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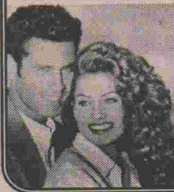
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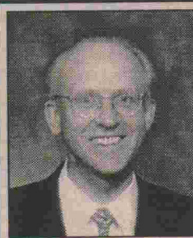


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# 435 Sqn back to Europe

The departure of two KC130's on Friday, 8 June, marked the return of 435 Squadron to Europe for the NATO exercise 'Clean Hunter'. This exercise included the air forces from Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Norway, the United Kingdom, the Czech Republic, Poland, the United States, Italy, Canada, Portugal, Greece, and Turkey. The air forces included some 350 fighters, six AWACS, 14 Electronic Warfare aircraft, and 19 Air-To-Air refuellers. To round out the exercise, there was also participation from some European armies and navies.

The 435 Sqn Detachment was comprised of 37 personnel, which included 18 aircrew, 14 ground crew, and five operations and administration/support staff. The deployment required that one Herc pre-position in Churchill, Manitoba and the other in Iqaluit, Nunavut. This was in preparation for the deployment of eight CF18's from 416 and 441 Sqn's based in Cold Lake, Alberta. Two refuelling missions per Herc took place on Saturday, which allowed the CF18's to fly from Cold Lake to Keflavik, Iceland, nonstop. Following the refuelling missions, the Churchill Herc, with a fresh crew flew on to Kinloss, Scotland. The other Herc remained overnight in Iqaluit and departed for Kinloss on Sunday.

On Monday, prior to departure, a message was received that one CF18 was unserviceable in Keflavik and that it would require a Maintenance Repair Party (MRP). A second CF18 remained behind for support purposes. It was decided that the two Hercs would press-on to Karup, Denmark, following the refuelling of the remaining six CF18's. Our fighters recovered in Eggebek, Germany, their operating base. On Tuesday, one Herc was tasked to fly to Eggebek, pick-up the MRP, and recover in Keflavik. With the CF18 repaired, the Herc departed on Wednesday, refuelled the two CF18's enroute, and all recovered at their respective bases. The deployment was now complete.

The Det Ops centre also became operational Wednesday morning, and the first work-up mission was flown

in the afternoon with our CF18's. The remainder of the week saw six more work-up missions flown with our CF18's and the French Mirage 2000's.

Also working out of Karup was a KC135 Det and a F15 Det. The tanker Det comprised of five KC135's and 178 Air National Guard personnel from the 155th Air Refuelling Wing in Lincoln, Nebraska and the 121st Air Refuelling Wing at Rickenbacker AFB in Columbus, Ohio. The F15 Det consisted of 8 fighters from the 58th Fighter Sqn of the 33rd Fighter Wing located at Eglin AFB, Florida. Their Det consisted of approximately 150 personnel.

Denmark is a beautiful country situated just north of Germany and forms part of Scandinavia. It has a population of approximately 5.3 million people and it consists of four major regions including Jutland (where we resided), Funen (the birthplace of Hans Christian Andersen), Bornholm and Zealand. Being surrounded by the sea, Denmark enjoys a moderate climate with daily sea-breezes. The weather, while we were there, was mild with overnight lows about 8 degrees Celsius and highs between 15-25 degrees Celsius during the day. There were days that were cloudy and rainy, but we also enjoyed beautiful sunny and warm days as well. The countryside was patched with farms, and the gentle rolling hills were broken-up with many trees and colourful rose bushes. The people were very friendly and most helpful.

During our days off, some detachment personnel visited the many historical sites the country had to offer. Some of these included Queen Margrethe II's summer home, WWII German gun emplacements, cemeteries and bunkers, Viking museums and settlements, and the many castles and mansions that dotted the countryside. Others enjoyed the many recreational activities available to the Det personnel, when the opportunities arose.

The exercise started on Mon 18 June. The plan was to have four missions per day, two in the morning and two in the afternoon, except Friday where there was only two missions scheduled in the morning. Although the weather wasn't as nice as the previous week, it did not hamper the fly-

ing program. There were 13 missions planned for the week of which 10 were flown. We refuelled CF18's and German Tornado's offloading nearly 150,000 lbs of fuel.

On Thursday, 21 June, the detachment organized a "Canada Night", with a western theme, for our Danish hosts. We catered a BBQ at the all-ranks mess providing sausages, buns, salads and local Winnipeg refreshments. A great time was had by all, and our Danish friends were most grateful.

During the second and final week of the exercise, there were 12 missions planned and flown with USMC F18's, German Tornado's and CF18's. Throughout the two week exercise, we flew 22 missions and offloaded over 350,000 pounds of fuel.

On Friday, 29 June, one tanker left to participate in an airshow at RAF Station Waddington. Upon arrival the crew was briefed on the weekend's events, and then transported to Lincoln where they stayed. That afternoon most of the crew took in many of the historical sites the town had to offer. Saturday and Sunday was the airshow and the crew worked 12 hour shifts on each day. There were many interesting static and flying displays to see. The Israeli Air Force's static display was very impressive as were the flying displays of the French Air Force's aerobatic team 'La Patrouille' and the RAF's own Red Arrows. The airshow was enjoyed by all. On Canada Day, the crew had the opportunity to have their pictures taken with a restored RCAF WWII jeep, making the day that more special. The crew departed for Winnipeg on Monday, 2 July.

Also on Friday, the second Herc began the first of four chalks to preposition the CF18 Detachment from Eggebek to Florennes, Belgium in preparation for the Tactical Leadership Programme (TLP). The remaining three chalks were flown on Monday and Tuesday.

On Wednesday, 4 July, the last Hercs left Karup for Canada. However, due to a strong jet stream, a fuel stop in Prestwick, Scotland was required. After a 50 minute turnaround, the Herc departed for St John's Newfoundland, and remained overnight. The next morning, the Herc departed on its final leg home.

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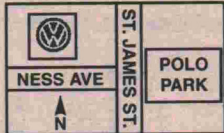
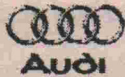
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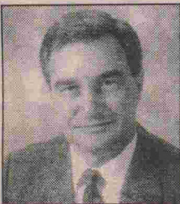
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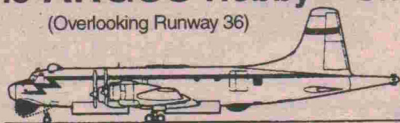

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# Acquisition challenge

**AEROSPACE POWER REVIEW 2001**  
The Air Force's Acquisition Challenge  
(Aerospace Systems Course 53 Symposium)

This year, on June 7 and 8, the Canadian Forces School of Aerospace Studies and Aerospace Systems Course 53 continued a symposium focus on aerospace power with its Aerospace Power Review 2001 - The Air Force's Acquisition Challenge...to Refit, Replace, Re-role or Rethink. Two days were spent looking at emerging aerospace technologies, and assessing their potential impact on Canada's future security environment. The two days were an extremely stimulating and beneficial time as the forum produced a challenge to look beyond current resource realities, and ponder and debate a variety of alternative ways ahead in capital or equipment renewal, and their individual merits in addressing Canada's future security environment and needs. Presenters and attendees were from across the Air Force as well as representatives from academia and industry.

MGen Findley, A3 1 CAD, opened the Symposium, stating that "...the Review is a timely exercise..." He went on to say that over the last ten years, the CF and the Air Force have been largely preoccupied in managing downsizing budgets while addressing increasing operational tempos. Planners have sought to look through immediate demands at what the Air Force's long-term future should be, but have consistently been side tracked by immediate program issues. Furthermore, he indicated that with the current budget stability and even modest expansion, that true future force planning and renewal can now be undertaken - and it is. We are, at this moment, at the start or leading edge of at least ten years of force structure renewal inside the Air Force, renewal that will dictate what the Air Force will be able to do for and on behalf of Canada for the next 20 to 25 years. According to MGen Findley, it is valuable and critical at this time to engage in this type of intellectual exercise, to truly examine competing alternatives, to fully appreciate the benefits and shortcomings of refitting, replacing, re-rolling and rethinking the Air Force's existing systems and fleets.

MGen Findley reaffirmed the importance of ASC training to the Air Force, and acknowledged ASC's considerable efforts with respect to generating this symposium. In its 53-year history, ASC has earned the reputation of being one of the most challenging and advanced courses within the Air Force. The aim of the ASC is to provide selected air operations and direct support officers with advanced education and training that will enable them to fill appointments associated with the definition of operational requirements, and the acquisition, analysis and evaluation

of aerospace systems. Also of note is its continuing international "flavour" as evidenced by an Australian resident on this year's course.

Throughout the ten-month program, the course members are given the opportunity to develop their abilities to express themselves, logically and concisely, on operational and technical matters - both in writing and verbally. The resulting research papers are often used as planning and reference sources by various Canadian Forces agencies. The Research Project permits the course members to conduct research on assigned topics, to demonstrate their ability to collect and analyze data on a complex technical subject, and to present the findings to a select and knowledgeable audience. This year's topics covered a wide range of technically challenging aerospace technologies: An IRCM Suite for the CP-140; AN/ALQ-503 ERI Jammer Pod for the CP-140; Evaluating EO Systems for AP3-C Integration; Joint Precision Approach and Landing System; Use of Laser Detection in Underwater Warfare; Bell/Agusta 609 Tiltrotor for the CF; Arming the CH-146 Griffon; CP-140 as a C4I Platform; Space-based Hyperspectral Imagery for the CF; Airborne Alternatives to Satellite Communications; and Tactical UAVs for CF C4ISR. Symposium attendees were impressed with the quality and technical content of the presentations. In the words of MGen Findley, "...we need...an enlarged cadre of trained personnel in defining requirements, managing projects, and performing test and evaluation...we need ASC-type graduates..."

A major feature again this year, that began with last year's symposium, was the presence of several guest speakers. Dr. J. Fergusson, Deputy Director, Centre for Defence and Security Studies, University of Manitoba, established the backdrop with his presentation on Canada's Defence Acquisition History. Col W. Istchenko, Director of Air Requirements, NDHQ presented Many Demands, Limited Options! to lead off the Scoping out the Problem - Today's Acquisition Challenges! session. Continuing this session theme, Capt J. Churman, CFSAS, spoke on Navigating the Myths and Realities of the RMA and Dr. T. Gillon, DGIIIP US Team/ADM(Mat), NDHQ looked at Where's the Industrial Base Just When You Need It. LCol D. Burt, DAR, NDHQ, moved into the session on Weighing the Options - Refit and Sustain the Present in his presentation on CF-188 Modernization: A Fighter Aircraft for the Future. In the Weighing the Options - Replace and stay the Course Into the Future session, Maj U. Jaggi, D/Comdt, CFSAS, discussed Lessons from NSA and the EH-101 Cancellation, and Dr. P. Mitchell, Director Academics, CF Command and Staff College provided food for thought with JSF - Wishful Thinking or

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Solution. In the final session, Implementing the Options - Transforming Alternatives Into Solutions, Ms V. Poter, Director Materiel Acquisition and Support Program, NDHQ, addressed Acquisition Reform in Canada, Maj J. Brennan, CFSAS, presented Modeling and Simulation - High Hopes, But How?, and Dr. G. MacLean, Research Associate, Centre for Defence and Security Studies, University of Manitoba, closed the day by commenting on Harmonizing Air Force Desires With Canadian Public Interests.

A Keynote Dinner was held in the WO/Sgt Mess Thursday night with Col Istchenko the speaker and he talked on Harmonizing Ends and Means.

Throughout the past year, ASC 53 course members gained significant experience with national and foreign government and commercial agencies during aerospace military and industrial visits throughout the year. Visits included departments and companies in Canada, U.S., France and Sweden such as: NDHQ/CAS, DREO, Bombardier, Bell Helicopters, CAE, Pratt and Whitney, Raytheon, Boeing, Hughes Space, TRW, NASA Dryden, Lockheed-Martin "Skunk Works", JPL, Direction G n rale pour l'Armement (DGA), EADS Launch Vehicles, EADS Matra BAe Dynamics, Thales Systems A roport s, EADS Eurocopter, Dassault Aviation, Defence Materiel Acquisition (FMV), Saab Aerospace, FMV Defence Procurement, and Ericsson-Saab Avionics.

A change in the academic schedule was introduced this year, so that, unlike in previous years, the symposium was not the end of the course year; it immediately preceded a two-week Test and Evaluation session at the USN Test Pilot School, Patuxent River, MD. On the course's return, end-course relaxation officially commenced Monday, 25 June with a family picnic at Assiniboine Park, followed by a BBQ at the O/M in the evening. Formal graduation ceremonies were on Tuesday, 26 June - a stand-up luncheon with Course Certificate presentation by the Commander, 1 CAD, and a dining-in that evening, where BGen (ret'd) G.E. Sharpe was the guest of honour and after-dinner speaker. The WCOMD and Honourary Colonel were also in attendance. At the graduation dinner, BGen Sharpe presented the three major awards given on the course: Overall Best Student: Flt Lt (RAAF) Darin Lovett; General Paul Manson Award for the overall best individual project paper: Capt Mike Lortie; and Best Symposium Presentation: Capt Mike Lortie.

There is fun to be had during ASC, but it comes with a price tag - much hard work! And what is ASC you ask? The ASC has established its credentials as the most advanced, technology oriented, officers' training course in our Air Force. This reputation extends to recognition among NATO and other air forces (USAF, RAAF, RNZAF) and indeed among the international aerospace industrial community. Candidates are typically at the rank level of Captain, with members occasionally being promoted during the course, and have completed one operational tour.

One thing is certain: the skills acquired on ASC can only benefit the individuals and the organization itself. There is no substitute for education, except perhaps some experience to go along with it. The students of ASC 53 have graduated and headed off to their new units to put their "education" to work and gain that experience.

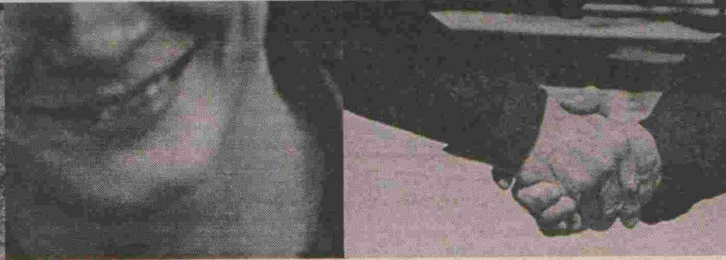
## Volunteer Program

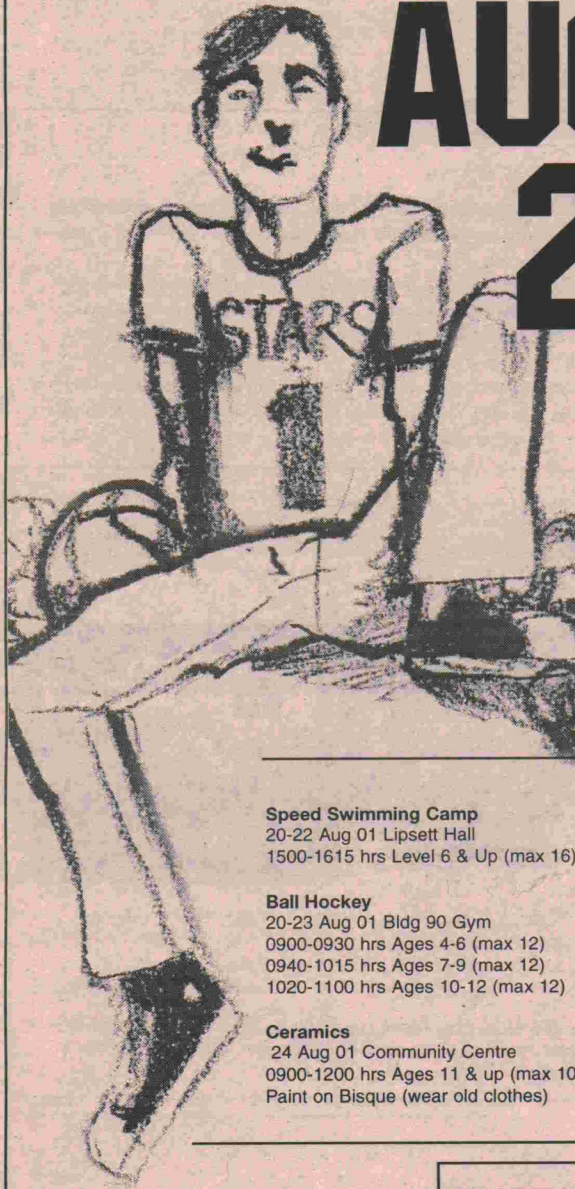
