17 Wing Soldier Rescues Baby From Car Wreck

Relying on both adrenaline and instinct, 17 Wing's Cpl Darrell Hulme rescued a baby trapped in a car wreck in freezing rain. On Feb. 4, the Wing Transport driver was running freight between Montreal and Toronto on Highway 401 when a car with three adults and one baby pulled out in front of

his truck and rolled off the banked road.

Hulme watched as the car flipped a few times and landed in some woods, then stopping his 80,000 lb truck, called for help on his cellphone, and ran down to help those trapped in the car.

Because the doors would not open, Hulme said that he kicked in the

back window, where a baby, who looked to be about six months old, was hanging upside down in the car seat. After he removed the baby from the wreck, Hulme wrapped the baby in his coat.

The mother, who was "in bad shape," according to Hulme, was not wearing a seatbelt. He could not understand what she

was trying to say, but stayed with her until she passed away. Hulme said the mother's husband was screaming, but he later helped him climb out the back window.

The grandmother, who had been sitting in the front with the husband, was cut out of the wreck with the jaws-of-life.

For Hulme, he said the

impact of the accident did not sink in until he stood back after police arrived, "That's when it hit me ... when I left, I drove pretty slow."

According to the *Winnipeg Sun*, the mother was 23-year-old Humaira Shakeel of Hamilton, and the son, Ibrahim. The husband was not injured in the crash.

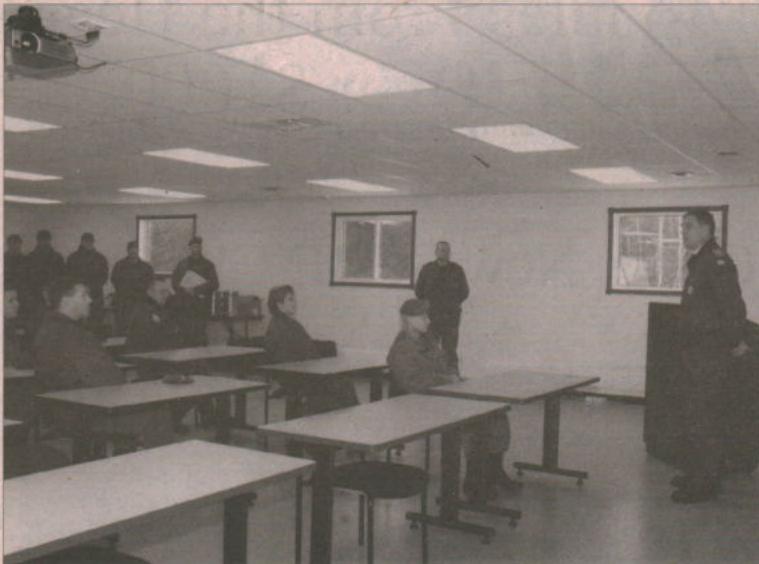



The next fundraisers will be the Care and Share Walk and Run race on April 24 and the upcoming silent auction.

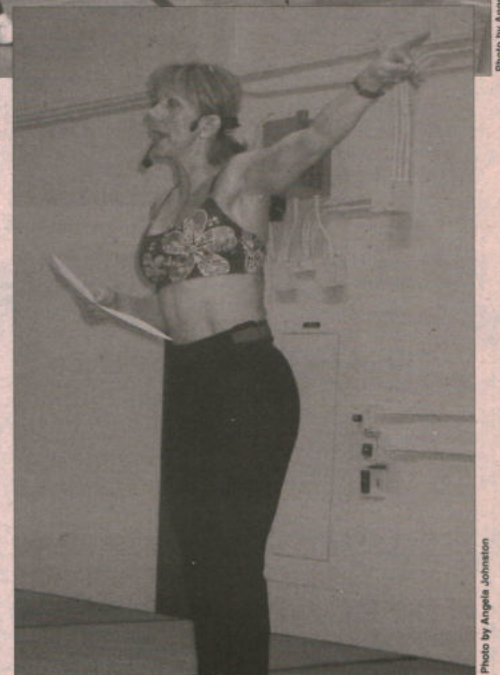
Hospice Aerobics Challenge Raises Over \$15,000

1 Month Down, 5 To Go

I worked as a civilian at 17 Wing for just over 8 months, and I thought I knew a lot about the CF and how things work. As a reporter at the Voxair, I wrote articles about people, events, and issues that affected military operations in Manitoba, Western Canada, North America, and the world.

However, because I did not often leave Winnipeg to cover these stories, I realized my perspective revolved somewhat around 17 Wing, 1CAD, and the Air Force. When I applied for an in-theatre position with the CF Personnel Support Agency (CFPSA) last July, I knew I would get a crash course on CF overseas operations and life on deployment.

And I was right. I arrived at camp on January 23 to take part in Op ATHENA and it has been a revelation from the beginning.

Although I do not suffer the same hardships as my

counterparts living and working in Afghanistan, I still had my fair share of lessons learned about life in a military Camp. As I quickly approach one month in theatre, I thought folks at home might like to know how my life has changed since my arrival.

When I stepped off the plane in mid January with 200 military members from Valcartier and 2 CFPSA co-workers, I was welcomed to the Middle Eastern desert by a very rare rain shower.

Although it was close to 2 A.M local time, Tammy Audet, CFPSA Site Manager for the Camp, greeted us on the tarmac. She was friendly and helpful, and didn't seem the least bit mad that we made her get up to stand out in the rain; rather, she said it was a blessing because in her 6 months on camp, she'd only seen it rain once.

Because I was not flying on to Kabul in the following days, Tammy gave my fu-

ture coworker Francine Dion and I a quick tour of the Camp that night. She showed us to our room—which was small and spartan but very clean—and then suggested we try to get some sleep.

It took a few days to reset my internal clock (10 hours up from Winnipeg is quite a change), but I soon settled into a relatively consistent routine. I started work at the Canex after resting for a day and, working as a cashier, quickly met new people and made new friends.

Because I spend six days a week in the store, it did not take long to start recognizing the faces and remembering the names of my military customers. Whether they were visiting me to buy cigarettes, chocolate, 0% beer, or knife sets (which are an excellent deal, by the way), they were always friendly and quick to ask where I call home.

When living and working on a small camp like this one

here, it is interesting to see how everyone relies on everyone else to make time in theatre pass quickly and smoothly. My piece in the puzzle is to meet the members' nicotine, sugar, and knife set requirements; in return, the members help me with things I cannot do on my own.

The post office, I learned, is a great place to go because they have free postage AND free candies at the front desk. After a couple of disappointing workouts, I also learned that while the two Canadian gyms are great for pumping weights or attending a step class, some of our allies have the better cardio room on their camp only a short walk away.

I have learned most of my lessons by meeting people in the store and learning about their specific roles. My friend Roger in Supply, for example, is the man to see when I break my ID necklace (which has happened twice already); Sara, the CF-

Making friends has so far not been an issue, which is definitely a good thing. Although there are many activities to do on Camp (watching movies, rollerblading, playing beach volleyball, surfing the Internet) and in the nearby city (suntan on the beach, shop at the mall, tour the historic sites), those things are always more fun when you have someone to share them with.

In fact, I think that is the key to having a good deployment. With an ever-growing group of friends, I have not suffered from homesickness as if I thought I would. I miss my friends

and family, obviously, but people who keep me busy throughout the day and people I can talk to at night surround me.

With five months to go, I am sure I still have many more things to learn about CF operations outside of Winnipeg. I know I will have mixed feelings when it comes time to go home, but I am already looking forward to heading back home and applying what I have learned here to future stories in the Voxair.

To everyone back in Winnipeg, thank you for the support you gave me before I left and the support you continue to give me while I am over here. I am sure I will have many more stories to tell when I get back.

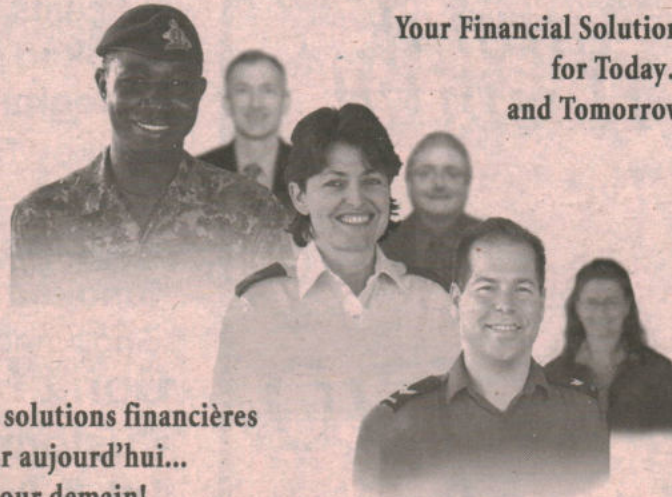

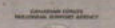

Flying Officer George Finkle Memorial Scholarship & Bursary

The recipients of the 2003-2004 Flying Officer George Finkle Memorial Scholarship have now been selected. This year's scholarship winners are: Private Ali Khan, Trooper David Sierhuis, and Sub-Lieutenant Colin Stewart.

The family of George Finkle has established a fund in his memory to provide annual scholarships or bursaries to students at The University of Manitoba.

Candidates must meet the following requirements:

1. Be a member of the Regular Canadian Armed Forces or Primary Reserve (or is a member of the immediate family of a Regular Force member) who is resident in Manitoba or northwestern Ontario;
2. Be enrolled as a full-time undergraduate student (with 60 percent or more of a full course-load) or as a full-time graduate student in one of the departments of the Faculty of Management or in the Department of Geology in the Faculty of Science*;
3. Have achieved a good academic record (with, for entering students, a high school average on final year courses of at least 70 percent or with, for continuing students, a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0 for scholarship purposes or 2.75 for bursary purposes);
4. Demonstrate the qualities of George Finkle, including love of country, love of family, decency and morality, strength, intelligence, courage, determination and hard work (with these qualities to be documented with reference letters in the application process).

Award applications for the 2004-2005 academic session will be available on or around August 1, 2004 at the Financial Aid and Awards Office at the University of Manitoba (deadline for receipt of applications is October 1, 2004).

(NOTE: The same individual cannot win either of these awards in consecutive years. Applicants will be once again considered eligible for both awards once a year has elapsed since the student received one of these awards; bursary applicants must meet the above criteria and demonstrate financial need on the standard University of Manitoba bursary application form.)

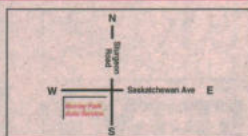

Athlete of the Month Women's Hockey Player "Peaked at the Right Time"

Though MCpl Heather Demchuk surprised everyone at the women's hockey regionals in CFB Suffield by scoring six goals in five games, she had a feeling she would do well at the tournament. The team's weakness proved to be her strength: a short bench meant players were double or triple shifting – Demchuk knew that she had to step up to the challenge.

Demchuk, who said the long shifts created a higher focus, noted, "I was in a really dry spell in Winnipeg, and peaked at the right time." The small hockey team of seven skaters and goalie arrived in Suffield, were able to pick up one additional skater from Edmonton, and ultimately won the regional championships in a 4-0 final score against Cold Lake.

Demchuk was understated – underestimated, even – by

rivals on other teams. She said that because other teams focused on defending captain Cpl Lisette LeBlanc and defencewoman Cpl Stacey Kohanski, an opportunity opened for the team, as well as Demchuk, to sneak in a score.

Coach Ed Staniowski noted of Demchuk's performance, "Heather played absolutely outstanding... She rose to the top."

Winnipeg's women's hockey team has often been an underdog sport on the base. Many players are unable to attend tournaments, creating a small team. Still, this year the team didn't lose a single game out of five in the regional tournament.

Aside from the tournament, the south-site Demchuk embraces a rigorous training regimen off the rink. She laughs, "I do a lot of PT here [on the site]." Demchuk runs Mondays,

performs a rucksack march on Tuesdays and Thursdays – even in -54°C windchills – and circuit training in the gym on Wednesdays. As for Fridays, she takes them off.

Although the military hockey team practices once or twice a month, Demchuk and many of the players also participate in a city league at The Highlander arena. Demchuk said she believes this league has helped the women's team: because it ranked very high in pre-season games, the team was bumped up to a higher level, from "C" to "B." This provided a more competitive atmosphere, and higher calibre hockey.

Demchuk has skated since nine years of age, and played ringette for seventeen years. She picked up hockey five years ago. She shrugs, and notes, "I'm not much of a summer sport person." Last year, she was named the

17 Wing's Female Athlete of the Year.

What Demchuk enjoys most about winter sports is the team atmosphere. She likes forming friendships, maybe even going out for a drink or a chat after the game.

Still, the team will face a drastic downsize next year when 2PPCLI transfers to Shilo: the women's hockey team will lose five players. Demchuk remains enthusiastic, and adds that the team is always looking for players – even those who have never laced a pair of skates. Any one interested can contact Demchuk.

As for the upcoming nationals, to be held March 19-26 in CFB Borden, Demchuk said, "I'm trying not to get too nervous," as she gears up to represent the prairie region for the first time. She believes the biggest challenge will be to

unite different players from the different prairie region cities, or "to get everyone working together."

17 Wing Women's Hockey Players Off to Nationals Unexpected Victory at Regional Tournament

With a regional championship behind them, the 17 Wing women's hockey team is now looking towards a national victory. After a sparkling winning streak throughout the Prairie Regional Championships in CFB Suffield, 17 Wing is now sending six players – and one coach – to represent the region in which it won.

“Winnipeg has always been the bridesmaid and never the bride,” said MCpl Stacey Kohanski, a reservist and the regional tournament MVP, of past performances. This time, 17 Wing did not lose a single game during the Feb. 1-6 tournament.

Coached by CWO John Kamperman and former NHL player LCol Ed Staniewski, the team won five games, and had one bye. The final score against Cold Lake was 4-0.

The main challenge the team faced at regionals was a short bench, as many players were unable to attend the tournament. In the end, seven women from Winnipeg played in the tournament, aided by a floater from Edmonton. However, coach Staniewski noted, “The girls that we did have really pulled it together.”

A few of the girls, including Kohanski, said it was a pleasant surprise how the

team rallied together in the tournament. “I didn't think we were going to come together as we did,” she said. “Everyone listened to what the coaches said, played their positions, and played their hearts out.”

Despite a short bench, the underdog team surprised everyone at the tournament. Winning games and skills competitions alike, Kohanski noted; “All you heard was ‘Winnipeg.’”

Next is nationals

Up next is the national championships to be held in CFB Borden from March 19-26. Players to represent the prairie region are chosen from all cities. Those representing Winnipeg include MCpl Brenda Beaton, MCpl Heather Demchuk, MCpl Stacey Kohanski Maj Michele Claveau, Capt Gillian Parker and the national team captain, Cpl Lisette LeBlanc.

The nationals involve a higher intensity than the regionals. “The talent is a lot stronger, and the girls are a lot bigger,” commented Kohanski.

Still, the coach remains confident: “We'll be a contender this year,” said Staniewski. Staniewski was selected as one of two prairie region national coaches,

along with Danny Hamilton from CFB Shilo.

Kohanski and LeBlanc, who have both participated in the national tournament before, noted that the team is particularly strong this year. “There's a lot of heart,” said LeBlanc. “All the women involved on the new team, which will unite players from Winnipeg, Edmonton, Cold Lake and Calgary, know each other well from regionals and get along,” said Kohanski.

Still, the new prairie region team has yet to practice together. Before nationals, the new team will have only one practice. Staniewski said he believes this will be the newest challenge. “The girls are going to have to buy in on the system very quickly,” he said. Girls who used to rival each other must now play on the same team.

As national team captain, part of Winnipeg's Cpl Lisette LeBlanc's job will be

to overcome such a challenge, and unite the new team. LeBlanc said her job was to “keep the happiness going” as well as conduct warm-ups, team meetings, and keep a light-hearted atmosphere in the dorms.

“The road to nationals began back in September. Most of the girls play in a downtown league two times a week. The high-competition “B” league has only helped the team, said Demchuk.

These games are augmented by 17 Wing team practices.

Still, anticipation is rising for the upcoming nationals. Kohanski remains confident: “I think people are going to be shocked. I think we're going to do the best we've ever done.” As coach Staniewski said, “It all comes down to that first game.”

Risk Management at the Winnipeg Military Family Resource Centre

The management of risk requires an organized approach allowing for the identification of foreseeable risks.

The likelihood and severity of the risk impact needs to be assessed.

A plan to make risk management decisions is necessary to determine whether to avoid, retain, transfer or reduce risk.

The WMFRC has been involved in a risk management planning process for the past 1 1/2 years. We began by looking at existing laws, regulations, acts and codes. These included labour, childcare, building use, security & fire, health & safety, codes of professional conduct, finance and administration. These are considered external influences that oblige the WMFRC to operate in certain ways. Next we examined our in-house (internal) policies and procedures to determine to what extent we were compliant.

As a result of our risk management efforts, the WMFRC has made some changes to the way we do business. This has not affected the programs and services that are offered, but how they are offered based on any identified risk associated with them. Both the WMFRC staff and its Board of Directors have been involved in the development and implementation of rules and procedures (risk control methods) designed to avoid or minimize risks for our clients and themselves.

We would like to also provide an opportunity for community members, especially those who use our facilities, to take part in our risk management process. We are very interested in your concerns about risk factors at our Centre. Your feedback allows the WMFRC to evaluate the importance of a service or activity relative to the risks involved in offering them.
