HIGHLIGHTS OF COUNCIL MEETING 20 Oct. 58

F/O Tricker Representing the Housing administration, also attended.

The meeting was open for all to attend and only one member of the public was present.

The Mayor stated that he had some new ideas for use at the Bingos. It was also stated that it was necessary to appoint at least one or two Councillors to run the Bingos. Councillor Swan, who was absent due to DCCWO duties, has experience in this field and was appointed to run the Bingos.

Councillor Young stated that the problem of parking in front of "B" Block was becoming difficult and asked if yellow lines would be painted there at some future date. It was pointed out by Councillor Hawkes that lines had been painted in front of "F" and "G" Blocks when we ran out of paint. More paint might now be available and with the help of residents, lines could be painted shortly. Councillor Young also asked about the rear doors of "B" Block being locked. The Mayor pointed out that those doors are locked for the winter months to try and keep the lower apartments warm. The fitting of hydraulic door stoppers would be ideal but very expensive. At this point F/O Tricker pointed out that the sponsor's approval had to be obtained for any variations made to any part of PMQ. The Mayor added that two rear doors were being left open in "B" Block at the moment, at 5 and 11 entrances, respectively.

Councillor Manonsen had asked what happened about the chains for the apartment windows. It was stated that Air Division Headquarters has turned this

down owing to the cost. It was felt that each parent is responsible to ensure that his child did not climb up on the window ledges.

Councillor Wright asked if Fly Screens were to be provided for apartment windows. The Mayor explained that this matter had been gone into and was considered by AFHQ that our Fly problem was not great enough to justify the expense.

The Mayor suggested that each member of the Council should have a specific task within the Council. This was agreed and jobs would be allocated in due course as the need arose. At the moment, Councillor Cooper looked after the Hobby Shop in FMQ. Councillor Swan would look after the Binges. Finance was being handled by Councillor Hall and the works committee would be handled by Councillor Nelson. Councillor Donovan would assist him. Councillor Anonsen would handle public relations.

Councillor Anonsen asked about the Radio station, CFMY. It was stated that CFMY would be in action shortly. The problem of receiving the Station at P.M.Q. would be looked into by Councillor Anonsen.

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The Mayor stated that at an earlier meeting he had suggested that \$1.00 per month be deducted from each resident in P.M.Q. on a voluntary basis, in order that three French civilians could be employed by the Council to clean walls and keep the P.M.Q. area generally tidy. Councillor Anonsen stated that he would investigate the details with Councillor Hall. The idea being to present the deductions to all residents unless they refuse to pay.

There was a discussion on the cleaning of the hallways and whether the cleaners already employed by the sponsor could spend two days each week cleaning the walls in the entrance ways instead of sweeping down the stair wells. F/O Tricker stated that he would try and find out whether the sponsor would agree to this. The men employed by the Council could then be employed outside all the time.

Councillor Anonsen stated that he would find out from Telecom whether they could receive news daily from Canada for re-broadcasting by CFMY.

The Mayor mentioned that it had been suggested at an earlier meeting that the Council should provide prizes for the school. This had been agreed upon in

followed through without fail.

Meetings would be held on the second Monday in each Month in future at the small school. NB NEXT MEETING WILL BE 10th November.

There was a general complaint about overcrowding of the bus for the children's show on Saturdays. Several times it had been noticed that teenagers were trampling all over the smaller children to get on the bus and the fact that there was only one bus only made matters worse. It was decided that this matter would be looked into and see if it was possible to put on a second bus.

It was asked why a Mail box should not be installed at PMQ for the use by the residents. The Mayor stated that the Postal Corps had been approached about this some time ago and had put up various reasons for not installing one here. Councillor Hayden suggested that the matter could be handled very easily if the Postal Corps had two steel boxes which could be used as locked containers, the full one being replaced by the empty one each day and the container itself being placed inside a locked stand to which only the Postal Corps personnel has a key.

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WHAT'S NEW IN THE POOL

The fall and winter swimming program is in full swing, and has expanded considerably from last season. Applications for Red Cross courses were distributed to all school children, which resulted in the organisation of 3 junior 2 intermediate and 1 senior class. The children attending school at FMQ's have their classes Saturday mornings, and the children in the Base school are accommodated after school hours. These classes are fully subscribed to and we regret that anyone who failed to register will have to wait until other classes are formed.

This station is fortunate in having an excellent staff of qualified volunteer red cross instructors who donate a lot of their time to swimming instruction. The beginners classes for children operate Saturday mornings and have an enrolment of approx. 200. Fortunately, however, there isn't full attendance each time since there is neither pool space nor time to handle many more than 100 beginners. Since last June, close to 250 children have been awarded the Safe Swimmer Crests. Most of whom have learned to swim here at Marville.

The adult classes are running every Monday night, Men's at 1900 hrs and women at 2000 hrs. The staff welcomes anyone, from the person nervous in a bath tub, to the one wanting Royal Life Saving Instruction.

LESSON No. 2 - Keeping up appearances with a Charge Account.

Having embarked upon Lesson 1 (which means that you have committed a good chunk of your future earnings to the furniture dealers) don't be prepared to make sacrifices in other things. If, for example, the wife's coat is a little shabby, don't try to make it do. This could conceivably lead the neighbours to think that you are "feeling the pinch". The answer: Open a Charge Account! After all, you will have made a few payments on the furniture now so you can give referances. Yes sir! You have established a credit rating. (See note below)

Once the charge account has been opened, it is quite easy to keep adding other household articles or wearing apparel - and even the odd small appliances. Moreover, you will probably find that you don't have to pay the total bill the store sends you at the end of the month. Try paying half of the amount due. Chances are the store won't bother you as long as you make reasonable payments. Incidentally, if you happen to notice that a small interest charge has been added to the monthly account, don't worry. You will find that the store policy is to charge 5 or 6 per cent (some cases higher) on overdue accounts. But what is a few more dollars? After all, most businesses operate on overdrafts and credit extensions. Why not introduce a few of these "business principles" into your household management.

NOTE: It is common fallacy that the only way to establish a credit rating is to buy on credit and keep up your payments. Admittedly this is one way but it can also be done by keeping out of debt until you have to use credit. Visit your credit bureau some time and ask the manager!
