FIRST AID FOR THE LADIES

In a recent issue of the Tribune we asked for volunteers for a ladies first aid course. A few names have been submitted but we feel that there may be others whose names we have not received as yet, possibly because of a forgetful husband or maybe because of the seasonal festivities.

The instruction will be given in the DND School by F/O Al Gunn, Sgt. Bev Pearson and Cpl. Lucky Harding. If you are interested and have not yet submitted your name please do so as soon as you can - we want to get the course underway as early as possible.

GAS STOVES AND OIL STOVES

All residents of FMQ's should be very careful with the handling of gas stoves. (a) Should the gas key be left open by accident do not light any matches or attempt to light the stove right away and the following safety precaution should be carried out: Shut off gas key and open at least two windows to let the gas fumes escape. A period of at least five to ten minutes should elapse before closing the windows. A good practice to take is to shut off the gas key near the gas meter. This way little hands, if they open the stove key as they often do, cannot cause gas to escape. (b) If your stove is leaking gas, report it to the housing officer without delay.

All residents of trailers should beware of oil stoves, when lighting. Should oil accumulate in the pot don't light it! Clean out the accumulated oil first, thus preventing an explosion.

HOUSING NEWS

WASHING MACHINES

Washing machines play a very important part in the regular everyday living in FMQ's. Maintenance has, with a few exceptions, been kept at a reasonably high level in the past few months. Your co-operation in observing the following requirements is necessary in order that these machines will continue to function satisfactorily:

- (a) If it is necessary to remove the strainer from the washing machine drain to clean, please replace it immediately. The maintenance man recently presented an assortment of coins, cuff links and other objects that had been found plugging the drain. This was caused by the strainers being removed and not replaced.
- (b) Ensure that the water is below the red level mark when tub is fully loaded. When water is over this mark it seeps down into the motor and we are then faced with a large repair bill and loss of a washing machine for a time.
- (c) Ensure that all clothes are removed from the machine and that washer and dryer are left clean and ready for the next user.
- (d) Do not overload the washing machine or the dryer.

I realize that several washing machines are out of order at the present time and efforts are being made to have these machines repaired as soon as money is available. Every month a total of \$550.00 is expended to maintain the FMQ washing and drying machines. When the repairs cost in excess of this amount it is necessary to wait for the next month before repair action can be taken.

DAMAGES

A recent survey in "B" Building indicated that 21 inter-connecting basement doors out of 26 are in need of repair or replacement. In "D" Block over a dozen outlet switches in the basement halls have been broken. The cost of all broken switches, doors, etc., that cannot be considered fair wear and tear must be paid for by the RCAF or individual(s) found responsible. Please advise Cpl. Hawkes or the Housing Officer if you have any evidence concerning vandalism of this kind.

WATER LEAKS

I know there are many water leaks in apartments after the heavy driving rains we have encountered. If your apartment is one of the unfortunate victims and you have not already submitted a requisition for work to cover repair of these leaks, please do so as soon as possible. SQUARE DANCE CLUB

TO ALL SQUARE DANCERS

With the Christmas and New Year's seasons past, no doubt a number of square dancers are looking forward to a continuation of activities.

In this connection, there has been and probably still is, some confusion and doubt as to what square dancing is. There is a vast difference between it, and what may be generally termed as "hoe-downs" or "barn-dancing". In this manner, a large number of people can participate whether or not they have had previous experience. It thus follows that the same patterns and dances are done, and little or nothing is done to advance the level of dancing. On the other hand, square dancing is made up of a number of basic geometrical movements - simple ones to start with, then as square dancers get more profficient, on to more advanced basics (e. g. allemande thar, triple allemande, wagon wheel, do paso, etc.) until sets are able to cope with the majority of dances. It is therefore the intention of this club to:

- 1) have fun during the square dance evening
- 2) illustrate and teach the basic movements of square dancing
- 3) standardize square dancing so that dancers may go to any club and be able to participate with a good degree of success.

REQUIREMENTS FOR A CLUB

In order that the club can operate, there are four requirements: They are - a suitable location, some music, a caller or instructor, and at least four couples for a set. We do not have a permanent location as yet - the most adequate to date has been the Kindergarten room at FMQ's. There is good possibility of obtaining it on a permanent basis, however attempts are being made to obtain a suitable room on the base. Live music is not a requirement - as a matter of fact in several aspects it is a detriment. Recorded music is available (both with and without calls) and cost is little, if any. In this regard the FMQ school site is much preferred as a good player is available there. A bigger problem we face is lack of a caller/instructor who has sufficient experience to teach square dancing from scratch. Anyone who is aware of one please contact one of the committee. In the meantime we can carry on at a more limited pace by having movements explained and by walking through called dances off records. Our biggest problem to date has been getting at least four couples (not 6 men and 2 gals or vice versa). On the last club night it was a quarter past ten before four couples were available. This is not good enough, and a club cannot operate in that fashion. Club nights were called for 2045 hours, and if people choose not to turn out, the club WILL have to cease functioning.

Thanks to WO Evans and his painters, the general purpose room in the small school received a much-needed paint job. It is certainly an improvement which is greatly appreciated. We are also indebted to WO Evans and his men for removing the false flooring in Room 14, which last year was the High School laboratory.

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"A" and "B" section volleyball with six teams in section will be played on Monday and Wednesday from 1800 hrs. on.

- (a) the point is decided;
- (b) a Fault, as hereinafter defined, is made; or
- (c) a Let, as hereinafter defined, occurs.

At the beginning of each game, and each time there is a new server, the ball shall be served from whichever service box the server elects and thereafter alternately until the service is lost or until the end of the game. If the server serves from the wrong box there shall be no penalty and the service shall count as if served from the correct box, provided, however, that if the receiver does not attempt to return the service, he may demand that it be served from the other box, or if before the receiver attempts to return the service, the referee calls a Let, as hereinafter defined, the Service shall be made from the other box.

The server, until the ball has left the racquet from the service, must stand with at least one foot on the floor within, and not touching the line surrounding the service box and serve the ball onto the front wall above the service line and below the 16' line before it touches any other part of the court, so that on its rebound (return) it first strikes the floor within, but not touching, the lines of the opposite service court, either before or after touching any other wall or walls within the court. A ball so served is a good service, otherwise it is a Fault.

If the first service is a Fault, the server shall serve again from the same side. If the server makes two consecutive Faults, he loses the point, A service called a Fault may not be played, but the receiver may volley any service which has struck the front wall in accordance with this rule.

3. Return of Service and Subsequent Play

- (a) To make a good return of a service or of a subsequent return the ball must be struck on the volley or before it has touched the floor twice, and reach the front wall on the fly above the tell-tale, and it may touch any wall or walls within the court before or after reaching the front wall. A return is deemed to be made at the instant the ball touches the racquet of the player making the return.
- (b) If the receiver fails to make a good return of a good service, the server wins the point. If the receiver makes a good return of service the players shall alternate making returns until one player fails to make a good return. The player failing to make a good return loses the point.
- (c) Until the ball has been touched or has hit the floor twice, it may be struck at any number of times.
- (d) If at any time the ball hits outside the playing surfaces of the court, which includes the ceiling and/or lights or hits a line marking the playing surfaces of the court (except on the first service, when it is one Fault), it is a point against the player so hitting the ball.

4. Score

Each point won by a player shall add one to his score.

5. Game

The player who first scores fifteen points wins the game excepting that:

- (a) At "Thirteen all" the player who has first reached the score of thirteen must elect one of the following before the next serve:
 - (1) Set to five points - making the game eighteen points
 - (2) Set to three points - making the game sixteen points
 - (3) No set, in which event the game remains fifteen points.

(b) At "fourteen all" provided the score has not been "thirteen all" the player who has first reached the score of "fourteen" must elect one of the following before the next serve.

- (1) Set to three - making the game seventeen points.
- (2) No set, in which event the game remains fifteen points.

6. Match

A match shall be best three out of five games

7. Keep out of opponent's way

Each player must get out of his opponent's way immediately after he has struck the ball and

- (a) Must give his opponent a fair view of the ball, provided, however, interference with his opponent's vision in following the flight of the ball is not a Let;
- (b) Must give his opponent a fair opportunity to get to and/or strike at the ball;
- (c) Must allow his opponent to play the ball from any part of the court; and
- (d) Must allow his opponent to play the ball to any part of the front wall or to either side wall near the front wall.

8. Ball in Play Touching Player

If a ball in play, after hitting the front wall, but before being returned again, shall touch either player, or anything he wears or carries (other than the racquet of the player who makes the return) the player so touched loses the point, except as provided in Rule 9 (b).

If a ball in play touches the person who last returned it or anything he wears or carries before it hits the front wall, the player so touched loses the point.

If a ball in play, after being struck on a return, hits the striker's opponent or anything he wears or carries before reaching the front wall:

- (a) The player who made the return shall lose the point if the return would not have been good.
- (b) The player who made the return shall win the point if the ball would have gone directly from the racquet of the player making the return to the front wall without first touching any other wall.
- (c) The point shall be replayed as a Let (See Rule 9) if the return except for such interference would have hit the front wall fairly and (1) would have touched some other wall before so hitting the front wall, or (2) has hit some other wall before hitting the striker's opponent.

When there is no referee, if the players are unable to agree whether the return would have been good or whether the ball would have gone directly to the front wall, the point should be replayed as a Let (see Rule 9).

In all cases covered by this Rule play shall cease even though the ball goes up.

9. Let

A Let is the stopping of play and the playing over of a point. On the replay of the point the server

- (1) is entitled to two serves even though a Fault was called on the original point;
- (2) must serve from the correct box even though he served from the wrong box on the original point; and
- (3) provided he is a new server, may serve from a service box other than the one he selected on the original point.

In addition to the Lets described in Rules No. 2 and No. 8 (c), the following are Lets if the striker could otherwise have made a good return;

- (a) When a player unavoidably violates Rule 7;
- (b) When owing to the position of the striker, his opponent is unable to avoid being touched by the ball;
- (c) When the striker refrains from striking at the ball because of a reasonable fear of injuring his opponent;
- (d) When the striker in the act of striking and before actually hitting the ball is touched by his opponent, his racquet or anything he may be wearing;
- (e) When on the first bounce from the floor the ball hits on/or above the six and one-half foot line on the back wall; and
- (f) When a ball in play breaks. If however, neither player has claimed the ball to be broken before the completion of the point, the point shall stand.

The referee may call a Let at any time for interference with play caused by any factor beyond the control of the players.

No Let shall be allowed on any stroke a player makes unless in the act of striking and before hitting the ball he touches or is touched by his opponent or his opponent's racquet.

If the referee fails to call a Let when in the opinion of a player he is entitled to a Let, such player may appeal to the referee whose decision shall be final.

10. Let Point

A Let Point is (1) unnecessary interference with one's opponent in his playing of a point and (2) unnecessary crowding as defined in Rule 7. Even though the opposing player is not actually prevented from reaching the ball or actually striking at it, the referee must call a Let Point. The player interfered with wins the point. If in the opinion of a player he is entitled to a Let Point, he should at once appeal to the referee whose decision shall be final.

11. Continuity of Play

Play shall be continuous from the first service of each game until the game is concluded. Between each game, play may be suspended by either player for a period not to exceed one minute, and between the third and fourth games play may be suspended by either player for a period not to exceed five minutes. Except during the five-minute period at the end of the third game, no player may leave the court without permission of the referee. The referee may suspend play for such period as he may consider necessary. If play is suspended by the referee because of an injury to one of the players, such player must resume play within one hour or default the match. The foregoing provisions shall be strictly construed. Play shall never be suspended to allow a player to recover his strength or his wind. The referee shall be the sole judge of intentional delay, and, after giving due warning, he must disqualify the offender.

In the event the referee suspends play other than for injury to a player and for some cause beyond the control of both players, such as the failure of the electric lighting system, play shall be resumed when the cause of such suspension of play has been eliminated, provided, however, if such cause of delay cannot be rectified within one hour, the match shall be postponed to such time as the Tournament Committee determines and the match shall be resumed from the point and game score existing at the time the match was stopped unless the referee and both players unanimously agree to play the entire match or any part of it over.

12. Condition of Ball

- (a) No ball, before or during a match may be artificially treated—that is, heated or chilled.
- (b) At any time, when not in actual play, another ball may be substituted by the mutual consent of the contestants or by decision of the referee.

(Cont'd)

13. Extra Equipment

No equipment of any sort shall be permitted to remain in the court during a match other than the ball used in play, the racquets used by the players, and the clothes worn by them. All other equipment, such as extra balls, extra racquets, sweaters when not being worn, towels, bathrobes, etc., must be left outside the court. A player who requires a towel or cloth to wipe his eyeglasses should keep same in his pocket or securely fastened to his belt or waist.

14. Referee

(a) Referee's decision on all questions shall be final. If the referee is in doubt under Rule No. 8 whether a return would have been poor or whether it would have hit the front wall fairly without first touching any other wall, he shall call a Let.
