New Commanding Officer For Can. Forces Hospital

Group Captain H.J. Bright was appointed Commanding Officer of Canadian Forces Hospital Rockcliffe back in July and we'd like to take this opportunity to welcome him.

Educated at Toronto, he graduated from the University of Toronto in Medicine in 1936. After two years internship at the Toronto General Hospital he was physician to three gold mines in Northern Ontario for two years and returned to Toronto to DVA Christie Street Hospital for about a year and a half.

In 1942 he joined the RCAF and was the Medical Officer on staff of the Clinical Investigation Unit at the Old No. 1 I.T.S. Early in 1944 he was transferred to Gander Newfoundland as 10 BR squadron Medical Officer. A year later he was transferred to Dartmouth, Nova Scotia where he spent about a year as Station SMO. Following this he was President of the Medical Bd. at No. 4 Release Centre in Toronto.

In January 1946 G/C Bright left the RCAF and attended the Public Health Course at the University of Toronto from which he graduated in December of that year. In September, 1946, while still attending University, he rejoined the RCAF as a Wing Commander Medical Officer and in January, 1947, was transferred to Northwest Air Command Edmonton as SOMS. In August, 1949, he returned to Toronto to take a post-graduate year in cardiology after which he was transferred to the IAM in Toronto for two years during which he was in charge Central Medical Establishment. In 1953 he became SOMS Training Command Trenton; in July 1955 he proceeded to 1 Air Div as SOMS in Headquarters, Metz, France. Following his return to Canada in July 1958, he attended a two year course in Hospital Administration at the University of Toronto and the Hospital for Sick Children on completion of which he was transferred to Rockcliffe to be Commanding Officer of Canadian Forces Hospital Rockcliffe.

In 1954, due to his experience and work in Aviation Medicine, G/C Bright was made a Chartered Fellow of the American College of Preventive Medicine in the specialty of Aviation Medicine.

G/C Bright's main hobbies are colour photography and music.

From all of us at the Hospital, goes a sincere welcome to G/C Bright. We hope his stay at the Hospital will be a long and enjoyable one.
