SPECIAL MOVING BENEFITS

LAHR, O of I — The Canadian Government has approved several special benefits to help Canadian Forces Personnel, and their dependents, who are required to move because of re-organization of the Forces in Europe.

Here are the highlights:

.....250 pounds baggage allowance, in addition to normal entitlement, for each serviceman and dependent moving into or out of public quarters, or returning to Canada.

.....full move benefits (including packing and crating but no insurance) for members moving from unfurnished economy housing in one location to unfurnished economy housing in another location;

.....reimbursement of necessarily incurred real estate agent's fees for obtaining economy housing, up to an amount equal to one month's rent;

.....moving grants of \$100 for all married members as well as actual and reasonable expenses (supported by receipts) up to \$35 for single members relocated within Europe;

.....purchase by the Crown of privately owned furniture if a serviceman has unreasonable difficulty selling.

These benefits are retro-active to 1st January 1970. The authority remains in effect until 31st March 1972 for personnel re-located from the Soest area and until 31st March 1971 for personnel re-located from other than the Soest area.

The net effect of the special baggage allowance is that, at public expense: an officer may ship 750 pounds; a man may ship 550 pounds; a wife may ship 800 pounds if relocating in Europe, or 950 if returning to Canada, and each dependent child may ship 600 pounds.

The Material Movements Offices in Soest, Baden-Soellingen and Lahr, are able to offer more details on the 250 pounds extra baggage allowance and on arrangements for transportation, at public expense, of personal effects for those on the move in Europe.

Authority also has been granted for the purchase of privately owned furniture. This would be done to help the serviceman realize a return on his furniture investment if he has difficulty selling. However, it remains the personal responsibility of each serviceman to try to sell his own furniture. The staff officer housing in Lahr, and his counterparts in Baden-

Soellingen and Soest are able to answer specific questions pertaining to the purchase of furniture by the Crown.

Although reimbursement for real estate agent's fee is now authorized in some instances, before you commit yourself to an extra deposit to hold a home in your new location in Europe, check with your Housing Office. There are some pitfalls.

For those being re-located within Europe during re-organization, limitations on movement grants have been relaxed. Families may now receive \$100 and single members will receive actual expenses up to \$35.

CFN En Francais

LAHR, Germany — Canadian Forces Headquarters in Ottawa has approved the establishment of a French language radio station for Canadian Forces Europe. The French radio outlet may start broadcasting before the end of 1970. The French language radio service can not be in operation for at least six months, mainly because of the lead time to purchase the necessary radio transmitting equipment.

The French language radio service will be an integral part of the Canadian Forces Network (CFN). The broadcasting service in the French language will be monaural FM. It will provide a parallel service to that of CFN's present English language station. That is all types of programs will be offered in the French language such as weather reports, news, sports, public affairs, etc. CFN will also have the capability of simulcast.....that is the simultaneous broadcasting over the French and English radio frequencies of special programs, such as the reading of the Speech from the Throne during ceremonies marking the opening of Parliament.

Until the French language service is operational, CFN will gradually increase French language content to coincide with the increase in the French-Canadian population in Lahr this year. As CFN's bilingual capability increases, the number of hours devoted to French language programming will increase, until approximately 20 to 25 percent of broadcasting will be in French.

Mr. Hans Konow, present director of CFN, will continue in that post after both the French and English components are operating from combined facilities in Lahr.

Mr. Don McGibbon will continue in his post of Program Director for CFN's FM-stereo English language service. Program Director for CFN's monaural-FM French language service has not yet been appointed.



Two 427 Squadron pilots, Major M.D. Thom and Captain J.M. GEORGE HAMILTON IV AMBASSADOR HIT

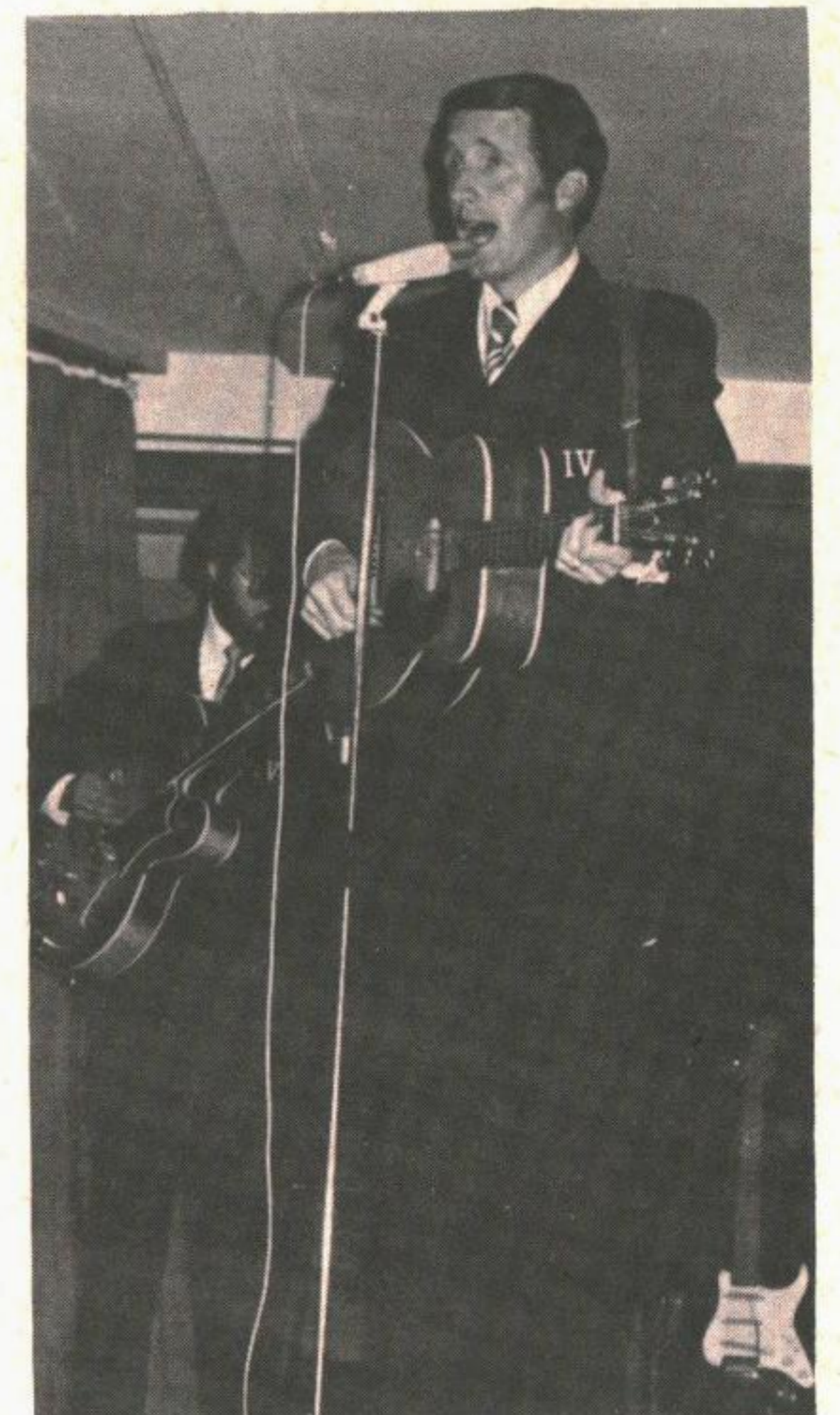

SUBS and SATELLITES for ARCTIC SURVEILLANCE

(CP) - A Commons Defence Subcommittee Report recommends that nuclear submarines and satellites be added to the Forces used in surveillance of Canadian Arctic sovereignty. The 90-page report was prepared by the Defence Committee's Subcommittee on Maritime Forces, under Subcommittee Chairman Keith Penner.

The report's recommendations are based on the belief that the Government intends to take defence of Canada's Arctic sovereignty seriously. The report will be examined by the full Defence Committee in Ottawa next week.

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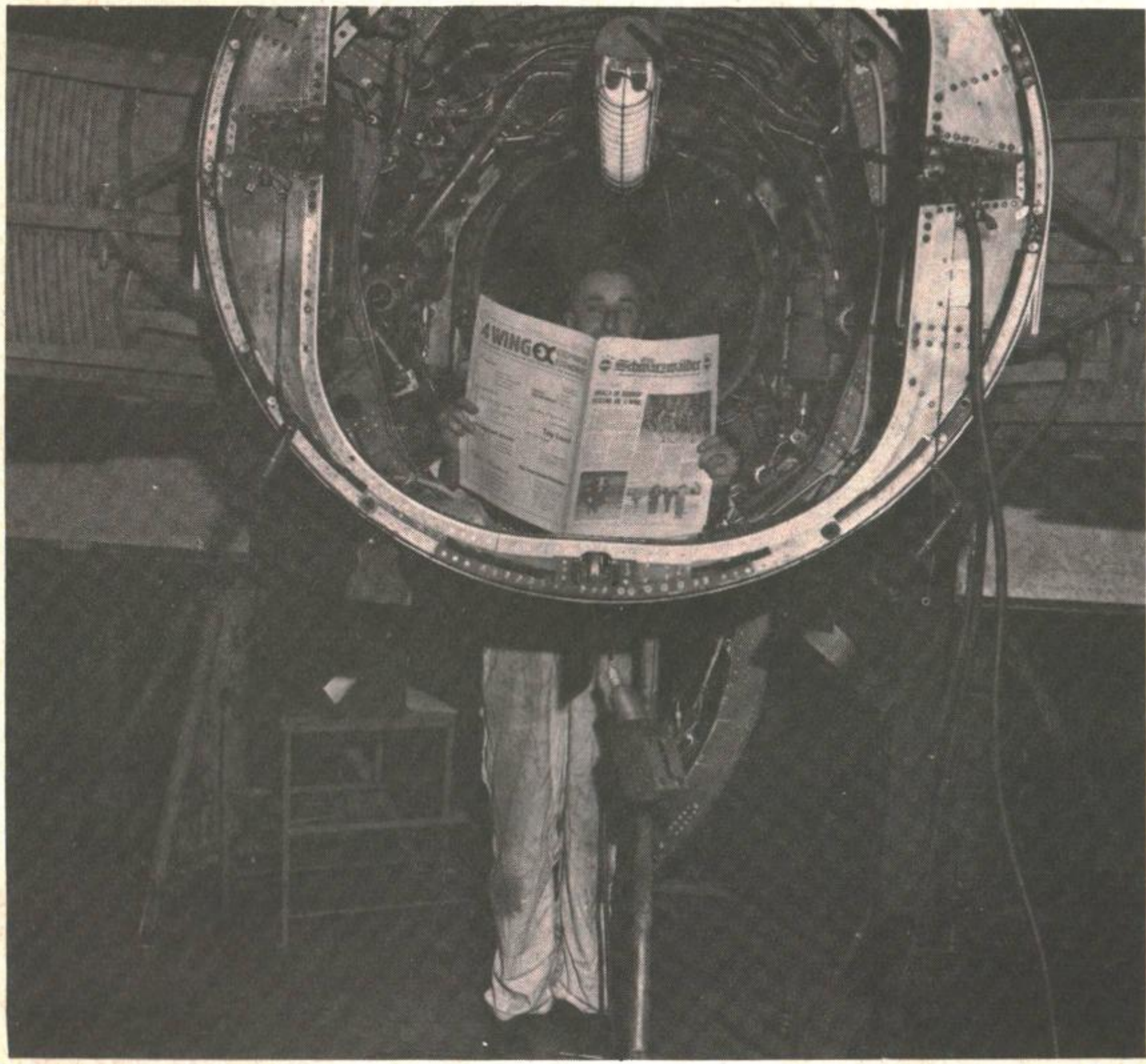

How To Start Job-Hunting

OTTAWA (CFP) — Thinking about retirement ?

Time has a way of sneaking up on everyone. Retirement, which up to now has been something to be pushed to the back of your mind, can suddenly turn out to be only months away. Common sense tells us that a change involving the outside world needs early planning and preparation.

Fine, but how do you start and who can help?

One person who is ready to help is the Base Personnel Selection Officer or Personnel Education Officer responsible for the Civilian Employment Assistance Program. Briefly, these are some of the ways he can help you.

— It is a good idea to test your retirement plans by talking them over with a person who can be objective. For example, how realistic are your plans in relationship to economic conditions?

— You may wonder if your military skills and experience are useful in the outside world. A master gunner in the artillery, for example,

might need help in selling his skills to the average civilian employer.

— If you want to make a clean break with the past, vocational guidance tests are available.

— The preparation and printing of your career resume will be done for you.

— Can you teach an old dog new tricks? Of course, and those interested in academic upgrading should talk it over with the Base Personnel Selection Officer.

— The largest employment service in the country is Canada Manpower. Your contact for the Manpower Centre nearest your Base is the Base Personnel Selection Officer. He can start your first appointment off on the right foot with a special introduction.

It pays to start thinking about your retirement.

Servicemen approaching retirement are invited to participate in the Civilian Employment Assistance Programme as outlined in CFAO 56-20. Consult your Base Personnel

Selection Officer or Base Personnel Education Officer for further details.

at all times that will ensure the safe and efficient completion of his driving duties.

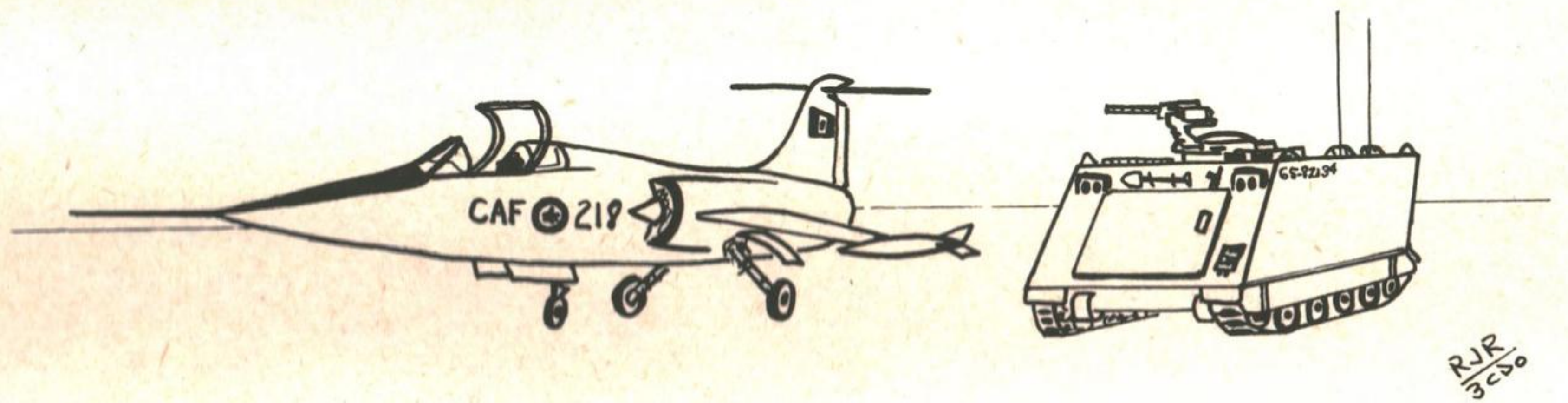
The professional driver polices his own actions and doesn't need someone to keep him in line.

'IT'S NOT FAIR'

"But it's not fair!" cries the young child as he is dragged upstairs at an early hour, thwarted by the older generation in his effort to take part in the evening's festivities. This same shrill cry is repeated again, when the child becomes a man and in his endeavours to cope with the world finds once again that the older generation have established a pre-determined order which limits his freedom.

One cannot help but empathize with the frustration and despair expressed by young people as they survey the world bequeathed to them by their elders. Indeed, "IT IS NOT FAIR" to ask youth to tolerate quietly an existence that seems threatened on one side by a nuclear sword of Damocles - a sword more and more wielded by smaller if not equally irresponsible powers, and on the other, doomed to a slower but more inevitable extinction decreed by the unchecked contamination of natural resources.

Much has been made of the phenomenon of Youth - not long ago "Time" Magazine paid tribute to it by citing as its "Man of the Year" Youth under 21. That we have not learned how to best cultivate this potential source of human power was made drastically obvious at Kent States University last month. Here was the cry of "It's Not Fair!" at its most tragic pitch - echoing not only the sins of the fathers, but the ultimate irresponsibility of the sons and daughters as well. Yet that very scene marked a watershed for every student, parent of potential student, indeed for every thinking individual. For the cry, no matter how ridiculous or justified it may be, deserves an answer - before it becomes a clarion call between the generations - a veritable battle cry.

As it stands now, "IT'S NOT FAIR" cannot be accepted as a reasonable criterion for making protest and rebellion a way of life, unless inherent in that protest are well constructed designs for the future. You do not "shut down" a university randomly unless in that closing there is a vision of a more acceptable pattern of education. In effect, negativism is not a suitable *modus vivendi*.

Such, then, are the admonitions to youth - what therefore can you suggest to the older generation? Accept the idealism, not the negative frustration factor of their actions. Supply for the young people the maturity and responsibility for which they seek - tempered with enough understanding of the problems facing us all.

It is essential that those "over the hill" not allow themselves the liberty of becoming too smug and intransigent. And it is well to remember there is about as much wisdom and fairness in condemning the owner of a beard to radicalism as there is in assigning a narrow mind to an individual simply because he has chronologically met his thirtieth year.

The fact that "THE SCHWARZWÄLDER" is ceasing to exist in name only does not mean that we have no requirements for people to fulfill the many positions on a newspaper. In fact, the opposite is true. To staff the Baden portion of the new "KANADIER", many people will be required to fill vacancies left by those people going home, and to build up the existing staff even more so that the quality of the "KANADIER" will be the envy of service newspapers everywhere.

To do this, we need the same support that you, the members of 4 Wing, gave "THE SCHWARZWÄLDER". Positions are open for Sports Editor, Editorial Staff members, photographers, layout and advertising.

Feel free to drop in to "THE SCHWARZWÄLDER" office and see how the operation works. Help support the "KANADIER" - your new paper, which is planned to be the largest service paper in the Canadian Armed Forces.

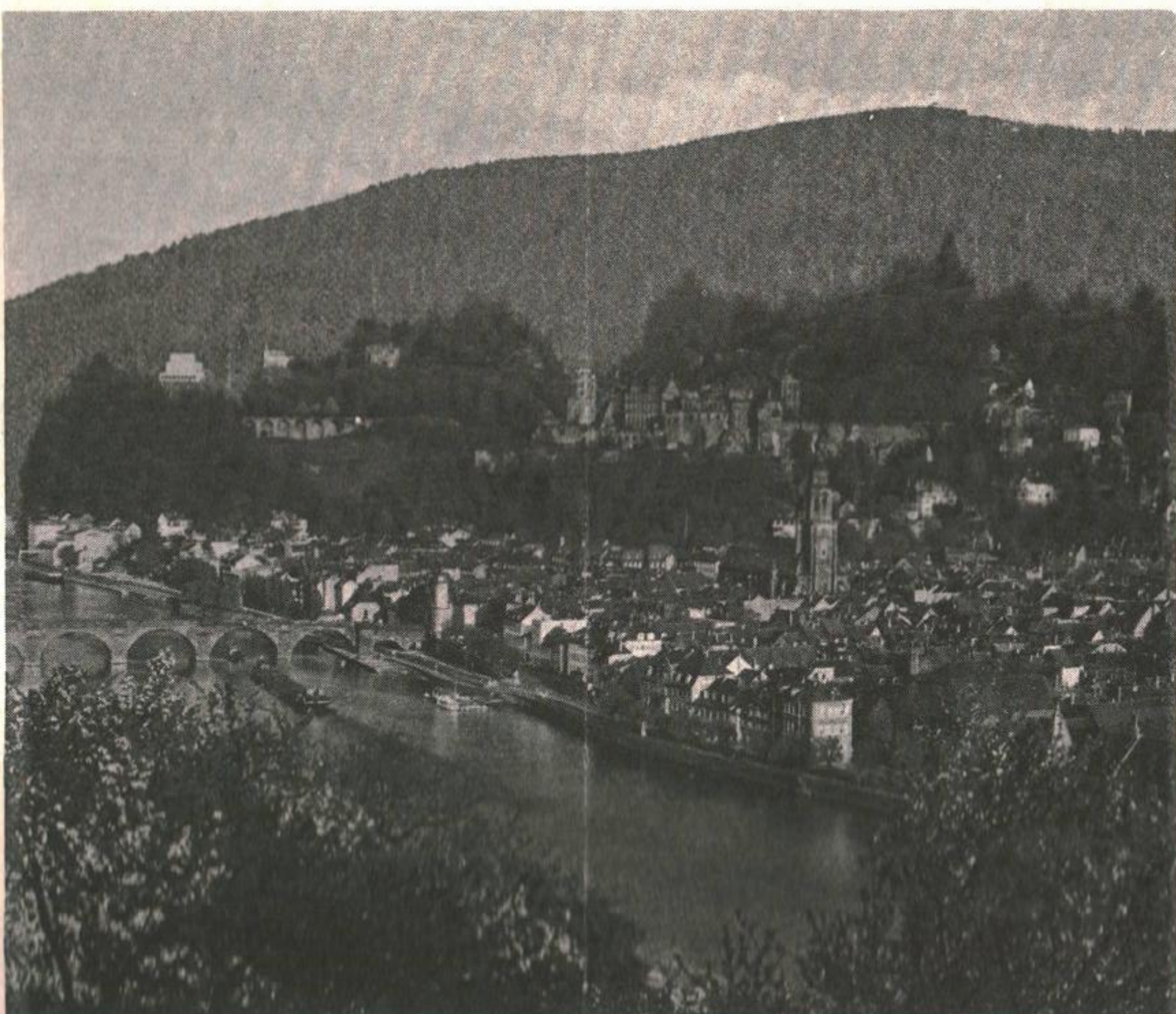
BACKYARD TRAVEL ADVENTURES

ONE DAY CAR TOURS FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY

Searching for something worthwhile and exciting to do or see during these getting - hotter Deutsch days? May we suggest a one-day trip to a nearby city, large enough to afford you a full day's interest and enjoyment?

Below we give you the choice of two cities of high interest in this vicinity of Germany. We do suggest that you not attempt both places in the same day. We



hope your visit will be rewardingly interesting.

HEIDELBERG

Population of 127,000. 74 KM (46 miles) from 4 Wing, via Autobahn (Karlsruhe)

Heidelberg, the oldest university town in Germany, has catered to educating youth from all over Germany, and the world, since 1386. Most of the original University buildings, or structural sections of them, still remain. Today, this combined old and

new city, situated along the peaceful Neckar River, is the headquarters of the United States Forces stationed in Germany.

From Heidelberg eastward, the Beautiful Neckar Valley is a gorge between high wooded hills on either side, providing some of the most romantic scenery in Germany, especially by moonlight. Maybe a sunset stroll could fit into your itinerary for the day?

SOME POINTS OF INTEREST IN HEIDELBERG CITY

a) Heidelberg Castle This is the most impressive structure of the old City - an example of 700 years of building, and rebuilding. Although the castle is essentially classified as a ruin today - owing to heavy destruction in the battles of the 17th century - there was originally so much of it that what is left remains exceedingly imposing, especially its architectural styles and adornments.

You can drive right up to the castle along the hairpin bends of the NeueSchlossstrasse. The castle gardens and courtyard are open all day, every day. Here an awesome and impressive view of both old and new Heidelberg city presents itself from the castle towers and ramparts. Guided tours of the castle: 8:30-12:30, and 1:30 -6:00 p.m. Charge, DM 1.50.

b) Grosses Fass (Great Vat, also called Heidelberg Tun) - in castle cellar.

This tremendous 49,000 gallon keg dates from the 18th century. Its enormity supports a platform where dancing and tasting can take place. While in this old wine cellar be sure to give greetings to Perkeo, the dwarf, once guardian of the huge vat, and today the symbol of Heidelberg. Also, your visit to the cellar can be coolly concluded by sampling a taste of the area wine, purchased in a tiny, insigniaed thimble-glass (DM 1:00) The glass is yours. to keep as a souvenir of your visit.

While at the castle, we do suggest you purchase a reasonably priced guide book and map of the grounds. It really helps.

c) Marktplatz - Old City This old market place, situated beside the Rathaus, houses market gardener's stalls on most days of the week. The sweet fragrance of freshness is worth the walk around this century-old platz.

d) Studentenkarzer (Student's Goal) - University Quarter.

The goal was the University of Heidelberg's disciplinary prison for uproarious and beligerent students. During their forced retirement here, the students carved inscriptions, coats of arms, and outlines upon the walls to commemorate their incarceration.

Also, in the Student Quarter, we suggest you stop off for coffee or tea at one of the numerous student inns located along the narrow streets of the old town. The walls of many of these inns are decorated with photographs and caricatures of past students and patrons.

e) Church of the Holy Spirit (Heilig-Geist Kirche)

Fine examples of Gothic architecture are displayed here for your interest.

SOME HELPFUL HINTS

Pack a lunch to eat on the neatly-barbered grass of the castle park grounds. And when you purchase your souvenirs, the shops at the foot of the castle area seem to have less expensive wares than the souvenir shops on the grounds themselves. We hope you enjoy your day in Heidelberg.

BADEN-BADEN

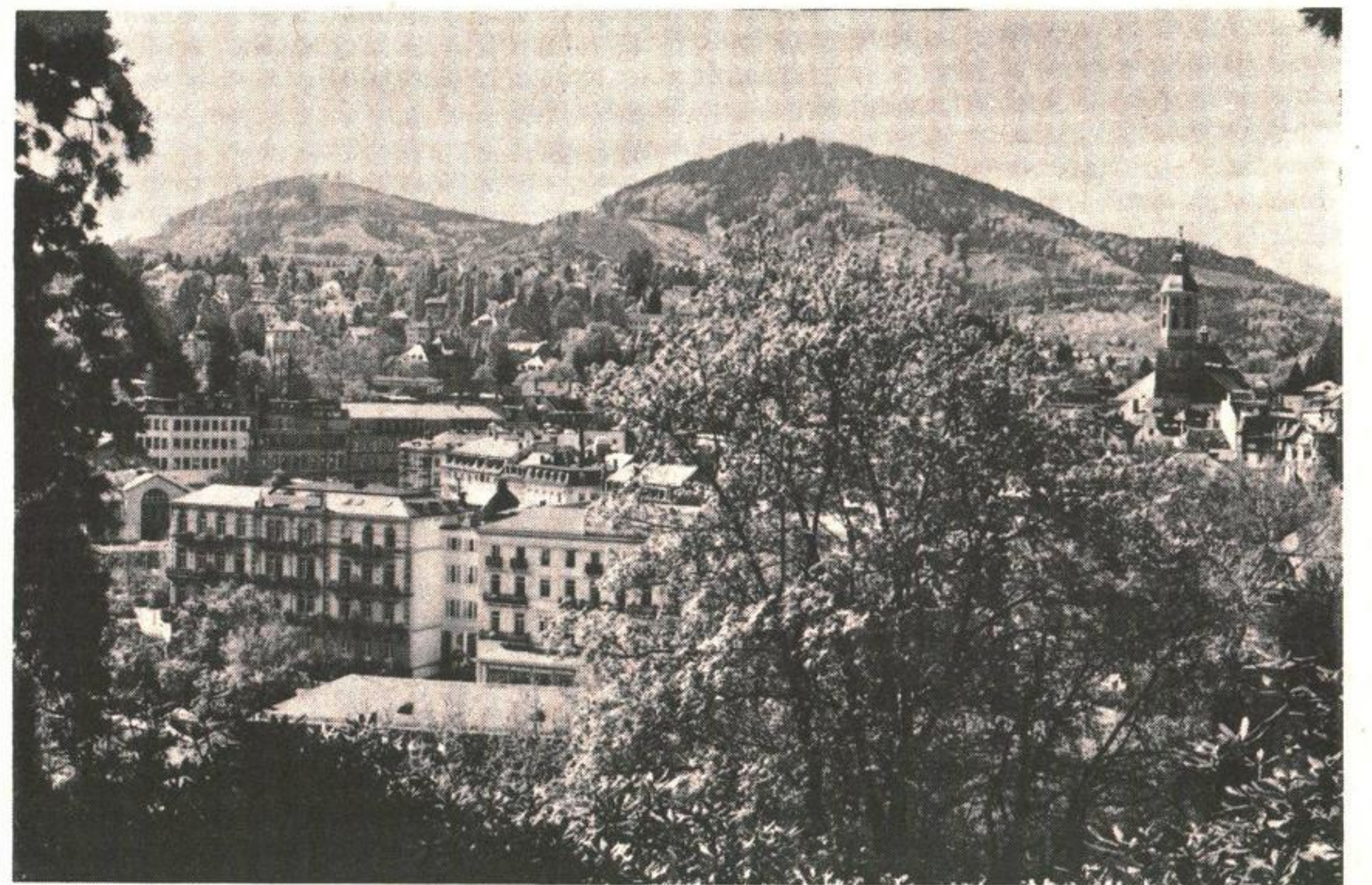
Population of 40,000. Five minutes drive from 4 Wing.

One of the most luxurious resorts in Germany, where people come to take life easy amid the pleasant surroundings of the parks and wooded avenues, lies in the sheltered area in the Valley of the Oos River (Hence, Baden-Oos). The last week in August is the busiest time for Baden-Baden owing to the attraction of the Iffezheim horseraces.

SOME POINTS OF INTEREST IN BADEN-BADEN

a) Kurhaus and Casino (see Schwarzwälder -Vol. II, No. 8

This magnificent structure of white stone, built in 1821, has welcomed kings, prime ministers, renowned men and women, and thousands of visitors and tourists since that date. In the gambling room of the Casino, one may witness the use of solid gold chips, evidencing the seriousness of the gambling done here. Guided tours are conducted each day (except Sundays and holidays)



from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m. Charge - DM .50. (Please keep in mind that men require a white shirt and tie to even enter the Casino of the Kurhaus.

b) Lichtentaler Allee

This is the most beautiful promenade in Baden-Baden, running alongside the River Oos. A swimming pool and lovely flowered park adorn the route of this peace-rendering path.

c) Neues Schloss (New Castle)

This 15th century fortress transformed into a Renaissance castle by Baden princess is today the Baden Historical Museum, housing notable paintings and a valuable collection of porcelain and china, besides the famous 15th century crucifix by Nikolaus von Leyden.

Tours are conducted each day (although closed on Mondays) 10:00 - 12:00 and 2:00 - 6:00. Cost: DM 1.50.

d) Roman Baths (Romische Badruinen)

The Romans started using the healing springs way back in their days of glory (you can still see the remains of their bathing establishments). There are radioactive, chloride, and hot springs, whose

waters one may drink, recline in, combine with soil for mud baths, or inhale (in the form of vapour), which all may be employed to treat, as one brochure explains, "diseases due to the strain of modern civilization".

You can visit the ruins beneath the Romerplatz from 9:00 til noon, and 2:30 until 5:00 p.m. Charge DM .30.

Also in Baden-Baden you can view a varied collection of churches - the Evangelical Church, the English Church, the Catholic Church, and the Russian Church.

Baden-Baden is not a typical sight-seeing city, as much as it is a rest and relaxation city, but it's well worth a visit...if only for peace of body and soul. We wish you a restful day while in Baden-Baden, city of the baths.

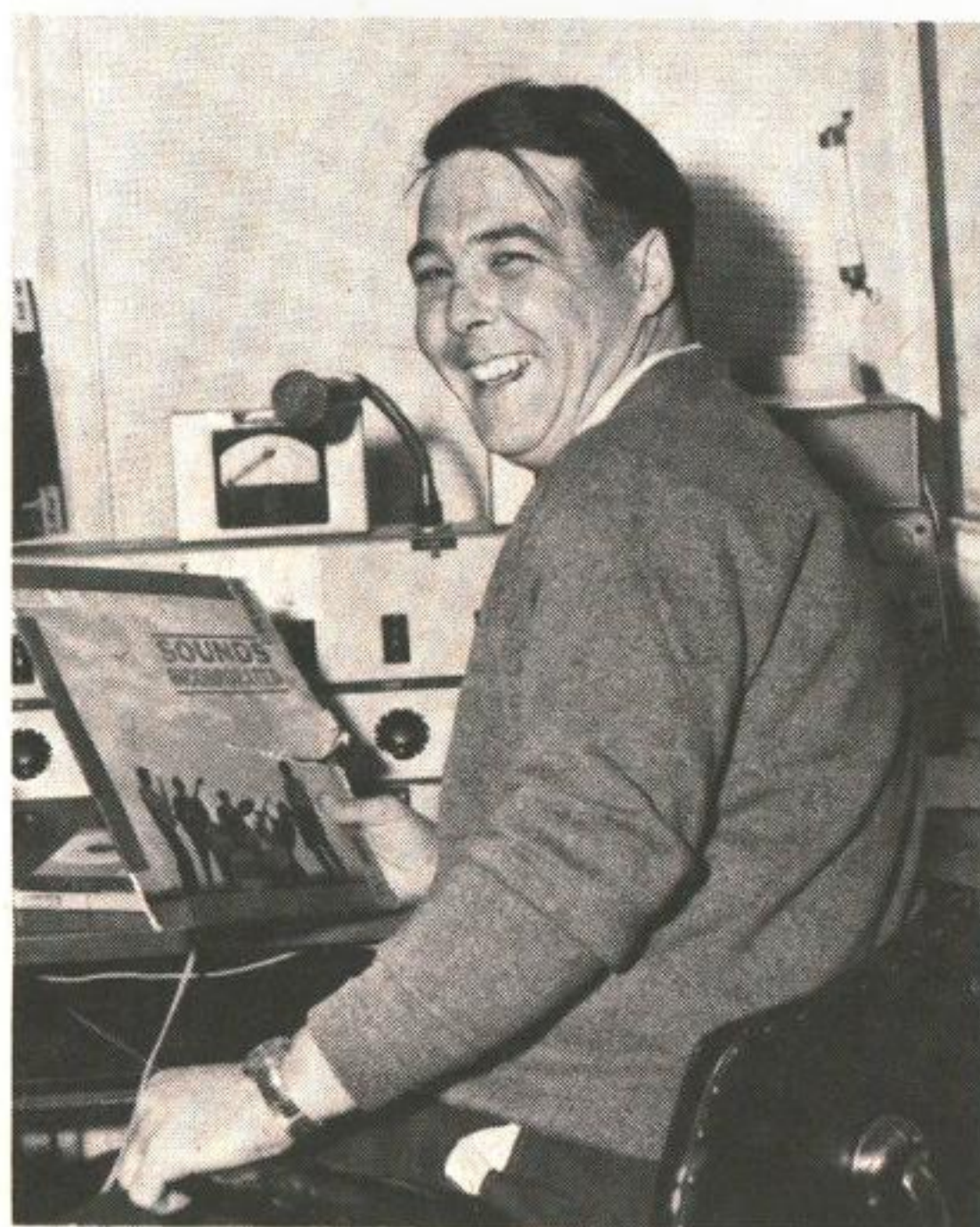

Although still quite a young man, Bob has already had a more eventful career than many servicemen experience in a lifetime.

By the time he joined the Air Force in July of 1959, Bob had already compiled an impressive six years in the Air Cadets and two more in the Reserves in his native Edmonton. Since that time his career has spanned four continents with postings to Uplands, St. Huberts, El Arish in Egypt, and a tour with the Zambian oil airlift in the Congo before arriving in Europe in October of 1967.



Bob made an abortive attempt to join the radio station a month after coming to 4 Wing, but for reasons that remain unclear, his application was neglected until October of the following year. This was a rather curious oversight considering Bob's background in Little Theatre at St. Hubert's and broadcasting at El Arish. In the latter case, the Announcing Staff had to improvise a program schedule with one tape deck, one turn table and one microphone in a rudimentary radio station whose signal barely reached the boundaries of the Camp.

However, after having finally joined the CFNS volunteer staff, Bob put in many hours of programming time covering the complete spectrum of musical styles. He will be mainly remembered as the longest-lasting host of Weekend World Part 6 - a gruelling (from the announcer's point of view) late night, four-hour shift at a time when the studio temperature frequently reached 100 degrees F.

Well travelled, Bob's next posting will take him to the one part of Canada he has not yet seen, the Maritimes. After repatting to Summerside he is undecided about aiming for more than amateur involvement in broadcasting, as well he might be after such an interesting service so far.

He therefore decided on a bold manoeuvre and sacrificed one of his certain Spade tricks. The opening lead was ducked in Dummy, and when East played the Queen of Spades Declarer followed with the 4 of Spades. East switched to the King of Hearts and Declarer won immediately with the Ace of Hearts and then played the Jack of Diamonds. West won with the King of Diamonds, and not unnaturally, convinced that his partner had the King of Spades, continued with the 5 of Spades.

Declarer continued the deception by winning with the Ace of Spades in Dummy and dropping the Jack of Spades from his own hand. A second round of Diamonds was led by Declarer and West won with the Ace of Diamonds and continued his Spade attack. But now Declarer was able to win with the King of Spades and claim the balance of the tricks.

For the FRAU

For those of you who have finally exhausted the budget for the next six Christmases with your twice daily dining at the local "Spargel Spots", here are a few suggestions as to how you can serve that delectable white vegetable at home. It would be good to remember that the recipe given below for Pfannkuchen may not turn out EXACTLY as does that served you at the Hügelsheim gasthauses, but we have utmost confidence in your ability to adapt the recipe to your own specifications. (Don't forget that the German brand of asparagus, unlike the variety you may be more familiar with from Canada, needs to be peeled of its hard layer of outer skin.)

PFANNKUCHEN

Combine and stir until smooth:

- 4 Beaten Egg Yolks
- 2 Tablespoons Cornstarch
- 1/4 cup of Lukewarm Milk
- 1/4 cup of Lukewarm Water
- 3/4 teaspoon of Salt
- 1 Tablespoon of Sugar
- Grated rind of 1 Lemon.

Beat until stiff:

- 4 to 5 Egg Whites.

Fold them into the yolk mixture. Melt in a heavy 10-inch skillet:

- 2 Tablespoons of Butter.

When the skillet is hot, pour in the pancake batter. Cook it over low to medium heat, partly covered with a lid, for about 5 minutes. Or the batter may be cooked until it begins to set, and then be placed in a pre-heated 400-degree oven until it is puffed and firm. Cooking time in all is about 7 minutes. It should puff up well, but it may fall. So serve it at once with:

Confectioners' sugar and cinnamon or lemon juice, covered with jam or jelly and rolled, or with wine, fruit or rum sauce.

ASPARAGUS SOUP

Wash and remove the tips from:

- 1 Pound of Fresh Asparagus.

Simmer the tips, covered, until they are tender in a small amount of milk or water. Cut the stalks into pieces and place them in a saucepan. Add:

- 6 Cups of Veal or Chicken Stock,
- 1/4 Cup of Chopped Onion
- 1/2 Cup of Chopped Celery.

Simmer these ingredients, covered, for about 1/2 hour. Rub them through a sieve. Melt:

- 2 Tablespoons of Butter.

Stir in, until blended:

- 3 Tablespoons of Flour.

Stir in, slowly:

- 1/2 Cup of Cream.

Add the asparagus stock. Heat the soup well in a double boiler. Add the asparagus tips. Season the soup immediately before serving with:

Salt, paprika and white pepper.

Garnish with:

A diced hard-cooked egg.

SPARGEL AND EGG SALAD

Chill in a dish:

- 2 Cups of cooked, well-drained asparagus, cut into pieces.
- 3 sliced hard-cooked eggs.
- 6 sliced, stuffed olives.

Wash, drain and place in refrigerator to crisp:

- 1 bunch of water cress
- 1 small head of lettuce.

When ready to serve, combine:

- 1/2 cup of cultured sour cream
- 2 teaspoons of grated onion or chopped chives,
- 2 tablespoons of lemon juice, caper liquor or vinegar,
- 1 1 teaspoon of salt.
- 1/4 teaspoon of paprika
- 1/16 teaspoon of curry powder (2 tablespoons of capers.)

Line a serving dish with the larger lettuce leaves. Break the rest into pieces. Add these to the asparagus mixture. Chop and add the water cress. Pour the dressing over these ingredients. Toss them lightly. Place them in the serving dish. Serve the salad at once, garnished with:

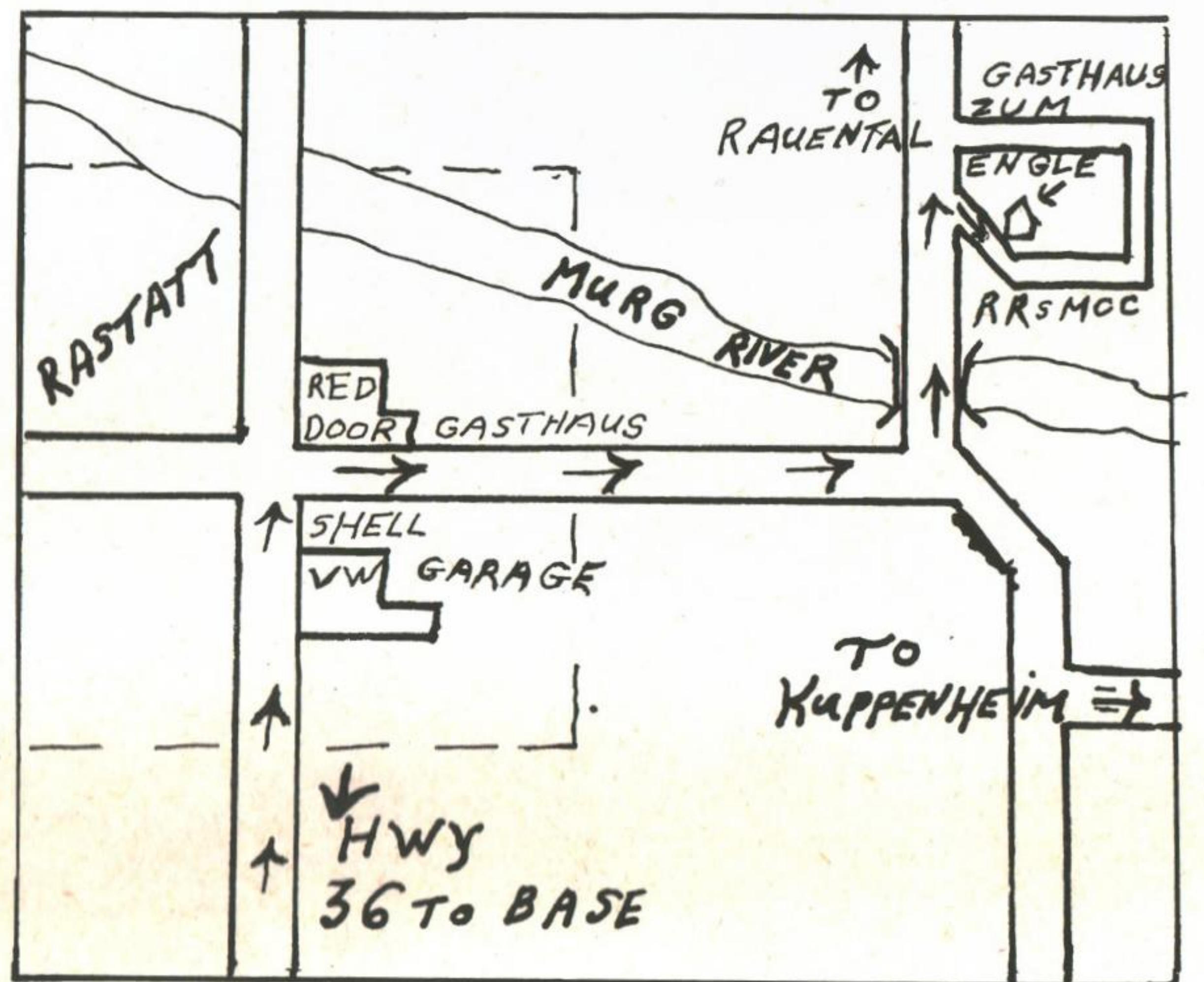


RHINE ROVERS

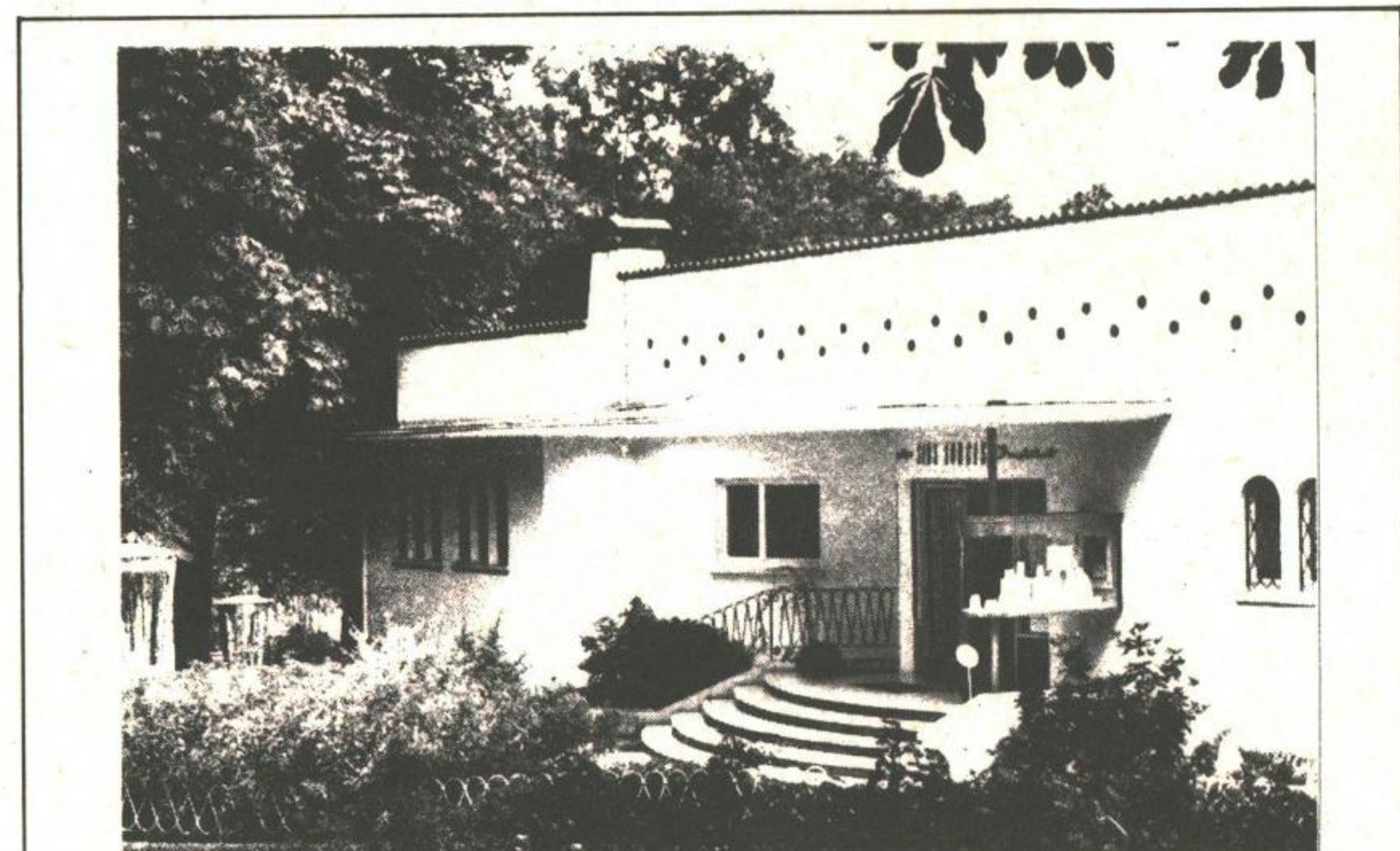

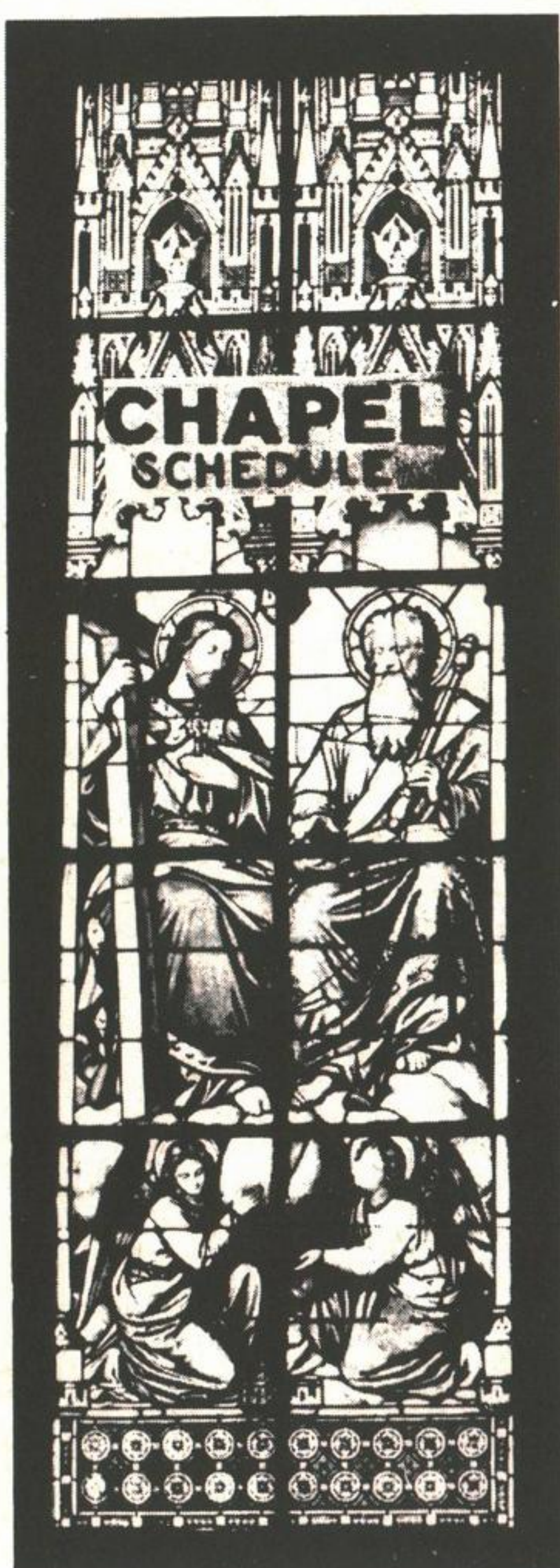
