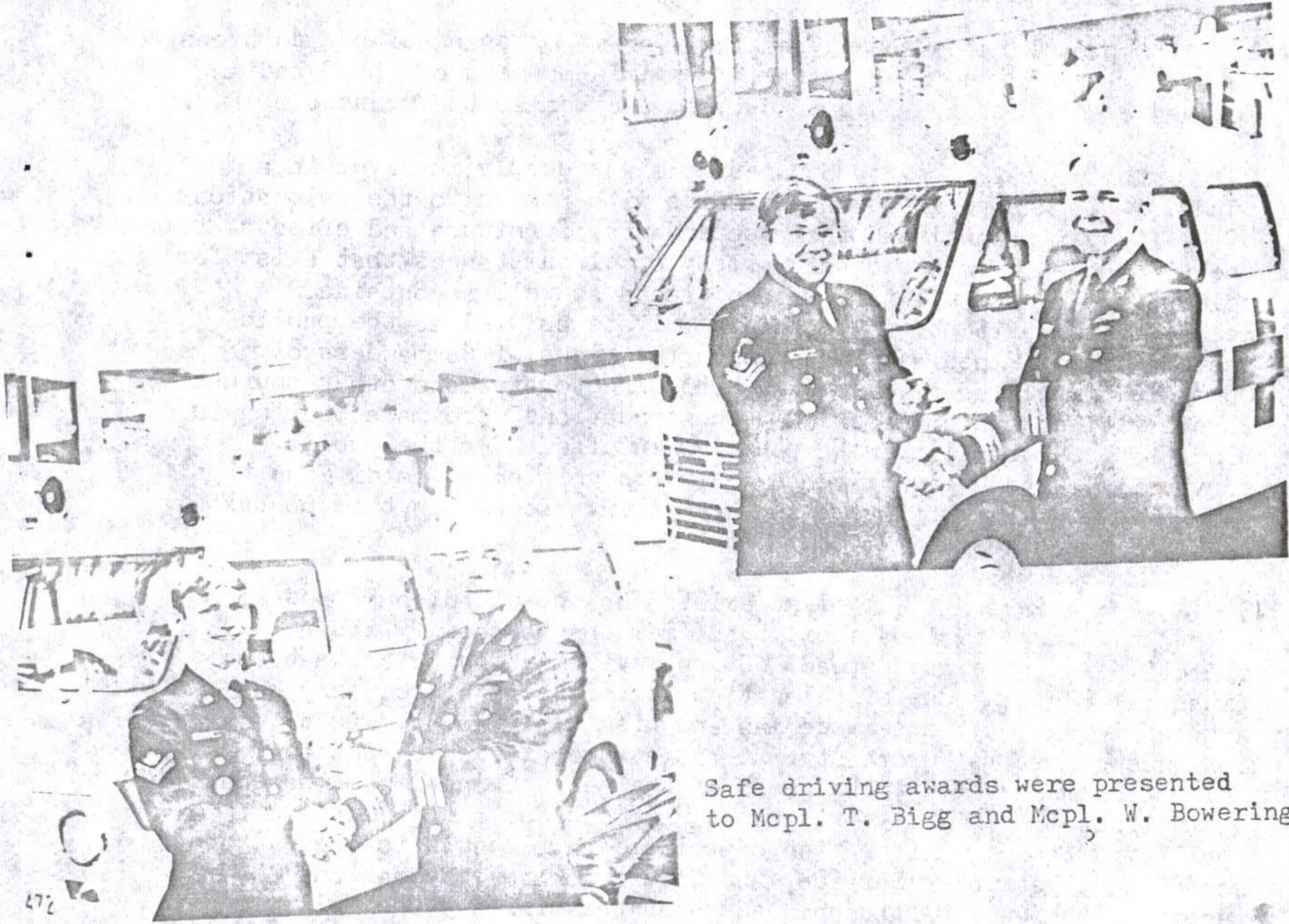

REVISION TO REIMBURSEMENT OF REMOVAL EXPENSES --  
CF PERSONNEL ON POSTING

1. Approval has now been received for major changes and additions to removal expenses and assistance provided members of the Canadian Forces moved from one place of duty to another at the request of DND.

2. During 1978 the Pay Studies Team was deeply involved in a study of all DND policies and benefits with regard to the relocation of military personnel and their dependants, furniture and effects. The study has encompassed the variety of circumstances that exist for relocations of the military within Canada as well as outside. Relocation benefit norms within the private as well as the public sector were examined and in addition the views of Commanders of Commands as well as a variety of NDHQ Directorates and other sources were solicited and considered. Recommendations were made bearing in mind that comparability with policies in effect for the public service is a basic guideline; however recognition of conditions that are uniquely military has also been given. It was in this context that the study was conducted.

3. A continuing requirement exists for the Canadian Forces to maintain a high level of mobility of members to satisfy its objectives at home and abroad. Strong evidence indicates that the financial consequences of relocation at this high a frequency has a great impact on the service man and his family today. As a consequence, it is important that assistance offered by DND on relocation must reflect the needs of the service and its members and not detract from this overriding requirement for a high level of mobility. After consideration of policies applicable to the private sector and the Public Service, and in view of recommendations received, recognizing the uniqueness of the military the following changes have been approved.

4. House Hunting Trip (HHT) - an HHT prior to COS date has been approved for personnel posted within Canada and from USA to Canada. HHT is introduced in response to a strong desire expressed by CF personnel for spousal involvement in the selection of accommodation at the new place of duty, to reduce periods of family separation and extended interim lodgings and to facilitate door-to-door moves on COS date.

5. The HHT package provides for return transport for member and spouse plus up to five days of interim living expenses and three days car rental expense.

6. A feature of HHT is flexibility to accommodate the variety of military and personal circumstances which allows spouse to join member after COS for HHT and both to return to accomplish move of DF and E among other options. Posted personnel should consult CFAOs for information on other options available.

7. HHT is not approved for members who apply and are provided with an MQ; however, when an MQ is not available, HHT may be undertaken without jeopardizing MQ list position. To provide advance indication of MQ availability, application has been increased to 60 days prior to COS with protection for those receiving less posting notification.

8. This is a significant new benefit that unless great care is exercised could cause a large increase in expenditure. It is emphasized that as the gaining Base or Station Comdr is in the best position to ensure effective use CMM authority to authorize HHT has been delegated to him. Imperative that he exercise particular care to ensure that his authorization of HHT will result in better move for the member and his family and reduce necessity overall for interim lodgings and meals. Experience in other government departments shows that, without advance preparation, HHT can be wasted. To ensure success of each HHT, gaining Base or Stn Comdrs who approve HHT have been requested to provide information/assistance/ sponsor package for posted personnel. Additionally to facilitate Door-to-door moves, reporting dates may be adjusted plus or minus 30 dys of COS date by mutual agreement of losing and gaining Base or Station without NDHQ approval.

9. HHT is also available for single personnel where R and Q are not available. Here again great care is essential in ensuring HHT objectives are achieved at reasonable cost.

10. Movement Grant - The basis of entitlement to movement grant is changed to weight of F and E moved on posting and is based upon an average of incidental expenses over a succession of moves with rates established at the same level for all ranks.

11. Movement of more than 2000 lbs F and E qualified for the maximum grant of 500 dollars and 150 dollars for moves involving storage of the same amount of F and E. Expenses for local moves as well as those under 2000 lbs F and E are reimburseable on the basis of actual and reasonable expenses supported by receipts.

12. Separation Expense - Separation expense for personnel in instances where DND rations and quarters are not provided has been increased and restructured to address inflationary increases in shelter and food costs. New rates provide for expense of semi-permanent accommodation equipped with cooking facilities.

13. Actual and reasonable cost supported by receipts when approved by the CO is reimbursed up to approximately 375 dollars/month for commercial accommodation and approx 130 dollars/month for non-commercial. Additional meal expense of approx 175 dollars/month is paid without receipts.

14. Unaccompanied Baggage Allowance (UBA) -- UBA for personnel and dependants posted to CFE and other places outside of North America where move of F and E is prohibited has been increased and restructured to allow greater flexibility for the CF member. New UBA entitlement is expressed as the total of weight carried west to east plus east to west for each posting with member selecting the amount to be carried on each leg.

15. Following is the new UBA entitlement:

- a. Officer or Man - 1550 lbs
- b. 1st Dependant - 1000 lbs
- c. each additional Dependant - 775 lbs
- d. plus 25 percent of above weights for packing materials and containers. Example for family of four - total of east plus west - 5125 lbs.

16. In order that personnel now overseas may benefit from these increases immediately, fixed weights for the return to Canada which include 25 percent for packing and containers have been established as follows:

- a. Officer/Man - 1500/1600 lbs
- b. 1st Dependant - 475 lbs
- c. each additional Dependant - 675 lbs

Personnel now overseas are presumed to have taken their full entitlement east bound; however, those who can produce satisfactory documentation of weights transported eastbound may have their westbound entitlement determined in accordance with the new procedure.

17. Acquisition and Disposal of Residential Accommodation - Approval has been granted to reimburse for mortgage penalties and associated legal fees acquiring and disposing of the principal residence on posting.

18. Restrictions have been lifted on reimbursement of real estate and legal fees for successive postings outside of Canada.

19. Interest charges will be reimbursed for a bridge financing loan of up to 5000 dollars used as a down payment for purchase on moves from owned to owned accommodation and from isolated and foreign posts.

20. Approval for reimbursement of real estate and legal fees for single members changed to the same basis as married.

21. Movement of F and E - Rules regarding the movement of recreational vehicles (motorcycles, skidoos etc), building material (hobby supplies) and portable sheds have been changed to allow inclusion of these items with F and E.

22. Access to stored F and E is approved and posting between two locations where both entail an entitlement to LTS at DND expense.

23. Effective date for all changes with the exception of unaccompanied baggage allowance is 01 Feb 80 changes to unaccompanied baggage entitlements 01 May 79.

24. This message is for information purposes only. Advance CFAOs and instructions on the specifics of revisions follow. Personnel should consult with their local Admin Offices for further information. Copies of the Pay Studies Team Report will be given wide circulation and, as well, an article in an early issue of CF Personnel Newsletter will provide additional information.

25. Introduction of these benefits for personnel on posting involves an estimated increased cost of slightly over 6 million dollars per year. Steps must be taken to reduce overall relocation costs and to this end those who authorize as well as those who use relocation benefits are exhorted to do so as wisely and productively as possible. This (i) not to be translated into restrictions on the approval of benefits; however, judicious and economical use by all concerned can achieve the desired level of monetary restraint without seriously affecting our overriding requirement for mobility.

FROM THE CANADIAN FORCES PRESS

PROJECT DOGWOOD -- Ottawa (CFP) -- The director of business programmes, Camosun College, Victoria, B.C, Brian Killip, recently announced the opening up of 1980/81 Project Dogwood courses at Camosun College. Project Dogwood is a full time course of studies designed especially for retiring servicemen giving credit for military experience. In essence, the advanced credit allows a student direct entry to the final year of business administration course and an associate of arts diploma. For the 1980/81 academic year, 15 student places have been set aside for retiring servicemen under the sponsorship of Canada employment and immigration commission.

There will be four course options offered under Project Dogwood this year: Accounting, Finance, Marketing and Hotel and Restaurant Management. Successful completion of the course opens the door to a Variety of career Opportunities; for example, Accounting students can transfer to RIA (Society of Management Accountants) or (CGA (Certified General Accounts) programmes and Receive advance credit for their work at the college. The finance options will train students for careers with Credit Unions, Real Estate and Banking. Marketing graduates can explore careers in selling, Advertising and Public Relations. The Hotel and Restaurant Management Programme train Students for employment in the hospitality and tourist industry.

Project Dogwood is a programme of the DND sponsored second career assistance network (SCAN), which means that retired servicemen selected for the course are eligible for financial assistance. Final date for applications is 15 February 1980. Course starting date is 21 April 1980. Anyone interested is invited to contact their Base Personnel Selection Officer.

A MESSAGE FROM THE MASTER GOPHER

By now some of you may have heard that there are plans afoot to change Country Club dues. I would like to bring you up to date on why there is a need for change and what the changes will be.

First of all it should be emphasized that the concept of Country Club, wherein the station and village share in recreation and social facilities, will not be changed. The only changes will be to reduce the overall dues for everyone and to combine Country Club and Cable TV dues for those personnel living on the station.

Our station information booklet states that under the Country Club plan each family or single member pays a nominal fee entitling one to full use of all recreation facilities. It's not long after people arrive that they realize that this statement is not completely accurate. They find that to join or participate in some activities it costs them extra whereas in others it does not. There is a degree of unfairness in the system in that some people end up subsidizing the recreation system more than others. It would be more fair if people paid according to their participation.

The easy conclusion to draw from the above would be to abolish Country Club dues and have people pay as they participate in each activity. This unfortunately would not be in the best interests of the community because you need a stable and constant financial base to maintain a wide variety of activities. If each activity relied solely on its own revenues it would be subject to the number of people interested, which varies considerably from year to year. What you would have are facilities which tend to be either falling into disuse or building up because of renewed interest. This process tends to be very wasteful and it is clear that a stable financial base is required if you want to manage and maintain activities effectively. Therefore, there still is a need to have Country Club dues but the system can be made more fair.

Effective 1 March 1980 there will be an across-the-board reduction in Country Club dues. This will compensate those people who are paying extra for certain activities, and conversely those who are participating in free activities should expect to pay something if it is needed to make ends meet. Hopefully everyone recognizes the fact that some types of activities will require larger subsidies from Country Club dues than others to enable us to have a good cross section of activities which provide something for everyone.

I would like to point out that Cable TV charges remain the same. I would also like to point out again that Country Club and Cable TV dues will be treated as one charge for station personnel to streamline the administration of funds. The following outlines the new schedule for Country Club dues (the bracketed numbers represent the old dues):

a. On-Station Family

Country Club	-	\$2.25 (4.25)	per month
Cable TV	-	\$2.75	per month
Total	-	\$5.00	per month

b. On-Station Single

Country Club	-	\$1.00 (1.75)	per month
Cable TV	-	\$2.75	per month
Total	-	\$3.75	per month

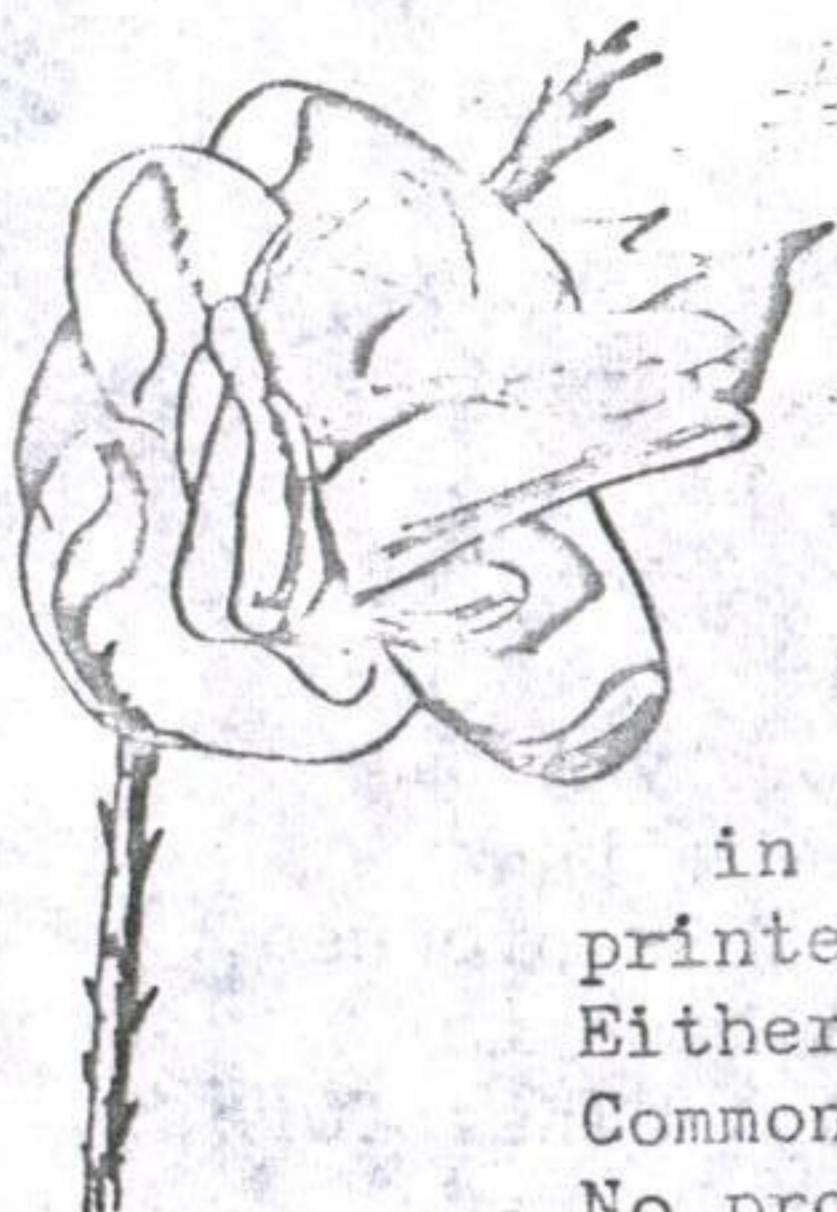
c. Off-Station Family

Country Club	-	\$32.00 (47.00)	per year
Cable TV	-	paid separately to Lions Club	

d. Off-Station Single

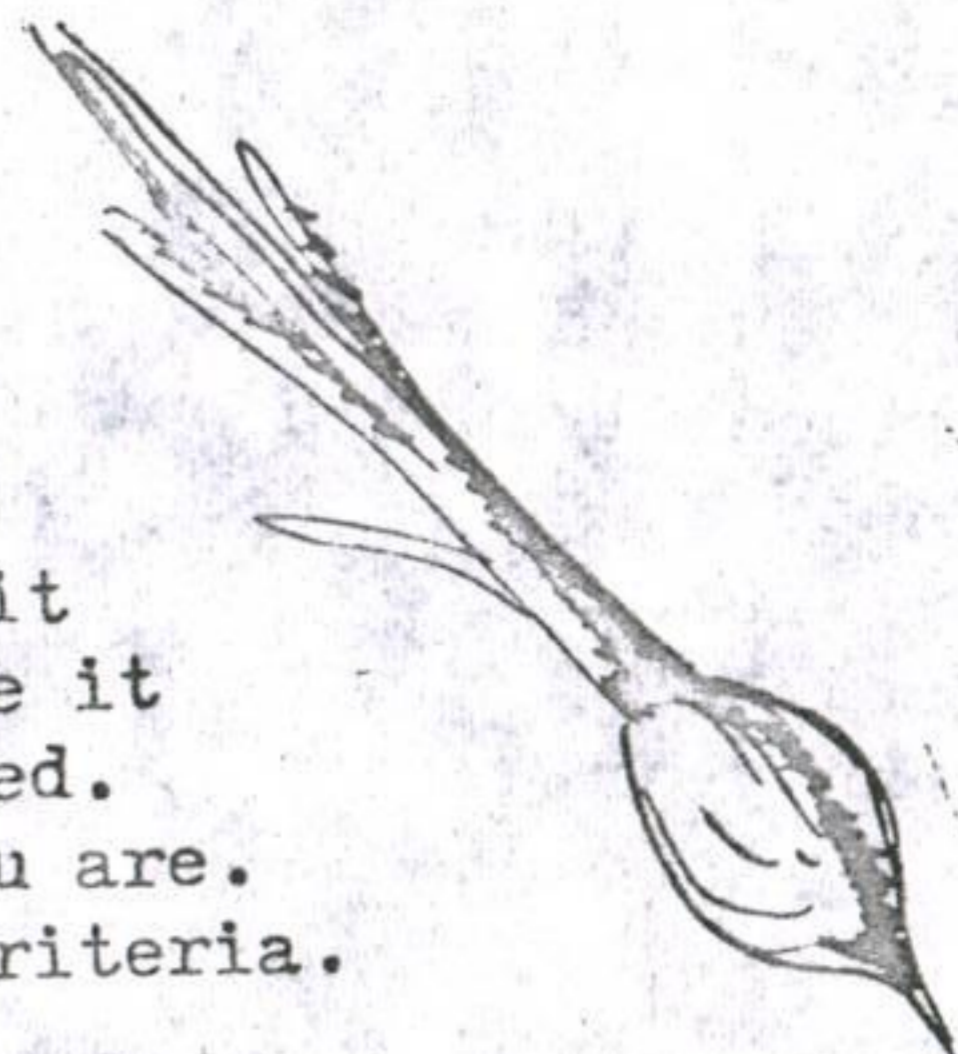
Country Club	-	\$16.00 (23.00)	per year
Cable TV	-	paid separately to Lions Club	

The new dues represent a significant saving to everyone. Station Fund income will be reduced by \$3400 per year because of the reduced dues, but the fact that the fund is in a healthy condition allows us to make the adjustment. With continued good management and no unforeseen expenses I hope that we can hold the line in this time of escalating costs.

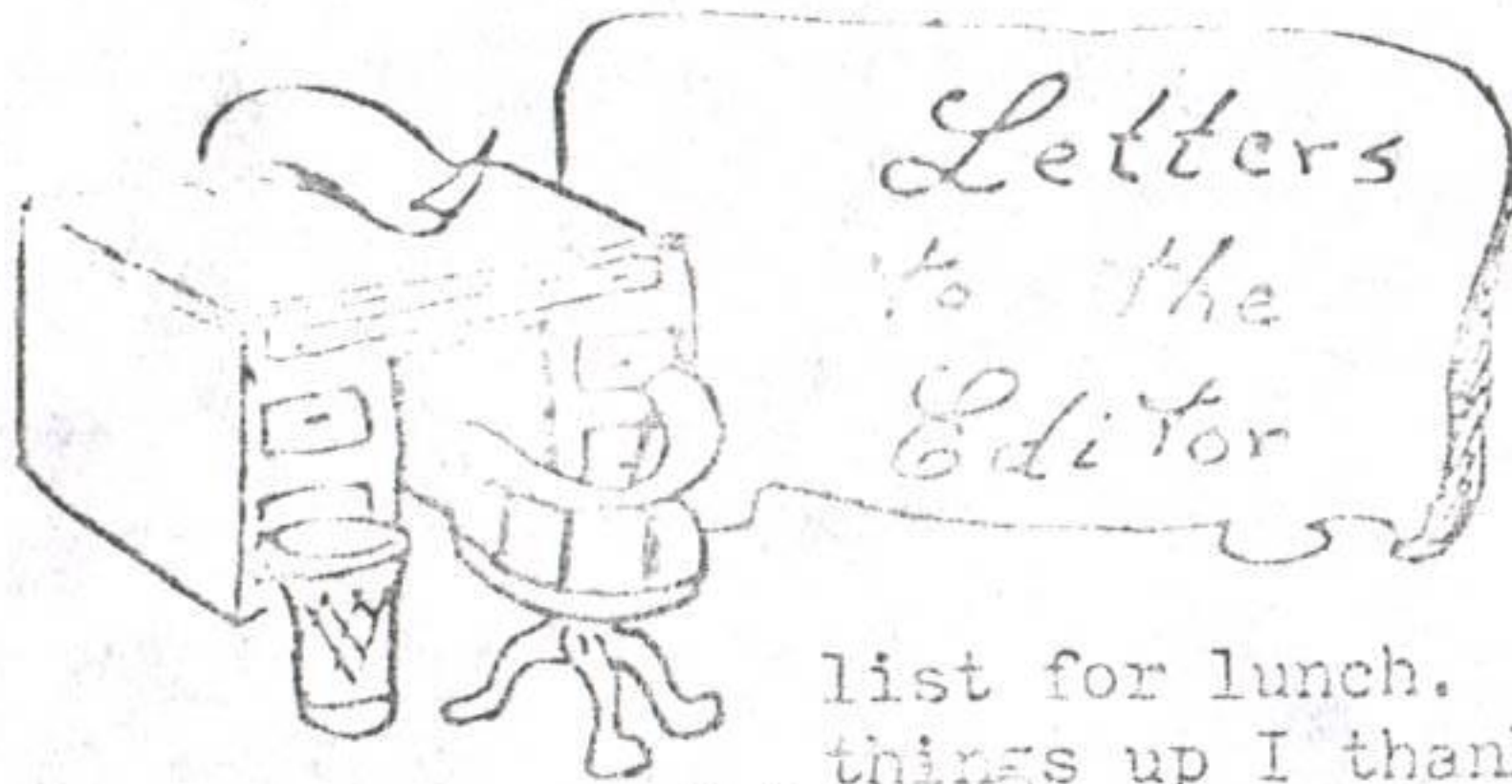

You can always louse things up so bad that no one will trust you with the most menial task. This only works for people who have no professional pride or are totally inept. Fortunately there aren't too many of this type left.

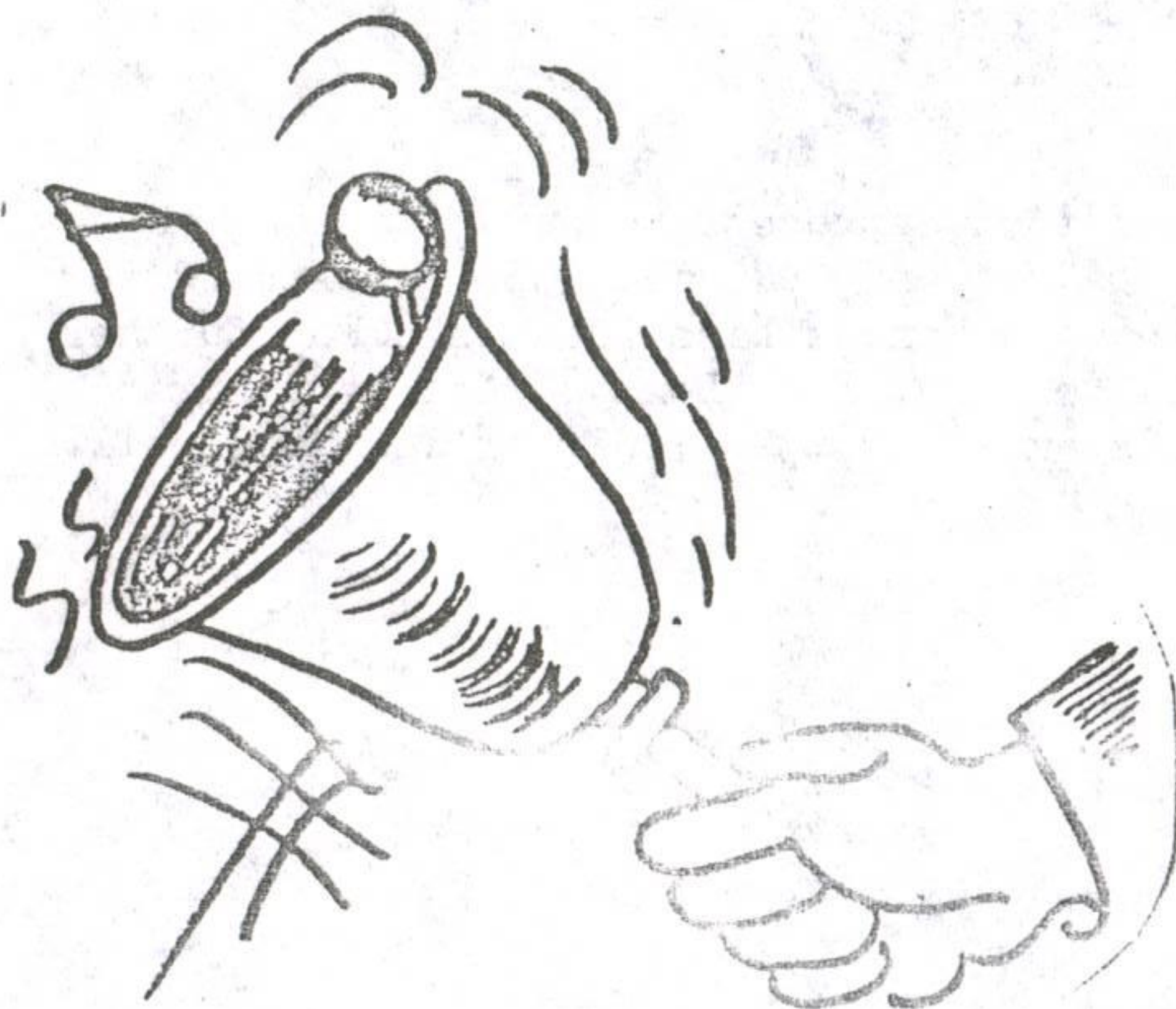

PLAY IT SAFE - by John Boy

Your friendly neighbourhood Fire Chief, Dave Garland, submitted the following gems, which he received from the Canadian Standards Association, to me so I could pass this important information on to you:

A. Coffee Maker Warning

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) and the manufacturer are warning owners of Proctor-Silex Automatic Drip Coffee Makers to be aware of a possible fire hazard.

During the past several months a number of coffee makers reportedly caught fire. These coffee makers were manufactured in Canada by Proctor-Silex and were sold exclusively in Canada bearing the Proctor-Silex label and the CSA mark. Investigations by the manufacturer have indicated that in most cases the fires have been caused by improper servicing or tampering with the electrical system. All of the fires occurred with coffee makers made before December 1976.

If your coffee maker has been serviced, repaired or the bottom plate removed for any reason by anyone at any time, use of your coffee maker should be discontinued immediately and it should be returned to Proctor-Silex Re-inspection Centre, PO Box 2100, Picton, Ontario K0K 2T0 for free re-inspection and/or repair. Please return only your base unit. Do not forward the accessories or glass carafe.

In addition, although the investigation to date has not revealed a defect in design which may result in a hazardous condition, if there is a malfunction or concern of any kind with respect to your coffee maker, to aid in a continuing monitoring of these coffee makers, you are urged to return your coffee maker for a free safety inspection.

B. Hazardous Kettles

The Canadian Standards Association (CSA) is warning owners of electric kettles to be on the lookout for a possible hazard.

During the past several months thirteen kettles have reportedly exploded in Canada. Production of the kettles involved was discontinued in September 1977.

CSA is urging the public to check the base of their kettle for serial numbers which will reveal whether or not their kettle may be hazardous.

The bases of the failing kettles bear the numbers 10, 11, 14 or 16 together with either of the following:

- (1) CSA number LR37933 with a red four digit number between 6100 and 7275.
- (2) CSA number LR26791 with no red four digit number.

The kettles were manufactured by ETM (1976) Ltd., 857 Fenmar Drive, Weston, Ontario M1L 1C8.

CSA is warning people who own kettles to stop using them.

I urge everyone to heed the warnings and follow the instructions outlined in the above to avoid any mishaps related to these coffee makers or kettles. 

No Bus? No, It's Not a Holiday--I have been instructed by Bob Johnson, Westcliffe School District Representative on the Kindersley School Division Board of Trustees to inform parents of their responsibility to have their children at school. Specifically, this issue surfaces from time to time when a school bus does not operate on a regular school day. Because of poor student attendance under such circumstances, the representatives of the respective boards and I believe a clear explanation of parental responsibility is needed to help remedy the situation.

Failure of a school bus to operate on a school day does not mean that the students who normally are conveyed on that bus are exempt from attendance at school. Such a notion is clearly false! In that instance, the student is marked absent. The school division, through its network of buses, is providing a service to the families of the school division. If a particular bus is unable to run, it is the responsibility of the parents to see taht their children are conveyed to school.

(NOTE: The intents of this article is not to imply that parents are expected to convey their choldren to school when a bus driver decides not to run due to inclement weather. The point stressed herein is that parents are responsible to get their children to school if the bus on their route does not operate for a reason other than inclement weather.)

Parenting Education Course anyone?--A query by an interested couple has prompted the following offer. Have you ever wondered about what alternative strategies you might employ as a parent when dealing with your child(ren)? Here is an opportunity for you to explore a proven method for improving your parenting skills. Barb O'Donnell of Kindersley is prepared to offer a course on "Parenting Education" at Westcliffe Composite School if there is sufficient interest to participate in this class, you would be obliged to do the following:

- 1) pay \$6.00 to purchase a book - your only cost; and 2) make a committment t o attend for 10 Wednesdays.

Did You Know?--The Westcliffe Board of Trustees has instructed me to inform or remind parents about personal liability for gratuitous passengers in the matter of students conveying other students to and from school. The Board

is concerned that parents know exactly what their legal responsibility is when their vehicle is being used in these circumstances. Board members realize that the school administration cannot monitor all such travel. Only parents and students themselves can effectively police these goings-on.

The Vehicle Act--states under Section 178: 1) Subject to subsection (2), when any loss damage or injury is caused to a person by a motor vehicle, The person driving in at the time is liable for the loss, damage or injury, if it was caused by his negligence or improper conduct, and the owner thereof is also liable to the same extent as the driver unless at the time of the incident causing the loss, damage or injury, the motor vehicle had been stolen from the owner or otherwise wrongfully taken out of his possession or out of the possession of a person entrusted by him with the care thereof.

3) The owner or driver of a motor vehicle, other than a vehicle ordinarily used for carrying passengers for hire or gain, is not liable for loss or damage resulting from bodily injury to or the death of a person being carried in or upon or entering, or getting into, or alighting from the motor vehicle, unless there has been wilful and wanton misconduct contributed to the injury.

If you are concerned that your son or daughter might be a driver or a passenger in a situation that you are not comfortable with please deal with it. You are in the best position to confront the issue with your child(ren). We at the school will do our best to help you control the situation if you let us know that you are concerned.
