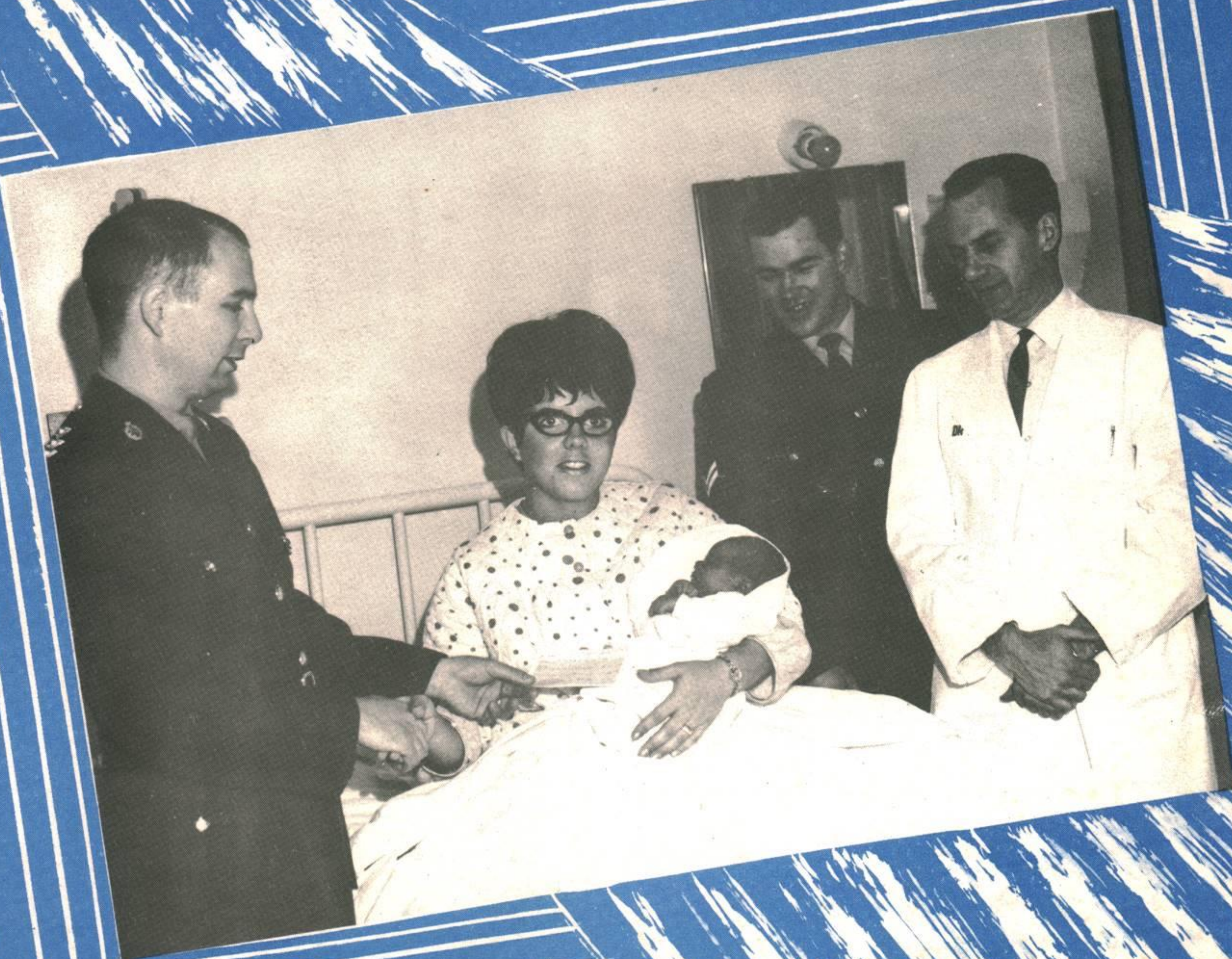

CANADIAN ARMED FORCES RADIO SCRIPT NEWS BY THE CANADIAN PRESS.

SUMMERSIDE, PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND -- PREMIER ALEX CAMPBELL OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND SPENT A DAY IN HOSPITAL IN SUMMERSIDE, PEI, FOR TREATMENT OF A DISLOCATED SHOULDER, RECEIVED IN A MOTORIZED TOBOGGAN ACCIDENT. THE PREMIER WAS RELEASED FROM HOSPITAL LATE MONDAY. HE WAS ADMITTED SUNDAY AFTER THE ACCIDENT, NEAR HIS SUMMER COTTAGE AT SHIRLEY BRIDGE ABOUT 20 MILES EAST OF SUMMERSIDE.

MONTREALS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN SAYS THE CITYS CONTINUING WAVE OF BOMBINGS IS THE PRODUCT OF A TIME WHEN PRESSURE GROUPS CARE ONLY ABOUT THEIR OWN ENDS. ANDCIEN SAULNIER WARNS THEM THE BOMBINGS COULD HARM QUEBEC'S ECONOMY BY SCARING AWAY INVESTORS. ABOUT 50 BOMBS EXPLODED OR WERE DISMANTLED IN THE MONTREAL AREA LAST YEAR, . . . MOST LINKED TO LABOR DISPUTES. MR SAULNIER SAID THAT POLICE ARE MAKING HEADWAY IN THEIR INVESTIGATION AND HE APPEALED TO CITIZENS WITH ANY INFLUENCE TO ASSIST AUTHORITIES.

MONTREAL -- AN ANONYMOUS BOMB THREAT HAS FORCED THE EVACUATION OF A DEPARTMENT STORE IN A WEST-END MONTREAL SHOPPING PLAZA. A SPOKESMAN FOR THE MIRACLE MART STORE AT THE ALEXIS NIHON SHOPPING PLAZA SAID THAT THOUGH THE STORE WAS "QUITE FULL" OF WEEKEND SHOPPERS SATURDAY, THE EVACUATION WAS WITHOUT INCIDENT. POLICE AND FIREMEN SEARCHED THE BUILDING FOR 30 MINUTES BUT FOUND NO BOMB. LATE LAST YEAR, SOME FIVE THOUSAND PEOPLE WERE EVACUATED FROM THE SAME SHOPPING PLAZA FOLLOWING A SIMILAR THREAT.

A SUSPECTED BOMB, REMOVED FROM AN EAST-END OTTAWA MAILBOX SATURDAY HAS TURNED OUT TO BE A FAKE. THE PACKAGE RESEMBLED MAILBOX BOMBS DISCOVERED IN OTTAWA LAST THURSDAY. HOWEVER IT CONTAINED NO EXPLOSIVES, ONLY BATTERIES WIRES AND OTHER JUNK MATERIAL. AN ARMED FORCES BOMB DISPOSAL EXPERT REMOVED THE HARMLESS DEVICE FROM THE MAILBOX. THREE UNEXPLODED BOMBS HAVE BEEN FOUND IN OTTAWA MAILBOXES.

IN PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. MR AND MRS SAMUEL CAMPBELL WERE SENT TO JAIL FOR NINE MONTHS FOR CHILD ABANDONMENT. THE COUPLE WAS FOUND IN A BEER PARLOR LAST MONTH AFTER THEIR TWO CHILDREN DIED IN A HOUSE FIRE. AND IN CALGARY, MR AND MRS JULIOUS MARTIZ WERE REMANDED TO JANUARY 17TH ON A CHARGE OF MANSLAUGHTER AND TWO OF CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE. ONE OF THEIR THREE TEENAGE DAUGHTERS DIED OF PNEUMONIA LAST NOVEMBER AND THE OTHER TWO GIRLS HAD TO BE TREATED FOR MALNUTRITION AND BRUISES.

CANADA'S OPEN DOOR FOR CZECH REFUGEES CLOSES ONE WEEK TODAY. AFTER THAT, CZECHS WISHING TO COME TO CANADA WILL HAVE TO WAIT IN LINE WITH OTHER WOULD-BE IMMIGRANTS. THE SPEEDED-UP PROCEDURES FOR CZECH REFUGEES HAVE HELPED NINE THOUSAND OR MORE COME TO CANADA SINCE CZECHOSLOVAKIA WAS INVADDED BY WARSAW PACT POWERS LAST AUGUST. MOST HAVE BEEN HELPED WITH TRANSPORTATION LOANS, PLUS GRANTS FOR LANGUAGE AND OTHER COURSES AND PAYMENTS TO TIDE THEM OVER UNTIL THEY FOUND JOBS. THE COST TO CANADA WILL BE BETWEEN EIGHT AND TEN MILLION DOLLARS.

OTTAWA-PROVINCIAL POLICE IN OTTAWA ARE LOOKING FOR THREE MEN IN THEIR EARLY 20'S AND A LATE-MODEL GREEN OR LIGHT BLUE CAR -- IN CONNECTION WITH FRIDAY'S DOUBLE-SLAYING OF TWO MEN NEAR CARP ONTARIO. POLICE SAID SUNDAY THE VICTIMS, 31-YEAR-OLD GERALD MACDONALD OF OTTAWA AND 42-YEAR-OLD KENNETH VALLEE OF MICHIGAN, WERE SLAIN WITH A .22-CALIBRE WEAPON. PREVIOUS REPORTS SAID THE VICTIMS SUFFERED WOUNDS FROM SHOTGUN PELLETS AS WELL. BOTH MEN WERE GUNNED DOWN ON A REMOTE HIGHWAY NEAR CARP, 25 MILES WEST OF OTTAWA, AS THEY WERE FLAGGED DOWN BY THREE MEN IN A CAR. THE WIVES OF THE MEN, WHO DROVE SEPARATE AUTOMOBILES, WERE UNHARMED. THE WEAPON USED IN THE DOUBLE MURDER IS BELIEVED TO BE A CUT-DOWN .22-AUTOMATIC RIFLE. THE WANTED CAR WAS DESCRIBED AS A GREEN, OR LIGHT BLUE PONTIAC OR CHEVROLET IMPALA. THE THREE MEN WERE BELIEVED WEARING SKI-JACKETS OR WIND-BREAKERS.

PREMIER JOSEPH SMALLWOOD OF NEWFOUNDLAND DESCRIBED PIERRE TRUDEAU'S RISE TO BE PRIME MINISTER AS "DIVINELY INSPIRED". THE PREMIER MADE THE STATEMENT DURING AN INTERVIEW BY A PANEL OF STUDENTS AT ST JOHNS. MR SMALLWOOD LABELLED MR TRUDEAU AS "THE MOST BRILLIANT PUBLIC MIND IN CANADA AND A FRENCH-CANADIAN WHICH CANADA NEEDED FOR PRIME MINISTER IN THIS PERIOD." THE PREMIER WAS ALSO ASKED ABOUT HIS SCHEDULED RETIREMENT THIS YEAR. HE SAID NO INDIVIDUAL CAN PERSUADE HIM NOT TO RESIGN. HOWEVER HE SAID ANY STRONG INDICATION THE PROVINCES LIBERAL PARTY MIGHT FALL INTO "WRONG HANDS" COULD CAUSE HIM TO BE A CANDIDATE AT A LEADERSHIP CONVENTION, EXPECTED IN SEP.

WHAT EVA RITTINGHAUSEN MIGHT TERM A LOVERS QUARREL CONTINUES IN LONDON... WITH ADDITIONAL DIALOGUE FROM CANADA. MISS RITTINGHAUSEN IS THE CANADIAN-BORN GERMAN DIVORCEE WHO LUNCHEDED WITH PIERRE TRUDEAU IN THE BRITISH CAPITAL, THEN TOLD NEWSMEN SHE AND THE CANADIAN PRIME MINISTER WERE IN LOVE. AND DESPITE A CURT TRUDEAU PUT-DOWN AT A NEWS CONFERENCE. SHE SAID TODAY THERES STILL A SLIGHT POSSIBILITY OF ANOTHER ENCOUNTER. BUT PIERRE SAID IT ISNT SO. HE TOLD NEWSMEN HIS PERSONAL FRIENDS DO NOT TALK ABOUT HIM IN PUBLIC, THEN ADDED: "IF THEY DO THEY ARE NOT FRIENDS, BUT PASSING ACQUAINTANCES." IN NOVA SCOTIA, MISS RITTINGHAUSENS HALF-BROTHER, WALTER SCHAAD, DECLINED COMMENT ON THE AFFAIR. BUT ANOTHER BROTHER IN VANCOUVER, HERMAN SCHAAD, CALLED HIS JET-SETTING SISTER INDESCREET. HE SAID HER PARENTS WILL BE FURIOUS WITH HER FOR PULLING ... WHAT SCHAAD CALLED "A STUNT LIKE THIS."

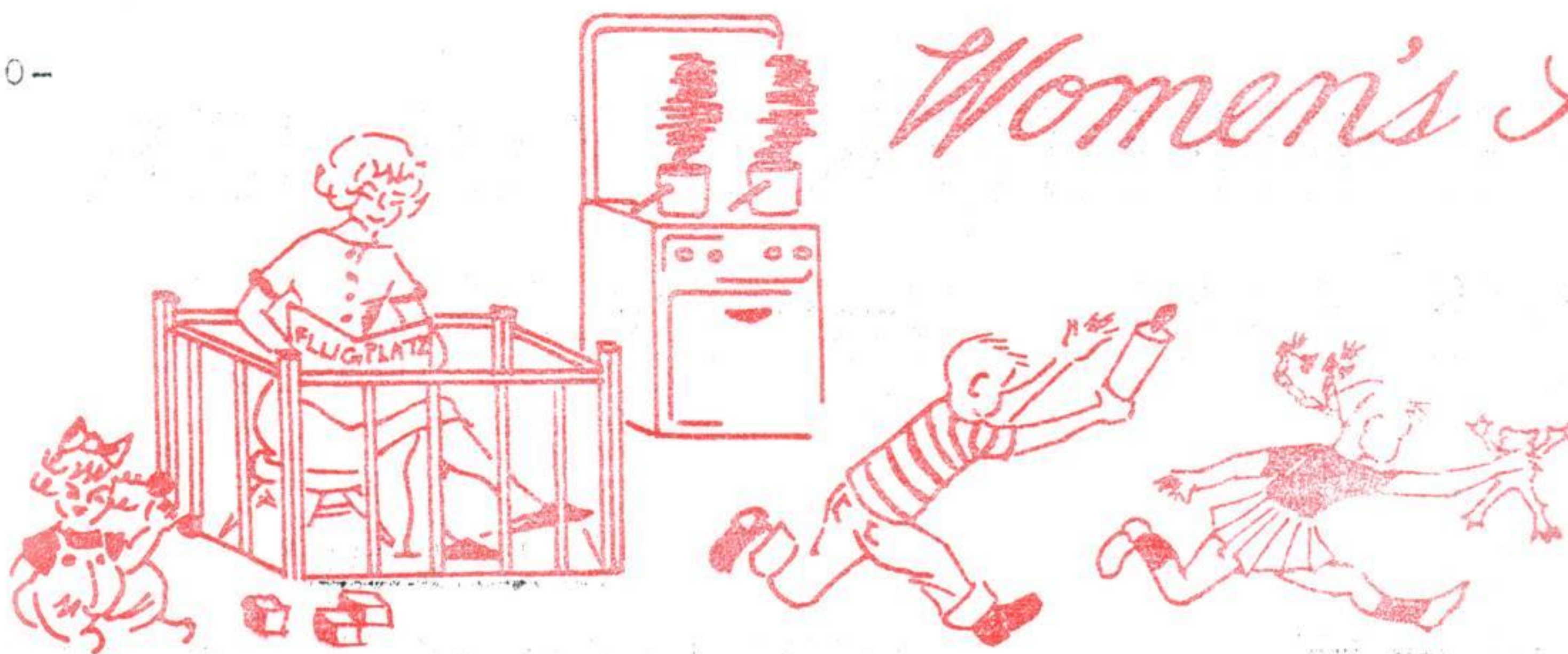

ALL-AT-ONCE SPAGHETTI

Everything cooks, all in one pan, in this revolutionary recipe. Your meat, your sauce and your spaghetti! And the flavour is real, homemade, Italian style....just try it!

|--------------------------|---------------------------|
| 1 tablespoon cooking oil | 2.8 oz. cans tomato sauce |
| 1 large onion, chopped | 1-1/2 cups water |
| 1/2 lb ground chuck | 1/2 lb uncooked spaghetti |
| 1-1/2 teaspoon salt | (half an 8 oz. pkg) |
| Pepper to taste | Grated Cheese |

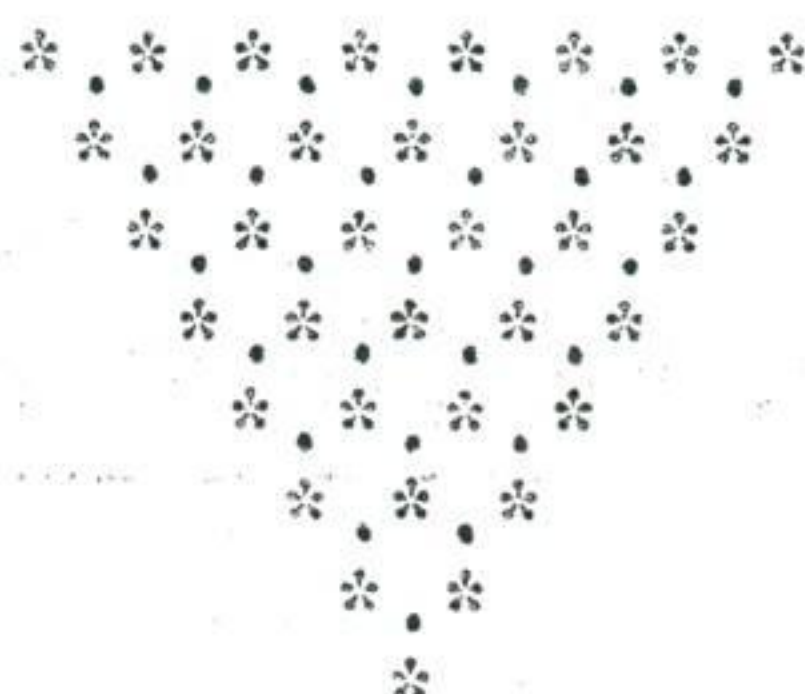
Heat oil in saucepan or skillet. Add onion and cook until soft. Crumble in the beef. Stir and fry until meat loses red colour. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Pour in tomato sauce and water, and bring to a boil. Break spaghetti in half; sprinkle in a little at a time, stirring it into the sauce and keeping it separated. Cover tightly and simmer 20 to 30 minutes. Stir once toward end of cooking time. Serve with cheese. Makes 3 to 4 servings.

You can double or even triple this recipe if you have a large enough pan. Perfect for potluck suppers, buffets, spur-of-the moment entertaining. Keeps well, carries well; and heats up like a dream.

HANDY HINTS

Baked potatoes get done faster if set on end in a muffin tin, and a single reach removes all the potatoes at once.

For that special cake for your child's birthday or party try this: Press an animal cookie cutter lightly into the icing, then fill in the outline with tinted icing in the child's favorite colour.

Average: 7-1/2 minutes!

At the moment I have been waiting 14:30 minutes and still no operator.

One wonders what would be the result if I were calling for the Fire Department, an ambulance or the police!

Is there an answer?

Dear Mrs Helmkey,

Ya gotta be kiddin' Mary; 14-1/2 minutes you sat listening to a phone ring somewhere in the distant beyond and still no answer? Are you positive you dialled "3135" on this particular occasion, and on the other occasions from which your average times were computed? The answer must be "yes"; you check in through the Wing switchboard a dozen times daily.

The veiled question you are really asking is, "Are Wing switchboard operators on duty at all times during business hours?" The answer is an unqualified "yes". There is always one operator working the 'board during business hours. She is relieved during her lunch hour by another operator, assisted if necessary by service personnel from the Telephone Maintenance and Communication Centre staffs.

That point is now clarified. Why then do you wait an average 7-1/2 minutes for an answer to your calls? Be rest assured the operator must not be receiving an indication from the switchboard light-buzzer system that you have placed a call; otherwise, she would go out of her ever lovin' skull listening to an average 7-1/2 minutes of buzzing.

The answer lies within the seemingly obscure, misty realm of telephone technology. Occasions will arise on dialling one of our four dial trunk numbers from a city Zweibruecken number such as yours, when a call will wend its way through the Bundespost telephone equipment at the Hauptpostamt, up through the lines to the Wing, into the automatic equipment located on the Wing, become emmeshed in an equipment operating aberration enroute, and never appear as a "buzz" at the switchboard - yet the person making the call hears the distant end ringing, sometimes, for 14-1/2 minutes. Under circumstances such as this, a caller could hold the phone until his body ossified, and still receive no answer.

"What to do now?" you ask. Here's a clue. Dial 3135 initially; if no answer, dial 3136; if still no answer, dial 3137; if still, still no answer dial 3138; if still, still, still no answer, pop into your car, drive over to the Wing and have a coffee with your client.

Incidentally keep the telephone numbers of the city Zweibruecken fire, ambulance and police services handy, also brush up on your knowledge of Deutsch because these are the people you will call when necessary - and you can dial them directly from your trailer. 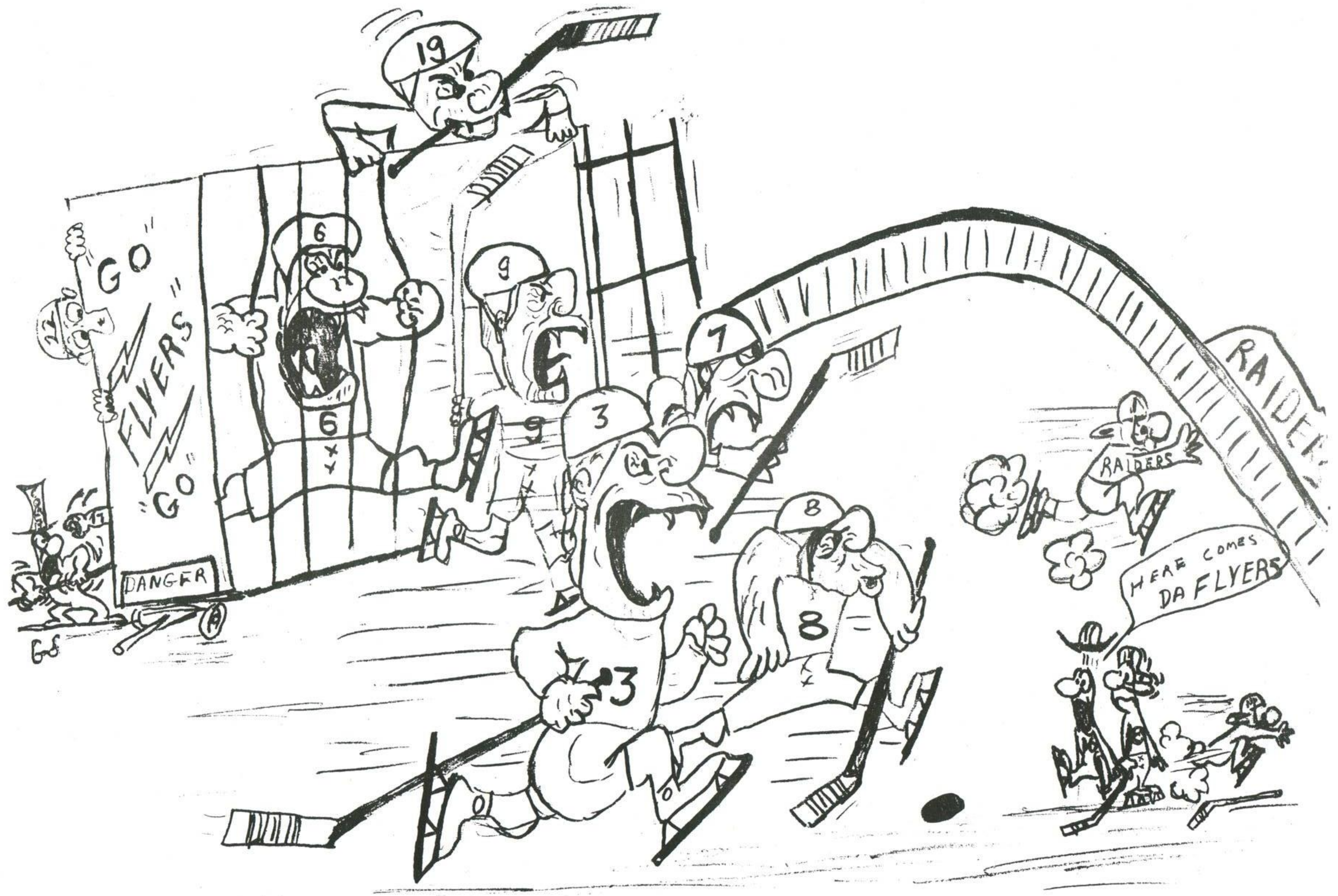

COMMEMORATIVE RECORDING OF 3 WING
