At the end of each leave year, in February and March, we find that many have not taken their full entitlement, and people are pressured to take leave during an undesirable period. Aside from the unhappiness this causes the individual, this also causes administrative and co-ordination problems for everyone. It's time we got rid of this bother because I'm sure, with very few exceptions, that everyone on this unit can get in their full entitlement. 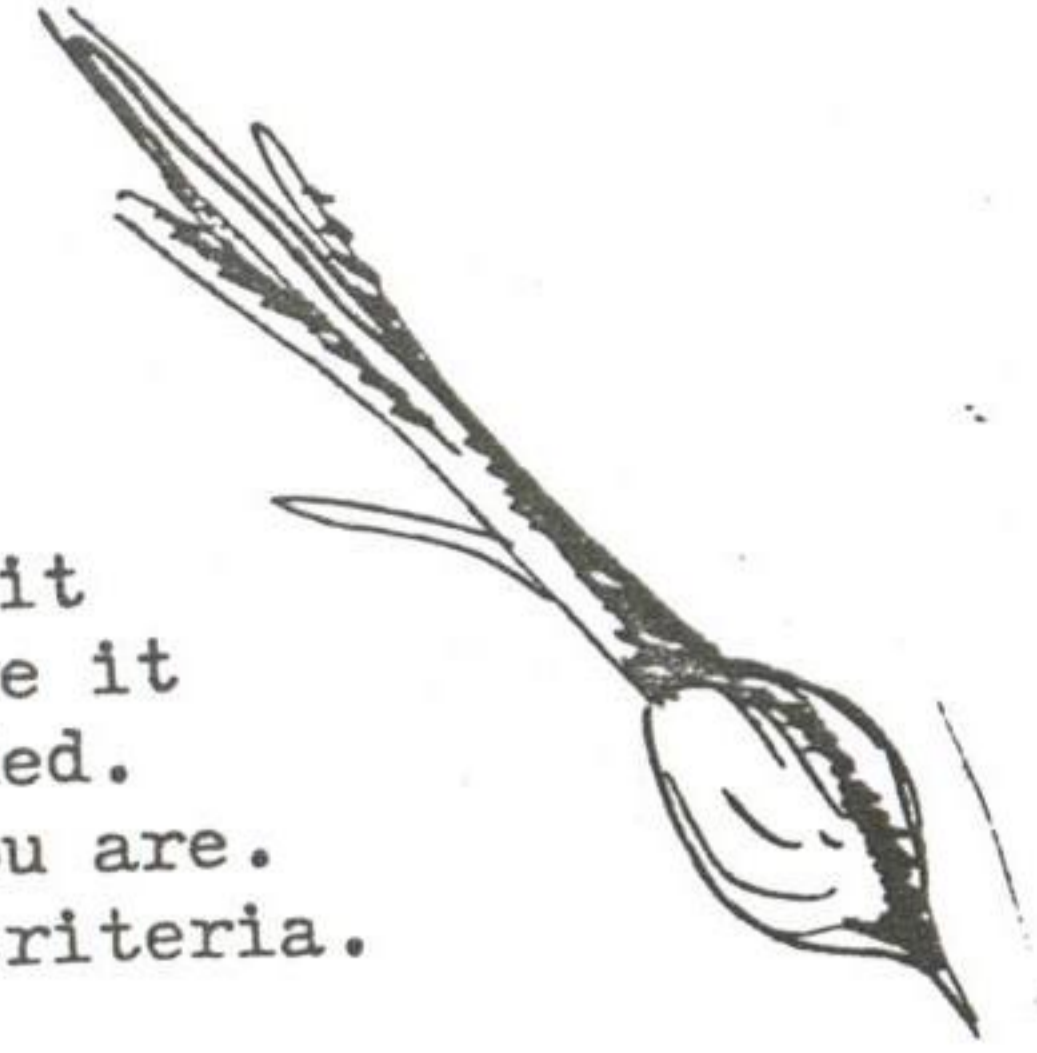

"I would like to say Thank You to the Fire Dept. and its volunteers for being so prompt and courteous when called to our home on June 4th for what could have been a bad fire.

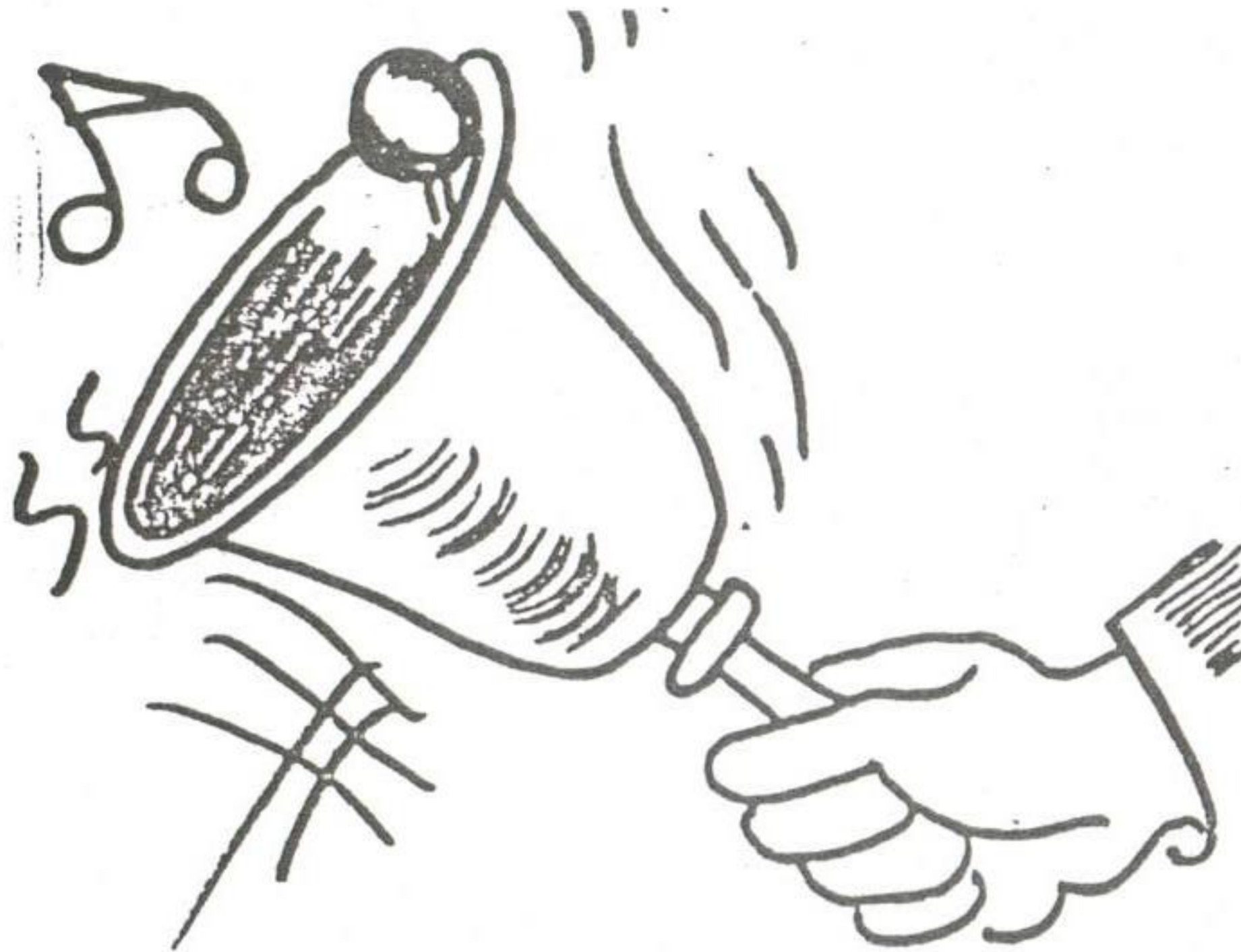

A Military Photo Contest open to amateur and professional military personnel and civilians alike, has been introduced by the Western Fair Photo Contest, held in London, Ont., early in September of each year.

Two categories have been added to an already outstanding list. The first is a print competition, either black and white or colour, mounted on a 16" x 20" board. The print must be at least 180 square inches and can be any shape. The second is colour slides. Subject matter must be of some aspect readily recognizable as pertaining to the armed forces. If enough entries in the print classification are forthcoming, the black and white will be separated from the colour, and each section will be judged separately with prizes being awarded in both.

A special trophy has been put together by the Canadian Forces Recruiting Centre, London, which is on permanent display there, along with the prize-winning picture. The overall winner's name will be suitably engraved each year and a smaller trophy sent to him/her.

The Western Fair will award three top prizes of \$20.00 in each Section.

The other open categories which also may be entered by anyone are for both black and white and colour sections in Pictorial, Human Interest, Portrait, Architectural Study, Spot News, Abstract and Nature Study.

A special achievement trophy is presented for the Best All Round Photographer based on a point system. First, second and third prize winners get 5 points, Awards of Merit get 3 points, Accepted prints get 1 point, and Special Awards get 5 points. To be eligible for the special achievement trophy, an exhibitor must have entered in at least four sections.

Deadline for entry is 1200 hours 01 August 80.

CARE OF PMQ LAWNS & TREES.

It is the responsibility of PMQ occupants to keep their lawns both cut and trimmed and to care for any trees and shrubs planted in their yard.

All PMQ occupants should be aware that there is a watering restriction in effect because of the limited capacity of the Water Treatment Plant. During the summer months there is a very high consumption and the restriction is imposed to maintain an adequate water pressure and fire protection level. If for any reason the water level should drop below minimum levels, notice will be given to all PMQ occupants to cease immediately watering of PMQ lawns.

As a helpful hint, with the hot dry weather expected for the summer months, PMQ occupants should endeavor to keep the cut height of their lawns fairly high - approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ - 2 inches. This should lessen the burning effect prevalent in the area and help to maintain a green looking lawn. In addition, all trees and shrubs should be well watered on a regular basis.

Play It Safe

Well, here it is the middle of June already. The kids will soon be finished school and it will be time for summer vacation.

One thing to remember about summer vacation is that it only comes once a year. You have to make the most of it while it lasts (and let's face it, vacations are ALWAYS too short) so before you leave home check all your gear and satisfy yourself that everything will work properly while you're away.

Campstoves, lanterns and anything else that uses liquid or gaseous fuel should be cleaned and checked to ensure proper operation. If you have the slightest doubt about their serviceability, have them inspected and repaired by a qualified service professional - after all, you and yours are worth every penny it may cost, aren't you!?

Trailers are major pieces of equipment which must also be properly cared for to ensure safety. A good solid hitch, taillights that work, properly inflated tires, good brakes (if it has them), and well-lubricated wheel bearings are just a few items to check. Of course, any appliances such as refrigerators and stoves should also be inspected to ensure proper operation. Add items to the list as you think of them so you don't forget anything.

Your main concern, I suppose, should be your good, old faithful family car since it gets you there and brings you back. I think almost anyone could write a book on what to inspect to make a car safe, so, to mention just a few things - lights, brakes, exhaust system, tires, wheel bearings, wheel alignment, lubrication, motor oil and antifreeze. That's all I'll mention here, but again, add to the list as you see fit so you cover everything.

Safety is mainly common sense and all I've tried to do here is give you a few hints about what to look at before you leave for your holidays. BOOKENDS

NIGHTWING by Martin Cruz Smith

The old Indian sits in the heat of his shack in the Painted Desert. The Hopi's, his people are dying a slow death, the death of the desert. "I'm going to end the world," he tells Youngman Duran, a bemused and cynical ex-convict the Hopi's have made into a deputy. Next morning the old medicine man is dead, bled to death. That is the start of his prophecy come true. Every night from then on, death stirs.

The burden of destroying the death falls on Youngman, and on the obsessed scientist Hayden Paine, whose life is the pursuit of death. Together they journey to the one place of the Hopi, both holy and infecred, where, the choice must be made, to live or to die. For night is falling.

THE MAIN by Trevanian

"The Main" is Montreals' immigrant district, teeming with crime, poverty, and society's rejects, a ghetto where Europeans and Asiatics, Catholics and Jews intermingle, Claude LaPointe, Police Lieutenant, has worked in the Main for thirty years, knows it as no other officer does, and, to prevent it from bursting its often rotten seams, plies the sharp needle and course thread that care his own brand of justice. For LaPointe, a widower, the Main has become his troublesome, demanding family.

LaPointe's existence is exploded by a grotesque murder in the Main. A flashy young Italian is found stabbed to death in a back alley. His investigation leads him to hustlers, winos and thieves, but not to a prompt solution.

DOLORES by Jacqueline Susann

This is Jacqueline Susann's last book. It is the intense, tragic story of Dolores Ryan, the beautiful and fashionable young widow of an assassinated American President.

After his death, Dolores finds herself too poor to sustain her extravagant tastes and too lonely to be fulfilled as a woman. The novel details her quest for money and for men.

SCRUPLES by Judith Krantz

This is the story of Billy Ikehorn, once a desperately unhappy woman, now a beautiful glamorous and sought after person. Billy moved from one man to the next until she found Ellis Ikehorn, nearly forty years her senior and ruler of a vast industrial empire. After five ecstatic years, Billy was alone one more. To fill the growing void, she created Scruples, a playland specialty shop where the rich could indulge their most lavish desires. For some, Scruples was the beginning of a dream come true - for Billy, it was the first step toward finding her real self and her desires.

YOUNG PEOPLES ENCYCLOPEDIA OF SPORTS

This is a well written book, describing 12 different sports. It gives the origin of some and describes, in easy to read terms, how the games are played. Described in detail are Soccer, Baseball, Football, Track & Field, Sports on Snow and Ice, Tennis, Basketball, Boxing, Wrestling & Judo, Diving, Swimming and Gymnastics.

FINANCIAL - SMALL LOANS AND BENEVOLENT FUND ASSISTANCE

1. The Canadian Forces Personnel Assistance Fund (CFPAF) comprises the Canadian Forces Small Loan Programme (CFSLP) and the Canadian Forces Financial Distress Programme. The Financial Distress Programme is operated in co-operation with the Royal Canadian Air Force Benevolent Fund (RCAFBF).

2. CFSLP Small loans of \$50. to \$500. are available to all members of the Canadian Forces (Regular) for any genuine purpose that will promote the well-being of members or their dependents.

3. CFSLP repayment rates may be geared from six to 24 months depending on the amount of the loan, at a service charge of \$3.00 per \$100. per year or approximately $5\frac{1}{2}\%$ simple interest.
