In the aftermath of the terrible events of September 11th, 2001, the Canadian Forces, and in particular Canada's Air Force, have been heavily involved with anti-terrorism activities, employing a wide variety of military resources. OPERATION APOLLO, the war on terrorism in Afghanistan is well known; domestic operations under the auspices of North American Aerospace Defence (NORAD) are less familiar but equally important. This on-going major CF commitment is named OPERATION NOBLE EAGLE.

surveillance and control of Canadian airspace post Sep 11. AWARDS: 1st \$2,500.00; 2nd \$1,500.00; 3rd \$1,000.00
MINIMUM SIZE: 18" X 24" and appropriate for print reproduction.

MEDIUM: Oil, acrylic, watercolour
SUBMISSION DEADLINE (35 mm slides of finished works): 16 December, 2002.

The judging panel will include the Commander 1 CAD/CANR, the Division CWO, and the Director of Air Force Heritage and History. Entries will be judged on the basis of artistic merit, technical accuracy, and historical significance. They may represent a collage of activities or one specific incident/ event. While emphasizing aerospace control and surveillance, entries need not be purely aircraft oriented. Winning entries will become the property of the Air Force Heritage Collection and will be prominently and

permanently on display at the Bishop Building in Winnipeg. The first place winner will also be reproduced as limited edition artist's proofs for presentation to all units participating in OP Noble Eagle and other significant recipients.

West Nile Virus

The West Nile Virus (WNV) is a disease transmitted by mosquitoes. The virus was named after the West Nile region of Uganda, where it first appeared in 1937. Human disease has since been reported in many areas including Egypt, Algeria, Israel, South Africa, Czech Republic, Russia and Romania. It was detected for the first time in North America in 1999 in and around New York City. In August 2001, positive reports of WNV in birds and mosquitoes were confirmed in Southern Ontario. The first positive bird was identified in Winnipeg, Manitoba on 12 July 2002. However, cases of human infection have not been reported to date in Canada.

West Nile virus is spread to humans by the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes become infected by biting an infected bird. The virus is not spread by person-to-person contact. And, it cannot be spread from a bird to a human. The risk of being bitten by a WNV - infected mosquito is low, even in areas where mosquitoes carry the virus. Most people who become infected with WNV have no symptoms, or develop mild flu-like symptoms such as: fever, headache and body aches. However, certain people, including the elderly, the young, and those with weak

immune systems are at greater risk of experiencing serious health effects such as meningitis (inflammation of the lining of the brain or spinal cord) or encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). Symptoms include the following: severe headache, high fever, stiff neck, vomiting, drowsiness, confusion, muscle weakness and loss of consciousness. Individuals who experience such severe symptoms should seek immediate medical attention.

DND has been cooperating with Health Canada and provincial health authorities in monitoring for WNV. Crows, magpies, blue jays and grey jays seem to be especially susceptible to WNV. If you see a dead bird of the crow family on DND property, report the observation to Manitoba Health Links at 788-8200 or 1-888-315-9257 and to the Preventive Medicine Department 833-2500 ext 2672. Remember to record full details of where and under what circumstances the dead bird was found and to allow for full specimen assessment and possible retrieval. Although it is unlikely that you will become infected with WNV by touching a carcass, AVOID direct contact with dead birds. Because positive reports of WNV in infected birds has already been confirmed in Winnipeg, spread of WNV in rural

areas outside of Winnipeg is now being closely monitored.

CF member can do several things to protect themselves from WNV, and also to contribute to efforts to track the spread of the virus. Good insect discipline is the first line of defence against WNV. Preventing mosquito bites is recommended and includes the following strategies:

- applying a DEET - based insect repellent to areas of the skin that are exposed to mosquito attack. Recent studies have shown that DEET is the most effective for preventing mosquito bites. And actually, other products had no effect whatsoever on preventing mosquito bites. For more information on the use of DEET, see the websites listed at the end;
- wearing appropriate clothing, including; head nets, long sleeved shirts and pants;
- where possible, avoiding areas where mosquito populations are high and/or timing activities when mosquitoes are less active. (e.g. many species of mosquitoes, including some that transmit WNV, are more likely to bite in the morning and evening, or in shaded areas);
- prevent mosquitoes from entering into buildings by screening doors and windows; and
- identifying and taking measures

to eliminate mosquito breeding grounds around the house or cottage and in operational areas. Because many mosquitoes breed in stagnant standing water, this could include filling in depressions in the ground where water accumulates, changing bird bath water regularly, ensuring that rain gutters are working properly and do not accumulate water. Empty, cover or remove other containers (cans, rain barrels, buckets, tires, boats) where water may accumulate.

FROM THE DESK OF THE WAC:

"IS THE ECSTASY WORTH THE PAIN?"

MDMA (known as Ecstasy) is a mind-altering drug with hallucinogenic effects. Ecstasy is produced in improvised labs and packaged for cultural appeal to young people. Use of Ecstasy can have severe physical and psychological consequences and is potentially FATAL.

Signs of Intoxification: increased energy, sense of pleasure, sociability, feeling of euphoria. Negative effects may include sweating, muscle tension, increased heart rate, suppressed appetite, nausea, vomiting, blurred vision, grinding of teeth, jaw pain, anxiety, panic attacks, tremors and hallucinations.

Withdrawal Symptoms: Confusion, panic, insomnia - may last for weeks.

EFFECTS OF CHRONIC USE

- MIND & BEHAVIOUR: Severe depression, confusion, anxiety, paranoia, apathy, distortions in perception and memory, insomnia, suicidal tendencies.

- HEART & BLOOD: Increased heart rate and blood pressure, possible cardiovascular failure induced by high body temperature and dehydration.
- BRAIN: Destruction of serotonin neurons, possible irreparable brain damage.
- LUNGS: Damage, may cause internal bleeding.
- LIVER: Jaundice and liver damage.
- KIDNEYS: Kidney failure.
- MUSCLES: Muscle tension, rigidity, breakdown of skeletal muscle.

OTHER RISKS

Severe hyperthermia (possibly to 110 °F or 43.3 °C), tachycardia, convulsions, sudden collapse, coma, potentially FATAL

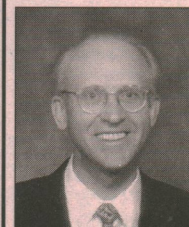
Open House for Interim Learning and Career Centre (LCC)

Tips and Traps on Credit Use

In today's world almost everyone uses credit. With little or no training on how to budget, save money or use credit wisely, people can get into serious financial difficulties.

A common powerful sales strategy trap used by retail stores is, "buy now and pay later" and it should be avoided. You can't afford the purchase now and you think you have the discipline to put aside the money to pay for your purchase in six months from now? In most cases, this miracle won't happen and this is what the third party finance company counts on.

When you "buy now and pay later", there is generally a deferral fee. The contract you sign is usually sold to third party finance companies and can have interest rates as high as 30%. Interest can be retroactive to the purchase date and calculated in full at the end of the deferral period if the account is not completely paid by the due date. Wouldn't it make more sense to be patient and put money aside and pay cash for your purchase? This way you will know for certain that you can afford your new acquisition.

Another trap used by retail stores is credit cards with bonus points attached. These retail stores cards can carry interest rates calculated daily as high as 28.8%. If you must use credit cards and plan on carrying a balance, consider using a general credit card, such as Visa or Master Card, offering a lower rate of interest, or double your payments.

On the chart below, you can see that by simply doubling the minimum payment, you can save years and money on interest:

Credit card balance of \$1000 at 28.8%:

Should you have to make an essential purchase and use credit, CANEX offers a no interest credit plan to a maximum of \$5,000 to CF members, their spouses and other authorized patrons. Their plan is a true interest free credit plan for up to one year and can be extended to two years subject to a small administration fee. In addition, the Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) has a Self Improvement Loan Program (SILP) to address emergencies, and to improve your quality of life. SILP loans may be approved for specific purchases, such as buying a computer or furniture. Contact your base Financial Counsellor who can offer professional guidance, or check out the website www.sisip.com for more information.

Remember "credit" is a business and you will never get something for nothing. Credit is a privilege, not a right and it should be used carefully.

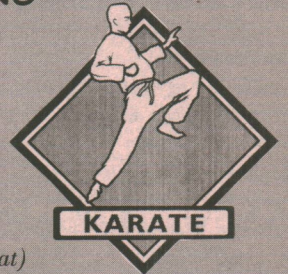

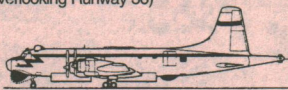

New stamps for a New Nation

Stamp collectors can tell you that the first adhesive postage stamp was the Penny Black, issued by Great Britain and first used officially on May 6, 1840. Even a quick look at a stamp catalogue will tell you that since that first stamp there has been a flood of postage stamps from countries of the world. Generations ago it was possible to collect all the stamps of the world; possible today? Not likely.

So, where does a collector start? One other starting point appeared earlier this year, when the new country of East Timor issued its first stamps. You may recall the new of the last few years telling us of this small nation's war with ruling Indonesia and the involvement of the United Nations, with May 20, 2002, being the date East Timor became a nation.

On that date its first postage stamps were issued, a set of four values. The 25¢ value shows the national symbol, a crocodile, the 50¢ ceremonial palm fronds, the \$1 depicts coffee-growing, an important industry. The \$2 value, illustrated here, shows us the flag of the new nation. Each stamp also illustrates "tias," a traditional woven cloth.

Australia Post printed the stamps as its contribution to the life of the new nation.

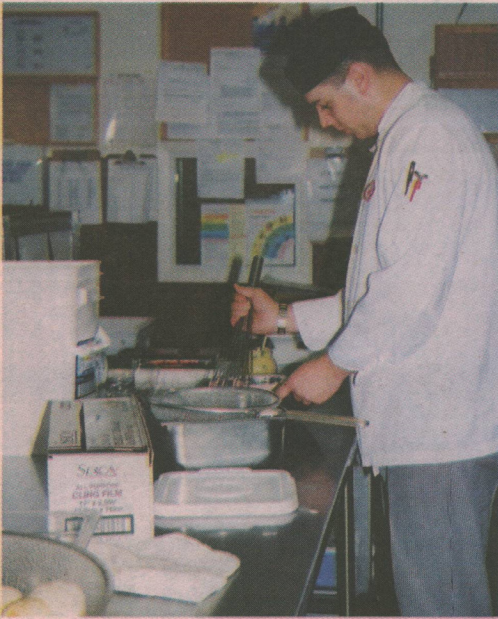

In the midst of the regular duties that are completed daily within the kitchens of 17 Wing Food Services Squadron, there are other responsibilities that are carried out as well. The QL 4 On-Job-Training (OJT) program for QL3 qualified cooks is one example. It is the responsibility of Food Service Squadrons to ensure that all QL3 cooks complete this 18 month program which provides them with the basic information they need to work as a Cook and develop their skills.

During a Logistics Conference held in Winnipeg in the Spring of 2002, these cooks were given a practical opportunity to utilize the training and skills they had achieved to date. Recipes for the dishes were chosen either from the Internet, Culinary Arts Cookbook or a

favourite home recipe. In selecting the four courses, the Cooks had to choose carefully so that each course would compliment the other. Soup, main course, salad and dessert had to flow together in taste, colour and in texture. Every course was garnished and placed for eye appeal.

Under supervision, these Cooks worked in teams to:

- plan the menu;
- calculate the cost;
- determine the groceries required;
- prepare for the menu (timing of each course including preparation, cooking and consumption etc.)
- set up the work area, equipment and place settings; and
- cook and present the meal.

On a Wing and a Prayer

With cool July temperatures ranging from 2 to 8 °C, a group of Inuit pilgrims on their way to the World Youth Day in Toronto, packed their belongings, toiletries, and an arctic char and headed south to Winnipeg, awaiting obliviously for what was in store.

Coming in two separate groups, the pilgrims were greeted at the Winnipeg International Airport July 17th and 18th by members of the 17 Wing Chapel and a blisteringly hot summer day. There was great excitement in the air since, for many, this was their first trip on an airplane or south to Winnipeg. They struggled with their luggage, consist-

ing of suitcases, native dress, and instruments. A bar-b-que was held at the Wing Chapel Annex for the first group. They were anxious to see the sights and to get in some shopping at Polo Park. Some guests were able to visit relatives who reside in the city.

Before departing for all parts of the city, the Inuit guests showed the volunteers their costumes and held impromptu lessons on drum dancing and throat singing. Volunteers were able to ask questions regarding the territorial flag, dress, symbols, and customs. Some of the guests played the guitar, and folk songs were sung after dinner.

One of the host families opened their home so that the first 12 delegates could swim in their pool. This was a treat for those from Arviat because there is only one pool in the town, and it has only four feet of water in it. The guests were afraid of such a large pool; however, their fears dissipated quickly and they were using the slide by the end of the evening. The party lasted until 2330 hours, when it was time to return to the Chapel Annex for some much-needed sleep.

For the first group of visitors, morning came early at 0600 hours. A breakfast meal was arranged and transportation was provided

to the airport at 0700 hours for their trip to London, Ontario, and subsequently on to Toronto.

The second group of pilgrims arrived on July 18th at 1530 hours. Once again, a bar-b-que was held at the Chapel Annex and more shopping was done. This group, slightly older than the first, was asleep early in anticipation of their 0600 hours wake-up call. A pancake breakfast was provided for the group before leaving for their 0830 hours flight.

A big thank-you is extended to all those who were involved in volunteering their time, talents, and vehicles to make this venture a huge success.

Emergency Childcare Service

The ECS provides immediate, affordable, regulated childcare in times of emergency.

- Designed to be your "BACK-UP"!
- The emergency may be the result of an unexpected/short notice duty/deployment/op. or training, where the member does not have sufficient time to implement his/her family care plan.
- During a deployment, families may experience a childcare emergency for a variety of reasons: medical, compassionate etc., By having one parent out of the area it increases the likely hood of some event that might disrupt the usual childcare arrangement and requires immediate alternative arrangements.

An "emergency" is NOT ...

"Recurring events for which a plan should be developed"

i.e. Mildly ill children, school in-services and in the case of deployments, misc. Duties, base exercises, or training for which advance warning in excess of 7 days has been given."

- The MFRC compiles and maintains listings of a large variety of childcare resources to help your family plan for just such events. These listings can facilitate the location of childcare providers for all occasions: casual evening, before & after school, emergency, overnight and extended hours.
- BUT... even the best-laid plans sometimes fall apart...and your presence at work is critical, that's where the ECS becomes your "back-up". The ECS can provide subsidised childcare services to assist in the first 72 hrs while you seek out an alternate childcare arrangement.
- For childcare emergencies as described above, funding

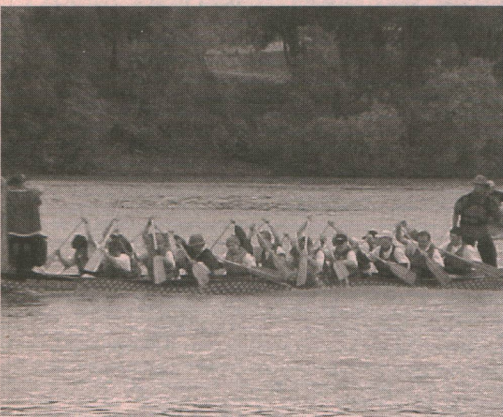
has been made available to fully cover reasonable cost incurred during the first 72 hrs and pro-rated partial billing up to a (max) 7 days.

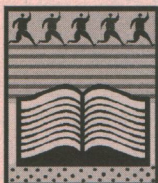

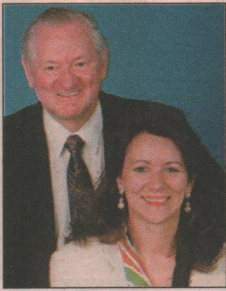
