Search And Rescue Exercise Unites Civilian And Military

A Cessna-172 with two people on board has gone missing over Lake Manitoba. The pilot is panicky. He left the St. Andrews airport, and en route to Dauphin, lost his way after approximately three hours. With fuel dwindling, the pilot estimates he has one hour of

flight left. It is now up to the joint efforts of the search-and-rescue technicians of Winnipeg's 435 Squadron and the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association, or CASARA, to aid the distressed pilot.

While this rescue scenario was only a training

exercise organized between 435 Squadron and the Winnipeg CASARA Zone, it may very well have been the real thing. "Today, the focus is just training, but such training prepares both military and civilian search and rescue teams alike for real-life mishaps", said Capt Tom

Kolesnik, CASARA Liaison Officer with 435 Squadron in Winnipeg.

The day's training also involved a simulated crash site with an activated Emergency Locator Transmitter (ELT) set-up and manned by Al Fraser, a Winnipeg CASARA member. After the air-

borne intercept of the "lost" Cessna and successful direction to a safe airport, the SAR crew homed the ELT signal and found the "crash" site.

While awaiting the return of the CASARA Cessna-172 and 17 Wing's Hercules from

their exercise, Kolesnik describes how to locate a missing plane in their SAR area spanning the Prairie Provinces, northwest Ontario, and the Northern West Territories.

If the lost aircraft has a transponder, which transmits a radar signal, 435 Squadron's aircraft can pick up the signal from a significant distance away. This signal is called "squawking." The Hercules can also trace radio signals, which is known as directional finding, or "DF-ing." They can then follow the radio signal or triangulate the position of the missing aircraft. The SAR team directs the aircraft to fly in a holding pattern and take note of landmarks below and other directional clues such as the position of the sun.

"Hopefully we get him to an airport to land," says Kolesnik.

Still, many things could go wrong. The aircraft could have no radio, or lose communications. The pilot could panic, or decide not to listen to SAR crew's instructions. The weather is always a factor, and the lost plane could

run out of gas. Then there are compass problems – a whole range of complications which SAR crews – whether civil or military – must be prepared to work around.

Once on the ground, CASARA volunteers Ken Wilson, a pilot, and Al Northam, a navigator, assess how the training went.

"It was a good job today ... it was an interesting exercise," said Wilson.

CASARA members are all volunteers – many members are retired, with an interest in aviation, said Kolesnik, "...they are aviators – pilots, interested in aviation and rescue." Many rescue workers also volunteer, such as firefighters or first aid workers, yet volunteers come from many different sectors.

New CASARA members receive extensive training, depending on the background in aviation. Spotters, or the "eyes" of rescue missions, who scan the landscape beneath the plane, learn about flying, search-and-rescue standards, backcountry survival, first aid and CPR over a few

months. Navigators take one to two years to train. Many volunteers used the CASARA training as a "springboard to greater activity in aviation, like getting their pilot certification" said Kolesnik. Spotters receive certification, first by CASARA, and then by the military. Despite rigorous demands, approximately 125 volunteers live in Winnipeg, according to the CASARA website.

"They're volunteers, and they're awesome," said Kolesnik, "They're very professional." It is Kolesnik's role to evaluate, train and maintain connection between the military and civilian groups. Without CASARA, said Kolesnik, response time would be much slower.

Of Wilson's own personal background, he said that he has always had "a tremendous interest in aviation. I wanted to combine my passion for flying to use skills developed to help other people."

Navigator Northam sums up the day's events: "A-1."

"We tried to do things

wrong, and they kept cutting us off," he jokes. During this training exercise, Northam and Wilson feigned concern over fuel, compass readings and turned off their transponder. "The easy stuff (to intercept the lost aircraft) went out the window," noted Kolesnik.

The crew in the Hercules kept the two men talking, and told them to orbit. Once given directions, Wilson and Northam proceeded to go 45 degrees in the wrong direction, to throw in an added difficulty for the rescue

team. The SAR crew gave very simple explanations, cutting out military "phraseology."

"If I was lost out there in a real situation ... I think I would have had a real comfort," said Wilson on the runway outside of 17 Wing's Hangar 16, "It's commendable that the SAR crew can tone themselves down ... take all the jargon away."

Once the missing plane was located, the SAR crew directed the wayward pilot to Gimli Airport, with a nearby smoke stack – actu-

ally part of a distillery – as a visual cue for the Cessna pilot.

Back on the ground, Kolesnik, Wilson and Northam joke about experiences from previous rescues – directing lost planes from 20,000 feet in the air, trying to get an accidentally activated ELT turned off, and so on. Such is the camaraderie between military and civilian rescue members – a camaraderie which continues to save lives in real-life dire situations.

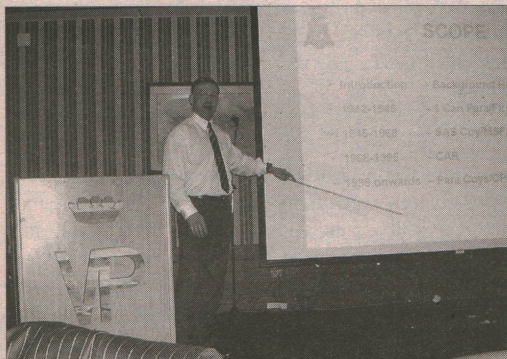

Second Battalion Officers Join Regiment For History Lesson In Edmonton

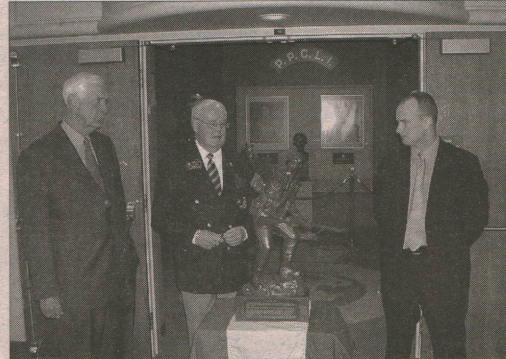

'Brain Drain' - Losing More Than Kapyong Barracks

When the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2PPCLI) moves to Shilo this summer, 17 Wing loses a lodger unit. But the Wing and the city of Winnipeg also stand to lose nurses, health care specialists, teachers, daycare operators, dental assistants and provincial public servants. Several community sports programs will lose coaches and various charities around the city will lose some of their hardest working volunteers.

Lieutenant-Colonel Mike Day, Commanding Officer (CO) of 2PPCLI doesn't think the impact of the battalion's move out of the city has been fully understood. Many of the serving members of the unit are actively involved in community events in their spare time.

"As an example, we are going to remove about 96 amateur coaches, assistant coaches or team managers from this local area and that is just one statistic. If you think that holds true across all activities, whether it be cub leaders, scout leaders and volunteer workers, it's a huge impact." LCol. Day said.

The CO of 2PPCLI feels the loss of spouses and their employment will be even more significant. "We have

a number of spouses leaving who are specialized health care workers. I think they are going to see that the removal of two-dozen or so nurses that we have, that's a significant number. Especially when you're taking out the specialists," said LCol. Day.

Major Steve Joudrey will be moving to Shilo with his family. For the past four years, Maj. Joudrey has coached minor hockey and soccer for South Winnipeg division. His wife, Penny, a registered nurse for 19 years, works at Health Sciences Centre. She is one of only 18 nurses on staff who start all of the intravenous lines for patients as part of the hospital's vascular access team.

"Here in Manitoba, nurses don't start IVs. You need specialized training for that. My boss is not happy to see me leave," Joudrey said.

The move to Shilo means that Joudrey will face a loss of seniority going from one health care region to another, and her job will be different. "They do not have any specialized teams like IV access in Brandon. They told me I will probably work with their chemo patients," said Joudrey.

Major Mike Gagné is also posted to Shilo with his wife, Stacey Brown. Brown, a registered nurse since

1995, has worked for almost five years as a peri-operative nurse at Health Sciences Centre. Peri-operative nurses work exclusively in the operating room. "The hospital I work at now, it's one of two teaching hospitals, St. Boniface being the other one. So we get all the traumas, we get really big cases." Brown said. "We do everything from brain to heart surgery."

Brown wasn't very enthusiastic about the prospect of leaving Winnipeg. "At first I was not thrilled at all, because I love my job and I'm happy to go to work there everyday," said Brown.

"If we weren't planning a family, I probably would have stayed here. I start all over again for seniority. They mostly have part time jobs, but if I wanted to work full time, I could." Brown said.

"It won't be the same kind of work though," said Brown. "It will be quite a bit different, just the pace of it. We do everything here in Winnipeg. In Brandon, it's going to be more general surgery."

Brown's supervisor, Diane Ewaschuk, manager of Patient Care for the Adult Operating Room at Health Sciences said "experienced operating room nurses are few and far between. Stacey

has been an asset to this operating team from the moment she got here. Brandon hospital's gain is our definite loss."

When Master Corporal Sacha Michaud moves his family to Shilo, the loss of his fiancé, Taylor McEachern, will be deeply felt by Meadow Green Riding Academy where she trains horses and is a coach and riding instructor. For the past year, she has also worked as a volunteer with the Manitoba Riding for the Disabled Association (MRDA).

"We work with children who are mentally or physically disabled, from six years of age into their teens," McEachern said. "It's a pretty big program, there's a three year waiting list."

"We work with their therapists," said McEachern. "It helps them to develop their socializing skills by having contact with the animals. Their bodies learn to work with their brains when they ride. The kids love it, and they develop a great bond with their horses."

Deborah Davis, program administrator for MRDA is saddened by the potential loss of McEachern. "It's heartbreaking. We rely on her so much to know which horse is right for the right

child. We were so thrilled to get her help. I don't want to think about her leaving the program. She will be missed by everyone."

McEachern will try to come back for the MRDA sessions twice a week from Shilo, but with a family, it could be difficult. "If it doesn't work out, I would love to start coaching in Shilo." McEachern said.

With the arrival of 2PPCLI this summer, the city of Brandon and CFB Shilo will gain outstanding new members to their community. The loss to 17 Wing and Winnipeg is hard to measure, but the CO of 2PPCLI

is sure that the unit will be missed and members of 17 Wing agree.

"It will be no one thing that the city identifies as being a loss. It will be the accumulation of what this battalion is, the battalion family in its larger sense, the wives, the husbands and the children, what we give as a family to the community. That's what they are going to notice, the cumulative effect." LCol. Day said.

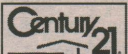

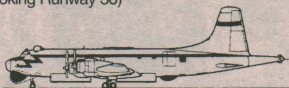



Hay Fever From Trees?

(NC)-Hay fever is an allergic reaction to pollen. In fact, pollen from trees such as elder, elm, hazel and especially birch cause what we call 'spring hay fever'. Pollen that causes hay fever can vary from person to person and from region to region but unfortunately, hay fever seems to be with us for most of the year.

Grass pollen and flowers are responsible for summer hay fever, while ragweed and other late-blooming plants set off late summer and early autumn hay fever. Some people may even experience

symptoms year round - called perennial allergic rhinitis. It is caused by household dust, mould fungus and pet dander.

(NC)-One of the best 'treatments' for allergies would be to avoid what causes allergic symptoms in the first place and to stay indoors all spring, summer and fall. But that's not very realistic! We want to get out and enjoy the outdoors.

Thankfully there are a number of medications that you can speak to your pharmacist about. Find out which kind is right for you to treat those annoying symptoms of allergic rhinitis such as sneezing, runny nose, watery/itchy eyes and especially nasal

congestion, which is the bothersome symptom for up to 90 per cent of allergy sufferers.

Decongestants - work by constricting the blood vessels in your eyes and nose. They also shrink swollen nasal tissues and reduce blood flow to the mucous membranes. This helps you breathe easier, soothes your red eyes and helps clear up your stuffy or runny nose. The most common decongestant, pseudoephedrine, is associated with insomnia and is not recommended for

people with high blood pressure, heart disease, diabetes or glaucoma.

Antihistamines - work by blocking histamine receptors in the body. Histamine is a substance released during an allergic reaction which triggers symptoms of an allergic reaction. Although they are effective, antihistamines can make you feel abnormally sleepy or drowsy. A newer antihistamine, called Aeries®, is now available in Canada without a prescription to treat both nasal and non-nasal symp-

toms of allergic rhinitis. Unlike some other antihistamines, Aeries® is not associated with drowsiness and it does not need to be taken with a decongestant to relieve nasal congestion.

Nasal corticosteroid sprays - corticosteroids reduce the inflammatory response that is responsible for most of the symptoms of allergic rhinitis. These types of treatments are available only by prescription for the moderate to severe forms of allergies.

Spam, Scam and Jam: The Tin Man in Cyberspace Internet Scams: Consumer Tips

Called GetRichQuick.Com, the sweep resulted in thousands of suspected addresses and dubious schemes being reported. Marjorie Kolbe will report on the latest creative and not-so-creative internet scams.

She will also discuss who is targeted and vulnerable to these scams as well as what is happening to enhance consumer protection in cyberspace.

MFRC Volunteer Receives Governor General's Caring Canadian Award

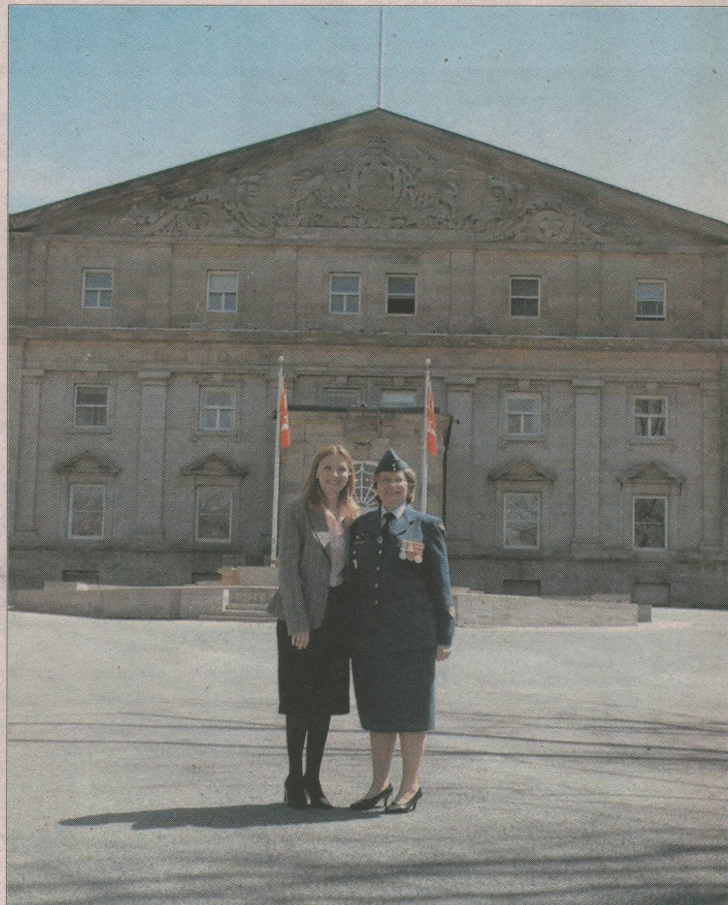

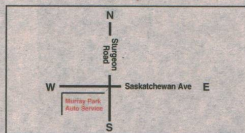

Sisters Give Rocking Performance At 17 Wing

One male "sister" dons a cape and gold-rimmed sunglasses, imitating Elvis Presley – causing many of the other Sisters to swoon.

One suspects that the Sisters of the Holy Rock are not a typical convent from the moment they take the stage. Reverend Mother has cherry red satin heels with iridescent bows on the toes. Her habit has gold trim. Almost immediately into the show, two "sisters" reveal a passionate flair – a zest – with outrageous pantaloons hidden under their habits, bright sunglasses and colourful scarves. They bring out maracas and bongo drums to entertain the crowd. One sister reaches into an audience member's popcorn to grab a quick bite during the performance.

Accompanied by a quintet from 17 Wing's Air Command Band, the sisters enter the Base Theatre to a brass rendition of "When the Saints Go Marching In," during an April 16 concert to support the Winnipeg Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC). The Sisters are a non-profit group who donate entrance fees to charities all over the city.

In total, the Sisters have raised over \$1.5 million in the over ten years they have

performed, according to the group.

"This is a group of people who just love music," says Reverend Mother Carole "Whoopie" Stone. The Sisters loosely base their concerts on the Sister Act movies, starring Whoopi Goldberg.

Stone uses wry, deadpan humour to address the crowd. Never a group to discriminate, she describes how the Sisters evolved from a 17 member group, who dressed up as nuns to sing at the Grey St. United Church, to a non-denominational, and non-gender specific powerhouse with over 70 "sisters" – approximately a quarter of the group are men.

They flow from songs familiar from the Sister Act movies, such as "My God," to a parody of the Beach Boys' "Aruba" injecting Manitoban small towns such as Morden, Gimli and Anola into the song lyrics. They pull out pink-tinted studded sunglasses and leis during the song. No celebrity is safe – the Sisters mimic Elvis, and surprisingly – yet successfully – unite imitations of

both Willie Nelson and Julio Iglesias.

They touch on the serious side with a Hebrew hymn in the middle of the set mixing traditional church hymns with revved-up contemporary classics.

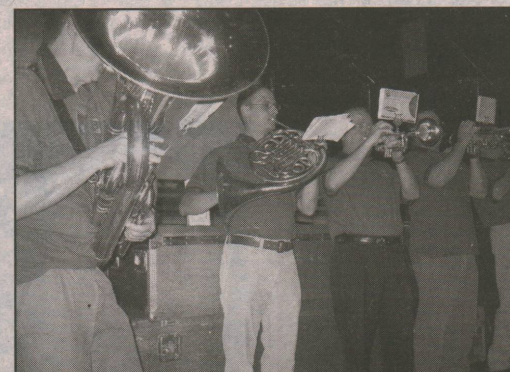
After the concert, Sisters Dorothy Barron and Vina Main, discuss how the concert went during a reception. They agree that the show went well – the audience always helps to get them "geared in."

The Sisters perform every weekend except in July, August and at Christmastime and practice at least once a week. Members are not paid – the Sisters prove to be a formidable force with serious time commitments from members. The group is now booked until 2007. They are "people from all walks of life," says Stone.

Most of the Sisters have no musical background; often they cannot read music.

Stone says it often takes a long time to learn a song, but what is more important is to try to get music that is a mixture of toe-tapping, seriousness, silly antics and recognizable tunes. She has directed the group since its beginning.

The Sisters, while not paid, receive an honourarium for their performances which they, in turn, also donate to charity. Donations could go towards private families, NGOs or support groups – all requests come from within the group.

This is the third time the Sisters have performed at 17 Wing. According to Linda Belisle, a co-ordinator with the MFRC, 358 tickets were sold for the April 16 performance, and the funds raised will go towards children's, youth and special needs programs.

Athlete of the Month: American officer soars through the pool

Col Al Laursen chats with a colleague outside of 17 Wing's Central Flying School in the industrial Hangar 16. He is genial, friendly, relaxed. His uniform is slightly different from the others. Once in his office, one spots a small American flag on the shoulder of his jacket. American Laursen has been on exchange in Winnipeg for three years, teaching American procedures to Canadian pilots at the school. But in his off time, Laursen has proven to be quite the avid swimmer.

Laursen takes to the pool three to four times a week, for an hour, swimming anywhere between "2000 to 3000 yards." After a quick imperial to metric conversion, the distance is 1.8 to 2.7 km. In high school, Laursen competitively swam, though he said he was a "big fish in a little town." He would often qualify for state meets,

but said he enjoyed winning races at the local level.

Laursen used to have a "stroke of the month," as he says. Though he prefers freestyle, or front crawl, he would alternate between various other strokes. One month, he decided to try out the butterfly stroke, which is a "very intense" stroke, in the words of Laursen.

Laursen laughs, and says he was "acting like a 22 year old ... trying to do butterfly at age 37." He hurt his shoulder about two years ago, and has since slowed down. He now focuses on his kicking skills, using a kickboard, swimming breaststroke, using flippers, or practicing the dolphin kick.

There is a loose camaraderie at the pool, says Laursen. Often he will race with his friend, Luke. Others, he says, keep to themselves – that swimming is their quiet time – but he

said he knows most of the people at the pool.

"I swim because I enjoy it more than running," said Laursen, "I like the sound of the water, the feel of the water."

Still, having participated with no military swim teams, Laursen keeps his priorities in check: "I've been a flier my entire career. Take care of the mission first, play second." The B-52 pilot joined the US air force in 1983, and became an officer in 1987. He has served in Michigan, Oklahoma and most recently, Winnipeg.

In Winnipeg, swimming is not the only activity in which Laursen participates. He has recently encouraged his ten-year-old son, Jonah, to cross-country ski. Because of regular fitness tests, he also runs on treadmills and tracks, enjoys canoeing and kayaking, and plays baseball.

Though Winnipeg has no major league baseball teams, Laursen says the Goldeyes team is one of the best things about the city. He enjoys attending games with his sons, Jonah, and seven-year-old Kieran, saying it is the "best game of baseball ... the team gives access to the players ... You stay with the team because you know the players."

Of Winnipeg, "I love it. The city's great," Laursen pauses, and then, "The weather is pretty rigorous. But the job I have is really a lot of fun."

Laursen will stay in Winnipeg until June, when he will return to a Washington posting in the US, where he will both pen flying regulations and receive flying time.
