Winnipeg Sessions a Success

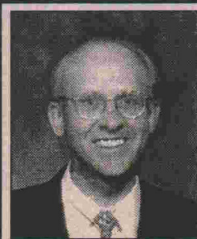

PLEASE STEP OUT OF THE CAR



Hot weather and long weekends at the cottage are just some of the things that make the summer so pleasant and many of these good times are spent enjoying a cold alcoholic drink. So there you are at the lake and you decide to have two or three quick beers which go down so smooth and quick that you don't even notice it. But then you remember that you need to pick up some burgers for the BBQ and you grab your keys and decide to drive to the local store. Now we have a problem. Death and injury associated with drinking and driving is a national tragedy and it is the number one contributor to highway deaths in Canada. Over 25,000 vehicle deaths occur every year across North America because of drinking and driving and thousands more are injured. Think about it, that's more than three times the total military and civilian population of CFB Winnipeg wiped out each year because of alcohol.

Alcohol takes away three things that everyone needs to drive: judgement, coordination and vision. Also, the amount of alcohol consumed directly relates to how much an effect it has on these attributes. Many people ask, just how much alcohol is too much if a person plans to drive? Ideally, if you have to ask, then you've drunk too much and you shouldn't drive. Since, we don't live in a perfect world the fact is that many people still have a few drinks and then get behind the wheel thinking they are OK to drive. However, it may shock you to learn that what too much is, is often a lot less than you might think. There are many factors

And speaking from personal experience it's not uncommon for me to be in a coma on a Saturday night after downing an 18 pack of Blue over the course of a Stanley Cup Playoff game. Would I get behind the wheel after that? No way!

The law in Canada sets the legal blood alcohol limit at .08 and being caught with anything over that amount is a criminal offence. What's important to note here though is that everyone's ability to drive is affected well below the legal limit. Research shows that ALL people are affected in their ability to drive at a

which will affect a person's Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC). These factors are a person's weight, sex, the amount of food recently consumed, the alcohol level and how much alcohol drank and the person's metabolism to name a few. Because of the multitude of factors I have always told people that there is no way to accurately predict if they are over the legal limit. Many people are aware of the one per hour rule, however, while that MIGHT be acceptable for a person who only has one drink, I would not want to get behind the wheel if I had 12 beers over 12 hours, as many people do who are on those infamous beer drinking/fishing weekends.

BAC approaching .05. This is part of the reason why 24 hour suspensions are issued to persons caught driving with a BAC of .05. It should also be remembered that you don't need to be over the legal limit of .08 to be charged with a criminal offence—If your ability to operate a vehicle is impaired by alcohol, then the Police need only have road evidence for a charge of Impaired Operation which carries the same penalties as over .08. A person (for example) may only have two drinks, but if they are fatigued and haven't eaten recently, it is possible that two drinks may have enough of an effect on their system that it will profoundly affect their ability to drive. So if a Police Officer notices that the driver crosses the centre line a few times, fails to signal or come to a complete stop, the Police now have the evidence needed for a criminal charge even though the driver may be below the legal limit.

If the Police suspect you of impaired driving, you will be asked to provide a breath sample on the roadside tester or at the Police Station. It is also an offence to refuse to provide a sample and the penalties for refusal are now greater than for impaired driving or being over the legal limit. So what are the penalties for impaired driving? Today even a 24 hour suspension will cost you the tow truck and licence reinstatement. A 1st offence for impaired driving/over .08 will cost you several hundred dollars, a licence suspension of one year and your insurance will skyrocket to several thousand dollars. This is provided of course you don't injure or kill someone or cause property damage in which case the fines (including jail time) will increase. Armchair lawyers who don't care about the penalties believing they will beat the charge in court should realize that your licence is immediately suspended for 90 days prior to the 1st court appearance and the cost for the defence of an impaired case can cost a couple of thousand dollars. So for those who don't have a quick two thousand dollars saved, most lawyers have monthly payment plans they can set up for you over the next several years. So as you can see there are penalties to be paid regardless of whether you are found guilty or not.

Don't forget the career implications also! You can't operate an Ilitis/Ship/Jet or Tank if you lose your licence as once you lose your civilian licence you will also lose your military licence. Let's be honest, it would be foolish to think it won't affect your career if your supervisor can't employ you because you are in jail or can't drive. Did you also know that your insurance company has the right to refuse your claim and can come after you for the costs incurred for the repairs to the vehicles, lost wages, injuries and law suits. That can easily add up to hundreds of thousands of dollars. ARE TWO OR THREE BEERS WORTH THAT?

Think about it, cut your risks and don't drink and drive. With all the education and publicity on the subject there are no excuses for drinking and driving. Don't let your name show up on the Wing Commander's or Judge's desk after the Police ask you "To please step out of the car."

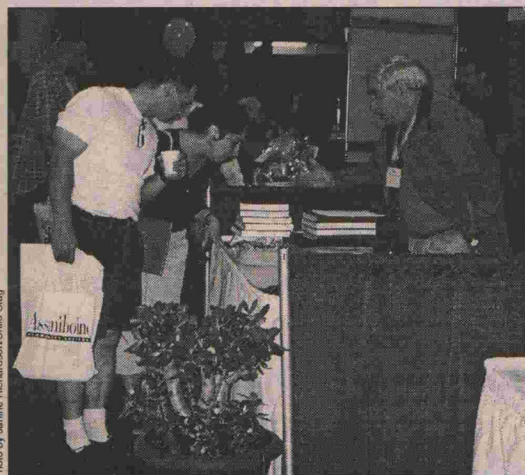

Representatives from Shilo, Brandon, Carberry, Rivers, Minnedosa, and other communities in Westman were on hand to answer questions. Eldon Obach, chairman of the Wawanesa Community Development Corporation was somewhat surprised by the positive response from 2PPCLI members about the upcoming move.

"I think most people have been really positive. We're really happy with the response we've had."

With the ground rules set and a little bit of practise, the children then tried their new skills out on the bicycle obstacle course. After some practise all of the children did quite well on the obstacle course.



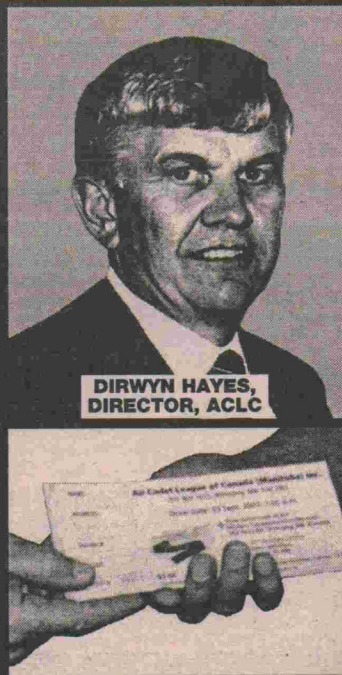

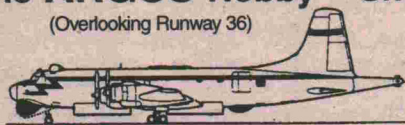

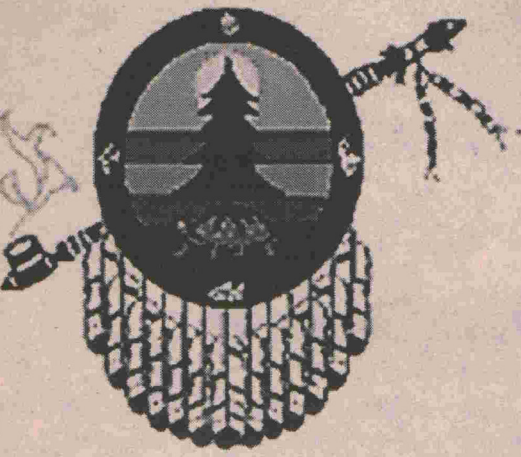

DID YOU KNOW?

- * Aboriginal people are the youngest and fastest growing segment of the Manitoba population
- * The Aboriginal population is projected to increase 38% between 1995 and 2011; non Aboriginal population growth estimated at 9%
- * Projections indicate that by the year 2016, 1 in 4 workforce entrants will be of Aboriginal ancestry
- * The number of Aboriginal peoples with post-secondary education tripled between 1981 - 1991, with an increase from 3.5% in 1986 to 5.7% in 1996
- * Through the Treaty Land Entitlement Framework Agreement, several Manitoba First Nations will be seeing settlements in the range of \$125 million dollars collectively
- * The purchasing power of Aboriginal people more than doubled from 1986 to 1991, representing close to \$1 billion dollars in Manitoba

NATIONAL ABORIGINAL AWARENESS WEEK

MAY 21 - 26 2001

Aboriginal Awareness Week (AAW) was developed in 1992 in response to the Government's announcement of the Aboriginal Agenda. The purpose of this event is to increase awareness and promote the contribution of Aboriginal peoples in Canada.

Through increased awareness and recognition of Aboriginal Peoples, progress will be made in recruitment, promotion and retention of Aboriginal peoples.

DND will celebrate Aboriginal Awareness Week 21 - 26 May 2001. The Department's participation in this annual commemorative event reinforces its commitment to promoting activities for Aboriginal Peoples. By encouraging awareness, we will bring a greater understanding of Aboriginal peoples among members and employees of our defence team. In addition, Cross-cultural awareness sessions help to sensitize managers and leaders to Aboriginal issues and make them receptive to the concerns of Aboriginal employees.

One of our human resource management principles states that "diversity is recognized and welcomed; all team members are treated with dignity and respect". With greater awareness, future employment opportunities for Aboriginal peoples will become a reality - not only in DND and CF, but also throughout the Public Service.

The province of Manitoba is venturing into exciting times, particularly within our Aboriginal communities. The progression of the community in areas such as employment, education and training, capacity building, and economic development is essential to the overall well being of our province.

Today more than ever the Aboriginal community is gathering strength and taking a proactive approach to the issues they face. A strong feeling of pride and the movement toward self-sufficiency and self-government drives the sense of urgency to build capacity within the community and the province.

IMPORTANT CHANGES TO THE EMPLOYMENT INSURANCE PROGRAM

The Government of Canada has made changes to Employment Insurance (EI) to support Canadian families and to ensure that Canadians who need EI will have access to an improved program.

WHAT'S NEW

- There is no more intensity rule.* Now all EI claimants will receive at least 55% of their maximum insurable earnings. Retroactive to October 1, 2000.
- The benefit repayment (clawback) provision is no longer applicable for claimants who receive maternity, parental and sickness benefits, first-time claimants and claimants who make less than \$48,750 net annual income. Retroactive to the 2000 taxation year.
- Parents who took extended absences from the workforce to care for young children may now be able to qualify for EI regular benefits like other workers. Retroactive to October 1, 2000.
- Self-employed fishers can now benefit fully from the changes made to maternity, parental and sickness benefits. Retroactive to December 31, 2000.

AUTOMATIC RETROACTIVE PAYMENTS

Since mid-June, Human Resources Development Canada has been automatically issuing retroactive payments for adjustments to EI claims affected by the changes. The Canada Customs and Revenue Agency will forward retroactive payments for clawback (2000 taxation year) automatically in about two months.

* The intensity rule, which gradually reduces the basic benefit rate of 55% to 50% for frequent EI users, proved to be ineffective and was removed.

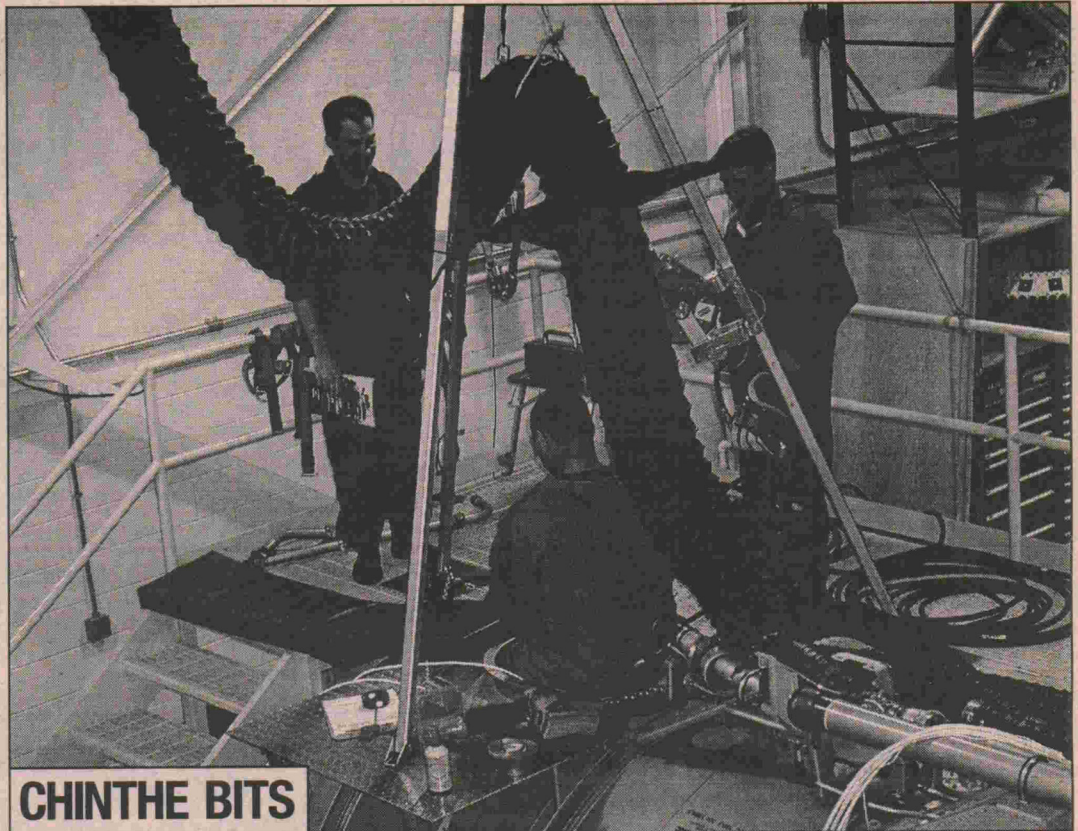

AAR MAINTENANCE

435 Engineering Support Organization

435 ESO was established in April 2001, combining 435 Engineering & Maintenance Support organizations. We are located in building 55 across from sunny downtown hangar 16, home to all our illustrious leaders. We maintain Air-to-Air Refuelling (AAR) equipment (when parts actually arrive from the United Kingdom), which includes fourteen pods - an assembly that attaches to the wing that houses the required components to deliver fuel to fighter aircraft. We also have five fuselage tanks that fit in the cargo compartment which provide additional fuel for refuelling or additional range.

This year the Air-to-Air Refuelling shop is facing the additional task of installing new fuselage tank pumps that are used to pump fuel up to the wings from the fuselage tank. This will enable us to offload

more fuel to receiving aircraft, making Flight Engineer Sgt Webster a happy camper.

The overhaul of C130 brakes, tires and arrestor brakes falls heavily on the backs of the Tire Shop. The arrestor brakes serve all of Canada's fighter pilots that run out of runway or want to pretend that they really work on Aircraft Carriers. More seriously, these are mobile or stationary systems that run a steel cable across the end of a runway enabling a fighter to snag it with an arrestor hook when an emergency stop is required. They are used at host base, air shows or Arctic forward operating bases.

The engineering section handles the administration of all squadron aircraft modifications (Mod's); special inspections (SI's) and any non-standard aircraft repair issues.

We also manage 17 Wing's liquid oxygen building, which supplies both transient and host unit's aircraft with oxygen

as well as Bristol and the CF-5s.

Our members continue to augment the Squadron maintenance deployments to fun in the sun places like Greenland and AAR missions to more fun places like Bag Town (Bagotville, QC) and Cool Pool (Cold Lake, AB).

We run the Squadron car rally every year, too, so that Major and Mrs Orziak can claim their annual victory. Our parking lot is also very popular; I wish I could just figure out how anybody that works here could get a space? WO Maltby, alias "The Pod Father", has made references to horse anatomy being discovered in any interloper's vehicle!

Trudeau Stamps

He was a controversial figure in Canadian politics, no doubt about it. When he died last year there were many tributes paid to him, for his flair, for the life he brought to the Canadian political scene. He is famous for the rose he wore, for his pirouette caught on film, for his intellect and incisive opinions. Many spoke of him with great sadness and reverence.

western farmers he asked "Do you expect me to sell your wheat?" And he gave a hostile crowd the gesture of "the finger."

When Canada Post issues a stamp to honour his memory on July 1st you can be sure the controversy will surface again. The stamp will be available in a sheet of four which will also show a waving younger Trudeau, a small picture of him walking and a red rose over his name. Also available will be a souvenir package with the sheet of stamps, a reproduction portrait on canvas, a tribute card with information and a single stamp with a July 1st cancellation.

Liberia also will issue a July 1st stamp for this controversial Canadian.

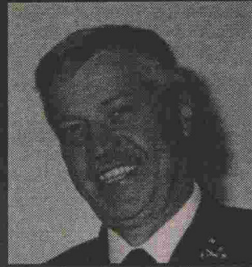

Canada invests in clean air

(NC)-OTTAWA - The Government of Canada is investing \$120.2 million in new measures to accelerate action to improve air quality.

Environment Minister David Anderson announced the action plan earlier this year, saying that it focuses on a "10-year regulatory road map" for cleaner vehicles and fuels, initial measures to reduce smog causing emissions from industrial sectors, improvements to the cross country network of pollutant monitoring stations and expansion of the public reporting by industry on pollutant releases. It ensures Canada will meet its commitments to implement the Canada-U.S. Ozone Annex signed in December 2000.

The Ozone Annex commits both countries to reduce dramatically the smog-causing pollutants (nitrogen oxides and volatile organic compounds) that cause ground-level ozone to form. It also contains commitments on monitoring and

reporting measures.

The \$120.2 million investment in cleaner air builds on earlier initiatives including regulations to reduce sulphur levels in gasoline, measures to enhance science and monitoring programs on acid rain and leading in the development of a United Nations treaty to reduce Persistent Organic Pollutants such as PCBs, dioxins and furans.

Mr. Anderson said: "We know that air pollution affects our health, and that children, senior citizens and those with respiratory and cardiac illness are particularly vulnerable to the health effects of dirty air. Therefore our job is not finished. We will continue to work on reducing emissions from industrial sectors, on engaging more and more Canadians and on strengthening the foundation of clean air science."

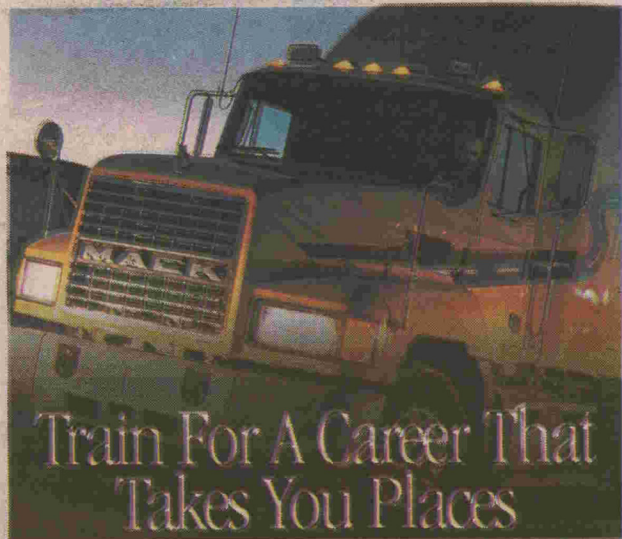

remembering KOREA

As the wheels touched down at Incheon International Airport in Seoul, Korea at approximately 1600hrs on the 21 of April 2001, it marked the first return of Canadian Combat Arms soldiers to Korea in 50 years. These soldiers representing 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, the Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadian), 12 Field Squadron of the Canadian Engineer Regiment, and the Royal Regina Rifles, had deployed from Canada almost a full day prior to commemorate and remember a war and a great battle that has been all but forgotten. This article is offered not as education on a war that so many know so little of, but as an experience that will hopefully inspire some to seek out the truth and understand what happened in those years, and why.

It was not without great effort that 2nd Battalion, PPCLI planned, organized and executed this return to Korea, and it was by no coincidence that it occurred 50 years after one of the most important engagements of the war. The main effort of this group was to honour the men, living and dead, who fought so hard and so bravely and won a major victory towards the freedom of South Korea over the period from 23-25 April 1951. This was the Battle of Kapyong. So it was with great pride and reverence that 41 soldiers stood in front of those that had once fought back the gates of hell, and paid them their proper respect.

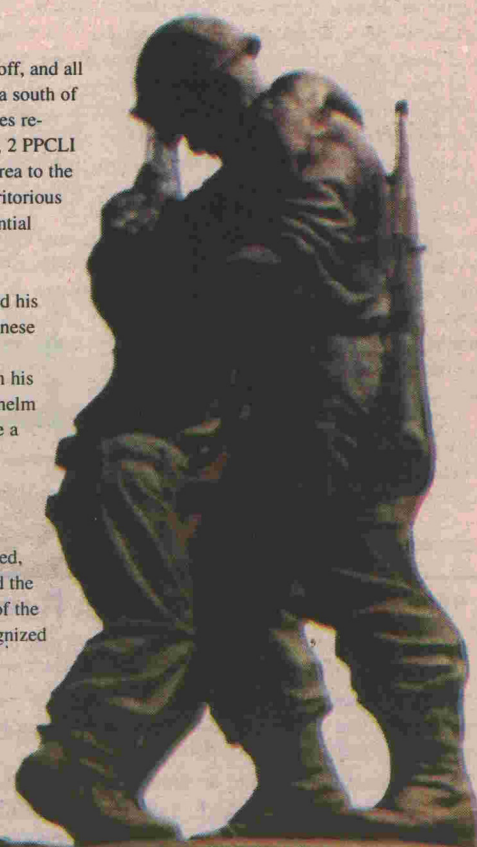
Korea today must have appeared very different to the veterans who, until their return this April, had not been back in the 50 years that have passed since they left the country they came to protect. The country where they spent a year of their lives fighting from hilltop to hilltop, and a country where they witnessed so many friends die. They had returned to be recognized for their sacrifices for it was the blood and tears of these warriors that was shed on the hills of Korea. They had returned to visit and remember those who did not leave with them so many years ago. Canadians killed totaled 516 over the course of the war, and of those, 10 were sustained on hill 677. This was the Battle of Kapyong.

The Battle of Kapyong was fought against incredible odds by units of the 27th Commonwealth Infantry Brigade Group, which included 2nd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and the 3rd Battalion Royal Australian Regiment. Company A, 72nd Heavy Tank Battalion (US) provided direct fire support throughout. For a

48-hour period these units, completely surrounded, cut-off, and all alone held the front line between North and South Korea south of the super parallel while US and Republic of Korea Forces re-established defensive positions behind them. Moreover, 2 PPCLI was credited with not giving one inch of the Battalion area to the enemy. For their valourous actions and exceptional meritorious conduct, these three units were awarded the US Presidential Citation.

To actually stand at the site where LCol Jim R. Stone led his Battalion of Patricia's to victory over the advancing Chinese hordes is overwhelming. To view the ground where Capt Mills had called friendly artillery down on his own company position as enemy forces began to overwhelm him despite the consequences, is inspirational. To relive a part of world history whose outcome could have been drastically different had it not been for a handful of Canadians who did not know how to quit and were left with no option of withdrawal, is monumental. Outnumbered by thousands, hungry, tired, and disoriented, these men epitomized Canadian tenacity and maintained the aim with an exceptionally high morale. The President of the United States, Harry Truman, rightly and properly recognized these men 50 years ago with the Presidential Citation. They were recognized again today by all those who put so much effort into making it possible for 41 personnel to stand in front and honour them at the actual site of hill 677 on 25 April 2001, 50 years to the day after the battle, we will remember them.

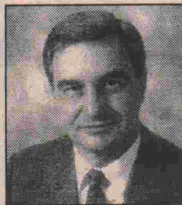

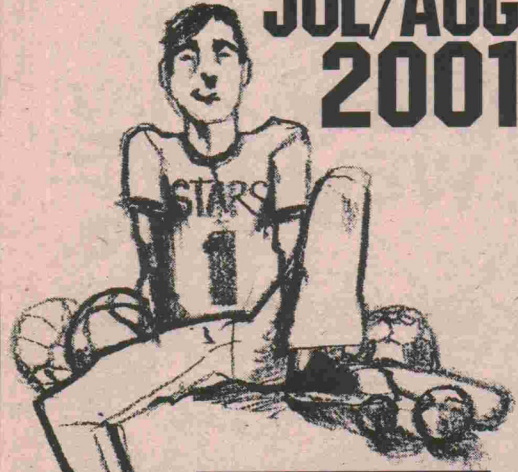
