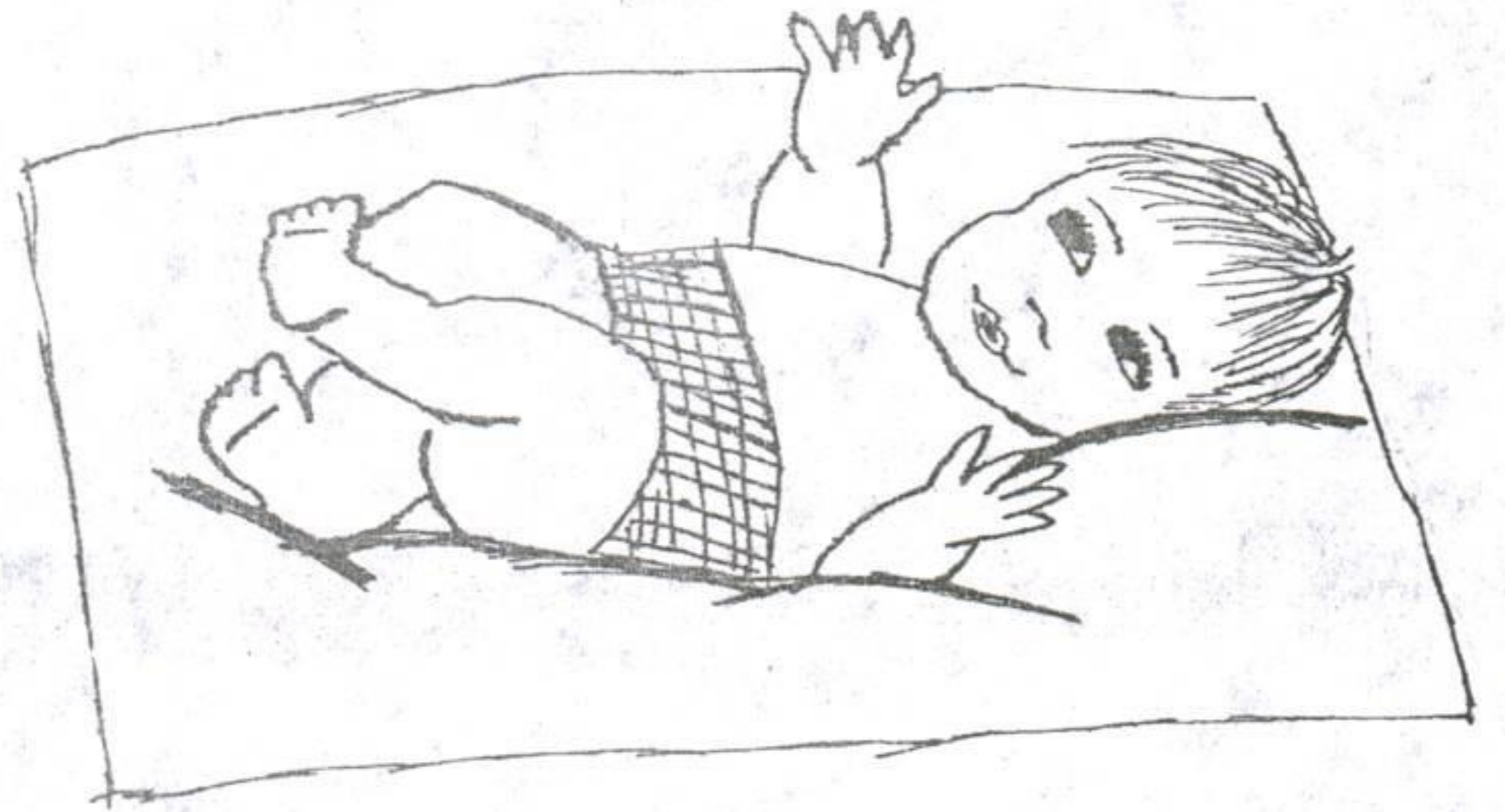

# Radar Base Gets Trees At Alsask.

ALSASK, Sask. (CP) — This lonely NORAD radar post on the Alberta-Saskatchewan border 175 miles west of Saskatoon now has four trees.

The trees, a gift from General John Gerhardt, USAF, commander-in-chief of NORAD in Colorado Springs, Col., were presented to Wing Commander Hugh Spectre of the RCAF by USAF Col. Robert Greig in ceremonies at the post Tuesday.

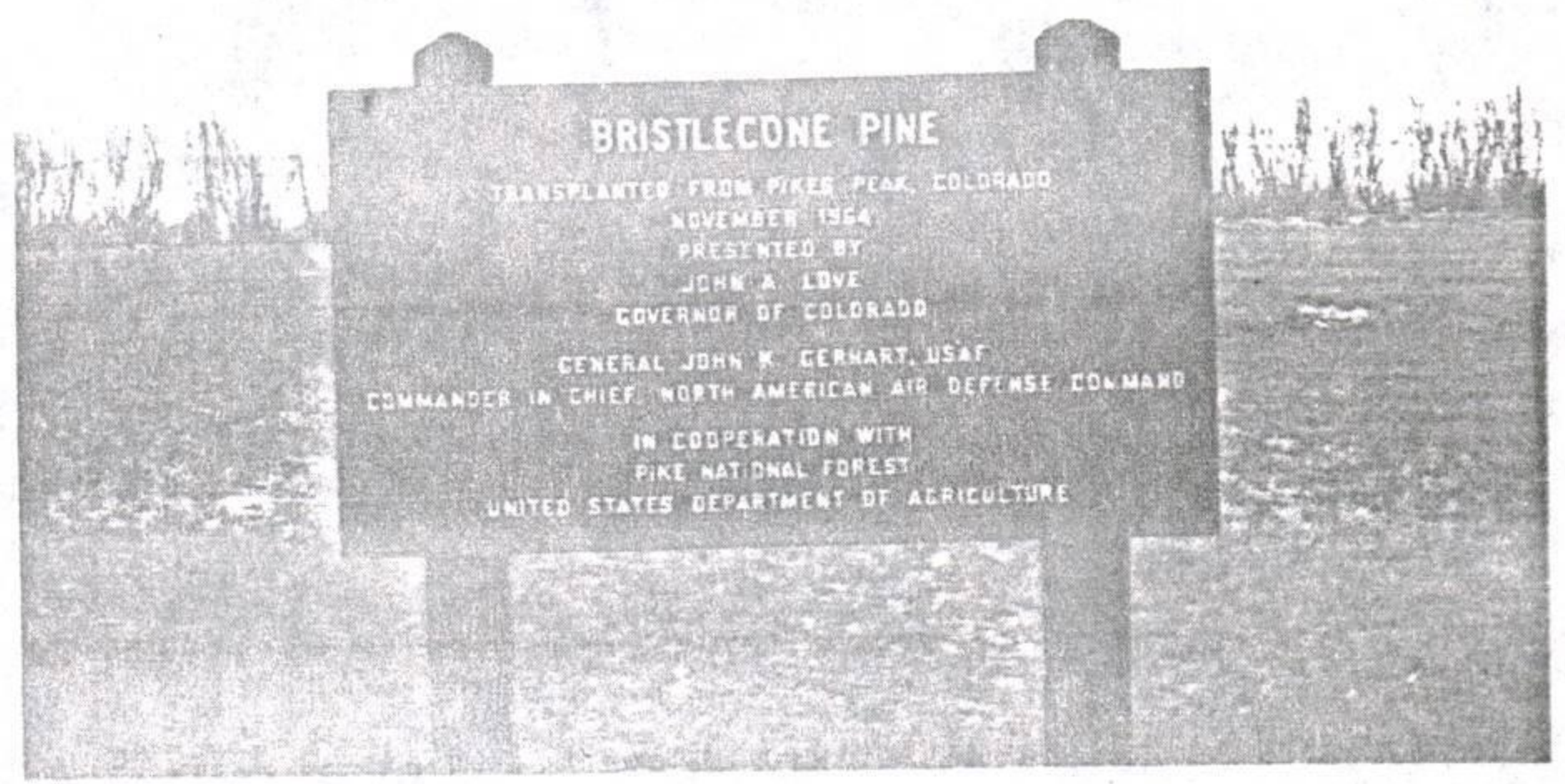
While on a visit to the two-year-old base, the general noticed there were no trees to be found anywhere and decided to do something about it.

Together with Governor John Love, of Colorado, and U.S. Forestry Branch he had four bristlecone pine trees sent to Alsask from Pike National Park, Col.

Bristlecone pine, thought to be the oldest living thing on earth, are said to be the hardest type tree and will grow anywhere.

Two trees presented Tuesday are more than 40 years old and stand five feet tall. The other two were smaller younger trees.

Alas, a unit of the Great Falls Air Defence Sector of NORAD, is a barren outpost and has little growth. Staff of the base now are putting in rows of trees to be used as a windbreak and to beautify the site.

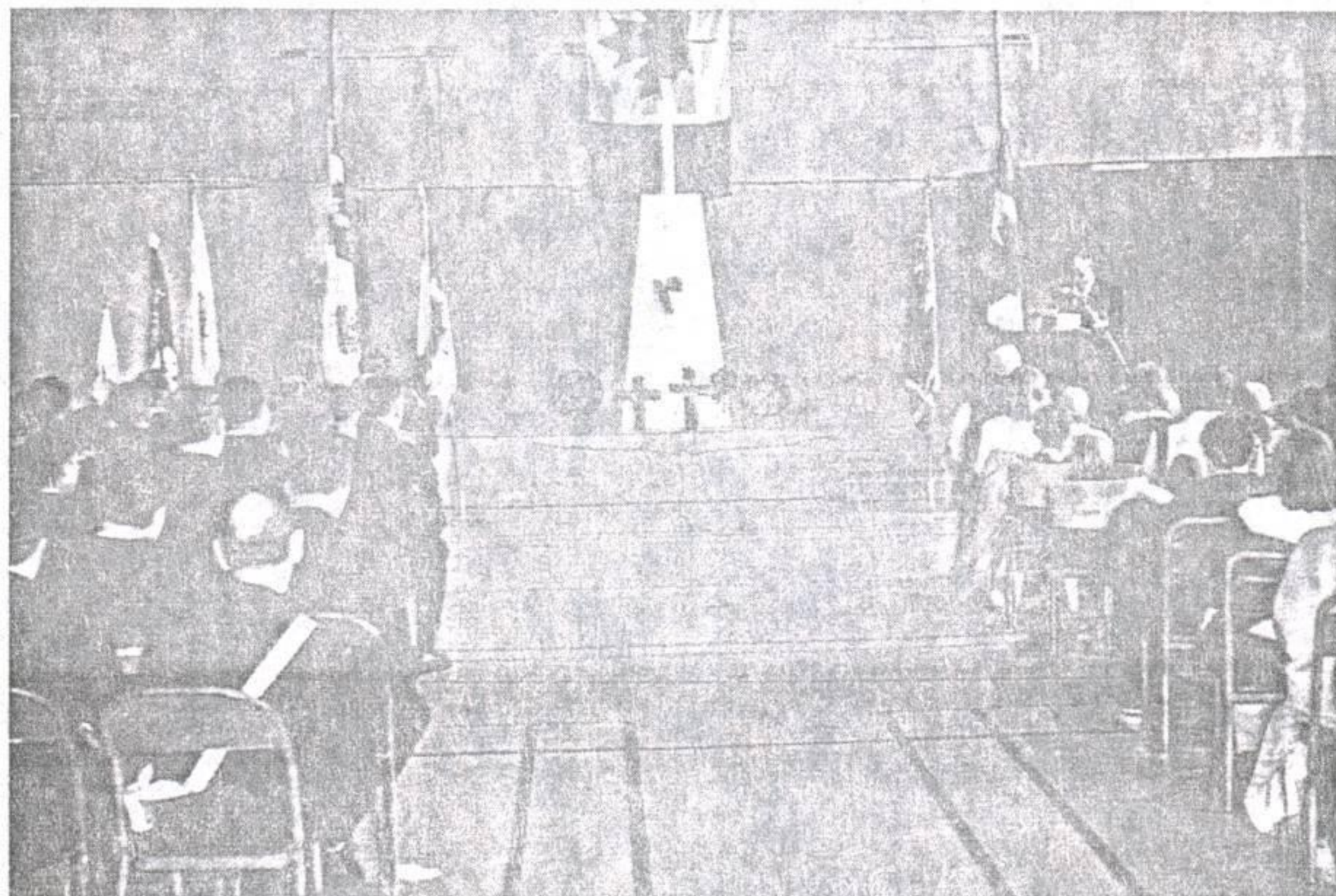

A MESSAGE FROM THE MASTER GOPHER

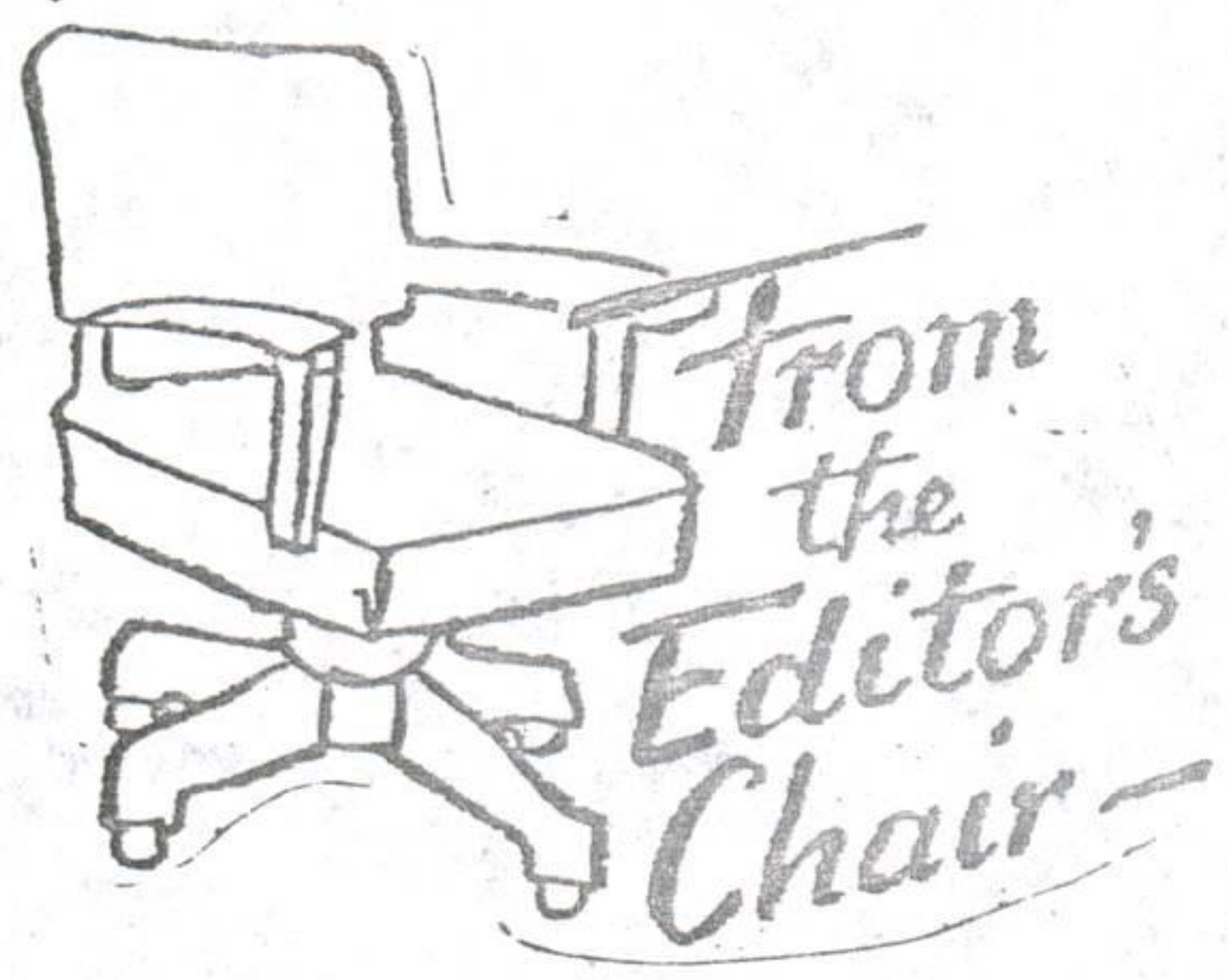

Please, stop and smell the flowers.

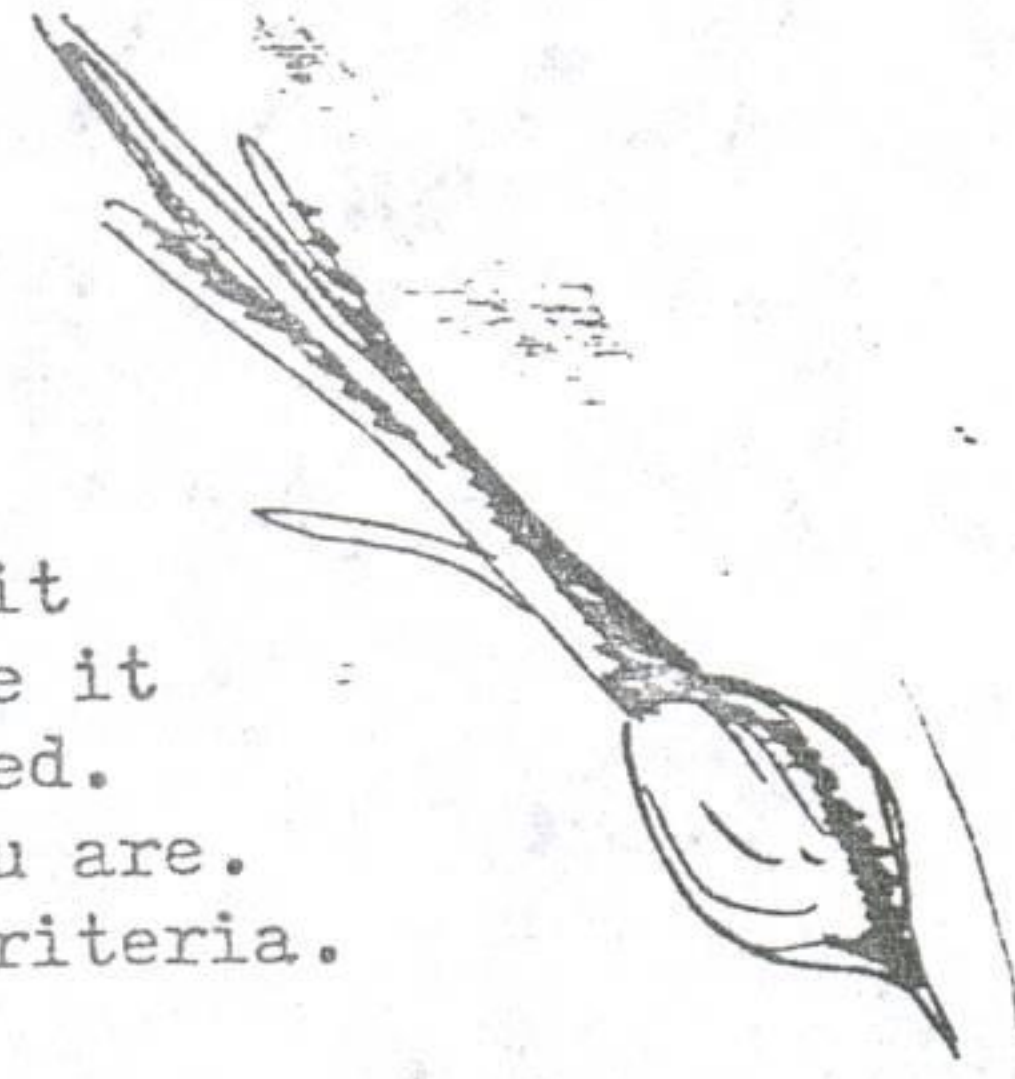
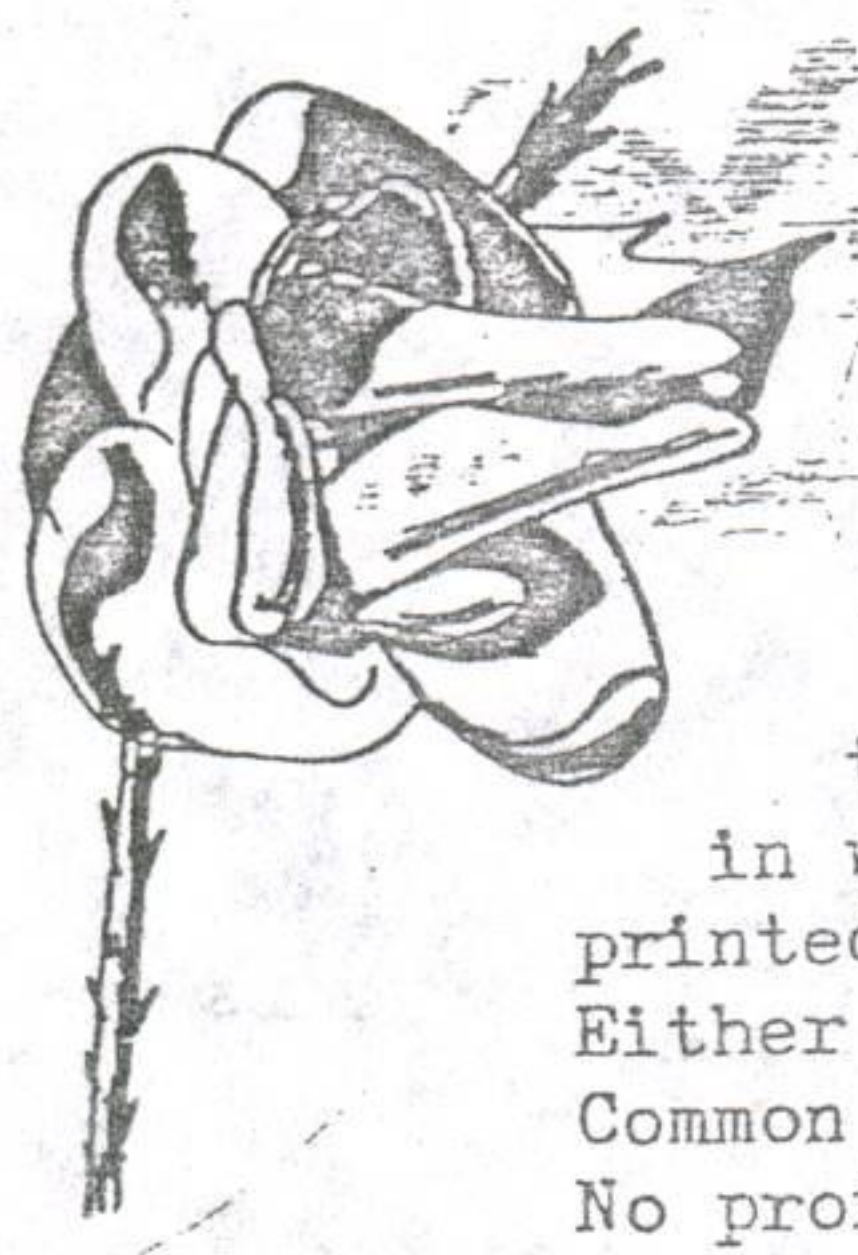

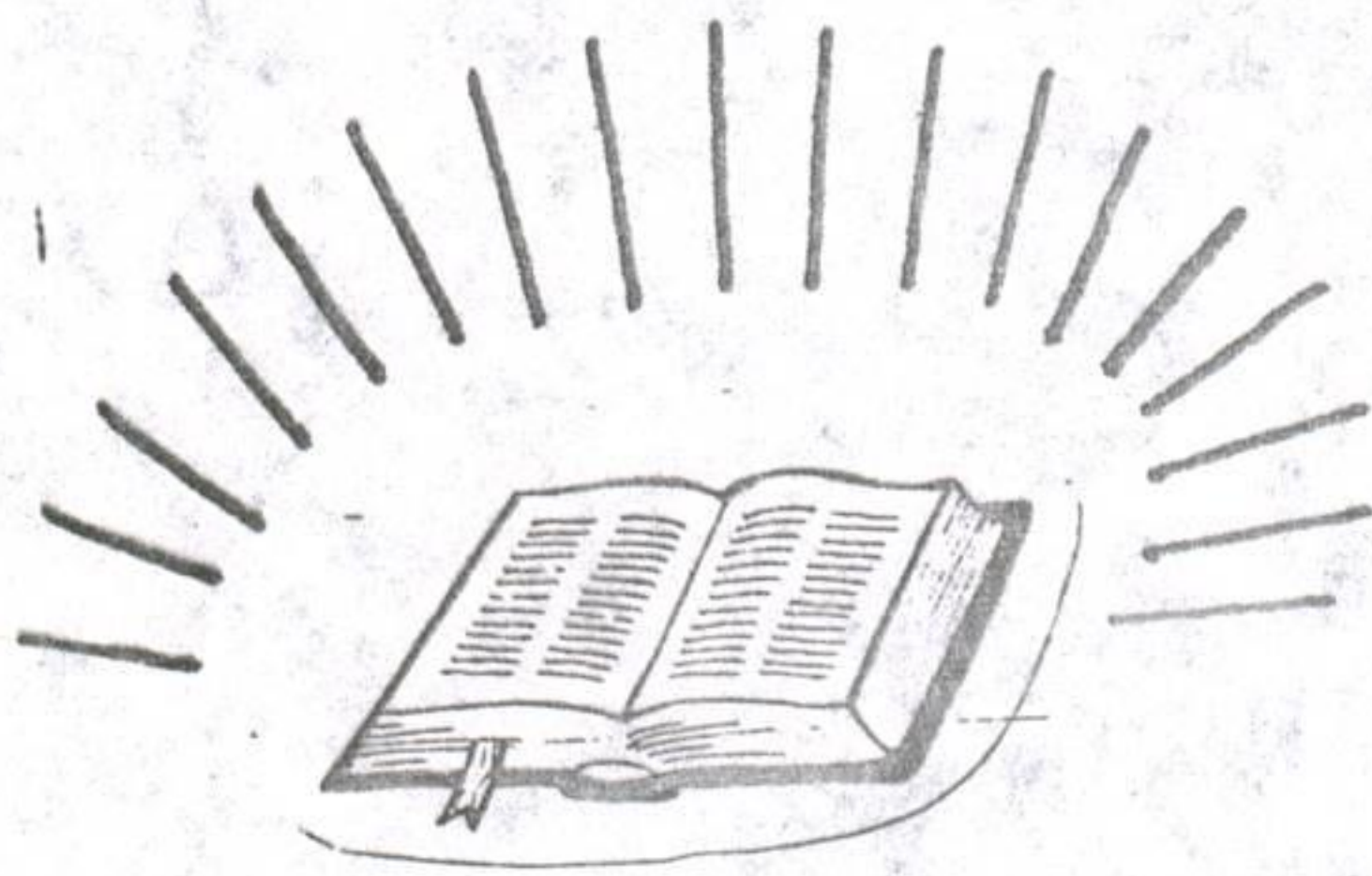

Dear Editor:

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the anonymous donor of "a bushel full of bad ones" on behalf of the Station. There are a few misconceptions which I would also like to point out as well. Firstly, the fees for casual bowling are not additional any more than the fees for regular league bowling are additional. It is not clear what additional is suppose to mean in that context. The writer doesn't mind paying 40¢ per string for league bowling, so it seems very odd that they should mind paying 50¢ per string for casual bowling. The reason for charging for bowling, of course, is to pay for the new machines (\$10,000), provide for future improvements and maintain equipment (shoes, balls, towels, lane finish, etc). Secondly, the fees for bowling here at Alsask are far below the national average. Bowlers in larger centres pay \$.85 - \$1.15 per string, so we are pretty well off. It is not reasonable to expect the same charges this year when we have put in very expensive machines since last year. When you look back over the last TWO years, we went from \$2. down to \$1.50 and back up to \$2. So you could say we didn't raise prices, we went back to the old 1977 rates! It's not often you see any organization install automatic equipment and then roll back prices to 1977 rates! Finally, there was no charge for casual bowling last year because you set your own pins. I might also add, there was "virtually" no casual bowling either. The Station Fund does provide minimal cost entertainment for bowlers but it must pay for these machines and also support many other activities as well. From my point of view, you have got a good deal at rock bottom prices.

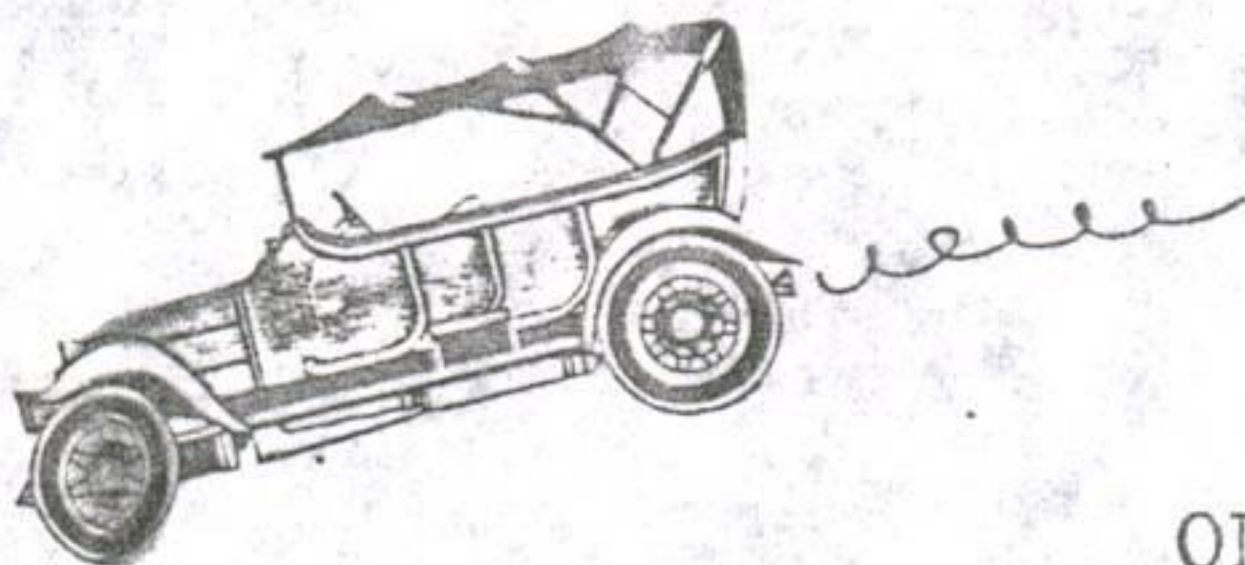

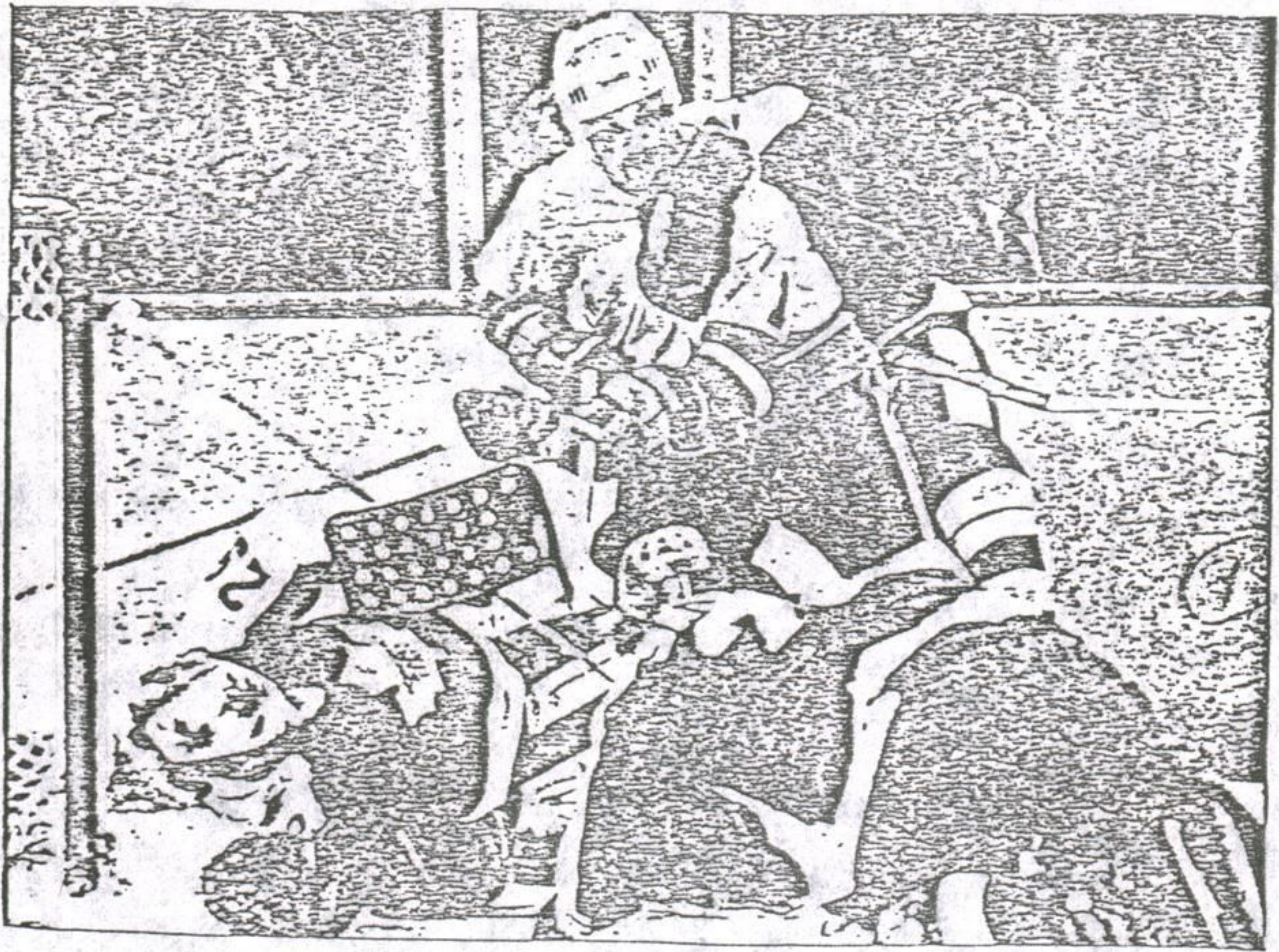

Memberships for 1980 are available from Duncan Mackintosh Loc 217 or 2263. Cost is \$6.50 for regular membership and also family memberships are available.



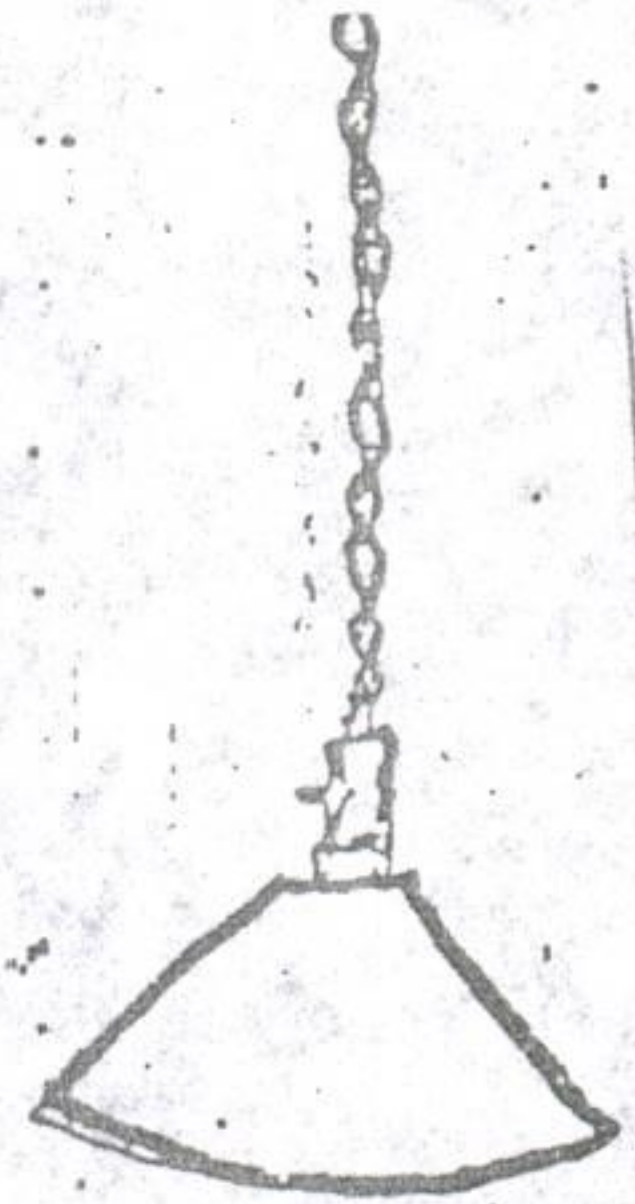

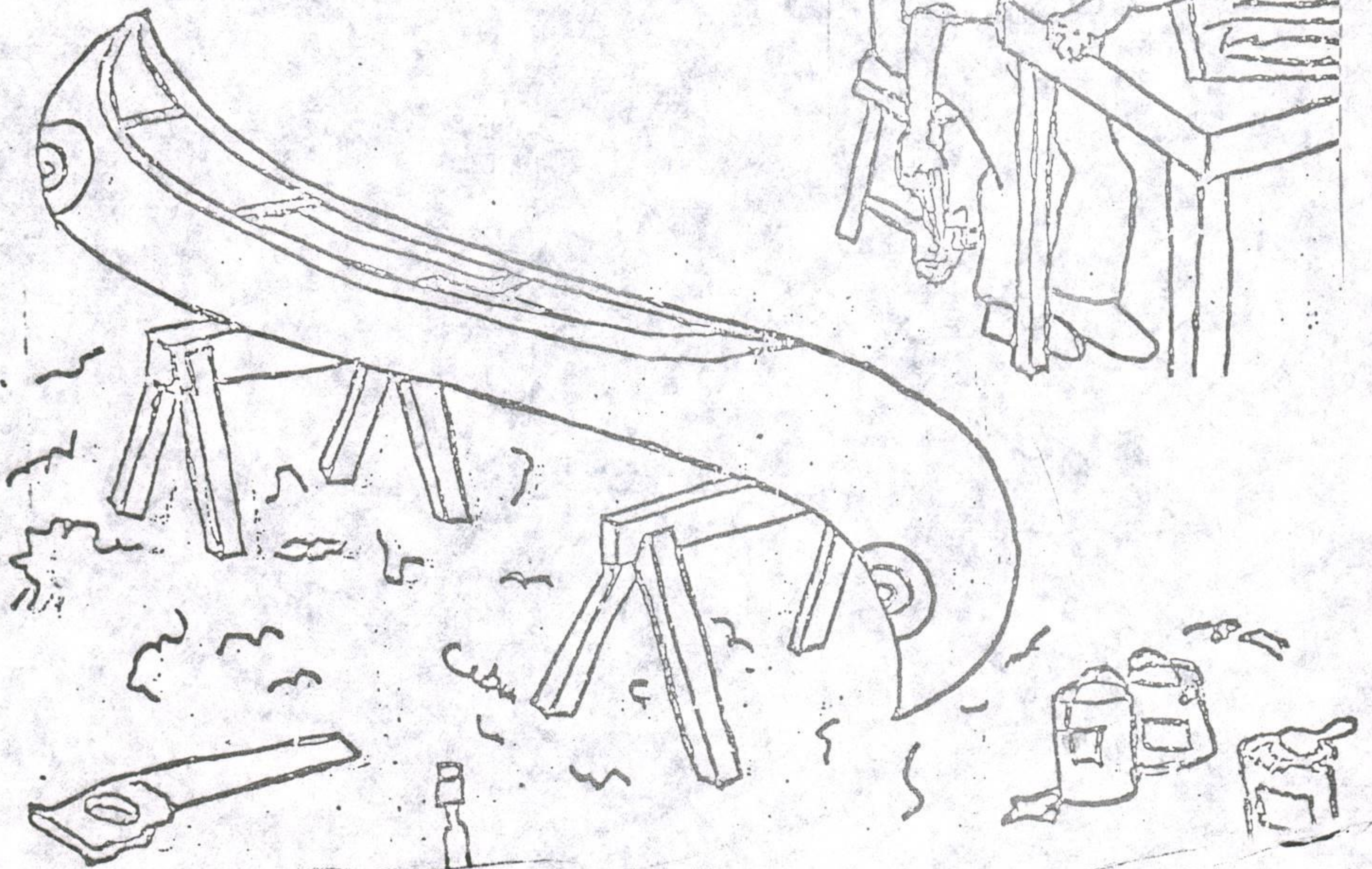
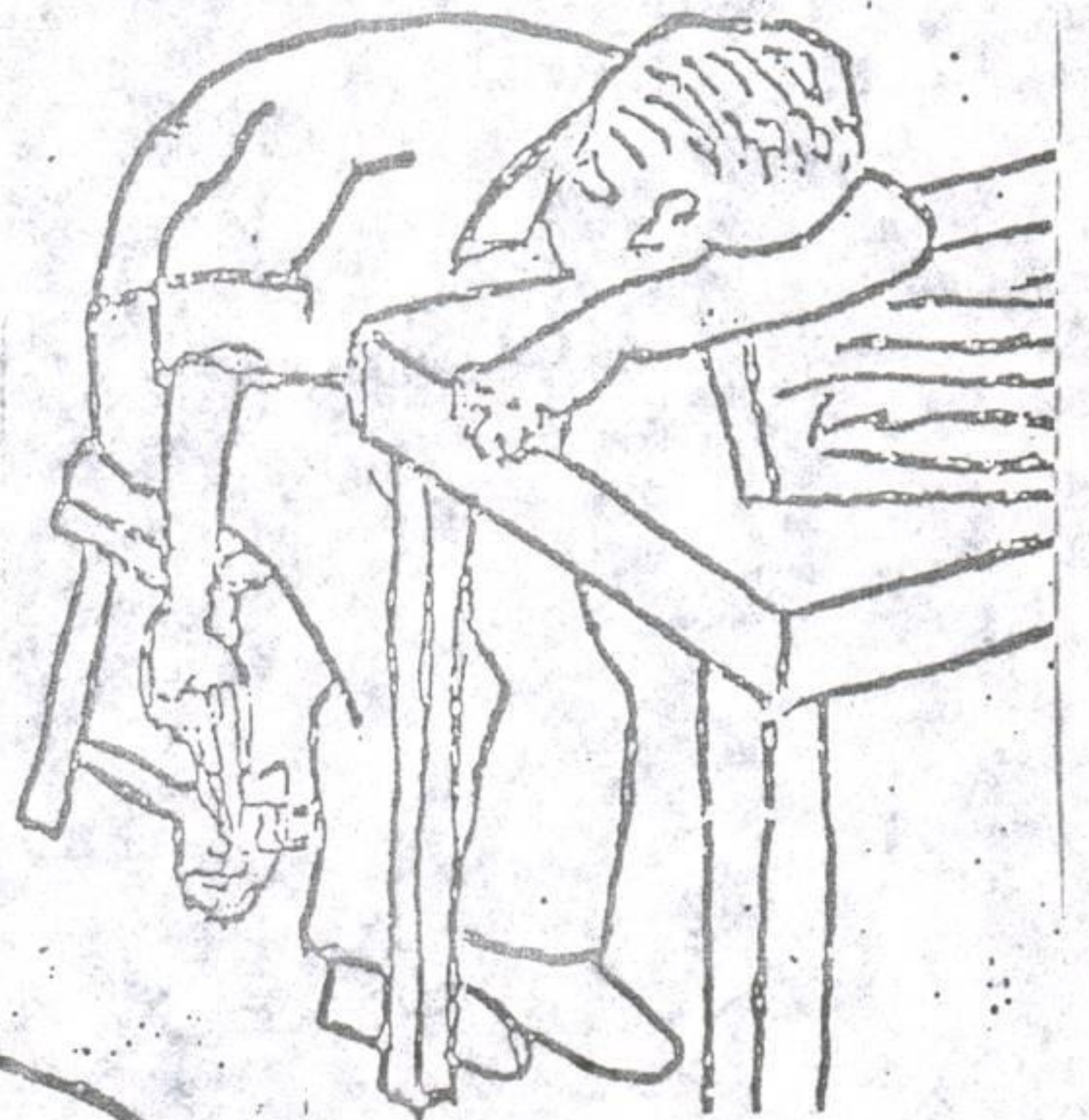

PLAY IT SAFE by John Boy

This time around I'd like to say a few words about the windows in PMQ's, especially for the benefit of our newer neighbours. To those of us who have been here a year or more, it is a well-known fact that the windows are very hazardous because they often come crashing down without warning if left open and not supported. I urge everyone not to trust the windows to stay open by themselves.

Whenever you open a window use a block of wood, a ruler, a book, or almost any other solid object to keep it open. You could prevent injury to yourself or your children by doing so and it only takes a few seconds of your time. I think you can imagine the consequences of a window falling on your hand or fingers (especially if you've ever lifted one); if you can't, just ask someone who was caught. The usual result is a very sore hand, but for young children it could very well be much worse because of their small, soft bones! Nuff said!

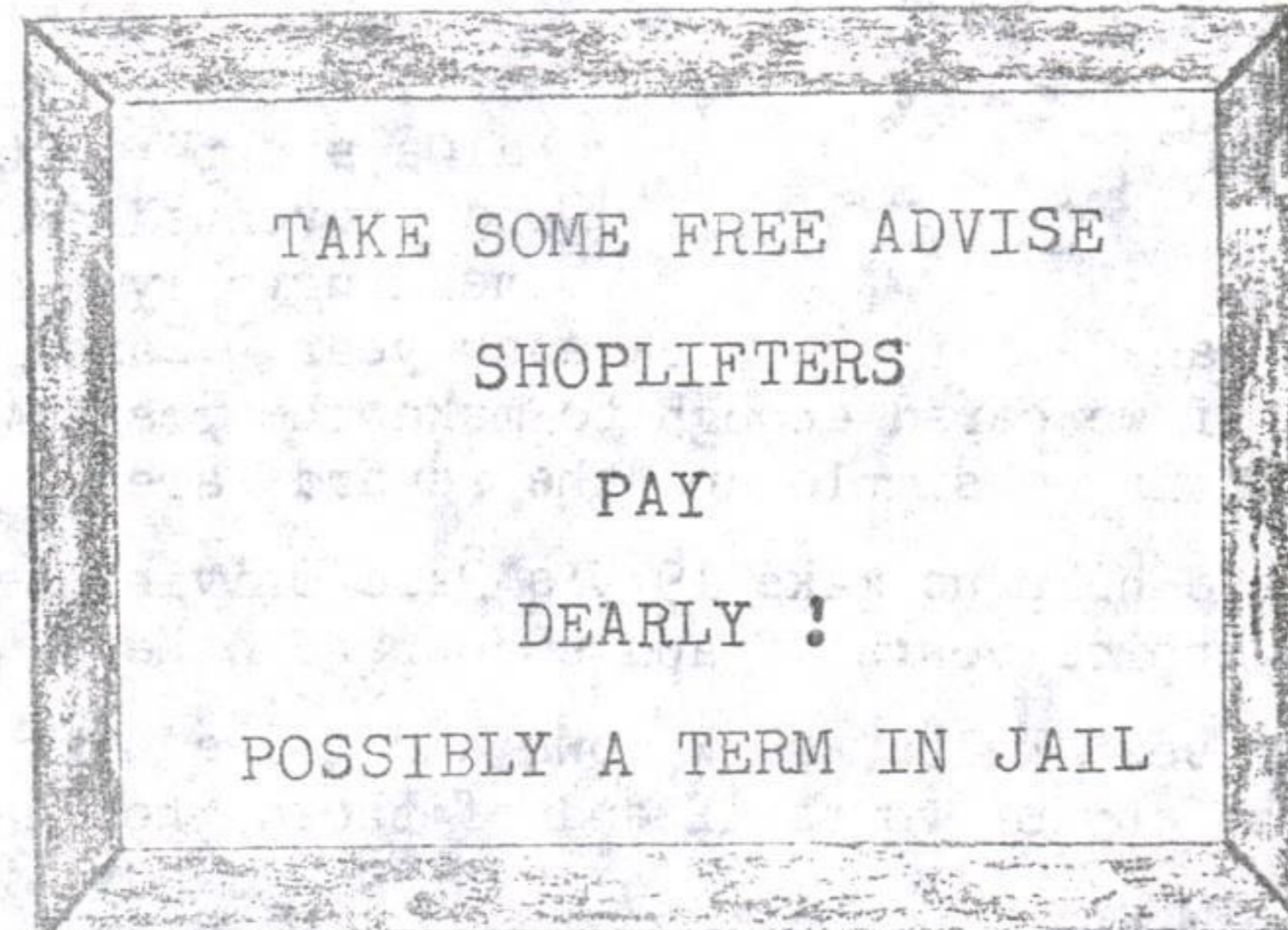
I'm presently gathering statistics about the number of incidents (both injuries and close calls) involving these windows for a submission to Command HQ aimed at speeding up the replacement program which began this year. Branch and section heads have been asked to canvass their people and provide me with the information by 1 December, so ensure any incidents involving your family are reported. I can't promise anything, but I hope our representation will do some good.

In the meantime, please be very careful so we can reduce, and hopefully eliminate, these injuries - use something solid to keep your windows open, don't just throw them open and hope for the best.

## TOTEM TALK



You have probably seen this sign in CANEX or in other commercial outlets. HEED the sign's warning or face a CRIMINAL RECORD, LOSS OF FRIENDS, AND A LOT OF PERSONAL EMBARRASSMENT.

Do you know you may be convicted for stealing something as a prank, or for eating peanuts or fruit from food displays.

Shoplifting is an offence of theft under section 283(1) and the punishments are listed in section 294 of the Criminal Code of Canada.

Section 294 - Except where otherwise provided by law, everyone who commits theft

- (a) is guilty of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for ten years, where the property stolen is a testamentary instrument or where the value of what is stolen exceeds two hundred dollars; or
- (b) is guilty
  - (i) of an indictable offence and is liable to imprisonment for two years, or
  - (ii) of an offence punishable on summary conviction,

where the value of what is stolen does not exceed two hundred dollars.

On summary conviction you are liable to a fine of not more than \$500.00, or to imprisonment for 6 months, or to both. In order to cover loses caused by shoplifters, products cost you and I the consumer more money.

DON'T BECOME A STATISTIC

I had the occasion to rummage through my old airforce kit bag the other day. Lo and behold, I fumbled across a newspaper clipping article I had tucked away for future reference. As it concerns all parents planning to become proud, I'd like to share Mr. Nicols' observations on "planned parenthood". 

Even now the thought of the wood was like a shadow, a cold breath against his skin. Wolf had come back to face down his nightmare. He finds he must do much more than that in order to survive.

SHUT UP AND EAT YOUR SNOWSHOES - by Jack Douglas.

For comedian Jack Douglas it all began with a newspaper ad, reading "For discriminating homeowners" Canada, hunting and fishing lodge! Your own islands! Your own peninsula! Your own private road! Anyone else would have turned the page, but Jack Douglas, with the uncanny eye of a born loser, soon found himself the owner of twelve islands on Lost Lake, with 12 outbuildings and fewer bathrooms, the nearest mailbox is a mere 116 miles away. Douglas's zany misadventures as he faces the simple life are sure to release the escape valve in us all.

VETS MIGHT FLY - by James Herriot.

She vowed she would hang all her awards and recognitions in her utility room. It's where she earned them. This is her fifth book. Her hobby is dust.

RALLY ROUND THE FLAG, BOYS! by Max Shulman.

It takes place in a Connecticut commuting village, where discontented country husbands live with their discontented country wives; where old yankee settlers wish the commuters would vanish in a puff of smoke; where teenaged disciples of the late James Dean prove you don't have to be underprivileged to be delinquent; where frenzy lies fitfully beneath a rustic patina. ## FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE
