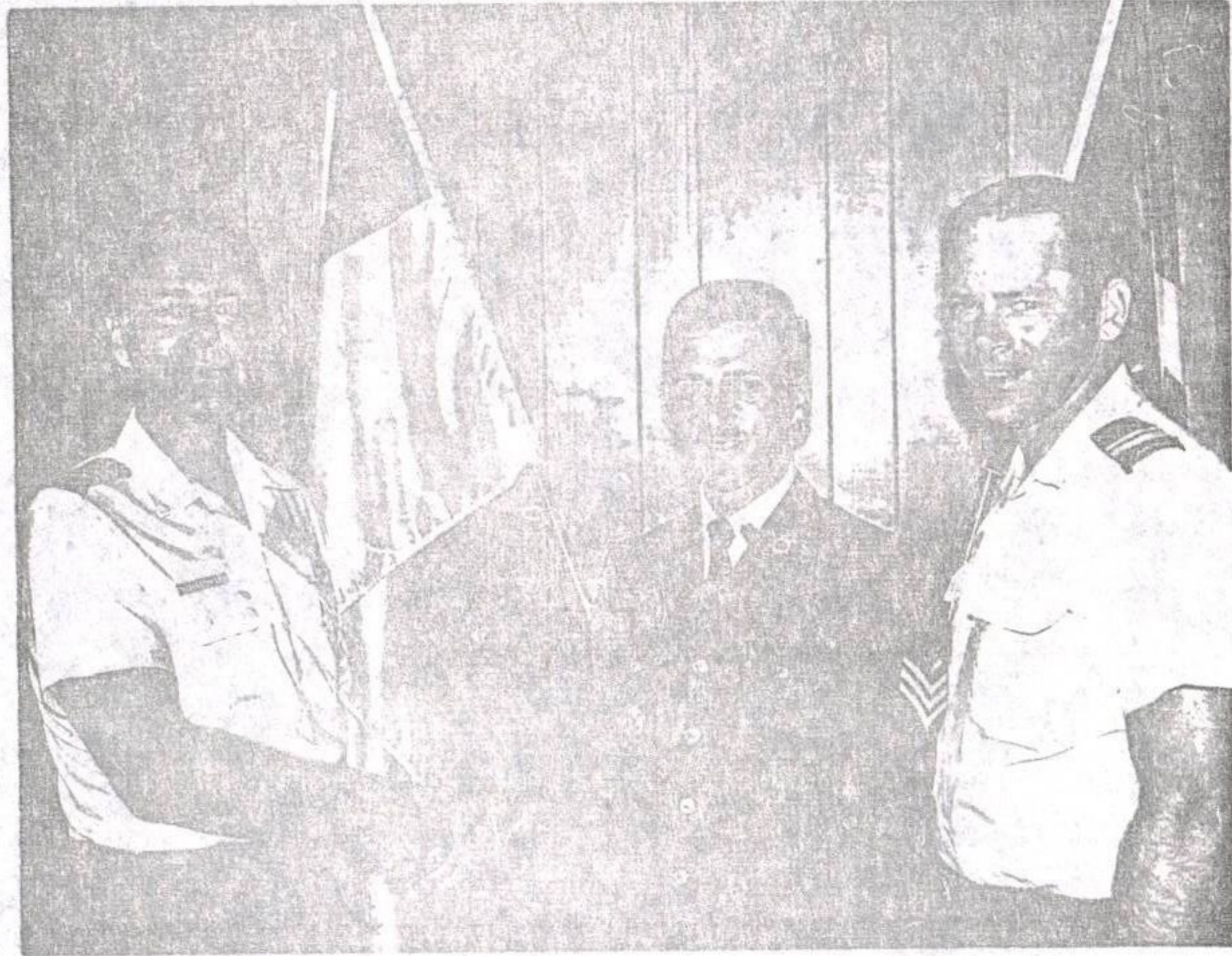

Sgt. Garland is congratulated on his promotion by the CO and Capt. Runge, SCEO.



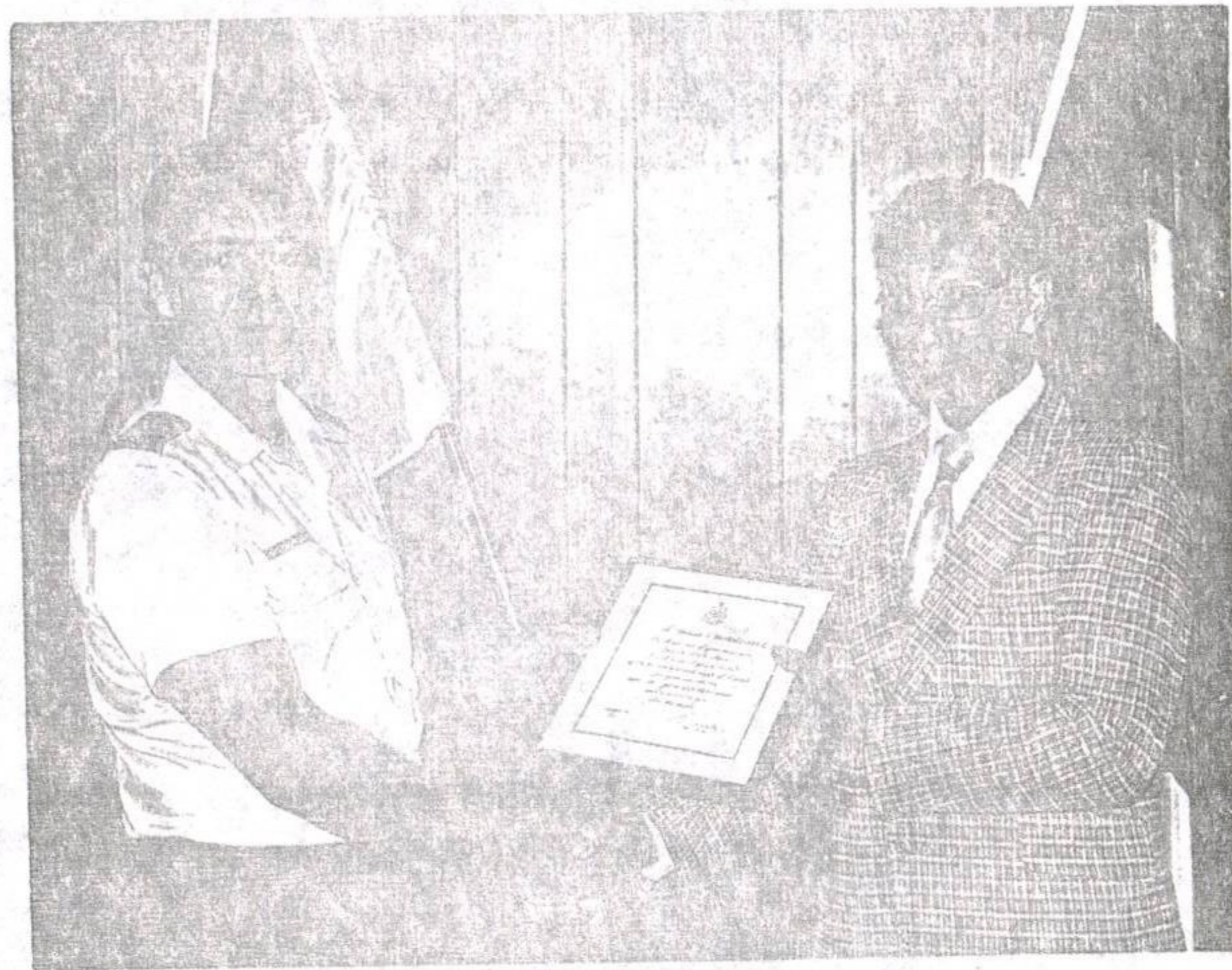
The Colonel and Lt. Newell, SCOMPT, congratulate Sgt. Philibert on his promotion to that rank.

FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

FIRST CANADIANS TO WIN NORAD AWARD -- Ottawa (CFP) -- Two Canadian Forces Captains assigned to 23rd NORAD Region at Duluth, Minn., are the first two Canadians to achieve the prestigious NORAD rating of Master of Air Defence.

Captains Jean-Marc Dufour of Ville de la Baie, Que., and James Scott of Hamilton, Ont., were among the six recipients of this rating, which is awarded to NORAD personnel who have demonstrated outstanding ability in the performance of their duties.

Candidates for the Master of Air Defence rating undergo rigid written and practical evaluations for proficiency in all areas of controlling and directing an intercept mission. They must demonstrate outstanding ability in each phase of the evaluations before being selected for the rating of Master of Air Defence. Less than 170 personnel have been designated Masters of Air Defence out of the thousands who have been assigned as pilots and weapons controllers in the air defence missions since 1962.

NEW BOOK RECOMMENDED -- A new book, 'Scan for the Future', is a straight-forward and practical guide for military personnel and their families about a subject that concerns many: planning for civilian life and a second career.

Major Terry Christopher, co-ordinator of the Civilian Employment Assistance Program at NDHQ and co-author of the book with Dr. John Wyspianski, a professor at the University of Ottawa, says that the anxiety caused by re-entering civilian life is usually a result of poor preparation on the part of military personnel. He considers that planning is critical. "Retirement is part of one's career in the same way as recruiting is part of one's career," he says.

Experience has shown that for too many individuals serving in the Forces, retirement is seen as a "time to get out" and few plans are made. The absence of planning and lack of awareness about available career options can cause a sudden onslaught of panic as the individual approaches retirement.

Reading "Scan for the Future" is like going on a voyage - a voyage to determine realistic aspirations, assess previous experiences and then proceed on the road to a second career. It contains chapters on self-assessment, self-development, civilian life, career goals, planning your transition, job searching and achieving your goals. There are also detailed instructions on resumé writing and preparation for job interviews.

The book should be available at all Base Personnel Selection Offices, in early September.

CALLING ALL HEMINGWAYS -- Ottawa (CFP) -- Do you see yourself as a budding author?

If so, Canadian Defence Quarterly (CDQ) awaits your literary efforts. Editor John Gellner needs articles on any defence subject in either French or English.

Topics of particular interest to CDQ include Canadian engineers in the Arctic, surveillance of the 200-mile economic zone, Airborne Warning and Control System in NATO and satellite reconnaissance.

This periodical magazine publishes articles written mainly by CF officers and Canadian academics. The articles relate to national defence matters and the military profession and the magazine provides a vehicle for both defence experts and junior officers to air their views and opinions.

Known in Canada and abroad, the magazine plays an important role in officer professional education and development and contributes to a more informed general public.

The editor maintains a close working relationship with DND through National Defence Information Services.

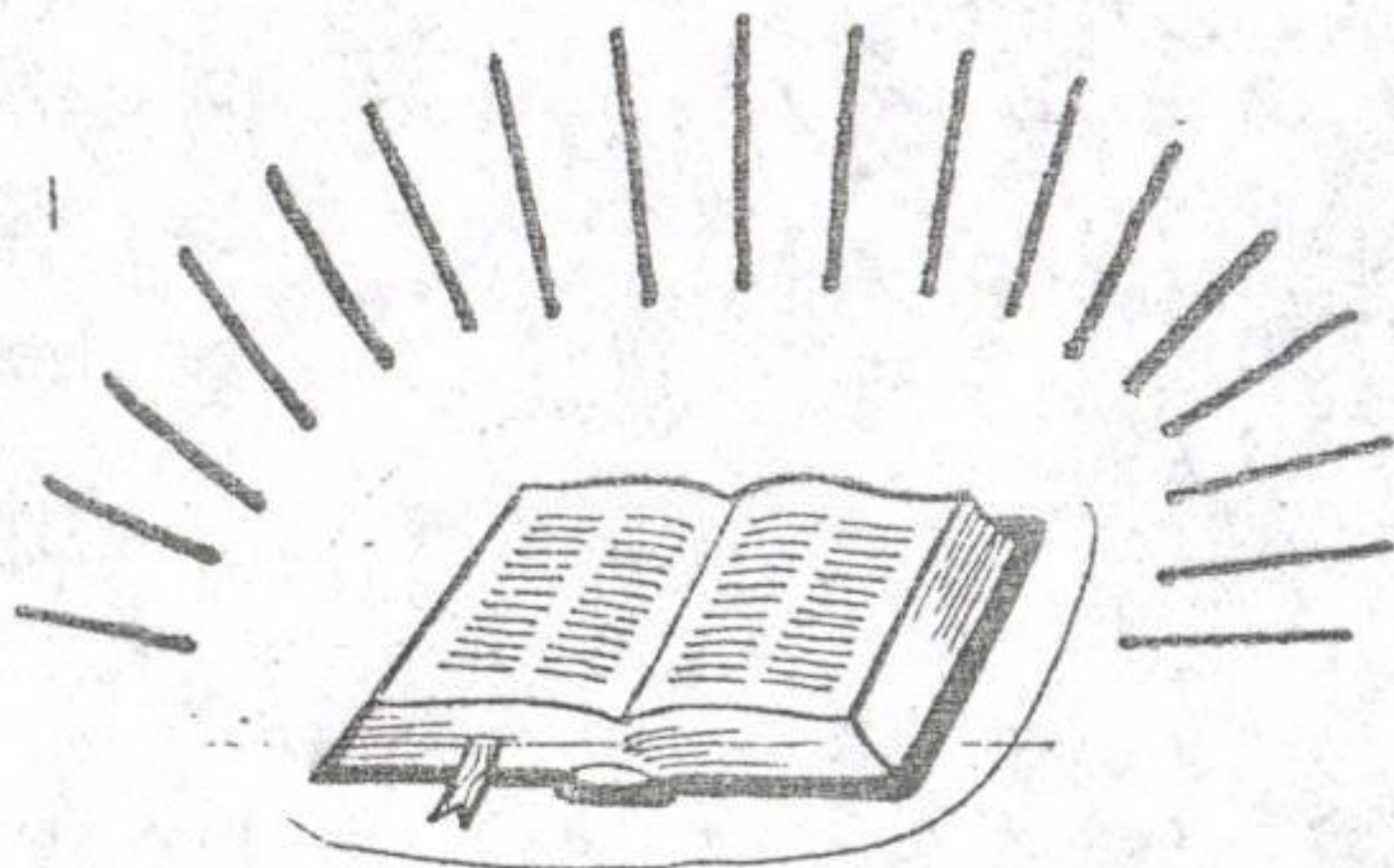

### NOTES FROM THE AUXILLIARY FIRE DEPT.

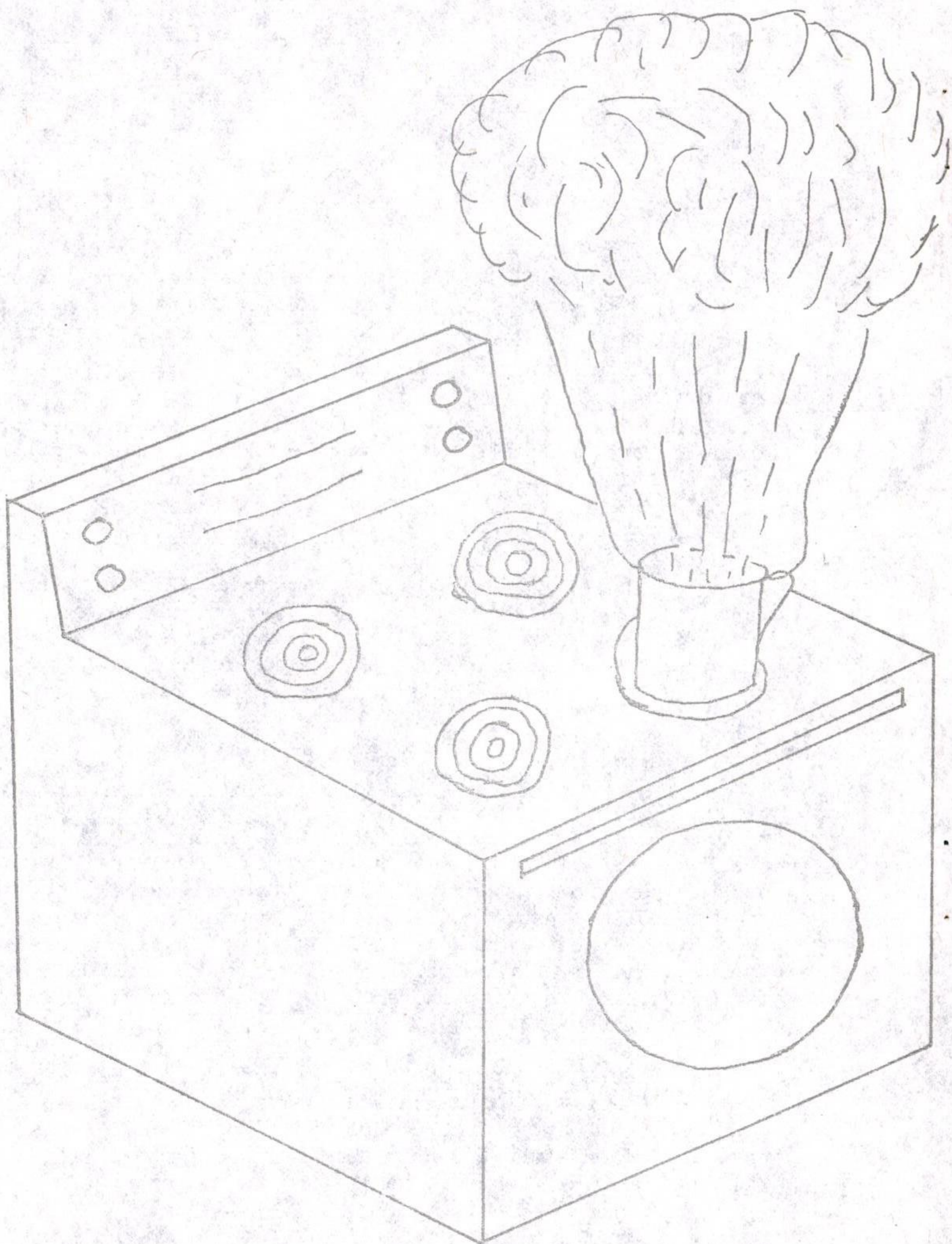

TRANSPORT TRAFFIC LAND MAINT. SUPPLY

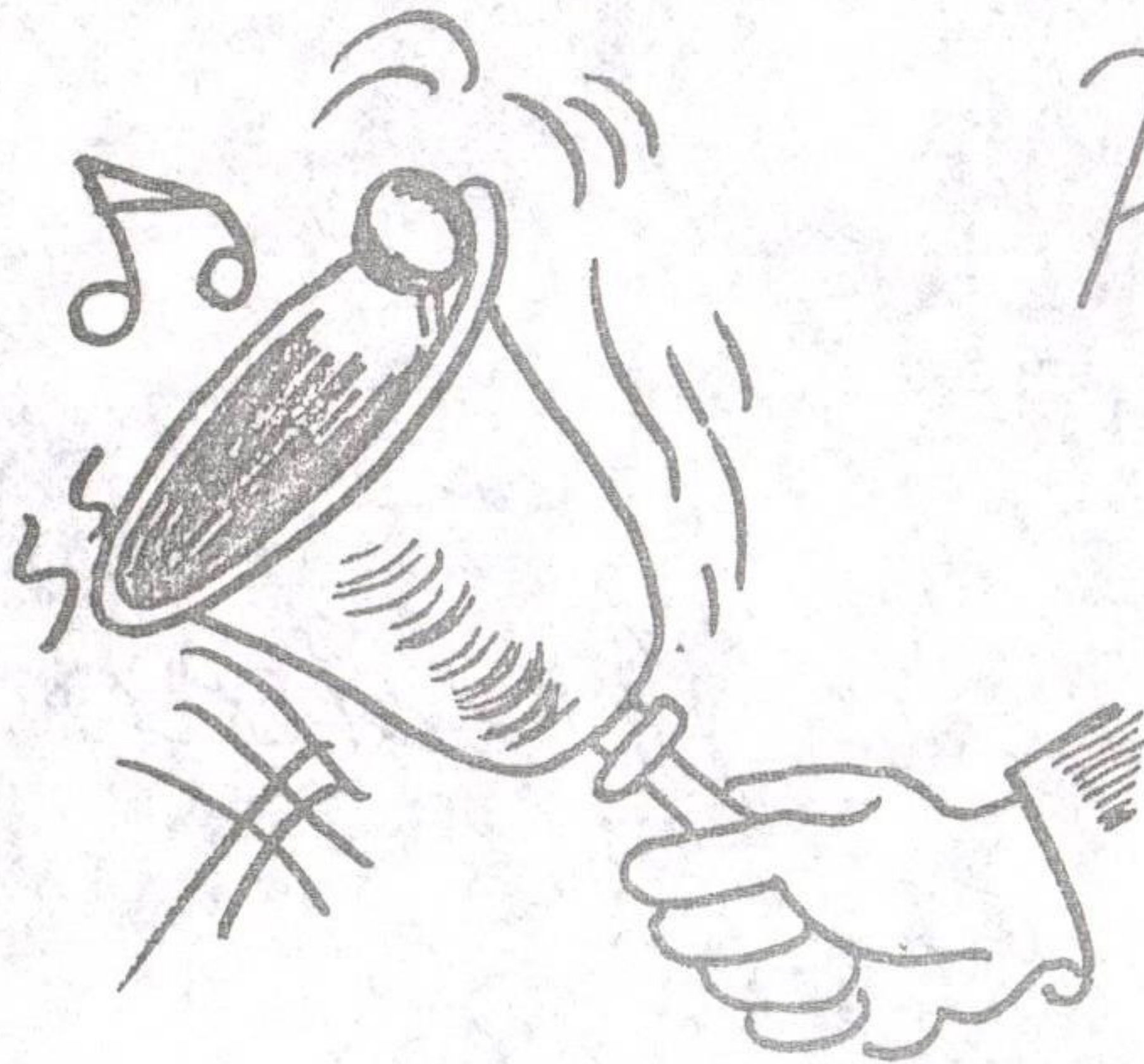

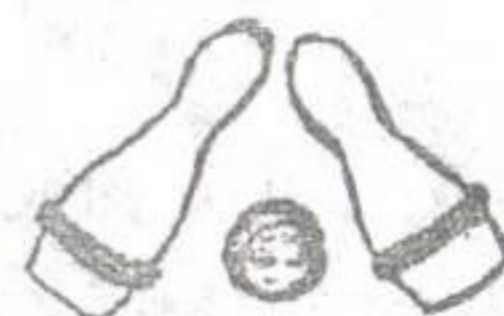
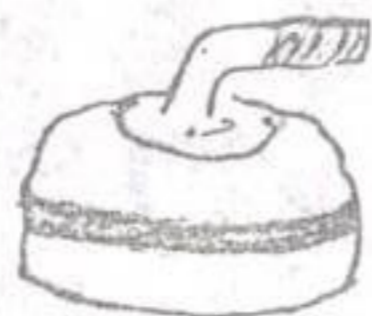
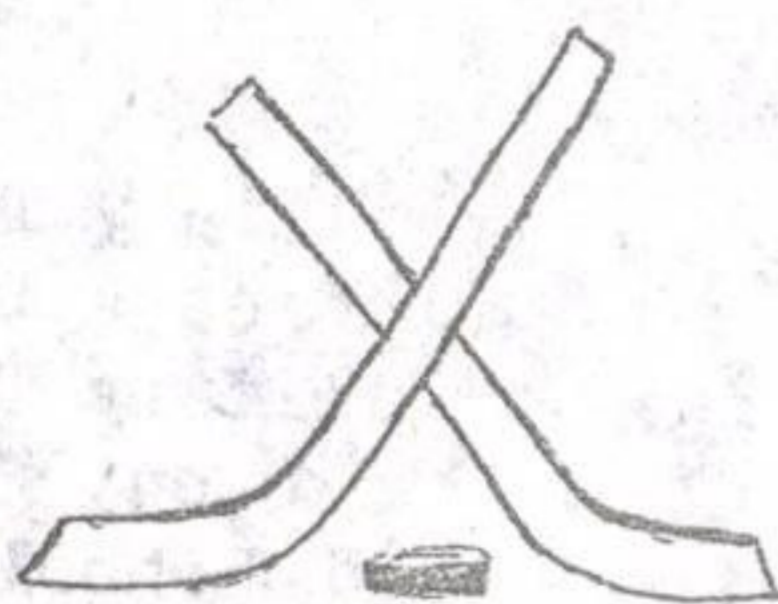
### NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY

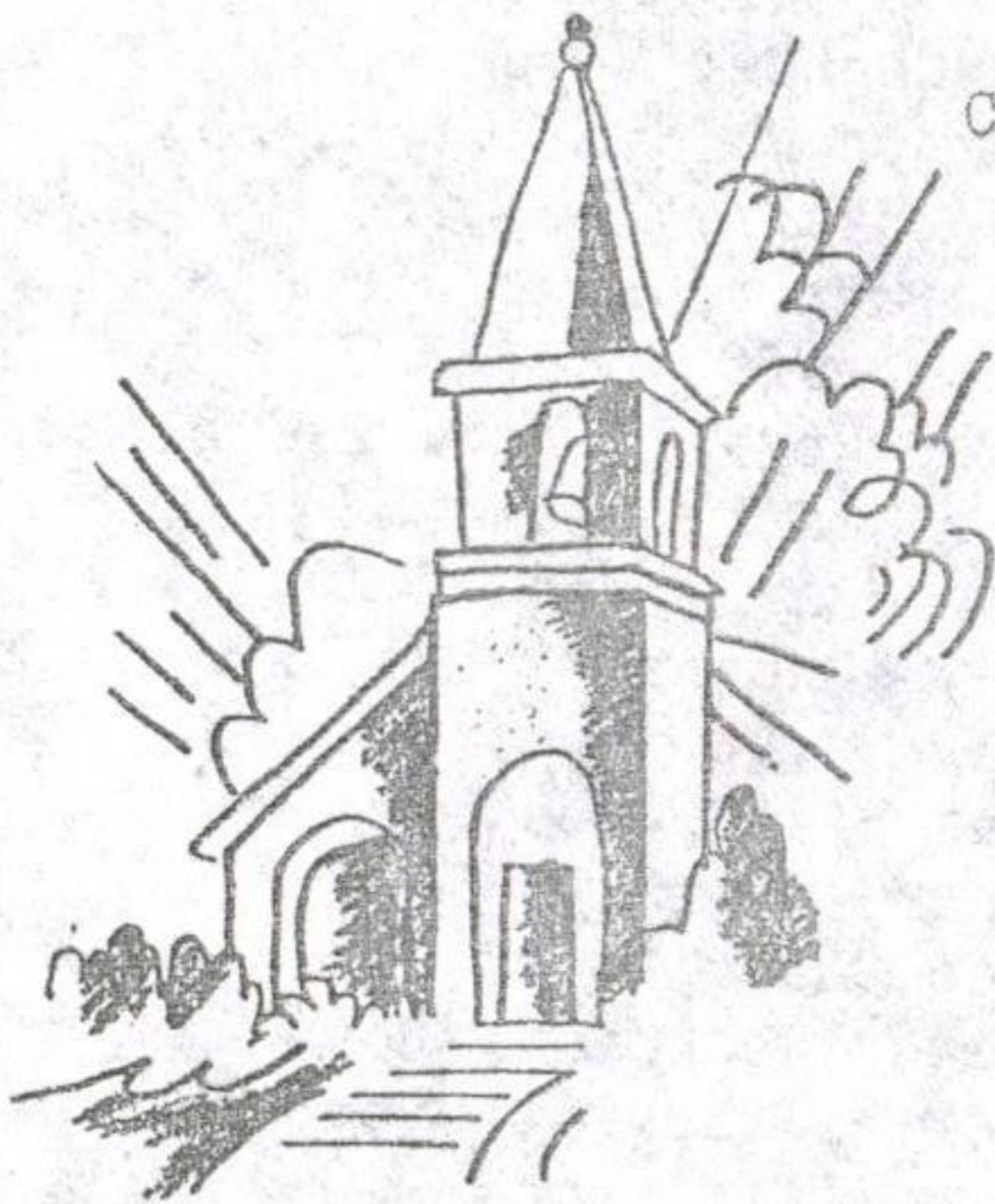

## FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50. to \$500. are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100. per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
