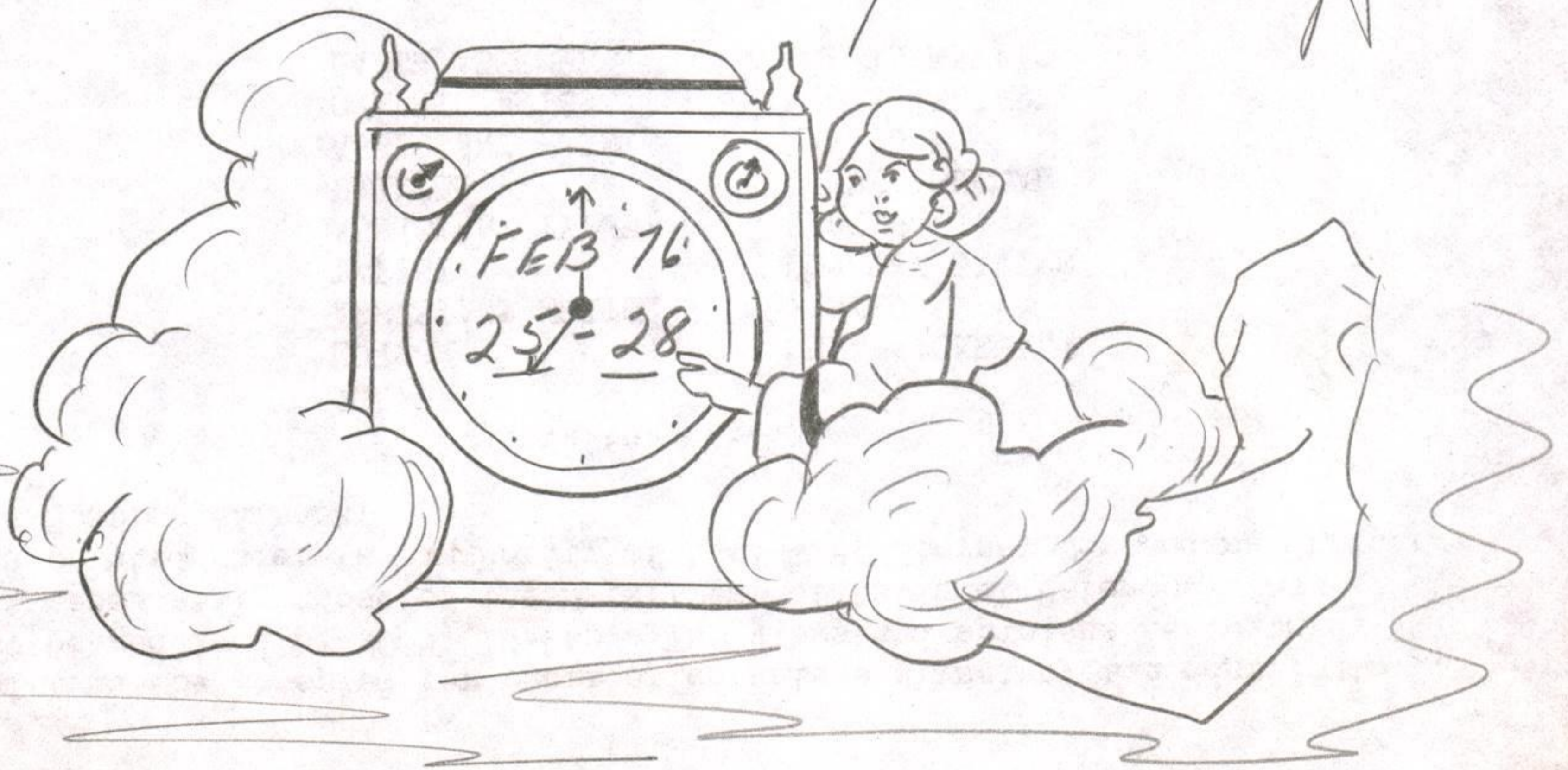

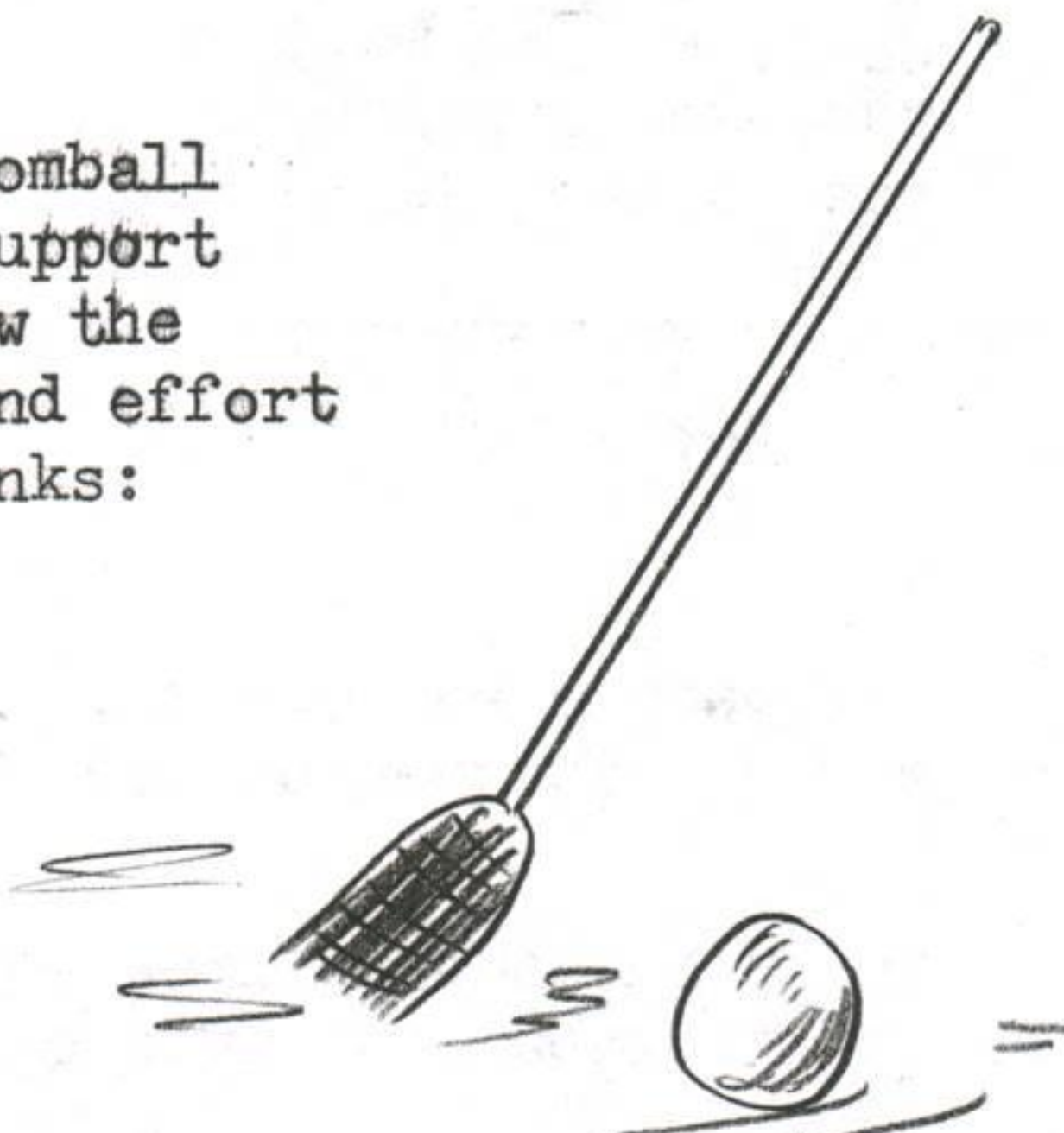

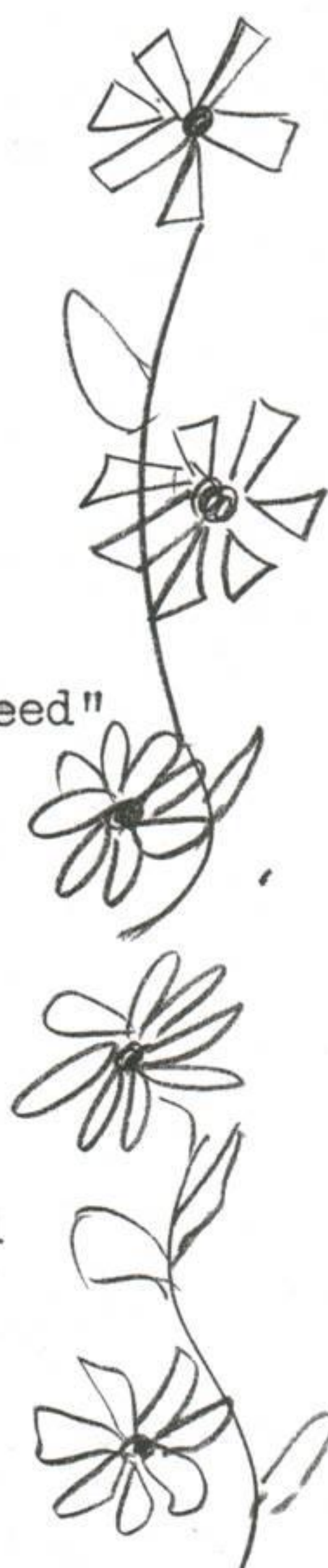

SERVICEMEN'S REGISTERED RETIREMENT SAVINGS PLAN

The Servicemen's Registered Retirement Savings Plan has now completed its first year of operation and we are very pleased to be able to report to you that response to the Plan has been very favourable and indicates that the SRRSP is filling an important need of the Servicemen.

PARTICIPATION IN THE SRRSP

At the end of December 1975 there were approximately 1400 Servicemen enrolled in the SRRSP with total deposits of over \$3 million. If we consider that most persons invest in RSP's in the months of January and February we can expect these numbers to increase significantly over the next few months.

Of the four Investment options available in the Servicemen's Plan, by far the most popular option has been the Guaranteed section which at present accounts for approximately 90% of total funds. The remaining 10% is distributed among the Mortgage, Income and Equity options. No doubt part of the reason for the high proportion of deposits going into the Guaranteed option is the good return offered in this section; i.e. a net of 9.50% for 1975.

So far only a small number of Servicemen are making their contributions to the SRRSP by monthly pay allotment. The main advantage of course in making payments this way is that it enables the individual to receive an immediate tax credit on his deposit to his SRRSP, rather than waiting until he files his tax return in the following year. For those of you who wish to take advantage of this we suggest that you contact your pay accounting office for the necessary pay allotment forms.

Many retired Servicemen are using their SRRSP as a means of deferring income tax payable on their severance money and pension earnings. We should emphasize that pension and severance money may be transferred to your SRRSP in addition to your normal yearly maximum allowable contribution.

1975 INCOME TAX DEADLINE

You will have until 1 March 1976, to make deposits to your SRRSP to be included as part of your 1975 contribution for income tax purposes. Wherever possible, deposits made from 1 January to 1 March will be considered as part of 1975 contributions unless you have reached your maximum allowable amount for that year. When you reach your maximum allowable contribution for 1975, any deposits made after 31 December must be applied to your 1976 allowable contribution.

Any withdrawals made from your SRRSP will be considered as income for taxation purposes in the year in which you actually receive the money. Thus, SRRSP money received in January 1976 would be added to 1976 income and taxed in that year.

1976 GUARANTEED RATE

The interest rate for the Guaranteed option of the SRRSP remains unchanged from 1975 at a net of 9.50%. This rate will be effective for the six month period 1 January 1976 to 30 June 1976 at which time it shall be reviewed again. The interest accrued shall be capitalized on 31 December 1976.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED

There were two problems that arose during the year which were the cause of some concern among the members.

The first was the fact that quarterly statements were often very late in getting out to the members. We can appreciate your concern over this and are pleased to be able to report to you that the cause was an internal systems problem which has now been rectified. In the future you can expect statements to be received approximately fifteen days after month end.

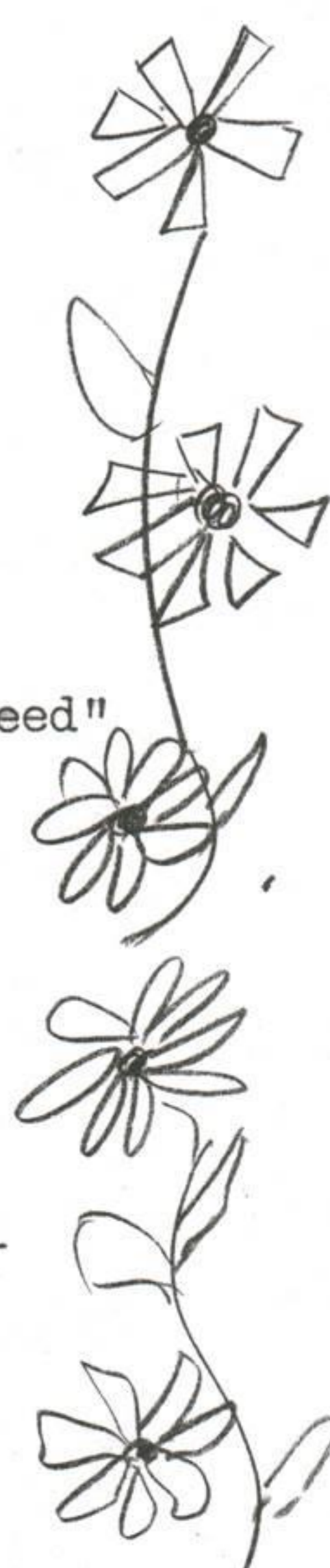

Secondly, as you are aware, those members who deposited into the Mortgage, Equity and Income options of the SRRSP, had their money invested in short term notes yielding around 6%. The reasons for this were set out in the letter included with your November statements. As pointed out in this letter the three options of Income, Mortgage and Equity are now fully invested in their appropriate categories.

CONCLUSION

The SRRSP has had excellent response with most members choosing to invest their money in the Guaranteed option. Members have until the 1 March 1976, to reach their 1975 maximum allowable contribution. The new Guaranteed rate for the first six months of 1976 will be a net of 9.50%.

An Emergency level First Aid Course is being planned for Dependents. The Course will run in the evenings (approx 4 evenings), and will be free of charge.

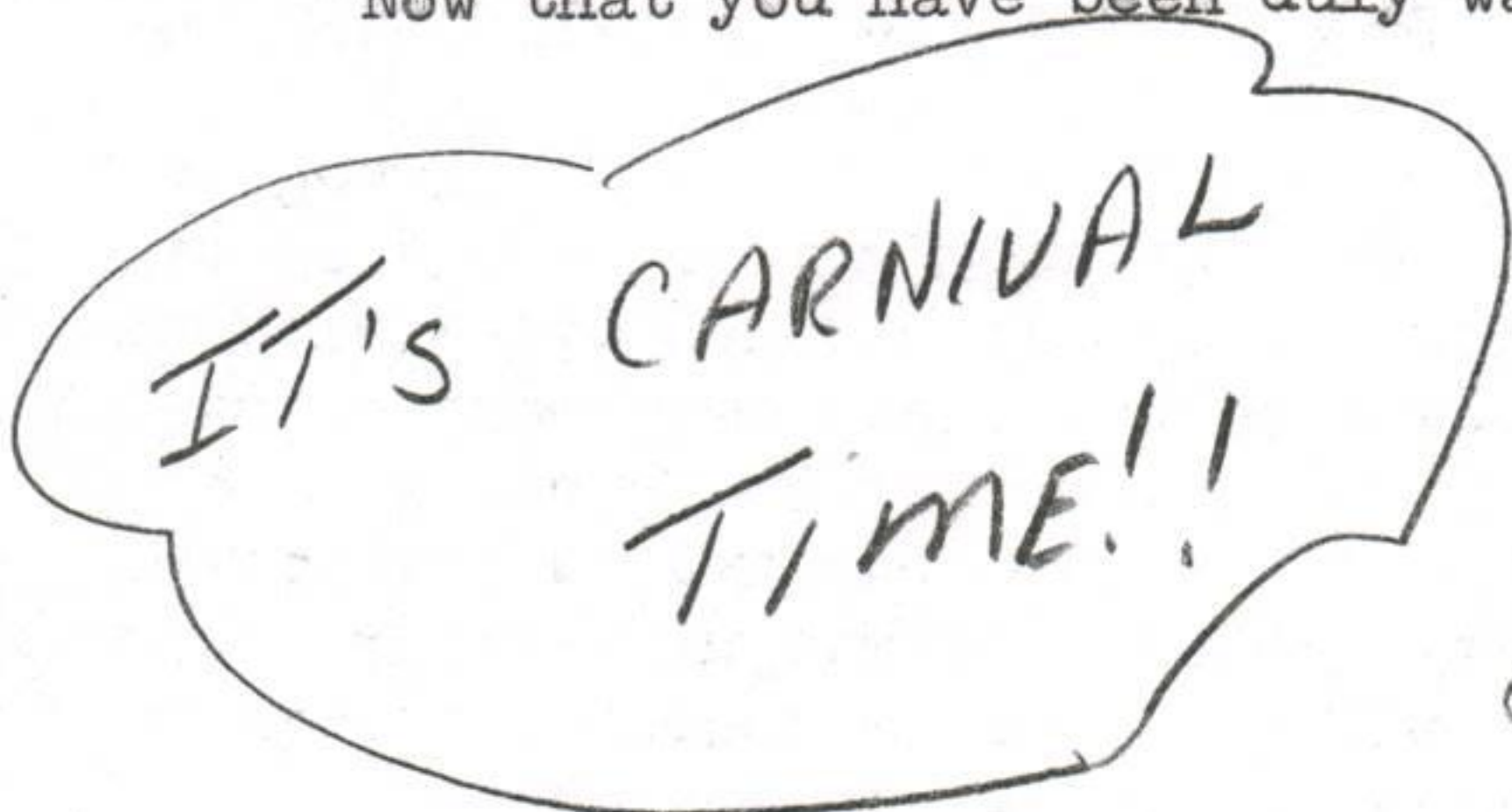
As most accidents occur in the home, it would be advantageous for any dependent wife to take this course.

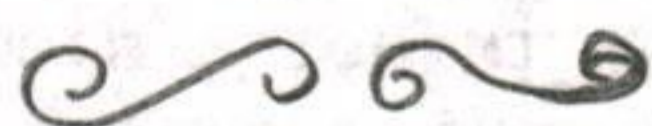

Carnival ribbons and buttons will be arriving soon. These will be available from your team captain and selected places on the Station and in the Village.

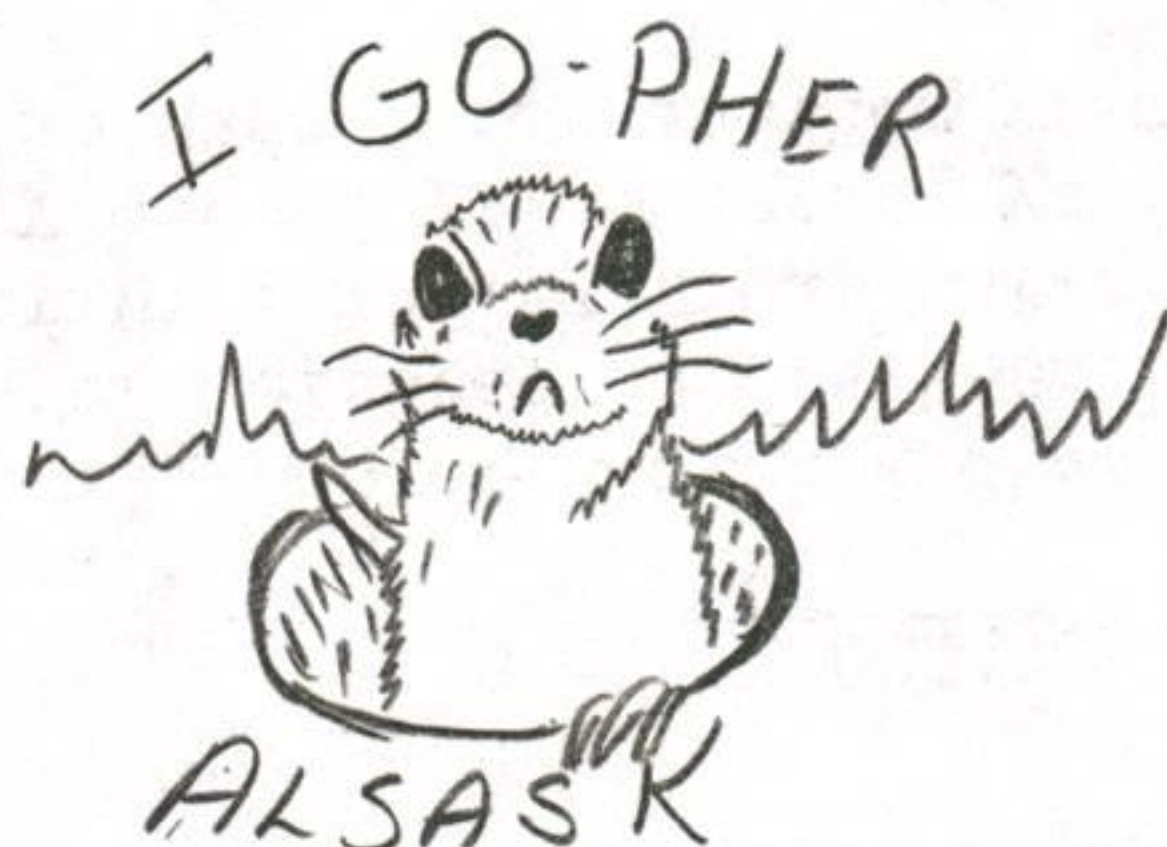
