DRIVING AFTER TAKING DRUGS



Just as in the case of the use of alcohol, the ability to drive safely can be seriously affected by drugs. Driving while impaired by a drug is an offence under the Criminal Code of Canada. Upon conviction, the same penalties apply to drugs as to those convicted of driving while impaired by alcohol.

Prescription Drugs. Medicines which are prescribed by doctors often can affect your ability to drive. Generally, a physician will explain effects when a drug is prescribed. But, if he doesn't mention it, and you intend to drive, ask him.

Non-prescription Drugs. Even common medicines taken for colds and minor illnesses can impair your driving. Drugs such as amphetamines, barbiturates, and antihistamines frequently sold under trade names can affect one's driving abilities. The exact nature of their effects depends upon the specific drug taken. Read the labels and know that any type of drug which changes body chemicals can affect judgment, perception, coordination, memory, and inhibitions.

Illegal Drugs. There should be no question about the effects of illegal drugs in relationship to driving. Marijuana affects one's ability to drive a car; marijuana users are classed as dangerous drivers while under the influence. Driving while under the influence of marijuana is more dangerous at night than in the daytime. It works very quickly in intensifying the prolonging the effect of glare on the eyes. Marijuana users are likely to be more quickly and completely blinder by oncoming headlights than nonusers. Their reaction time is slow and judgment is poor in performing complicated tasks (eg., simultaneously flashing on the turn signals and changing lanes or braking for a traffic light). The effects of other illegal and even more dangerous drugs have not been adequately studied in their relationship to driving, but there is no question that they very seriously impair a person's ability to drive safely.

VEHICLE SAFETY

There will be no vehicle safety lane held at CFS Alsask this year as the Saskatchewan Government Insurance Office has decided to drop the program. However, personnel are still reminded that it is the individuals responsibility to ensure his or her vehicle is maintained in a safe operating condition. Especially after the winter months and before the holiday season ahead, all vehicles should undergo a spring checkup.

OTTAWA NAVY MESS MANAGER DIES

OTTAWA (CFP) -- ROBERT C.E. SHARP, SR., OF OTTAWA, longtime manager of HMCS Bytown Naval Officers Mess (78 Lisgar St.) in downtown Ottawa, died here Apr. 10. He was 60.

Mr. Sharp, of British Army background, spent four and a half years in a Prisoner of War Camp in Germany during the Second World War, and in 1946, came to Canada as head of the personal staff of Lord Alexander of Tunis when he was appointed Governor-General. A year later, Mr. Sharp was named mess manager of Lisgar Streets "Stone Frigate".

He is survived by his widow, Ceronica, and son, Bob. He was buried April 13 in Pinacrest Cemetary, Ottawa.

Says Mess President Captain (N) Heward Richardson, "Anyone who thought of the Bytown Mess automatically thought of Bob Sharp. Hex will be missed."

CONSERVATION - CONVERSATION

Choosing appliances.
How much energy?

Before you buy any new appliance, it's wise to find out just how much energy it will use. Take a moment to look at the plate on the bottom or side of the appliance which gives the electrical "ratings". Ignore all numbers except the wattage ratings. A typical information plate could read something like this:

Ser. No. 1847092 - 75C
Volts - 110/120
Watts - 1250
cycles - 60 AC only

The following table shows how much energy (measured in Kilowatt Hours) is consumed in one hour of operation. The two columns to the right show the weight of oil or coal burned at the power station to produce this amount of electrical energy.

Example: if you have an electric frying pan, rated at 1,500 watts which you use for 4 hours a week, it consumes 6 Kilowatts hours of electricity. This might cost you 14 cents on your bill. The Generating station in turn, would burn 60 ounces of oil, or 80 ounces of coal to provide you with electricity. Multiply these figures by 1,000 homes in your area and the total jumps to about 3,500 gallons or 2.5 tons of coal. And this is just for one appliance. For one appliance it doesn't seem very much, but when multiplied by millions of homes, it sure adds up.

BGen Ken Wark
possible NHL
president

OTTAWA (CFP) - The search to find a successor to retiring NHL president Clarence Campbell is narrowing, and among those still in the running is 51-year old Brigadier-General Kenneth A. Wark of Ottawa and Toronto, who commanded CFB Ottawa until mid-1974.

Gen. Wark, who appeared before the NHL selection board last Tuesday (April 6), has been continually active in hockey circles since the late 1930s. He has done everything connected with the game from cleaning the ice to being president of two leagues, including coaching and managing. He also played junior hockey.

Posts he has held include those as president of the Central Junior A Hockey League for three years, vice-president of the Ottawa and District Hockey Association, and founder and first president of the National Capital Minor Hockey Association.

He left Ottawa last July after serving as director-general of current policy at National Defence Headquarters. He now serves with the North American Air Defence Command as deputy commander of the 24th NORAD Region, Malstrom Air Force Base, Great Falls Montana.

BOWLING ROUND UP - MIXED LEAGUE

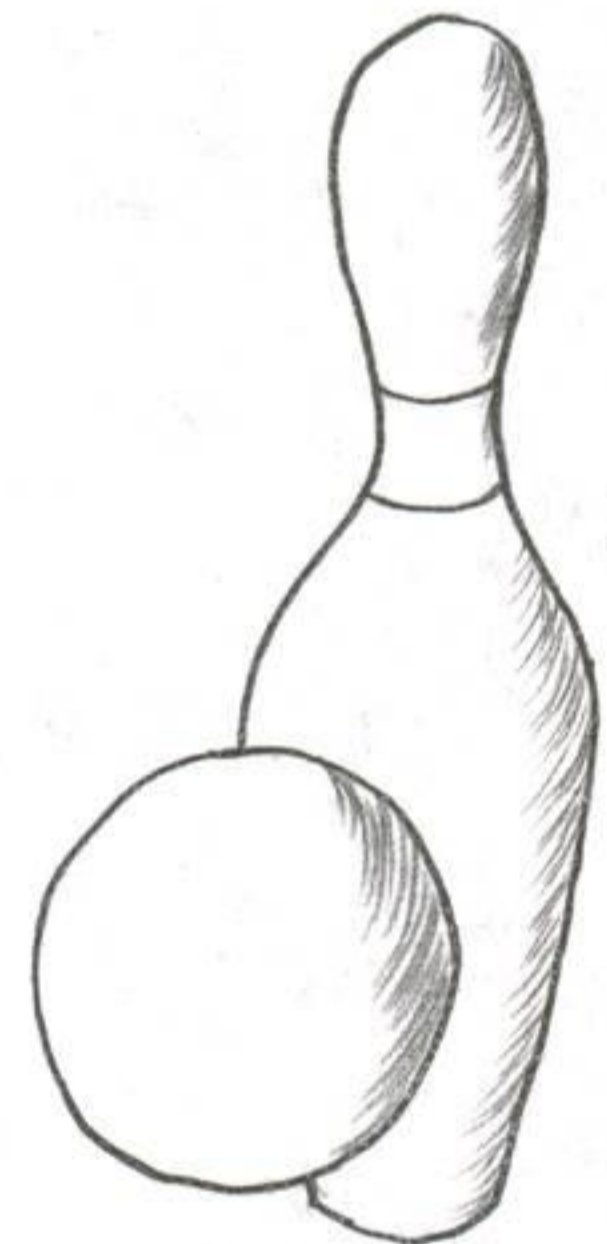
