FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

FORCES VOTING -- Ottawa (CFP) -- Members of the Canadian Forces make up the bulk of the 100,000 Canadians eligible to cast their ballots in the May 22 federal election up to 14 days before the rest of the country. Using special write-in ballots, voting for them begins May 7 and ends May 12.

In addition to members of the Forces the total figure includes eligible dependents residing with Forces electors outside Canada and some civilians employed outside the country.

The pre-election voting occurs under the special voting rules to ensure that the Forces ballots are available for counting at the same time as the civilian vote. These special regulations are under the direction of Col. Robert Martin, 46, of Edmunston, N.B., and his special duties in the election make him one of the busiest men in the country these days. Col. Martin, the permanent DND co-ordinator appointed by the minister, is travelling across Canada and to locations overseas to aid in setting up the special procedures necessary to ensure an orderly vote.

Actually his work began some time ago when 2800 special voters lists were prepared of all eligible personnel under the special voting rules. The large number of lists were necessary because the rules call for a list of electors to be available for every candidate nominated in each of the 282 ridings in this election. Computer lists for each electoral district were prepared at National Defence Headquarters and delivered to the Chief Electoral Officer April 2. The lists have the name, rank, and current military postal address of every Canadian Forces elector eligible to vote for a candidate in a particular riding. The DND computer center also prepared alphabetical listings of all Canadian Forces electors. These lists will be used by the Chief Electoral Officers in Ottawa and by the special returning officers at the four voting territory headquarters in Edmonton, Ottawa, Halifax and London, England. Other lists are being prepared at all units for use by Deputy Returning Officers at the voting places of the units during the voting week.

Members of the Canadian Forces are ineligible to vote at civilian polls in the electoral district where they are presently residing unless that electoral district is their chosen place of ordinary residence. If this is not so, it is illegal for service personnel to vote at civilian polls in the ridings where they are presently posted.

About 16,000 Canadians will be entitled to vote outside the country. These are members of the Canadian Forces and their accompanying dependents 18 years of age and up on civilian polling day. Also included are members of the public service residing outside Canada and their eligible dependents and civilians employed by the Forces as teachers or as administrative support staff for the Forces schools. Their dependents may also vote if they qualify. CF members outside Canada include troops in the United States, Europe, Cyprus and the Middle East.

Every attempt is made to keep the Service vote secret. After the ballot is filled in, it is placed in a special unmarked inner envelope and sealed by the voter. Then the inner envelope is placed in an appropriately addressed outer envelope by the Deputy Returning Officer (DRO) and sealed by him. Both the voter and the DRO must sign the outer envelope. These are

then forwarded to the appropriate Special Civilian Returning Officers at Edmonton, Ottawa, Halifax and London to arrive prior to 1600 hours local time on Friday, 18 May. Col. Martin explained that the ballots of most overseas members of the Forces and their dependents will go to London for sorting and counting by scrutineers selected by political parties.

The ballots of the military in Canada and the United States will be sorted and counted in the three Canadian centres also by scrutineers. Once totals have been tabulated for the various electoral districts in Edmonton, Ottawa, Halifax and London they are sent to the Chief Electoral Officer J.M. Hamel in Ottawa by secure telecommunications. On May 22 -- Civilian Polling Day -- the Chief Electoral Officer will in turn send the results to the returning officers in the respective ridings not earlier than one hour after the polls have closed. The returning officer must, where possible, merge the results of the votes under the special voting rules with the result of the votes of at least one advance poll in that electoral district.

Col. Martin is presently visiting military centres from Victoria, B.C. to Ismailia, Egypt, during the next few weeks to brief military and public service DRO's and their staffs. He will outline the procedures under the special voting rules to ensure that all eligible voters under these rules are given the opportunity to vote anywhere in the world, according to the methods prescribed by the rules.

OTTAWA -- Dependent sons and daughters of Canadian soldiers were granted \$130,000 in educational bursaries during 1978 through the Canadian Army Welfare Fund (CAWF).

The amount exceeds 1977's allotment by \$30,000.

The 244 bursaries, averaging \$606.50, were awarded to students attending universities and community colleges across Canada.

To be eligible for a bursary, one of the applicant's parents must have served in the Canadian Army (Regular) between October 1, 1946, and February 1, 1968, with financial need being a determining factor.

The Canadian Army Welfare Fund was established in 1952 with contributions from Maple Leaf Services, Army canteens and messes. It is supported now by the Canadian Forces Central Fund. The Fund also provides financial assistance in the form of loans and grants to eligible applicants.

Applications for this year's CAWF Bursary Programme may be obtained from the Manager, Canadian Army Welfare Fund, East Memorial Building, Wellington Street, Ottawa, Ont., K1A 0P4. Deadline for the acceptance of applications is July 1 of each year, and applicants are advised of the results by August 15.

HELP WANTED

It's that time of year again, and while some of you may look forward to your transfers with eagerness, those of us who have to stay for a while and who have to find new volunteers to fill the gaps created by those transfers are not the happiest people in the world. On the whole, volunteer response to various needs throughout the last year has been fair. But it could be a whole lot better!

Last fall I indicated in this column that the Tumbleweed was in need of help. Well, we need even more help now, or will by next September when the new publishing year starts. Transfers and commitments to other projects and organizations are going to take away two of the three typists, two of the four printers and one of the distribution couples. In addition the paper still has no assistant editor, and it is this lack that most concerns me at present. I have not minded the present workload because I enjoy the work, and most important I HAD THE TIME TO DO IT. But that is about to change. We are expecting an addition to our family in mid-November and I will be absolutely unable to carry the present workload alone. But please take this warning seriously: if I don't get the necessary help before September 1, I will have no choice but to resign on the spot, in which case one of two things will result: either the Commanding Officer will have to appoint someone else to the job, someone who may not want it at all, or else the paper will die! Please don't let that happen.

RAMBLINGS OF GORDON

Several weeks ago my oldest son sustained a very bad cut to his left hand. Had my wife or I not known what to do he could have bled to death. Had this happened on a camping trip or on the road a long way from medical facilities, the results would have required extensive first aid treatment. As it was, it was simply a matter of stopping the bleeding until such time as I could get him to the M.I.R.

Let's suppose you are on a camping trip and something goes wrong, as it inevitably does. Let's say your cook stove explodes and someone gets badly burned. What do you do? Once the fire is out, do you apply burn ointment? Run cold water on it? Immerse the wound in warm water? What do you do??

You come in from outside to find your child screaming because an electric cord, which has frayed to bare metal, is lying across his or her leg and current is running through your child's body. What do you do? Kick the cord away? Grab the child away? Call an electrician? What??

Someone in your family has ingested a poison. You don't know whether it's an acid or an alkali. What do you do? Someone stops breathing, for any one of a thousand reasons. We all know artificial respiration, or think we do, so you give it to save a life. But what if your breath won't go into the victim's lungs, and you can't see why; then what? What if the victim has acid in his or her mouth and you can't let it get in your mouth or you'll be the next victim; then what do you do? What if the victim has had a laryngectomy (breathing device in the neck)? What if someone breaks a bone? What do you do to help? What if someone staggers into view and falls in front of you. Is the victim drunk? A diabetic? If a diabetic, is it diabetic shock or insulin overdose?

If you can't answer any of these questions or only a few, then you're in trouble. If you're a service person you should know; you've had a formal course. But what about your dependents, or you civilians that have never had a course? Well, your troubles are over. At least they could be. It's up to you. Sometime next month, we will be running a dependents' first aid course that will qualify you to standard level as laid down by St. John's Ambulance. It's something we instructors enjoy teaching because we feel you can never know enough when it comes to saving a life. Stay tuned to the Tumbleweed for further information.

BICYCLE SAFETY WEEK DECLARED MAY 20-26

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The week of May 20 through 26 has been declared "Bicycle Safety Week" in Saskatchewan. The purpose is to alert both parents and motorists to the necessity for extra precautions during the summer months when bicycles share the roadway with automobiles.

Automobile drivers have a responsibility to do whatever they can to protect the cyclists in traffic. Even though bicycles are classified as vehicles, child cyclists often forget to obey the traffic rules and regulations. No driver wants to be responsible for injuring or killing a child!

Help protect cyclists by slowing down, tapping the horn when approaching and giving riders plenty of room when overtaking or passing. When making a right turn, drivers should watch for cyclists coming between the car and the curb, and be especially watchful for cyclists riding at night, since many bicycles still have no lights or reflectors.

All sensible cyclists stay healthy by practicing the following rules:

- Observe all traffic regulations. A bicycle is a vehicle.
- Read your provincial driver's handbook and note a cyclist's responsibilities.
- Avoid freeways and busy streets where possible.
- Stop, look and listen when you enter any street. Automobile drivers may not see you.
- At busy intersections do not attempt to make left turns. Instead, walk your bike across on the pedestrian walk light until you are on the street you wish to travel.
- Ride along (single file) - one on a bike, and don't carry bulky packages.
- Stay on the right - with traffic. Watch for doors opening on parked cars.
- Keep your bike under control - no tricky steering or riding.
- Yield the right-of-way to all pedestrians.
- Never hitch a ride by hanging onto motor vehicles. This is against the law and very dangerous if the vehicle stops or swerves suddenly.
- Do your riding in the daytime. If you must ride at night, wear light coloured clothing and use reflective tape on both clothes and bike. After dark your bike must have a working headlight and a red rear reflector.
- Keep your bike in good mechanical condition by frequent check-ups.

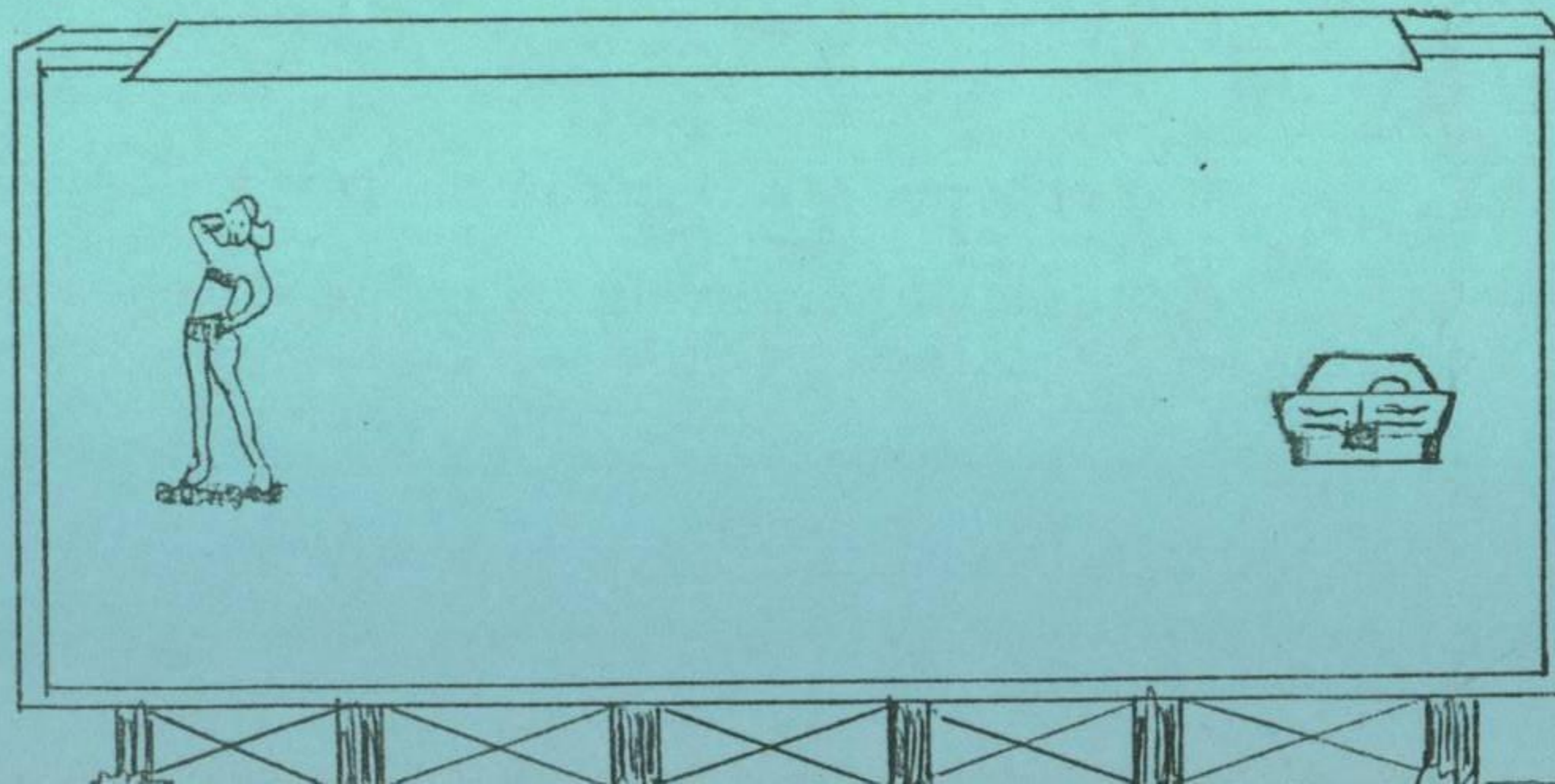
Transport is waiting for a call from PMQ 56 and 92, to transport patients to hospital, baby time is close. Enough kidding, here is a neat trick for you to try.

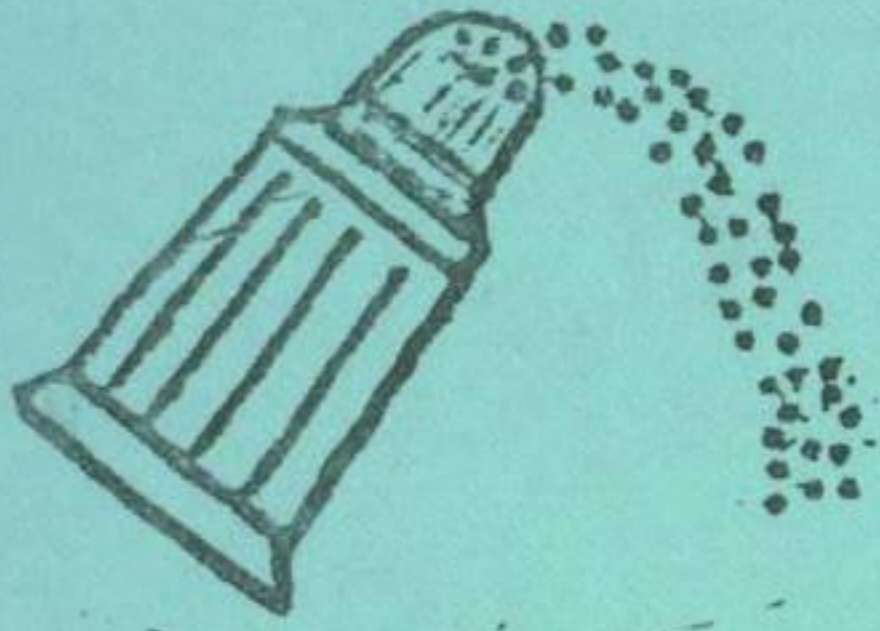
Now you see it. Now you don't!

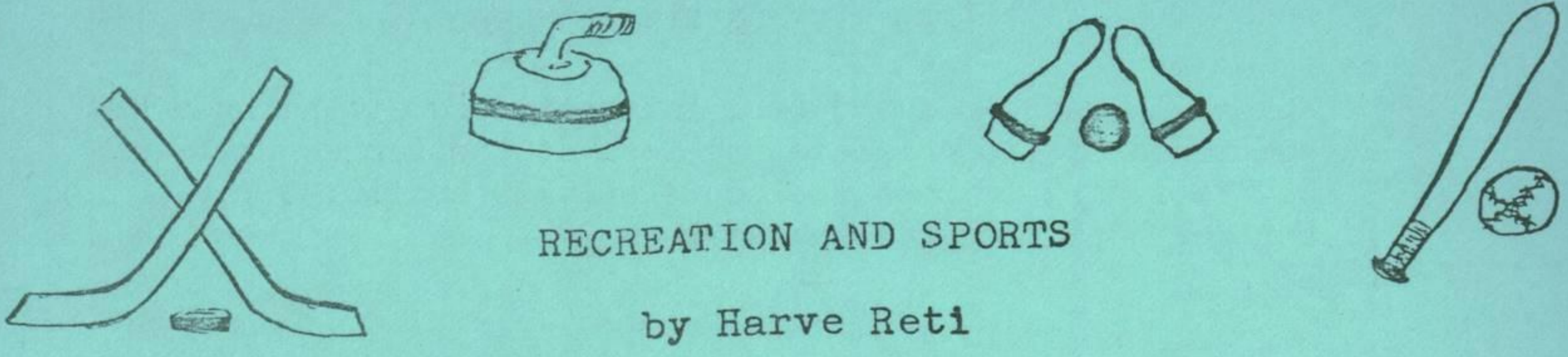
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ON THE LIGHTER SIDE

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).

2. CFSLP small loans of \$50. to \$500. are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.

3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100. per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
