new source of wealth, the beaver. Fashionably-dressed men of Europe in this time wore hats made of felt, which was produced from fur shaved from animal pelts. The best was beaver fur. When explorers discovered the abundance of beaver in North America the search was on, as in the next centuries exploration of our continent was driven by the need for beaver fur to satisfy the European market. From Québec came the French: Champlain, Radisson and Groselliers, La Verendrye and many others, pushing farther west and north looking for new wealth. From Hudson Bay, after 1670, there were Kelsey, Henday and Hearne. And when Canada became British in 1763 the Nor'Westers, carried on, moving farther west: Fraser, Thompson, Mackenzie. They explored because the new land was there to be found, but there was also the lure of great wealth, the beaver.

In 1851 the British colony of Canada (Canada East and West, present day Québec



and Ontario), issued their first postage stamps. The stamp was designed by Sandford Fleming, an engineer and the chief surveyor of the CPR, our first transcontinental railway. It was the problem of coordinating affairs of a railway over such a long distance that led Fleming to propose the use of time zones; he is remembered by many as "The Father of Standard Time." The lowest value, three pence, fittingly pictured a beaver. Some stories tell of Fleming designing the stamp on a restaurant table cloth as he shared a meal with the Postmaster

General. Collectors wanting to have one of these in their collection must be prepared to spend thousands of dollars for even an inferior copy, so few of us have one. However, now we all can buy one, for on April 6 Canada Post, to mark the one hundred and fiftieth anniversary of Canada's first postage stamp, will issue a forty seven cent stamp picturing the three pence beaver. This will be popular with collectors, not only for its historical value but also for those who collect such topics as stamps on stamps and animals on stamps.

# "When the Uniform Comes Off."

## The Pack by Don Keachie

It is 6:00 AM on a frigid February morning. Just outside Marquette, Manitoba, a pack of 8 Alaskan Malamutes are waiting patiently in their oversized kennels. In their eyes, Marty Lee, a Traffic Tech from 17 Wing is the pack leader. He disappears from their sight, and for a moment, there is complete silence as the dogs strain to hear what they are longing to hear. Marty emerges from his garage carrying a tangle of lines, rings, and snap-hooks. This innocent action sets off a cacophony of barks and yips, and behind the chain-link enclosure, the Malamutes go wild. They know what the boss is carrying. He lets the dogs out, attaching them one by one to a harness that will join them together as a team for the rest of this crisp winter day. The excited dogs are about to do what Malamutes do best - long distance sledding!

Marty has had a passion for dogs all his life. As a hobby, dog sledding evolved from his love of camping in Algonquin Park during the summer. Often he would hike deep into the bush with two of his Labrador Retrievers. As time marched on, however, his attitude began to change. "I got to the point where I just couldn't stand the black flies and mosquitoes. It wasn't fun anymore," he said.

So, Marty began camp-

ing in the fall, going later each season. Eventually he settled into winter camping.

"I just love being outdoors in the winter. Of course, you have to invest some dollars to buy good kit, so that you're comfortable. But once you start winter camping, you'll never want to return to camping in the summer," he said.

Labrador Retrievers are not well suited to the winter environment, so Marty began looking for a breed of dog that he could take on winter camping trips. He wanted a dog that could pack in its own food, and haul some of his photography equipment. After extensive research, he decided the best breed for the job was the Alaskan Malamute. He found a reputable breeder from whom he purchased a young female named "Kinder." The pair enjoyed many camping trips that first winter. Malamutes are still bred to perform their traditional role of pulling heavy loads over long distances. In competition, a single dog can pull well over 1200 lbs by itself! This differs greatly from the Alaskan Huskies you see on TV and at the Festival de Voyageur. Huskies are amazing athletes that are built for speed and endurance, but by comparison are not good at hauling heavy weights.

A Malamute can also haul up to one-third of its body weight on its back, using pouches that resem-

ble a horse's saddlebags.

"It was amazing, watching Kinder work with the backpack that first winter," Marty said.

"If I get another dog," he thought, "I can build a small sled and get them to carry all my equipment, while I break trail for them on my snowshoes."

Marty contacted the same breeder he had purchased his first Malamute from, and as luck would have it, the breeder was looking for a home for one of Kinders' littermates, a stocky animal named "Carson." The two got along famously, and Marty's dog sledding

career officially began. In 1992, the trio was posted to Edmonton. Marty quickly became friends with one of the local Malamute breeders who showed his dogs in the confirmation ring. The fellow needed a way to keep his own dogs in shape, and allowing Marty to use them as sled dogs was the perfect solution. So, in no time at all Marty went from 2 dogs pulling his sled to a full team of 8 Alaskan Malamutes. Under ideal trail conditions, they would be capable of sustaining speeds over 18 kph! The team was now able to travel longer distances with more weight,

and they began to explore the Alberta wilderness. "Elk Island Park was an amazing place," Marty said. "On any given day, I could spot moose, buffalo, elk, coyotes, and sometimes wolves." Operating a sled team in an environment brimming with wildlife requires an enormous amount of concentration, trust, and focus on the dogs.

"If I saw the dogs react in a certain way, I knew there was something on the trail. I wouldn't even stop to see what it was. I would turn the team around and find a different route. You don't want to

argue over who's using the trail when you run into a Bull Moose," he said. Placing trust in your team's instincts, sense of smell, and sense of direction, is paramount.

An unexpected blizzard in 1993, near Hinton, Alberta, put that trust to the test. Marty and a team of four dogs were on the final leg of a three-day trip. They were sledding in the area of Hinton, close to where the Canadian Forces Land Survival School was located at the time. Before starting the journey, Marty

had consulted with the school instructors who had given him topographical maps and pointed out many landmarks by which the team could navigate.

"It was back in the days of no GPS (Global Positioning System), no cell phones or satellite phones. You used a map and compass, along with landmarks to navigate," Marty said. The sled team was about 6 hours from the end of their trip, when it began to snow. They pushed on for another hour, unfortunately missing a crucial landmark

that would have guided them in the proper direction. At one point the trip became a battle of wills, as Marty's lead dog would insist on going in one direction, after being commanded by Marty to go in another. Weather conditions deteriorated as the snow intensified. "Visibility was reduced to 100 or 200 meters," he recalled. He could no longer navigate using landmarks, and the team became lost.

At this point, Marty had a choice. He could dig in and wait for the weather to improve, or attempt to make it back to the start point where his vehicle

was parked. He was certain they were still 4 or 5 hours away. Having years of winter camping experience, Marty was not overly worried about surviving the storm. What really bothered him was the idea of being considered AWOL if he didn't make it back to work in time. To make matters worse, he began to worry that once people knew he was late, an all out Search and Rescue operation might be launched!

As the snow continued to make the situation miserable, Marty recalled a conversation he had with a trapper earlier that season.

He remembered the trapper saying that the handler had to trust the lead dog, and that would make or break a team. On every sledding trip, Marty conducted an experiment based on that idea. When the journey was about two-thirds complete, he would yell to his lead dog "Kinder, truck. Find the truck." Off they would go, with no directional commands from Marty. They made it back with ease, every time. Marty gambled, and made his decision. They had to make it out of the bush today. He checked over the dogs and harnesses, got back on his sled, and

issued the command: "Kinder, truck. Find the truck." The team set off into the blizzard, in a direction chosen by the lead dog. Amazingly, four hours later, based solely on the decisions of his lead animal, Marty and his team of snow-covered Malamutes made it back to the safety of his truck!

Stories like that are common in the world of Malamute owners, which is why Lee bristles when he hears professional handlers question the breeds intelligence level.

"Malamutes are not eager to serve you. Their main purpose in life is to be your best friend and companion, not to perform cute tricks," he said. "They think and act independently." At the same time, they do love to work as a team, and make outstanding pets. Marty and his wife Lucinda have worked with many local youth organizations.

They've given organized tours of their kennels, and sled rides to all who visit. They do not offer rides for commercial purposes such as "Johnny's birthday party."

When it's time for an older dog to retire from sledding, Marty begins the meticulous process of a breeding program to find a replacement dog. He is a licensed breeder, and is registered under the "Howling Moon Kennel" name. He follows the Canadian Kennel Club's breed standard for Alaskan Malamutes, which helps to ensure a strong, healthy lit-

ter. "One of the most interesting aspects of owning this many dogs is watching the social dynamics of the pack," Marty said. "It's both funny, and educational, watching how the dogs work out their social hierarchy. As one dog gets older, and perhaps a little weaker, one of the younger dogs will push him to see what it can get away with." It's a social setting that Marty and Lucinda will be a part of for years to come.

Long after you and I have finished supper, and well past a reasonable bedtime for a weekday, Master Corporal Marty Lee and his team of Malamutes, turn their sled towards home. They glide past a familiar landmark like quiet ghosts in the snow. All of them know that in two hours, they'll be back home, but they are not in a rush. Their faces are painted white with frost, as the Northern Lights dance brightly across the rural sky. The only sound for miles is that of the gentle padding of dog's paws on hard-packed snow. Although they are focused on the silvery-white trail ahead, Marty and his team are supremely relaxed, doing what they enjoy the most. Ranger, the lead dog tonight, keeps tension on the harness, encouraging the other dogs to stay strong. "Ranger, home. Find home."

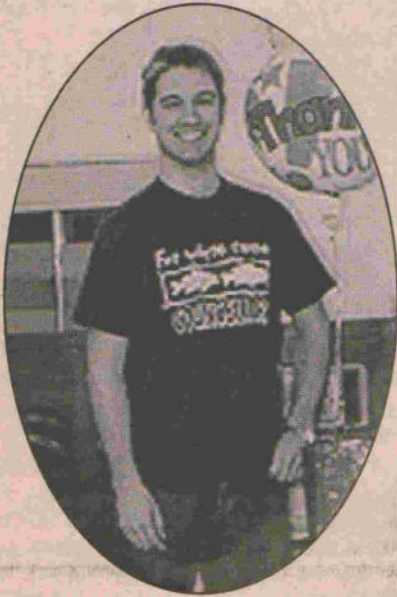

# Volunteer Program at the MFRC

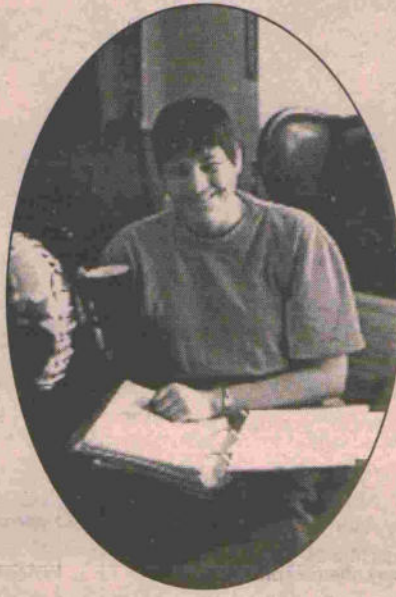

# 1 Air Movement Squadron builds for "Habitat for Humanity"

For the fourth consecutive year, 17 Wing's 1 Air Movement Squadron (1AMS) has kept up the tradition of a good old-fashioned barn raising, albeit in miniature. On Monday, March 5, 2001, at a ceremony at 10 Hangar, 1 AMS presented its 'Livery stable' contribution to Habitat for Humanity's "Playhouses for Hope 2001". In the short ceremony, 17 Wing Deputy Wing Commander, Lieutenant-Colonel Stephan Kummel, and 1 AMS Commanding Officer, Major Brook Bangsbo, formally donated the playhouse to Ms. Mary Williams, Executive Director of Winnipeg Habitat for Humanity. The 'Livery Stable' was one of seven playhouses on display, each having been donated by various organizations from the Winnipeg area.

The "Playhouses for Hope" event is organized annually by Habitats for Humanity, which is an independent, non-profit

housing program that is dedicated to eliminating poverty housing by building homes in partnership with families in need. Raffle tickets for the playhouses are sold for \$2 each and were available for purchase at the Home Expressions Show at the Winnipeg Convention Centre from March 7-11, 2001, and at the St. Vital Centre from March 12 to April 1, 2001, where all the playhouses will be on display.

Builders of the 1 AMS playhouse, Sgt Blair Sherwood and Cpl Dan Fraser, have been involved with "Playhouses for Hope" for the last four years. They also contribute many Saturday hours, along with other members of 1 AMS and 402 Squadron, to the actual construction of the family homes. The playhouse design was inspired by an authentic 1890s military livery stable first seen by Sgt Sherwood at CFB Kingston four years ago. Last year's effort by

The playhouse is valued at an estimated \$2600. Funding for the


playhouse construction came from sponsor Kevin Weibe of FWS Construction and Revy Home and Garden provided the necessary materials at cost. Also contributing to this

worthwhile charity were MCpl Jackson and the Transport Section who donated both trucks and volunteer drivers to gather the playhouses and move them to their final display location. Due to

the hard work and dedication of these members of 17 Wing, a lucky child is going to enjoy an incredible playhouse, and a lucky family will someday enjoy a new home.

- \* Learn to delegate effectively
- \* Establish and approach deadlines realistically
- \* Learn to say 'no'
- \* Take 'time-outs' - vacations, long weekends, regular daily breaks
- \* Don't take work home
- \* Handle home chores more efficiently using all resources available
- \* Develop a regular sleep routine
- \* Commit to regular exercise or physical activity
- \* Give yourself permission to have leisure time and make it a priority

Despite the complexity of the problem and the elusiveness of the solution, one thing is certain - for the well being of all Canadians, learning to enjoy free time and establishing work-life harmony is not a luxury; it is a necessity!
