First Town Council Sworn In

OTU CREWS BOMB SUB

On November 12, four Lancasters from 2 (M) OTU flew to Kindley Air Force Base in Bermuda, to carry out air-sea exercises with units of the Royal Navy and the Royal Canadian Navy. During the four-day "battle", twelve exercises were carried out and the aircraft flew 75:00 hours. The humid Bermuda climate did not deter the enthusiasm of the Lancaster crews, and the highlight of the operation was the opportunity to bomb a real submarine.

On November 14, three student crews of course Number 3 took off from Kindley Field with several

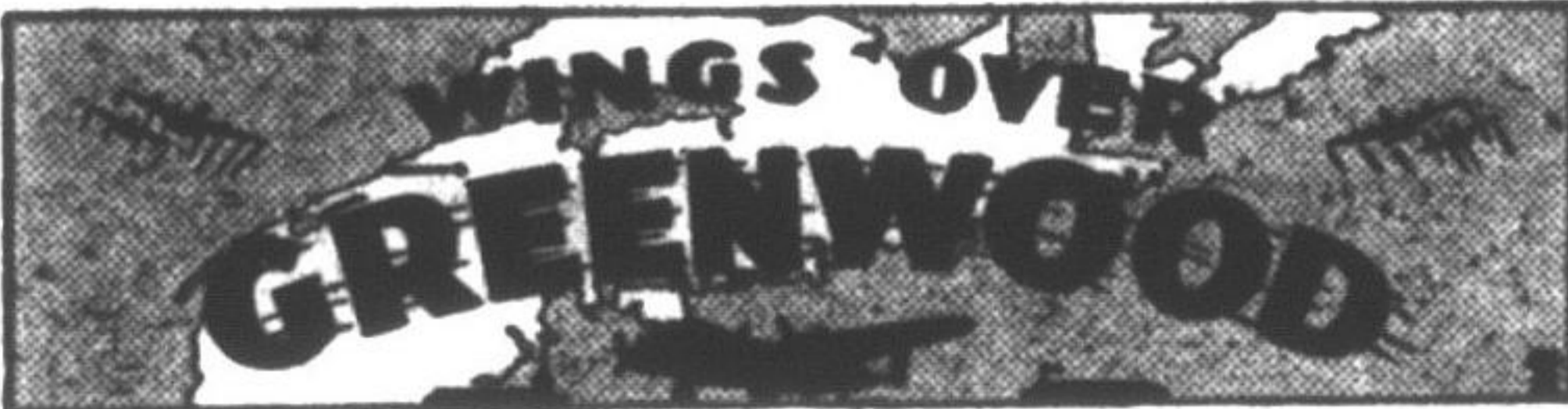
Squadron Leader Moody stated that, "Through a free and unprejudiced right to vote, the electors of Greenwood Community have seen fit to

103 TO THE RESCUE

Twice within a week 103 Rescue Unit has been called upon to ferry engine spares to Bermuda. The first trip was on the evening of Tuesday, November 14, when word was received that one of the O.T.U.'s Lancasters was grounded in Bermuda and needed engine spares. Canso 11075, captained by Flying Officer Pearson, made the trip, leaving Greenwood at 8.10 p.m. and arriving at Bermuda at 2.30 a.m. This is believed to be the first time that a Canso from Greenwood has gone to Bermuda, Lancasters always having been used before. It takes considerably longer in the "great

Particularly, we wish to thank WO2 J. Walmsley and Corporal R. A. Teale, with whom it is always a pleasure to be associated.

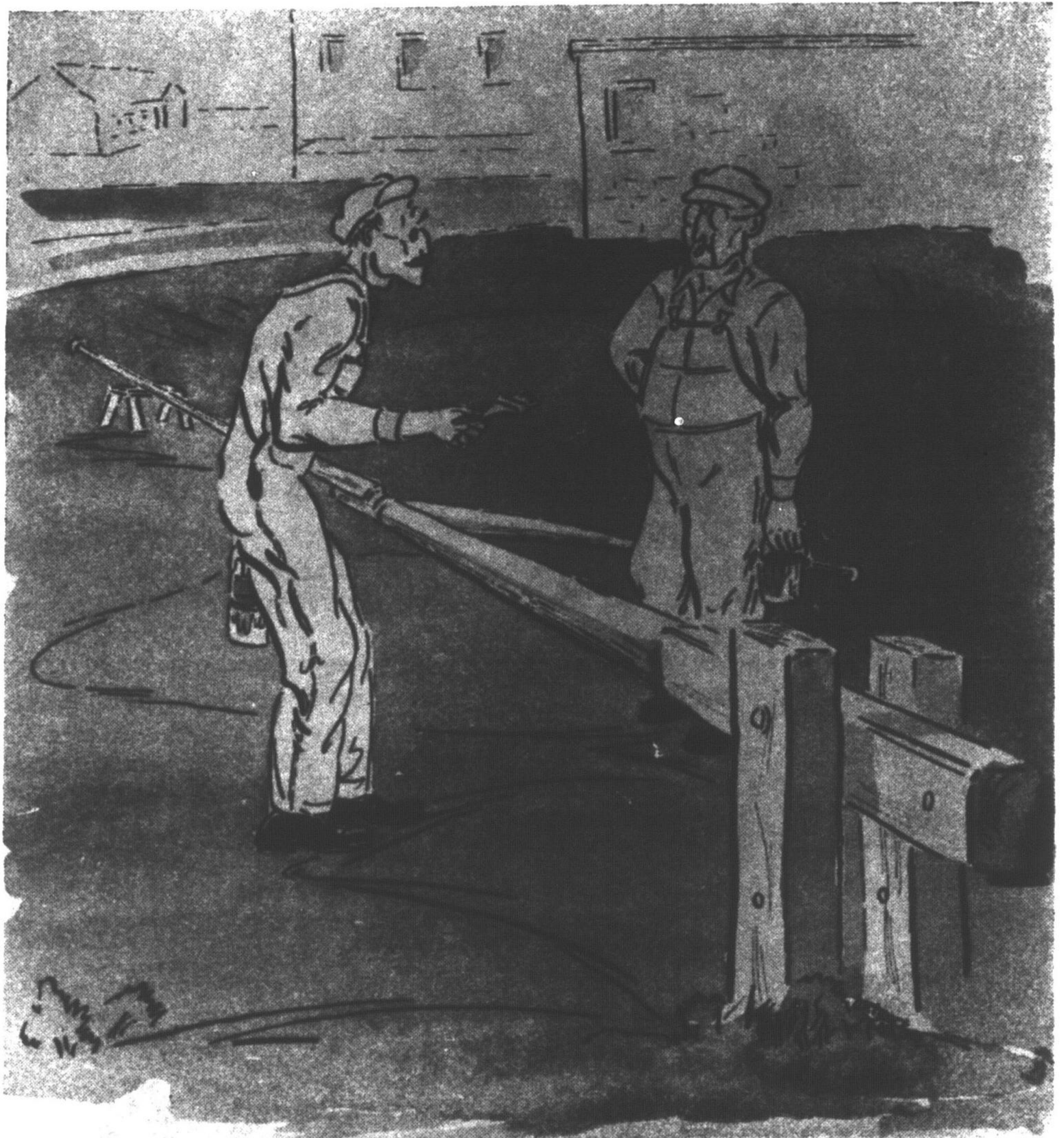

bombs on board, to search for a submarine known to be off the coast of Bermuda. The aircrews were keeping a good lookout and the submarine was first sighted by F/L Ashton and crew in Lancaster 946. After a dummy run over the target, the bombers attacked with several sticks of bombs. The submarine took evasive action but was unable to elude the accurate bombing of the OTU crews. One bomb scored a direct hit on the port saddle tank of the submarine, while another fell near the conning tower. The submarine commander skillfully survived the ferocious attack by the three aircraft and kept his craft seaworthy until reaching a port at Bermuda. Shortly after the aircraft returned to Kindley Field, the aircrews were on their way to visit the crew members on the submarine and the attack was relived amid good humoured laughter.

The submarine involved was HMS Andrew of the Royal Navy, and the bombs dropped were the specially de-

signed practice break-up type, which are being used for the first time since World War II. No casualties were reported, and the only damage to the submarine was reported by radio from the submarine commander, when he said in an English accent, "Oi, you're chipping my paint."

The four Lancasters returned to Greenwood on November 16, after a most successful operation. The aircrew carried out their duties in an admirable fashion, and the ground crew who worked from dawn to dusk to keep our aircraft in the air deserve credit for their part in making the operation such a success.

Once again, the 2 (M) OTU in an effort to simulate actual Maritime operations, has scored another first in the post war period by being the only unit in Canada to drop bombs on a live target in friendly waters.

PREJUDICES

Are you a Liberal or a Conservative? Or haven't you made up your mind? If you have already decided which party you favor, when did you make the decision? Many people form a liking for one or the other of the parties when they are quite young. They hear their parents or others whom they respect talking politics. They hear one party favored and the other condemned, and they accept the views of their parents or friends.

There is nothing wrong about their doing this. A child knows very little about politics, and it is natural that he should accept the views of others. But when one gets older he should decide things for himself. He should not go ahead favoring the Liberals or the Conservatives just because he happened to like them when he was a child.

When a person gets away from childhood, he gives up many things which he liked when he was an infant. He quits playing with dolls and blocks and such toys. He has other interests.

Many men and women, however, cling to the ideas about politics which they had when they were playing with toys. They get to liking the very name "Conservative" or "Liberal" so well that they always want their party to win. Even when a party changes, as parties do, these people still cling to the party to which they became attached when they were children.

If a person is wise, he will not do that. He will study the problems before the country. He will make up his mind how these problems ought to be solved. Then he will read what the party platforms say about these problems. He will listen to what the candidates say. He will then make up his mind which party believes as he does.

Beware of people who think that all the arguments are on one side. Things are not as simple as that. Pay more attention to people who talk reasonably and calmly and who do not seem to be unduly prejudiced.

All of us will finally decide upon candidates to support, but we should not let blind prejudice determine our choice. And we should not support a party simply because we got into the habit of liking that party back in our childhood days.

The entire nation will benefit as more and more people refuse to give blind support to any one political party, year after year. In the hope of winning the backing of these vigilant, independent citizens, the parties will then have to be on their toes at all

exercise their franchise and have placed in office the following:

Mayor: Flight Sergeant H. L. MacAulay.

Councillor Ward 1: LAC L. Donovan.

Councillor Ward 2: Tie: Cpl. A. J. Sheehy, Cpl. F. S. Collins.

Councillor Ward 3: Cpl. W. J. Falkenham.

Councillor Ward 4: S/L R. J. Gordon.

Councillor Ward 5: F/S J. C. Terrill.

Councillor Ward 6: F/L J. C. Hall.

"I will now ask the Mayor-elect and the councillors for Wards 1, 3, 4, 5 and 6 to step forward and be sworn into office by the Commanding Officer."

The Commanding Officer, Group Captain N. S. A. Anderson, then took over proceedings and, after congratulating each of the successful candidates, he performed the ceremony of "Swearing in" the Council. The Mayor and five successful Councillors took the following oath:

"I solemnly swear to uphold the principles associated with the office of Mayor or Councillor of Greenwood Community.

"I promise to faithfully carry out those duties associated with the office to which the electors have seen fit to appoint me, through their free and unprejudiced right of vote, and I will do so to the best of my ability, so help me, God".

A by-election to decide on the representative for Ward 2 has been scheduled for Thursday, November 23, and by the time this issue of "Wings Over Greenwood" is circulated, the name of the councillor for Ward 2 will be known. This will complete the Town Council, consisting of a Mayor and six Councillors.

One of the features of the voting arrangement was the travelling poll, in which a representative of each ward delivered ballots to each house on Wednesday, November 15, and picked them up in sealed or locked boxes on election day. This system contributed greatly to the fact that 95.2% of eligible voters had their ballots amongst those counted. With such a large vote, a truly representative Town Council is now in power in our town.

The election campaign and the election itself was carried out with efficiency and good humoured rivalry between the nominees, and was followed with great interest by all station personnel. For this, the Commanding Officer wishes to express his thanks. WOMEN'S AUXILIARY

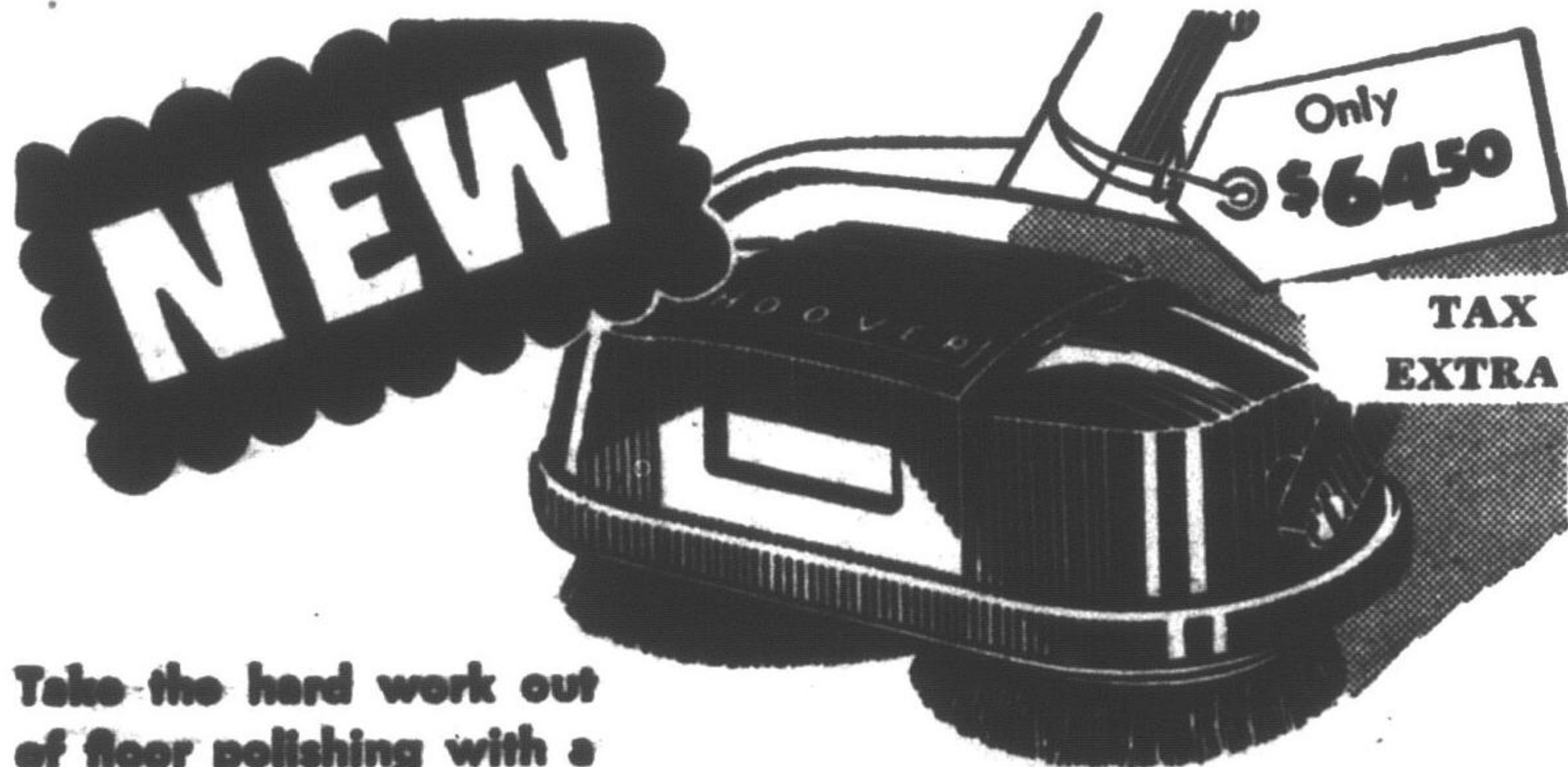
