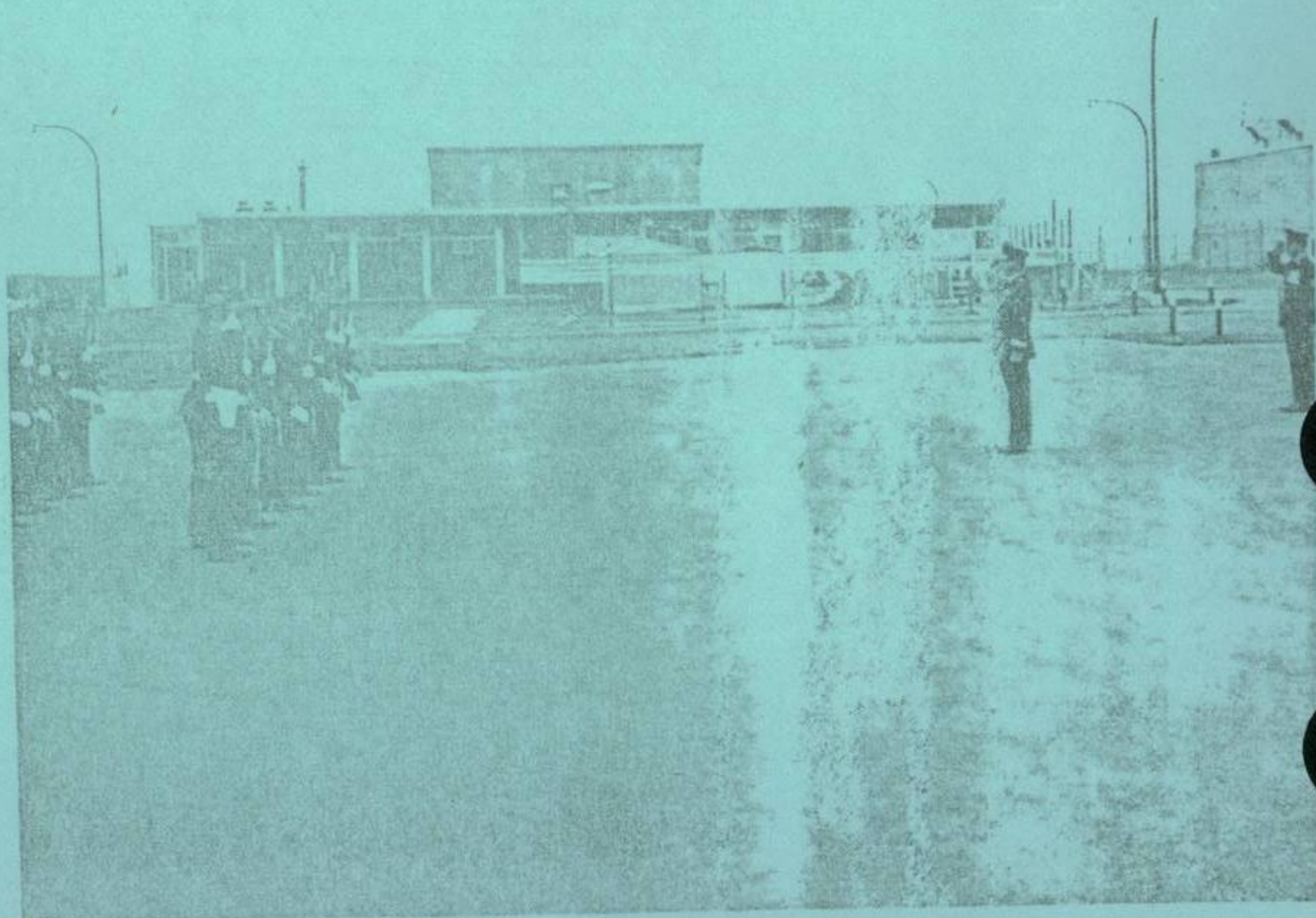
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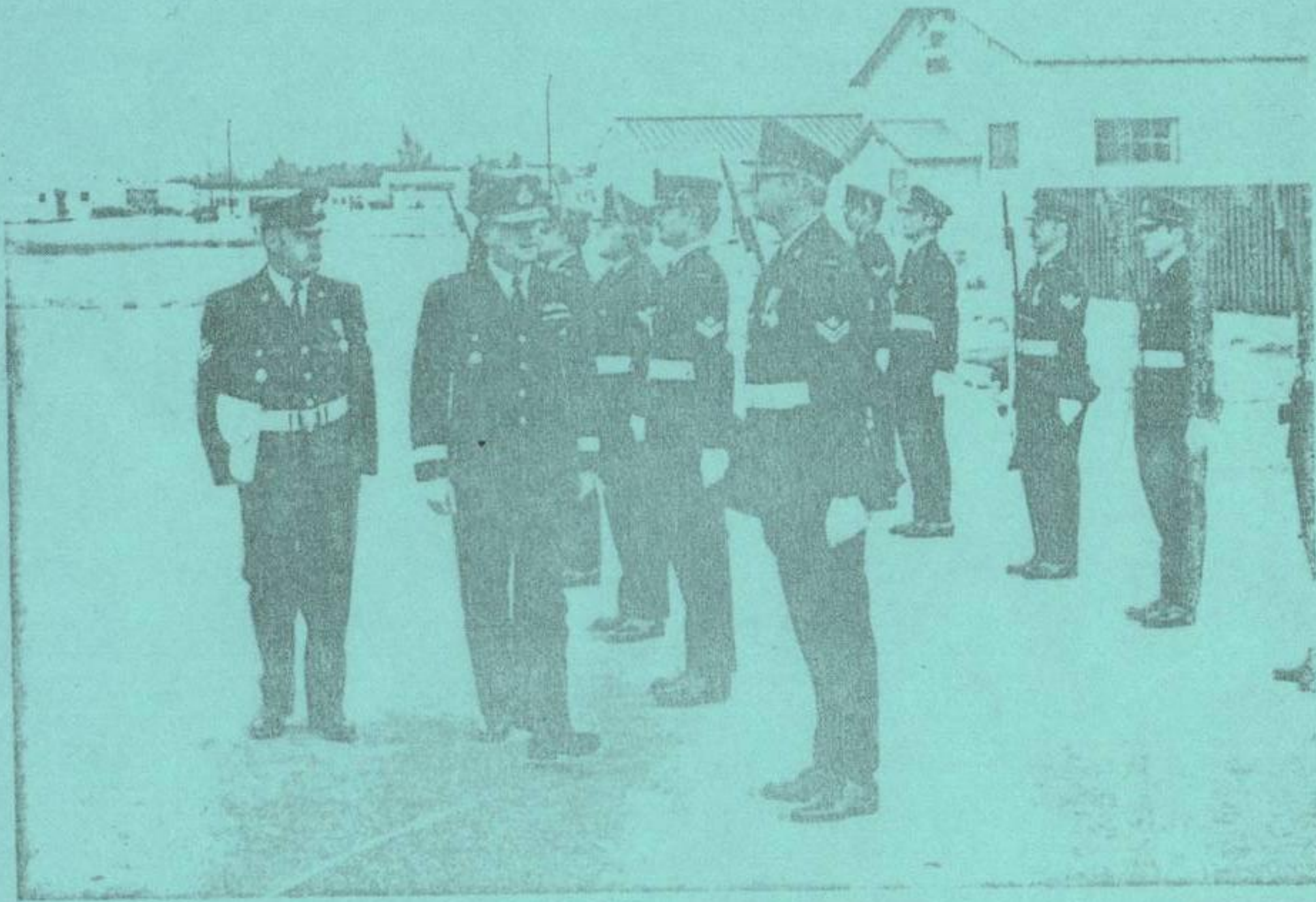

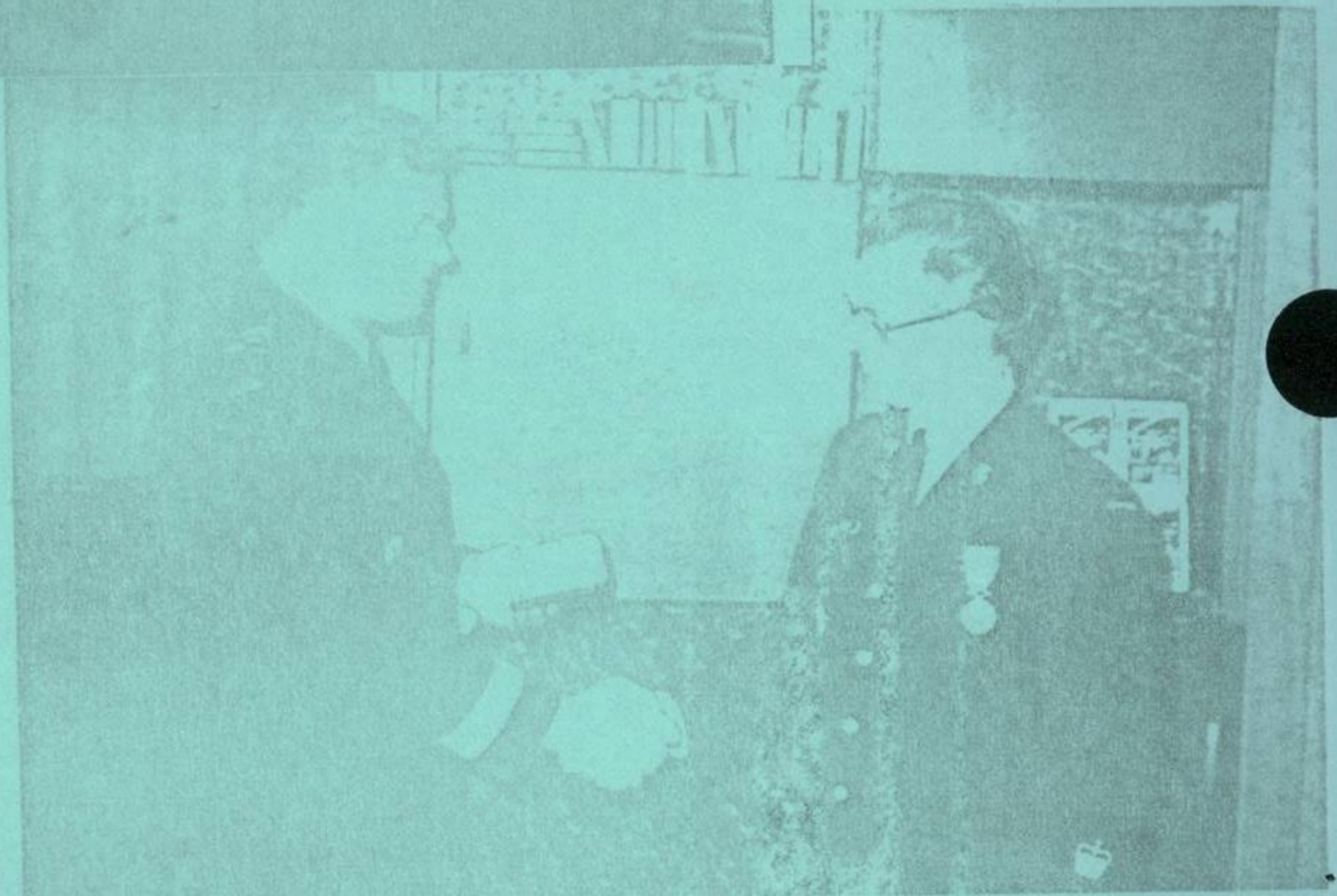

FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

CYPRUS ROTATION-- OTTAWA -- After six months of United Nations peacekeeping duty in Cyprus, the 3rd Battalion, Royal 22E Regiment of CFB Valcartier, Que. will return to Canada between Oct. 3-5. The "Vandoos" are commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel Michel Matte of Sorel, Que.

Replacing them are 290 Officers and men of the Lord Strathcomas Horse (Royal Canadians) (LDSH (RC) based at Calgary, augmented by 126 troops from 3rd Regiment, Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, CFB S. Ile, Man. Lt-Col. Ian McNabb of St. Thomas, Ont. Commanding Officer of LDSH (RC), will command the force. Aircommands 437 Transport Squadron based at CFB Trenton, Ont. , will fly the replacement personnel and equipment to Cyprus and bring home the "Vandoos".

This Cyprus personnel rotation is the 32nd to take place since Canadian troops began serving there in March, 1964.

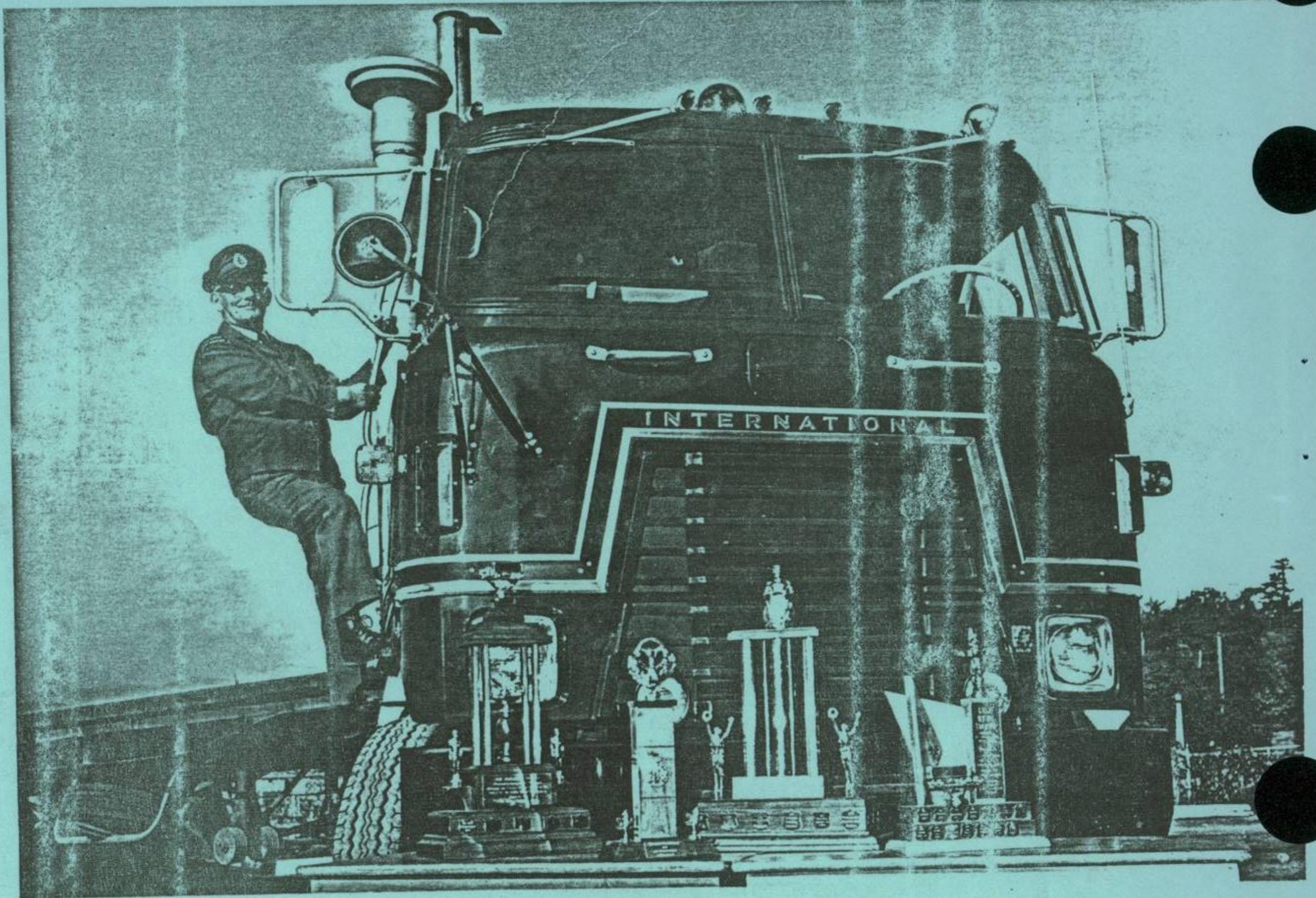
ANNUAL CONFERENCE UPCOMING -- OTTAWA-- The Military Christian Fellowship of Canada (MCF), a non-denominational group dedicated to sharing Christ in the military community, will hold its annual conference in Ottawa November 9-11. With a total membership of over 800 the MCF expects about 100 people, both military and interested civilians to attend with their families.

The conference, which has taken place in Ottawa for the past five years, is aimed at providing members and friends of the MCF the opportunity to get together, share ideas and come to grips with the challenges facing a Christian in the military community. The theme for this year's conference will be "Reaching Out".

Activities get underway formally on Friday evening, November 9, at the chapels of CFB Ottawa (South). They continue Saturday, ending with a banquet what evening at the Rockcliffe combined mess. And of course the attendees will be at the CFB Ottawa chapels Sunday morning. A full program has also been scheduled for children for both Friday and Saturday.

A moderate conference fee covers lunch and banquet on Saturday as well as all coffee breaks. Accommodations will be arranged through a system of billets with Ottawa-based members.

ONE MORE TIME! -- VICTORIA -- Gordie "Rodeo" Smith, 57, of the CFB Esquimalt Transport Section, has done it again -- he's the 1979 National Truckers' Rodeo tractor-trailer driver champion, won the 15th of September in Truro, Nova Scotia.

Gordie took the title in the most difficult of driver events, the tandem-tandem class (largest of tractor-trailers) which required him to successfully answer difficult driving questions, repair a hidden malfunction and demonstrate his driving skill by manoeuvring the huge tractor-trailer through a delicate obstacle course with only inches to spare.

Gordie, a DND driver for 31 years, advanced to the national competition, representing British Columbia, after winning both the Regional DND Rodeo, May 5th, and the Provincial Truckers' Rodeo held June 10th. He is, however, no stranger to the world of professional driving competition -- as his collection of trophies will testify. Driving a smaller class of vehicle he has won past DND Rodeos in 1956, 58, 59 and 61; placed first in British Columbia Provincial Rodeos in 1952, 53, 54, 55, 57, 71 and 73; and was declared National Champion in his class at Canadian National Rodeos in 1956, 71, and 74.

Gordie Smith is a recognized world-class driver who works very hard in his spare time perfecting his skills to be, as his boss describes him, "the best damned truck driver in Canada."



A MESSAGE FROM THE MASTER GOPHER

Having gone through a full cycle of activities over a period of a year and now starting to see the cycle repeat itself, I think it's appropriate at this time to give a brief accounting of what we've accomplished since the end of summer 1978. In making this review I'd like to refer to the station priorities which I set at that time. They were operational commitments, quality of life and community relations.

From an operational point of view we've done very well. The availability and performance of our radar and communications equipment has been very good despite the conversion to commercial electrical power and the many problems associated with it. This unit single-handedly resolved the technical and procedural problems of the conversion, and the reports we voluntarily submitted now provide some real guidance to other units so that their power conversions can take place smoothly. Another major technical undertaking, the height finder conversion, was another feather in our cap. The height section, plus good support from other sections such as the R&M shop, carried through this major project with little outside help. We truly impressed the experts from higher headquarters on this one by successfully completing work considered well beyond normal radar site's capabilities. These two major accomplishments plus the well above average performances during the Op Eval last fall and the recent C&E staff visit certainly indicates to me that our ops site people are not only very competent but also very dedicated.

The key to good operations is good support, as all of us down at the domestic site will attest to. Indeed our ops site has been given very good support. A recent admin staff visit verified that the Admin branch and Canex give us very good service. What would we do without that great kitchen staff who turn out excellent food and are always willing to put in that extra time for special wants? Another example is our transportation section who are always there when we need them plus the excellent record they achieved during their inspection visit. The good examples go on and include supply, financial, medical and CE support. It's clear to me that the support end does its fair share.

On the quality of life priority I have to admit some set-backs due to financial constraints but overall we've done pretty well. Most of our community organizations have been strengthened over the past year and are in good financial shape. Hard and tangible improvements which you can see are

this newspaper, on-going gym improvements, automatic pinsetters in the bowling alley, improved Canex operations, weekly drycleaning service, expanded chaplain services, new windows in ten PMQ's and some very successful social events. Soon to see improvements are air conditioning of the Canex store for next summer's shopping comfort and to cut down refrigerator losses, and day time barber service at least once a week. As you can see we are surviving without great hardship and we will strive for continuing improvements.

The third priority of community relations has pretty well taken care of itself. I rely mostly on our social and recreation activities, which we share with our civilian friends, to promote a spirit of friendship and cooperation. In addition to this is our daily contacts which should reflect a feeling of mutual respect. I've heard of no major problems with this priority and hope for a continuing awareness of its importance.

Although we've accomplished a great deal and can justly be proud of ourselves. I'd like to point out that there are still a lot of improvements that need to be made. In trying to encourage continuing improvements, I worry about seeing the same people always doing the extra work and coming up with the new ideas. I worry about growing apathy and the attitude of some to expect more without doing more. I also worry about the attitude of quite a few who let things happen rather than make things happen. I think it's pretty obvious that our success, happiness and satisfaction depend a good deal on a team effort. Are you doing your share?

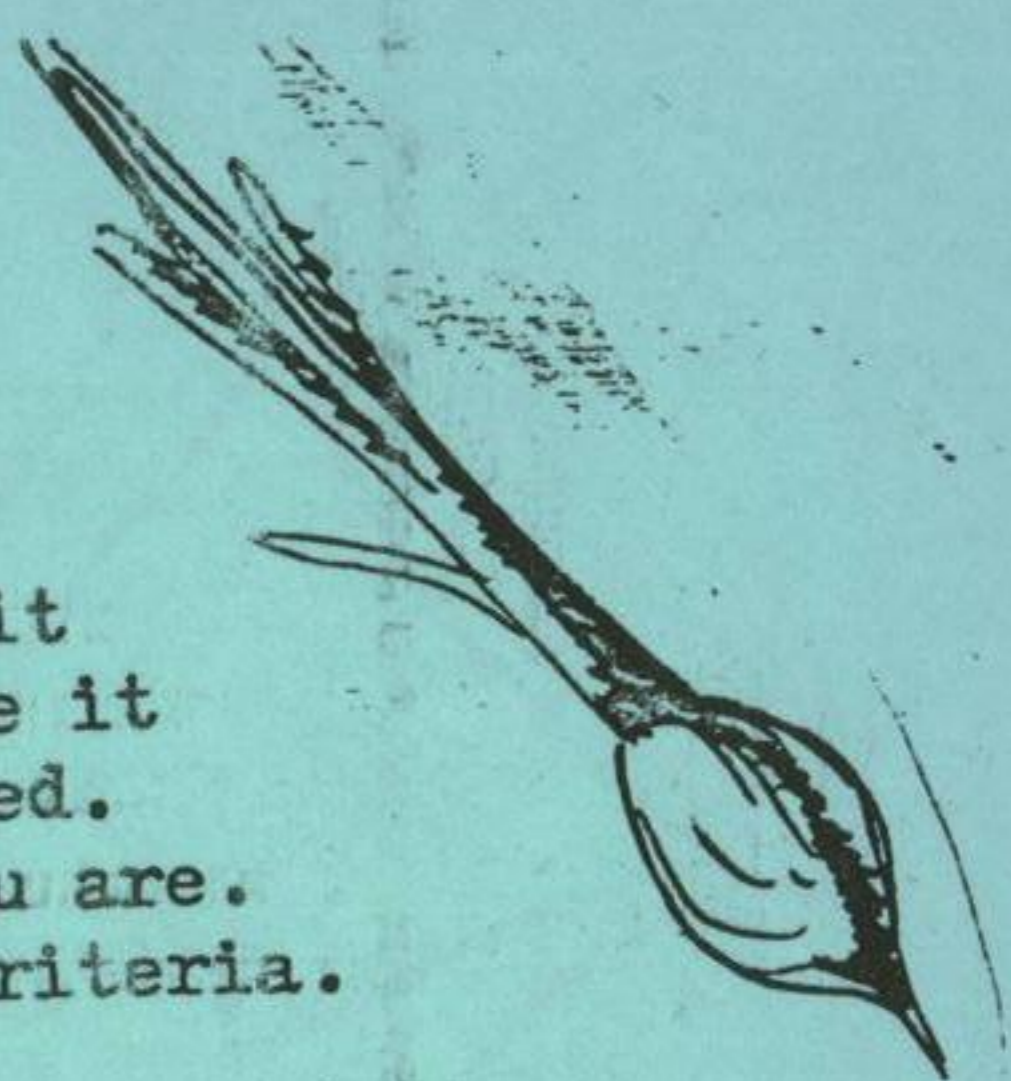

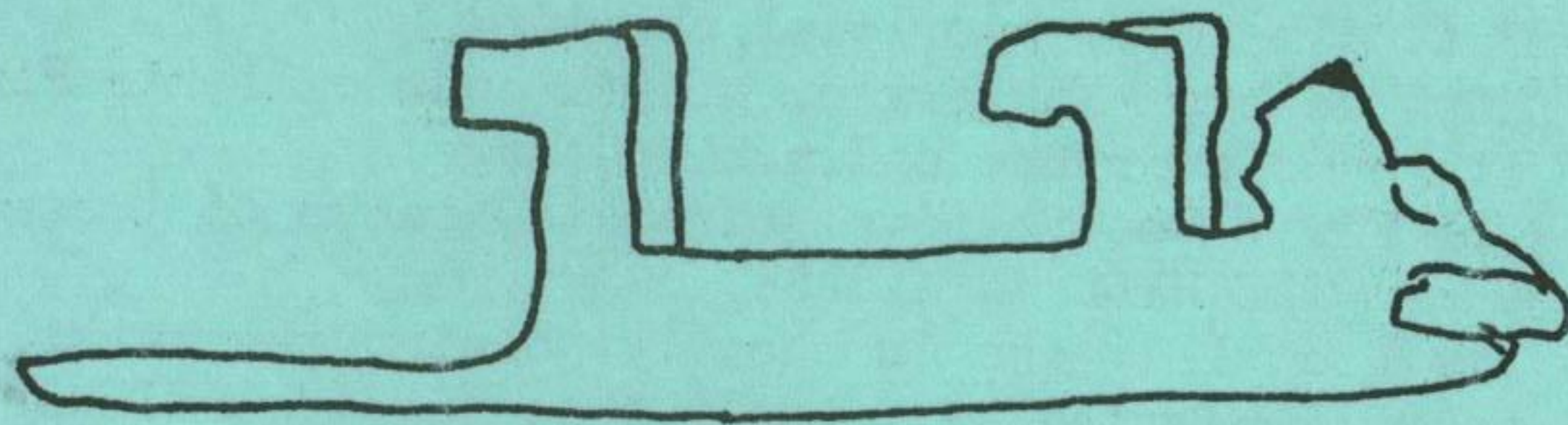

Gwen Hornsby is now operating at the Cut N Curl Corner on Tuesdays 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Call 2622 for appointments.

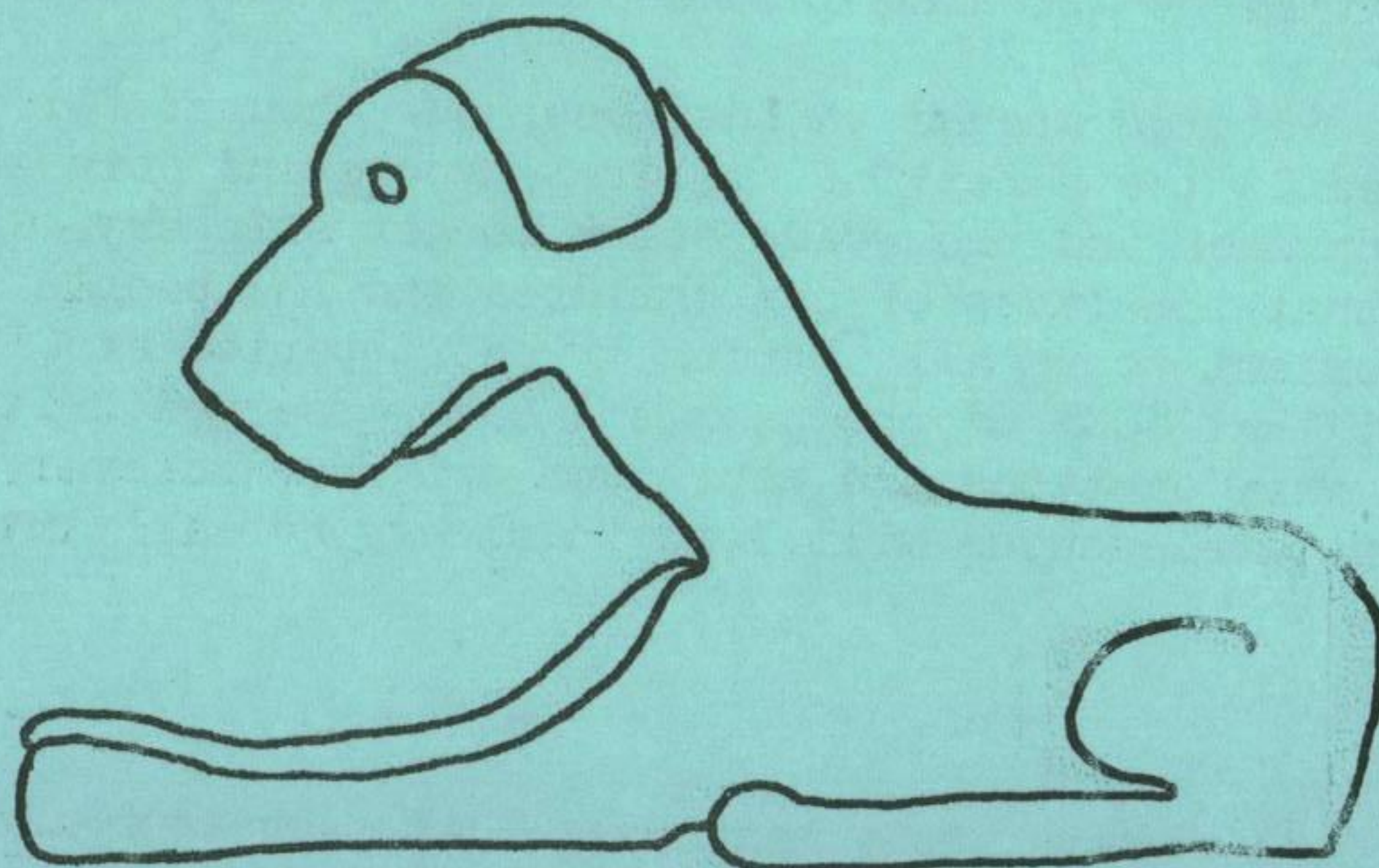



FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).
2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50. to \$500. are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.
3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100. per year or approximately 5½% simple interest.
4. Any regular member on leave, TD, etc. away from his home unit may apply to the unit nearest him for an emergency loan.
5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
6. Applications for CFSLP small loans, Distress/Benevolent Fund Assistance, or Benevolent/Financial counselling committee:

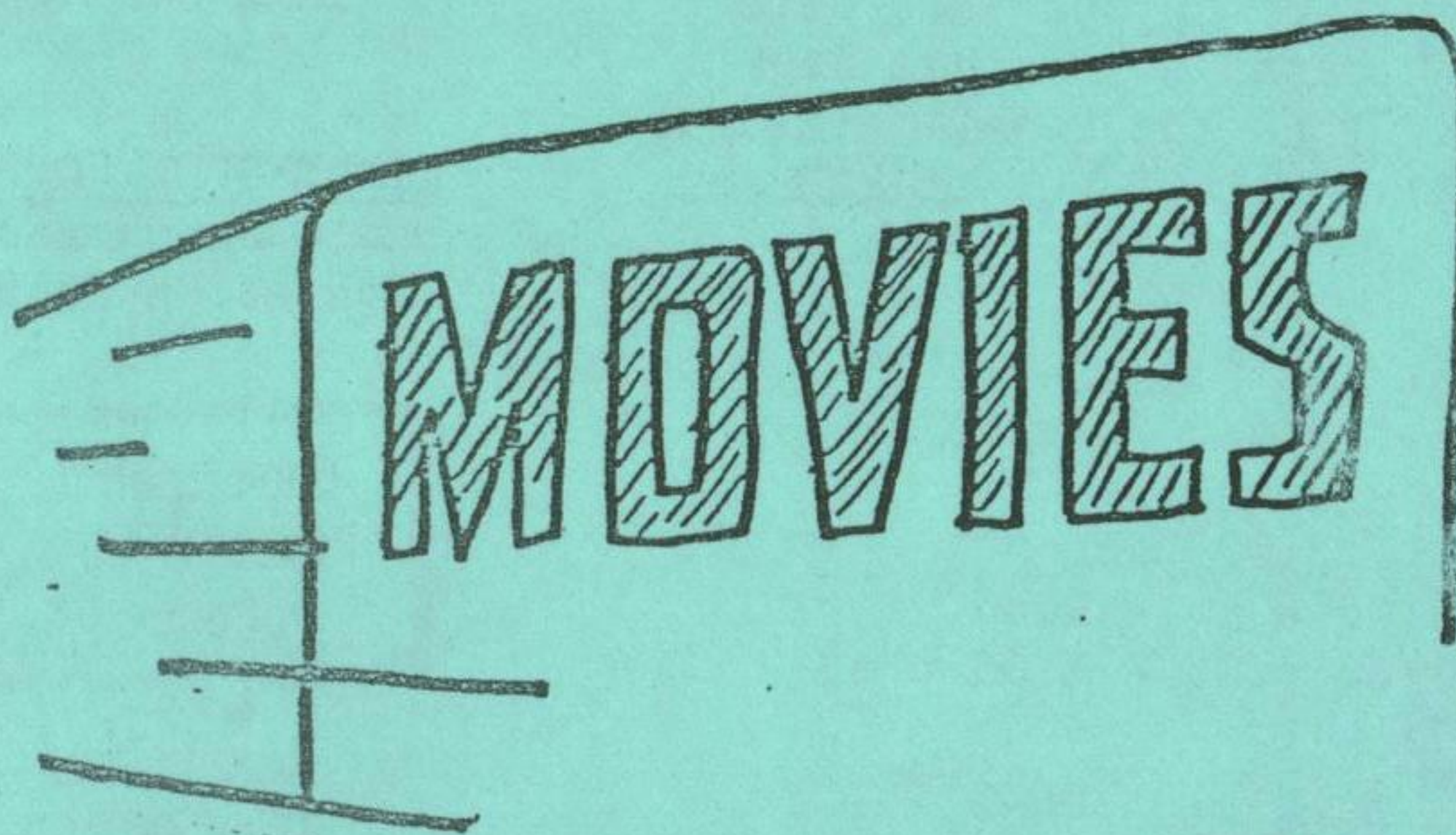
