Lieutenant-Governor Liba Presents Awards at 17 Wing

The Honourable Peter Liba, Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba, was on hand at 17 Wing on Friday, February 21 to present the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal and Commander-In-Chief Unit Commendation awards. Also present for the event were MLA-St.James Mrs. Bonnie Korzeniowski and Mr. Korzeniowski, MLA-Assiniboine Mr. Jim Rondeau, Wing Commander Colonel D.C. McLennan and Mrs. McLennan, and Wing Chief Warrant Officer Frank Emond and Mrs. Emond.

"It's such an honour to have The Honourable Lieutenant-Governor and Mrs. Liba here today," said Colonel McLennan. "They are strong supporters of the military in Manitoba and in Winnipeg, and are very active in social affairs in the province."

The ceremony was held to recognize the efforts and accomplishments of military personnel (both active and retired) and

community members. The Commander-In-Chief Unit Commendation was created by the Governor-General in 2000 to publicly recognize the performance of military deeds of a rare, high standard under extremely hazardous circumstances, which brings honour to Canada and benefits the reputation of the Canadian Forces. The Commendation was awarded to the 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry Battle Group for courageous and professional execution of duty during the Medak Pocket operation in the Former Yugoslavia in September, 1993. Members of the 2PPCLI Battle Group held their ground under enemy fire, forcing the Croatian Army to cease 'ethnic cleansing' in the sector. Their bravery undoubtedly saved many innocent lives.

The Queen's Golden Jubilee Medal commemorates the 50th

anniversary of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and is awarded to Canadians who have made a significant contribution to their fellow citizens, their community, and to Canada. Recipients are nominated for the medal by a wide variety of public, private and non-profit organizations across the country.

"This is a very special occasion, where we recognize those who served Canada with honour, distinction, and valour," said His Honour, Lieutenant-Governor Liba. "The actions of the recipients of the Commander-In-Chief Unit Commendation saved the lives of countless people from the escalating madness of 'ethnic cleansing', and your actions will not be forgotten."

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New Patrol for Tadoule Lake, MB

Tadoule Lake is situated 250 km west of Churchill and 920 km north of Winnipeg. It has a population of approximately 250 Sayisi Dene First Nation people. Tadoule Lake is truly an isolated community. The closest community is Lac Brochet some 120 Km west as the crow flies. The only way in or out is by air or winter road; the latter only for a few months of the year (and mere 24 hrs by truck to Lynn Lake). The economy is based on hunting, fishing, trapping and many are professional guides for outfitters.

The people of Tadoule Lake gave a warm welcome the CO, 4CRPG, Maj

Ian Hay, GSM, MWO Bud Fisher and the Admin O, WO Shannon Wills from our HQ in Victoria BC, as well as the MB Ranger Det from Winnipeg, MWO Doug Colton, WO Wade Jones, WO Christine Fink and Sgt Jeff Belisle. The chilling temperatures and hundreds of caribou on Tadoule Lake were the backdrop for the initial community briefing on the Ranger Program. Two more briefings were given over the next 2 days and the interest steadily grew. From that day on, the community was very enthusiastic and eager to help the Ranger Program in any way they could.



Living on the land comes as no great hardship for the older members of the Patrol but becomes a

little more difficult for the younger ones. Having a cross section of the age groups provides a great op-

portunity for the passing of knowledge from generation to generation. Patrol Comd, Sgt Jim Clipping says. He has been actively involved with the youth of the community for a while now and sees the Ranger program as a positive step for the community.

Weather is always a factor when this far north and often halts the best laid plans, or at least one must re-evaluate them, as was the case with the FTX. Temperatures dropped to -50 with the wind chill, so day trips replaced the overnight exercise. Even daylight temperatures did

not warm the soul as we had hoped, however, a good hot fire, a brew of tea and hot IMPs kept the body fuelled enough to squeeze in a couple of hours of lake trout fishing on Stony Lake. Where tales of 50 pounders kept Sgt Jeff Belisle and most of the patrol huddled around holes on the ice to witness a couple of 5 pounders jump through the holes to keep the interest. These hardy new Rangers were not to be slowed. Try

standing on a toboggan, hanging onto a backboard and being towed by a ski-doo for 15 or 20 miles at -40 to -50, not a problem for the Rangers from Tadoule Lake. "Winter travel is a way of life for some" says Section Leader, Mcpl Tommy Cheekie, who has made the 500 km round trip to Churchill many times and has guided professional adventures from Europe across the north.

Training went very well with an excellent turnout each night. Map and compass proved to be an interesting subject for all. Though the Dene people travel extensively in their traditional hunting grounds, map and compass are seldom used, if at all. It was enlightening to see traditional navigational skills coupled with modern aids and how they enhance each other. Ranger Joe Thorassie SR, one of the older members of the patrol, tells of when his people trav-

elled as far east as Churchill and north of the 60th parallel to the Coppermine and Kazan River all without maps or compass. Even today, seasonal trips still happen. Patrol 2I/C Ernie Bussidor says "All you have to do is look at any map and the names of the lakes and you can tell how far my people travelled. The names are in Dene, like Kasba Lake, Dene for Ptarmigan", and the list went on.



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Butting Out – Making it a Reality: 17 Wing Members Share their Stories. Part III

The following is the final article in our 3-part series on butting out, in which 17 Wing members share their personal stories about smoking cessation, to assist those participating in the "March 1st, I Quit!" smoking cessation challenge. This personal story focuses on remaining smoke free in the long term. The author of this article shares practical strategies for personal motivation. I'm sure you'll agree that the personal stories shared in this series on smoking cessation are inspiring and provide really useful strategies for quitting smoking.

Quitting Smoking, or more aptly put... GETTING REAL

I won't get into the history of why I smoked and what I experienced while smoking. Waste of time for smokers to read that. I will discuss quitting though, why I did it and how I did it.

Having smoked for 13 years, and resolving to give up the habit many times, I decided it was time to get real about the whole situation. My second son was born Dec 11th, 1991. I smoked my last cigarette on Dec 15th, 1991. In spite of the oncoming holiday season and the obligatory celebrations, I just decided that it was time to get real. I just love the phrase "Everyone quits

smoking – sometime". Both my sons – the first was born in 1988 – were too important to continue the lunacy of polluting both myself and the air around them with what I knew (and everyone else knows) are the hundreds of chemicals, otherwise known to the human body as carcinogenic garbage, within the smoke I was creating. My wife had quit smoking during her pregnancy, and appeared to have the habit kicked.



I'm not saying it was simply the presence of my children or my wife's ability to stop smoking. It goes to something much more profound. The recognition that I believe every smoker needs to go through – what the real situation is - that cigarettes are nothing more than junk, garbage, and people-polluters that have no place in our world. They are currently about as anti-social a phenomenon as can be. They are impediments to many, many social situations.

But enough diatribe. Over the years that I was a smoker, I met several people who had quit. Some of them started up again, even after months and sometimes years of having gone without smoking. As a

smoker who wanted to quit, that was just flabbergasting! How I wished that I could quit for a month, even a couple of weeks! I knew that by "investing time" I could stay off them. And thus was born my strategy.

When I quit, I made sure that the day I picked was an appropriate one. Not a Friday, nor a Saturday – I was worried about getting involved in a social situation that might tempt me to light up. I chose a Sunday because it was the day before work. I allowed myself to smoke that day, but decided to go to bed early that night. Then I went for it. I counted time, in terms of hours, without smoking. The first nine hours were a breeze. I slept right through them. Suddenly, I was into double digits. 10 hours. You see, my strategy was to consider the milestones I was achieving, and that I didn't want to waste the time I "invested" in not smoking, like the other people I described before who started up again after lengthy periods of going without. I was getting good at counting hours and figuring out when milestones would occur. Did you know that 100 hours is exactly 4 days and 4 hours? I considered that milestone as one of the most important. Or that 1000 hours is 42 1/3 days? Once you have 200 hours, you've gone over a week, and I think that the 250 hour point – of 1000, or 10 days/10 hours is the magic milestone. 1000 hours occurred on a February morning as I was waking up. I went outside

and took a deep breath of cold Winnipeg air and felt glad because I knew it was over. I continued to count to 2000 hours (almost 3 months), and sometime between 2000 and 3000 I stopped counting. Well, not quite. I still do to this day in terms of the months and years I have gone without smoking. Now it's been just over 12 years, and my next milestone is the 13 year point. That is exactly how long I smoked for, and it feels like it will be an eraser to all those years of being under the nasty influence of cigarettes.

Some might feel it would be anti-productive to be thinking about quitting smoking while doing it, as it may be tempting to start up again because of all the thought going toward the effort. But for some reason, the more I involved myself with the milestones, the more repulsive it felt if I was to go back to inhaling the noxious substances into my body. I could literally feel the headache I would achieve by puffing, especially if I was enjoying a beer! (or more to the point, the headache I would have the next morning...). I ate a lot of sunflower seeds, not the already shelled kind, and read a lot of books.

In summary, and at the risk of sounding "preachy", quitting can be relatively easy if one is willing to invest the time and to not "sell out" the time invested. The more milestones one reaches, the more difficult it is to go back.

Worked for me.

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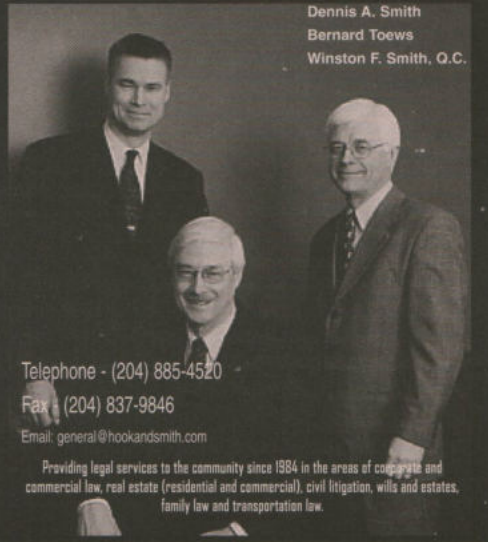

New Pre-School Swim Program ready, and Improved Swim Lesson Delivery to Make a Splash

Beginning in April, parents with preschool aged children will see a big difference in class programming. Community Recreation is introducing a new five level preschool program created to meet the physical and mental capabilities of children between the ages of three and five. The program incorporates the same knowledge and water based skills as the Red Cross Aqua Quest program but has been designed with the unique needs of preschool aged children in mind. In level one, children will be introduced to the aquatic envi-

ronment through games, songs and practice of the basic skills. Advancing through the levels, they will be taught floats, glides, breathing and strokes. At completion of the 5 levels, children will be able to swim an entire length of the main pool. To ensure that each child is given the best opportunity to succeed, we have set the class ratio for these lessons at four children to one instructor. In addition, Preschool classes will now run for a full thirty-minute class instead of just twenty minutes.

Child - Instructor ratios will also change for the Aqua Quest program. Aqua Quest Levels one through six will have six children to one instructor, while children registered Aqua Quest seven to twelve will have eight children to one instructor. These ratios have been set with your child's learning in mind. The new class sizes will ensure more one-on-one attention for each child as well as maximize the amount of time that each child spends swimming. In the event a swim block becomes open, private



swimming lessons would be made available. At a cost of \$15.00, your child will receive one thirty-minute lesson that will allow them to receive individual attention from one of our instructors. Enrolling your child into one of these lessons will allow them the time to grasp a new concept that they might be struggling with or extra time to practice some drills that will help them improve

their overall swimming ability.

If you are interested in taking some of the advanced life guarding and instructing courses such as Bronze Medallion, Bronze Cross, Aqua Leaders, or N.L.S., please phone ext. 7013 to have your name added to our interest lists.

To assist in the cost-recovery of these programs, the swim lesson registration fee will increase from \$25 to \$35/level for the first two children in a family, additional children can register for \$25/level. Bronze Medallion and Bronze Cross courses are available at a cost of \$95.00 per child

including the manual.

Registration for the spring session will begin on March 17, 2003. The lessons will start the week of April 15 and run for 10 weeks until the middle of June. 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Air Commodore Birchall Delivers Words of Wisdom

Distinguished officer shares experiences, lessons with AAOC

17 Wing had the honour of hosting a lecture on leadership by Air Commodore (retired) Leonard J. Birchall, which was delivered to the Advanced Aerospace Operations Course (AAOC) at the Officer's Mess on Friday, February 28.

"Command is a source of authority," said Air Commodore Birchall.

"Command brings obedience, but not loyalty and trust – those must be earned."

The Air Commodore's lecture focused on what he calls the "Three C's" of leadership – Character, Competence, and Comradeship. Through the afternoon, the Air Commodore recounted his personal experiences in the military – which included a moving account of his experience as a pilot and Japanese POW in the Second World War – to point out the qualities inherent in a good officer.

"The fight with selfishness is the biggest battle that you'll ever have to wage," said the Air Commodore to the assembled officers. "Once you've won that fight, everything else will fall into place."

The Air Commodore actively served in the CF for over 30 years, and after retirement from active duty, continued to remain very active in both military and civilian

affairs. His list of honours is long and prestigious: the Order of Canada, Order of the British Empire for Gallantry, Order of Ontario, Distinguished Flying Cross, and the only member of the CF ever to receive the fifth bar to the C.D., just to name a few.

During the Second World War, the Air Commodore was named the "Saviour of Ceylon" for getting a warning to the Island of Ceylon that a Japanese fleet was closing in on April 4, 1942. His actions saved the British fleet and allowed the island time to prepare a defence. Just after getting the signal away, the Air Commodore's plane was shot down. He became a Japanese POW, and was taken to Yokohama Camp, where he remained for the rest of the war. He and his fellow prisoners faced horrible atrocities at the hands of the guards, and often the Air Commodore and the other officers inter-

vened and took punishment that would otherwise have been meted out to the men. Even though a rest is well deserved after such a remarkable record of service, Air Commodore Birchall continues to give. When asked what it is that drives him to continue to serve his country and his fellow citizens, the Air Commodore was unsure of the answer. "I don't know, I really don't," he said. "I guess that when I see something that needs to be done, I can't stop myself from doing it."

"I don't mind doing it at all," said Air Commodore Birchall of his frequent touring around the country to share his knowledge and experience. "If I can help out in some way, the let's do it. I feel I owe the Government and the people of Canada that much."

We Stand On Guard For Thee: Canada Post to Honour Canadian Rangers with a Stamp

OTTAWA— Formed on March 3, 1942, the Pacific Coast Militia Rangers (PCMR) were established in response to the wartime threat of a Japanese invasion. Originally made up of loggers, trappers, fishermen and Natives, the PCMR were the precursor of the Canadian Rangers, a vital component of the Canadian Forces. The Honourable André Ouellet, Canada Post's President and Chief Executive Officer, announced today that a single domestic rate stamp will be issued on March 3rd to honour the Canadian Rangers for their important work. A total of 3 million stamps will be available in panes of 16 stamps.

The stamp's design is by Oliver Hill and Dennis Page of Page & Wood Inc. of Halifax. Mr. Page previously designed the 1999 Naval Vessels stamps as well as the Killam stamp in Canada Post's Millennium Collection that same year. The principal image is of a red-capped Ranger looking

through binoculars, with snow-capped peaks reflected in the lens. Mr. Page explained that the design effectively communicates the Ranger's motto, the watch-ers, and highlights the organization's critical role in defending the remote areas of Northern Canada.

The Canadian Rangers duties are many: the reporting of unusual activities (including unidentified vessels within Canadian waters), search and rescue operations, surveillance/sovereignty patrols, and at times, mentors and educators for the Junior Canadian Ranger (JCR) program. The JCR program was launched in 1996 to promote traditional cultures and lifestyles by offering a variety of structured activities to young people in remote and isolated communities of Canada. Currently, there are more than 2,500 JCRs in 79 communities across the country. For additional information on the Canadian Rangers, please visit

Available for sale at post offices across the country on March 3, 2003, the stamp measures 56mm x 29mm, and will be sold in sheets of 16. The stamp was printed by Lowe-Martin, using six-colour lithography with gloss spot varnish and P.V.A. gum, on Tullis Russell Coatings paper. The stamp is general tagged on all four sides and has 13+ perforations. The Official First Day Cover will read Yellowknife NT.

Stamps and Official First Day covers will be available at participating post offices, or by mail order from the National Philatelic Centre. 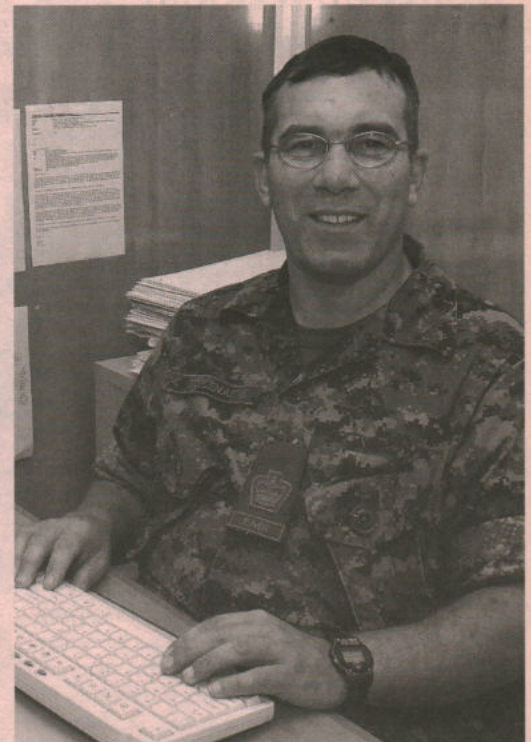

At press time, the event had raised in excess of \$22,000, which will benefit Hospice and Palliative Care Manitoba; however, pledges were still coming in.

"This year's event turned out wonderfully," said fitness leader Cathy Scott, founder of the Hospice Aerobics Challenge. "It's great to see so many people coming out and getting involved."

The money raised by the event will go to benefit many different areas of Hospice and Palliative Care Manitoba's operations. "The funds raised by this event will go to support our programs and services – helping to support those people

who are living with terminal illness and those who are coping with grief," said Margaret Clarke, Executive Director of Hospice and Palliative Care Manitoba. "It will also support education for volunteers and other health professionals that work with the terminally ill."

The Hospice Challenge raises money by getting participants to sign up for the event, and then go into the community to raise pledges. Participants then take part in the challenging two hour workout at the Fitness Centre, which is led by Scott, a certified aerobics instructor and 2002 Manitoba Fitness Leader of the Year.

The event was created the previous year when Scott, who had organized and led similar fundraisers for the Arthritis Society, joined forces with Hospice and Palliative Care Manitoba. Scott says that

the cause is one that is close to her heart. "After I was diagnosed with breast cancer, I really realized the fragility of life," she said. "Tragically, not everyone is as fortunate as I was in surviving my illness, and it's important that they get proper end-of-life care."

Scott decided to apply her talents to try to raise money for a worthy cause, and the Hospice Challenge was born. "I felt that by doing what I think I do best, which is exercise and motivate people, I could maybe make a difference and support a great organization and a great cause."

The 2003 Hospice Challenge drew support from a pair of local celebrities – Winnipeg Blue Bombers quarterback Khari Jones, and his wife, Winnipeg Free Press writer Justine, who both participated in the challenging aerobics workout. "It was something that Justine brought to

my attention, and I got a call from Cathy asking if we'd come out and lend our support," said Jones. "End-of-life care is something that people don't like to think about, but eventually a lot of people need it, so I think it's a great cause to support."

Although he said he enjoyed the workout, Jones mentioned that he thought it was challenging. "I did aerobics when I was a little younger, but I don't think I've ever done two hours worth, so that was a little tough," he said. "But Cathy is definitely a great leader, and it was a lot of fun."

Khari and Justine even went so far as to challenge each other to see who could raise more money. "Khari and I always like a little challenge, so we thought we would compete to see who could raise the most money," said Justine. "When we learned about all the services that Hospice and

Palliative Care Manitoba provides, we really wanted to get involved, and we thought this was a great way to help out."

This is the second year the event has been held at the 17 Wing Fitness and Recreation Centre. Clarke said that the first Hospice Challenge was originally scheduled to be held at the St. James Civic Centre, but as more and more people got on board, she realized they needed a larger facility. The 17 Wing Fitness and Recreation Centre had the space and the resources needed to handle the event, so the Hospice Challenge was moved to 17 Wing. "This has been a great place for the event – it's a great facility and the atmosphere is very welcoming," she said.

"Physical activity is about improving quality of life – improving body, mind, and soul," said Clarke. "Hospice and

Palliative Care is all about helping people to live as fully as possible and celebrate life, even though their length of life is shortened, so I think that there's a strong connection between exercise and end-of-life care, which is why events like this one are so successful."

Thanks to Cathy Scott for all of her hard work and dedication in bringing this event to life, as well as to Khari and Justine Jones for lending their support, to assistant fitness leaders Wendy Adams and Vicki Zachanowich, and to event organizers Margaret Clarke, Joan Lawless, and Sophie Tapper. Thanks also to Andy Oxley and the 17 Wing Fitness Staff for their work in helping to organize and set up the event at the Fitness Centre, and to Cpl Brian Mullen for providing the audio/visual elements of the event.

How to prevent eye injuries in hockey

- Replace helmets every seven years and avoid purchasing used ones. Older helmets may have weak plastic, may have lost the ability to absorb impact, or may contain deteriorated lining.
- Ensure helmets and face protectors are certified by the Canadian Standards Association (CSA).
- Make sure equipment fits properly. Helmets should be snug and secured to the head by a taut chin cup. Ensure face protectors are properly fastened to helmets.
- Get accustomed to new helmets and face protectors before a game. Practice looking through the face mask.
- Do not tamper with equipment. Never cut wires on face protectors, because it weakens the entire structure.
- Immediately replace cracked or damaged helmets and face protectors.

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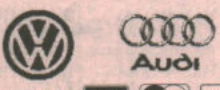
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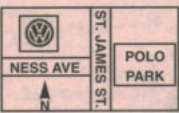

Westwin a Centre of Curling and Camaraderie

The old Westwin Curling Club on the North Side of 17 Wing (left) was a popular spot in both summer and winter, and served as a gathering place for many people on the Wing. A crew cleans up the remnants of the club (centre, right) after it was destroyed in a fire on August 24, 1985.

Before it was destroyed in a suspicious fire on August 24, 1985, the Westwin Curling Club was a hub of activity at 17 Wing. In the winter, it served as the primary curling club for the military community in Winnipeg, and in the summer, it was a popular hangout for ball teams. All year round, it was a gathering place for many different people on the base. "We had more fun at Westwin than you could shake a stick at," recalls Earl Lin, who was the presiding manager of the club at the

time of its demise. "In the winter, we'd have men's, ladies', and mixed curling, and in the summer, we'd socialize with the ball teams and with our friends." People on the base often spent their lunch breaks at the club, turning it into a makeshift restaurant throughout the year. In fact, the club was such a popular hangout that CJOB's Peter Warren once called it the 'Payton Place' of Winnipeg. "It was busy all year round," says Lins. During the curling season, Westwin had a large body of regular curlers that

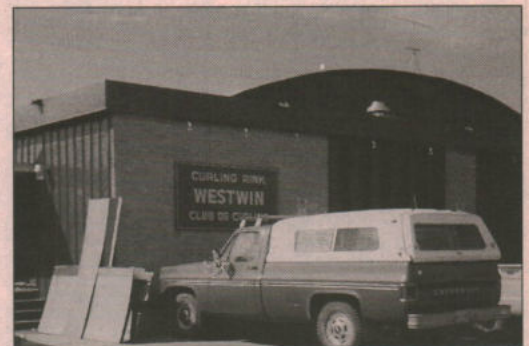
always kept the place busy. "It was a very large club," says Lins. "In a given season, we had anywhere from 90-100 rinks curling out of the club, which included men's, ladies', and mixed." In addition to the regular curling leagues, the club also regularly rented out ice sheets when league games and events were not scheduled. Westwin was also home to a good number of bonspiels over the years, including the annual city bonspiel, and even once hosted the CF championships.

Westwin underwent a major overhaul in the summer of 1983, and the renovations made the club one of the nicest in the city. The lounge area in particular was

reworked with the addition of wooden wall finishing, similar to what can be seen at the CFB Winnipeg Curling Club today. Although there was no upper level, the club added a staircase in anticipation of a second-floor addition. The Westwin and Fort Osborne Barracks clubs were amalgamated in the 1968/69 season to become the CFB Winnipeg Curling Club. After the two were amalgamated into one club, CFB Winnipeg Curling Club held a Guinness World Record for the longest distance between two sheets of curling ice in one club — sheet 4 at Fort Osborne and sheet 5 at Westwin. Tragically, Westwin was

laid to waste in a fire in the summer of 1985, after two previous fires, one of which was of a suspicious nature. The flames that consumed the club brought a sudden end to years of curling tradition on the North Side of 17 Wing. "It was a terrible

shame to see it go like that," says Lins. Today, the Westwin Community Centre stands on the spot of the old curling club, but for many curlers, the name Westwin will always be linked to the busy club on Whytewold Street.
