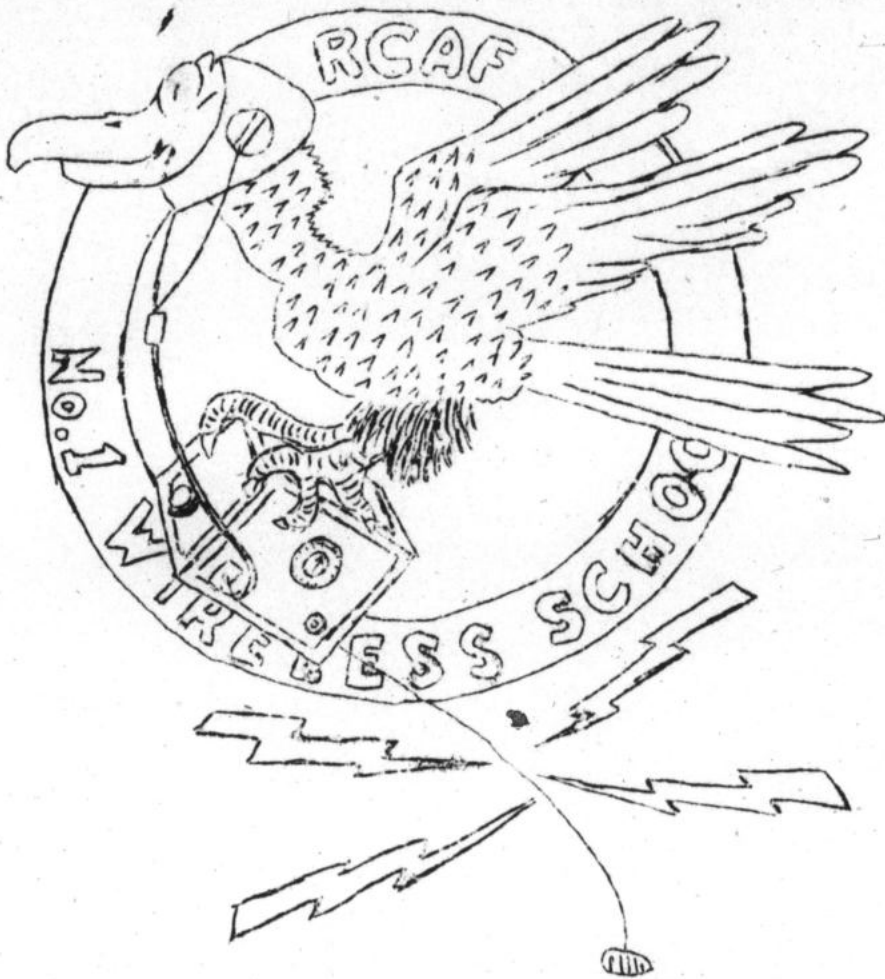

Editorials.

Sgt. Payne, former W.A.G. at #1 Wireless School had quite some difficulty on his course, particularly in Morse, but with a lot of drive in applying himself to this subject he was able to master it. He was one of the best students on procedure, and it was because he knew his procedure that he was able to pass through out-stations. We reprint herewith a letter received by F/L Walmsley from Sgt. Payne.

Sir:

As a former W.A.G. at #1 Wireless School, I am taking the liberty of writing you in the hope that possibly some of the information I pass on to you may be of interest to you in Montreal.

Upon landing in Scotland, we were sent to the R.A.F. overseas pool at Uxbridge, and in the course of a few days, we were granted seven days landing leave.

When our leave expired, we were posted out, in small drafts of seven or eight men, to the various operational training Units, we were given an eight weeks course on W/T and gunnery. Half of the day for the first two weeks is given over to signals and the other half to gunnery. From then on, we fly daily, till the end of the eight week at which time we are posted to the Operational Squadrons.

It is a fact, that Dominion Airmen are very well treated in the R.A.F., but for the information of any W.A.G.'s who are interested, the standard needed by the R.A.F. is definitely high, and since I was once upon a time, a pupil at #1 Wireless School, I believe I can safely suggest that his own sake, no W.A.G. will make any mistake by trying his very best to obtain a Morse speed of twenty words a minute, and to really know how to operate his G.P.I. Failure to do so, even though he is graduated from #1 Wireless School, will result in bitter misgivings when he has almost reached his goal over here. To illustrate the need of understanding the G.P.I. - one of the tests in Air Operations is to change frequency seven times. Back tuning, is of course, paramount.

To all W.A.G.'s, I would say - Reach a speed of 20 w.p.m. Know your "Trans-Receiver" and when you go to a Bombing and Gunnery School, concentrate on the power driven gun turret - and all the long boring months of training will be well repaid when you get here.

And to those W.A.G.'s who doubt that there are commissions for them, if they warrant them - I can truthfully say - there ARE commissions.

bombshell referred to above.

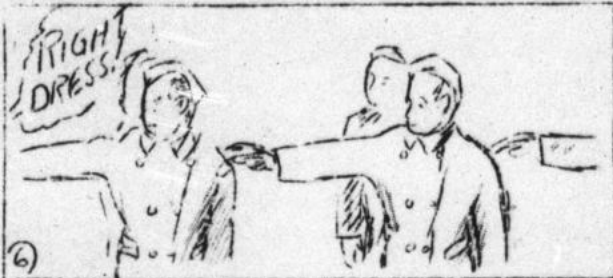
These concerts are greatly appreciated by

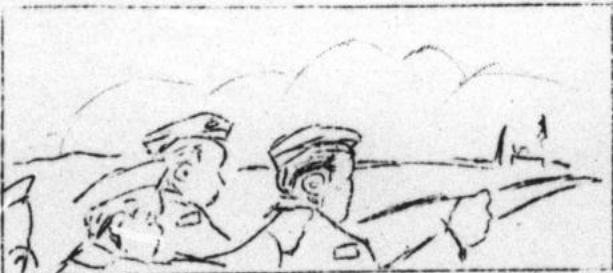
DAY STARTS AT 0630 HRS.

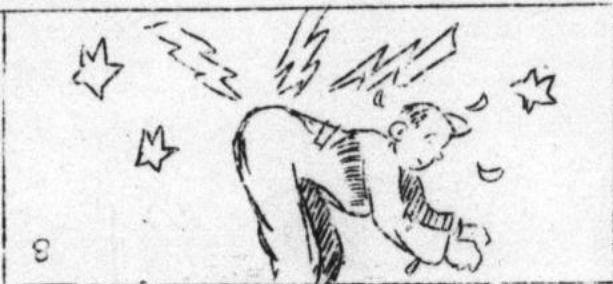

AUSSIES AND NEWSIES HOLD ANZAC SERVICES!

On Thursday last, the 24th, members of the Royal Australian and New Zealand Air Force here commemorated Anzac Day to coincide with the holding of services in Australia and New Zealand on the 25th of April.

The parade was commanded by S/L W.K. Lawson, Liaison Officer from Ottawa. F/L M.G. Grant, chaplain of the School conducted the service. S/L J.H. Norton, M.C., D.F.C. represented Command H.C.

Unfortunately the weather was not at its best but nevertheless the parade was extremely successful.

Route taken was west along Sherbrooke St. to Pool and thence to the Cenotaph where a short service was held and wreaths placed in memory of those men who lost their lives in the Battle of Gallipoli on April 25th, 1915.
