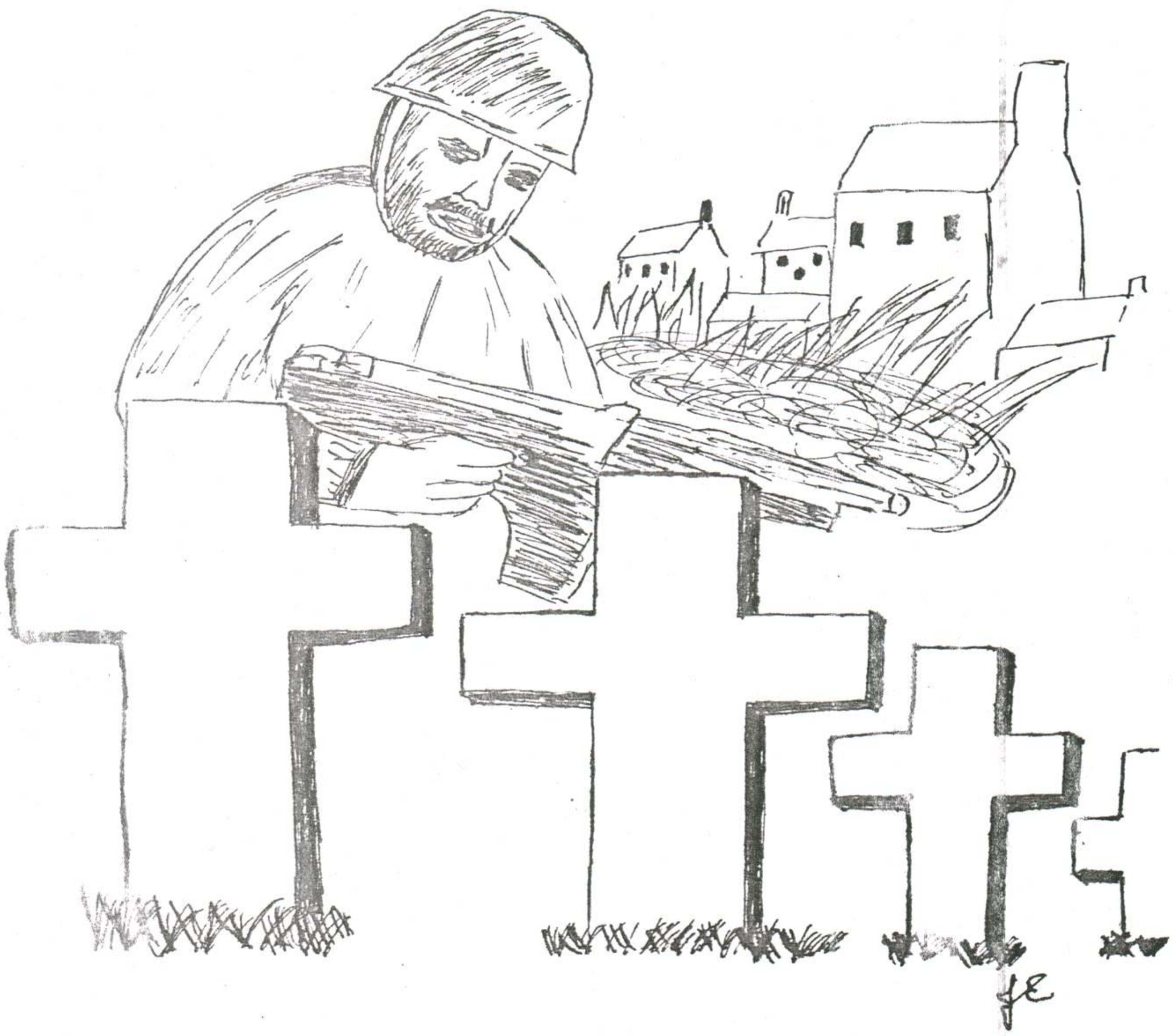

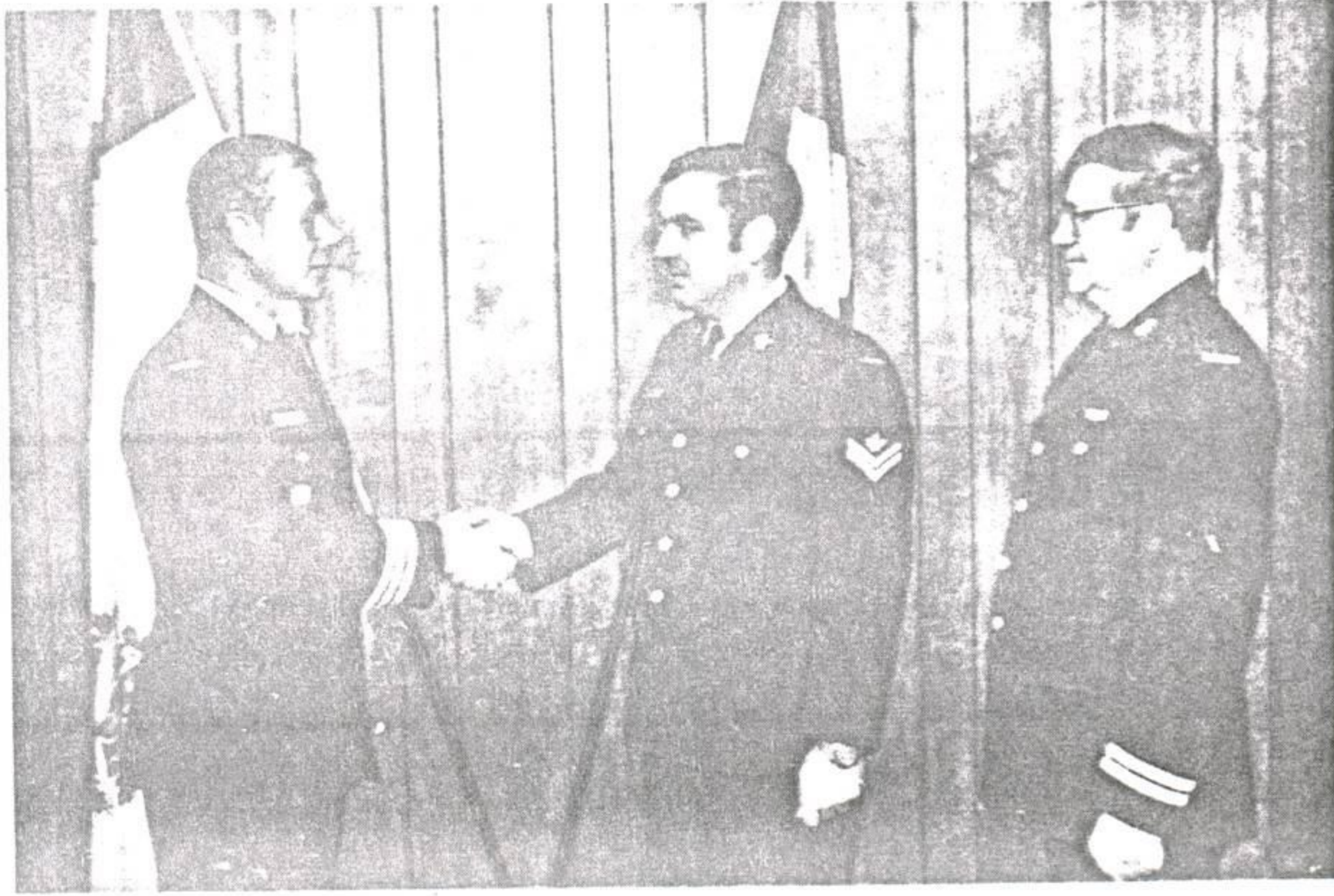

GOOD PUBLIC RELATIONS -- The WO & Sgts. Mess was recently the scene of the presentation of a plaque and hockey stick to Sgt. Carson Woodman as a memento of his selection as Coach of the Year of the Alsask Stampeders for the 1978 - 79 hockey season. Those participating in the awards event were LCol. L.E. Novakowski; Mayor Ted Plato of Alsask; Sgt. Jim Lowe, Mayor of Tumbleweed Park, CFS Alsask; Rod Stauble, Manager of the Alsask Hockey Arena; WO Al Ward, PMC of the WO & Sgts. Mess; Ted Lewis, father of Dave Lewis of the New York Islanders; and Tim McBride, convener and donator of the plaque. Gordon Denny acted as Master of Ceremonies and did a masterful job, given such a short time to prepare for the event. It is the hope of all hockey enthusiasts of the Alsask district and CFS Alsask that this ceremony become an annual event.

WO Ward gave the opening speech and Mayor Plato praised Sgt. Woodman's participation in molding the Stampeders into such a formidable team. Similar speeches were made by LCol. Novakowski, Sgt. Lowe, Mr. Stauble, and Mr. Lewis, who presented the plaque on behalf of the Islanders, the sponsor of trophies for Minor League achievements. Mr. McBride presented a hockey stick on behalf of Mayor Richard Reichert, President of the Marengo Memorial Arena, and brought the Mayor's greetings. He also introduced Ted Lewis, mentioning that the jacket that Ted was wearing was presented to him by the N.H.L.'s Coach of the Year, Al Arbour of the Islanders, and that Ted's son, Dave, has signed a 5-year contract with the Islanders and will be playing with Denis Potvin, the N.H.L.'s outstanding defenceman of the 1978 - 79 season.

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FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

CBC TO AIR REMEMBRANCE DAY SPECIAL -- Ottawa (CFP) -- A Remembrance Day special on Operation Jubilee, the frontal assault on the French town of Dieppe in 1942, will be aired this weekend on the CBC-TV network.

"Dieppe 1942", which focuses on one of Canada's most traumatic events of the Second World War, will be telecast in two 90-minute film segments on Sunday, Nov. 11 and Monday, Nov. 12 at 9:30 p.m. Part 1 is subtitled The Battle Begins; Part 2, Echoes of Disaster.

In this CBC-TV special documenting the battle and its aftermath, survivors of the raid recall the part they played in the attack. Canadian, British, German and American veterans revisiting Dieppe describe their part in the events. Among the Canadian veterans appearing in the film are Brig.-Gen. Dollard Menard, the most senior surviving officer, and Senator John Godfrey who flew a Royal Canadian Air Force Spitfire in the Dieppe action.

Brereton Greenhous, senior historian at the Directorate of History in Ottawa says that "the films treat the idea of fighting to one's death in a sober, realistic fashion, emphasizing the waste and political futility of war, without sentimental editorializing."

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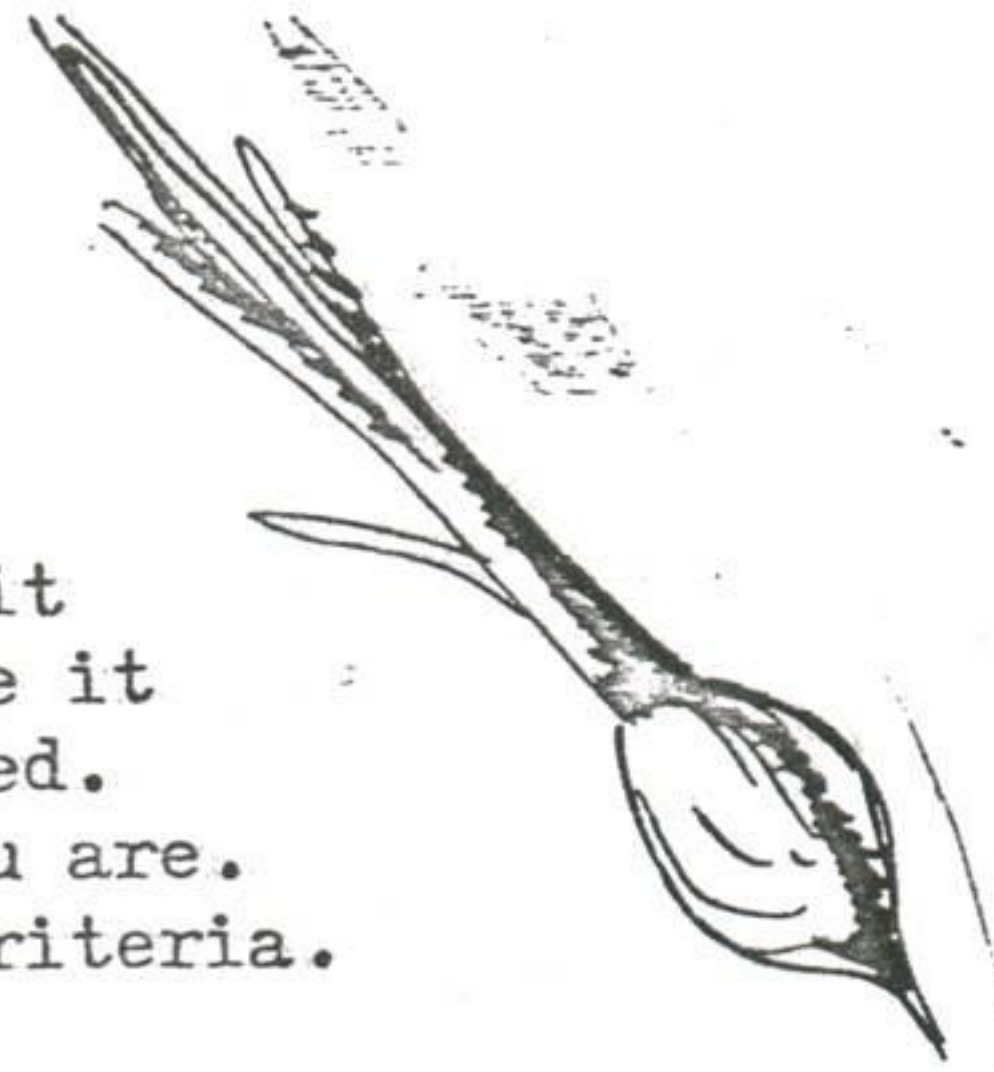
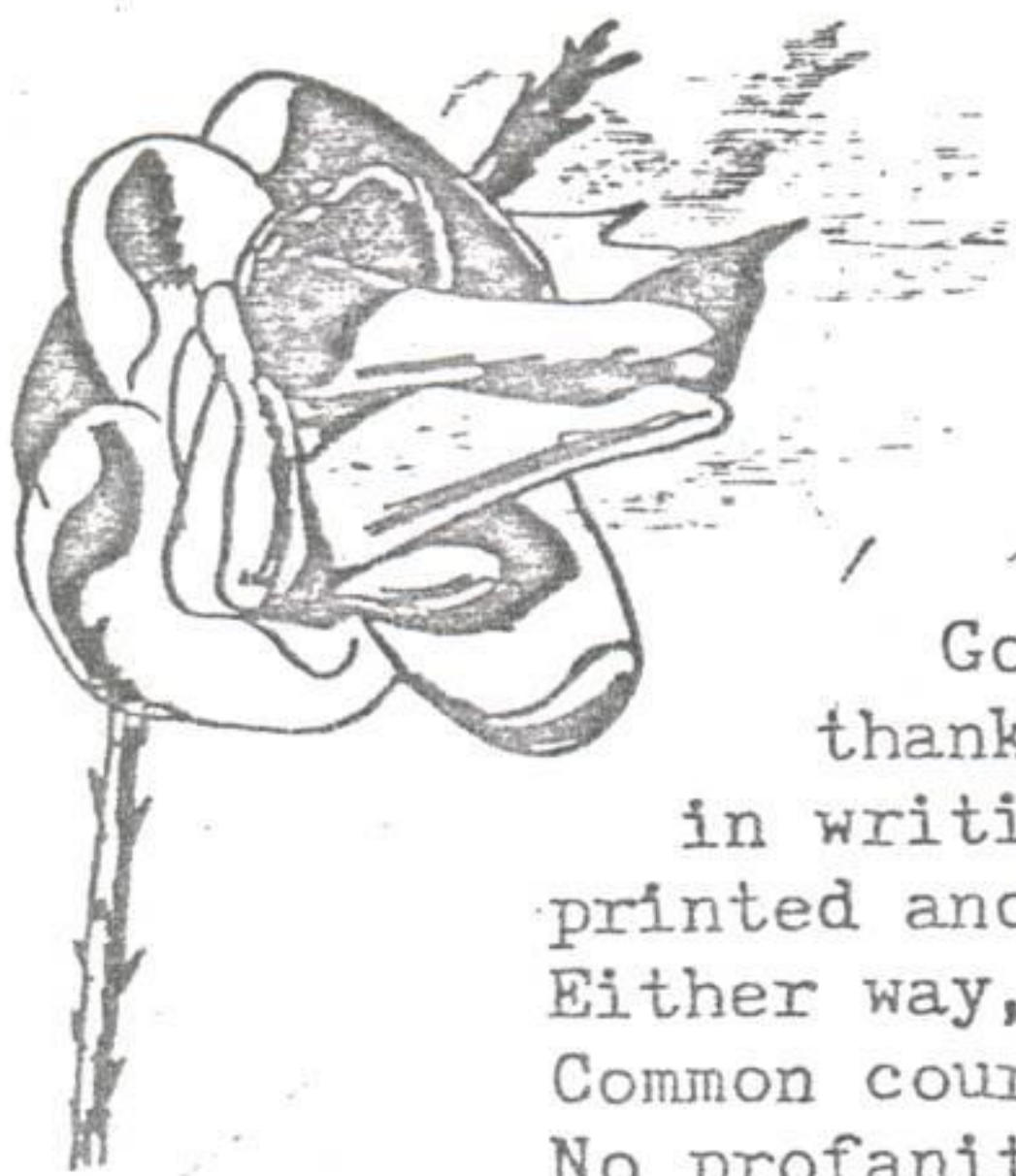

TOTEM TALK

As Old Man Winter slowly takes hold bringing heavier frosts and light snow flurries, we know it will not be long before the ground is blanketed in white for four or five months, at the end of which time we can watch our brown grass turn green.

During the past few weeks, with the frosty mornings its been noticed that a few people still wait til the last minute before they jump into their vehicles and drive to work, peeking through a small hole that they scraped in the frost on their front windshield. This is like peeking through a key hole, and just as dangerous. Hopefully the only thing this person will run into or back into is a cement block, we hope. Unfortunately in most cases it's another vehicle or worse, a person walking along the side of the road with their head down to the wind and cold.

The Saskatchewan Vehicle Act, Section 122 states the following;

- (1) The windshield, and the windows on either side of the compartment containing the steering wheel, of every motor vehicle shall be maintained at all times in such a condition as to ensure a clear view to the operator, and no person shall drive and no owner shall cause or allow to be driven on a public highway a motor vehicle on which the windshield or any such window is not so maintained.
- (2) In brief states - the rear window of every motor which shall be maintained at all times.
- (3) In brief states - Subsection (2) does not apply with respect to a motor vehicle equipped with a mirror or mirrors securely attached and placed in such a position as to afford the operator, otherwise than through the rear window, a clearly reflected view of the roadway in the rear.

The fines for the above traffic violations are:

Operate a Motor Vehicle on a Public Highway:

- (1) With unclear windshield (Side Windows) - \$30.00
- (2) With unclear rear window (when not equipped with side rear view mirrors) - \$20.00

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SPARKY SEZ

Well, here we are into November and Christmas is getting closer all the time.

I'd like to thank all the students at the school for some very good posters and coloring books on fire prevention and congratulations to the students who won the prizes. Hopefully, next year will be as good as this year.

Now to some serious business. As you know, most PMQs have smoke detectors and the rest will be installed shortly. I have taken an article from another base paper and am inserting it here. I think it is very appropriate at this time what with the festive season just around the corner.

Smoke Detectors - The smoke detectors installed in Base MQ's were a big step in the right direction, however, your Base Fire Department suggests that residents consider the purchase of a second detector for ideal protection. We suggest that your smoke detector be powered by batteries, as the detector installed by the Military is electrically powered, and with the addition of a battery powered detector, you have the best of both worlds, batteries and electricity. Although we do not recommend any specific model of smoke detector we do suggest that you follow these guidelines in buying a smoke detector.

Buy only the 9 volt model of battery smoke detector (An add size battery might be very hard to find when replacement time comes around.)

Make sure the detector is U.L.C. or C.S.A. approved.

Operating Principles - Smoke detectors are activated by the earliest signals of combustion. The two basic types of smoke detectors are the "Photo-Electric" type and the "Ionization" type.

The Ionization Detector - The Ionization Detector contains a small radioactive source in a smoke chamber that emits radiation, resulting in a weak flow of electric current. When particles such as ones produced by fire enters the smoke chamber they reduce the current and trigger the alarm.

The Photo-Electric Detector - The Photo-Electric detector contains a chamber with either over-lapping or porous covers which prevent the entrance of outside sources of light but which allow the entry of smoke. The unit contains a light source and a special photosensitive cell in the darkened chamber. The cell and light are positioned within the alarm so that the light beam is interrupted by the smoke or the beam is deflected into the cell.

Testing - Your smoke detector can be tested in one of the following ways:
(Monthly testing and testing after extended absence from home is recommended.)

1. Light a candle or string, immediately extinguish and hold smoldering item immediately below detector, gently blow smoke into unit. This will trigger the alarm.
2. Hold a lighted cigarette immediately below detector and gently blow smoke into unit to trigger the alarm. The detector will automatically reset itself when particles of combustion have been cleared from the chamber.

Maintenance - Smoke alarms should be cleaned periodically (once or twice a year). This can usually be done by gently running the nozzle of a vacuum cleaner over the cover. If the smoke detector is battery operated, replace the battery when it's low; don't just remove it. With no battery, it is powerless to save your life.

REMEMBER - although smoke detectors save lives, they are no substitute for common sense fire prevention.

SINATRA by Arnold Shaw.

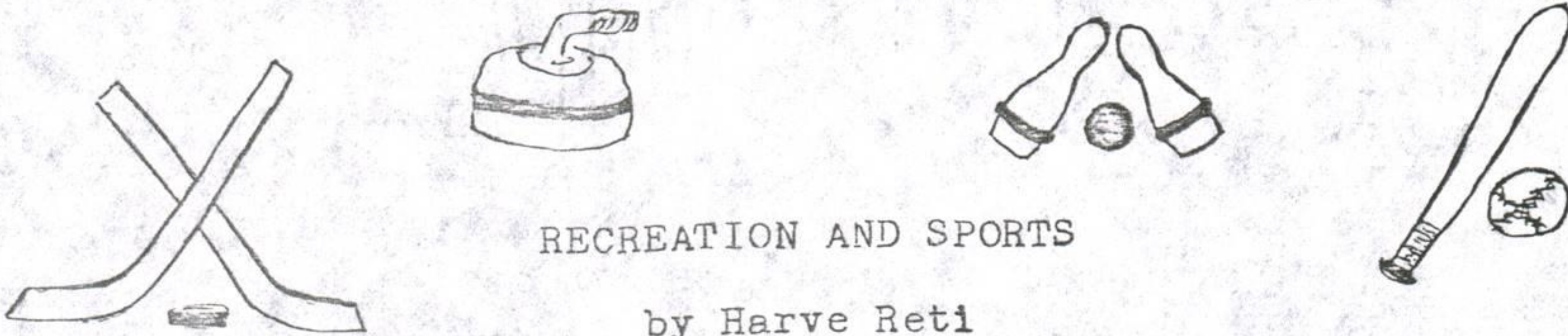
