Dieppe Pilgrimage 2002 St. Aubin-le-Cauf's Canadians

Early the morning of August 19, 1942, Canadian P/O Norman Monchier and P/O John Edwin Gardiner took off in their Spitfire Mk VBs to provide air power to the Dieppe Raid. The two pilots had received their wings at the same time, training and flying throughout the war as a team. They could not have imagined as they left England for France that 60 years later, their comrades would assemble at Dieppe for a ceremony in their honour.

When 403 Squadron first took off from Manston, England, the landings had already been made on the beaches of Dieppe. Initially, enemy opposition

was light, but had increased considerably by the time the squadron arrived. During the ensuing air battle, French eyewitnesses saw two Spitfires appear over a forest, flying a few feet above the treetops. During an exchange between Monchier's and Gardiner's aircraft and a German FW190, the two Spitfires collided and crashed in a field at St. Aubin-le-Cauf, five miles southeast of Dieppe. Both pilots died instantly.

"I was 15 years old when I witnessed the air battle," said an emotional Alfred Prévost. "My friend and I quickly peddled our bicycles to the site of the crash. Being the first to

arrive at the scene, we checked to see if any help could be given, but unfortunately we found both pilots dead." Villagers buried the two pilots in the St. Aubin-le-Cauf cemetery and have tended their graves for 60 years. After the war, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission traversed Europe claiming their fallen airmen.

"When they came to St. Aubin-le-Cauf they told the villagers they were taking the bodies to the main Dieppe Cemetery," said Wing Commander (retired) Douglas Warren. "The people refused, saying, 'These men died for us, we shall look after the graves and honour these men.' And so they

did and continue to do so. We owe the people of this village a debt of gratitude."

Each year on August 19 a modest service is held; flowers are laid, and prayers said. Sixty years later, Dieppe veterans, villagers and a Canadian Forces Ceremonial Flag Party returned to the small crowded cemetery in St Aubin-le-Cauf to pay their respects. Three Air Force representatives, WO Alan Blakney from B.C.'s 443 Sqn, Sgt Hank Coffin from 16 Wing Borden and Sgt Rod Cousins from 22 Wing North Bay formed the flag party.

"It was very moving to witness the care and devotion given to our two airmen by the French people," said Warrant Officer J. Ross Atkinson, a member of the Canadian Forces Ceremonial Flag Party from the Royal Regiment of Canada. "Their selfless attention to these graves over these past 60 years demonstrates true love of service to their fellow man."

Capt Ben Bond, the Air Force's historian from 1 Canadian Air Division

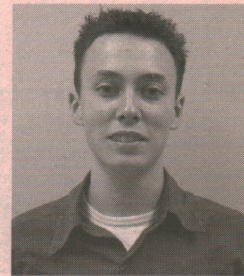
Headquarters in Winnipeg, gave a brief address at the ceremony. "It was both a privilege and an honour to be able to pay our respects to these two fallen airmen who had given their lives in the defence of freedom," he said. "For the last 60 years the people of this town have shown their appreciation, and now it is our turn."

Corporal Denis Vallée from the Canadian Forces Supply Depot in Edmonton was impressed by the dedication of St. Aubin-le-Cauf to the two Canadian graves. "In this town, these two airmen were a symbol of hope in a dark time, as were others that landed on the beaches of Dieppe. They are well remembered."

P/O Norman Monchier, 19, was from Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, while P/O John Edwin Gardiner, 23, was from Ottawa. Due to the nature of operations at the time, it was over one year before their families were notified of their deaths.

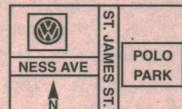

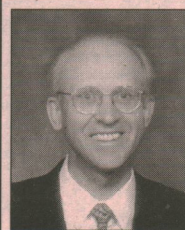

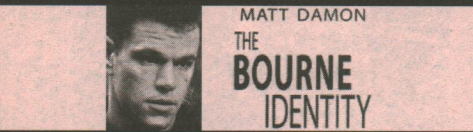

Report from the 2002 Canadian National Broomball Championships

The 2002 Canadian National Broomball Championships were held in Ottawa, Ont. on 3-6 Apr 02. The Manitoba Hawks senior women's team, including one member from 17 Wing, represented the province at this competition. Capt Deanna Manson, 1 CAD HQ, has been a Hawk since 1998 and has attended the Canadian National Broomball Championships three times (1999, 2001 and 2002). This year marked the best showing for the Manitoba Hawks at the national competition as they came away with the 'B'-side silver medal.

It is notable that the Canadian Forces is represented at the Canadian National Broomball Championships in a variety of ways: players like Deanna can attend the tournament as part of a civilian team that wins their respective provincial championships in accordance CFAO 50-3.

There is also a special agreement made between the CF and the Canadian Broomball Federation (CBF) whereby the women's and men's teams that win the CF National Broomball Championships at CFB Borden can represent the CF at the Canadian National tournament. In the latter case, the winning team from the CF competition can pick up a maximum of fifty-percent of their roster from other teams attending the CF National tournament. As a result, the CF team could include members from right across the five regions. In exchange for CF participation, it is understood that, where possible, base broomball teams will register with their local provincial association. This arrangement is indicative of the close relationship between the CF and the CBF to ensure continuing development of the sport. Finally, CF members who are qualified referees may also be selected by their provincial associations to attend. Maj Denis St. Pierre, 1 CAD HQ Region Cadet Support, attended this year and was noted to be one of the most qualified and experienced refs at the competition.

As you can well imagine, the competition at the Canadian Nationals is tough. Broomball is a full contact sport and there is no holding back at this level. The Manitoba Hawks finished 3rd in their pool in the round robin having competed against Ontario 1 (0-2), Quebec 2 (3-7), Canadian Forces (2-1) and New Brunswick 1 (1-0). The team was able to get the best of Saskatchewan in the semi-final round (1-0), but lost to Alberta (0-2) in the final game to earn the silver medal. The Hawks were also awarded the Sportsmanship Award at the end of the tournament. The Canadian Forces women's team won the 'B'-side bronze medal, but the men's team did not place.

Nouvelles du championnat canadien de ballon sur glace 2002

Du 3 au 6 avril 2002 se tenait, à Ottawa (Ontario), le championnat canadien de ballon sur glace. L'équipe féminine senior, les Hawks du Manitoba, dont faisait partie le Capitaine Deanna Manson de la 17e Escadre, représentait la province à cette compétition. Le Capitaine Manson du QG de la 1 DAC fait partie des Hawks depuis 1998. Elle a participé au championnat canadien de ballon sur glace trois fois (1999, 2001 et 2002). Cette année a été la meilleure de toutes pour les Hawks du Manitoba; ils ont obtenu la médaille d'argent dans la catégorie B.

Il faut mentionner que la représentation des Forces canadiennes au championnat canadien de ballon sur glace peut prendre diverses formes. Selon l'OAFC 50-3, les joueurs, comme Deanna, peuvent participer au tournoi en tant que membre d'une équipe civile qui a remporté le championnat provincial. Il existe aussi une entente spéciale entre les FC et la Fédération canadienne de ballon sur glace qui prévoit que les équipes féminine et masculine gagnantes du championnat national de ballon sur glace des FC tenu à la BFC Borden peuvent représenter les FC au championnat canadien de ballon sur glace. Les équipes participant au championnat canadien peuvent choisir des joueurs des équipes ayant participé au tournoi des FC, à condition que ceux-ci ne représentent pas plus de 50 % de la formation. Ainsi, les équipes des FC pourraient très bien comprendre des membres des cinq régions. En contrepartie de la participation des FC au championnat, on s'attend à ce que les équipes de ballon sur glace des bases s'inscrivent, dans la mesure du possible, auprès des associations provinciales. Cette entente reflète la relation étroite entre les FC et la Fédération, relation qui contribue à l'avancement du sport. Les arbitres des FC peuvent être choisis par leurs associations provinciales. Le Major Denis St. Pierre, de l'unité de soutien des cadets du QG de la 1 DAC a participé au championnat et a été reconnu comme l'un des arbitres ayant le plus d'expérience et de compétences.

Comme vous vous en doutez, la compétition est acharnée au championnat canadien. Le ballon sur glace est un sport de contact et à ce niveau, il n'y a aucune retenue. Les Hawks du Manitoba ont fini troisième dans la ronde de qualification. L'équipe a affronté l'Ontario 1 (0-2), le Québec 2 (3-7), les Forces canadiennes (2-1) et le Nouveau-Brunswick 1 (1-0). Elle a battu la Saskatchewan en demi-finale (1-0), mais a perdu en finale contre l'Alberta (0-2), ce qui lui a valu la médaille d'argent. Les Hawks ont reçu le prix du championnat décerné à l'équipe ayant fait preuve du meilleur esprit sportif. L'équipe féminine des Forces canadiennes a gagné la médaille de bronze dans la catégorie B et l'équipe masculine ne s'est pas qualifiée.

SEPTEMBER 11 CDS COMMUNIQUE



General Raymond Henault CDS

Over the course of the past several months, I have been most fortunate to travel across Canada visiting various bases, wings, and units, and to see for myself the brilliant work and dedication that is the hallmark of our Canadian Forces members. It has also been an honour to welcome literally thousands of you home as you returned to Canada from the mountains of Afghanistan, from patrol sectors in the Arabian Sea, and from the skies of southwest Asia. As the Chief of the Defence Staff, I share the immense pride that is your reward for having given so much of yourselves under unyielding conditions. To say that the men and women of the Canadian Forces and DND "delivered" does not really do your efforts justice. Following September 11th, thousands of you cancelled leave, worked overtime, and deployed abroad to help us meet our commitments and obligations to international peace and security and the campaign against terrorism. We have also made extreme sacrifices - another hallmark of Canadians in uniform. As no commemora-

tion of September 11 would be complete without paying homage to the thousands who perished in the horrors of the attacks, no words of praise or encouragement from me would be complete without lamenting the painful loss of friends and colleagues and emphasizing the sorrow we feel for the families of those who were injured or killed in the line of duty this past year. I also want to stress that our commitments have not ended. Indeed, on Sept. 9, the crew of HMCS Montreal sailed from Halifax for the Arabian Sea and, on Sept. 15, HMCS Winnipeg will sail from Esquimalt. In the meantime, Hercules, Sea King, and Aurora crews have maintained unbroken operations in the skies over Southwest Asia. On the anniversary of September 11, 2001, I ask you to pause with your comrades-in-arms, your families and your friends, and remember and honour the victims of terrorism, those members of the Canadian Forces who died in the service of our nation, and those who continue to serve so far from home.

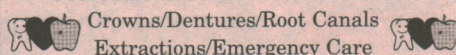

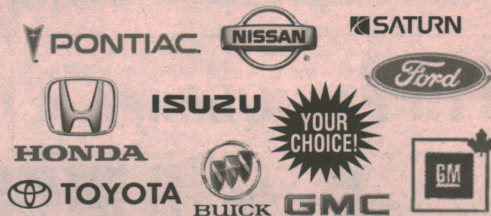

Bill 9, The Canadian Forces Personnel (Amendments Relating to Voting Rights and Driving Privileges) Act, was passed on July 17, 2002 by the Legislative Assembly of Manitoba.

Chapter 7 - The Canadian Forces Personnel (Amendments Relating to Voting Rights and Driving Privileges) Act.

The Elections Act

The Elections act previously allowed people to vote in a provincial election only if they have resided in Manitoba for at least six months immediately before polling day.

Chapter 7 now allows Manitoba residents who are members of the Canadian Forces - and the people who live with them - to vote when posted outside the province. (Deployed)

The Highway Traffic Act

Chapter 7 allows members of the Canadian Forces whose drivers' licenses expire while they are posted (Deployed) outside Manitoba to maintain their merit-mark eligibility. In addition, Chapter 7 also requires the Registrar of Motor Vehicles to establish the merit and demerit status of members who move to Manitoba and obtain drivers' licenses. The changes also apply to certain family members.

DID YOU KNOW?

- The MFRC's programs and services are not funded. 98% of the MFRC funds are used for core services employee salaries with 2% left for basic O&M.

- The MFRC's Special Need's Coordinator has a case-load of 15 military families to date for this fiscal year.

This saved families an average of \$300.00 per week in summer childcare and allowed for a place where

military youth can find friendship and recreation.

All of the MFRC's programs and services are available to all military families at no cost or very little costs. The availability and success of our programs and services are dependent on fundraising and donations.

Last year the MFRC received \$1500.00 from people directing their donations to the Military Family Resource Centre through the United Way. This donation was used at our Youth Centre's Summer Camps. 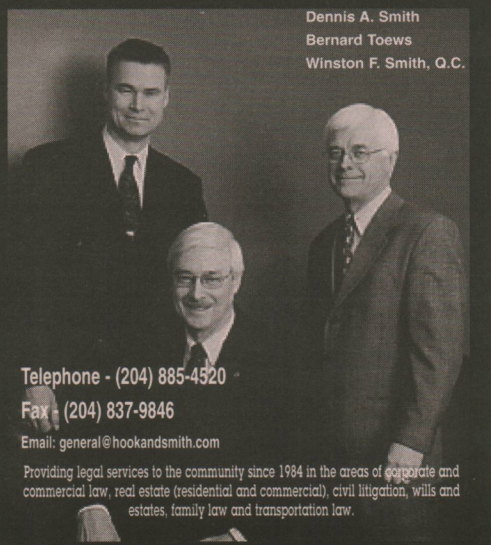
