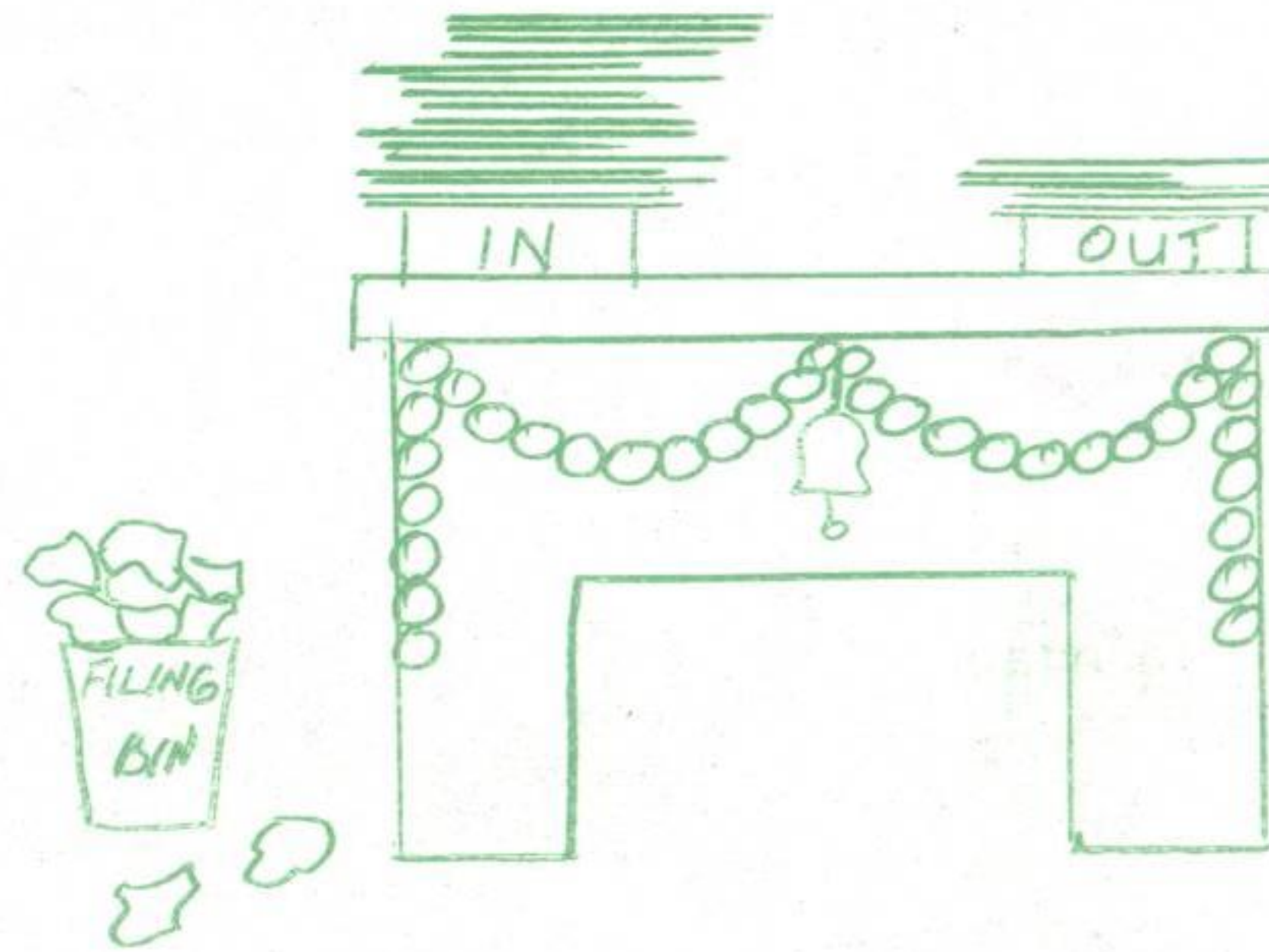

- Check with your baby sitter occasionally throughout the evening
- And try to arrange for a regular sitter that is familiar with your children

LEGAL RAMBLINGSKIDS, BOOZE AND THE LAW (PART I)

Is your wife
old enough
to drink?

Did you know that if you live in Ontario or Nova Scotia, it is illegal to give a minor a drink of wine in your own home? I didn't believe that when I heard it, but it's true. In this and a succeeding article on minors and drinking, the contents are mostly a matter of interest, but they may help you avoid trouble with some of our sillier laws.

The terms used in the various Provincial Liquor Acts are so different, and sometimes so vague, that I am not really sure that the information in these articles is absolutely accurate. However, it will serve as a guide, and give you a general feel for alcohol legislation as it applies to minors in your province or territory.

About the only thing that is the same in all provinces and territories in that minors may be given alcoholic beverages for medicinal purposes.

Even the age of majority is not the same in all provinces. In Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec and P.E.I., a minor is a person under 18. In all the other provinces and territories, a minor is a person under 19.

Drinking at Home

Serving alcoholic beverages to minors at home is illegal in Ontario and Nova Scotia, but it is legal in all other provinces, provided that it is served or supplied by a parent or guardian. However, in some provinces, serving means providing an open bottle of beer or a

glass of wine or liquor. In other provinces, you can apparently hand your child the whole bottle.

A fascinating point is that, if you happen to have a wife who is under age of majority, you cannot serve her a drink in your own home unless you live in Alberta, Saskatchewan, New Brunswick, or P.E.I. In other provinces and territories, she can have a drink when she visits her parents, but not in your house.

There are a couple of twists to these rules. In the Yukon, a grandfather may provide a minor with liquor in a private residence. In Saskatchewan, it is lawful for any adult to serve a minor alcoholic beverages in that adult's home - they don't have to be relatives. However, this rule specifically excludes motels, so watch it, you fellows in Saskatchewan!

An important implication of these laws is that teenage drinking parties in private homes are illegal. This is so because the parent or guardian must serve or provide the alcohol to his own minor children. The exception is Saskatchewan, where any adult in his own home may serve minors, but he must remain in the house.

So, if your children want to have a party without you being present, here is your built-in excuse for staying at home and keeping an eye on things.

Part II will deal with minors drinking in dining rooms and lounges.

ICING

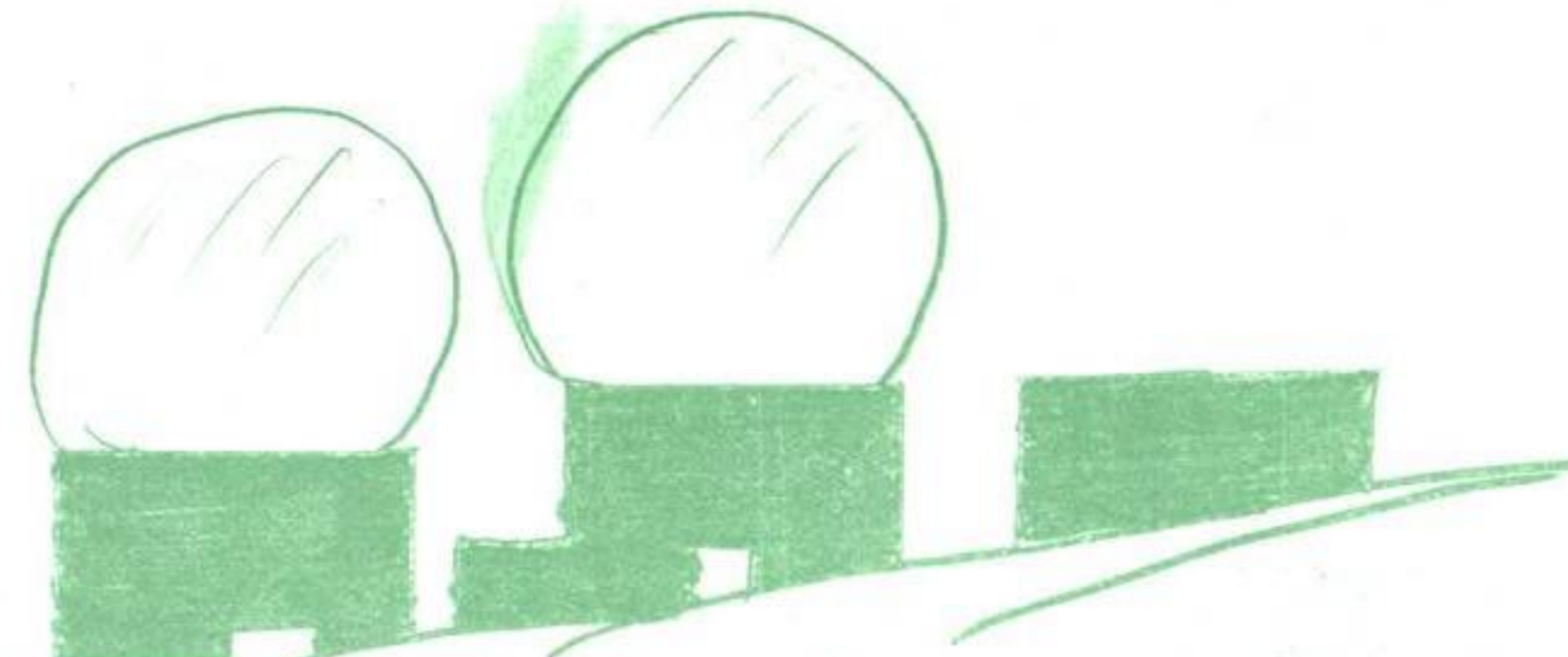
- 2 egg yolks

BICYCLES - LIGHTING

With the arrival of winter, driving conditions in the MQ and Station area are becoming increasingly hazardous, particularly with regard to bicycles on the roadway during darkness. Although there are no Federal or Provincial laws regulating lighting equipment for bicycles, everyone should be aware of the dangers involved when riding under these conditions. Therefore, parents are requested, for their childrens own safety, to ensure that bicycles have adequate illuminating equipment for night riding. e.g.

- front - white light
- rear - red reflector

The cost of a bicycle light is a small price to pay for a child's safety.

MT SAFETY

ARE SEAT BELTS WORTH THE TROUBLE?

Seat belts have been used now for several years. They are widely reputed to save lives, yet the number of deaths from vehicle collisions continue to rise, year by year. Why? One reason seems to be that drivers and passengers alike resist the "hard sell". If you want to influence others to use their seat belts, facts are more effective than admonitions.

A survey of accidents by Volvo, Inc., in Sweden, is tabulated below. There were 28,700 traffic accidents included, but only 25 percent of the drivers and 30 percent of the front seat passengers were using belts. The belts were "lap and shoulder," and 98 percent of the cars were so equipped.

DRIVERS:

- Among 6,870 using belts, 2 killed, 51 severely injured, 175 slightly injured.
- Among 21,910 not using belts, 37 killed, 263 severely injured, 835 slightly injured.

FRONT SEAT PASSENGERS:

- Among 2,699 using belts, 1 killed, 22 severely injured, 109 slightly injured.
- Among 6,032 not using belts, 12 killed, 160 severely injured, 439 slightly injured.
