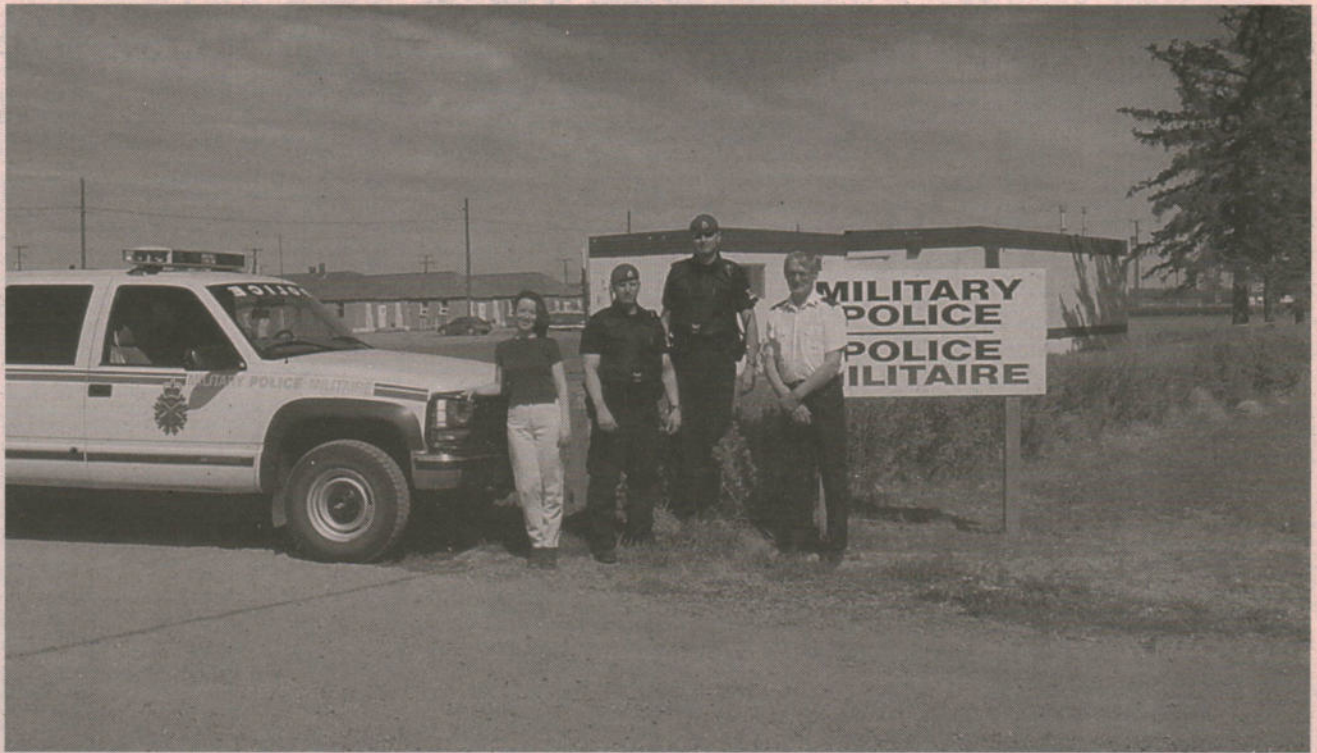

SERVING OUR COMMUNITY

The Military Police (MP) Section at 17 Wing Detachment Dundurn, takes pride in being able to provide the military community with professional law enforcement services. Under the direction of WO Barry Watson (Detachment Provost Marshal) and MS Bert Power (IC Patrols), the MP Section has evolved into a community-policing force. In recent years the Military Police have taken great strides in providing a quality police service and modernizing operations.

The MP Section currently consists of eight regular service members of the MP trade, one reserve clerk and five commissioners who provide law enforcement patrols 24/7/365. The patrol component consisting of the five members, allows for positive interaction between members of the MP Section and the community, while the HQ staff combine a wide range of skills to respond to the needs of the detachment.

As 17 Wing Detachment Dundurn is a remote location, the MP Section takes pride in being able to provide diverse police services as a result of the wide range of skills of the members of the section. From traffic accident investigations to crime scene analysis, the Military Police are able to respond to the needs of the community as required. An essential part of the work of the patrol members is volunteering with organizations in the community. Working with the Detachment Youth Center, the Detachment Military Family Resource Centre and other community events allows for patrol members to interact with the community outside of the patrol car.

The MP Section has one member specializing in security related matters concerning all military establishments and units in the Province of Saskatchewan. A demanding role, the security branch provides a vital service in protecting the military assets in Saskatchewan.

In addition, the security branch is responsible for processing all security clearance requests and in improving physical security of military facilities.

Assisting the MPs in providing a safe and secure community is the Detachment Auxiliary Security Force (DASF). Comprised of members from the detachment, the DASF is available for rapid deployment in response to critical operational activities. The DASF is both organized and trained by the MP Section and considers the DASF as a vital part of the overall service that is provided to the community.

Through continued training and professional development, the members of the MP Section in Dundurn continuously strive to provide a valuable law enforcement service to the military community.

MESSAGE FROM THE CDS

It has already been eight months since the September 11th terrorist attacks on the US. I have been extremely proud of what CF members have undertaken and accomplished since that fateful day, and throughout the following period of dynamic change and challenge. Whether you are one of the nearly 4 000 CF members involved in Operation APOLLO since it started, one of the 2 000 or so other people involved in the 12 other missions in which we are involved around the world, or one of the HQ or support staff providing assistance from Canada, you have helped to restore stability in extremely troubled regions around the world.

As I can confidently say after my recent visit to Southwest Asia, Op APOLLO has demonstrated that the CF is capable of operating alongside the best militaries in the world, under some of the worst conditions. My visit with Defence Minister Art Eggleton, gave me a first-hand look at what our men and women are doing in the campaign against terrorism, in the air, at sea and on the ground in Afghanistan. As with every other mission that I have visited since becoming CDS, I assure you that I came away filled with admiration and gratitude for the dedication, professionalism and commitment that I saw in each and every one of you.

Shortly after my return, the tragic friendly fire incident of April 17th occurred just outside of Kandahar. The deaths and injuries of our soldiers highlighted that CF members remain at risk whenever and wherever they are deployed on operations. My heartfelt condolences go out to the families and friends of the troops of the 3 PPCLI Battle Group who were killed or injured in Afghanistan. Our troops face significant dangers in this campaign against terrorism. On behalf of the CF, I assure them that they have our continued thoughts and support. We will not forget these brave soldiers.

As I said at their memorial service in Edmonton, just a few short weeks ago, history has taught us that we must always remember our fallen soldiers, sailors, airmen and airwomen. In doing so, we help give meaning to their lives and to their deaths. We will make sure that their sacrifices were not made in vain. But while we must learn the lessons of our past and honour those who came before us, we must always work for a better future. That is why we will continue to serve wherever we are called upon, to uphold our values and defend against those who would threaten them. This is what life in the military is all about. And while it is an inherently dangerous life,

strengthening our recruiting and retention efforts, as well as our learning and professional development programs);

3. Optimize Canada's defence and security capabilities (by advancing key capital projects and conducting an update of Canadian defence policy);
4. Maximize our management effectiveness (by promoting a modern-management agenda, improving communications and implementing a new information management strategy); and
5. Enhance our defence relationships (by strengthening North American security arrangements, other key international relationships and our strategic partnerships).

The bottom line is that we need to continue to modernize Canada's defence capabilities and make the changes needed to ensure that the CF remains relevant and able to meet their commitments today, tomorrow and well into the future.

The year ahead will continue to be challenging. We will need to deliver on operations and continue to re-invest in our people. I look forward to keeping each of you informed, as we work together to meet these challenges and pave the way into the future.

Next month, I'll expand on some of the ideas above and discuss the importance of quality of life and leadership in the CFs. Until then, I again compliment each and every one of you on the contributions that you continue to make to the Canadian Forces and the Department of National Defence, and look forward to the opportunity to share more of my views with you in the months to come.

The events of September 11th dramatically demonstrated how the world has changed over the past decade...especially for those of us in the CF. In addition, we have experienced first-hand how traditional peacekeeping can often be replaced by peace-building, peace enforcement, and most recently, combat operations.

To address the challenges we are facing in the aftermath of September 11th, we have established five broad priorities for the coming year. These priorities will allow us to focus on the country's top concerns for security and the CF's need for effective management of its people, resources and relationships.

These priorities are as follow:

1. Respond to the new security environment (by continuing to contribute to the campaign against terrorism and to other operations at home and abroad);
2. Put people first (by

MANITOBA EMPLOYERS RECOGNIZED FOR SUPPORTING RESERVE FORCE

Four civilian employers were honoured by the Department of National Defence in Ottawa, for their support of the Reserve Force — Canada's part-time military.

Chief of Defence Staff, General Raymond R. Henault on behalf of the Canadian Forces Liaison Council (CFLC) and the Honourable Pearl McGonigal, chair of the CFLC Committee in Winnipeg presented the awards at the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce Membership luncheon on May 16th, 2002.

Companies were nominated by their employees who are also primary reservists serving in the Canadian Forces on a part-time basis in addition to their civilian job. Companies are recognized for the continuous support they provide in allowing staff to further their military career and to participate in United Nations peacekeeping missions. The Honourable Peter Liba said "Civilian employers play an important role in ensuring reservists are able to train and serve and we are pleased with the level of support from employers across Canada."

2Lt Joe Tyson of 17 Medical Company nominated his employer, Ingrid Olson of St. Boniface General for granting him a six-week leave of absence from the emergency department for training despite the critical nursing shortage Manitoba. 2Lt Tyson wrote of Ms. Olson. "She is in my opinion, very understanding of the varied role that the militia plays in aid to civil power and acts matter of factly with granting time off."

Sgt. Claude Ouellette of the Regimental Band of the Royal Winnipeg Rifles nominated his employer, Shaun Tyler, Head of National Microbiology for granting time off for training and exercises. "During my three and a half year employ with Mr. Shaun Tyler, he has been quite flexible and supportive for all of my military training," said Sgt. Ouellette. "He is by far an exemplary employer and deserves proper recognition for his support of the Reserves and the military."

Since 1988, LS Bradley Froggatt, of HMCS Chippawa has been granted time off annually to attend training and exercises. LS Froggatt nominated his employer, Claudette Leclerc of the Manitoba Museum for her ongoing support of his military career.

Mr. Gerry Berezuk of the Province of Manitoba was nominated by Major Jim Wainwright of 17 Winnipeg Medical Company for granting three extended leave of absences to help with the Manitoba flood, training and to work on special military projects.

Supportive employers recognize that reservists make a valuable contribution to the Canadian Forces and to their fellow Canadians. They bring their work values, leadership training and specific job skills and experience directly back to their civilian workplace. Employers in turn, can take advantage of the ongoing professional development the military provides.

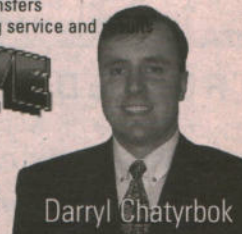

"In Canada, support for the Reserve Force is voluntary," said Deputy Prime Minister Gray, "We have not passed job protection legislation because we have always felt that, when military service is voluntary, job protection should be too. So it is especially meaningful when employers show their support by giving reservists time off to train, exercise and operate with their Regular Force counterparts."

CANADA CELEBRATES ABORIGINAL PEOPLE

NATIONAL ABORIGINAL DAY IS 21 JUNE 2002

June 21 is National Aboriginal Day, a day for all Canadians to celebrate the cultures and contributions to Canada of First Nations, Inuit, Metis peoples.

Even before the Governor General of Canada proclaimed June 21 as National Aboriginal Day, there was a long-standing desire to set aside a national day to recognize and celebrate Aboriginal peoples and cultures.

Here is a brief history of the origins of National Aboriginal Day:

1982-National Indian Brotherhood (now the Assembly of First Nations) calls for the creation of June 21 as National Aboriginal Solidarity Day;

1990-Quebec legislature recognizes June 21 as a day to celebrate Aboriginal culture;

1995-Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples recommends the designation of a National First Peoples Day;

The Sacred Assembly, a national conference of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people chaired by Elijah Harper, calls for a national holiday to celebrate the contributions of Aboriginal peoples;

JUNE 13, 1996-Former Governor General Romeo LeBlanc, declares June 21 as National Aboriginal Day after consultations with various Aboriginal groups;

JUNE 21, 1996-National Aboriginal Day is first celebrated with events from coast to coast to coast.

TODAY-National Aboriginal Day is part of the annual nation-wide Celebrate Canada festivities held from June 21 to July 1. They begin with National Aboriginal Day, are followed by Ste-Jean Baptiste Day and conclude with Canada Day.

June 21 was chosen because of the cultural significance of the summer solstice (first day of summer and longest day of the year) and because many Aboriginal groups mark this day as a time to celebrate their heritage. Setting aside a day for Aboriginal Peoples is part of the wider recognition of Aboriginal Peoples' important place within the fabric of Canada and their ongoing contributions as First Peoples. As Governor General Adrienne Clarkson said: "It is an opportunity for all of us to celebrate our respect and admiration for First Nations, for Inuit, for Metis - for the past, the present and the future."

National Aboriginal Day events are held in every region across the country.

Insuring your mortgage with term life

Your mortgage is insured and you feel as snug as a bug in a rug. Have you ever wondered what mortgage insurance really does, and if it is the proper type of insurance for you?

L'entente entre le Ministère de la Défense nationale et la Télé-université (Université du Québec) pour le maintien en vigueur du PLAN UNIVERSITAIRE DES FORCES CANADIENNES a été renouvelée récemment pour une autre période de trois ans.

Le PLAN UNIVERSITAIRE DES FORCES CANADIENNES qui existe depuis 1987, a pour objectif principal de faciliter l'accès aux études universitaires aux militaires et à leurs conjoint(e)s, ainsi qu'au personnel civil du Ministère de la Défense nationale.

Le PLAN UNIVERSITAIRE DES FORCES CANADIENNES a été établi par la Télé-université, à la demande du Ministère de la Défense nationale, pour donner aux militaires, ainsi qu'à leurs conjoint(e)s, les moyens de mener des études universitaires à bonne fin malgré ces exigences particulières reliées à leur profession.

Grâce à ce programme et aux services qu'il fournit, plus de 2020

étudiants ont poursuivi des cours dans le cadre de ce programme depuis 1987, dont environ 20% sont des officiers, 56 % des sous-officiers, 22 % des conjoint(e)s et 2 % des employés du personnel civil. Plus de 350 étudiants ont obtenu des diplômes.

Études à temps complet

Un nombre sans cesse croissant de militaires qui sont choisis pour poursuivre des études à temps complet dans le cadre de programmes subventionnés, tels le Programme de formation universitaire membres du rang (PFUMR) ou le Programme d'obtention d'un premier baccalauréat pour officiers, choisissent de poursuivre leurs études avec la Télé-université à travers le PLAN UNIVERSITAIRE DES FORCES CANADIENNES, ce qui leur permet de combiner des cours à distance pris à domicile, avec des cours pris sur campus dans une autre université au Québec ou ailleurs.

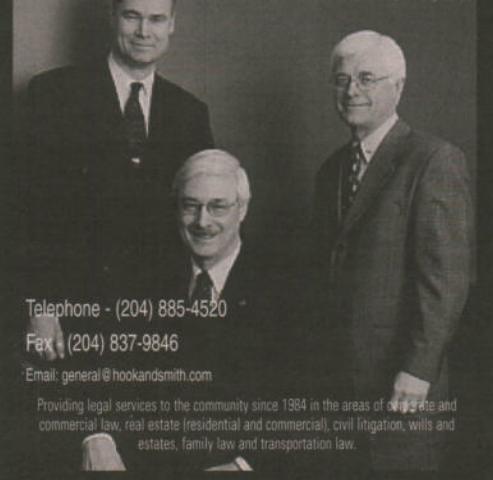

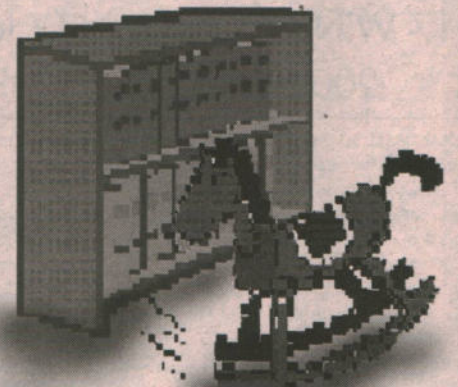

The contract to continue management of the Canadian Forces Community College Network (CFCCN) was awarded to WJR and ASSOCIATES on May 31. The firm under the direction of Bill Riddell developed the concept of CFCCN in 1994-95 and negotiated the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding by the CFCCN colleges and the Department of National Defence. Mr. Riddell has been the National Director, CFCCN since the network commenced operation in May 1995. Over 50,000 subject registrations within the 24 network colleges is one visible measurement of the impact CFCCN has had on the CF community in 19 major locations served by CFCCN coordinators. More than 15,000 of these registrations were for courses on-base and scheduled to meet base schedules and require-

ments. The CFCCN Distance Learning Catalogue that is revised annually contains over 315 pages of college courses available in a variety of distance learning alternatives.
