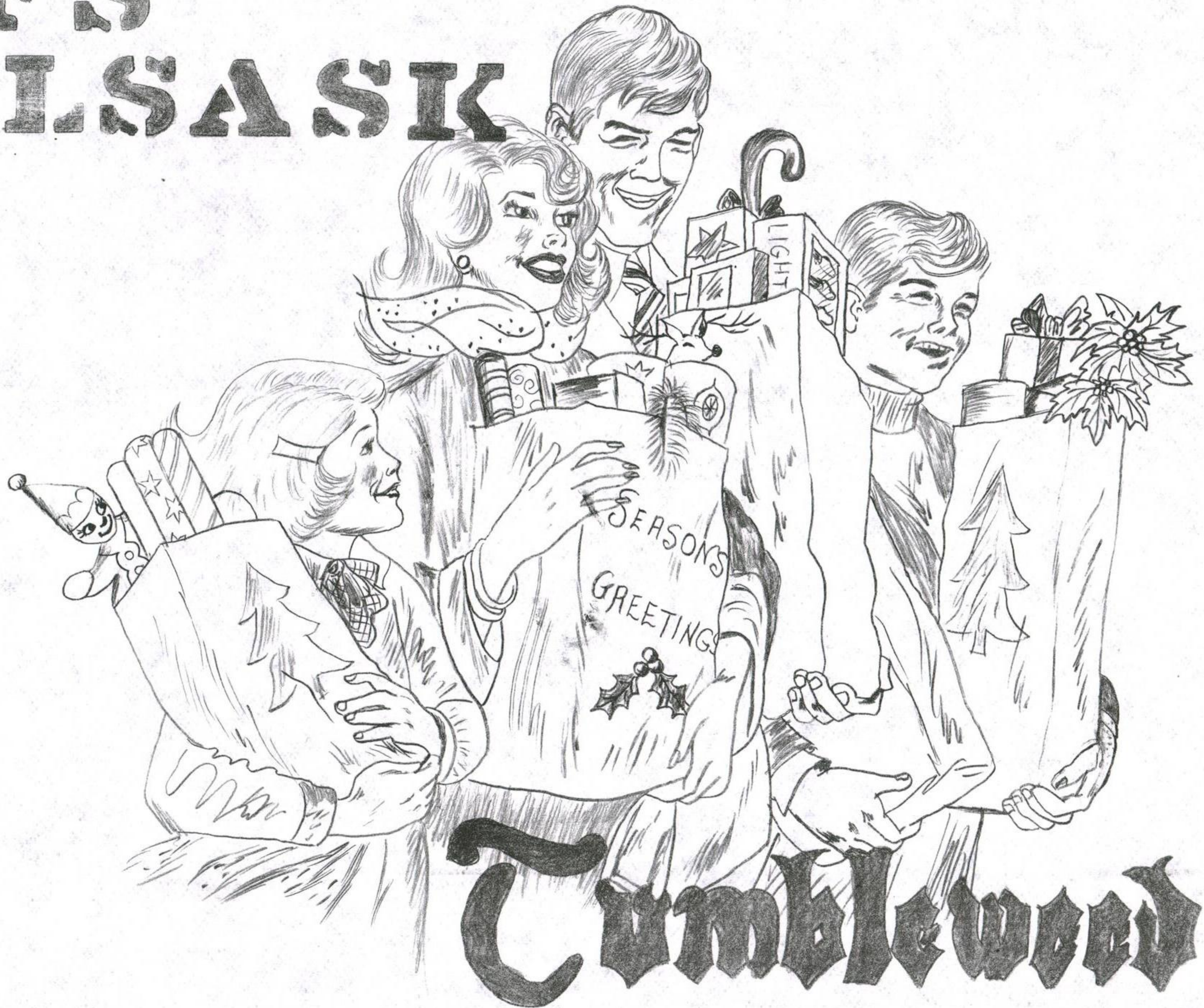

MASTER GOPHER MESSAGE

And who know, maybe even a great idea. One thing is certain; there will be some great nightmares resulting from excessive conviviality!

ALSASK AND DISTRICT DONOR'S CHOICE

The coordinators for the local Donor's Choice wrote a previous "Tumbleweed" article explaining the background and outlining the goals of the campaign. Larger urban centres have a "Red Feather" or a "United Appeal" campaign, which is a large scale, organized drive to collect funds for charitable organizations. The size of Alsask prohibits that kind of organization, consequently the Alsask Donor's Choice surfaced as an effective alternative.

Further, we can all continue to serve our country and the world community in the cause of principles and way of life we all cherish."

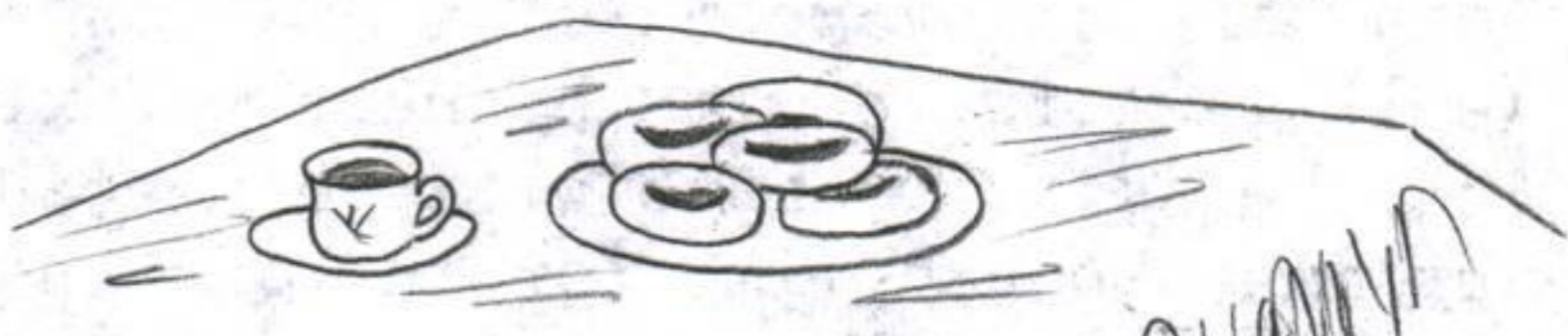
FIGURE SKATING CLUB

When you're fit, two o'clock in the afternoon finds you in the middle of your best efforts of the day. Being fit is doing your grocery shopping without worrying about how you're going to get the bags from the car to the kitchen. Being fit is walking into a room without having to pull in your stomach. Being fit is going to a party and having enough energy to out-dance all others in the room. Being fit is knowing that everyone thinks you are 29 when you're really 35. Being fit is getting to sleep each night without tossing and turning. Fitness is not bulging muscles--it's a way of life---a sense of fun---a happy feeling. Only one adult in five can stay up on ice skates for more than five minutes at a time.

Congratulations to Mae & George Dowell on the birth of their daughter.

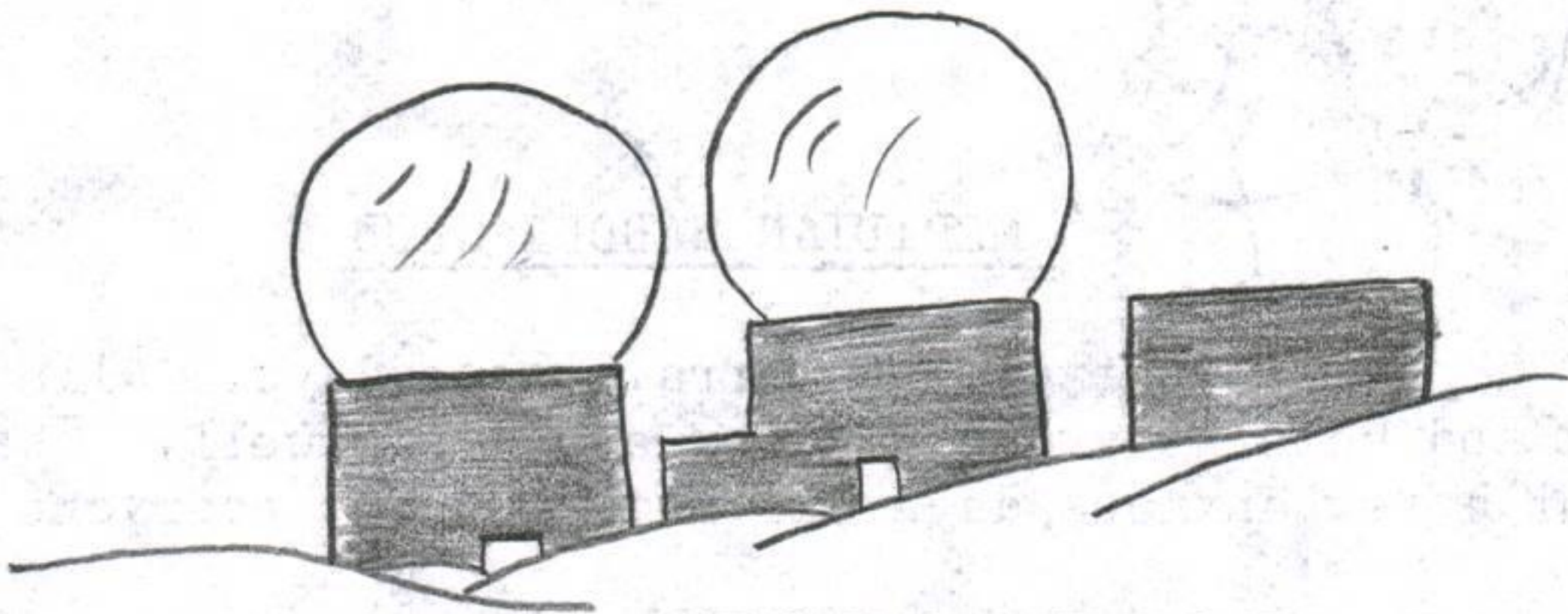

Death in slow motion (2nd last Tumbleweed) was fairly good, but I could wreck my car in away less than 7/10 of a second. How? Hear's my story.

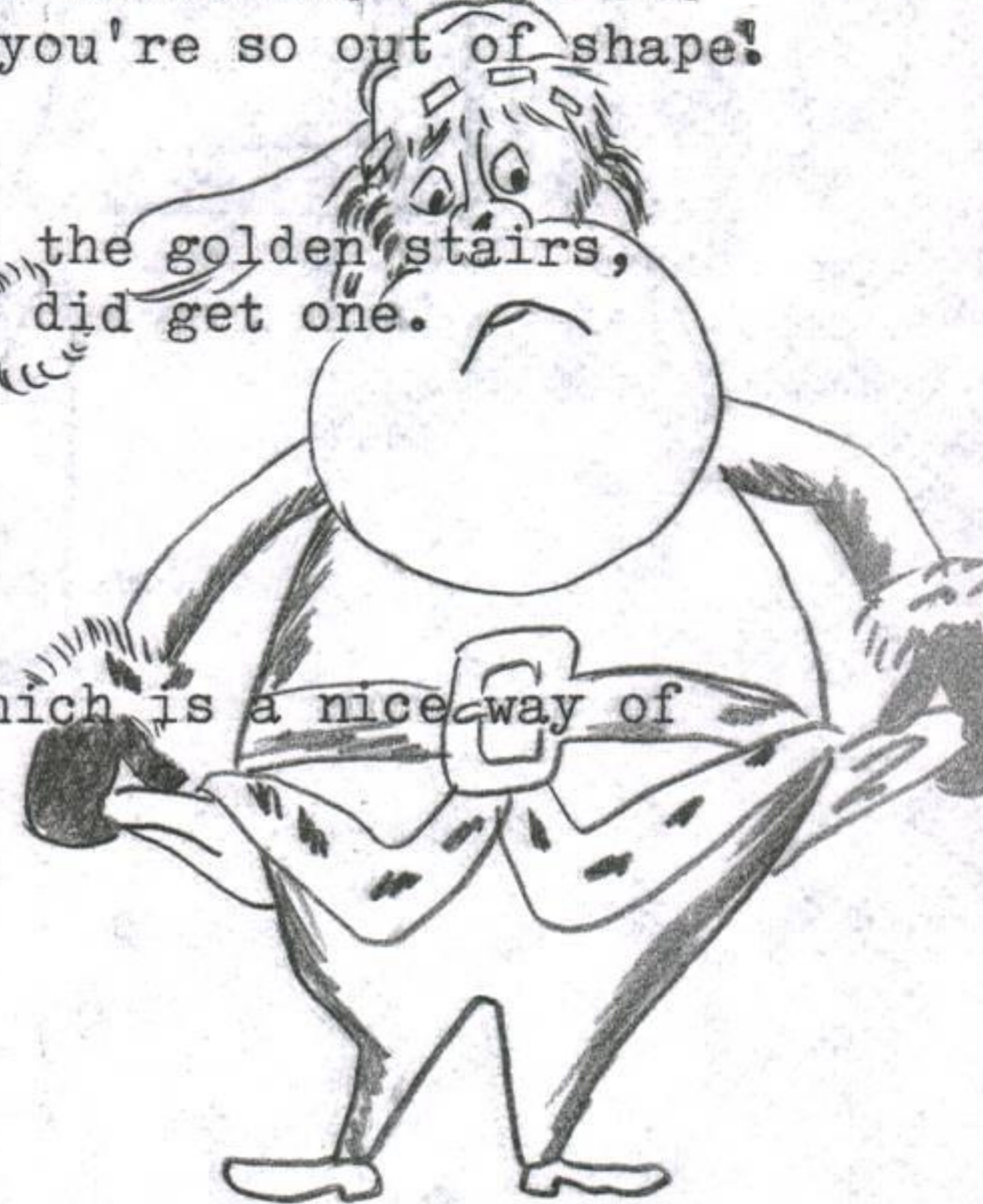

RULES - BEARD GROWING CONTEST

The Commander of Air Command has given personnel at radar stations authority to grow beards for winter carnivals. As a result of this, beard growing at CFS Alsask will commence on 12 Jan 77 in keeping with the following rules.

- a. Except in the Alsask area, personnel shall not appear in public in uniform during the period their beard is growing;
- b. Beards shall be removed the day following completion of the carnival;
- c. Beards shall be removed if an individual is required to depart from the station on TD, posting, etc;
- d. Permission shall not be granted to grow a beard if the person is a food handler, employed in a medical facility, or precluded from wearing a beard because of operational safety or functional reasons, as determined by the Commanding Officer or a safety authority;
- e. In accordance with CFAO 17-3, when growing a beard the use of the razor shall be discontinued entirely, and the beard shall not be worn without a moustache;
- f. Personnel entering the beard growing contest are not eligible for the moustache growing contest;
- g. Military personnel authorized and wishing to grow beards are to report clean shaven (no moustache) to the SASC on or after 12 Jan 77;
- h. Civilian personnel wishing to grow beards are to report clean shaven (no moustache) to their respective team captains on or after 12 Jan 77;
- i. Prizes will be awarded for the following categories:
 1. Best overall; 2. most colourful; 3. scruffiest; 4. best attempt
- j. judging of beards will take place at the wind-up dance on 26 Feb 76.

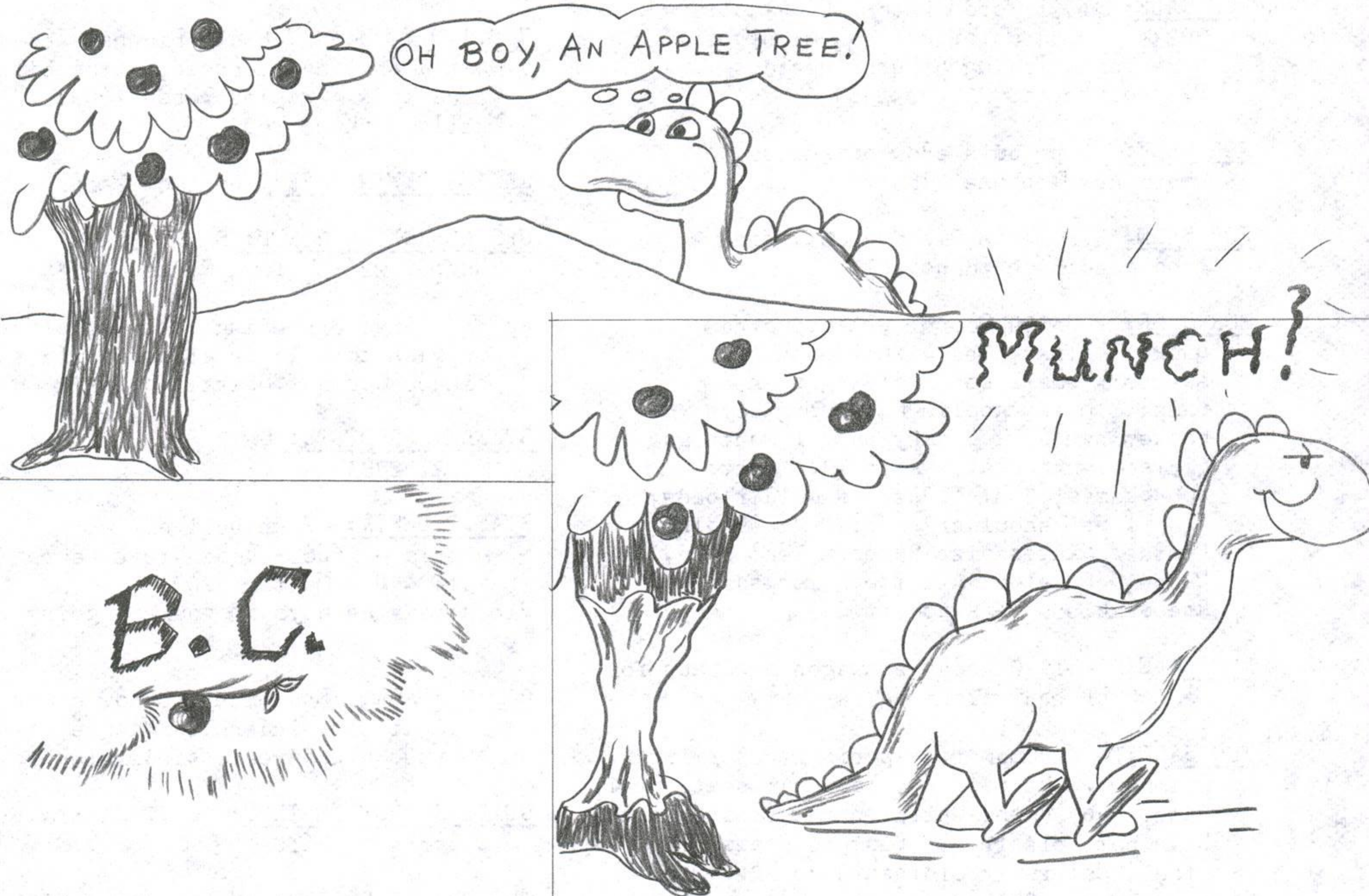
