



Nijmegen Memories March On

Four days. 160 kilometres. 47,000 marchers. 1 million witnesses. Countless memories.

A dozen members (with 24 sore feet) from 17 Wing completed the Nijmegen March in The Netherlands in July. The team finished strong and was ready to celebrate accomplishing their goal - to earn a team medal for crossing each check point of the 160 kilometre trek together. For all but one, this journey was the first time taking part in the annual event.

Even though Cpl Nathan Rody took part two years ago, the challenge of the gruelling adventure was still something his body wasn't prepared for.

"It's a pretty rough go," Cpl Rody said. "You are on your feet for nine hours a day with a rucksack on your back. By the end of the first day the pounding of your feet is the worst part," he added.

Marching in combat boots mostly on paved roads, with some sections

made of cobblestone, Team captain Capt Rebecca Barton said that marching each day with only three official rest stops (each approximately 13 kilometres apart) made the team appreciate every chance it could get to take a break. However,

"Getting started after a break is difficult - muscles are stiff and hips are locked," Capt Barton said. Little rest and a lot of exercise along with a few German beer made the march challenging, Capt Barton said. "The body can handle a lot more stress than I expected."

Calculating it out, Cpl Rody said each foot was subjected to at least 15 million pounds of pressure during the four-day march depending on the weight of the team member, varying from 22 to 55-years-old.

Overall the Canadian contingent was very successful, the Winnipeg team in particular, completing each step of the march with all members. She accounts the team's success to the

training they did to prepare and the fact that they trained together. The team cohesion pulled them through when the going got tough.

Training for the 17 Wing team began in April, providing the team with enough time to condition the muscles and feet. The team was very cohesive

Cpl Rody said. During the march each person had the team in mind, there were no individual marchers, just a single unit working together. "I wasn't as focused on myself this time," he added, reminded of how he felt two years ago during the Nijmegen March.

Looking back on the

experience, Capt Barton said she "felt so proud of each member of the team." Adding, "no matter how much (physical) pain, they didn't want to let the team down." And the pain will be a distant memory, saying "you forget the pain and remember the excitement and energy."

"It shows your level of

personal fortitude and how far you can push yourself," she said of the "challenging" Nijmegen March. Capt Barton credits "working as a close-knit, goal-driven team" as the ultimate reason for success. The team had a great time - "a very memorable experience."

17 Wing Soccer Team Wins Before Tournament Even Begins

17 Wing had its first representation in three years at the Prairie Regional Soccer Championships held in Winnipeg mid-August.

While the team wasn't the big winner of the tournament, the players certainly knew they achieved great success by being able to form a team and work together to be ready to compete in the tournament this summer.

Team captain, Capt Stefan Szkwarek, said, "It was excellent. We accomplished our mission from minute one." He said the team took two years to develop, which at times "was challenging, but I'm glad we did it."

With weekly practices beginning in February,

Capt Szkwarek said the training paid off because "until the last minute of the last game we hadn't trailed" in the tournament. It was during the Round Robin game against Shilo that 17 Wing lost by one goal with minutes left to play.

"Winning isn't necessarily the only thing," Capt Szkwarek said. "It's about representing the Base."

Spectators, including Wing Commander Col Ken O'Brien, were treated to "just awesome" soccer. That was just one of the many praises Col O'Brien gave each team at the closing ceremonies on the field.

"It was an outstanding weekend of soccer," Col O'Brien said to all of the players at the closing cere-

monies. He expressed, "How wonderful it was to come watch you play," referring to three games he took in over the weekend. He congratulated each team and said 17 Wing "played well... a good job," placing third in the tournament and was proud there was representation from Winnipeg in this year's tournament.

Chris Merrithew, Sports Coordinator for 17 Wing said Szkwarek's team "is going to be a force to be reckoned with in the future." He said, "(The team) had a professional attitude and great discipline." Merrithew commends team captain, Szkwarek, for getting the team together and working so hard to perform as they

did in the tournament. "It's all due to him," Merrithew said.

Moose Jaw won the tournament and MVP Capt Scott Frost said the tournament went "very well," congratulating Winnipeg (shortly after being dunked with a huge bucket of water by his team) on hosting a successful event. Following the Prairie Regionals, Capt Frost said the Moose Jaw team now begins preparing for the national tournament in Borden in September.

But what's next for the 17 Wing team? Praising what he called "a competitive team," Capt Szkwarek said he is looking forward to developing an indoor team to put in the Winnipeg Soccer League.

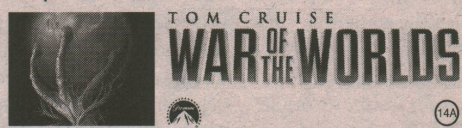

New Program Launched To Assist Military Families Do Business Better

Military families now have help when it comes to doing business in Winnipeg. The Military Family Resource Centre (MFRC) has partnered with the Better Business Bureau serving Manitoba and N.W. Ontario (BBB).

In a new project set for launch September 1, the MFRC will be providing assistance in cooperation with the BBB to military families in Winnipeg that may not be familiar with doing business in the city.

This pilot project has been developed following the success of a program launched in the United States, president of the BBB Manitoba/N.W. Ontario Brian Garagan said.

Garagan said the program will introduce a special website and telephone

number available to military families if they have a concern about business-related issues. He noted that "most military families perceive they aren't part of the community," and in turn, aren't aware that the Better Business Bureau is out to protect all consumers with regard to doing business. "The BBB is for all Canadians," he said.

Having a direct phone number and website will now provide an easier form of communication directly to the BBB for military families. "The new line will give (the families) access to reliability reports, the complaint process, consumer tips, advice and more," said Catherine Chatterley of the MFRC Information and Referral Services.

Beginning first in

Winnipeg, the as-yet-unnamed program has a "three-pronged attack": Prevention-Education & Training; Protection-Complaint Handling and Industry Self-Regulation; Response-Incentives and Enforcement.

The American study provided to Garagan from the U.S. Better Business Bureau showed that there were 2172 military complaints from mid-December 2004 to February 2005. 16% of these complaints were for service issues, 15% were delivery issues. Other complaints included selling practices, contract disputes, repair issues, product quality and refund practices.

Garagan said that CF bases and MFRCs across Canada are excitedly waiting for the program to be

rolled out in Winnipeg and are ready to jump on board, with the hopes of it going nationwide.

Measuring the success of the program will not be difficult for Garagan. He said if the program helps one family it will be worth it. "It's about time that we show our support to military families and make our community realize we have to get behind our troops," he said.

"The Better Business Bureau of Manitoba was born in June of 1930 when a group of then corporate and business leaders of our community came together with a vision to further the principles of business integrity and consumer trust and confidence in the local marketplace," according to the Better Business Bureau of Manitoba website.

Students Discover Memorial, Honour Officer

A group of summer students made a remarkable discovery, stumbling upon a memorial to honour a fallen military police officer.

At the end of July the students were working on the grounds of St. Charles Range

when they came across what appeared to be a large rock that was overgrown with weeds. After clearing some of it away, the students were quick to discover they had found a memorial plaque for Capt M. Cletus Cheng.

Capt Cheng was born in 1963 and passed away September 18, 1995. He died while representing Canada in the International Military Police Competition: Peacekeeper Challenge. The St. Charles Range Obstacle Course is dedicated as the "Captain M. Cletus Cheng Memorial Confidence

Course."

Compelled to keep Capt Cheng's memory alive, the students used several of their lunch breaks to place flowers they bought, rocks they painted and ropes and sticks they found to surround the plaque in the field.

The good deed hasn't gone unnoticed. 17 Wing PSP Manager, Rick Harris said, "The summer students have indeed demonstrated their unselfishness, compassion and respect for the sacrifice made by Capt Cheng," who was recognized as a "dedicated leader" with an "outstanding

personality" who "personified the professional Canadian Forces officer."

17 Wing Fitness & Recreation's Andy Oxley concurred, saying, "I believe the future looks very hopeful for all of us, with acts of kindness

and compassion from fine young adults like these."

The students say their touching tribute was done to remember someone who dedicated his life to Canada and it was the least they could do to honour him.

Orientation

"Good morning my name is..." Do you remember arriving at your first day at work? Do you remember the uncertainty, the overwhelming sensation of the unfamiliar? Was anyone there to help? Countless stories exist about how a new employee has been directed to their office after having received a ten-minute talk with the manager. Not only is this stressful for a new employee, but it virtually guarantees a long period of unproductiveness and uncertainty.

Orienting employees to their workplaces and their jobs is one of the most neglected functions in organizations. Many Public Service managers believe a depart-

mental orientation is simply a nicety rather than an obligation. An orientation for a new hire reduces employee anxiety and employee turnover. As well, through the explanation of the values and ethics of the department the employee can gain an appreciation of the Defence Team with which he or she is expected to operate. Therefore, a familiarization to the department and the employee's specific workplace is a must rather than an option. DAOD 5031-52 states that a supervisor/manager is responsible to "ensure that all their new DND employees have access to an orientation process that includes the Orientation Program".

The Winnipeg Learning and Career Center (LCC)

prides itself in offering newer employees to National Defence a great one-day Orientation for New Employees. The aim of the orientation is to acquaint new employees with the structure, broad terms of employment, culture and values of the department. This orientation, facilitated by a Learning Advisor, invites representatives from the Wing Executive, Safety, the Employee Assistance Program and other areas to help the employee appreciate the broader system he or she works in.

At the end of the day, the employee is equipped with the basic tools to understand the broader environment in which he or she works, yet he or she lacks an orientation at the unit level. For that reason a unit level orientation is essential, covering items specific to the employee's new

workplace such as work responsibilities and expectations, unit policies and procedures, reporting structure and training needs. This orientation is best conducted by the employee's immediate supervisor coupled with ongoing coaching and feedback. To assist, a checklist for managers is provided at http://admfincs.mil.ca/admfincs/subjects/daod/5031/52_e_a.sp.

Orientation (or lack of it) will make a significant difference in how quickly an employee can become more productive and also has long-term effects for the organization. Stereotypical Newfoundland; nothing but cold weather, strong winds and rain! Anyone who competes in track and field would admit that these are not the best conditions to run in, but for us Newfoundlanders, this is what we call a good day!

Nonetheless, these were the conditions for the 2005 Newfoundland Age Class Championships during Canada Day Weekend. This meet was used both as a trial for the 2005 Canada Games and for the Canadian Track and Field Championships. At the end of a long week-

end, I finished in 2nd and 3rd place in the 200m and 100m respectively.

With a quick return to 402 Squadron in Winnipeg to continue my AERE PPT training, I now had qualified to run in both events. As the weekend of the 15 - 17 of July approached, my coach and I began our peaking cycle for the meet. As

Thursday and Friday rolled around, people like Bruny Surin, Glenroy Gilbert and Canada's top athletes started to show up in the Winnipeg area for this competition.

For myself, this meet was more of a way to gain some experience into what a bigger meet truly is. I have never attended such a high caliber meet, and to run against the best of the best in Canada was like waking up on Christmas morning to see your family smiling around some of your favorite gifts. I have, for the past 8 years, dreamed of making the Olympics in 2008 and RMC has supported this dream since the day I enrolled. However, I have been unable to compete during the summer months because of phase training. Given this,

I knew it would be unrealistic for me to set a goal of medaling at the meet, but I wanted to get out there and run a few personal bests.

On the day of competition, the weather was not the greatest for running excellent times. In the end, I finished in 19th place for the 100m with a time of 11.57s. However, Sunday was what made my weekend. I was nervous prior to the 200m race because the weather conditions had really taken a toll for the worse with the rain, thunder and lightning. However, just before getting into the starting blocks, the race was delayed for 30 minutes as one of our own, a CF-18 Hornet, did a fly by of the track on final approach to Winnipeg International. This did it for


me! I was truly ready now! No butterflies, no nothing, I was in the zone to run! After a grueling race battling some of the worst conditions, I finished in 26th with a time of 23.54s.

I had such an amazing time at this competition, and to represent the Royal Military College and the CF at such a big meet, it truly did bring a smile to my face. I could not have done it without all the support I have gotten over the years and I am truly appreciative of this. I will do everything I can to represent the CF and our beautiful country at the next World Military Games in 2007 and the Olympic Games in 2008.

In the end, this is just my little way of saying Thank You!

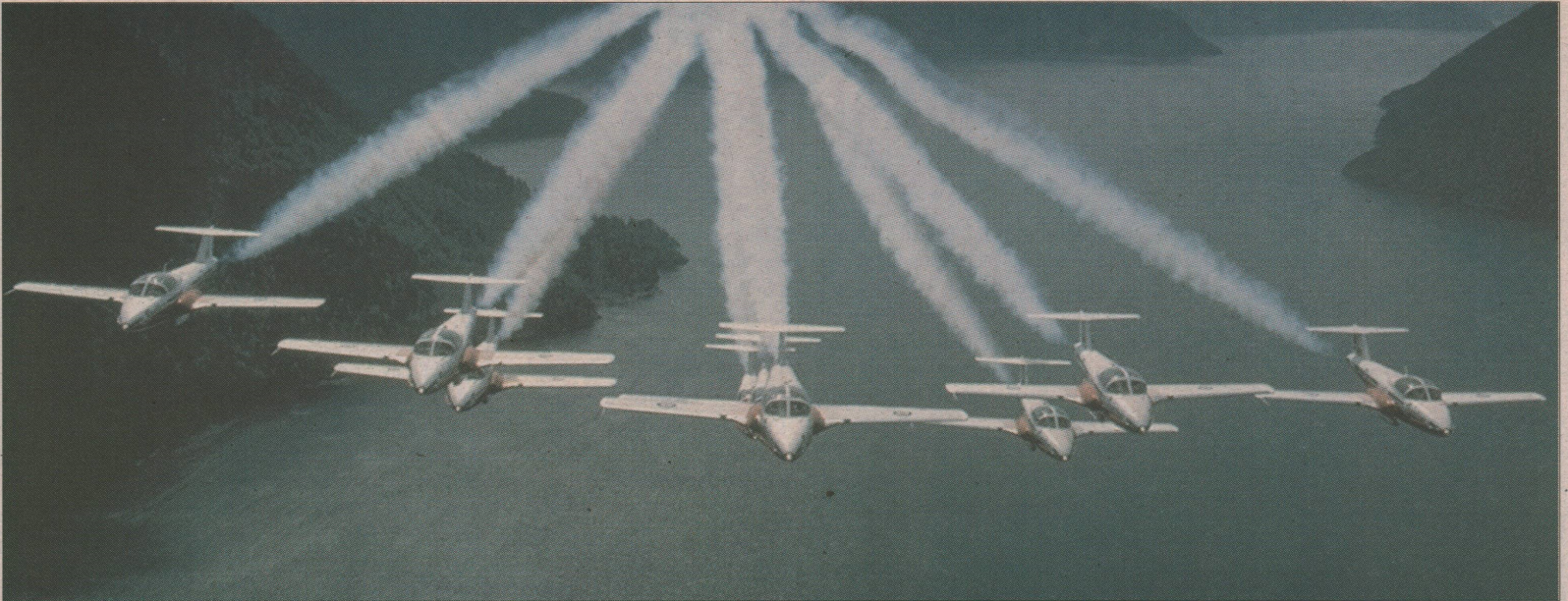


Skatepark West would give skateboarders of all ages a place to strut their stuff. Newman says the proposed facility should be open by Summer 2006.

For two years 17 Wing has partnered with Skatepark West, a community organization, in the fundraising for building a new facility for the public, including military families. At the beginning of August, Acting Wing Commander, LCol Tom Whitburn, was presented with a certificate of appreciation

for the Wing from Skatepark West Chair, Connie Newman. 17 Wing provided facilities at Kapyong Barricks for a skate event on June 5 to fundraise for the building of Skatepark West. Newman said 17 Wing has helped "bring awareness to skateboarding" and is thrilled about the "partnership with

the military." Through various fundraising events, the group has raised enough money to build the proposed Skatepark at the southwest corner of Sturgeon Road and Silver Avenue. The facility is expected to be open by summer of 2006, Newman said.

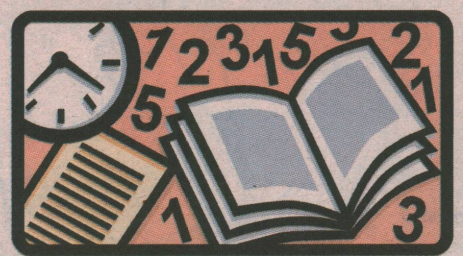

Flat Tire, Smashed Tooth Can't Stop Ironman Competitor

Maj Luc Guillette represented 17 Wing at the Ford Ironman USA Coeur D'Alene on 26 June. Overcoming a minor bike accident in which he smashed a front tooth, Maj Guillette was still able to achieve a personal second best time of 10 hours and 19 minutes.

Of the 1,761 competitors, Maj Guillette finished 108th and was one of the top male Canadians aged 35-39 to complete the Ironman. He placed 28th out of 286 in his category.

An Ironman competition involves a 3.8 km swim, followed immediately by a 180 km cycle and ending with a 42.2 km marathon run.

A former Flight Commander at CFANS, Guillette said he had a "strong swim" with a time of 54 minutes, putting him in 45th position overall.

However, the race took a turn for the worse on the bike leg when Maj Guillette was heading downhill and says one of the competitors tried to pass him on the left side. Both racers were reaching speeds in excess of 60 km/h when suddenly the other cyclist lost control of his bike at the bottom of the hill and started sliding.

"I hit him square in the back, chipping (my) tooth in the process," Maj Guillette said. "I helped (him) on the ground, he was badly injured." Guillette continued, "It could have been a lot worse I think." The only repair Maj Guillette needed dur-

ing the race was to fix a front flat tire that was damaged upon the collision. In total, the accident cost Maj Guillette at least 10 minutes to get back on track, but he "was not about to give up." The bike portion of the race "was fairly challenging - hilly and very technical, as difficult as Penticton, sight of Ironman Canada," Maj Guillette said.

However, despite losing precious time in the bike accident, Maj Guillette finished strong, passing 50 people during the final leg of the race, the marathon run.

"The race went well despite the fact that I smashed a front tooth during the bike leg," said Maj Luc Guillette, who will now be enjoying some time off from racing, setting his sights on Ironman USA Lake Placid, NY in July 2006.

Currently a planner with A3 Contingency Plans at 1 Cdn Air Div., Maj Guillette is grateful for the "support from family and friends, as well as the people at work." He feels strongly that without their support, training and racing in Ironman triathlons would not be possible. In addition, Maj Guillette would like to thank former Wing Commander, Col Kummel, former Cmdt CFANS, LCol Cameron, 17 Wing Fund, 17 Wing F&S Director, Al Brazeau and his staff, and CISM International Sports Manager, Roy Hillier.

Mandate

The primary role or purpose of the DAGPWD is to advise the senior leadership of the DND/CF on matters related to the equitable representation of persons with disabilities within the Defence Team. In particular, the DAGPWD (NE) will work with the local DDAG in the identification of issues that have a national impact, as well as planning/developing appropriate measures for dealing with these issues. The specific roles of the DAGPWD include:

- provision of advice on employment equity initiatives, action plans, employment equity related issues, identification of systemic barriers, and recommendations for solutions to identified issues or problems;
- provision of advice on the development of policies, procedures and mechanisms related to recruitment, retention, and training of Defence Team members with disabilities;
- acting as an advocate for the equitable treatment of all of Defence Team members with disabilities; and
- the exchange and promotion of information on issues affecting persons with disabilities within the Defence Team and external agencies as appropriate.

Dealing with individual cases is not part of the DAGPWD's mandate. The group is not a substitute for the normal internal processes established for dealing with grievances, complaints, etc, although it is within the Group's purview to provide guidance or suggestions with respect to sources of information or solutions to issues. Individual cases may highlight a shortcoming in national or regional policies; however, the DAGPWD's role is to focus on the policy issue, rather than the individual situation.
