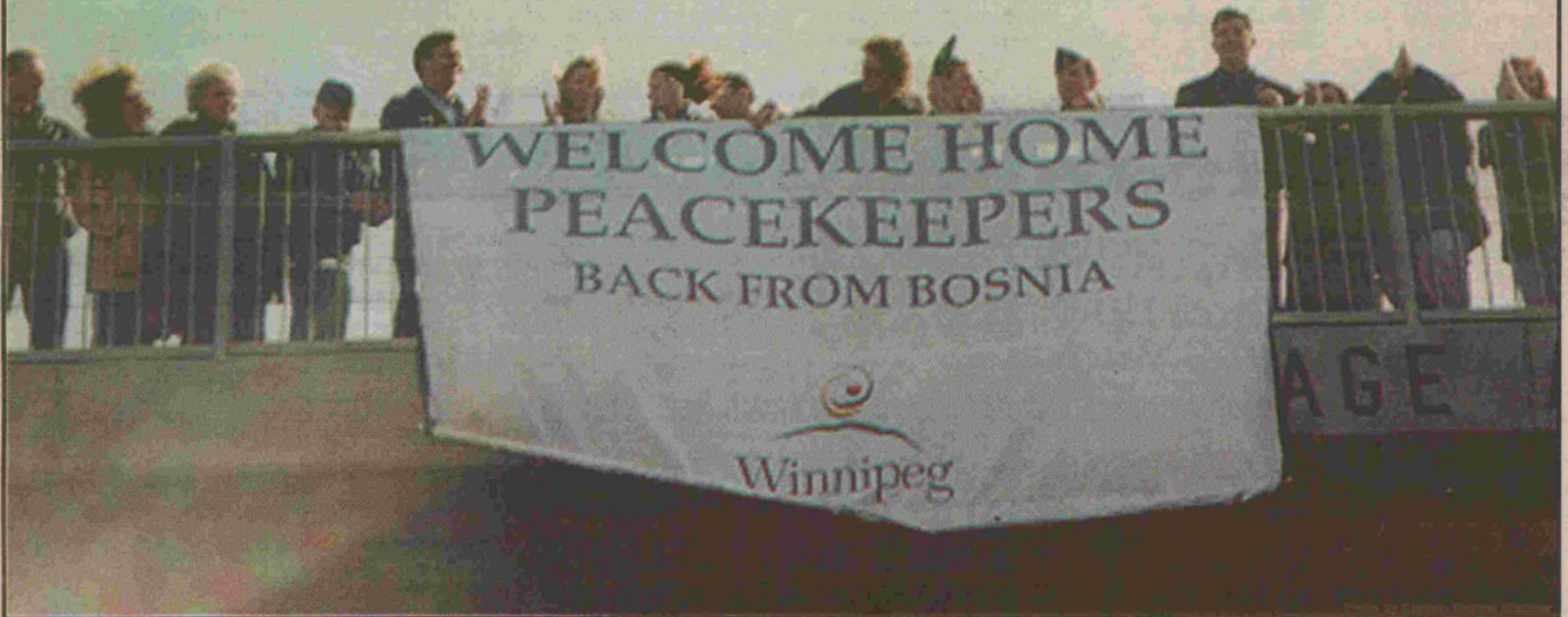

Banners and balloons, welcome home signs and ribbons turned the Drill Hall at Kapyong Barracks into a homey location for the families to be reunited with their significant others after a

long seven month tour. Blue and white ribbons in the SFOR (Sustainment Force) colours along the boulevards of Kenaston and Tuxedo and at the front gates of Kapyong Barracks set a festive tone.

The City of Winnipeg

donated a "Welcome Home" banner that was hung with the assistance of Premier Gary Doer, Mayor Glenn Murray, 17 Wing Commander Colonel McLennan, and Wing Chief Emond on the St. James Street Bridge over Route 90.

"It's important for the soldiers to know that we as Canadians are proud of their peacekeeping efforts in Bosnia", commented Mayor Murray. "Seven months is a long time to be away from your family. The City of Winnipeg just wants to

welcome them home", he added.

All of the soldiers will be back in Canada and reunited with families by 6 April. The battalion will then start a three-week block leave period before going on Exercise during the month of May.

SAR Mountain Training: A Loadmaster's Point of View

What is SAR? Besides being an acronym for Search and Rescue, what is it really all about? Many people at 17 Wing often see the SAR bird (CC-130) sitting on the ramp or being launched. The personnel who frequent the flight line, from flight crew, to duty driver and kitchen staff, know it only too well. For the rest of you, here is some idea of what SAR training is like, particularly in the mountains, from a loadmaster's point of view...

Becoming a qualified SAR crewmember is a lengthy and rewarding experience from a loadmaster's perspective. Months of on-the-job training (OJT) are

involved, which culminate with an 8-day SAR course at 424 Sqn, 8 Wing Trenton. SAR training days theoretically expose the loadmaster in training to most, if not all, of the responsibilities of a SAR qualified loadmaster: from SAR specific pre-flight duties to throwing flares from the gaping maw of the open ramp or door at altitudes as low as a 1000 ft in the blanket of night... all of this, in order to deliver the SAR technicians to a site "so that others may live".

In spite or because of its intensity, the most exhilarating experience in SAR training is probably mountain training. The purpose of this training is to exercise the skills of every crewmember involved in

high terrain areas. For the pilots, it is to maneuver through mountainous valleys at eyebrow raising low altitudes. For the SAR technicians, it is to sharpen their spotting and jumping skills. For loadmasters, it is an opportunity to participate in many aspects of SAR operations that are not always available. Under the supervision of a SAR qualified loadmaster, the "loadie" in training dispatches jumpers from the ramp or the right paratroop door, dispatches training aids - such as a toboggan (to simulate a live load, with winter survival gear), streamers (to help the SAR technicians approximate the winds in order to plan their jump) - as well as other supplies and equipment. Almost

all of the aforementioned equipment is, of course, rigged with parachutes, which is another part of a loadmaster's training... The SAR technicians also rely on the loadmaster as their safety-man with respect to their chute inspection and for retrieval, if they become hung up. They count on him to dispatch accurately the equipment they need to carry out the mission. One can imagine the importance of such aerial delivery in mountainous areas!

If you have never done it, standing on the edge of a ramp in a Herc flying anywhere between 150 - 2000ft AGL can be quite unnerving. Your only comfort is knowing that the safety harness you wear is secured to a ring

on the aircraft floor by a strap that has been inspected by a fellow qualified crewmember. In order to throw out all the equipment mentioned above, the loadmaster must perch himself very close to the edge of the ramp. The ultimate test of nerves is opening a para door in flight. You have to maneuver yourself to whichever para door that is required and when you open it there is nothing between you and the ground but air, wind, and a long scream if things go wrong (depending what altitude you're at, of course). Again, wearing a safety harness decreases the likelihood of that happening. As you can see, conducting low-level SAR operations over

mountainous areas can be an adrenaline producing experience. Flying along a 10,000ft (or more) mountain range in the Rockies sure makes you feel small! The Herc's skin seems to be at the mercy of the unforgiving jagged peaks of a rock monster...

At last, the loadmaster's place in the SAR world is proving to be, whether in the mountains or flat areas, a position of great demands and responsibilities. Until now, I had no idea of how much other crewmembers and, most of all, the casualties on the ground rely on a loadmaster to be proficient with respect to his/her duties. That alone puts it all into perspective for me.

In the weeks to come, 17 Wing Food Services Squadron will be implementing a Point of Sale (POS) system in order to automate ration accounting and cost recovery activities in our dining rooms.

The tentative date for implementation is set for 09 Apr 01. Automating food services delivery programs will not result in the degradation of dining services; rather its purpose is to enhance existing programs. It is our goal to provide affordable customer-focused services and to become *the* choice for food service delivery here at 17 Wing.

In the near future you can expect to see:

- New and exciting menu options;
- Competitively-priced meal options;
- Individually-priced items, i.e. "a la carte" items; and
- Full-service take-out.

If you haven't been to your Dining Hall lately, you're missing out on the new menu! This gives you the choice between regularly featured entrées and new, tantalizing A La Carte items. Now available is a Pasta and Pizza Bar prepared fresh every day; if you're looking for a light lunch you can try our new Soup Bar with two selections daily or the Sandwich Bar, stocked with a

variety of fresh breads and fillings - or perhaps the Salad Bar would be more to your taste, prepared with the finest and freshest produce.

On a family outing, but can't decide where to eat? Bring the clan to the Mess for a delicious meal at reasonable prices - or take advantage of the new Take-Out Service and bring it home with you after work!

Those of you on ration strength will

continue to enjoy the fine food and professional service you've become accustomed to, with no added cost or restriction to the amount of food you currently consume. All you'll need do is obtain your new POS card from the W Food Svcs Fin/Admin section, which is located on the top floor, east wing of Building 61. This card, personalized with your photo, must be presented to the POS Clerk for

each meal. Individual letters will be sent to all our personnel on ration strength providing further details.

Many other individuals make occasional use of our services; military members and their families, Public Service and PSP employees, contractors hired by DND and the general public. These clients will be given the choice of paying by cash or by setting up a debit card through our Wing



Foods account section. Debit cards will be embedded with a predetermined dollar value as negotiated with the client, inclusive of applicable taxes. When a purchase is made with the card at one of our dining facilities, the appropriate account is updated automatically. Balances remaining at the end of each month will be forwarded from month to month. The flexibility this approach provides should be of

particular interest to those living-in members who have chosen to de-link rations and quarters. Debit cards will be made available at Wing Food Services Fin/Admin section in Building 61, commencing 02 Apr 01.

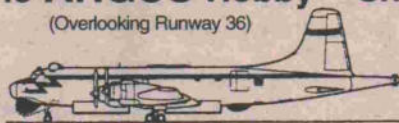

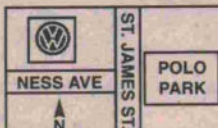

PROTECT YOUR INVESTMENTS AND BUY INTO GOOD SECURITY

Crime, like the Stock Market, occurs in cycles. Sometimes it's up and sometimes it's down. The most difficult part of investing, though, is trying to predict when the market will be up or down. So how do smart investors protect themselves against the "down times"? They buy their preferred stock on a regular basis and take advantage of something called dollar cost averaging. Well, this same principle applies in fighting property crime. Buy into good security often to protect your investments instead of trying to predict when crime may hit. Why? Because property crime is one of the most common offences committed and no one can predict where or when a break-in or a theft will occur. Most property crimes are relatively unsophisticated and many are "crimes of opportunity." Thieves will usually seek out the easiest targets with the least threat of detection. So here are some ways of protecting yourself from property crime:

- A. Install sensor lights not only on your residence but also on your garage;
- B. Lock up attractive items in your yard or place them inside the garage or house when not in use (two items stolen the most from backyards are bicycles and expensive toys like Tonka trucks because they are not locked up or put away);
- C. Use an anti-theft device on your car like the Club or an alarm;
- D. Don't leave attractive items in open view within your car;
- E. Turn on your porch lights at night;
- F. Trim back shrubs and trees which block your neighbour's view of your windows and doors;
- G. Keep your property neat and tidy. Criminology studies of career thieves have shown they prefer to hit targets which look unkept, believing that if maintenance is neglected, security will be neglected also;
- H. Consider having a quality deadbolt lock installed on your entrance doors;
- I. Ensure that your garage door and all of its components are well maintained. This means checking that the door and rollers are securely and tightly fitted on its tracks and that the sliding locking bar fits securely in its slot. One of the most common methods for breaking into a garage is for the thief to "throw himself" or bounce off the garage door to dislodge the door or locking mechanism out of its track or slot or to break off the sliding bar; and
- J. LOCK ALL DOORS, on your house, garage and car! As simple as this last step may seem, the fact is that many people do not lock their doors.

The failure of people to take steps to protect their property at times does result in their property being stolen. In fact a recent study of cars in Winnipeg revealed that out of 16,000 cars surveyed, 82% of them did not employ any form of anti-theft device and between 1999 and 2000 car thefts rose by over 700 from the previous year. I believe that a strong case could be made to show that these two figures are related. Also, out of the hundreds of property crimes against automobiles, many were from smashed windows to steal such items as change, sunglasses and CDs. These, of course, are items which could have easily been hidden.

It's an unfortunate state that we sometimes find ourselves in but the reality is that criminals will steal almost anything if it's not locked down. So remember, good security is like a good insurance policy, it's there to protect you. As far as the costs of buying a sensor light or Club are concerned, just remember it's not a question of whether you can afford to, but rather, whether you can afford not to. Also remember that the 17 Wing Security and Military Police Section is dedicated to helping our members protect their assets whether at work or at home in the PMQ sites. 17 Wg Sports Coordinator Intersection Curling had its last draws on Wednesday 4 April. The A final had 402 Sqn's WO Montgomery's

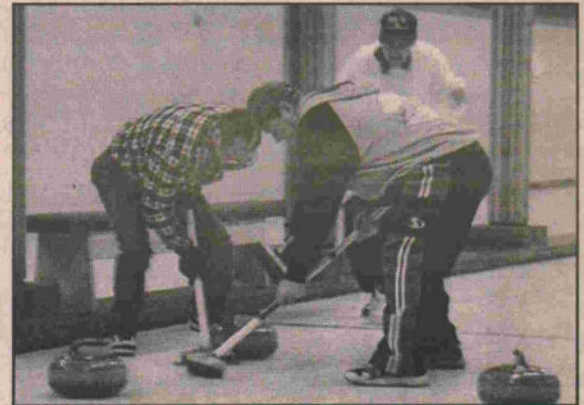
threeosome defeateing WOps in a close match. The WOps foursome mounted a comeback after dropping behind early in

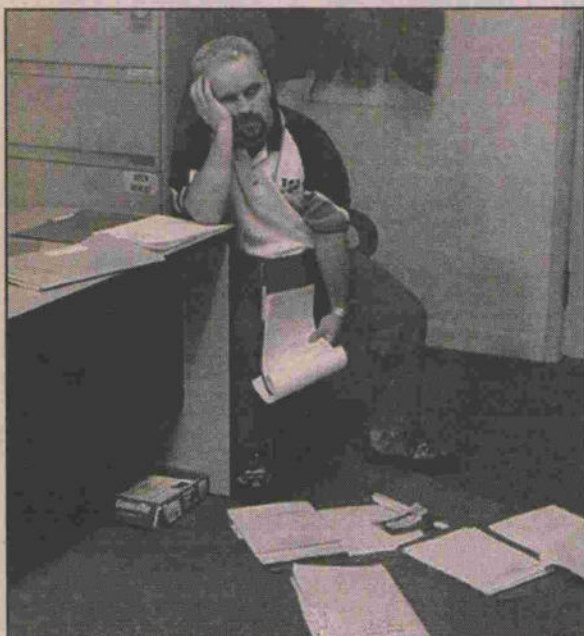

Thinking of Purchasing a House?

If you are considering buying a house at your new location, there are a few things you should be aware of to help you with your decision.

You will be required to provide a pre-approved mortgage certificate prior to applying for a HHT. During your relocation consultation you will be given the option to have The Mortgage Center or CIBC Group Mortgages discuss their financing

packages with you to help you determine the most beneficial financing package available to you. You also have the option of dealing with your own personal banking representative at the local level. When approaching a financial institution for a pre-approved mortgage, it will be necessary for you to have a letter from your employer confirming your employment and rate of pay, as well as detailed information of outstanding loans and

other financial obligations.

To qualify for a mortgage, a bank will look at both your Gross Debt Services (GDS) and Total Debt Services (TDS).

GDS should not exceed 32% of your gross annual income and consists of the total principal, interest, property taxes, heating costs and condominium fees.

TDS should not exceed 40% of your gross annual income and consists of all of the

above payments as well as all other personal loans, credit cards, line of credit, court ordered support or alimony payments, etc.

As an example, with a gross annual salary of \$40,000 and no other loans to consider, your yearly financing costs to purchase a home could be \$12,800, (40,000 * 32%) or monthly payments of \$1066. If property taxes were \$100 per month, heating costs of \$150 per month, that would leave you

with \$816 toward a mortgage. At an interest rate of 6.5% amortized over 25 years, this translates to a mortgage amount of \$121,000. Add in the amount of your down payment for the net purchase price you could qualify for.

When making an offer on a home, it is necessary to have funds to make a deposit with. This money will eventually become part of your down payment but is considered good faith money that you will com-

plete the purchase. Ensure you check with your realtor at destination to find out how to make your deposit. Do you require a certified cheque, cash, cheque, or money order?

If you have less than a 25% downpayment, your bank will require that the mortgage be insured. One company that insures mortgages is Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation. CMHC rates vary depending on the financing ratio.

For example, with a 5% downpayment (which is the minimum downpayment that can be made), the CMHC amount is 3.75% on the mortgaged amount.

On a sale price of	\$ 100,000
Downpayment amount	\$ 5000
Mortgage amount	\$ 95,000
CMHC at 3.75%	\$ 3562.50
CMHC application fee	\$ 165

On the same sale price with a 15% downpayment, the CMHC fee rate drops to only 2%.

Sale price	\$ 100,000
Downpayment of 15%	\$ 15,000
Mortgage amount	\$ 85,000
CMHC at 2%	\$ 700
CMHC application fee	\$ 165

In this example, with a \$10,000 larger downpayment there is a savings of over \$1800 in CMHC fees.

Other costs that you may incur that are not reimbursable by DND, on your purchase are:

- payment of property taxes,
- reimbursement to the vendor for heating oil in the tank,
- home insurance to take effect on the structure on the day of closing,
- interest adjustment, and
- prepaid water bills.

So remember to bring your cheque book with you on the HHT to pay for any last minute final adjustments.

A MESSAGE FROM THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

A growing number of cottagers, campers, and backyard barbecue enthusiasts realize that propane can be used as a convenient and economical fuel source for recreational, camping and household applications.

Propane is a clean, portable and efficient fuel for use in Bar-B-Q's, stoves, refrigerators, space heaters, water heaters, clothes dryers, lighting and much more.

Used with care, propane is a safe and convenient fuel. Propane gas is not toxic. Nor is it injurious to you should you be exposed to it in limited quantities. However, should a leak occur, the accumulation of propane gas could become dangerous.

Propane is heavier than air and it tends to settle in the lowest available space. Very small amounts of propane are required to create a flam-

mable mixture of gas and air in the limited space of a recreational vehicle; for instance, very little propane is needed to create a hazardous situation, which can result in injuries, even death, and property damage. Propane requires a large volume of air to burn properly. With adequate ventilation, an operating burner gives off a number of harmless products such as carbon dioxide and water vapor. But a

propane appliance starved of oxygen can quickly produce dangerous amounts of carbon monoxide, similar to the lethal gas produced from a car exhaust.

For most uses, propane is generally sold and stored in a cylinder. The cylinder is a critical part of your propane fuel system requiring special care and maintenance. Propane cylinders manufactured in Canada carry markings, which means

that they have been manufactured to an acceptable specification. By law, all propane cylinders are required to be re-qualified for continued service at each ten-year interval starting with the date of manufacture. No person shall fill a cylinder that is overdue for re-qualification. "Out-of-date", extremely rusted or damaged cylinders cannot be filled.

Learn now what you can do to ensure the

safety of yourself and others when using propane! The following safety information will assist you in this regard. However, should you encounter any questions or problems not covered here, on propane cylinders or any other components of your propane fuel system including the regulators, piping and connectors and the appliance, consult a propane dealer or service organization.

Protect the cylinder valve tightly. Even when empty.



Use cylinder appliances approved for propane.



Put the cylinder down gently. Cylinders bruise easily.



Do not let the cylinder get too hot; the inside pressure will rise.

The Ombudsman investigates complaints and provides information,

He reports to the Minister of National Defence and is independent of the chain of command. The Ombudsman is accessible to all DND employees and CF members to address either individual or systemic problems. He reports publicly through annual reports or individual case reports and makes recommendations to improve the welfare of members of the defence community.

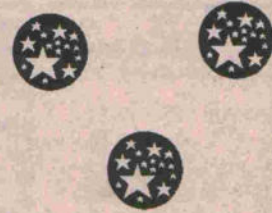
