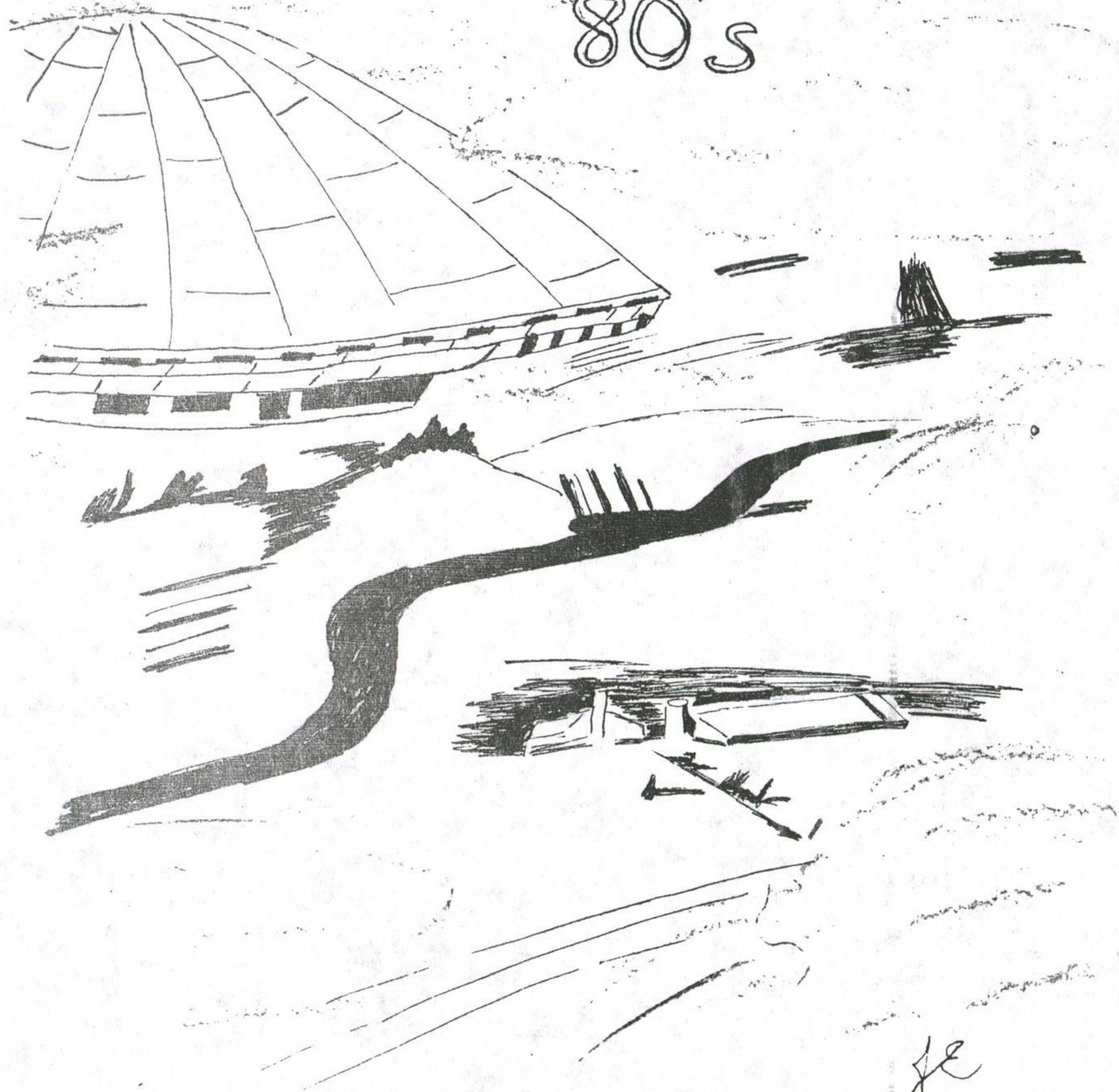

FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

WOMEN IN THE FORCES -- 1979 was a good year to be a woman in the Canadian Forces. The new Primary Reserve Unit - Canadian Forces Public Duties Unit - has but a single role, that of performing the Changing of the Guard Ceremony on Parliament Hill each summer. Introduction of this unit made possible for the first time the employment of female personnel in the colourful ceremony. Wearing the traditional scarlet uniforms and bearskin headwear, this integrated ceremonial unit performed this summer to much favourable comment from visitors, tourists, and citizens of the capital region.

Women's roles in the forces were further expanded in consonance with the Canadian Human Rights Act passed in 1977. Trial employment has begun to assess the impact, if any, of servicewomen on operational capability at near-combat or all-male isolated units. The units for these trials are 4 Field Ambulance, 4 Service Battalion, 4 Combat Brigade Group and FMC Field Unit during cold weather operations, and CFS Alert. Four serving women have begun aircraft pilot training at Portage La Prairie, Man. As part of a phased program, twelve servicewomen have been accepted into a university training plan as officer cadets and are attending military colleges as undergraduate students living off campus.

Today 63 of the 100 trades and 21 of the 31 officer classifications are open to women. Women, as of November 30, 1979, form 6.5% of the Regular Force (effective strength) and 20.3% of the Reserve Force (effective strength).

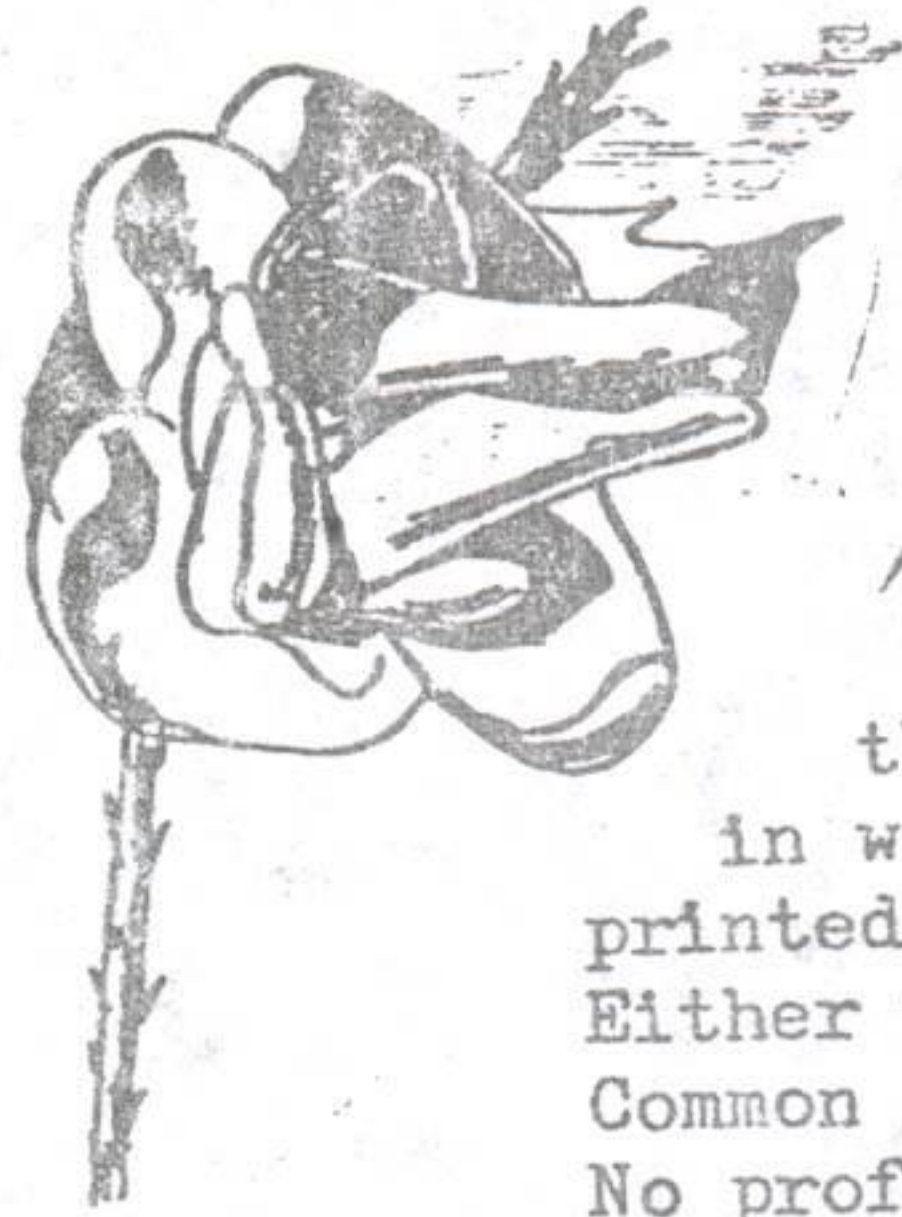

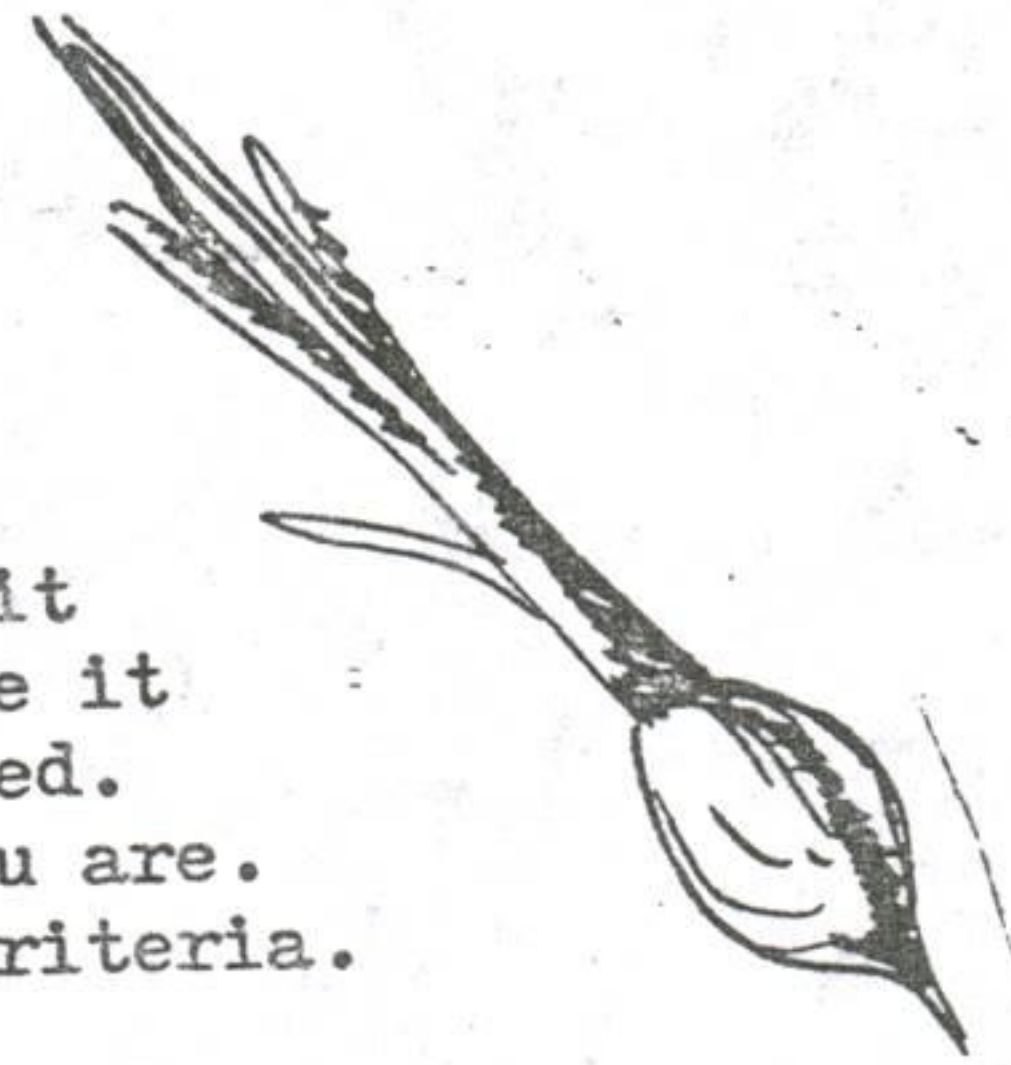

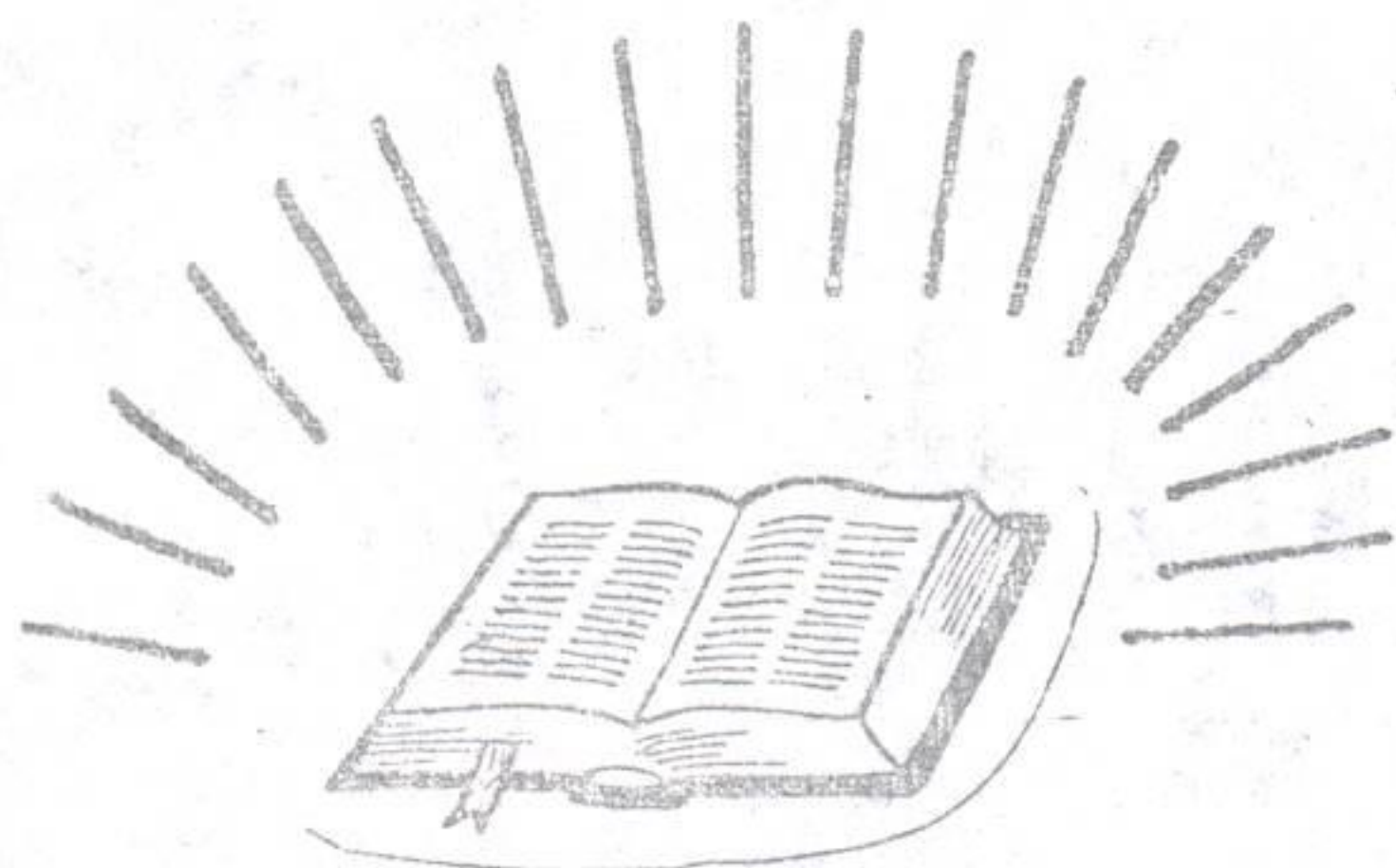

Hello again and Happy New Year ! I'm going to start off 1980 with an item of interest to all of you "Bic - flickers" cut there. Here goes:

DYNAMITE BIC

Chief William F. Foley of the Chicago Fire Department, Illinois, recently issued a memo that has prohibited "all ranks involved in field fire fighting operations to carry, or have on their persons, a butane-type lighter."

Chief Foley issued the memo after learning that two deaths have resulted from the "accidental ignition of the butane-type lighter commonly referred to as "Bic lighters." The accident was reported in a Chessie Railroad System memorandum, the text of which follows:

Recently on a neighbouring railroad, two Mechanical employees were killed as a result of butane lighters exploding. In both cases the men were involved in welding or burning, and sparks penetrated the plastic housing of the lighter, causing the liquid butane to explode with the equivalent force of three sticks of dynamite.

Please advise all of your employees immediately of the danger of using this type of lighter anywhere around sparks or flames.

This excerpt was taken from a news item in the Fire Command Magazine dated December 1979.

Well, there it is folks, one of the hazards which these lighters present. So if you plan to do any kind of work where sparks could result, remember to put your "Bic" away in a safe place.

BOMBER by Len Deighton

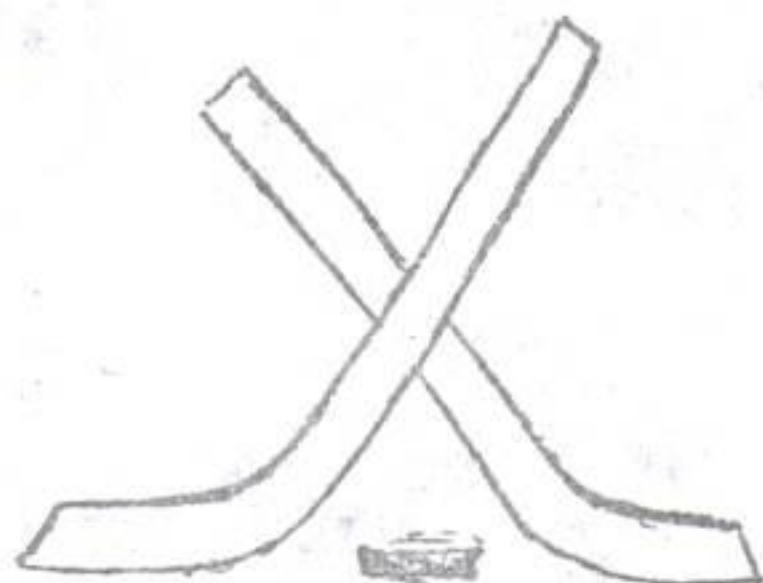
In Describing a day in the life of a war, the author weaves together the lives of three strangers, their lovers, their colleagues and compatriots. At a rural Air Station in England, a bomber pilot preparing for his 46th raid begins to question the whole strategy of destruction from the air. Across the Channel, a Luftwaffe fighter pilot is shocked by the excesses of the regime he serves. And in a little medieval town tucked away in the Ruhr Valley, the veteran commander of a radar station discovers that he is in love. Deighton links the participants through a sequence of grotesque ironies that send the bombers on a futile and disastrous mission.

RIVERS OF DARKNESS by Ronald Hardy

Mozambique, 1973. Dr. Harry Lynd and his team arrive in search of the black fly spreading oncho and blindness. The missionaries bring to Africa not only their skill as professionals but their personal motives as well. Also in Mozambique is the wealthy heir to a port wine fortune, Luke Magellan. He is brought into the war himself by his outrage at the wounds inflicted on a young woman to whom he is peculiarly bound. The hunt he then embarks on to find and punish the attacker, a government soldier, defines him as an enemy of the state. But the passions of both the doctors and Luke lead them to the most difficult task of all. The Africans trying to evict the Portuguese are in the midst of a civil war. The missionaries find they must weave a path between the guerrillas who come to them for treatment and the government which forbids rebel sympathy.

THE MEMOIRS OF RICHARD NIXON

This is the autobiography of Richard Nixon, the thirty-seventh President of the United States. Before him only six men who held the office wrote comprehensive memoirs. He begins his story with his earliest recollections of rural California boyhood and continues through the moment he and his family left the White House for the last time. Within the story we see the struggle of a man to implement what he believed. It is the story of a man whose whose to lead his life in public, but who remained a private person. Even his closest associates have contended that they never came to know the real Nixon.

The following article is submitted for your safety, whether winter, summer, fall or spring. We would like to emphasize however that the danger of Hypothermia is very real for those contemplating extended cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, or snowmobiling treks in the wilds of Alsask. This article is not to dissuade you from these activities but to persuade you to play it safe. It is taken from General Safety Digest, Nov.-Dec. 79, Vol. 7 No. 6.

WATCH HYPOTHERMIA

Hypothermia is the No. 1 killer of outdoor recreationists. It is the rapid, progressive mental and physical collapse accompanying the chilling of the inner core of the human body, caused by exposure to cold and aggravated by wet, wind and exhaustion.

Most cases develop in air temperatures between -1° Celsius (30° F) and $+10^{\circ}$ Celsius (50° F). It's hard to believe that such temperatures are dangerous, but it's not "how cold is the air?" but "how cold is the water against my body?" $+10^{\circ}$ Celsius water is unbearably cold running down the neck and legs, cold water held against the body by sopping clothes, flushing body heat from the surface of the clothing.

Cold kills in two distinct steps. One is by exposure and exhaustion. The moment your body begins to lose heat faster than it produces it you voluntarily exercise to stay warm, and your body makes involuntary adjustments to preserve normal temperatures in the vital organs. You are now draining your energy reserves.

The other step is hypothermia, a state you reach when your internal temperature is sliding downward, leading to stupor, collapse and death. Your energy reserves have been exhausted.

Before going out hunting, fall fishing, snowmobiling or hiking, prepare yourself for emergencies and changeable weather conditions. Wear wollen clothing. When wool gets wet it loses less insulating value than cotton or synthetics. Include a knitted cap that protects the neck and chin. Choose outer clothing that is proof against wind-driven rain and will cover head, neck, body and legs. Put them on before you get wet.

Pack emergency food rations - nuts, raisins, chocolate bars. For hot drinks, take dehydrated soup, tea, powdered milk, a mixture of cocoa and sugar, and a tin can for boiling water. Rig a piece of wire through the open edge of the can so that it can be hung on a tripod over the fire.

Take plastic sheeting and nylon twine. It affords an additional foul-weather shelter.

If you cannot stay dry and warm under existing weather conditions, call a halt to your activity. Persistent or violent shivering is clear warning that you are on the edge of hypothermia. Find shelter and build a fire. Make this temporary camp as secure and comfortable as possible.

Take precaution against weather conditions that can make you vulnerable to hypothermia.

In guarding against cold it is necessary to take the wind-chill factor into consideration. A zero temperature with no wind means zero -- a zero temperature with a wind at fifteen miles per hour is equivalent to a dead calm temperature or -34° Celsius (-30° F). Because of the wind-chill factor, a low positive temperature with a strong wind can actually be colder than a subzero temperature with no wind.

It is possible under certain conditions to suffer frostbite or frozen extremities after a brief exposure. Contrary to an old belief, do not rub the afflicted part with snow, but allow it to thaw out gradually in luke-warm water. If the freezing is severe, you should lose no time in trying to reach a physician or a hospital.

5. If a member is on an unaccompanied posting, his dependent may make application to the loan committee where the dependent is located for assistance.
