MEDICAL NCO SHOWS MARKED IMPROVEMENT

NEWSREEL RECORDS GREENWOOD SEARCH

GREENWOOD, N. S.—Mr. Bob Campbell of the National Film Board, Ottawa, arrived at this base Tuesday to record the activities of Greenwood Station in motion pictures. Mr. Campbell flew over the search area photographing the terrain from heights ranging from 300 feet to 9000—the height from which Rockcliffe aircraft made their photo-reconnaissance. Newsreel pictures were taken of crews preparing to go on search and of aircrews actually at work in the air. In addition, Mr. Campbell took some interesting shots of Greenwood Station itself. These pictures will be released to the Nation Film Circuit and distributed throughout Canada and USA. The National Film Board of Canada is now recognized as one of the major newsreel producers in the world, and Greenwood feels honored that it has become the site of a picture of this type.

DAY OFF FROM SEARCH ENDS UP IN MERCY FLIGHT

After flying almost continuously since the beginning of the search, F/O Zaleschuk and crew were finally rewarded with a day off from flying. Their relaxation period was short-lived however, when a call for a Mercy Flight to Goose Bay brought them into Ops room at daybreak. Six seriously ill Eskimos, flown into Goose Bay from Pangnirtung, Baffin Land and Frobisher Bay required urgent medical treatment that Goose Bay was unable to provide.

The Lancaster took off at seven, and after three hours of battling dirty weather, landed between ten-foot snow drifts at Goose Bay. The patients were speedily loaded and the aircraft flown direct to Dartmouth.

Nursing Sister Allen and Squadron Leader Beaton took part in the flight. The regular crew was made up of F/O Zaleschuk, Sgt. Short, F/O Ritchie, F/O Webb, F/O Charko and the para-rescue boys, Cpls. Courturier and McMennamon.

EAGLE ATTACKS LANC

The North American Eagle is king of our forests. His razor talons and sickle beak are respected and feared by any who have come in contact with him, and his own domain is given wide berth by forest travellers.

During the Search, a Lancaster, piloted by Grant Nelson, passed over an eagle's nest. The nest was sighted by Flying Officer Hawkshaw, who had no sooner reported his sighting, when Flight Lieutenant Nelson was confronted by a large bird coming in for a bow attack. The eagle pulled up barely in time to miss the windscreen of the aircraft.

The next leg of the Search brought the aircraft near the same spot again, and this time King Eagle really had the Lancaster in his sights. He dived straight down and actually passed between number three and four engines, missing the props by a hairbreadth.

The third leg of the search took the Lanc some distance from the nest but the eagle could be seen in the distance, still carrying out Fighter patrol above his home.

HEALTH TOPICS

S/L Purchase

There has been a great deal of discussion in the Armed Forces about free medical care for dependents. Information from authoritative sources is to the effect that the Minister of National Defence will not authorize more than is being carried out at present. Thus, to make the cost of medical care for dependents easier to bear, prepaid medical insurance plans offer the best solution.

A non-profit organization called "Maritime Medical Care" was approached and has agreed with certain stipulations, to form a group here. One of the stipulations is that 75% of the families on the Station must join. This plan pays the physicians' fees for home, office, or hospital diagnosis and care. It pays consultants, and surgeons' fees for all surgical operations. It also pays the anaesthetists' fees and the fees for obstetrical procedures. Special diagnostic procedures (including X-rays) are also paid for. There are no initial medical examinations, and there is no exclusion from membership because of chronic or pre-existing conditions. You have a full choice of physicians.

This plan in no way interferes with the Blue Cross Plan, which pays hospital bills only. Because of the fact that the service personnel get free medical care, our rates will be lower. The rate for a family with one child will be \$3.75 per month. The rate for a family with two or more children will be \$4.50 per month. In Nova Scotia last year only 14% of those sick were

Pamphlets explaining this plan are available at the Station Hospital. Remember that 75% of the families on the Station must enroll if we are to have a group here. Perhaps some of those most interested would consent to canvass our one hundred and eighty families to find out what per cent would join.
