CANSO MAKES MERCY FLIGHT TO SABLE

The Canso was called out to Sable Island last Saturday for another Mercy Flight. A seriously ill woman was taken off the island, but owing to bad weather at Halifax, F/L Nelson, the pilot, brought the plane back to Greenwood and landed the patient here.

GREENWOOD, N. S.—History was made for the RCAF on May 2 when the first Canadian Aircraft flew over the geographic North Pole. The aircraft, Lancaster "Zenith", was piloted by F/L Johnnie Moss DFC of 103 Search and Rescue Flight.

The aircraft took off from Kittigazuit and flew to the pole in perfect weather. When over the pole itself a small triangle of cloud was seen below, and from a height of 10,000 feet the RCAF flag was dropped. F/L Moss stated that the flight was "purely routine, and there was nothing to see but ice, and still more ice."

INOCULATIONS

Husbands should keep a closer eye on D.R.O.'s for the exact date and time of each monthly inoculation parade. Don't forget to tell the little woman about it, as once a child has started on a series, it is important that it attends regularly.

For those children who have finished a course of inoculations at this hospital, or have had a successful vaccination, certificates are available with this information on them. Call at the Station Hospital for them. They will be needed sooner or later.

CHICKEN POX

Remember that all infectious diseases occurring on the camp must be reported to the S.M.O. There are a few cases of chicken pox on the Station now.

Chicken pox is a mild virus disease, very infectious, and occurs most commonly in young children in the winter or early spring months. It is not related to smallpox. It takes 14 to 21

days to develop after exposure. The disease is contracted in the same way as "colds"—that is, by nose and mouth droplets. It may also be caught from toys, clothes, etc. contaminated by a sick child.

The course of the disease is mild but the child, at first, may be restless and uncomfortable. It may begin with what seems to be a mild "cold", with a low fever 100-101 degrees. However, the rash may appear without any previous symptoms. It usually begins as small red spots, which are itchy, on the child's trunk. Later these spread to the arms, legs and face. They may even be found inside the mouth. Small, clear blisters are seen on some of the spots. The blisters are easily broken and become dry, and then a crust is formed which may come off in 7-10 days. Occasionally these little blisters get infected, especially if the child does a lot of scratching. Little boils may develop, often leaving a little pit after they heal. Ordinary chicken pox, itself, produces no scarring.

In treating this disease, the first thing to remember is that the child must be isolated from all other sus-

FISH AND STREAMS

As all the talk in the vicinity and on the station is, when, where, and how the catches of salmon and trout are made, a few extracts from the official Nova Scotia Angling Regulations are in Order:

Permits are required by persons domiciled in the province less than 6 months, the fee being, \$5.00.

Salmon

Season: April 1st to Aug. 31st in the Annapolis Valley area, with artificial flies fished at surface only. **Bag Limit:** In above area, 5 per person per day, and 20 per week; **Size Limit:** 3 pounds, round weight.

Trout

Season: April 1st to Sept 15th. except in Sunken Lake, Kings Co., and Rumsey Lake, Annapolis Co. **Season for these lakes,** July 1st to Oct 1st: **Bag Limit:** Gray trout, 3 per person per day. Grayling trout, 3 per person fish or 10 lbs. per person per day. **Size Limit:** Gray trout, 15 inches; Rainbow trout, 12 inches; Other trout, 6 inches.

STRIPED BASS

Special size limit Annapolis River between Annapolis and Bridgetown, 16 inches; Elsewhere none.

There are a few waters in this area in which fishing is prohibited—i.e., the limit mentioned on striped bass in Annapolis River. Angling is prohibited in the Nictaux, between the powerhouse and storage dam. At Round Hill River—within 25 yards downstream from a point marked at trout hole. At Rumsey lake and Sunk-

ceptible persons. No one, except the mother, should be in the same room, even momentarily. No clothing or toys should be taken out of the patient's room, and the patient's dishes should be boiled after use, or at least kept completely separate. The mother should wash her hands after coming from the child's room, before she touches anything, including door knobs. When the scales have come off, the child can be allowed out of isolation after a complete bath, shampoo, and fresh clothes. The bed clothes and contaminated clothes should be laundered. The blankets should be put out in sunlight to air for 24 hours; and the bed, dressers, toys, etc. be washed with soap and water or 5% lysol solution.

The child should be kept in bed until the fever is down. To make him more comfortable, aspirin may be given several times a day in doses suitable to the child's age. To allay itching, the child should not be kept too warm. The skin may be bathed with 5% soda bicarbonate solution or 3% boracic solution. Calomine lotion with 1/2-1% phenol may be necessary to prevent scratching. Scratching should be discouraged or prevented to forestall infection and scarring. The child itself and its clothing and bed clothing should be kept scrupulously clean for the same reason.
