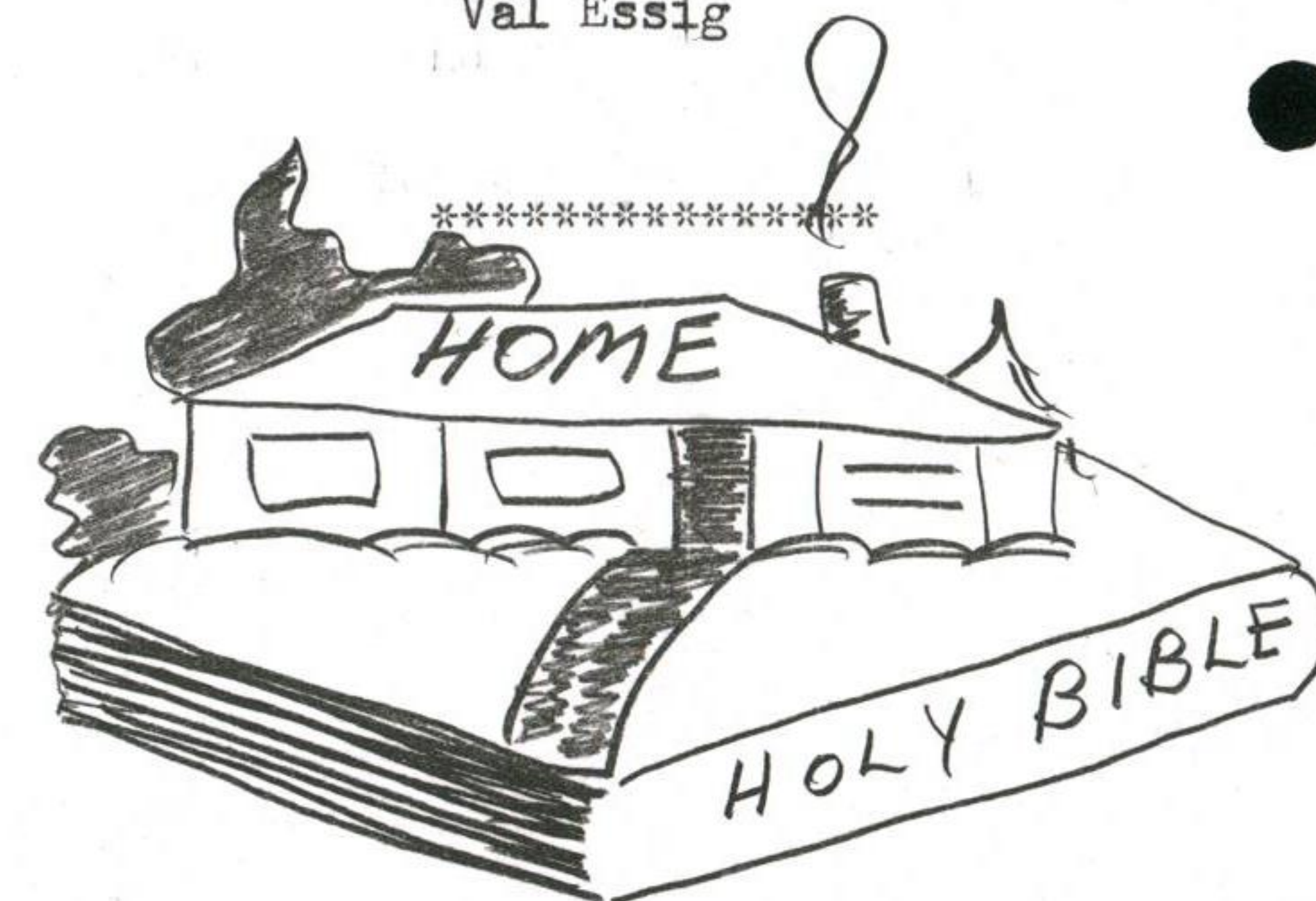

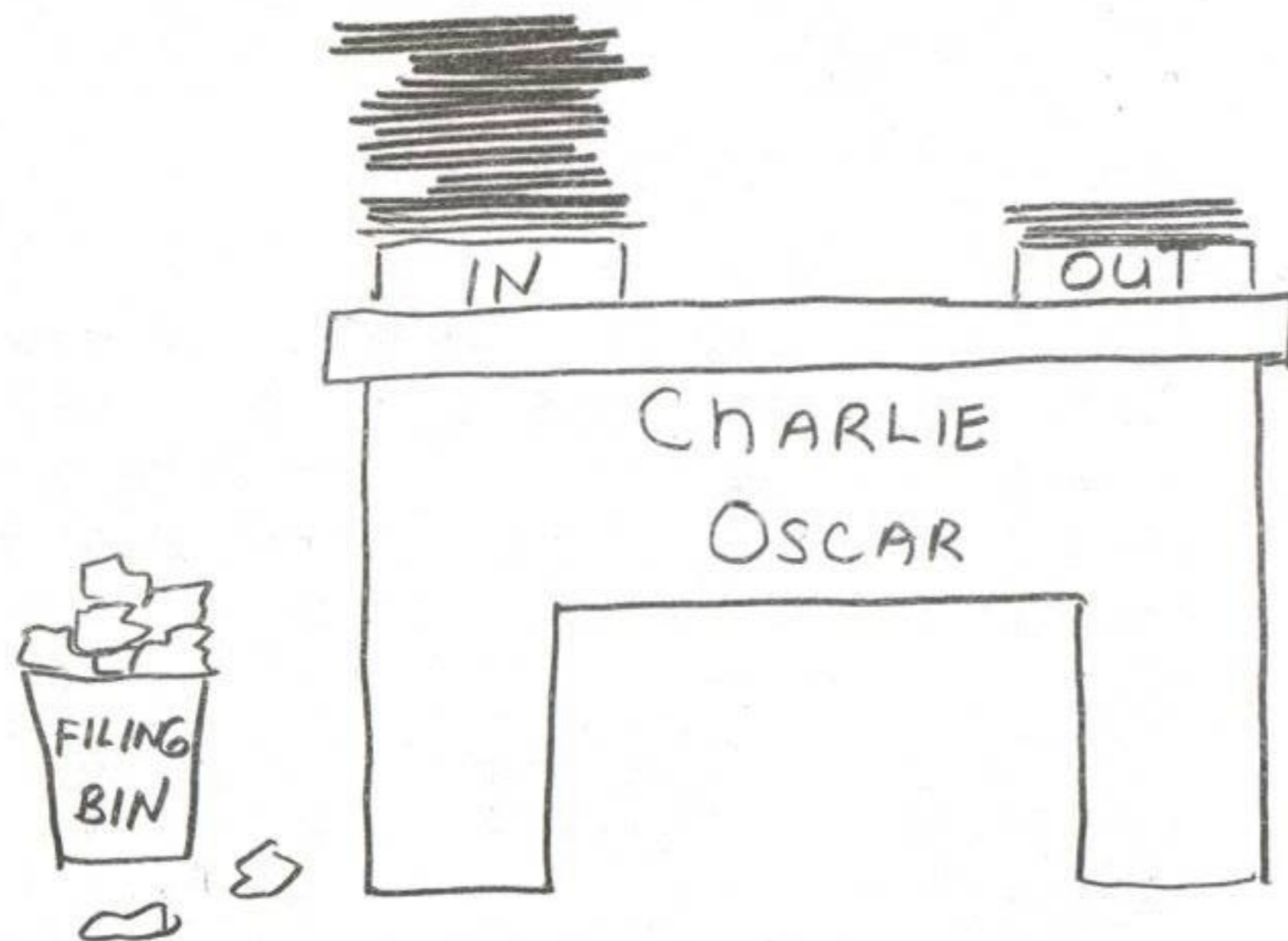

ALSASK AND DISTRICT RESIDENT - DONOR'S CHOICE

At one time, a group of local canvassers met and decided to conduct a once a year canvas for funds to meet the requirements of various charitable organizations. It has been decided to continue this practice and this year the campaign will be conducted during early November. Once again the fund drive will be known as The Alsask and District Donor's Choice.

The advantages of a single drive to you, the contributor, are that it eliminates the bother of answering your door a great many times during the year and enables you to plan exactly what your charitable donation for the year will be.

LET'S WE FORGET...From The Toronto Sun.

Until relatively recently, school kids would rise from their desks at precisely 11 a/m. on November 11 and, amid rustles and sniggers, try to maintain two minutes of respectful silence for the dead of wars they didn't understand. Now they have a full holiday instead, while teachers sleep in. It rather exemplifies the decline of tradition.

This Remembrance Day it is not the dead of past wars that need mourning for, but living servicemen of today who are steadily being demolished and destroyed - not by a foreign enemy, but by their own government which has contempt for things military.

The military, in other words, is fighting for its life. And all professional soldiers and militia know it.

The ones who seem most oblivious and uncaring are Defence Minister James Richardson, the Winnipeg broker whom Trudeau has chosen to administer the coup de grace, and Trudeau himself who, from his record, despises the military. ("An Imperialist war" he once gave as a reason for ducking World War II).

Richardson now talks blithely of a 50,000 man military - which is already 4,000 men below its 83,000 establishment, which in turn is down from its previous 100,000 strength, which was down from 120,000.

Our weaponry is obsolete; recruitment can't keep pace with members resigning or retiring. After eight years of abuse, morale is breaking, spirits flagging.

Our forces will shrink to the point where

changing the guard on Parliament Hill in tourist season is Canada's main military role.

The Canadian military has always served its military. We have no power - hungry Pentagon; no military-industrial complex, no military lobby. Our military has been peace-seeking, very professional and utterly loyal. The government, in its way, is committing treason, weakening our country.

This Remembrance Day let's have concern for living soldiers. They are the ones under fire while the dead lie in peace and honorable sleep.

OTTAWA: A Mo-Ped sits in the window of a bank in downtown Ottawa and a sign on the seat states that it may be purchased for "X" number of dollars per month. This scene is repeated in financial institutions throughout our fair land, only the articles may be cars, boats or whatever.

Now we know that the financial institution does not sell Mo-Peds but it will gladly lend the money so that Canadians can buy houses, cars, household appliances, furnishings, clothing and even knick-knacks. Why, you can even take your vacation on the instalment plan, and should you wish, you can even borrow to pay educational costs.

So you ask: What else is new! Credit is our way of life and as long as there are massive advertising campaigns telling us to buy more and more, over-indebtedness will be a fact of life for many Canadians.

I would venture to say that there can be little doubt that debt as a way of life is so deeply entrenched in our economic system that there is no possibility of a return to the att-

itudes and practices of 50 years ago. In fact if we tried to turn back the clock there would be the danger of an economic turn-down, based upon any marked reduction in the use of credit.

So, whether we like it or not, credit, which is just an imposter word for debt, poses a problem for many of us today.

Now let us take a look at what happens when credit gets into arrears and the creditors start to bear down. Some people will yield to the blandishments of financial institutions to get a "billpayer loan," or what is commonly known as a consolidation - of-debts loan.

In theory, a person will borrow enough money from one creditor to pay off all outstanding debts and then he only has one payment to make. These people have the idea that they can "borrow" their way out of dept which of course is a mathematical impossibility. What they are doing is merely trading creditors and when the consolidation has taken place they owe just as much money, and over the term of the loan can sometimes pay a great deal more in interest.

Unfortunately, when they have only one bill to pay it is not long before they start looking around for other avenues of credit to explore. Their conscience is quite clear; they only have one debt now, and after all, they really need that new snowmobile or color TV.

So take a tip from the Old Dapper and watch consolidation loans very carefully. If you find yourself over extended credit-wise, seek advice from your Base, Station or Unit Financial Counsellor before committing yourself to a consolidation loan.

Then, if your circumstances suggest that a consolidation loan would be beneficial, make sure you are disciplined to pay off that loan before considering any other credit transaction.

She is having difficulty in keeping from spending all her money on "fantastic buys", especially on leather goods. It's a good place to buy shoes, ladies.

Brazil's streets (in cities) are filled with hundreds of Volkswagens, and the entertainment she receives from watching them perform their intricate weaving at rush hour is as good as any T.V. Show. "Any minute, I expect to see a 50 car pile up. Instead of the R.C.M.P. musical ride, we have the A.B.C.D. (Amazing Brazillian Car Drivers) musical ride complete with an accompaniment of the horn section". The police cars are black Volkswagens, but they don't bother to chase the offender-just take the licence no. and fine through the mail. By the way, gas is over \$1.00 per gallon.

P O K I N G A R O U N D E U R O P E W I T H M O R R I S A N D P E GPart four of a six part series

On Saturday, April 5th, we joined a bus load of fellow Canadians and departed from Lahr for the 12 hour ride to Vienna, Austria, via Stuttgart and Munich. The scenery en route was varied and all beautiful. Gone were the Black Forest type of farm home, now the farm house and farm buildings seemed to form a compact square - all very neat and tidy. Our hotel was in downtown Vienna with the stores very handy for an evening walk and "window shopping".

Next day was a busy one - sightseeing with an excellent guide, Frau Panich, who really knew her Austrian history. We saw fabulous treasures dating back to the Holy Roman Empire (about year 962) - bejewelled crowns, regalia of the Order of the Golden Fleece, robes and dresses embroidered with hundreds of pearls - and that mean't real pearls! In the museum of Fine Arts, the many rooms hold priceless paintings. We were not permitted to take our cameras on the tour. Each room had a television camera high in the ceiling and if a person got too close to any picture, a voice would boom out a warning. One lady removed her coat and was promptly asked to put it back on - the reasoning behind this being that she might manage to smuggle out a smaller painting under the coat.

The Vienna Boys Choir were singing Mass at Burg Chapel. We were able to hear them but only saw them on a TV in an ante room of the church.

We lunched in the shadow of the giant Ferris Wheel filmed in the show "The Third Man". We crossed the Danube River (Vienna is on the Danube Canal) on our way out to the Vienna Woods which form a semi-circle around the city. We encountered a dust storm on route. It horrified our guide who said she had never seen it happen before. We thought for a moment we were back in Saskatchewan! The gusts of wind took out windshields on a couple of cars. We journeyed through the woods, passing through a tiny portion of Liechtenstein, a small principality, with about six policemen who are also the customs officers, etc. We could see the castle where the Royal Family actually do reside. We stopped at a Monastery at Heiligenkreuz which dates back to 1100. "The Tragedy

of Mayerling" is the story of an heir to the Austrian throne who, together with his mistress, was found dead in the summer home at Mayerling. Now, a Convent, with a very beautiful chapel, is built over the site of the tragedy.

A tree branch hanging over the sign of a Winery indicates that the new season's wine is available and when we went to the Crinzig Wine Village that evening, it was the new wine we sampled. The wine must have been good - the combination of wine and musicians soon found the Canadian group in fine voice. The somewhat startled waitresses soon decided they may as well join the fun and a good time was had by all. Throughout all this, three Viennese men sat at a nearby table engrossed in serious conversation-their powers of concentration must be much better than mine!

The Schoenbrun Palace was on our tour program next day. Pure gold decorates some of the ornate rooms and they are filled with treasures from the past and from many different countries. Large, ornate porcelain stoves were built into the corners of each room. Some of the beautiful rooms are still used to entertain Austria's visiting dignitaries.

St. Stephen's Cathedral, the Imperial Vaults, were on our program and each had something of special interest. Vienna is famous for some very special china - someone in the group priced a demi-tasse - one cost \$80.00! And, of course, Johanne Strauss and other famous musicians are honoured with statues and plaques to commemorate where they lived and worked.

While visiting the Stables of the Lippizianie Horses, we learnt that it sometimes takes several years for them to become white enough (they are born dark) to commence training to perform. In order to see a performance, one had to book a long time ahead.

That evening we chose to dine at the Rathauskeller - a huge complex in the basement of the Rathaus (Town building). The room in which we dined had a five man orchestra who played beautiful Viennese music or whatever request was made to them as they moved from table to table.

Declining dessert here, we walked to the Hotel Sacha for coffee and Sacha Torte. The Sacha Torte originated in this Hotel and they are proud of the fact that they can send it anywhere. I have a recipe so must try my luck some time.

Time to leave Vienna. We had an early start so that we could have a two hour lunch break in Salzburg. It is a beautiful place! It nestles below the Alps, has a fascinating old city across the river and, of course, castles, including the one filmed in "The Sound of Music". Our homeward journey through the Austrian and German Alps let us see Hitler's Eagle-nest at Berchtesgarden - perched high on a peak - a snowy one at that time.

It was raining when we reached Lahr but next day the sun was shining and we could enjoy being "home" again with Chuck and Sheila. During this period we visited the Richdales and Liz Duffin in the small town where they enjoy living "on the economy."

The night of the 11th saw us leaving Lahr for our 14 hour train journey to Rome. Sheila was with us on this venture. Going through the St. Gottard Pass was obviously slow - but one could see the exceptionally heavy snowfall that had been contended with and it was still snowing. Daylight and the Italian scene - passed through Milan this time and on to Florence - beautiful countryside in this area. As we journeyed on it was interesting to note the ancient cities built high on the hills and each with a protective wall. Vineyards were on every available piece of land with the hillside terraced - many back-breaking hours must have been used up at some point in time.

We had decided not to allow any Italian at the station to guide us to a hotel, so we successfully made our way through them and in a safe spot, so we thought, stopped to look at our book. From nowhere, it seemed, an "Official Hotel Guide" arrived, complete with badge and book. So once again we fell for it and were transported to hotel on the Via Nationale. Really nothing wrong with the hotel except higher priced than one was lead to believe and on arrival, they said they accept-

ed American Express - on departure, they ~~did not!!!~~ Just little things!!!

The entrance to the hotel was directly from the very busy Via Nationale, through an enormous door which was closed on Sundays and at night. Then, one would have to ring a bell, be identified and then a small door in the big door would open. Once inside, you found yourself in an imposingly large area and from here an elevator took you to the -fourth floor and here was your hotel !!! Keys are the large old fashioned type and the ones used by the hotels have an equally enormous and heavy piece of paraphernalia attached. Obviously, this deters guests from accidentally departing with keys in pocket - but - it still can happen. Guess who left with one????

There is so much to see in Rome, the Coliseum, ruins of the ancient temples, the famous fountains, the churches. Some we explored by ourselves - others on a guided tour. The large building on the Via Nationale now an art museum was of special interest to us as during World War Two, it was used as a rest centre for Canadian soldiers on leave and Morris was among the many who stayed there. We liked Rome - a noisy city though. Everyone seems to lean on their car horn and police and ambulance sirens are the noisiest I have ever heard. Since it is illegal in West Germany to sound a horn unless it is an emergency, it was even more noticeable. Plans to shop for gloves and shoes had to be rescheduled a couple of times until we realized that Rome and Naples still have their siesta - stores are closed from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. That makes for four rush hours too!!! Speaking of shoes, we found that it was indeed necessary to wear comfortable ones if intending to walk from St. Peter's Basilica to see the Sistine Chapel!!! One has to walk around the perimeter of the Vatican City and then through the many rooms and halls, each with objects of interest both old and modern, until finally one enters the Chapel, where silence is requested, and seats are placed around the wall. 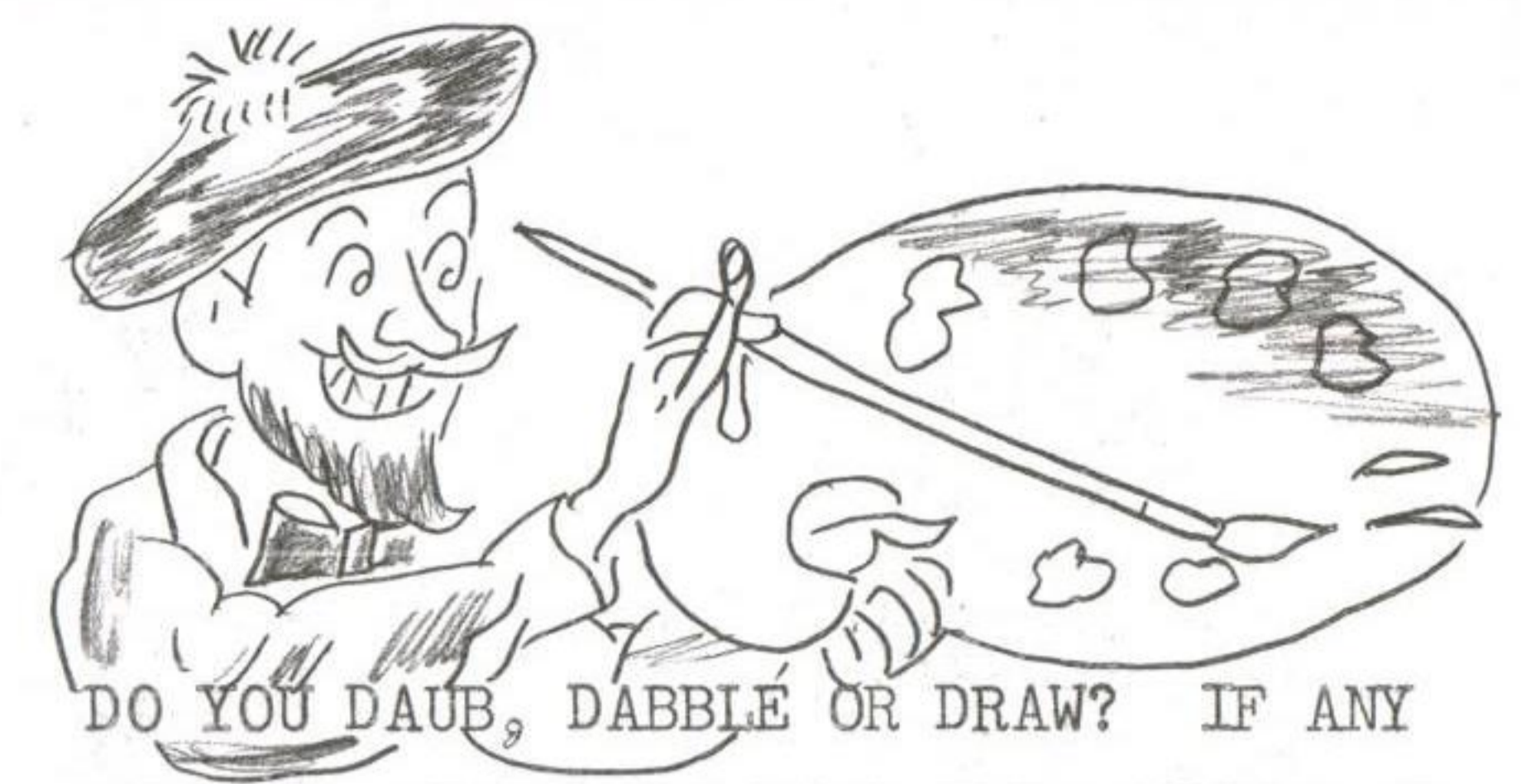

The Brownies will be having their Halloween Party on the 29th of October and will be having their first enrollment for the year sometime in November.

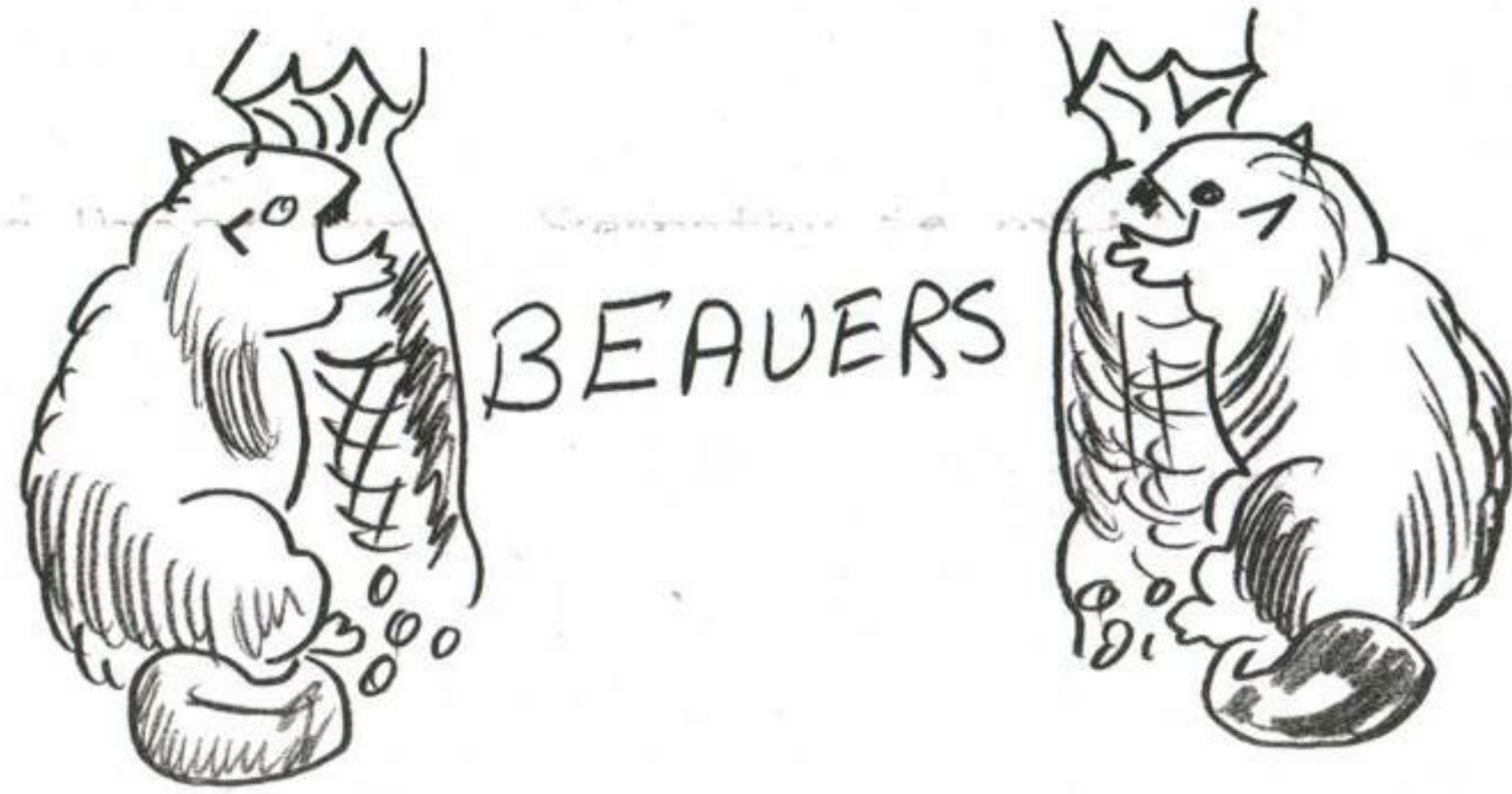

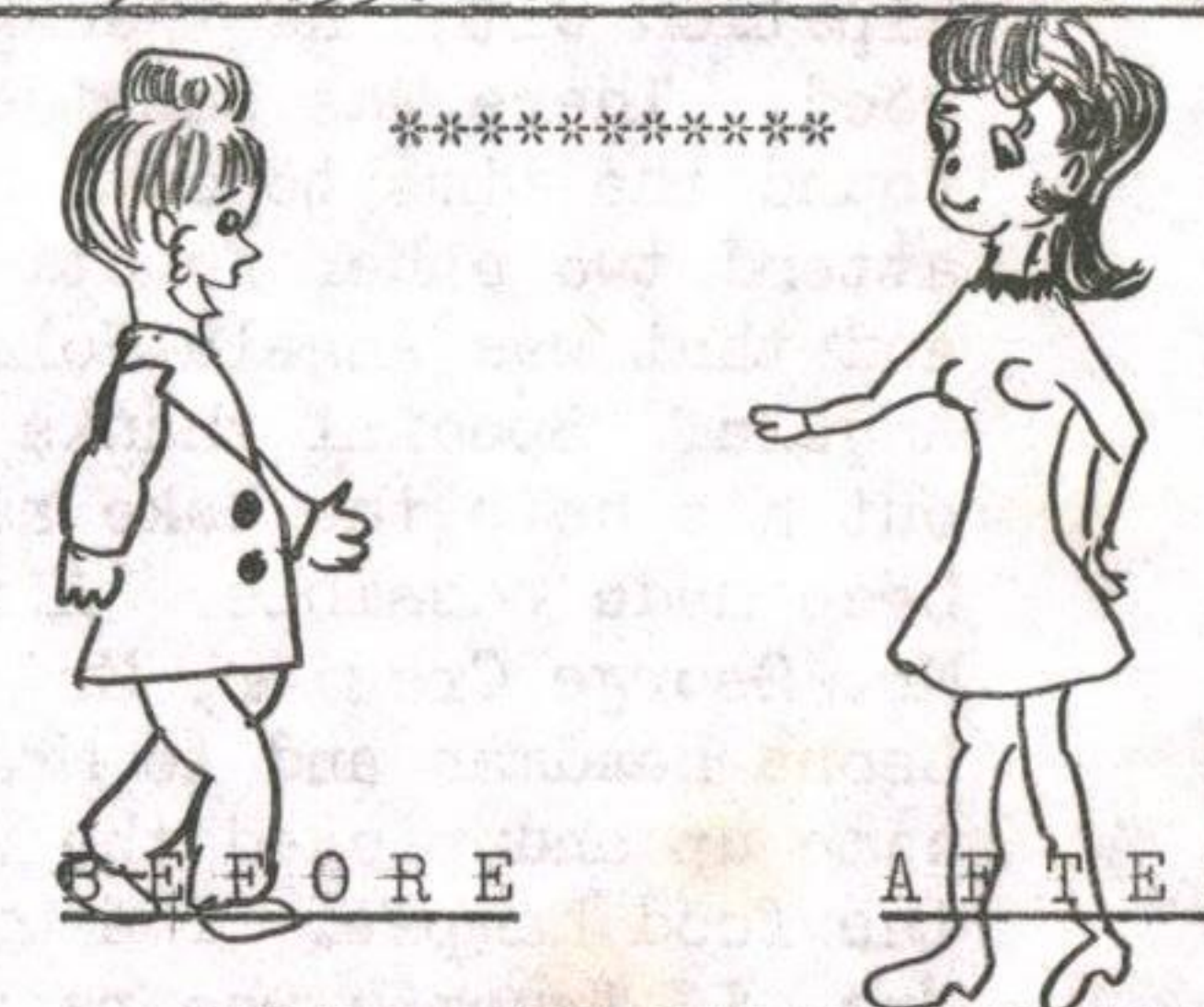

We hope in the near future we will have better participation at our functions.

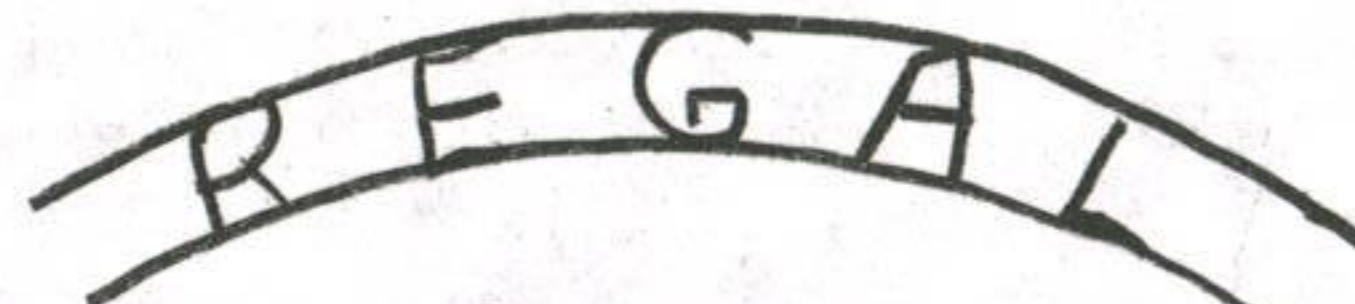

GLIDING

We are looking for members in the Alsask Soaring Club. If you wish to join the club contact Al Erickson or Paul Kuzma or Mel Brown.

The Air Cadet League glider was at Alsask for two weeks. During that time it flew over 300 sorties, 150 of which were to give rides to

Air Cadets, the rest of the flights were offered to local residents at \$2.00 a ride and to the crew at no charge. The money raised (over \$200.00 after expenses) goes into the club.

Why would the Air Cadet League allow us to use their glider and winch? If we can stimulate enough interest to get a glider club going at this unit, the Cadet Squadrons which we support will have better access to a gliding facility than they do at present and thus, indirectly, the Air Cadet League will be accomplishing its goal of getting the "AIR" back into Air Cadets. In addition to allowing us use of their glider set up for this two week period, it is hoped that the league will provide a capital grant to assist us in purchasing equipment required to get started. The Air Cadet Squadron themselves are also anxious to pay their way and get a gliding facility established here.

What do we military personnel and our dependents have to gain from establishment of our own gliding club? Another excellent recreational outlet at a comparatively low price. Civilian DND employees and local citizens and their families will also have access to gliding.

CAPITAL COSTS

How do we finance the initial set up of our own club. The Air Cadet League and Station Fund have agreed to assist financially in initial capital purchases. The Air Cadet squadrons are individually prepared to assist us financially, and of course membership fees will help us getting started.

APPROXIMATE COSTS WILL BE -

WINCH \$800.00 (100.00 has already been paid as a down payment)
 GLIDER 5000.00 (second hand - two place)
 TRUCK 200.00 (an old 3/4 ton for cable retrieval)
 TOTAL \$6000.00

We hope to raise the money by asking for donations from groups and individual as well as through Station Fund, Air Cadet League and Air Cadet Squadrons.

The approximate breakdown for income is expected to be:

Air Cadet Squadrons	\$2500.00

Station Fund	1000.00
Memberships (other than Air Cadets)	500.00
Donations	<u>1000.00</u>
	\$6000.00

Initial adult membership will be \$25.00 with \$10.00 annual renewals and a straight \$10.00 for a person 17 yrs or under whose parent is not a member. For additional members of a family, one member of which has an adult membership, the annual fee will be \$5.00.

If we are successful in raising enough surplus money, it would go into construction of a shelter to protect the glider without having to dismantle it.

OPERATING COSTS

These will be covered by levying a charge for each flight. The charge will cont.

cont.

be minimal, consistent with the break even policy of Station Fund recreational outlets. Some of the operating expenses are insurance, maintenance and operation of the winch and retrieve truck, certificate of Airworthiness (Cof A) checks on the glider and miscellaneous costs (eg administrative).

To this point we haven't mentioned glider training. The cost to get your gliding license elsewhere would be significantly more than it is expected to cost through our club.

To qualify for glider pilot training you must have a current MOT MEDICAL (DR Frazer at Empress) and a glider student pilot permit (15 yrs or over - glider license cannot be issued until after 16th birthday).

Finally to those who are skeptical or downright opposed to the formation of a gliding club "criticism is your right" but I would ask that you criticize the club not in seclusion but out in the open so that we have a fighting chance at defending ourselves. I've already heard (2nd or 3rd hand) that "Why should station fund spend our money on gliding when only 3 people are going to benefit?" First of all don't knock it until you try it and second of all if we used that line of reasoning all the time, we wouldn't have any recreational outlets on the station because they all cost money to initially set up. Thirdly, we expect to have a minimum of 20 active members with probably half the station personnel taking advantage of rides offered. Fourthly,

there are still people in this world who work selflessly so that others can enjoy themselves. We saw a good example of that in the launch crew recently. To those of you who wish to take part in the gliding please attend our meetings and join the club. For those of you who aren't interested please have patience, understanding and sympathy for we fools who willingly, bust our knuckles knotting ropes and repairing cables, freeze and get wet setting up and taking down a glider, and expend energy just as we can soar silently over this uniquely beautiful country.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Responses to a recent Tumbleweed article indicate that there is sufficient interest to warrant running the following courses:

1. Typing
2. Driver Training
3. Metric Usage

1. Typing will be possible when the typing course commences at Westcliffe High School, Marengo. This course will probably commence in January 1976. A fully qualified professional typing instructor will be supplied by the Dept of Education.

2. Driver Training will get underway when the Community College can book the driver training car (dual control). As of today the College has no estimate of when they will get the car, however it will more than likely be after the New Year. The cost per student will be \$40.00 and includes 6 hours of classroom instruction with 10 hours of driver training. This course will be a real bargain for anyone who wants to learn to drive. (properly)

3. Metric Usage - we have the go ahead to conduct a course on the use of the metric system of units. The cost per student will be \$0.50 per hour of instruction. The course is intended to run about 3 hours, and will include all types of metric measurements, such as capacity, length, pressure, force and mass.

If you are interested in taking this course contact the SSTO at local 208, or the GTNCO at 240. If the minimum number of students register, then the course date will be finalized.

There was not enough interest displayed in areas such as Academics or Cake decorating to warrant setting up a course. Academic courses will now have to wait until next year. Other areas of interest may be possible to initiate courses in response to that demand.
